CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right. So
let's now go back to our calendar -- our afternoon calendar. The first case in our afternoon calendar, it's a protest hearing on Allure Lounge, License No. 108303. Ms. Andrews, can you please elevate the rights of the parties in this case, please?

MS. ANDREWS: Sure. Stand by.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Thank you.
MS. ANDREWS: Ms. Quat, your rights have been elevated. Mr. or Ms. Amente, your rights have been elevated. And Mr. Puente, your rights have been elevated. And that's all, Mr. Chair.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Okay. I'll mention that I also have the documents. All right. I would like the -- for the parties who have -- could you please turn your cameras on and open your microphone, please?

MR. AMENTE: Can you hear me, sir?
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Who's speaking?
I don't know who's speaking.
MR. AMENTE: Allure.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Okay. Hold on. Yes, sir. Are you on camera or are you just on the telephone today?
(Simultaneous speaking.)
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: You're Mr.
Amente? Oh, you're Mr. Amente. Okay. Do you have a camera?

MR. AMENTE: Yeah.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Well, it's not on, so $I$ can't see you.

MR. AMENTE: What do I click? Okay, so video, I think.
(Simultaneous speaking.)
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Mr. Puente, all right. All right. Okay. So I will -- all right. So good afternoon, everyone. I will let -- let's start for the parties to identify themselves. Let's -- I need you to state your name, your relationship to the establishment, and also spell your name.

And once -- what I'll ask all parties to do, if you're not speaking, please mute your telephone. I'm asking that of all the witnesses and I'm also asking that of all Board members too, if you're not speaking, please mute your
microphone because we have -- I guess my -- I don't have the feedback issue in my office. But for the other members, for whatever reason, if their microphones are unmuted, there is feedback. So I will just ask that if you're not speaking for you to please mute your microphone. All right. So let's start with the licensee. Please spell and state your name for the record, please.

MR. AMENTE: My name is Zerihun Amente. It's Z-E-R-I-H-U-N, last name, A-M-E-N-T-E.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Good afternoon, Mr. Amente.

MR. AMENTE: Good afternoon.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Let's start with the protestant. The protestant is ANC 6C. Turn your microphone on, ma'am. We can't hear you. I cannot hear you. I think you need to unmute your microphone. No. No. I can see you, but I cannot hear you.

MS. QUAT: What about now?
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Yes, I can hear you.

MS. QUAT: All right. Sorry, I had
the wrong microphone chosen. My name is Caroline Quat on behalf of ANC 6C. First name is C-A-R-O-L-I-N-E. Last name is Q-U-A-T.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Thank you, Ms. Quat. So the only other person that's on the line is Mr. Puente. Can you please introduce yourself for the record, Mr. Puente?

MR. PUENTE: Yes, I'm ABRA
Investigator Kevin Puente, K-E-V-I-N P-U-E-N-T-E.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right. Anyone else on the line who would be speaking today? Those are all the parties who will be speaking today? Okay. All right. All right. This is a protest hearing for -- it's to renew the license application for Allure Lounge. And this is the process how this will occur.

Each side will have one hour to present its case and -- one hour to present its case and that's for during -- while you present your case, for cross-examination of the other side. That counts towards your hour. In this particular case since there are no witnesses, then who's on line, normally, I would have stated that there are only -- that each side would have only five witnesses that could testify.

But since it appears that this is all we have today, so we don't have to worry about that being an issue. The way this case will present itself is that the applicant will make an opening statement. I'll give the applicant about five minutes to make an opening statement, and this is not part of your one hour presentation.

So the applicant will have -- can speak for about five minutes in an opening statement. The protestant can also make an opening statement and have five minutes to make an opening statement. Once the applicant and the protestant have provided an opening statement, then the Board will call its witness.

The Board's witness will testify and will go through the Board's report, testify. Once the Board's witness has testified, then the Board members would have an opportunity to question -- ask questions of the Board's witnesses. Once the Board members have had an opportunity to question the Board's witnesses, then the applicant will have an opportunity to ask questions of the Board's witness and/or witnesses.

Once the applicant has had an
opportunity to ask questions of the Board's witness, then the protestant will have an opportunity to question the Board's witness on the testimony and also the report that's filed. Once that's done, if the Board wants to ask additional questions of its witness, the Board will have that opportunity. The Board then will rest its case.

Once the Board has rested its case, the applicant will then present its case. And that's when the one hour that the applicant has to present his case. Once the applicant presents its case, then the protestant can cross-examine the applicant based on the testimony.

Once the protestant has cross-examined the applicant on his testimony, then the Board will have an opportunity to ask questions of the applicant. And once the Board asks questions of the applicant, then I will give the protestant an opportunity if they have any questions to ask of the applicant based on the questions that was asked by the Board. Once that is done, then the applicant could -- in this particular case since there's no attorney, the applicant, if for some reason that he needed to clarify his answers that
he had given to the Board or to the protestant, then he will have that opportunity to make clarification.

Once the applicant has presented his case, then the protestant will have an opportunity to present their case. And we will -- once the protestant presents its case, the applicant will have an opportunity to crossexamine the protestant's witness. Once the applicant has had an opportunity to cross-examine the protestant's witness, then the Board will have an opportunity to cross-examine the protestant's witness.

Once that is done, I will give the applicant a final opportunity to ask questions of the applicant's -- I'm sorry, the protestants. I'll have the applicant have an opportunity to ask questions of the protestant's witness. And then the protestant will have the last word if they need to make clarification.

Once the protestant has completed her case, then we'll do closing. And I'll give each side five minutes to close. And in closing, what I'm requesting is that you're free to tell me what is it that you want the Board to do.

So at the end of the case in your closing, you can say, this is what we have presented and this is what we are -- so the applicant can say, this is what I want the Board to do. The protestant can say, this is what I want the Board to do. Okay?

So that's what I expect for this matter to move smoothly. Now are there any preliminary issues that either the applicant or the protestant needs to bring to the attention of the Board for me to address? Mr. Amente, no? Yes? No? I need you to say something, sir.

MR. AMENTE: So what was the question? I'm sorry.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Are there any preliminary issues that you would like to bring to my attention before we start the case?

MR. AMENTE: Yes, the evidence, there is a lot of things that have been said about Allure before opened or after opened that really kind of been something honestly.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Sir, that's not -- well, preliminary -- you can -- when you do your direct testimony, you can state that. But preliminary is, like, are there any procedural
type of things that are happening that you need to bring to my attention before you present your case. But when you present your case, you can present your case that way.

MR. AMENTE: Okay. No.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right. So let me find my documents before I call our first witness. So hold on, please. Let me make sure that I have the documents. Hold on. All right. All right.

So the Board will then call its first witness. And the Board's first witness is Mr. Kevin Puente. Mr. Puente, can you raise your hand, please? WHEREUPON,

KEVIN PUENTE
was called for examination by Counsel for the ABC Board, having been first duly sworn, assumed the witness stand, was examined and testified as follows:

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right. Mr. Puente, can you please state your name for the record, please?

MR. PUENTE: Kevin Puente.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: And where are
you currently employed, sir?
MR. PUENTE: ABRA, the Alcoholic Beverage Regulation Administration.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: And what's your position at ABRA?

MR. PUENTE: I'm an investigator.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: How long have you worked for the Agency, sir?

MR. PUENTE: Approximately six years.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Have you
testified in a protest hearing before?
MR. PUENTE: Yes.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Approximately how many protest hearings, sir, have you testified in?

MR. PUENTE: Approximately four or five.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Thank you. Are you familiar with Allure Lounge, sir?

MR. PUENTE: Yes, sir.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: And how are you familiar with this establishment?

MR. PUENTE: I conducted a protest investigation.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: And as a result
of conducting a protest investigation, did there come a time that you wrote a report?

MR. PUENTE: Yes.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: And do you have a copy of the report, sir?

MR. PUENTE: Yes.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right. Now can you -- as a result of the -- who's protesting this matter, sir?

MR. PUENTE: ANC 6C.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: And do you know why the ANC -- do you know -- all right. Did there come a time -- all right. What information regarding the establishment were you able to find out as a result of your investigation?

MR. PUENTE: Yes, sir. So I was assigned the protest investigation of Allure Lounge which is a Class CT licensee. They're located at 711 H Street, Northeast. Allure Lounge applied for renewal as a tavern with hours to include operation of service from 11:00 a.m. to 2:00 a.m. Sunday to Thursday and 11:00 a.m. to 3:00 a.m. Friday and Saturday.

Allure Lounge requested a total occupant load of 69. Allure Lounge also has an
entertainment endorsement. The application was submitted by the owner, Mr. Amente.

The application for renew is being protested by ANC 6C who's being represented by Ms. Caroline Quat. The protestant submitted a letter to ABRA protesting the renewal on the grounds that the establishment will have an adverse impact on peace, order, quiet, adverse impact on the establishment's real property values, and the effect of the establishment upon residential parking needs and pedestrian safety. On Friday, January 15th, I spoke with Mr. Amente about the protest issues.

Mr. Amente stated that his biggest issues that the neighborhood doesn't want him to have entertainment. They're claiming that he's loud and a nuisance. Mr. Amente stated that the establishment has not been open for most of 2020 because of the Mayor's emergency order for the public health emergency with the coronavirus pandemic.

He said he opened for a little bit, then he shut down again when the Mayor reduced the occupant load to 25 percent. And since then, he has been closed. He stated that he has been
following all the laws and regulations with no issues.

On Wednesday, January 20th, I spoke with Ms. Quat. Ms. Quat stated that ANC 6C is protesting Allure because lots of noise, trash, and patrons leaving the establishment at closing time and being disruptive throughout the neighborhood walking to their cars. Ms. Quat stated that the patrons are loud and noisy and often wake up the neighborhood.

Ms. Quat stated that ANC 6C would like to see a rollback of the hours for the establishment from 2:00 a.m. to 12:00 a.m. on the weekdays and from 3:00 a.m. to 2:00 a.m. on the weekends. Ms. Quat said that the ANC 6C would like to see establishments stop allowing hookah unless they get approval from Department of Health. Lastly, Ms. Quat stated that the ANC 6C would like to see the establishment come to the ANC first before they apply for a summer garden or sidewalk café in the future.

Allure Lounge is located in NC-16 zone in H Street, Northeast neighborhood commercial overlay district. According to the zoning regulations, NC-16 sub-district of $H$ Street,

Northeast neighborhood runs along the H Street, Northeast corridor from 2nd Street, Northeast to 15th Street, Northeast. According to the District of Columbia Geographic Information System, there are 21 licensed ABC establishments operating within 1,200 feet of Allure Lounge.

I would like to add that I received this information during the public health emergency. As such, many establishments have closed temporarily or permanently and have not been reflected accurately in the current GIS system. Out of the 21 ABC establishments, 6 have entertainment endorsements, the Haymaker, Duffy's Irish Pub, Po Boy Jim, Mythology, Lore, and Dirty Water, Crab Boss, and Felicity Lounge.

Thirteen have settlement agreements with ABRA, D.C. Supermarket, the Haymaker, Duffy's Irish Pub, Chupacabra, Taqueria \& Rosticeria Fresca, Po Boy Jim, Mythology, Lore, and Dirty Water, The Wydown, Fancy Radish, Bar Elena, Solid State Books, Felicity Lounge, and NewAge Wine. According to the District of Columbia GIS system, there are no schools or public libraries within 400 feet of the establishment. There is one daycare nearby,

Loving Daycare Nursery is located at 616 H Street, Northeast and is approximately 264 feet away from Allure Lounge.

Allure Lounge is a medium-sized establishment located at 711 H Street. It is bounded by 8th Street, Northeast to the east, 7th Street, Northeast to the west, I Street, Northeast to the north, and G Street, Northeast to the south. Allure Lounge is a two-level establishment that has one main entrance.

They have a back door that leads to an alley. Most of the interior establishment is brick and mortar with a full-service bar. There is no soundproofing in the establishment.

The second floor of the establishment is not used. It is mainly a storage area for the establishment. Allure Lounge currently has the entertainment endorsement that goes on weekdays throughout the week to 2:00 a.m. and on the weekends to 3:00 a.m. Allure Lounge has contracted with DG Trash and Light Hauling to pick up his trash four times a week.

There is one Metro bus stop in the vicinity of Allure Lounge located at $H$ and 8th Street, Northeast. The bus serves the X1 and X2
lines going east and west along the H Street corridor. There is one street car stop located in the $\mathbf{7 0 0}$ block of $\mathbf{H}$ Street, Northeast in the vicinity of Allure Lounge. That serves the $H$ Street corridor from 2nd Street all the way to Oklahoma Avenue, Northeast.

Allure Lounge has no parking on site for vehicles. There's no parking lot or garages in the area. H Street, Northeast spanning from the 700 block to the 800 block offers on-street meter parking. 7th Street, Northeast, spanning from the 700 block through the 800 block offers on-street meter parking Monday through Saturday from 6:30 a.m. to 10:00 p.m. as well as Zone 6 permit holder parking.

I made a request for calls for service at the dates of the report. I have not heard back from the Office of Unified Command for that report. From October 2019 to January 5th, 2020, ABRA received five noise complaints at Allure Lounge. None were substantiated.

Allure Lounge was closed for most of the Mayor's public health emergency. They opened at times. They were monitored by ABRA investigators throughout the emergency. And I'd
like to add I was notified this morning that DOH, Department of Health shut down Allure Lounge this past Friday night for allowing hookah going -(Simultaneous speaking.)

MR. PUENTE: -- against the coronavirus pandemic.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Mr. Amente, please.

MR. AMENTE: Oh, sorry.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: You can't
speak. When you present your case or when you have -- you'll have an opportunity to cross examine him, sir. You can ask whatever questions you want when you're cross examining him.

The Board -- this is the Board's witness. The Board's witness is testifying. And neither party can ask questions of the Board witness until I have authorized you to ask questions, sir. All right. Go ahead, Mr. Puente.

MR. PUENTE: Oh, yes. As I was saying, we were notified that DOH shut down establishments on Friday for hookah smoking and Allure Lounge was one of them. And that's all I had to add, sir.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right. The report that you wrote, Mr. Puente, are there any exhibits attached to the report?

MR. PUENTE: Yes.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Can you go through -- can you name the exhibits and go through them, please?

MR. PUENTE: Yes. Exhibit 1 is a letter from ANC 6C for the protest. Exhibit 2 is the zoning map for Allure Lounge. Exhibit 3 is the GIS map of the establishments within 1,200 feet.

Exhibit 4 is the GIS map for any schools and daycares within 400 feet of the establishment. Exhibit 5 is the front of the establishment. Exhibit 6 is the front door of Allure Lounge.

Exhibit No. 7 is the inside of Allure Lounge when you come in. Exhibit 8 is the bar area of Allure Lounge. Exhibit 9 is where the DJ sets up the DJ booth.

Exhibit 10 is some seating. Exhibit 11 is the area where the bathrooms are. Exhibit 12 is one of the bathrooms. Exhibit 13 is another picture of the bathroom.

Exhibit 14 is a picture of the kitchen. Exhibit 15 is a picture of the kitchen. Exhibit 16 is a picture of the kitchen. Exhibit 17 is a picture of the kitchen. Exhibit 18 is a picture of inside the kitchen.

Exhibit 19 is the trash area. Exhibit 20 is the stairs leading to the second floor. Exhibit 21 is the picture of the second floor. Exhibit 22 is on the second floor. It's the office area.

Exhibit 23 is the rear door in the alley outside of the establishment. Exhibit 24 is the alley directly behind the establishment. Exhibit 25 is the continuation of the alley.

Exhibit 26 shows the Metro bus stop and a street car stop. Exhibit 27 shows the Metro stop and the street car stop. Exhibit 28 shows the parking on $H$ Street in front of and across the street of Allure Lounge.

Exhibit 29 shows parking in front of Allure Lounge. Exhibit 30 is a picture of the street parking on Allure Lounge. And Exhibit 31 shows the parking on 7th Street next to Allure Lounge.
(Whereupon, the above-referred to
documents were marked and received into evidence as ABC Board Exhibit Nos. 1 through 31 for identification.) CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Mr. Puente, so when was -- you have several pictures of interior and exterior. So for example, Exhibit 19, when was that exhibit taken?

MR. PUENTE: Yeah, so due to the public health emergency, the pandemic, the pictures -- I couldn't get inside the establishment since it was closed. The pictures were taken February 4th, 2019 from the final inspection that was conducted by ABRA.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: And so that's the interior. So what about -- I see Exhibit 19 is a trash area. When was that taken?

MR. PUENTE: Exhibit 19, that was taken during the final inspection as well.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: So all the pictures -- okay. So all the pictures -- all the exhibits were taken prior to the pandemic?

MR. PUENTE: Yes, for inside of the establishment. All the outside pics were taken by me during my investigation.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Now the reason
-- so that's why I was asking you because Exhibit 19 was the trash area -- is the trash area. So that's why I was trying to find when --

MR. PUENTE: Yes.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: -- was this
taken.
MR. PUENTE: Yeah, that was taken February 4th, 2019.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: On 2019?
MR. PUENTE: Yes, during the final inspection.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Okay. Now since the -- I know you stated that -- have you done any monitoring of this establishment recently?

MR. PUENTE: Yes, the weekend that I went, they were closed. When I spoke to Mr. Amente, he advised me that he shut down when the Mayor enforced the 25 percent indoor dining restriction. Then the dining ban occurred as well.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Now you just mentioned that it was your understanding that they were closed by the Department of Health this Friday. So can you --

MR. PUENTE: Yes.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: -- explain that to us, please?

MR. PUENTE: So apparently, Allure Lounge opened back up this past week. And DOH said that they shut down Allure Lounge for hookah smoking.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Now let's see. You stated that you did not receive any information from -- you did not receive any information regarding a noise complaint regarding this establishment?

MR. PUENTE: No, we received five noise complaints from October 2019 to January 5th 2020. We have not received any since according to our noise task force coordinator.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: So the noise complaint that you received, the five you received during that period of time, were any of those substantiated?

MR. PUENTE: Yes, none were substantiated.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: You said none were substantiated?

MR. PUENTE: None, none, sir.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Or were they? I'm sorry. You're saying none -- you said none of them were substantiated? Is that what you stated?

MR. PUENTE: Yes, that's what $I$ said.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Okay, fine. Now tell me -- you stated that -- I want to go back. And Mr. Amente, you can testify about that later on. You stated that you got notice from Department of Health about this hookah smoking. What, if anything, is wrong with it? Tell me -why was this a big deal, if any?

MR. PUENTE: During -- so prior to the pandemic, there was only -- you had to get an exemption from the Department of Health to allow hookah smoking or cigar smoking inside your establishment. So you had to go through a process to apply and get approved by Department of Health. During the Mayor's public health emergency, it's outlined in her restrictions that there can be no hookah smoking allowed inside the establishments.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: And so you're saying that you got information this past Friday that they were cited by the Department of Health
for allowing hookah smoking in the establishment. Is that correct?

MR. PUENTE: Yes.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right. Now do you know whether or not prior to -- prior to the COVID emergency, do you know whether or not they have -- let me ask you a question. Are you familiar with? I know that this is not something that ABRA regulates. But do you -- are you aware of what it is that an establishment requires to allow hookah smoking -- an alcoholic establishment requires hookah -- what is it that an alcohol establishment requires to allow hookah smoking in the establishment?

MR. PUENTE: From my conversations with Department of Health, an establishment has to show two years of consecutive tobacco sales in order to get the exemption for hookah.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Now do you know whether or not -- I know that there's a different criteria for -- because of COVID. But do you know whether or not this establishment has this? Do you know if they have this exemption from the Department of Health?

MR. PUENTE: Oh, no. They do not have
the exemption.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Okay. All
right. So are you saying that because they don't have the exemption that hookah smoking should not be in the establishment, period? Is that what you're saying? Is that your understanding? Is that --

MR. PUENTE: Yes.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: -- your understand?

MR. PUENTE: Yes, my understanding right now during the Mayor's public health emergency, no establishment should allow hookah. And if they are, DOH can shut the establishment down on the spot.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right. I don't have any other questions. Does any of the Board members have any questions that they want to ask Mr. Puente? I'm sorry. Raise your hand. I don't recognize you.
(Simultaneous speaking.)
MEMBER GRANDIS: Ed Grandis. I was looking through the exhibits, and I couldn't pull it up. But sir, you said you had an exhibit that showed the CSA, I think you called it, for
establishments -- ABC establishments within a facility of that establishment. Is that correct? MR. PUENTE: Yes, sir.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Hold on. Hold on one minute. Hold on, Mr. Grandis. Mr. Puente, do you have the ability to share your screen?

MR. PUENTE: I do not, sir.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: No, I'm sorry. Do you have -- all right. Let me ask you a question. I asked the question incorrectly. Do you have the documents on your computer so I could give you permission to share your screen? That's what I need to ask you.

MR. PUENTE: No, I have the hard copy in front of me, sir.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Okay. All right. That's fine. I'm sorry. Go ahead, Mr. Grandis.

MEMBER GRANDIS: I apologize. I'm trying to pull up my documents. But sir, could you reference other establishments on that CSA sheet that also have entertainment endorsements?

MR. PUENTE: Yes, sir. So there are six within 1,200 feet that have entertainment
endorsements. The six are the Haymaker, Duffy's Irish Pub, Po Boy Jim, Mythology, Lore, and Dirty Water, Crab Boss, and Felicity Lounge. Felicity Lounge is to the right of the establishment, and Po Boy Jim is exactly to the left of the establishment. They're all neighbors.

MEMBER GRANDIS: Okay. And I think you testified that there was a period where ABRA received some noise complaints. And inspectors went out and they were not able to substantiate the noise complaint from the establishment of record --
(Simultaneous speaking.)
MR. PUENTE: Yes.
MEMBER GRANDIS: Was ABRA able on those evenings to establish noise from other establishments in that 1,200 feet?

MR. PUENTE: I'm not sure. I'd would have to find out which investigators responded to those calls and ask them.

MEMBER GRANDIS: Thank you.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right. Are there any other Board members who wish to ask questions of the investigator?
(No audible response.)

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Okay. Hearing none, Mr. Amente, this is your opportunity to ask questions of Mr. Puente. You can ask him any questions that you so desire off his testimony and off his report. Go ahead, sir.

MR. AMENTE: Okay. I'm going to jump to the Health Department. When did you get the notification that $I$ got shut down --
(Simultaneous speaking.)
MR. PUENTE: I found out this morning that it was allegedly Friday, January 29th.

MR. AMENTE: It wasn't open. Felicity got shut down because of Health.

MR. PUENTE: Okay. I'm waiting to hear back to confirm, so --

MR. AMENTE: I'm waving the picture that it shows a window I take of somebody and I'm waiting to speak, not Allure.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Remember, sir, you're asking him a question. Okay? You're asking questions of him. Okay? $I$ just want to remind you.

MR. AMENTE: Sorry. It's my first time. Okay. So during your investigation, how do you describe 700 block of $H$ Street? Is it
quiet? Is there any activities that you have witnessed? For example, people standing at the corner of 8th and H smoking, is there any alley -- is any activity in the alleys?

MR. PUENTE: That could be twofold because right now during the Mayor's public health emergency, $H$ Street is much quieter right now due to a lot of establishments have to close at midnight. Then you've got a lot of alcohol establishments have to stop selling alcohol at 10:00. I noticed from my work at H Street that 10:00 o'clock, a lot of the establishments on $H$ Street will close. But prior to the pandemic, $H$ Street -- there would be a lot of foot traffic on H Street, people walking, people smoking on the corners and stuff.

MR. AMENTE: So would you agree it's not quiet?

MR. PUENTE: I couldn't hear you, sir.
MR. AMENTE: Do you agree it's not, like, a quiet corner on $H$ Street -- the 8 and $H$ ?

MR. PUENTE: No, because I would say it's not because you've got the Metro bus cars, the street cars, and people walking.

MR. AMENTE: So do you think Allure
being there create more noise on that block since 2019?

MR. PUENTE: What's the question?
MR. AMENTE: So do you think Allure being there since 2019 increased the noise of the people out there or a car braking, house breaking, all legal activities?

MR. PUENTE: Oh, no, because we do -well, our supervisor will answer a hotline call for noise and they'll ask the caller what they're hearing before they send us out to verify that it's music or anything. They won't send us out for a car noise or anything.

MR. AMENTE: So it could be next door. It could be noise in a car. It could be anywhere, yes?

MR. PUENTE: Yes, if someone is sitting in their car, I've come across that at times.

MR. AMENTE: So after you guys came and investigate that the noise not coming from me and not -- since I never got any fine about the noise complaint, so my license is standing good hand, right, on --

MR. PUENTE: Yes.

MR. AMENTE: -- according to noise complaint?

MR. PUENTE: Yes, because you got five noise calls from October 2019 to January 5th, 2020 and none were substantiated.

MR. AMENTE: Okay. So how do you observe about the parking in your investigation? Is that, like, always full, or is it, like, spots open for anybody?

MR. PUENTE: Yeah, when I went during the daytime, there were open spots. And my time prior to the pandemic, usually parking was full along 8th Street. Right now, it's more open because a lot of taverns are closed.

MR. AMENTE: Do you have, like, a time frame that you observed that parking is full between 7 and 8 Street, not on the main street but the neighbors.

MR. PUENTE: Neighbors? I don't have a time frame. No, I do not.

MR. AMENTE: But you observe, like, kind of full all the time before the pandemic?

MR. PUENTE: Yeah, from my previous visits over at $H$ Street, $I$ noticed that parking was full on that block.

MR. AMENTE: So Allure being there, do you think is it because of Allure that the parking is always full?

MR. PUENTE: Could you repeat that, sir?

MR. AMENTE: Do you think the parking is always full back in the days is because of Allure being there or --

MR. PUENTE: No, like I reference in my report, there's over 21 establishments within 1,200 feet of yours. So there's a lot of establishments in that corridor.

MR. AMENTE: Yeah, because they complain about the parking that that's why I ask this question. So would you agree that not only Allure has so much parking?

MR. PUENTE: Yeah. I mean, I can't pinpoint each car to each establishment. No, I can't do that.

MR. AMENTE: Have you noticed any activity about weed smoking or weed consumption in Allure? We met a couple of times. You came a couple of times before.

MR. PUENTE: No, the two visits I made to you, I believe, on your investigative history,
one is my report. I think just right when you opened up or just prior to you opening up, you were running off one-day licenses. But no, not when I've been there. I haven't really noticed any weed.

MR. AMENTE: Have you give any fine about hookah smoking in bars?

MR. PUENTE: No, ABRA cannot fine establishments. That has to be a Department of Health regulation.

MR. AMENTE: So how many bars do you think in D.C. sell hookah?

MR. PUENTE: Oh, I couldn't give you an exact -- there's a lot.
(Simultaneous speaking.)
MR. PUENTE: I couldn't give you an exact number.

MR. AMENTE: Okay. Yeah, that's the only question I have.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right.
Thank you, Mr. Amente.
(Simultaneous speaking.)
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Do you have any questions of Mr. Puente?

MS. QUAT: Yes, thanks so much. Just
a couple of questions. Thanks for your thorough report. Do you have any record of complaints from before October 2019, or is that just the date you looked for of --

MR. PUENTE: No, that's --
MS. QUAT: -- noise complaints or any other complaints from ABRA?

MR. PUENTE: Yeah. No, I don't have anything before. That's just the date that the supervisor gave me.

MS. QUAT: And then when it comes to establishments that have an entertainment endorsement, do you guys typically see increased complaints that come in about those types of establishments?

MR. PUENTE: What kind of complaints?
MS. QUAT: Noise complaints, patrons, kind of just any sort of complaints?

MR. PUENTE: Yes, I responded to a fair share of noise complaints because of a loud DJ or loud music instruments playing and people singing.

MS. QUAT: And then when you get those complaints, how do you substantiate those claims to which establishment they're coming from,
especially if you mentioned how the block has -there's three with entertainment endorsements next to each other. So how are you substantiating to each --

MR. PUENTE: So --
MS. QUAT: -- restaurant or establishment?

MR. PUENTE: -- we can substantiate it several ways. The biggest thing we substantiate it with, during usually the summer and fall and springtime, we have a noise task force where we work with DCRA. And they'll send a representative out with us who will have a noise meter reading.

And if they find it to be over a certain decibel, that'll constitute as a violation. Also, we substantiate it if they have settlement agreements and it's in the settlement agreement saying music cannot be heard in the residences or heard outside the establishment. That's another way we could substantiate it. MS. QUAT: Thank you. Sorry. I was taking some notes. And then my last question is, what was your interaction with $H$ Street before the pandemic? And then I'll have a follow-up to
that question once you answer it.
MR. PUENTE: Usually, I work every other weekend on nights. So usually, every weekend, $I$ find myself on $H$ Street, either responding to calls, MPD's calls for service if MPD calls us. So usually every weekend, we're on H Street working.

MS. QUAT: And my follow-up to that is, do you see a lot people? You see it's a pretty busy area of the city?

MR. PUENTE: Yes, $H$ Street has come up over the last -- my six years I noticed, especially with the new residential buildings coming up there and many more establishments coming to that area. So it's getting more congested I noticed.

MS. QUAT: Great. Thank you so much. Those are all of my questions.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right.
Thank you, Ms. Quat. Do we have any questions by any Board members of the questions that were asked by both the licensee and the ANC?
(No audible response.)
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Hearing none, thank you very much, Mr. Puente, for your
testimony and have a good day. Thank you.
MR. PUENTE: Thank you, sir. You too.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right. So
Mr. Amente, this is your opportunity to present your case. Do you have witnesses you're going to call, or are you the only witness, sir?

MR. AMENTE: No, I'm the only one.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Can you raise your right hand, please? WHEREUPON,

## ZERIHUN AMENTE

was called for examination by Counsel for the Licensee, having been first duly sworn, assumed the witness stand, was examined and testified as follows:

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right. Go ahead. How do you plan to present your case?

MR. AMENTE: Yeah. Can I show a picture that just taken about closing my establishment for the other --
(Simultaneous speaking.)
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Is it on your computer?

MR. AMENTE: No, just probably you can see it. But I'm just saying that it's not
correct thing that he present. I didn't get shut down.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: What is that you're showing, sir?

MR. AMENTE: The front of my establishment. Just -- my friend just took a picture. I didn't see any food violation in my -- on my window.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Well, sir, I don't know -- I'm sorry. I don't know -- I know when ABRA shuts you down, there is a different type of sticker in front of your establishment. I don't know what it is that the Department of Health does. But anyway, go ahead.

MR. AMENTE: I just want you and the Board to know that that's false testimony that the Health close me down. I wasn't open Friday. CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Okay. Go ahead.

MR. AMENTE: Yeah, so I wrote a question from the evidence that they send me for individual. But the only person I'm seeing is -I can't pronounce his name. So --

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: No, sir. All right. This is -- all right. This is your
opportunity to present your case. How you present your case is that you're telling us why that you believe that your license should be renewed.

MR. AMENTE: Okay.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Once Ms. Quat -- once she testified, then you can ask questions of her.

MR. AMENTE: Okay.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: But this is your opportunity to tell the Board through whatever documents or evidence that you have why is that the Board should renew your license. So that's why I swear you in. So you said you were going to be testifying. So that's what I need you to tell us, sir.

MR. AMENTE: Okay. Yeah, so since Allure opened, doing good, that everything that I heard about the noise complaint and everything didn't came from Allure. It's a good standing building. You give me time, please? Yes?

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: You have an hour. You have an hour. Take your time.
(Simultaneous speaking.)
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Hold on. Hold
on. Hold on. Hold on. Hold on. Okay. We'll be off the record for -- we're off the record for a couple of minutes.
(Whereupon, the above-entitled matter went off the record at 2:23 p.m. and resumed at 2:27 p.m.)

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right. So as $I$ stated -- so we're back on the record now. All right. So as I stated, Mr. Amente, this is your opportunity to tell the Board why is it that we should renew your license. Your license has been protested, so this is your opportunity to present whatever documents on the record that you want to present to the Board to convince the Board that we should renew your license.

MR. AMENTE: Yes, so the license is in good standing. And all of the evidence that is submitted not related to Allure. The back alley, the parking, the people smoking outside has nothing to do with Allure. They mention the car broken, house broken. They refer all that to Allure, and it's not true.

I mean, I have no violation except one time over capacity. During the coronavirus, ABRA visit me, like, five times. Nothing wrong.

Felicity got three warning, two fine, got shut down. Again, he just got shut down again because of Health. I have nothing for me.

There's no violation in Allure. I mean, that's the only -- they have nothing. I cooperate on everything. I do my best. You told me to not see me again back in the day. So I'm trying to do that.

Because the reason I'm really nervous is they said Allure is a place to sell stolen things which is not true. They say after Allure opened, houses broken. How many times have any living got robbed? How many times have any living got robbed with arm. Crown Chicken, how many people got stabbed?

I witnessed since 2017 five gunshots on H Street corridor. It's not because of Allure. House broken, my car broken two times. My ex car broken one times. Yeah, it's a -- I mean, I'm trying to do my best. But this email is really personal to me, what they wrote about Allure.

They have nothing. And anybody can call for noise complaint. But ABRA is tough. They found with the measurement, they measure the
sound. But nothing happened. I don't know why. I mean, you're not living in the suburbs. H Street, there's always something.

Anyway, just Board to know that all the evidence that is submit not good enough and really, really insulting, especially Allure's stolen materials place. It's not -- that's all, sir. Yeah.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right.
Thank you, Mr. Amente. All right. Ms. Quat is going to ask you some questions about your testimony. So I need you to answer the questions, sir. Okay. So she's going to ask you some questions. I need you to answer her questions. Go ahead, ma'am.

MS. QUAT: Hi, it's good to see you. I promise $I$ don't have super tough questions. Have you and $I$ been in communication since I think it was winter 2019, winter 2020 to try and resolve the protest?

MR. AMENTE: Yes.
MS. QUAT: Have I presented you different options such as rolling back hours to put into a new settlement agreement that say prohibition of hookah, prohibition of a summer
garden? Have I given you those options?
MR. AMENTE: Yes, you did.
MS. QUAT: Have you agreed to any of those options and to do a new settlement agreement?

MR. AMENTE: No.
MS. QUAT: Can you tell me why you didn't want to agree to any of these new settlement agreements?

MR. AMENTE: Sure. You complained about the noises first time, right? About the --
(Simultaneous speaking.)
MS. QUAT: Mm-hmm.
MR. AMENTE: I know the noise, I know for sure, $I$ know my noise don't go outside. I have permission with Mark, 522. That house, she complain about noise. What about the two house, like, before her?

So he came up with a noise complaint and the person with the complaint and surrounding. That's not me. If it was me, yeah, we come up with something. But it's not me. Why I cut my hours for?

We talked about this. I went to 522, and I talk to her. I said, just to know if

Allure or Felicity or 705. You guys know about 705. Just let me know. If you hear a sound, let me know. So that way, we all know where the sound coming from.

Already Mark, the yellow house, already put wrong name on my -- I would've been not there. I testify to you. Come on. He walked into the back door and he notice weed? He's not supposed to walk in the back door without permission in the first place. He wrote, address 709. But mind is 707. And he wrote our names.

MS. QUAT: So if you are --
MR. AMENTE: Let's say -- let me -let's say $I$ am fine about the noise to 3:00. That's understandable. But it's nothing. Why am I going to increase our hours? I'm doing -- I'm there all the time. I check the sound. There's no sound coming out. So we cannot about the trash. It's not mine.

MS. QUAT: On the noise, if -- would you believe that there are multiple neighbors who have complained to the ANC about noise that maybe haven't come to you because they are people who avoid confrontation and they just went to the

ANC? Do you think that that is something that the ANC --

MR. AMENTE: Actually, the ANC -(Simultaneous speaking.)
MR. AMENTE: I've been around in business. Weed is supposed to be the thing. When you hear something, you're coming to me. You don't hold it. I mean, we not enemies. So I'm careful.

When I did my settlement the first time, you guys weren't there. I forgot his name. We walked in. He's a video man. We made a sound. We set it that way.

MS. QUAT: So a follow-up. You're saying that they were supposed to work together. And just to confirm, $I$ did give you multiple options of ways to remedy the situation with neighbors to sign a settlement agreement to avoid a hearing, correct?

MR. AMENTE: Again, that's my money. One hour is my money. That's easy money, right? Why would without me doing wrong why I cut my hours? Let's say you're working, right? Without doing anything wrong, if they cut your hours, would you be happy? We have a --
(Simultaneous speaking.)
MS. QUAT: I have no further questions.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right. Any
-- all right. Any questions of Mr. Amente by any Board members?

MEMBER SHORT: Yeah.
(Simultaneous speaking.)
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: I'm sorry. Who was that? Mr. Short. Go ahead, Mr. Short.

MEMBER SHORT: Good afternoon, Mr. Amente.

MR. AMENTE: Good afternoon, sir.
MEMBER SHORT: Great. Are you the owner, ABC licensee and proprietor, sole owner and proprietor of Allure Lounge?

MR. AMENTE: Yes.
MEMBER SHORT: Has, to your knowledge, ever been any smoking of any materials, any smoking of any type from the time you opened Allure until now? Has there ever been any smoking inside of the club?

MR. AMENTE: Hookah?
MEMBER SHORT: Anything. Smoking anything.

MR. AMENTE: Hookah, yes. So --
MEMBER SHORT: Wait a minute. That's fine. You said yes, correct?

MR. AMENTE: Hookah, yes.
MEMBER SHORT: Okay. Did you know or were you aware that the Department of Health has to give you a permit before you can smoke inside of a club?

MR. AMENTE: Is that a yes or no, or can I explain?

MEMBER SHORT: That's a yes or no answer, sir.

MR. AMENTE: So I figured that I would after one time when they came and they pointed out I have to do exemption. So that's when I apply because everywhere I go -- I'm move from Philly. So everywhere I go, hookah smoking.

MEMBER SHORT: I have a very short time, Mr. Amente. I just want to know before the Health Department came and told you to stop, has there been smoking previous to that and has there been smoking since that time?

MR. AMENTE: Hookah, yes.
MEMBER SHORT: Thank you. That's all
I have, Mr. Chair.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Any questions by the Board members?
(No audible response.)
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Ms. Quat, do you have any questions of Mr. Amente based on any questions that the Board was asking?

MS. QUAT: No questions.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Mr. Amente, do you need to explain yourself based on the questions that the Board asked you?
(No audible response.)
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Mr. Short had asked you a question, then he had said yes or no. And you said you had an explanation.
(Simultaneous speaking.)
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Do you want to explain?

MR. AMENTE: Yeah, so --
(Simultaneous speaking.)
MR. AMENTE: Yeah, so, about hookah, Nomad since for the ten years, a lot of places that have hookah in advertising. I even have visitors from DOH. I'm a tavern.

So she came and she advised me that to get exemption. That's when $I$ start doing
exemption and I stopped. But like I said, all bars sell hookah. And yeah, after that -- like I said, after that, ABRA came. Like I said, Felicity got shut down because hookah been doing the same thing.

Once I know -- this is my first time doing a bar. Once I know, like, I'm doing wrong, I avoid that. But yeah, hookah, it's honest mistake, I would say. But am I going to do it again? No, I already applied. I'm doing the process.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right. Do you have anything else you want to say, or do you rest your case at this juncture? I'm still going to give you another opportunity to make a closing statement. But at this juncture, do you have anything else you need to say?

MR. AMENTE: So can I ask? Is that me?

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Ask who a question, sir?

MR. AMENTE: I can't say her name.
I'm sorry.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: No, you can't ask her a question. That's why $I$ had given you -

- well, no, she's going to testify. All right. All right. She's going to present her case now. So when she presents her case, you'll have an opportunity to cross examine her as she just cross examined you. So --

MR. AMENTE: Okay.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: -- are you done presenting your case?

MR. AMENTE: Yeah, basically, I'm saying, like, Allure is being really cooperating with the rules. And I have good feedback from the same area, from all apartment. They come to hang out. It's not -- I'm doing my best and the Board to know that, understand. And the hookah, it's honest mistake and I will not do it again. (Simultaneous speaking.)

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right. Now you can say that when you close your case. I'm going to give you five --

MR. AMENTE: Okay.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: -- minutes at the end of the case. But I guess you don't have anything else more to say in presenting your case. Is that where we are right now?

MR. AMENTE: Yeah, all of it, yeah.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right. Okay. All right. We're fine. All right. Ms. Quat, do you have any witnesses to call or are you the only witness?

MS. QUAT: I'm the only witness.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Can you raise your right hand, please? WHEREUPON,

## CAROLINE QUAT

was called for examination by Counsel for the Protestant, having been first duly sworn, assumed the witness stand, was examined and testified as follows:

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Okay. Go ahead ma'am.

MS. QUAT: And this includes time for opening statement?

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: You already did your opening.

MS. QUAT: Okay.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: And so you're still -- you have an hour. But I'll give you five minutes to do a closing after you present your case.

MS. QUAT: Okay. Because I don't --
actually, just a procedural question. I don't know if we did opening statements.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Didn't I ask you? I thought we did. But if you didn't --

MS. QUAT: No.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: -- I'm sorry.
MS. QUAT: Okay.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: I thought I told all parties. But if we didn't, I apologize. But you can do that now if you want.

MS. QUAT: Okay. That's why I'm going to be reading from a separate screen if there --

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: That's fine.
MS. QUAT: -- was a question. So the ANC 6C protests the license renewal of Allure Lounge on the following basis. The establishment continues to disturb the peace, order, and quiet of the surrounding neighborhood. And the establishment's continued disruption to the neighborhood adversely impacts property values.

The ANC respectfully requests that ABRA reviews the license renewal and takes these three actions before granting the license renewal. Set the hours of the establishment to be 12:00 a.m. on weekdays and 2:00 a.m. on
weekends. Prohibit the sale of hookah on the premises and prohibit the creation and opening of a summer garden or sidewalk café unless getting approval from the ANC 6C.

The ANC requests these actions because of multiple complaints and issues that have arisen since the business opened in January 2019. The exhibits show repeated complaints from neighbors as well as repeated complaints reported to ABRA and to MPD. MPD and ABRA have been made aware of these issues and as shown by evidence logs from both stating the dates of the offences, incidents, and complaints.

The complaints have ranged from noise and disorderly conduct, from patrons of Allure to issues with trash in the alley, alleyway between the businesses and residential properties. Additionally, reports from MPD show other issues of patrons such as multiple ABC violations. These issues from Allure show how the business is not being a good neighbor.

Another piece of evidence is a letter from residents to the business asking Allure to turn down music to a reasonable level. The letter states over the last several weeks and
months, the noise generated by your business has cost our family and children a great deal of sleep. The noise mostly in the form of loud bass beat begins about 10:00 p.m. and lasts until early and sometimes late in the morning.

These homeowners have not only expressed their issues directly with the business which has done nothing to alleviate the issues but have also expressed these issues to the ANC which have led to the protest. Allure is one of the few businesses in the area that is open till 3:00 a.m. on weekends and 2:00 a.m. on weeknights. Its neighbor, Felicity Lounge, is open until 2:00 a.m. on weekends and 1:00 a.m. on weeknights.

## This leads us to believe that

 complaints coming in after 2:00 a.m. on weekends and 1:00 a.m. on weeknights are most likely coming from Allure as it's the only business open on that block. The ANC is requesting a rollback of hours to be more in line with other businesses, specifically 12:00 a.m. on weeknights and 2:00 a.m. on weekends. We believe this will help alleviate many of the neighbors and ANC's concern.The ANC is also asking ABRA to prohibit Allure from opening a summer garden or sidewalk without agreement from the ANC and an updated settlement agreement. Allure has proven itself since opening not to be a cooperative neighbor. And we don't believe that allowing a summer garden or sidewalk café without a new settlement agreement with that endorsement would be productive for the neighborhood.

Another issue is that Allure sells hookah to its patrons as seen by members of the ANC and neighbors before. The business advertises itself as a hookah lounge including doing so on Yelp. However, Allure does not have a license to do so and does not have a smoking exemption from the Department of Health or in their settlement agreement with the ANC.

This was confirmed in January 2021. The did apply in 2019 for an endorsement. But all the required information was not given to D.C. Health, so it was not approved.

The ANC originally protested this renewal in fall of 2019. But due to the pandemic, this hearing has been delayed almost a year. So during the time of the original protest
and during the time during the pandemic, the ANC has reached out to the establishment and started a line of communication to hopefully reach a compromise.

We've proposed multiple solutions, and the establishment was adamant that none of the issues have come from his business. He would also say how he wanted to work with us but still has not agreed to any of the compromises that we have proposed. Solutions that we have presented have been rolling back the hours voluntarily, a rollback situation where hours would only be rolled back if a certain number of complaints had been logged with ABRA over a certain period of time, as well as agreement that only had the prohibition of hookah on the premises and the prohibition of a summer garden and café, eliminating the want for rolling back the hours. No solution has been agreed upon as of today. Because of all these reasons, we believe ABRA has sufficient grounds to grant our request. And now I'm going to kind of just walk through the packet of evidence that $I$ submitted. So the first couple of pages --

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Hold on a
minute. Do you -- on your screen, do you want to share your screen with us?

MS. QUAT: Yes. Actually, it'd be great.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Ms. Andrews, can you please give her the ability to share her screen, please?

MS. ANDREWS: Sure. Stand by. Okay. It looks like you have presenter privileges. Could you please try for me?

MS. QUAT: Yup. Okay. Do you all see my screen?

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Yes.
MS. QUAT: It's a PDF profile.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: The first, I'm looking at a Gmail.

MS. QUAT: Yes.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Yes, go ahead. MS. QUAT: So these first couple of pages are what I believe Mr. Amente was referencing. And these couple of emails are really submitted to demonstrate that for an extended period of time, there have been issues on the 700 block of $H$ Street. And these issues are not just common to Allure. There are other
businesses that the ANC is protesting at this time.

And these just go to serve that there's a couple of times where Allure is pointed out in them. But there have just been issues with the business since the beginning. We have a couple of neighbors who are very outspoken and who kind of speak for the couple of houses, I guess, like, the full block of houses that live near one particular neighbor.

And he has kind of gathered a lot of complaints. He's seen a lot of stuff over the past couple of years. And so what these emails are demonstrating are just that there have been issues for a while.

I know that the content is something that Mr. Amente was questioning, and I'm happy to answer questions on those. I did not get a lot of clarification from the neighbors. But just to demonstrate that there has been issues for a long time.

The next is a DCRA service history that was requested from them and that there are -- you can see there's multiple establishments who are listed on here. But there is -- 711 H Street
was included on nuisance odor complaints. The alleyway behind the establishment has been a point of contention among neighbors and all of the area businesses on that block for a long time.

The ANC has received complaints over the years as different businesses have come in and out of that, all the different spaces that are there. So it's not just pointing at Allure as the only business who's using the alley. And there's trash and illegal construction materials and things like that. But it is one of the establishments that is contributing to that. Also submitted is the original settlement agreement which was agreed upon Allure and the ANC. And this was submitted so you can see. It was a pretty basic settlement agreement since the business had not been opened yet.

And it had typically stuff about deliveries, public space and trash. There was a section in there about the applicant should regularly inspect and clean the public space as well as noise complaints. So they acknowledged the settlement agreement that they'll comply with noise control provisions. And so there was in
the original settlement agreement information on some of the issues that have come up since with neighbors since the establishment has been open. Then the next evidence is from ABRA. This is why I requested end of 2019 from ABRA which shows multiple complaints from the first -all of 2019 but includes some that were left out, I believe, of Mr. Amente's ABRA report because he had started, it looked like, in October of 2019. And there were some complaints that had been from May and, what is it, July and September and kind of cut off a little bit. But the time of a lot of those is pretty late which kind of goes to that it could be Allure Lounge had gotten those complaints.

There's also been submitting investigative history of Allure Lounge as well as information from other neighbors about complaints that have come in from -- about the establishment. Then submitted copies of correspondence that Mr. Amente and I have had where I have repeatedly tried to find compromise with the business, suggesting different types of ways to solve the complaints that the neighbors and ANC have had that have been rejected from --
by Mr. Amente. And this continued probably, I would say, every couple of months, I would just in to see if there had been any change in -especially with the pandemic, any change in thoughts of, like, what has been going on.

And then the next one is that -- this is what I really want to point out was this was a letter that Mr. Amente had received from neighbors that he had texted to me that show that there are neighbors who wrote him something that say his establishment has been loud. This was a quote in my statement about it. They provided an example of, like, the sound level that was needed.

It's the 60 decibel. And they had attached I believe it was information about 60 decibels and I think the part of the regulation that said how loud things should be. So this just goes to show that the neighbors have made an effort to talk to Mr. Amente and let him know that there has been issues. And that as he has stated, that he doesn't think his business has been the problem at all, and that some of the neighbors would have to disagree.

More emails that have been between me
and Mr. Amente. And then when it comes to the hookah exemptions, ANC Commissioner Joel Kelty had reached out to D.C. Health about getting confirmation about if there was a smoking exemption allowed for Allure as well as some other area businesses. And he had also included Yelp, and this was just a couple of weeks ago, 1 believe, that the screenshot was taken that Allure advertises itself on Yelp as a hookah lounge.

So I can't remember when Mr. Amente said that D.C. Health stopped by about hookah. But he said he wouldn't do it again. But as of recently, a couple weeks ago, this was still listed on his Yelp page what type of business.

Then this is a report from MPD from 2019 and then on 2020 of MPD incidents that they have responded to from the business. And the second page to that was some more information, more information from MPD. And then I think this had to do with the confirmation that there was no hookah exemption for Allure Lounge.

And I would like to say that we did get confirmation that Allure was not one of the businesses that was shut down on Friday. I think
originally we were told that they were shut down. But then D.C. Health circled back and said that it was just Felicity.

So Mr. Amente is correct that he was not shut down according to what D.C. Health told us earlier this week. Yeah, today is Thursday, so earlier this week. And so that is the evidence packet. I'm going to stop sharing my screen.

And then at this time, I would just like to reiterate that we are asking ABRA to -with the license renewal, to rollback hours. We are not trying to shut down the business. We are not trying to have -- not allow a renewal to happen.

We would just like for there to be additional measures such as the hours rolled back, such as prohibiting summer garden, a sidewalk café, and hookah with the license renewal so that the neighbors can feel like they are being heard. The ANC can feel as though we are taking the steps to make sure that the neighborhood is still welcoming of business, but wanting to make sure that when there are issues that we are hearing them and working with the
business and working with ABRA to make sure those are addressed. So I guess my case rests.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right. Mr. Amente, do you have any questions that you want to ask Ms. -- now these are questions. The same way she asked you questions, now you're going to ask her questions, sir. All right.

MR. AMENTE: Can we go back to the police incident reports?

MS. QUAT: Yes.
MR. AMENTE: So --
MS. QUAT: Do you need me to share my screen?

MR. AMENTE: Yeah, please.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: What I'm going to do, Ms. Quat, if these are documents that you want to move into evidence, then I'm going to ask you that later on. So we're going to go back through them again, and then I'm going to ask you to identify the documents. And then I will ask. So all right. I just --
(Simultaneous speaking.)
MS. QUAT: Okay. And these were all submitted.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: They were
submitted, but there's a process to move them into evidence.

MS. QUAT: Okay.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: And so they've not in evidence as yet. So I --

MS. QUAT: Okay.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: -- will go through that when once you're done. So go ahead.

MR. AMENTE: Okay. So all this said 711 H Street, Northeast, D.C., right?

MS. QUAT: Yes, from what MPD provided when I requested those.

MR. AMENTE: Yeah. If anything happened inside, it would say Allure Lounge. But let's say something -- you saw something bad happened, somebody's house which address you give. You give the address. You're just right there, right? So that would --

MS. QUAT: That, I don't know because I don't know MPD schedules or --

MR. AMENTE: Okay.
MS. QUAT: -- writes down their reports.

MR. AMENTE: Do you see that during the daytime, 4:00 o'clock, 4:01, 1823?

MS. QUAT: Which document are you looking at?
(Simultaneous speaking.)
MR. AMENTE: No, no.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: I think we're at the police -- the initial report that you said was a police report.

MR. AMENTE: Yeah, right there, right there, right there.

MS. QUAT: This one?
MR. AMENTE: Yeah.
MS. QUAT: This one? Okay.
MR. AMENTE: Yeah. So it said -Allure open 6:00 o'clock, right? This is for 4:01 p.m. Threats to do bodily harm, Ms. Berman (phonetic) I think it say. It's 4:01 p.m. So is there anything to do with Allure?

MS. QUAT: All I know is when I requested from MPD reports, this is what -- this was what was sent. So --

MR. AMENTE: Yeah, you received it.
(Simultaneous speaking.)
MS. QUAT: So I received this, yes. But I can't -- they don't give any more detail than whatever is on this. So I can't answer that
fully.
MR. AMENTE: All your evidence is supposed to support your argument about Allure. (Simultaneous speaking.)

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Hold on. Hold on. Hold on. Hold on, please. Let's hold on a little bit. But let him finish before -- after he's asking you a question. So let him finish before you respond, please.

MR. AMENTE: So you submit all --
okay. On the top, it said ABC violation or incident. Any incident happens, we call the police. That's ABRA rules. It goes to incident report.

If somebody lost a bag inside a property or out front, I'll call police. If I see somebody falling, I'll call ambulance. That goes to report. So is this anything that supports your case? Can you explain? And which way this police report supports you just saying 711 H Street, Northeast, D.C.?

MS. QUAT: So it's just for the address. So I would say that how it supports the case is that when I requested any incident reports from your address, this is what was
given. And I'm not given any detail about what was called for.

And so this is what $I$ got from it. And so some of them are later. Some, like, you're correct about the times are from all throughout the day.

MR. AMENTE: Some of them are --
MS. QUAT: So that's just what I have to say.

MR. AMENTE: -- 4:00 a.m. Where is this, 4:00 a.m.? I close 3:00 o'clock. This is 4:00 a.m. Okay. I don't want -- the time we go back to the DCRA reports.
(Simultaneous speaking.)
MR. AMENTE: No, that's ABRA, the ABRA reports. On those evidence, I am not subject to any fines. Like I said, anybody -- on your other email, it said she said we call the police. Somebody play loud music inside a car.

MS. QUAT: So these are complaints from --
(Simultaneous speaking.)
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Mr. Amente, let her respond before you speak, please.

MS. QUAT: So these ABRA -- these are
from ABRA and that these were all complaints that have been pulled as of -- this was December 2019. So these were all complaints that came in for 711 H Street, Northwest which is your location. So this was all neighbors who were calling in about your establishment. So you didn't get fines. You didn't get fines. But these were still neighbors who called in and put in a complaint. MR. AMENTE: Yeah, yeah, yeah. I understand that. But I just want to -- I mean, like I said, she emailed somebody partying in a car. So let's say that car is in the alley, and she heard music they playing. I'm telling the truth. They want to --

MS. QUAT: Is there a question for me on that --

MR. AMENTE: Okay.
MS. QUAT: -- on this?
MR. AMENTE: Let's go to the D.C.
reports, DCRA. Yes, right there.
(Simultaneous speaking.)
MR. AMENTE: Yeah. Can you show me anything, like, 711 H Street?

MS. QUAT: Right here.
MR. AMENTE: Okay. So I don't sell
food, right? And my trash is alcohol, like, bottles and floor trashes. But people come in there, pee and do things.

MS. QUAT: Is there a question?
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Hold on. Hold on. Hold on. Let him finish, please. He wasn't done yet, so let me see.

MR. AMENTE: So the time that I called an ambulance that somebody overdosed shooting insulin and then falling down, you report something on H Street on the complaint. But I have no ticket for that. You see 727?

MS. QUAT: Is there -- I just want to ask a question about procedurally. Is there a --

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right.
Okay. All right.
MS. QUAT: Is this supposed to be question-and-answer time?
(Simultaneous speaking.)
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Hold on. Hold on. Hold on. Hold on. Mr. Amente, if you -- I know that you're -- neither parties are attorneys. So I'm giving some flexibility. So if you're going through this report, you need to ask her a specific question about the report,
sir. So ask a question, and then she'll respond. But it can't be a statement. So just -- yeah. All right. All right.

MR. AMENTE: How this document supports your argument?

MS. QUAT: So this document is showing how on $H$ Street, on the block that you are on in general, that there are a lot of issues that go on. This is a DCRA service report and that there was from 2019 a report from your establishment of a nuisance order complaint and that that is coupled with other establishments in the area that have issues. And so that just points to how you are not the only business who's being complained about. But this is your protest hearing. And so there are complaints that are linked back to your business.

MR. AMENTE: But today, we're talking about just Allure, yes?

MS. QUAT: Yes, and that is literally just what I said.

MR. AMENTE: But this DCRA shows a lot of things happens on other house numbers, not 711 H Street, which means the alley is already bad before Allure came or after, right?

MS. QUAT: Correct.
MR. AMENTE: On Mark's email and the other person email said this become increased after Allure opens about the trash. But I don't see a lot of lists in here about Allure. What I see is other houses.

MS. QUAT: Is there a question?
MR. AMENTE: Yes. So why I just have -- like, did the document show to you -- me seeing this and you complaining about trash, that's much for me because I'm doing -- I'm not doing, like -- I'm doing okay. I'm doing good about extraction, everything that you guys concern. That's what I'm trying to say. And -yeah.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Do you have another question you want to ask, sir?

MR. AMENTE: Yes. Can you respond for Mark email since you present them?

MS. QUAT: It depends on what your question is. I mean, $I$ don't know what --

MR. AMENTE: Mark -- okay. So Mark said he got a package stolen. And the people came to my -- in the alley -- my back alley because it had space in it. And he said, Allure
has stolen property at my place. Can you explain? You guys discussed about this, right? What proof do you have, you two say? He wrote it, at a location where --
(Simultaneous speaking.)
MS. QUAT: -- explain our neighbor's
exact comments that I cannot explain. The reason why that was submitted is it's part of a chain --
(Simultaneous speaking.)
MR. AMENTE: -- when you read this --
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Mr. Amente, please let her finish before you ask, before you start up, sir.

MS. QUAT: I did not ask -- I did not ask him about it specifically because it is the reason why it is submitted, it is part of a collection of multiple emails and about how there are just issues on not only $H$ Street but with Allure. And so it is not to be submitted to be taken as any sort of -- I'm trying to think of the best way since any sort of accusation about that that is somebody a neighbor said about what was going on and submitted it to -- I believe those were MPD officers, I think, from the emails. I can't remember off the top of my head.

I'd have to back and double check.
But it is just to show how there have been issues from the beginning and that you are familiar with a lot of the neighbors there. And they have expressed concern to you before about noise and other issues, and that there has been no willingness to compromise on the issues that the neighbors have on your part.

MR. AMENTE: So I got -- like, my car got broken, like, in front of 722. I didn't assume anything with 722. But this is, like -okay. So he said about the gunshot. He saw the gunshot on the 7th Street. And on the email, he said, after Allure opened.

You know how many gunshot I notice it on H Street? You guys get a report only 711 H , I mean, Allure. But you should get 711 H -- like, 711 store, they have armored security guard to protect.

That's what I notice a gunshot since I was there. I noticed it. But after Allure opens, either related to the gun or all everything with Allure, that's not right.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Is there a question --
(Simultaneous speaking.)
MR. AMENTE: -- because you represent them. Today we here for the truth. You should ask. Did he see any stolen package sold in Allure? You should ask him before you -- really, this is insulting. But it's okay. But you should. Another -- one second.

The commander said the trash that you submit, the -- like, the construction. And her email said that's me. It came from Allure because I'm the one that give them the video and the tag who trash that. Because the file is too big, $I$ couldn't submit it. That's not me.

MS. QUAT: Are there any more questions, Mr. Amente?

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Hold on. Hold on. Do you have any more questions you want to ask her, sir?

MR. AMENTE: No. Just, like, everything really -- I mean, I understand your concern. But it's, like, let's be -- who really is serving you and find out because cutting my hours especially after this happens, it's not cool. I'm doing -- I even -- I have -- I hire a police officer out there after you came up about
people leaving. I did.
MS. QUAT: You never alerted me to anything. So if that was a question about if I knew that, $I$ did not know that.

MR. AMENTE: I did after we talk at store -- I mean, the coffee shop, yeah, I hire. It took me -- to find that person, took me time. (Simultaneous speaking.)

MS. QUAT: I mean, we talked about it, but you never circled back to say, I have hired a police officer. I put up signage. So -- and we have talked multiple times since then. So any steps that you have taken to alleviate any neighbors' concerns, in our further conversations, you have not told the ANC this or anything. So I can't say for sure what steps you have taken because you haven't told us.

MR. AMENTE: Me saying moving forward be honest with you. Like I said, Felicity didn't hire. I talk to him. But I did. He still get my benefits, me hiring with us, just working with you guys.

But like I said, lowering my hours for 45 minutes, it kills me. But I don't think it's going to benefit noise complaint because it's not
from me. How can you explain me cutting hours satisfy the complaints?

MS. QUAT: So I would say that based on conversations that ANC members have had with neighbors who have complained about the establishment for -- since the first summer that you opened is a lot of it is late night stuff that comes in. I mean, you received a letter from neighbors telling you --
(Simultaneous speaking.)
MS. QUAT: -- that there were complaints that were coming. And if you would let me finish my answer.

MR. AMENTE: Okay.
MS. QUAT: And so by rolling back late night hours and you were the only business on that block that is open until 3:00 a.m. that that can be something that helps alleviate not only the complaints but shows that you are -especially before a protest hearing if we had come to an agreement, it would've showed that you were willing to work with the ANC in order to help alleviate these concerns. But any compromise that we have presented to you, you have not agreed to. Even a provision that would
be if you got four -- I can't remember exactly what I had presented.

But if you had gotten four noise complaints logged over a month's time with ABRA, that would rollback your hours which is a pretty generous offer because even based on the ABRA complaints that -- from the evidence that we're showing, you never received four complaints in one month that ABRA had logged. And so there has been no movement on your part to help work with the ANC to help alleviate concerns of the neighbors and of the ANC. And so do we want to rollback your hours, especially in this pandemic? We would love to not have to do that. But there has been no compromise on your end.

MR. AMENTE: About the noise complaint, you said four calls, right? I said because I know. You call or who call, I'm not going to get fined. I asked you if I get a fine, you said no, just complaint.

How I'm going to take that offer? Anybody can call four times, ten times. I asked you, okay, if I get any fine with those calls, I will take it. You said, no, only complaint.

MS. QUAT: To be honest, I do not
remember that part of our conversation.
(Simultaneous speaking.)
MS. QUAT: You never presented anything in writing back to us.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Hold on, sir.
Hold on. Let her finish, please.
MS. QUAT: So I mean, I've asked you to present in writing back to us something similar, and nothing ever came back. And so --
(Simultaneous speaking.)
MS. QUAT: -- I don't remember that part of our conversation because we had a lot of conversations. But as I just said, you had never gotten four noise complaints in a month, especially because it was going to be from four different residences. So it's not, like, 123 H Street could call four times in a row and get you to trigger that rollback. It would have to be from four different addresses.

And so I mean, we can sit here and go back and forth about the hypotheticals of things that could happen. But the whole point of having a settlement agreement in place would be to help with these situations that would happen. So if there is something that potentially had caused
your hours to rollback if it was in a settlement agreement, it would've been something that would've been agreed on between both of us, both the ANC and you.

So I mean, that's all I can say. I don't want to dwell on the fact that every single noise complaint can or cannot get substantiated. I think ABRA probably sees this a lot where they get complaints and then things can't be substantiated.

It doesn't necessarily mean that the business wasn't being loud. It doesn't necessarily mean that they were being loud. But people put in complaints all the time.

MR. AMENTE: Yeah, what I'm saying is H Street by itself is always people there, especially by the bus station, always. Like, to be honest with you, 24/7. There is a place -- I mean, $I$ don't know if you're familiar with $H$ Street. There's a place who buy drugs and everything because it's right there, $H$ Street.

You guys really focusing on the wrong place. To clean the alley, to clean the area, nothing to do with Allure. There is always busy, especially by the bus, the bus stop. People
drunk. People yelling. People fighting. A guys died last year right in front of my property by the alley fighting.

Like I said, I've been there. Just Felicity, he open after me. He got suspended. He got shut down. Just see what I -- like, I mean, it's not, like, without you having anything that I'm doing wrong, me cutting hours, no.

Because when $I$ sign up first time, I talk to them. You guys weren't there. I talked to them. I explained to them, I'm doing my best to keep my word with them.

MS. QUAT: Is there a question?
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right.
MR. AMENTE: I'm everywhere because it's just --

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right. I know you're everywhere, Mr. Amente. But I need to put some structure into this. Do you have any other specific questions that you want to ask her, and then I'm going to move on.

MR. AMENTE: I think -- oh, yeah, about the house. You mention a house. What was it? House price, right?

MS. QUAT: Yes.

MR. AMENTE: So having a bar shouldn't decrease house price. Gun violence, sex offenders, gang area, that decrease the house price. For sales, foreclosures, not bar. Would you agree?

MS. QUAT: I would agree if we're just looking at your statement on face value. But when we dig into it, no one wants to move into a house that is near a business that is unwilling to be a compromising neighbor and to be a good neighbor to those houses. And so if someone is going to decide to sell and hopefully they're not talking to other people on the street and that live on the street and ask, are there any issues with this area to move in, because a neighbor could say to someone, like, yes, like, this business is -- we put in a lot of noise complaints there.

And so I mean, your statement at face value, not necessarily. But I would agree that more business is good for a neighborhood. But the business is not being a good neighbor, that is going to directly affect the home prices and ability to sell those directly right there, behind and near the business.

MR. AMENTE: So which one is the most? Is the gun violence, sex offenders, gang area, or the bar?

MS. QUAT: I think that is a ridiculous question to ask --
(Simultaneous speaking.)
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Ms. Quat, Ms. Quat, Ms. Quat. He asked you a question, yes or no. Please do not editorialize.

MS. QUAT: I mean, it's not -- I mean, all of the above would be my answer. All of those affect home prices.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Thank you. Do you have another question you want to ask her?

MR. AMENTE: Yeah, if you say that, right. I moved here in 2017, and I know 722. 722 was on a sale. I know the price. And the house prices are going up, not going down after Allure. But you -- I mean, I'm just to know Allure being there decrease the house price, that's not -- cannot be evidence, you to lower my hours or me being there.

MS. QUAT: So that is one of the reasons of the ANC protest. It's not specific if you want specific evidence relating to that.

MR. AMENTE: No, but you tell me that -- okay. I'm just saying that everything we looked in here -- I mean, Crown Chicken, how do you know this Crown Chicken? Crown Chicken open at 5:00. People come, all H Street, to eat because that's the place the latest open. What about that one? That disturb the neighbors.

MS. QUAT: The ANC has not gotten any complaints about that establishment that I am aware of. So I cannot --
(Simultaneous speaking.)
MS. QUAT: -- answer that.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Mr. Amente, let her finish, please.

MR. AMENTE: Okay.
MS. QUAT: So I was done with that answer.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Okay. Do you have another question you need to ask, sir?

MR. AMENTE: So you guys only focus ABRA license holders?

MS. QUAT: So the -- this protest is in response to your alcohol license renewal. And so the ANC chose to protest based on feedback we had gotten from the neighbors. And so in this
case, yes, because this is about your renewal. The ANC also handles a lot of other issues from zoning to construction and things like that. That is not an ABRA issue. That is other agencies within the D.C. government.

So I think if you're going, does the ANC focus on other issues? Yes, it does. But not -- those issues are not what this hearing is about.

MR. AMENTE: Yeah, but to back up, your complaints about people smoking outside by my door, you have to bring me something. That area is clean and only these things comes from me. You have to show it to me. But if you just say on an email she said saw people smoking weed outside, is it nothing -- I mean, it's nothing to do with me. You have to come up, like --

MS. QUAT: It could --
MR. AMENTE: -- this area is -- like, this area is this, used to be this. You came here and this happens. Yeah, if it makes sense. Like, but you just -- you guys -- every email, you know. You read it. I read it. Every email refers to Allure.

All the fights, Allure. People throw
needles, Allure. Gun, after Allure. Noise, Allure. How many bars? How many places close? Three, and --

MS. QUAT: You are the only one -(Simultaneous speaking.)

MS. QUAT: -- on that block that closes at 3:00 a.m.
(Simultaneous speaking.)
MR. AMENTE: I'm not saying that block. But people can park anywhere from anywhere. They can park that aisle, that place, and take Uber if they want to, if they find a spot. And they can get off from Uber on 8th Street, on 7th Street. They might yell, but it's not -- I mean, could be anybody. Could be people who live here can be come drunk and yell.

So give me -- like, give me something that -- I'm a fair person man. Give me something so that, you know what? Okay. I understand. Come on. I mean, I have 69 capacity. I choose promoters. I don't take promoters --
(Simultaneous speaking.)
MS. QUAT: Mr. Anderson --
(Simultaneous speaking.)
MS. QUAT: -- his chance to present
his case --
(Simultaneous speaking.)
MS. QUAT: -- since this is supposed
to be --
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Ms. Quat, hold on. I'm running the hearing. One of the things that -- and I've given both sides leeway because people are not lawyers. And I try -- I could've ended this a long time ago because there's a soliloquy going on between both sides. But there is some inartful ways that questions are being asked.

And so I do give some leeway in getting to the question, and $I$ try to make sure. So I also -- at least in my view, the questions that are being asked, they're not being asked lawyerly. They are, however, addressing some of the issues that we need to hear today.

So I'm going to allow him to ask certain questions because, yes, I keep on reminding both parties that you need to ask a question. And it's almost a conversation. But at least for me, I'm getting some information out there because one of the things that I told you before, I'm going to go back through all the
documents that you disclose because you have to move them into evidence.

And so I'm going to go through that, then I'm going to ask him, does he object to that document being moved into evidence. And I did get a lot of clarification from some of the questions that he asked you, although they were not asked -- although they were asked inartful. But it got to the issues that $I$ need to -- I'm going to make a ruling later on whether or not all your documents, although they were disclosed, whether or not I'm going to move them into the record because are these documents relevant to Allure. So --

MS. QUAT: Okay, okay.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: -- all right.
So Mr. Amente, I need you to be focused and ask questions. If you don't have -- I'm not going to have any more conversation. And one of the reasons why I'm allowing this to happen is because I told each side that they had an hour to present their case.

And both sides have not necessarily exhausted their hour. So if they had, I would have cut this off a long time ago because I told
everybody they had an hour. But I need to bring closure to this case.

So if you have some more specific questions to ask, ask the questions. If not, I'm going to end it. So do you have any other specific questions that you're going to ask as cross examination? If not, we're going to end this and then we'll do closing.

MR. AMENTE: Yeah, $I$ do have a question. But, like, $I$ thought the five people will come here and ask. And so she might not answer my question because --
(Simultaneous speaking.)
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: And so she did not -- I have not seen the PIF. It appears that she had disclosed some witnesses. I don't know. But they're not here today, so we can't ask them questions. I've not seen the PIF, so I don't know what witnesses were there.

So you can ask her relevant questions to your case. But we need to bring some closure in the sense of they need to be on point. So let's try to wrap this up if you have any other specific questions that you need to ask her. If not, $I$ 'm going to end it.

MR. AMENTE: Okay. Have you been in Allure?

MS. QUAT: I've not been inside, no.
MR. AMENTE: Don't you think -- so you're protesting, not --

MS. QUAT: The ANC is protesting.
MR. AMENTE: Oh, well, okay. Yeah, I don't have any questions. I think that would be - -

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Are you done, sir? All right. All right. Do we have any questions by the Board of Ms. Quat? Any Board members have any questions they want to ask her?

MR. AMENTE: Uh --
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Not you, sir. You've had your chance.

MR. AMENTE: Okay.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: This is the Board. All right. No questions by any Board -by the Board. All right. Ms. Quat, do you rest? Is this the extent of your presentation?

MS. QUAT: Yes, it is.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right. All
right. Mr. -- I'm not seeing the PIF. So Mr.
Amente, were there any documents that you
disclosed that you sent that you want to move into evidence? As part of your PIF, did you -what documents did you disclose?

MR. AMENTE: So I have submitted 13 pictures that shows left, right, where when customer come parks which is on H Street. I submitted the pictures.
(Whereupon, the above-referred to documents were marked as Licensee

Exhibit Nos. 1 through 13 for
identification.)
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Do you have those documents, because I'm not seeing them. So I need to make a ruling whether or not to -- but let me -- have you seen the documents, Ms. Quat?

MS. QUAT: Yes, I have.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Any objections?
How many -- so how many exhibits are they?
MR. AMENTE: Thirteen.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Thirteen?
MR. AMENTE: Yeah.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: And do you -are there any of the exhibits that you have problems with?
(Simultaneous speaking.)

MS. QUAT: That I have problems?
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Yes, that you object to because he now wants to --

MS. QUAT: Oh, no.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: -- move them into evidence. All right.

MS. QUAT: No.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right. So
-- all right. So all the documents, Mr. Amente, that you disclose as part of your PIF, I'm going to move them into evidence. Okay? All right.

MR. AMENTE: Can $I$ get it on --
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Can you what, sir?

MR. AMENTE: If I have the time, can I say something about the evidence that why I submit it if we go to page to page quickly?

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: I don't -- do you have them available online so you can -- so I can have you share the screen because I don't --

MS. QUAT: I can pull them up if you

MR. AMENTE: Thank you.
MS. QUAT: -- want, Mr. Amente.
MR. AMENTE: Thank you.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right. So can you pull them and then you can share the screen? And then --
(Simultaneous speaking.)
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: I don't -- all right, sir. I'm not -- this is all I'm going to do, sir. I'm not going to have you -- this is -I'm just -- all I'm going to do, I need you to go through all 13 documents and identify them. I don't want an explanation. Okay? So basically, we'll go through the documents one by one, and you can just state what they are. That's all. All right. Go ahead.

MS. QUAT: Sorry. I'm just going to have to -- there are multiple emails. Okay. I think this is -- I'll share.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: And this is number 1? Which one is this?

MR. AMENTE: Yeah, this is number --
MS. QUAT: I don't --
MR. AMENTE: I can -- I have a copy, so I can explain.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right. So did you number all the documents, sir?

MR. AMENTE: Yes, number 3, yeah.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: So this is number 3. Let's start with -- well, let's -- can we go back to number 1 if you are able to do that?

MS. QUAT: No, that's 12.
MR. AMENTE: It is.
MS. QUAT: Mr. Amente, do you remember which one was number $1 ?$

MR. AMENTE: Yeah, Allure front. Like, just the front picture, yeah. Just --

MS. QUAT: There we go. No, that's 4.
MR. AMENTE: That's --
MS. QUAT: This one? Yes.
MR. AMENTE: Yes, yes.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: So what's
number 1?
MR. AMENTE: So this is, like, actually, like, the front side of Allure.
(Simultaneous speaking.)
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Okay. What's number 2?

MR. AMENTE: Number 2 is the left side of the street. So this --
(Simultaneous speaking.)
MR. AMENTE: Yeah, so this is --

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Go ahead, sir. MR. AMENTE: Yeah, this is the area where really open after the government office close and a couple of places closed because those apartment have own parking. Most the customers park their car here, like, straight up.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right.
Okay. What's number 3?
MR. AMENTE: Okay. Number 3, oh, is the same copy. Pass it. Go to number 4, please.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Number 4?
MR. AMENTE: So that's -- yeah. Number 4 is Crown Chicken where located in front of me where I was explaining about the stabbing and the gun going on. So this is where -- this is the place who open until 5:00. People come -like, these people can also just serve the area. Just to focus on those too.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right.
What's number 5 ?
MR. AMENTE: Five is the other side of my door. You see, like, that's the common area that people really doing things is right there which is unfortunately police there but they don't do nothing. This is the place --

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right.
Number 6?
MR. AMENTE: Can we go number --
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: If we don't go through the numbers, I'm not going to -- they're not going to be a part of the record then. So if you don't want them to be a part of the evidence, then we don't need to do that. So just tell me what numbers you want and I'll --

MR. AMENTE: I have number 6. Go ahead. Click number --

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: What's number $6 ?$

MR. AMENTE: Thank you.
MS. QUAT: Which one is $6 ?$
MR. AMENTE: Six? No, past 6. No, past 6. This is --

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Number 7?
MS. QUAT: Seven.
MR. AMENTE: Okay.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: What's number $7 ?$

MR. AMENTE: Yes. So this is, like, where Mark lived, very close house to my place. And he never complain about noise coming out from
my house.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right. What's number 8?
(Simultaneous speaking.)
MR. AMENTE: This is 7-Eleven parking where a lot of activity going on during the day or at night. That's the alley they were talking about, the trash and everything, finding all of the needles and all that.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right. What's number $9 ?$

MR. AMENTE: Okay. So number 9 is going to the fifth house, the 722 who complain about the noise. But these two, they didn't because I talk to them. So she cannot really hear my noise because she far than the first houses.

She's 150 feet away from the back door. If we count the speaker, the subfloor speaker is by front door. So that give us, like, two-something, 100-something feet. So that's what I was saying about the noise thing.
(Simultaneous speaking.)
MR. AMENTE: Okay.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: What's number

10?
MR. AMENTE: Yeah, this is where the 8th Street corner where a lot of things happen. This is the bus station. You can see all the trash and everything, yeah.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right.
Number 11?
MR. AMENTE: This is actually just during the day how the parking is already full, yeah.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Number 12?
MR. AMENTE: This also show only the parking, how full before Allure open or not. CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: And what's number 13?

MR. AMENTE: So the scene is the same, like, the other side of alley. But no one has complained. So -- but it's dark. But I see -just to show the parking that always is taken, not only because of Allure.

## CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right.

 Thank you, sir. Okay. So I'm going to move into evidence Exhibit 1, Exhibit 2, Exhibit 4, Exhibit 5, Exhibit 7, Exhibit 8, Exhibit 9, Exhibit 10, Exhibit 11, Exhibit 12, and Exhibit 13. Thoseare going to be the documents that are going to be moved into evidence.
(Whereupon, the above-referenced to documents were received into evidence as Licensee Exhibit Nos. 1, 2, 4, 5, $7,8,9,10,11,12$, and 13.)

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right.
Thanks. All right. Ms. Quat, now let's go through your documents, the documents that you disclosed.

MS. QUAT: Okay, okay. This is --
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: And how are they numbered?

MS. QUAT: So they are numbered 1 through -- or on my PDF, they're numbered. I don't have that editing software unfortunately. CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right. So the first one, is it numbered? Is the first one Exhibit 1? Is that what it is, because I don't have them. I'm trying to find out.

MS. QUAT: Yes.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right. So what is Exhibit 1?

MS. QUAT: Exhibit 1 is a neighbor from an -- an email from a neighbor from

September 2018.
(Whereupon, the above-referred to document was marked as Protestant

Exhibit No. 1 for identification.)
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: And Mr. Amente, do you have any objection to this document?

MR. AMENTE: Yes, because Allure opened January 1st, 2019.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: So if Allure opened January 1st, 2019, Ms. Quat, why is it relevant? What are you -- why do you want us to -- why did you introduce an email from September 27, 2018?

MS. QUAT: I introduced this because it shows how one neighbor had already started to form a relationship with Mr. Amente and that there was construction going on at the time for Allure as there were issues in the back alley. But I do not object to his objection. If he doesn't want to add it, $I$ don't want to --

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right. So

MS. QUAT: -- claim it.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right. So I'm not going to -- so we're not moving number 1
into evidence. What's number 2?
MS. QUAT: Two is an email from a neighbor from October 2018 on the same issues that were referenced in the email before. So if he has an objective, we don't have to move it.
(Whereupon, the above-referred to document was marked as Protestant Exhibit No. 2 for identification.)

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Do you have an objection to number 2, Mr. Amente?

MR. AMENTE: Yes.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right. Number -- let's move on. Number 3?

MS. QUAT: Number 3 is from a neighbor from May 5th, 2019 and the neighbor expressing concern about Allure Lounge as well as other businesses in the area. So this email encompasses Allure as well as other issues.
(Whereupon, the above-referred to document was marked as Protestant

Exhibit No. 3 for identification.)
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Mr. Amente, do you have any objection?

MR. AMENTE: Yes, because since this is about Allure, it shouldn't be included as a
property unless she has something to compare with mine or show me something.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: I'm going to allow number 3 since this specifically talks about your establishment. What's number 4?
(Simultaneous speaking.)
MS. QUAT: Number 4 is the DCRA's service history, and that is two pages.
(Whereupon, the above-referred to document was marked as Protestant

Exhibit No. 4 for identification.)
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: And this is service history for what, ma'am?

MS. QUAT: It is the 700 block of $H$ Street, Northeast. And so it has both mention of Allure as well as other area businesses.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Do you have an objection, Mr. Amente?

MR. AMENTE: DC --
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Yes or no, do you have an objection to this exhibit, sir?

MR. AMENTE: That's fine. You can, yes.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right. All right. So this is number 4, so number 4 will be
in evidence. Number 5?
MS. QUAT: Number 5 is the original settlement agreement signed with Allure and the -
(Whereupon, the above-referred to document was marked as Protestant

Exhibit No. 5 for identification.)
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Number 5 is in evidence. Number 6?

MS. QUAT: Number 6 is a list of noise complaints that I received from ABRA. And December of 2019 was the request.
(Whereupon, the above-referred to
document was marked as Protestant
Exhibit No. 6 for identification.)
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Does this talk about Allure?

MS. QUAT: Yes, it is about Allure specifically.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: It's an ABRA email, so number 6 is in evidence. Number 7?

MS. QUAT: Number 7 is the investigative history of Allure.
(Whereupon, the above-referred to
document was marked as Protestant

Exhibit No. 7 for identification.)
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Number 7 is in evidence. Number 8?

MS. QUAT: Number 8 is an email from neighbors from December '19-- December 2019 that reference both Allure as well as the entire 700 block.
(Whereupon, the above-referred to
document was marked as Protestant
Exhibit No. 8 for identification.)
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Mr. Amente, do you have an objection to this email?

MR. AMENTE: Yes.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Why, sir?
MR. AMENTE: I would like to see only Allure complaints, not violate combined with other buildings since it's my --

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: So let me -specifically -- I can't read the email. So specifically, was is it that this email says about Allure?

MS. QUAT: So this email references both Allure and its neighbor, Felicity Lounge.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: But specifically, what does it say about Allure?

MS. QUAT: It does group both of them together, and it talks about loud music as well --
(Simultaneous speaking.)
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: But I'm just -but is this about Allure? Does it specifically say this is that loud music in Allure, or just it lumps Felicity Lounge and Allure together?

MS. QUAT: It is done together.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: And which one was this? This is number 8 ?

MS. QUAT: This -- yes, it's number 8.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Okay. I'm not going to admit number 8. What's number 9 ?

MS. QUAT: Number 9 is email correspondence between me and Mr. Amente demonstrating draft settlement agreements and solutions to the protest.
(Whereupon, the above-referred to document was marked as Protestant

Exhibit No. 9 for identification.)
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: I'm not going
to admit this one. This is settlement discussion. And so that has no part for us to -so I'm not going to -- so let's move on. So I'm
not going to admit this one.
MS. QUAT: Okay. Number 9 is a picture that I received via text from Mr. Amente of a letter he received from neighbors.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right.
I'll send in number 9, yes. Next one?
MS. QUAT: Number -- actually, this was number -- what number are we on? Sorry. I'm looking at --
(Simultaneous speaking.)
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: You said number
9. You said the letter was number 9.

MS. QUAT: The letter is actually number 10.
(Whereupon, the above-referred to document was marked as Protestant Exhibit No. 10 for identification.) MS. QUAT: I might've numbered them wrong.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right. So number 10. What's the next one?

MS. QUAT: Well, we'll just read that. It is touch base email between me and Mr. Amente about the protest.
(Whereupon, the above-referred to
document was marked as Protestant Exhibit No. 11 for identification.)

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: It's about settlement or is this about the protest?

MS. QUAT: It's about settlement.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Let's move on. What's the next one?

MS. QUAT: The next is a request from Commissioner Joel Kelty from the Tobacco Control Agency about smoking exceptions on H Street. And it's specifically asking about Allure as well as two other businesses.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: What number is this one?

MS. QUAT: Eleven, I believe. CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right. So I'll move number 11.

MS. QUAT: This is 12.
(Whereupon, the above-referred to document was marked as Protestant Exhibit No. 12 for identification.)

MS. QUAT: I'm sorry. I think my numbering got off a little bit.
(Simultaneous speaking.)
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: So I'll move
12. But what's the next one?

MS. QUAT: That's all the email. The next one is a copy of MPD police offense reports.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: This specifically references Allure?

MS. QUAT: This page doesn't. Evidence 15 is the email from MPD that shows the attachments. So this is one of the attachments to Evidence No. 15.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Let me see 15.
MS. QUAT: So this is from Police Report 711 and then the --

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: So you're saying -- so what is $15 ?$ What is $15 ?$

MS. QUAT: So 15 is the email from MPD that sent forward the police offense reports and police incident reports. And so 13 and 14 are the attachments to Evidence 15.
(Whereupon, the above-referred to document was marked as Protestant

Exhibit No. 15 for identification.)
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right. I'm not going to because the email says that although that doesn't necessarily mean that the offenses occurred within the establishment. So I'm not
going to allow number 15 or --
MS. QUAT: So I know it's from -- I'm just asking a question about that. But is -CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: The email itself --
(Simultaneous speaking.)
MS. QUAT: -- 7-Eleven.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: But the email
says specifically: although that does not (audio interference) that the offense occurred within the establishment. That's why I'm not going to allow it, because this does not prove that this occurred at its address. And the captain -- when the captain wrote the email, the captain was specific by stating that this does not mean that the offenses occurred within the establishment.

MS. QUAT: Okay. That makes sense.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right.
MS. QUAT: Thank you for the
clarification.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right. What's the next one, please?

MS. QUAT: That would be all of them because the email and then the two. So that's it.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right. So from -- you can stop sharing the screen now. So from the exhibits for the protestants, the ones that are going to be admitted are Number 3, Number 4, Number 5, Number 6, Number 7, Number 10, and Number 12, I believe. Yes, Number 12. (Whereupon, the above-referenced to documents were received into evidence as Protestant Exhibit Nos. 3, 4, 5, 6, 7, 10, and 12.)

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right. Those are the only ones that will be admitted. All right. Okay. Mr. Amente?

MR. AMENTE: Yes.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: You have five minutes to close. Tell me what it is that you want the Board to do.

MR. AMENTE: So I would love to the Board see all the evidence and our conversation and rule that the right rules -- that I don't see that $I$ affect the neighbors that makes me to lower my hours. And I'm doing my best, and I will continue doing my best. Yeah, that's the only thing I can say.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right,

Quat. What is it that you want the Board to do? MS. QUAT: So the ANC is protesting because we have gotten complaints for pretty much since the opening about Allure Lounge. And the big thing that we would really like for ABRA to do is roll back the hours to be in line with other businesses that are within the 700 block of H Street which is within ANC 6C's jurisdiction which would be to rolling the hours back during the week, weeknights to 12:00 a.m. and rolling back to 2:00 a.m. on weekend nights. So we believe that this would really help alleviate a lot of the issues that neighbors and ANC have with the establishment.

We would also like for there to be a prohibition on the establishment being able to sell hookah which is already something that they are not supposed to be doing no matter what other businesses around them are doing. There are only five, I believe. Five or six businesses on H Street that have those endorsements available from the D.C. Department of Health.

We would also like for there to be a prohibition on creating a summer garden or a sidewalk café unless they come back to the ANC
and ask for permission before starting that build and getting that endorsement from the ANC. I think that there has been a lot back and forth between the ANC and the establishment on what could be done. And we're willing to be a partner for the business and all businesses that want to come to the area.

But one of our issues, we hope that any business would be open to change and would be open to compromise. And that's something that we're always looking for. And I think moving forward, $I$ hope that we'll be able to work with Allure on any issues that do arise, that come up. The door is always open to the (audio interference) to any of the other committees that are under ANC as well as the ANC for any concerns the neighbors or businesses have. So with that, I'm done.

## CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right.

Thank you. The matter is now -- just one question. Do the parties request that the Board make a determination on the presentation that was done today?

MS. QUAT: What are the other options?
I don't really know them.
(Simultaneous speaking.)
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: We have what's called -- this is usually what attorneys usually do, propose findings of fact and conclusions of law. You can write a legal brief to say, this is what the evidence shows. But I mean, that normally doesn't happen in protest hearings. But we'd just ask the Board to make a determination on the presentation that was made today.

You can't bring in new evidence. So it's not, like, okay, I forgot to do this today. So I'm going to write something and put it in. So it's no new information. It's basically, like, summarizing everything that occurred today. Or you can waive that and we can make a decision based on the presentation that's made today.

MS. QUAT: If that's what normally is done, that's what $I$ would be in favor of.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right.
That's fine. All right. I want to thank both parties for their presentation today. And so I'm going to bring closure to this case. But in order to bring closure to this case, I need to -all right.

So as Chairperson of the Alcoholic

Beverage Control Board for the District of Columbia in accordance with D.C. Office Code Section 2574B of the Open Meetings Act, I move that ABC Board hold a closed meeting for the purpose of seeking legal advice from our counsel on Case No. 19-PRO-00131, Allure Lounge, pursuant to D.C. Official Code Section 2574B4 of the Open Meetings Act and deliberating upon Case No. 19-PRO-00131, Allure Lounge, for the reasons cited in D.C. Official Code Section 2574B13, excuse me, of the Open Meetings Act. Is there a second? MEMBER SHORT: Mr. Short, I second. CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Mr. Short has second the motion. Now we'll have a roll call vote on the motion that has been properly second by Mr. Short. Mr. Short?

MEMBER SHORT: Mr. Short, I agree. CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Mr. Cato? MEMBER CATO: Bobby Cato, I agree. CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Ms. Wahabzadah? MEMBER WAHABZADAH: Rema Wahabzadah, I agree.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Ms. Hansen? MEMBER HANSEN: Jeni Hansen, I agree. CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Mr. Grandis?

MEMBER GRANDIS: Edward Grandis, I agree.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Mr. Anderson, I agree. I'm sorry. Hold on one minute, please. I have too much paper in front of me. So as it appears that a motion has passed, $I$ hereby give notice that the ABC Board will recess this proceeding to hold a closed meeting in the ABC Board's conference room pursuant to Section 2574B of the Open Meetings Act.

I want to thank both parties for their presentation today. And the Board will listen to the evidence that was presented today. And we will issue a decision within 90 days. Thank you very much, and have a great day. All right. Bye-bye.

MS. QUAT: Thank you.
MR. AMENTE: Thank you.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Thank you. All right. Have a great day. All right. It is 3:57. We have another protest hearing that was supposed to start at 3:30. What we're going to do, we'll just take a break for -- until 4:05.

So don't log off. We'll start the other protest hearing at 4:05 which is in seven
minutes. So that will give you an opportunity to do -- so we're off the record until 4:05. That's when I will start the other protest hearing. Okay.
