CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: The next case on our calendar is Case No. 20-PRO-00048, Wonder Mart, License No. 116997. Ms. Andrews, can you please elevate the rights of the protestants and also the licensee?

MS. ANDREWS: Sure. Stand by.
(Pause.)
MS. ANDREWS: Commissioner Adofo, your rights have been elevated. Ms. Doyle, your rights have been elevated. Investigator Jones, your rights have been elevated.

Ms. Love, your rights have been elevated. Ms. Johnson, your rights have been elevated. Ms. Reid, your rights have been elevated. Ms. Akinseye, your rights have been elevated. That's all, Mr. Chair.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Thank you, Ms. Andrews. Okay. There are lots of folks who are on this hearing today. And so what I'm going to do -- what I'm going to ask everyone to do if you are not speaking, please mute your microphone.

This is -- we might have a long
afternoon. So if for some reason, if something
is happening in your background that you don't want us to know, you can stop your video and mute your video and mute your microphone. But I just want to advise everyone that the public will see what is going on.

What I would ask at the moment, we're going to go through our introduction. So I'm going to ask everyone to unmute to start their video and unmute their microphone because I'm going to ask everyone to introduce themselves for the record. All right. So let's start with the licensee. So I would like the licensee to state and spell his or her name for the record, please. MS. GEBEREMESKEL: My name -- hello, my name is Adanech Geberemeskel. I'm licensee agent.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Can you spell your name for the record, please, ma'am?

MS. GEBEREMESKEL: My name, A-D-A-N-E-C-H. And my last name, G-E-B-E-R-E-M-E-S-K-E-L.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: G-E-B-R-E -and how do you pronounce that again, ma'am?

MS. GEBEREMESKEL: Adanech.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Your last name, please, ma'am.

MS. GEBEREMESKEL: Geberemeskel.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: This is for me because I'm going to refer to you this entire proceeding. So that's why I'm asking you to tell me how to pronounce your name so I don't butcher it the entire hearing.

MS. GEBEREMESKEL: Geberemeskel.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Geberemeskel.
MS. GEBEREMESKEL: Yes.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right. Thank you. Who is with you today to testify, ma'am? Is it yourself alone or do you have witnesses?

MS. GEBEREMESKEL: No, I have -- the owner is online with me, Etsegenet. She will introduce herself, the owner of the place.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: So who are you?
MS. GEBEREMESKEL: I'm the agent of the licensee.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Okay. So you're the agent of the license. Who's the owner?

MS. GEBEREMESKEL: The owner is Etsegenet. I'm just -- okay. Go ahead, Etsegenet.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: She needs to unmute her -- can you unmute your microphone, ma'am, and spell and state your name for the record?

MS. KETEMA: My name is Etsegenet Ketema, Wonder Mart (audio interference) owner.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Can you spell your first name and spell -- spell your first name and also spell your last name, please.

MS. KETEMA: First name is Etsegenet, E-T-S-E-G-E-N-E-T. Last name, Ketema, K-E-T-E-MA.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Is there anyone else with you, Ms. Geberemeskel? Or is it just the both of you?

MS. GEBEREMESKEL: No, both of us.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Okay. All right. Let's start then with the -- let's have the ANC introduce yourself for the record and spell its name. And so we'll start with the ANC Commissioner.

COMMISSIONER ADOFO: Good evening, everyone. My name is Salim Adofo. That is S-A-L-I-M A-D-O-F-O.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Maybe what I'll
ask you, Mr. Adofo, to do your -- maybe you need to get closer to the microphone or turn your volume up because since you're going to be speaking a whole lot, I need your voice to come out clearly and your --

COMMISSIONER ADOFO: Yes, sir.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: That's better.
COMMISSIONER ADOFO: I apologize.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: That's better. Who is with you, sir? Why don't you introduce -tell me who is with you and then that person can introduce themself once you call their name.

COMMISSIONER ADOFO: Yes, sir. I have five witnesses. I have four witnesses from the Commission and the State Board of Education representative for Ward 8. I will go in the order that I see them on my screen. First, I see Ms. Joy Doyle.

MS. DOYLE: Yes, hi. Joy Doyle and I'm here as a resident and representing the Congress Heights Homeowners Association.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Okay.
COMMISSIONER ADOFO: Does she need to spell her name?

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Yes, please.

Go ahead, Ms. Doyle. State and -- I need everyone to state and spell their name for -- and the reason why $I$ ask this because we have a court reporter who is transcribing everything that's said today.

MS. DOYLE: Yes, my apologies. My name is J-O-Y-C-E, last name, D-O-Y-L-E.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Thank you. Who else is next?

COMMISSIONER ADOFO: I have Ms. Wanda Johnson who's a resident of 8C02, the SMD.

MS. JOHNSON: Good afternoon. My name is Juanda Johnson. My first name is spelled J-U-A-N-D-A, Johnson, J-O-H-N-S-O-N.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Who else do we have?

COMMISSIONER ADOFO: Next we have Ms. Kristi Love, resident of 8C.

MS. LOVE: Hello. My name is Kristi Love, K-R-I-S-T-I. Last name is Love, L-O-V-E. And I feel like I'm echoing.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: You are echoing. The reason you're echoing is because Mr. Adofo's phone, his line is unmuted. So --

MS. LOVE: Oh, okay.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: -- that's why I ask everyone if you're not speaking, mute your phone. My phone will always be open. My line will always be open, but there's no echo. But everyone else, there is always an echo. That's why I always tell everyone that they need to mute their phone if they're not speaking. Mr. Adofo, who else do we have?

COMMISSIONER ADOFO: We have Victoria Akinseye. She's with her daughter who will also be testifying.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Ms. Akinseye, please open her camera, open her phone, state and spell her name for the record, please.

MS. AKINSEYE: Yes, good afternoon. My name is Victoria Akinseye. First name is spelled V-I-C-T-O-R-I-A. Last name is spelled A-K-I-N-S-E-Y-E.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: And who is the witness? Who is with you? Mr. Adofo said that someone is --

MS. AKINSEYE: Vierah. Excuse me.
Vierah. Hold on a second.
COMMISSIONER ADOFO: While we're waiting, can $I$ introduce the next witness, sir?

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Yes, go ahead. COMMISSIONER ADOFO: We have Dr.

Carlene Reid, the Ward 8 State Board of Education representative.

DR. REID: Good afternoon, everyone. I am Dr. Carlene Reid, the Ward 8 State Board of Education representative. My name is spelled C-A-R-L-E-N-E, last name, R-E-I-D.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right. Go back. Who is with Ms. Akinseye?

MS. AKINSEYE: This is my daughter, Vierah Butler.

MS. BUTLER: Hi, my name is Vierah Butler. It's spelled V-I-E-R-A-H B-U-T-L-E-R. CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right. Is that everyone?

COMMISSIONER ADOFO: Yes.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right. Mr. Adofo, remember I told you when we had our prehearing conference that we're only going to have five witnesses. So are you planning to testify? COMMISSIONER ADOFO: Yes, sir. Ms. Akinseye was just accompanying her daughter. She's not testifying.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: There's the
daughter. Well, that's still six people. I said five.
(Simultaneous speaking.)
COMMISSIONER ADOFO: I apologize. I didn't know that $I$ was included in the five. CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right. Well -- all right. But -- all right. I don't want to be here all night tonight. So -- all right. I'm not going to allow repetitive testimony.

So if the person is going to -- I don't want the person -- I don't want the -- I do not want the person to testify to the same information that the next person did. So if it's not new testimony, I'm going to cut them off. All right. Just want to let you know that. COMMISSIONER ADOFO: Yes, sir. CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: So I'm going to listen intently. And if you're just going to have a witness come on and parrot the same thing someone else says, I'm going to basically cut that person off from testifying. Is that clear? COMMISSIONER ADOFO: Yes, sir.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right. All right. Well, this is a protest hearing. Are
there any -- all right. Each side has one hour to present its case. And so within the one hour will be cross-examination.

So do not spend a whole lot of time cross-examining a witness because that's going to take away from your time. If you believe -well, I'm not going to tell you how to present your case. But it would be best if you do direct testimony and then cross-examination.

So you have one hour. Each side has one hour to present its case. The way this case is going to -- the way -- the process of how this goes is that after we do this preliminary, we'll have the applicant will do an opening statement.

What I need the applicant to do is to tell us what is it that the applicant is requesting and what the applicant wants the Board to do. After the applicant provides its opening statement, then I will have the ANC, they can also do an opening statement. And basically, I want the ANC to tell me what is it that they want the Board to do.

What is it that they're seeking. After the ANC has presented its opening, then the Board will call its witness. And the Board's
witness is the investigator who $I$ know has spoken to -- or at least attempted to speak to the applicant and also to the ANC to find out what the issues are.

So the investigator will present. He's the Board's witness, and so he will present his findings. Once the investigator has presented his findings, then the applicant will present her case and therefore will call witnesses and whatever documents or witnesses and evidence that they're relying on. Then the applicant will present its case.

Once the applicant present its case, then the ANC will have an opportunity to crossexamine the applicant and/or if they decide to call in witnesses. Then the ANC will crossexamine the applicant's witnesses. Once the ANC has cross-examined the applicant's witnesses, then the Board will cross-examine -- the Board will ask questions of the applicant's witnesses.

Once that's done, 1 will give the protestant an opportunity to ask follow-up questions of the Board. You don't have to. But if you have follow-up questions, 1 will give you an opportunity to ask follow-up questions and I
will also give the protestant -- both the applicant and the protestant will have an opportunity to do follow-up questions of the questions that were asked by the Board.

Once the Board has presented its case, then the applicant will present its case. Once the applicant presents its case, again, we'll have cross-examination by the protestant and the Board will ask questions. Then the protestant will present its case.

And we'll have, again, crossexamination by the applicant. And then the Board will ask questions. And then we will have a closing after that. And again, then we'll -each side will close its case. We'll move whatever documents or evidence -- documents into the record. We'll close the case and that's it. And as $I$ stated before, each side has an hour. This is -- ( will be a little bit flexible. But as I said before, I'm not going to have redundant testimony. If we're going to have redundant testimony, I'm going to cut this off because it's 4:30 and we all want to leave here at a reasonable hour today.

But we will stay here until this is
over with. So I'm not going say -- I'm not -- I said hour because we're all working remotely and no one wants to -- the Board has been at this since 9:30 this morning, although we took a break. But no one wants to be sitting in front of their computer till midnight tonight if they don't have to.

But we're here to do this. You'll have five minutes to give -- this is not from your case. But each side will have five minutes to an opening. And I'll also give you another five minutes to do a closing -- a maximum of five minutes to do a closing.

But that's not -- that doesn't take away from your hour. Your hour doesn't start until you present your case and then you do the cross-examination. Okay? Are there any questions or any preliminary issues that either side needs to bring to my attention?

COMMISSIONER ADOFO: Yes, sir. This is Commissioner Salim Adofo.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Yes, sir.
COMMISSIONER ADOFO: Is my sound better than it was previously?

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: It's much
better, sir.
COMMISSIONER ADOFO: Okay. I just wanted to reflect on the official record that the investigator was unable to contact me.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Well, you can -- that's reflected in the report. And then when you -- hold on. When you cross-examine him, you can give whatever explanation you want at that juncture.

So he said in the report that he's going to testify. He said that he tried to contact you. You can ask him questions about it at that time. Okay?

COMMISSIONER ADOFO: No, sir. I just wanted to state that he had the wrong email address. So $I$ was never contacted. But that's all.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: But as I said, you and him can have that conversation. He's going to testify, and then you can -- you're going to have an opportunity to ask him questions. And so you can -- I don't know what email address he has.

He might -- and you can ask him what email address he has for you. I don't know. I
don't know any of that. So that's what I'm saying.
(Simultaneous speaking.)
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: So when he's on the stand, then you and him can have that conversation. All right. Are there any other questions by anyone else before we start? All right. So let's have the applicant do -- now Ms. -- oh, Lord, have mercy. Ms. --

MS. GEBEREMESKEL: Yes.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON:
Geberemeskel, are you -- as the agent, are you the one who's going to do the cross-examination and the opening? Tell me how it's going to go.

MS. GEBEREMESKEL: Okay. The application is a --

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: No, I'm saying are you the one going to present the case?

MS. GEBEREMESKEL: No, the owner going to present the case.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right. So who's going to do the opening -- is the owner going to do the opening statement?

MS. GEBEREMESKEL: Yes.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right.

MS. GEBEREMESKEL: Yes.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: And the owner is going to call you as a witness or -- I'm sorry. I'm just getting the process.

MS. GEBEREMESKEL: Yes, she going to call me as a witness, yes.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right, fine. All right, Ms. Ketema. You have five minutes -- Ketema, you have -- Ketema?

MS. KETEMA: Yes.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: You have five minutes to do your opening, ma'am.

MS. KETEMA: Okay. Thank you so much. Okay. Wonder Mart is an existing business --
(Simultaneous speaking.)
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Hold on. I want to make sure everyone's mic is muted. I need everyone to mute their mic except for -- I'm even going to mute my mic. So hopefully, I'll remember to unmute it. So go ahead, ma'am.

MS. KETEMA: Okay. Thank you. Wonder Mart is an existing business in the neighborhood since August 2019. And now we're trying to expand by adding 25 percent beer and wine as 75 percent of our service being a grocery and
convenience. So since we don't carry 100 percent liquor product, this -- there's no way the additional 25 percent beer and wine affect the safety of the neighborhood.

Since we are a part of the community, we commit our service in maintaining the peace and security the area by installing at the back and side of establishment. So in addition, this we install extra light fixture to make the area brighter. And the liquor store nearby have 100 percent liquor and they open longer hour. Since we have a shorter business hour is wouldn't be present, like, to affect the peace and security for our community. Thank you.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Mr. Adofo?
COMMISSIONER ADOFO: Yes, sir.
(Simultaneous speaking.)
COMMISSIONER ADOFO: Good evening, everyone. I am Commissioner Salim Adofo, Chair of Advisory Neighborhood Commission 8C. In October, our Commission voted to protest the issuing of a license to Wonder Mart, LLC on the grounds that it was within 400 feet of an existing elementary school, also within 400 feet of an already established liquor store, and
within a corridor of several other liquor stores and other establishments that sell beer and wine.

The store is also within the close proximity of 801 East Men's Shelter. And that being so close to the school and to a men's shelter as well as other liquor stores, it is our position as representatives of the 14,000-plus people of ANC 8C that it is not necessary to have another establishment sell beer and wine.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right.
Thank you. All right. So the Board will call its first witness, Mr. Jones.

INVESTIGATOR JONES: Good afternoon.
Can you all hear me?
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Yes, sir. Do you have a microphone, sir? You can --

INVESTIGATOR JONES: I'm on my phone. So if you all can hear me, I think that's fine.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: I can hear me. Do you have video that you can turn on.

INVESTIGATOR JONES: I thought I had it on. Let's see. Is it on now?

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: No.
INVESTIGATOR JONES: I'm trying to enable the video, but it's not coming (audio
interference). Are you able to hear me? CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: I can hear you. I would prefer -- okay. I can now see you. INVESTIGATOR JONES: Can you see me? CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Yes, I can see you, sir. Can you raise your right hand, please? WHEREUPON,

EARL JONES
was called for examination by Counsel for the ABC Board, and after having been first duly sworn, was examined and testified as follows:

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Can you state your name for the record, please?

INVESTIGATOR JONES: My name is
Investigator Earl Jones for the Alcoholic Beverage Regulation Administration.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Where are you currently employed? I'm sorry.

INVESTIGATOR JONES: I'm currently employed with the Alcoholic Beverage Regulation Administration.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: And what's your position with ABRA?

INVESTIGATOR JONES: I'm an
investigator, and $I$ conduct investigations and
inspections of licensed ABC establishments within the District of Columbia.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: And how long have you worked for the Agency?

INVESTIGATOR JONES: For nine years, sir.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Have you testified in protest hearings before?

INVESTIGATOR JONES: Yes, sir.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Are you familiar with Wonder Mart?

INVESTIGATOR JONES: I am, sir.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: And how are you familiar with this establishment?

INVESTIGATOR JONES: I conducted a protest investigation of Wonder Mart within the last month. If you want me to finish, I can.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Are you -- I'm not sure if your -- are you moving? Sometimes you sound like you're breaking up, so I'm not sure if everyone can hear you well.

INVESTIGATOR JONES: Let's see if I can try to -- I'll try to hold it because, like I said, I'm on my phone. So can you hear me now?

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Yeah, I can
hear you much better. So we'll try to keep -because your video keeps on moving and your voice. So I want to make sure that everyone hears you moving forward. All right. Did there come a time that -- you said you did an investigation. Did you write a report regarding your investigation?

INVESTIGATOR JONES: Yes, sir.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Can you share with us what information regarding Wonder Mart were you able to find out regarding this protest and the establishment?

INVESTIGATOR JONES: Okay. I
conducted a protest of -- I conducted a protest investigation of Wonder Mart, LLC which is located at 2743 Martin Luther King Avenue, Southeast, 20032, in January of 2021. The establishment at 2743 Martin Luther King Avenue, Southeast is bounded by Cypress (phonetic) Street, Southeast and Milwaukee Street, Southeast to the north, Lebaum Street, Southeast to the south, and 5th Street, Southeast which leads to the east and directly behind Wonder Mart and Friendship Charter School's grounds.

The new Class B license application
for 2743 Martin Luther King Avenue, Southeast was protested by ANC 8C which is led by designated representative Commissioner Salim Adofo. There are three ABC establishments within a block of 2743 Martin Luther King Avenue, Southeast which are King Avenue Liquors, Players Lounge, and Quality Convenience Store. The protest issues of the ANC are adverse impact on the peace, order and quiet of the residents in the surrounding areas as well as residential parking and vehicular and pedestrian safety. On January 22nd, 2021, I met with and spoke with Ms. Ketema, proprietor of the establishment, who stated the primary issue that she is aware of with the new license application from Wonder Mart is that the ANC does not want another alcohol license in the area where they feel peace, order, and quiet are already at issue. I monitored the establishment at 2743 Martin Luther King Avenue, Southeast a total of five times from January 13th, 2021 when I was assigned the case to January 22nd, 2021 with no violations found. The monitoring period, I observed no -- I observed -- excuse me, I observed little parking -- little to no parking
in front of the establishment mainly due to bus stops, parking restrictions, and heavy construction taking place on Martin Luther King Avenue, Southeast.

The establishment also does not have a designated parking area or spaces as other ABC establishments do in the area. I also did not observe any criminal, loitering, or disturbance of the peace issues. Lastly, most of the individual patrons of the establishment arrived on foot and appeared to be residents of the surrounding areas.

According to MPD crime analysis unit, there were 22 calls for service for 2743 Martin Luther King Avenue, Southeast between January 2020 to January 2021. There were four disorderly calls, three mental health calls, two calls for persons down and disorderly and miscellaneous. There were also one calls a piece for the following: unknown situations, persons with a weapon, burglary of a business, aggravated assault, hit and run, accident of a government or commercial vehicle, robbery threat of a vehicle or weapon, 911 hang-up, and accidentally unknown injury.

None of these calls were ABRA-related violations as well as from the list of calls were produced that were not necessarily associated with Wonder Mart but to its address as well as the surrounding areas. And finally, as of the conclusion of the protest report, January 27, 2021, I did not receive correspondence or a response from the protestant from ANC 8C Commissioner Adofo after attempting to make contact on January 13th as well as January 22nd.
(Simultaneous speaking.)
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Hold on, Mr.
Jones. Hold on. Hold on, Mr. Jones.
INVESTIGATOR JONES: Yes, sir.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Am I the only one having problems hearing him?

COMMISSIONER ADOFO: I'm unable to hear him clearly throughout the entire testimony, sir.

INVESTIGATOR JONES: Okay.
MEMBER SHORT: That may be a problem, Mr. Chair.

MEMBER WAHABZADAH: It seems to be cutting in and out --
(Simultaneous speaking.)

MEMBER HANSEN: Yeah, I can hear him, but it's getting -- sorry.

INVESTIGATOR JONES: Should I try -can you hear me now?

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Yes, I can hear you. But $I$ guess we're having some issues with your connection, so --

INVESTIGATOR JONES: Yeah, I'm getting -- I'm also getting messages. It sounds like I'm having bad service.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: I'm sorry. What?

INVESTIGATOR JONES: I'm also getting messages from the office advising that it sounds like I'm having bad service. Are you able to hear me closely now?

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: I can hear you better.

INVESTIGATOR JONES: Can everybody hear me now?

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Yes, I can hear you better now.

MEMBER SHORT: Yes, it's clearer.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right.
INVESTIGATOR JONES: Okay. So should

I go over this again?
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: No, I think you were talking about -- where you are was your lack of communication with Mr. Adofo.

INVESTIGATOR JONES: Yeah. So I guess the thing -- and I heard what he said with reference to he did not receive correspondence. The email address that $I$ have is 8c07@anc.gov which is the email address that $I$ received from our internal department that handles the side that they deal with as far as the litigation part dealing with the other side as far as the protestants or as far as the business owners or proprietors. So I'm only responding to the information that I'm given. And so I do apologize if he did not receive the information. But $I$ did respond or $I$ did send out respondents to -- or correspondence to him on two separate occasions.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: And what was the email address?

INVESTIGATOR JONES: It was
8c07@anc.gov.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right. Go ahead.

INVESTIGATOR JONES: And so I did reach out to him on two separate occasions, and that was both on January 13th as well as January 22nd. And I did not receive any response as to the close of my report on January 27 th.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Okay. Go ahead, sir.

INVESTIGATOR JONES: And so I guess at that point, that's the closure of my report.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Hold on. Was there -- are there exhibits attached to your report?

INVESTIGATOR JONES: Yes, sir.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: And what are the exhibits attached to your report?

INVESTIGATOR JONES: I have 25 exhibits, sir.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: I need you to go through each of the exhibits and tell us what they are, please.

INVESTIGATOR JONES: Yes, sir. So the first exhibit is a copy of the initial public notice as far as the protest is concerned. Just give me a second. The second exhibit is an exhibit from the ANC 8C.

The third exhibit is -- so there was another exhibit from a councilman from the area. But he was not represented as far as being a protestant. But I did include his exhibit in this report from Mr. Travon Smith, Commissioner. We do have -- number 4 is my email to Commissioner Adofo. Number 5 is my calls for service to the Unified Communications as far as the calls for service. Number 6 is an exhibit of the owner's license.

Number 7 is my email -- my second email to Commissioner Adofo. Number 8 is an exhibit of the GIS information as far as the -where the establishment is located as far as the zones are concerned. And number 9 is the zones explained, in U-4.

Number 10 is GIS information for -- is GIS information -- I'm sorry -- GIS information as far as locations for schools or recreation centers. Number 11 is the GIS information for middle schools and elementary. Number 12 is an explanation of a copy of the nearby residential streets.

Number 13 is a copy or a picture of -again, of -- so this is the back alley behind the
establishment that is in front of Friendship Charter School. Number 15 is a copy of a picture of Friendship Charter School that's in the alleyway. Number 16 is a copy of the R.I.S.E. community center across the street from the establishment which is on St. Elizabeth's property.

Number 17 is a copy of the front of Wonder Mart. Number 18 is a copy of the rear of Wonder Mart. Number 19 is a copy of the inside of Wonder Mart which is from the cash register side on the inside of the counter.

Number 20 is another copy of the inside of the establishment from the rear shooting towards the front. Number 21 is a copy of the establishment shooting from the front towards the rear of the establishment. Number 22 is a copy of the establishment shooting from the rear of the establishment into the exit area which also shoots kind of the storage areas as well as the exit door.

Number 23 is a copy of a picture of the locking area where they can lock up whether it's beverages or whatever they want to put in there. That's a locking area, storage area.

This one on my copy is kind of unclear. It came out kind of dark. I don't know what you can see, but it's a picture of the parking --

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: What number is that?

INVESTIGATOR JONES: That's 24. On my picture, it comes out really dark. I don't know why. But it's a picture of the parking right in front of the establishment. It's the parking sign that's in front of the establishment. And $I$ can --
(Simultaneous speaking.)
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Okay.
INVESTIGATOR JONES: And 25, the last one, 25 is the calls for service from the Unified Communications from MPD, the calls for service from January 2020 to January 2021.
(Whereupon, the above-referred to documents were marked as ABC Board Exhibit Nos. 1 through 25 for identification and received into evidence.)

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Let me ask. Did you talk about -- did you testify about what this document consists of?

INVESTIGATOR JONES: Which document,
sir?
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Number 25.
INVESTIGATOR JONES: Let's see. Yes, sir. Yes, sir. I went through the calls for service. I went through all the calls for service.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: I'm sorry. I apologize. So --

INVESTIGATOR JONES: That's okay.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: -- were any of these -- on the calls for service, were there any -- are there any ABRA violations? Was it -- I mean, what were you able to gather from these calls for service -- for the calls for service that you gathered?

INVESTIGATOR JONES: So again for us because they don't have an ABRA license, they're not ABRA related or they're not ABRA violations. However, from the calls that $I$ did notice, what I did indicate was that as well as what happens from MPD is that whenever you put in the call for service for a certain address, they always give you the calls for that address as well as whatever happens in the surrounding address. So everything that comes in is not necessarily
dictated towards that address.
And if you can -- I can go through these again for you. There are -- let me go through this one more time. There are -- so -okay. So there were four disorderly calls. There were three mental health calls. There were two calls for persons down, disorderly, and miscellaneous.

And then there were one calls a piece for the following which included unknown situations, person with a weapon, burglary of a business, aggravated assault, hit and run, accident of a government or commercial vehicle, robbery threat of a weapon, 911 hang-up, and accident unknown injury. And all of that equaled up to 22 calls. So all of these calls were not necessarily dedicated towards that address, but MPD cannot determine or at least tell us which ones were absolutely dedicated towards that address.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Okay. All
right. Okay. Let me see if $I$ have any other questions I want to ask you. I heard Mr. Adofo in his opening stating that this was less than 400 feet from a school. For this particular
establishment, is that significant?
INVESTIGATOR JONES: I think it could be because there is Friendship Charter School that they share an alley with. However, there are also other ABC establishments that are in that same area. Again, that's not my -- I can't determine what should happen and what shouldn't happen.

But I do know when I monitored the area and drove the area on multiple occasions, like I said, there is a charter school that is directly behind the establishment and they share an alleyway. But there are also two other establishments. You have Player Lounge which is directly in back of and in front of that establishment, then you have King Liquors which also shares that same alleyway.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: So you're
saying that there are other ABC establishments that -- you're saying that there are other ABC establishments in the vicinity that's also within the 400 feet. Is that what you're saying?

INVESTIGATOR JONES: Yes, sir.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right. Is there anything else you want to add, sir?

INVESTIGATOR JONES: No. I know that -- and I wish that I could have -- and I apologize and I wish that I could've talked to Commissioner Adofo because I wanted to really get his side of what happened or what his issues or concerns are. And whether we had a bad email address or contact, I made the attempt. However, it would've been nice to get his standpoint on how he feels about things.

I know from what the email that I received from the Commissioner from -- the councilman, I understand what the issues are. I know that they don't want another ABC establishment in that area -- in that condensed area. Again, $I$ can't determine that.

I only know from a business
standpoint, I know what Ms. Ketema, what her thing was, was that she's trying to compete. And I know for her it's a thing where she's kind of losing business on what's going on around her. But I also understand at the same point, it's like you don't want more activity in an area that's already condensed and already kind of overconcentrated to them. And I'm only speaking off of not talking to Commissioner Adofo.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right. All right. Okay. Thank you, Mr. Jones. INVESTIGATOR JONES: Thank you, sir. CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Are there any other Board members who wish to ask questions of Mr. Jones?
(Simultaneous speaking.)
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: I'm sorry.
Hold on. Hold on. Hold on. Hold on. Go ahead, Mr. Short.

MEMBER SHORT: Okay. Investigator Jones, are you familiar -- how familiar are you with the community that you went through?

INVESTIGATOR JONES: I'm familiar, but I can't say that I'm super familiar with it, sir.

MEMBER SHORT: Okay. If I could recollect for you or just bring you up to some history, the school used to be a boy's club. And then the school was built after the liquor school came and the other ABC establishment were already there. So the market, which has always been a market, never had an ABC -- ability to sell alcohol.

INVESTIGATOR JONES: Okay.
MEMBER SHORT: So we already have, as
you mentioned, saturation. How saturated -you've been with ABRA for nine years now. How saturated would you say that situation is with King Liquor and another ABC license all within feet of each other?

INVESTIGATOR JONES: Yeah, in my opinion -- if you honestly ask my opinion, I do think that there's overconcentration.

MEMBER SHORT: Thank you. That's all I have, Mr. Chair.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Mr. Grandis?
MEMBER GRANDIS: Thank you, Mr.
Chairman. And thank you, Mr. Short. You actually hit the target that $I$ was going to ask. But $I$ would like to further the discussion with Inspector Jones. Inspector Jones, I want to thank you for your presentation today.

INVESTIGATOR JONES: Yes, sir.
MEMBER GRANDIS: Hearing Mr. Short and hearing your presentation, that while this may be a new owner for a year or so with a convenience store, it was -- the prior use of this building was also a convenience store, correct? Mr. Short, is that what $I$ heard?

MEMBER SHORT: Yes, to my knowledge
and living in the neighborhood myself for a while, yes, it was a convenience store, yes.

MEMBER GRANDIS: Okay. And Inspector Jones, you've been in the area for a few years, you said. Did they have -- do we know the last time there was a liquor license approved in the location?

INVESTIGATOR JONES: I don't recall saying that, sir. I'm not -- I'm familiar with the area, but I'm not familiar with that certain establishment, sir. I know that King Liquors has been there for a while. I know that Players Lounge has been there for a while. This one establishment, $I$ am not that familiar with.

MEMBER GRANDIS: Yeah. King Liquor is an A, correct?

INVESTIGATOR JONES: Yes, sir.
MEMBER GRANDIS: But I thought I heard in the presentation there was another $B$.
(Simultaneous speaking.)
INVESTIGATOR JONES: Yeah, Quality Convenience Store. Yes, sir.

MEMBER GRANDIS: So that's also within this area, correct?

INVESTIGATOR JONES: Yes, sir. Yes,
sir.
MEMBER GRANDIS: Okay. Thank you very much. And Mr. Chairman, thank you for letting me ask the questions.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Yes, Mr.
Grandis. Are there any other questions by any of the Board members?

All right. Hearing none, Ms. Ketema, are there any questions you want to ask of the investigator?

MS. KETEMA: No, sir.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: I'm sorry. Say yes or no.

MS. KETEMA: No.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Mr. Adofo, are there questions you want to ask of the investigator?

COMMISSIONER ADOFO: Yes, sir. Okay. Thank you. Mr. Jones, you stated that there were how many other establishments that have alcoholic beverages in the area?

INVESTIGATOR JONES: So within the block, there were three other establishments.

COMMISSIONER ADOFO: Okay. And when
I looked at the report, you gave a 1,200 foot
radius. Did that also include Mart Liquor which is at the -- two blocks away at the intersection of Malcolm X and Martin Luther King?

INVESTIGATOR JONES: So if that wasn't within the 1,200 radius, sir, then that wasn't included. But I do understand what you're saying.

COMMISSIONER ADOFO: Okay. And then you also mentioned -- in the report -- it was included in your report, but you didn't mention it in the testimony. Then there's also Dawn to Dusk Daycare which is also within the vicinity as well, correct?

INVESTIGATOR JONES: That is located where, sir?

COMMISSIONER ADOFO: On Lebaum Street.
INVESTIGATOR JONES: So --
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Hold on. Mr. Adofo, are you asking about -- I'm sorry. Are you asking him about establishments that's within the 1,200 feet? Or are you saying -- tell me. I'm not following you.

COMMISSIONER ADOFO: I wasn't clear on his testimony in reference to what $I$ read in the investigation. I saw that there was Dawn to

Dusk. I also saw that there was King Liquor -King Avenue Liquor as well as Mart Liquor and the other establishment that he mentioned. But he didn't mention those in his testimony, and $I$ was just trying to make sure that --

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Okay.
COMMISSIONER ADOFO: -- everything is still congruent. I didn't know if there was -(Simultaneous speaking.)

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Okay. I follow you. Go ahead.

INVESTIGATOR JONES: So everything is
still congruent. It's just when we do the testimony, we're just trying to really hit and hone in on the initial facts. And so I understand what you're saying. But for those things, those are things for the testimony later on to bring up and to go into that.

COMMISSIONER ADOFO: Okay. Also, you stated that many of the calls that you received would not have been ABRA complaints because the establishment does not have an ABRA license. So had they had an ABRA license, those have been complaints --
(Simultaneous speaking.)

COMMISSIONER ADOFO: -- ABRA
complaints?
INVESTIGATOR JONES: I can't determine that, sir, because $I$ can't -- unless the establishment has an alcohol license and they're found in violation, $I$ can't determine that they would be violations.

COMMISSIONER ADOFO: Okay. And just for the record, my email address would be 8c07@anc.dc.gov. So you left out that very critical part of anc.dc.gov. And I apologize for the mix-up. I wish we would have been able to connect with each other as well.

INVESTIGATOR JONES: I apologize too, sir. And I wish we would have too. I apologize. COMMISSIONER ADOFO: Chairman Anderson, $I$ have no further questions.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right. I don't have any further questions. Okay. Thank you very much, Mr. Jones, for your testimony.

INVESTIGATOR JONES: All right. Thank you, sir. All right.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Ms. Ketema, who's your first witness, ma'am?

MS. KETEMA: Say that again, please.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: This is now your time to present your case. Do you have a witness you wish to call?

Do you have -- how are you going to present your case? Do you have a witness you're going to call, or are you going to testify? MS. KETEMA: Chair, my witness, Adanech Geberemeskel.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: So you're going to call her as a witness?

MS. KETEMA: Yes. Also, I have 24 signature from the neighborhood from my customer.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right. But right now, you're going to call a witness. So you're calling Ms. -- you're calling your agent as a witness. Is that correct?

MS. KETEMA: Yes.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right, ma'am. Can you raise your right hand, please? Not you, ma'am. You're asking Ms. -- I'm talking about Ms. Geberemeskel. Okay. Raise your right hand, please.

WHEREUPON,
ADANECH GEBEREMESKEL
was called for examination by Counsel for the

Applicant, and after having been first duly sworn, was examined and testified as follows:

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Do me one favor again, please, ma'am. Can you state and spell your name for the record, please?

MS. GEBEREMESKEL: Okay. My first name is A-D-A-N-E-C-H. And last name, G-E-B-E-R-E-M-E-S-K-E-L.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right. Ms. Ketema, you can ask them whatever questions you want to ask them.

MS. KETEMA: So my concern was, like, more than 25 percent they carry (phonetic) wine is, like, Wonder Mart cannot responsible what's happening around the MLK.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Hold on. Are you asking her a question?

MS. KETEMA: Huh?
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: She's your witness. Are you asking her questions? You need to ask her questions. That's why she's -- that's why you call her. So do you have questions to ask her?

MS. KETEMA: No.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: So what's her
purpose?
MS. KETEMA: She know through the process. When we start applying the license, she know about the protest.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right.
Okay. Remember I explained the process. This is your opportunity to call, have documents and witnesses to tell the Board -- prove to the Board why you deserve to have a license. Do you have any questions you're going to ask her, or do you have a statement you want to make it? Which one is it?

MS. KETEMA: I don't have any question to ask her.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right. Do you have a statement that you need to make to tell the Board why is it that the Board should offer you this -- should grant you this license?

MS. KETEMA: No.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Do you have anything else to say? Do you understand this process, ma'am?

MS. KETEMA: Yes, but 100 percent.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: You know this is a hearing? This is a protest hearing. You
requested a license.
MS. KETEMA: Mm-hmm.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: The ANC is protesting your license. The ANC is saying that we should not give you a license. This is your opportunity to use documents and witnesses to tell the Board why the Board -- why the ANC is wrong an why we should -- why the ANC is wrong and why the Board should give you a license. What evidence are you going to put on? What are you telling us today? What is it that the Board should make its decision on? Is there anything you have to say?

MS. KETEMA: A summation give for, like, us, we have existing business. We --

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Hold on. Hold on. Can you raise your right hand, please, ma'am?

MS. KETEMA: Yes.
WHEREUPON,

## ETSEGENET KETEMA

was called for examination by Counsel for the Applicant, and after having been first duly sworn, was examined and testified as follows:

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: What is it that
you want to say, ma'am?
MS. KETEMA: As for existing business and we are a taxpayer, we are a part of the community. We commit our service maintaining the peace and security of the area by installing the back end for camera. So we are good support for customer.

And as we continue as a business, we give our customer the big selection of item, more convenient as well. And more job opportunity, more as we go, we pay more tax to the government. Therefore, as a tax paying business, we must be given the opportunity to expand our business to best serve our community while at the same times we promise to work (audio interference) to make the neighborhood more safe and peaceful.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Is that all you have to say, ma'am?

MS. KETEMA: Yes, sir.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: You're sure there's nothing else you want to say?

MS. KETEMA: That's all about it.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Mr. Adofo, are there questions you have you want to ask of her?

COMMISSIONER ADOFO: Yes, ma'am. I'm
allowed to ask both parties questions or just one, sir?

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: No, sir.
You're asking -- the only person who had something to say is Ms. Ketema. That's the only person you can ask questions of.

COMMISSIONER ADOFO: Okay. Thank you.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: The other lady didn't say nothing. So there's no questions for you to ask of her.

COMMISSIONER ADOFO: Thank you for the clarification, Mr. Chairman. Ms. Ketema, I hope I'm pronouncing your name correctly. I apologize. So you have a security plan for Wonder Mart if it was granted a license?

MS. KETEMA: Yes, sir.
COMMISSIONER ADOFO: And if so, can you explain the security plan, please?

MS. KETEMA: We do hire security and we also have the front and back camera.

COMMISSIONER ADOFO: Okay. You said you hired security?

MS. KETEMA: Mm-hmm.
COMMISSIONER ADOFO: And how would you go about verifying the customers are age
appropriate to purchase adult beverages?
MS. KETEMA: Say that again, please. COMMISSIONER ADOFO: How would you verify that the customers are authorized to buy adult beverages?

MS. KETEMA: I'm going to follow the rule and regulation from ABRA.

COMMISSIONER ADOFO: Have you gone through the training?

MS. KETEMA: No.
COMMISSIONER ADOFO: So as of right now, you have not gone through the training. And so do you feel as though you're now qualified to sell those beverages?

MS. KETEMA: Whenever I'm approved to get the license, I'll go to the training and I will follow whatever ABRA contributes.

COMMISSIONER ADOFO: Okay. So this is where I'm somewhat confused. And if you can help me, it would be greatly appreciated. How did you devise the proper security plan without having gone through the training to know what you need to do?

MS. KETEMA: Well, now I don't believe -- before, $I$ have idea about it. But I'm, like,
researching and learning more and more. Then whenever if I get the license, $I$ will do the best and $I$ will follow the rule and the regulation.

COMMISSIONER ADOFO: Yes, ma'am. So as an Advisory Neighborhood Commissioner, I am not only -- I am the chair of the Commission. And it's my responsibility to make sure that not only to the residents but also our stakeholders and business owners such as yourself operate within compliance of ABRA's code as well as the D.C. code overall.

And it is my responsibility to operate in the best interest of you as well. And what you're telling me is that you do not have full understanding of what the policy is. And so if you were granted a license, you would not be able to operate in accordance with the policy. And then you could possibly be fined.

So I have to look out for you as well. And I'm not sure that you're communicating to me that you have full understanding of the proper security procedures that need to take place. Also, you stated that you would operate at 25 percent of your gross income with alcoholic beverages?

MS. KETEMA: Only 25 percent, 75 percent will be the grocery.

COMMISSIONER ADOFO: Okay. And what I'm reading the municipal regulations Title 23, it states that the sale of alcoholic beverages constitutes no more than 15 percent of the total volume of gross receipts. Are you familiar with the municipal regulations for ABRA?

MS. KETEMA: I'm not.
COMMISSIONER ADOFO: Can you repeat that one more time, please?

MS. KETEMA: I'm not.
COMMISSIONER ADOFO: You're not
familiar with the ABRA regulation administration's manual?

MS. KETEMA: No, sir.
COMMISSIONER ADOFO: All right. Have you come to the ANC meetings to discuss with the ANC about the protest once you were made aware that the ANC on behalf of the residents in the community protested you being issued a license?

MS. KETEMA: I go through the neighborhood and talk to them to ask why they opening, but $I$ haven't get a chance to meet the ANC Commissioner.

COMMISSIONER ADOFO: All right. Thank you. And my last question is with so many other establishments in the community, why do you feel the need to open up another establishment that sells adult beverages so close to a school as well as to a homeless shelter where there are going to be customers that would come and they're on the down side of life and possibly to consume beverages there and further put themselves in a bad position? Why is it necessarily for you to sell alcohol in this community?

MS. KETEMA: I mean, I'm a business person. Also, there is the Players Lounge and the King Liquor. They're working, like, more than hour me. Then I can work less hours, like, until 10:00 maybe.

Also, they don't have security. They don't have, like, much camera to protect the customer and themself too. So I'll try my best to protect the customer and working with, like, the community.

COMMISSIONER ADOFO: Let me rephrase my question. With so many issues that we have in the community, why do you feel it is necessary for Wonder Mart to be able to sell alcoholic
beverages knowing that we have so many other issues such as homelessness? We have the uptick in homicides. We have an uptick in delinquency. Why would we support you in establishing another store that can possibly contribute to that activity as well as have that kind of activity gravitate to the location? Why is it so important for Wonder Mart?

MS. KETEMA: So Wonder Mart cannot take responsibility what's going on outside. But we try our best, like, to keep it safe, like, working with the community and the neighborhood too. So for me, like, selling 25 percent beer and wine is not going to affect the neighborhood. COMMISSIONER ADOFO: Thank you. I have no further questions, Chairman Anderson.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right.
Thank you. Any questions by the Board members? Questions by the Board members?

MEMBER GRANDIS: Yes. Yes, sir.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Yes, Mr.
Grandis. Yes, Mr. Grandis.
MEMBER GRANDIS: Thank you. Ms.
Ketema, and I apologize if I state your name incorrectly. I want to welcome your presentation
with the Board members for you to be here today. I am certain that being an independent small business owner is not only exciting but very heard. So I have a lot of respect for you being out there as a small business person. I'm just trying to get clarification. The zoning you are operating in prior to you opening, was there an ongoing business or was it vacant?

MS. KETEMA: It's ongoing.
MEMBER GRANDIS: It was a business?
Thank you.
MS. KETEMA: Mm-hmm.
MEMBER GRANDIS: And was that a convenience -- was it a similar type of business or a different type of business?

MS. KETEMA: Convenience store.
MEMBER GRANDIS: And you don't need to know the answer to this, but do you know how many years they were operating?

MS. KETEMA: No, sir.
MEMBER GRANDIS: Okay. Did they have an ABC license?

MS. KETEMA: No.
MEMBER GRANDIS: Okay. Thank you very much. Thank you.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Are there any other questions by any of the Board members?

Just one last question. How long have you owned this business, ma'am?

MS. KETEMA: August 2019.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: You bought the business in August 2019. And when you bought the business, it did not have a liquor license. Is that correct?

MS. KETEMA: Yes, sir.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: And so when did you decide that you were going to apply for -when did you apply for this liquor license?

MS. KETEMA: October.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: October 2019?
MS. KETEMA: 2019.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: So as soon as you bought the business, you applied for a liquor license?

MS. KETEMA: Yes, sir.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: So what is sold in this establishment?

MS. KETEMA: It's a convenience store.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: What type of products do you sell? What do you sell in the
establishment?
MS. KETEMA: I got canned food, fresh fruits, vegetables. We also have the fresh soap (phonetic). We also have drink, soft drinks, bread, eggs, all dairy product. Also, we have tobacco product like cigarettes.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right.
Okay. Do you have anything else you want -- do you have any -- I don't have any questions. And is there anything else that you want to say, or is this your presentation?

MS. KETEMA: This is my presentation. Thank you.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Mr. Adofo, do you have a witness you wish to call?

COMMISSIONER ADOFO: Yes, sir. I'm going to ask Ms. Doyle to come forward, please.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Ms. Doyle, can you raise your right hand please?

MS. DOYLE: Yes. WHEREUPON,

JOYCE DOYLE
was called for examination by Counsel for the Protestant, and after having been first duly sworn, was examined and testified as follows:

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Thank you. Your witness.

COMMISSIONER ADOFO: Oh, okay. I can't see. Good evening, Ms. Doyle. Can you please tell us how do you think that Wonder Mart having this license would impact your singlefamily district?

MS. DOYLE: Thank you. Again, I am a 16-year resident of Ward 8 living here in Congress Heights at 5th and Oakwood. I am also one of the founding members of the Congress Heights Homeowners Associations, and we are comprised of over 40-plus members where 98 percent of us are persons of color.

We -- although do not have a lot of diversity from an ethnic or racial background, we do offer a lot of diversity in our ideologies, work experience, diversity in thought, education, income, and socioeconomic status. We are investors in this community. We are financial investors in this community as homeowners and we are taxpayers.

So we are concerned. The CHHA in
total, we are focused on resolving tangible issues that plague the aesthetics of our
immediate area of 8C02. We are -- and those things are litter, working with DDOT, DPW, National Park Service, and Department of Public Works and MPD. I'm sorry if I repeated that.

We are not focused on resolving the historical issues that plague this community. It is beyond us and above us, such as the homelessness, mental health, poverty, drug use, and alcohol abuse. However, we do believe that from our investments as homeowners, we will be able to support the community and hopefully it would have a positive impact on those historical socioeconomic issues that plague this immediate area.
We're opposed to the issuance of this liquor license because as research shows, there's a direct correlation between offsite liquor stores and drug and alcohol abuse, homelessness, poverty, and mental health. These things increase behavior such as littering, drug sales, open alcohol consumption, street harassment, rude and ludicrous behavior, and violence. The liquor store, although I support small business and I'm a small business owner, this liquor store -- this license for this liquor store will do nothing but
contribute to the systemic issues of this neighborhood which we are fighting daily within the Congress Heights Homeowners Association to be heard and to be taken seriously.

We are a group of people that are highly educated and prepared to get the attention of those who run these agencies and have action to understand that we are taxpayers and not part of the negative stereotype that carries on through Ward 8. The liquor license will not benefit this community in any way. It will not serve purpose to combat these issues.

And although I did hear that a light was in place for security and there are 22 signatures of customers that are in support, the issue is far greater than any one business owner, particularly a small business owner or even a small group of people that make up the Congress Heights Homeowners Association. If you follow the research from the Department of Justice --

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Hold on, Ms.
Doyle. I mean, Mr. -- and I gave you some leeway. Mr. Adofo, I need her to answer a question. I can't have her speak for five minutes. So I need you to remember you have a
timeline.
COMMISSIONER ADOFO: Yes, sir.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: So I need you to ask pointed questions and I need shorter answers. And I can't necessarily have her going through for ten minutes. Okay?

COMMISSIONER ADOFO: Yes, sir.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: I'm giving you some leeway.

MS. DOYLE: I thought it was 45 minutes, but that's okay. Go ahead.
(Simultaneous speaking.)
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Hold on, ma'am. Hold on. He has one hour to present his entire case. Okay?

MS. DOYLE: Okay.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: So if he wants to spend all one hour with you, that's his choice. I'm just saying --
(Simultaneous speaking.)
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: -- he has one
hour --
MS. DOYLE: -- respect the timeline.
But go ahead. Let's move forward.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Okay.

MS. DOYLE: Let's move forward. COMMISSIONER ADOFO: Yes, Ms. Doyle. My question to you as the representative of the Congress Heights Homeowners Associations, how do you think that Wonder Mart, LLC having this license will impact the value of the home that you have, the real property values?

MS. DOYLE: It will negatively impact the real property value of this community and those of us who are financial investors and taxpayers. It contributes to a depressed economy, and there's no strategic plan to improve it by selling more liquor.

COMMISSIONER ADOFO: All right. Thank you so much. I appreciate it. I have no further questions for you at this time.

MS. DOYLE: Thank you.
(Simultaneous speaking.)
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Ms. Ketema, do you have any questions for her?

MS. KETEMA: Yes, thank you. Actually, as you mention, we -- I'm not applying for a liquor license. So that's not considered as a liquor license. Also, whatever happen in the shelter or around there, Wonder Mart --
(Simultaneous speaking.)
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: -- you're
asking her a question. So I need you to ask her -- if you have a question to ask her, not a statement. Do you have any specific questions to ask her based on the testimony she just gave?

MS. KETEMA: No, thank you.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Any questions by any Board members of the witness?

MEMBER SHORT: Yes, Mr. Chairman. Mr. Short. I have --

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Mr. Short. Go ahead, Mr. Short.

MEMBER SHORT: Ms. Doyle?
MS. DOYLE: Yes.
MEMBER SHORT: How many years have you lived in the neighborhood?

MS. DOYLE: Sixteen years.
MEMBER SHORT: Ten years, so --
MS. DOYLE: Sixteen, sixteen.
MEMBER SHORT: Oh, okay, 16. I don't want to -- I want to clarify something by making -- I noticed something before I ask my next question. How far do you live from the 300 block of Raleigh Street, Southeast?

MS. DOYLE: Raleigh? I can't even -I don't know. I'm literally around the corner from Mart Liquor.

MEMBER SHORT: Okay.
MS. DOYLE: So --
MEMBER SHORT: Let me help you then. When you make the right turn onto King Avenue passing Mart Liquor which used to be a movie theater. When I moved into 306 Raleigh Street, Southeast in 1971, I was a young person with a young wife and two babies. So that neighborhood was a wonderful neighborhood. And in fact, my ex-wife still owns the house.

But I'll just say this. I know about the community and that's the reason why $I$ made the comment about the boy's club. Were you familiar with the boy's club when it was Milwaukee Avenue?

MS. DOYLE: I'm familiar about the building and I've heard of the history of it, yes.

MEMBER SHORT: Okay. Well, thank you and your community, and thank you for your housing association there for building the community up and supporting the community. Thank
you for your time today.
MS. DOYLE: Thank you for having me.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Any other
questions by any of the Board members?
All right. Hearing none, thank you. Do you have another witness, Mr. Adofo?

COMMISSIONER ADOFO: Yes, I do. I'm going to ask Ms. Juanda Johnson to come forward, please.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Ms. Johnson? Ms. Johnson, can you turn your camera on if you have one.

MS. JOHNSON: I did. Thank you.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: I can't see you.

MS. JOHNSON: This is my first time being on this Webex. So you're going to see my right hand, right?

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: I can't see you. So if you have a camera -
(Simultaneous speaking.)
MS. JOHNSON: Oh, no.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: If you don't have a camera.
(Simultaneous speaking.)

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: But if you have one, turn it on because $I$ can't see you.

MS. JOHNSON: Is it too dark, or -CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: No, ma'am. I cannot see you, period.

MS. JOHNSON: Hold on.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: It's not the lighting. I can't see you. Your camera is not on.

MS. JOHNSON: Oh, I said -- okay. I said start. I told it to start the video. My apologies. Like I said, I'm unfamiliar with this medium. You are sending your video. Okay. CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Okay. That's better. Can you raise your right hand, please? MS. JOHNSON: Kind of. Okay. Here we go. WHEREUPON, JUANDA JOHNSON was called for examination by Counsel for the Protestant, and after having been first duly sworn, was examined and testified as follows:

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right. Mr. Adofo, your witness.

COMMISSIONER ADOFO: Good evening, Ms.

Johnson.
MS. JOHNSON: Good evening.
COMMISSIONER ADOFO: I have several questions for you. My first question is as a senior, do you feel safe when you walk in the vicinity of Wonder Mart?

MS. JOHNSON: Absolutely not. As a matter of fact, I rarely walk through the neighborhood at all, even though I am an avid walker, because of the number of addicted alcoholic and as well as drug addicted people in the area. They're offensive and they say offensive things. I don't feel safe.

I'm 70 years old, by the way. He was kind. He didn't give my age. He didn't ask me. But he said senior, so I'd like to clarify that.

COMMISSIONER ADOFO: How long have you lived in the area, ma'am?

MS. JOHNSON: Thirty-seven years.
COMMISSIONER ADOFO: And in the 37 years that you've been there, have you seen an increase in homelessness or drug addiction or alcoholism?

MS. JOHNSON: Absolutely, absolutely. I saw it when Obama was elected and Fenty closed
the shelter downtown. That's when a number -- a large number of homeless people came to the area. And statistically, according to the substance abuse and mental health services, 38 percent of homeless people are alcoholics.

COMMISSIONER ADOFO: Thank you, Ms. Johnson. I have no further questions.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Do you have any questions you wish to ask of her, Ms. Ketema?

MS. KETEMA: Yes, please.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: I said do you have any questions you want to ask Ms. Johnson?

MS. KETEMA: Yes, thank you. Ms.
Johnson, have you been in Wonder Mart store?
MS. JOHNSON: I was there before it was Wonder Mart actually. I used to frequent that store. I stopped when the traffic -- the pedestrian traffic became offensive.

MS. KETEMA: Thank you.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Any questions by any Board members?

All right. No questions by any Board members. Thank you. All right. Do you have -thank you, Ms. Johnson, for your testimony today. All right. Ms. Adofo, do you have another
witness?
COMMISSIONER ADOFO: Yes, my next witness is Ms. Butler, the daughter of Victoria Akinseye.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Where's Ms.
Butler?
MS. BUTLER: Hi.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Can you raise your right hand, please? WHEREUPON,

## VIERAH BUTLER

was called for examination by Counsel for the Protestant, and after having been first duly sworn, was examined and testified as follows:

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: And do you -let me ask you a question. Do you know the difference between right and wrong?

MS. BUTLER: Yes.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right.
Your witness, sir.
COMMISSIONER ADOFO: Good evening, Ms.
Butler. You can place your hand down now. All right. My question for you is, can you please describe how safe you feel being able to play in your own neighborhood?

MS. BUTLER: I don't feel that safe. I don't play at all actually in my neighborhood with other kids because of how many people walk past. They look very sketchy. Most people, they walk. A lot of people that are on alcohol and drugs, they walk past our house all the time and they knock on doors and stuff.

COMMISSIONER ADOFO: All right. And my next question for you is if you don't play in your own neighborhood, where do you go?

MS. BUTLER: I go to my dad's house. I play in his neighborhood. Actually, I play on my bike and my scooter and hoverboard.

COMMISSIONER ADOFO: And how far away is your dad's neighborhood?

MS. BUTLER: Maryland.
COMMISSIONER ADOFO: All right. Thank you. I have no further questions.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Ms. Ketema, do you have any questions for her?

MS. KETEMA: No, sir.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Ms. Butler, how
far do you live from this establishment?
MS. BUTLER: Two minutes.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: What do you
mean two minutes? I mean, tell me. What do you mean two minutes?

MS. BUTLER: It's down the street from me.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: So you live down the street. So you don't need to give me your address, but what street do you live on?

MS. BUTLER: Lebaum.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: I'm sorry. Lebaum?

MS. BUTLER: Mm-hmm.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: And what street is this place on? Now Ms. Akinseye, you can't have no conversation with her. I need her to -Ms. Butler, Ms. Butler.

MS. BUTLER: Yes?
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: You're talking to me.

MS. BUTLER: Okay.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: I don't need you to look left, right, up, down. You need to look directly in the camera. No one should give you any information. No one should say anything to you because you're under oath. And that's one of the reasons why $I$ ask you, do you know the
difference between right or wrong and telling the truth.

So I'm just -- so now I even forgot the question that I was asking you. So how far -- you said five minutes. So do you know where this establishment is located?

MS. BUTLER: Park Street.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: I said, do you know where the store is located? Yes or no?

MS. BUTLER: No.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: No? So if you don't know where the store is located, why are you testifying against this business today? I'm just asking you.

MS. BUTLER: Because my --
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: I can't hear you.

MS. BUTLER: Because my mom wanted me to be a witness.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Okay. Nothing wrong with that. I don't have a problem with your mother asking to be a witness and you state -- I mean, and so what you stated today was just how you feel about this place?

MS. BUTLER: Yes.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right. That's fine. Do we have any other questions by any other witness -- I'm sorry. Do we have any other questions by any other members?

Ms. Ketema, do you wish to ask her any questions based on the questions $I$ asked her?

MS. KETEMA: Sir, since she's not -she don't know where we're located, so I don't have any question for her.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right. Thank you. Mr. Adofo, do you wish to ask her any questions based on the questions that I asked, sir?

COMMISSIONER ADOFO: Yes, I do have two more questions I can ask her.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: It's based on the questions I asked. It's not new area. These questions are based on the questions that $I$ had asked her. If you want to ask her follow-up questions on what $I$ asked, fine, but not new questions.

COMMISSIONER ADOFO: Yes, sir.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Okay. Go ahead.

COMMISSIONER ADOFO: Ms. Butler, you
made it known that you were not aware where this store is, correct?

MS. BUTLER: Correct.
COMMISSIONER ADOFO: But you do know that it's in your neighborhood, correct?

MS. BUTLER: Correct.
COMMISSIONER ADOFO: Is it possible that your mother doesn't allow you to play in that area because of the possible things that could happen to you?

MS. BUTLER: Yes, my mom doesn't allow me to play around that area. I only go around the area with an adult or a guardian that watch over me. I'm not allowed to go in the store by myself.

COMMISSIONER ADOFO: All right. And do you feel comfortable being able to be here and to speak about your level of safety in your neighborhood?

MS. BUTLER: Yes.
COMMISSIONER ADOFO: All right. I have no further questions, sir.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Thank you. Ms. Butler, thank you very much for your testimony today. I know this is -- how old are you anyway?

MS. BUTLER: I'm 12.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: You're 12?
Well, thank you very much for your testimony today, and I hope I wasn't too hard on you. Okay?

MS. BUTLER: All right.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right.
Thank you. All right. Do we have another witness?

COMMISSIONER ADOFO: Yes, I would like to call Dr. Carlene Reid.

DR. REID: I'm present.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Dr. Reid, can you raise your right hand, please? WHEREUPON,

## CARLENE REID

was called for examination by Counsel for the Protestant, and after having been first duly sworn, was examined and testified as follows:

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Your witness.
COMMISSIONER ADOFO: Dr. Reid, as a subject matter expert in the field of education and someone who has taught at --

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Hold on. Hold on. Hold on, Mr. Adofo. You're not an attorney.

If you're going to do all of that, can you go through her resume? I don't know who she is.

How are you going to have her testify that she has subject matter -- so just why don't you -- this is her opportunity -- before you ask her those questions, have her tell us who she is if you want her to say she has subject matter jurisdiction. And I'll stop the timer so I'm not taking away time from you to do this. Have her tell us who she is.

COMMISSIONER ADOFO: Yes, sir.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: And once she tells us who she is, then $I$ can have a basis for believing anything she is because I can say, okay, fine, she does have some qualification to give us testimony.

COMMISSIONER ADOFO: Yes, sir.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Go ahead, sir.
COMMISSIONER ADOFO: Dr. Reid, can you tell us who you are?

DR. REID: Yes, so I'm Dr. Carlene Reid. I've been an educator in Washington, D.C. for over 15 years, both in DCPS charter as well as OSSE on the federal side. I'm not sure. Do you need me to give more specifications around my
qualification? $I$ have a doctorate in education.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: That's helpful, ma'am. This is your opportunity to talk about yourself. So can you tell me who you are?

DR. REID: Oh, yes. So I'm the elected -- I'm the Ward 8 State Board of Education representative. I'm just elected in November and started my term January 2nd and invited here to basically speak about the impact of Wonder Mart receiving additional ability to sell alcohol and some of the ways it connects to the work in D.C. because we're all partners in the city. So do you need more?

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: No, go ahead, Mr. Adofo.

COMMISSIONER ADOFO: My question to you, Dr. Reid, is how would an establishment that is so close to an educational institution impact students?

DR. REID: Yeah. So specifically -can you guys see me? I just got an error message. Yeah, okay, cool. So specifically in the realm of the Board of Education, the Office of the Student Advocate delivered our safe passages report which just to quickly kind of
give you some oversight about how students are feeling, we have Friendship that's right there as the high school.

And over 27.5 percent of students indicated they felt uncomfortable coming in to school, 21.5 percent felt that they were concerned about their commute, 3.3 percent of students felt that they were afraid. One in five students reported not feeling safe in their commutes mentioned that they were either harassed, being watched, or feeling threatened. And we also had, I mean, even from Ward 8, instances of students being robbed, Etsegenet cetera.

In the D.C. Advocate's report, the recommendation around street harassment and us as a city working together to collaborate to reduce street harassment was a recommendation that Investigator Jones who did the review of Wonder Mart area mentioned the potential for street harassment, for loitering or loitering specifically because of the amount of oversaturation of stores that serve alcohol in that area. So I'm presenting in regards to the impact on students trying to get back and forth
between the Metro, catch the bus, engage in after school activities.

COMMISSIONER ADOFO: Do you think there's high potential for students to steal alcoholic beverages in a convenience store?

DR. REID: I'm not sure about student behavior. I mean, I would hope that Friendship Academy or Friendship would work on that. But I mean, I feel like there's no difference between the other individual that may be able to steal alcohol.

COMMISSIONER ADOFO: All right. And the final question is, do you think that this establishment, if granted a license, would be beneficial to the overall health and public safety of our children commuting to and from school?

DR. REID: No, and for the exact reasons mentioned. Students often use the convenience stores in immediate areas to sometimes grab breakfast items, grab items on the way from home. And my opinion, and also getting off the (audio interference) have about students commutes to and from school I think definitely has a negative impact to be (audio interference)
individuals who might be possibly under the influence or loitering because they just made a purchase.

And also, I'm sorry. Go to your -the second question. The plan or lack of plan for security that was given in regards to student overall health and well-being is problematic for me. I would expect an establishment to have a more secure plan, especially in the immediate vicinity, not just Friendship but also a childcare center that's right there. And then the potential of the St. Elizabeth's campus to also hold students for after school activities because that area is developing.

COMMISSIONER ADOFO: I have no further questions. Thank you.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Thank you for your -- I'm sorry. Oh, I'm sorry. Ms. Ketema, do you have any questions for her?

MS. KETEMA: Yes. I mean, all the students, they don't have direct park to direct to Wonder Mart, LLC.

DR. REID: That's not a question.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Ma'am, that's for me to ask. If you can't answer the question,
say you can't answer the question. So all right. Ms. Ketema, maybe you can rephrase the question. Rephrase the question you want to ask her.

MS. KETEMA: No, sir.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: No, you can
rephrase the question you want to ask. Just say it in a different way. Are you making a statement or are you asking a question? What is it that you're doing?

MS. KETEMA: All she said is not really directly related to Wonder Mart.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: So why don't you ask her what you want to ask her in that sense?

MS. KETEMA: I mean, what -- well, she explain everything. But it's not related -direct related to --
(Simultaneous speaking.)
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Ask her how is what she just said related to Wonder Mart. Ask her that question.

DR. REID: How Wonder Mart is related with whatever you explaining?

DR. REID: Chairman Anderson, is it typical that you lead the --

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Ma'am, ma'am, ma'am, ma'am. This is -- I'm the Chairman of the Board, and I'm doing this. There's a lot of things that occurred today here. She's not an attorney. She asked you a question. You told her that was not a question. That was improper of you to have done that. So therefore --
(Simultaneous speaking.)
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: -- because she
-- so therefore, because she is not an attorney, so because you told her it was not answer -- she didn't ask you a question, I'm helping her formulate the question so she can ask you the question. That's all I'm doing. I'm not leading her. You told her she didn't ask the question. Clearly, she's trying to figure out to formulate a question. And all I did was to say to her, okay, fine. I tried to help her to formulate a question to ask you since you told her that wasn't a question she asked you if you can answer.

DR. REID: It feels like guiding the applicant. But I'm listening.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: I'm sorry. You said what, ma'am?

DR. REID: It feels like the applicant is being guided --

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Ma'am.
(Simultaneous speaking.)
DR. REID: -- question.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Ma'am.
(Simultaneous speaking.)
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: I take offense at that. I have been Chairman of this Board for five years, and one of the things I try to do, I try to make sure that everyone when they come here today, they've been heard. She's not being representative -- she's not represented. Okay?

And so she probably doesn't know the process. That's not mine. But I got involved because she asked you a question, and you told her that was not a question. So what is she supposed to do? I just help her formulate the question so she can ask you.

If you did not tell her that was not a question, $I$ would not have gotten involved. Okay? All right. If she has a question to ask you, she can ask you.

MS. KETEMA: No question, sir.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right. Any
other questions by any Board members?
(Simultaneous speaking.)
MEMBER SHORT: Mr. Chairman, I'd like
to --
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Yes, Mr. Short.
Go ahead.
MEMBER SHORT: First, congratulations, Dr. Reid, on being the D.C. Board of Education Ward 8 representative. How many years have you lived in Ward 8?

DR. REID: Thank you, Mr. Short. I've enjoyed your historical information about Ward 8. So I've lived -- have been a homeowner in Ward 8 for eight years as of May but also have been here when I was younger going to church. My parents were married in Ward 8.

MEMBER SHORT: Okay. We're very proud of you. And your testimony today has been compelling. And again, what impact would this have on the school children -- you're a role model for them. But what impact would this business if they were allowed to sell alcohol affect Ward 8 and that community around the licensee's request --

DR. REID: Yes, sir.

MEMBER SHORT: -- to open up a --
DR. REID: Yes, Mr. Short. So again, I have to point to safety as a main instance. And we just have fresh data that supports street harassment, individuals loitering which Investigator Jones mentioned that the quantity of stores in that area could increase loitering.

I live in Anacostia. We just have a similar store here where a young man was killed for walking in to grabbing coffee. I've heard from the education community, especially specifically Anacostia High School, where they said that that's a route that their students would take. Their students would buy snacks. And they actually have pushed me to include safe passages.

So thinking about this unfortunate model over at Anacostia, I immediately thought about Friendship which is a very close high school to Wonder Mart. And we have to really be stringent about how many stores can provide certain elements, the use of the store for students because students will be using that store highly likely to buy snacks. And now we want to make sure things are safe as possible.

So that's why I'm testifying because we have seen other examples of similar establishments that sell groceries and they also sell beverages. And then somehow we end up with either a dead young man or instances of children being harassed as they're moving forward. And we know the long term effects of harassment and trauma on our students.

MEMBER SHORT: Thank you for that answer, and thank you very much for your -again, congratulations, and thank you for being a -- making Ward 8 proud. Thank you.

DR. REID: Thank you for your service, Mr. Short.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Ms. Ketema, do you have any questions to ask Dr. Reid based on the questions that were just asked by Mr. Short?

MS. KETEMA: No, sir.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Mr. Adofo, do you have any questions of Dr. Reid based on the questions that were just asked by Mr. Short?

COMMISSIONER ADOFO: No, sir.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Dr. Reid, thank you very much for your testimony today. Have a great day, ma'am.

DR. REID: Thank you, Chairman Anderson.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: You're welcome.
All right. Mr. Adofo, do you have another witness?

COMMISSIONER ADOFO: I have my last one for the day, sir.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: And you still have 47 minutes to go. Who is your next witness, please?

COMMISSIONER ADOFO: It's Kristi Love. She's president of the Association of Black Social Workers.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Ms. Love, do you have a camera you can turn on, please?

MS. LOVE: Yes, hold on. Hello.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Ms. Love, can you raise your right hand, please?

MS. LOVE: Yeah.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Do you swear or affirm to tell the truth and nothing but the truth? Can you put your hand back?

MS. LOVE: I know. I know. I'm sorry. I got my --

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right. I
see you have someone you had to pay more attention to than me. So let's start one more time again.

WHEREUPON,
KRISTI LOVE
was called for examination by Counsel for the Protestant, and after having been first duly sworn, was examined and testified as follows: CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Your witness, sir. And please have the person give a little background information about themself first, please. Okay?

> COMMISSIONER ADOFO: Yes, sir. CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right. (Simultaneous speaking.) MS. LOVE: Well, I'm -- go ahead. (Simultaneous speaking.) MS. LOVE: Kristi Love. I have been
(Simultaneous speaking.)
MS. LOVE: Okay. I'm Kristi Love (audio interference). I've been a resident only since March 2019. But I have worked in D.C., basically Ward 8 and Ward 7, since 2007. I was currently elected as the president of the

Association of Black Social Workers, Metro D.C. chapter. And so I'm speaking more on behalf as the Association of Black Social Workers.

COMMISSIONER ADOFO: Are you resident of ANC 8C?

MS. LOVE: Yes, I am.
COMMISSIONER ADOFO: So as a resident of ANC 8C and as the president of the Association of Black Social Workers, from a mental health perspective, do you think adding an additional store in the community that has adult beverages, mind altering substances sold in close proximity to people who currently have social -- excuse me, substance abuse problems would advance the community?

MS. LOVE: No. So as the Association -- ABSW, we do not support another store that will sell alcohol beverages because it does not enhance the community. We are about black communities, black families. And this is just one of the ways that decreases the opportunities for families to grow, to learn about health and wealth, because like you all have already stated, it's a homeless shelter, it's a school, it's current behaviors and all of those things already
happening near me. So an additional liquor store does not advance our stance on the black family in the black community.

COMMISSIONER ADOFO: All right. My last question for you is there are a high number of cases in our community that deal with CFSA, Child and Family Services issues.

MS. LOVE: Mm-hmm.
COMMISSIONER ADOFO: Does alcohol contribute to the number of Child and Family Service issues that we have within that immediate community?

MS. LOVE: Absolutely because alcoholism can -- that call to CFSA can be because of neglect. And so because families are experiencing trauma, substance abuse, and dealing with alcohol, it definitely causes the breakup of the family which, again, is against our code of ethics and what we believe in for the black family. So did that answer your question? So yes.

COMMISSIONER ADOFO: And I apologize. Very last question, so with all of what you said, this would be adverse to good order, peace, and quiet in our neighborhood then, correct?

MS. LOVE: Right.
COMMISSIONER ADOFO: I have no further questions, Chairman Anderson.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right. Ms. Ketema, do you have any questions of her?

Do you have any questions you want to ask, ma'am?

MS. KETEMA: No, sir.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Do you have any questions you want to ask her?

MS. KETEMA: No, sir.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Any questions by any Board members?

MEMBER SHORT: Yes, Mr. Chair.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Yes. Go ahead, Mr. Short.

MEMBER SHORT: Thank you very much.
Ms. Love or should I say Social Worker Love, that's a beautiful baby. I can see a little part of it. But --

MS. LOVE: Oh, thank you.
MEMBER SHORT: And you know what?
I've seen a lot of communities in my eight years here on the Board. I've seen a lot of communities come and testify why or if they
should be permitted alcohol sales increase in their communities.

And I'll just say this. Anybody who sees this would say, Ward 8? And I would say, yes, Ward 8. I bought my first house in Ward 8 for 18,300 dollars. And I'm glad to see now that the community is coming up.

With that, I'll ask a question before the Chairman corrects me. Ms. Love, family, you mentioned family. So Ward 8, in your particular community close to this establishment, how would it affect family in this community?

MS. LOVE: How would it affect the family?

MEMBER SHORT: Family, yes.
MS. LOVE: It affects the family -- a social worker perspective. It affects the family because it still -- it's exposure. It's exposure to the alcohol and just an additional store that is selling alcohol.

> And so that can cause -- if it's not the parents, it's the young folks. And again, with mental health or recurring disorders, it disrupts the family, especially if it's generational things that are happening. And so
we're seeing just generations and generations of accessibility to drugs and alcohol and stores that sell it.

And so it affects the family and money. It affects the wealth and what's coming in to feed their families, to speak to their families about mental health issues. And so just all of those things -- those issues can affect the family and break up families like Salim mentioned about CFSA calls, abandonment, neglect.

Those things happen and imbalance. So all of those things affect the family. And we're a community, so it affects all the families. When one family is affected, everybody is affected.

MEMBER SHORT: All right, great. Now you are testifying -- and I can say again knowing the neighborhood like I know it. From Portland Street to this particular location where they're asking, there are several alcohol establishments, A license alcohol already. So opening the door for another one in your community -- so this is a yes or no answer. In light of all the testimony that has been said today and in light of your testimony about family, are you in favor of us as
a Board granting this license.
MS. LOVE: No.
MEMBER SHORT: Thank you very much. That's all I have, Mr. Chair.

MS. LOVE: Thank you.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Any other questions by any Board members?

Ms. Ketema, do you have any questions of the witness based on the questions that were asked by the Board?

MS. KETEMA: Okay. What's a direct impact for my license that the evidence -- all evidence, what's their testimony evidence?

MS. LOVE: Is that directed to me or to the Board?

MS. KETEMA: The Board.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: The question is supposed to be to you. Are you asking the Board a question or are you asking her a question? Which one is it?

MS. KETEMA: I'm asking the Board.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: You can't ask the Board a question, ma'am. I said to you are you -- do you have a question to ask her. If you have no questions --

MS. KETEMA: Okay.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: -- to ask her, then you have no questions to ask her.

MS. KETEMA: Okay. I'm going to ask her what's her testimony evidence.

MS. LOVE: To what? What is my testimony evidence?

MS. KETEMA: What's a direct impact of Wonder Mart, LLC?

MS. LOVE: Oh, so the stand for ABSW is that an additional liquor store does not positively impact the community. Is that --

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Okay.
MS. LOVE: Yeah. And again, like somebody else said, supporting small businesses is good. This is just one of those things that -- an additional thing that adversely -- that negatively affects our family. It's not something we support in the community.

MS. KETEMA: Okay. Thank you.
MS. LOVE: Mm-hmm.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Mr. Adofo, do you have any questions to ask her based on the questions that were asked by the Board?

COMMISSIONER ADOFO: No, sir.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Ms. Love, thank you very much for your testimony.

MS. LOVE: Thank you. Thank you for your time.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Have a good day. Thank you very much. Mr. Adofo, do you have another witness?

COMMISSIONER ADOFO: No, sir.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Do you rest?
COMMISSIONER ADOFO: Yes, sir.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: I did not see the documents of Ms. Ketema. Did you disclose any documents for your PIF? Were there documents that you disclosed to the Agency?

MS. KETEMA: Yes, I did.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: And what are the documents? I have not seen them. So what are the documents that you disclosed?

MS. KETEMA: The document is a petition signature from the customer from the community.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Is that all? Anything else?

MS. KETEMA: That be all.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Have you seen
that document, Mr. Adofo?
COMMISSIONER ADOFO: I have not been issued anything from the -- from ABRA that is official.
(Simultaneous speaking.)
COMMISSIONER ADOFO: I got that email.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: I'm sorry, no, no. She said that -- did you get documents from her in preparation for this hearing today?

COMMISSIONER ADOFO: No, sir.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: So you never saw -- you never got this petition that has the signatures?

COMMISSIONER ADOFO: I saw that via email. And then the email correspondence said that this had to be submitted officially through these channels. And I never received anything of the official channels.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right. All right. Did you provide this agency with any documents in preparation for the hearing today? COMMISSIONER ADOFO: Yes, sir. I did.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: And what are these documents?

COMMISSIONER ADOFO: I provided the

Agency with the survey that the Advisory Neighborhood Commission conducted once we were notified that Wonder Mart, LLC was pursuing a license. And because of COVID, we didn't go door to door. We did a survey sent via email, text message, social media out to the community stakeholders. And I submitted that.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: What else did you submit?

COMMISSIONER ADOFO: We submitted the health equity report.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Can you go through the documents you submitted and tell me what they're identified as? How are they identified?

COMMISSIONER ADOFO: Oh, okay. Let me

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Are you -- let me ask you a question. Do you have them on your computer?

COMMISSIONER ADOFO: Yes, I just have to pull up the email with those documents. I apologize.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Are you able to -- if I give you permission to share your screen,
can you share the documents that way?
COMMISSIONER ADOFO: I believe so.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Ms. Andrews, can you please give him the opportunity to share his screen with us, please?

MS. ANDREWS: Sure. Stand by. Mr. Adofo, you know have the right to share your screen.

COMMISSIONER ADOFO: All right. Okay.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right. So what are the documents?

COMMISSIONER ADOFO: I have here my PIF form of my witnesses, the community impact statements, and the health report.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Let me go through them. I haven't seen them, so $I$ need to --
(Simultaneous speaking.)
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: I need to decide whether or not I'm going to allow them to move them into evidence.

COMMISSIONER ADOFO: Okay. All right.
Here you go. This right -- are you able to see the screen, sir?

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Yes. So what
is this document?
COMMISSIONER ADOFO: Okay. So this was a spreadsheet of all the responses that we got from residents when asked were they in support of Wonder Mart, LLC having a license and their reasons why. And this is their name -- the date, their name, their address, their phone number, email, their response to the question, and these were their reasons why.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right.
This is Exhibit 1.
(Whereupon, the above-referred to document was marked as Protestant Exhibit No. 1 for identification.)

COMMISSIONER ADOFO: Yes. And we have a total of 113 responses of no.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right. What's the next document that you have?

COMMISSIONER ADOFO: The next document here was the D.C. crime search statistics within 2,000 feet of Wonder Mart. And these are all of the different types of crimes that have taken place.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Are any of these specific to Wonder Mart, or this is just
within 2,000 feet?
COMMISSIONER ADOFO: This is just within 2,000 feet of the address, sir.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: I'm not going to allow this into evidence. What's the next one that you have?

COMMISSIONER ADOFO: And the final piece that I submitted was -- and I couldn't submit it any other way other than the link because the file was too big, the D.C. health equity report, sir.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: What's that item? I don't know what that is, so --

COMMISSIONER ADOFO: The D.C. health equity report gives a comprehensive -- excuse me. I'm trying to see the screen. The D.C. health equity report gives a comprehensive report over the last few years. It ended in 2018 where the wards rank at in terms of health, education, transportation, and a lot of other critical issues.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: So what does this have to do with Wonder Mart?

COMMISSIONER ADOFO: I was just trying to show where Ward 8 and particularly Congress

Heights was ranking at in terms of all these different elements of what makes a community and how Wonder Mart having a license to sell alcoholic beverages plays a part in that.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: I'm not going to allow this in evidence because it's not relevant to -- it's not specific to Wonder Mart. But I will allow Exhibit -- so the only document that's been moved into evidence is Exhibit 1 which is -- you said there was a list of neighbors who were against the establishment. (Whereupon, the above-referred to document was received into evidence as Protestant Exhibit No. 1.)

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: And I'm also going to allow into evidence Exhibit -- the exhibit by Wonder Mart where they said it's a list of 24 -- I'm sorry. Did you say you did not receive that document?

COMMISSIONER ADOFO: Right. I stopped sharing my screen. I --
(Simultaneous speaking.)
COMMISSIONER ADOFO: -- received the document initially. And in the email, it was stated that Wonder Mart, LLC needed to follow the
proper channels to submit it. And since that time, I received nothing else.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right. Hold on. I'm trying to get response from the Agency. So I'm not ignoring you. So I'm trying to get a response from the Agency whether or not the Agency received the PIF.

Okay. So that's why I'm not looking at -- I don't want anyone to think that I'm hearing my phone, doing stuff $I$ shouldn't do. But as you know, all of this is remote. I don't have the document in front of me. I don't have the PIF.

So the only thing I can do is before I decide what we're going to do is to find out from the Agency whether or not this document was filed. Ms. -- did you file this document seven days prior to the hearing? Did you file that and disclose it to the Agency and also to Mr. Adofo?

MS. KETEMA: Yes, sir. I did.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: The Agency said you did not file a PIF. So did you file -- did you follow the procedures in the sense that you list your documents and witnesses?

MS. KETEMA: Yes, sir.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right. The Agency is telling me that you did not file a PIF. So because the Agency is telling me that you did not file a PIF and Mr. Adofo said that he never received a formal document from you. Therefore, I cannot -- the document that you said that you wanted to move into evidence, I'm not going to allow that to move into evidence because I'm being told by the Agency that a PIF was not filed and Mr. Adofo is telling me that he did not receive the document.

So I'm not going to move that document into evidence. So the only document that's going to be moved into evidence, it's Exhibit 1 for the Protestant. Okay, okay. Each side -- we have now come to the end of the formal hearing.

So what we're going to do now is that I'm going to give each side five minutes to wrap up their case. So what that -- basically what it is, Ms. Ketema, you're going to tell me what it is -- what was presented today and what it is that you want the Board to do. And Mr. Adofo, once she gives her, you're going to tell -- that you, Mr. Adofo, is going to tell me what was presented today and what it is that you want the

Agency to do. Okay?
COMMISSIONER ADOFO: Yes, sir.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right. So
Ms. Ketema, you have five minutes to tell me what it is that you want the Agency to do -- the Board to do.

MS. KETEMA: Thank you. I feel like all of it is they don't have direct impact to Wonder Mart. Also, Wonder Mart, it's not going to be the reason all what is going on in the community. But I'm willing to work with the ANC and ask the community too. And I need the license because I need to compete and grow my business too. And thank you.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Thank you, ma'am. Mr. Adofo?

COMMISSIONER ADOFO: Good evening, everybody. What I was able to witness today was that Ms. Ketema, the owner of Wonder Mart, has no clear security plan for how an establishment such as this should operate. What I was able to witness today was that Ms. Ketema did not seem to understand the proper protocols and procedures for submitting her paperwork to get her evidence submitted which gives me the understanding that
she may not understand how to properly administer and execute her license.

I wanted to be clear that I am not against Wonder Mart in no way, shape, or form. The ANC is not against Wonder Mart. The ANC is here to ensure the health and the safety of all of its residents and stakeholders which includes Wonder Mart.

And from the testimony that I have been able to hear from the owners of Wonder Mart that there is no clear understanding of the ABRA regulations. She stated that she was not familiar with the regulations at all. And so I have to say that we have to move forward with the recommendation from the ANC.

We represent approximately 2,000 people, and that it is in the best interest of the public health and the public safety for the Board to not grant this license on the grounds that it is also compromising the public health and public safety of our children. We've witnessed a young lady today testify that she's not able to even play in her own neighborhood safely or go in that area because of the saturation of liquor stores in the area and the
adverse impact that it has on our community.
So I would just like to close by saying that I think that we have to do what is in the best interest of everyone involved in that at this current juncture and time, Wonder Mart has not shown to me that they understand all of the ramifications of what goes into maintaining a -getting a license or maintaining one at this current juncture in time. So I would recommend that ABRA do not grant this license.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right.
Thank you. I want to thank both parties for their presentation today. Just one last thing I want to ask the parties and it's this legalese that I never can get to the parties. Do the parties wish to file proposed findings of fact and conclusion of law or make the decision on what was presented today?

Basically, what I just stated is that, do you want to go write a legal brief to summarize this hearing or allow -- or just have the Board make the decision whether or not to grant or deny this license based on the presentation that made today? When I said, proposed findings of fact and conclusion of law,
this would not be bringing in any new evidence. This is just to say what happened here today. Most people do not do that. But I just have to ask.

COMMISSIONER ADOFO: I am okay with the Board making a decision today, sir.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right. Well, I'm not going to make it right now, but yes. All right. So the Board will make a determination since I don't hear anything from Ms. Ketema based on the presentation that was made today.

All right. As Chairperson of the Alcoholic Beverage Control Board for the District of Columbia in accordance with D.C. Official Code Section 2574B of the Open Meetings Act, I move that ABC Board hold a closed meeting for the purpose of seeking legal advice from our counsel on Case No. 20-PRO-00048, Wonder Mart, License No. 116997 pursuant to D.C. Official Code Section 2574B of the Open Meetings Act and deliberate upon Case No. 20-PRO-00048, Wonder Mart, for the reasons cited in D.C. Official Code Section 2574B13 of the Open Meetings Act. Is there a second?

MEMBER WAHABZADAH: Rema Wahabzadah seconds.

MEMBER GRANDIS: Ed Grandis.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Ms. Wahabzadah and Mr. Grandis have second the motion. I will now take a roll call vote on the motion that's been properly second. Mr. Short?

MEMBER SHORT: Mr. Short, I agree.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Mr. Cato?
MEMBER CATO: Bobby Cato, I agree.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Ms. Wahabzadah? MEMBER WAHABZADAH: Rema Wahabzadah, I agree.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Ms. Hansen? MEMBER HANSEN: Jeni Hansen, I agree. CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Mr. Grandis? MEMBER GRANDIS: Edward Grandis, I agree.

## CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: And Mr.

 Anderson, I agree. As it appears that the motion has passed, $I$ hereby give notice that ABC Board will recess this proceeding to hold a closed meeting in the ABC Board conference room pursuant to Section 2574B of the Open Meetings Act. Thank you very much for your presentation today.The Board will make a decision, and we will issue a decision I believe within the next 60 to 90 days, $I$ believe. There's a specific timeline because this is a new license. But the Board will issue -- you will have -- you will get a written decision by the Board relatively shortly on what decision is made today. So thank you very much and have a good day. Thank you.

MS. KETEMA: Thank you.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right.
Bye-bye. All right. We have now come to the end of the Board's calendar for the day. So unless there are any other further business, I am going to close the record officially. So give me one minute, please.

All right. As Chairperson of the Alcoholic Beverage Control Board for the District of Columbia in accordance with Title 3, Chapter 405, Office of Open Government, I move that ABC Board hold a closed meeting on February 10th, 2011 for the purpose of discussing and hearing reports concerning ongoing or planned investigations of alleged criminal or civil misconduct or violations of law or regulations and seeking legal advice from our legal counsel
on the Board's investigative agenda, legal agenda, and licensing agenda for February 10th, 2021 as published in D.C. Register on February 5th, 2021. Is there a second? MEMBER SHORT: Mr. Short, I second. CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Mr. Short has second the motion. I will now take a roll call vote on the motion that has been properly second by Mr. Short. Mr. Short?

MEMBER SHORT: Mr. Short, I agree. CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Mr. Cato? MEMBER CATO: Bobby Cato, I agree. CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Ms. Wahabzadah? MEMBER WAHABZADAH: Rema Wahabzadah, I agree.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Ms. Hansen? MEMBER HANSEN: Jeni Hansen, I agree. CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Mr. Grandis? MEMBER GRANDIS: Ed Grandis, I agree. CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: And Mr. Anderson, I agree. As it appears that the motion has passed, I hereby give notice that ABC Board will hold this aforementioned closed meeting pursuant to the Open Meetings Act. Notice will also be posted on the ABC Board hearing room
bulletin board, placed on the electronic calendar on ABRA's website, and published in the D.C. Register in as timely a manner as practical.

We are now adjourned for the day, and I now direct the Board members for us to go to executive session. Thank you very much, and I thank the public for its participation today. Thank you. Have a great day.
