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1 P-R-O-C-E-E-D-I-N-G-S 2 (10:03 a.m.) 3 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Good morning. We're on the record. Good morning, everyone. 4 As 5 chairperson of the Alcoholic Beverage Control Board for the District of Columbia, and in 6 7 accordance with D.C. Code Section 25764 of the 8 Open Meetings Act, I am welcoming you to an 9 emergency meeting of the Alcoholic Beverage Control Board. 10 11 This meeting is being conducted 12 pursuant to guidance made available by the District of Columbia's Office of Open Government 13 14 regarding electronic meetings held by public 15 bodies during the public emergency. 16 Pursuant to this guidance, notice of 17 today's meeting was provided 48 hours in advance of the meeting on ABRA's website and on the 18 19 District's central meeting calendar. 3	Chairman of the Board. I would like to introduce
4	the other members of the ABC Board who are also
5	participating electronically pursuant to Mayor's
6	Order 2022-007. Please respond when I announce
7	your name. Mr. James Short?
8	MR. SHORT: Mr. James Short, present.
9	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Mr. Bobby Cato?
10	MR. CATO: Bobby Cato, present.
11	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Ms. Rafi
12	Crockett?
13	MS. CROCKETT: Rafi Crockett, present.
14	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Ms. Jeni
15	Hansen?
16	MS. HANSEN: Jeni Hansen, present.
17	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Mr. Edward

20	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: The Board has
21	six members in attendance for the conduct of
22	business today and that constitutes a quorum.
23	Our first order of business today,
24	it's a summary suspension Hearing Case Number 22-
25	CMP-00006, The Big Board, License Number 87398.

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1	Ms. Fashbaugh, can you please elevate
2	the rights of the licensee, the licensee's
3	attorney, and the government, please?
4	MS. FASHBAUGH: Good morning. Please
5	standby. Katie Chaverri, your rights have been
6	elevated. I do not see Eric Flannery. Walter
7	Adams, your rights have been elevated. And
8	Anthony Celo, your rights have been elevated.
9	That is all, Mr. Chair.
10	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Good morning.
11	Ms. Chaverri, is your client participating today,
12	ma'am? Oh, he's with you, okay. Good morning.
13	All right.
14	All right. Good morning, everyone.
15	MR. ADAMS: Good morning, Your Honor,
16	or Mr. Chairman.
17	MS. CHAVERRI: Ah, there we go, okay.
18	Sorry, guys. I was trying to communicate that we
19	were unable to unmute ourselves, but it just
20	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Okay.
21	MS. CHAVERRI: it just worked for
22	the first time. Sorry.
23	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right.
24	Thank you. Okay. Good morning. All right. All
25	right.

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The Board today -- let me -- well, 1 2 before -- let me have the parties introduce 3 themselves for the record. Mr. Adams? MR. ADAMS: Good morning, Mr. 4 Chairman, and members of the Board. Walter Adams 5 representing the District of Columbia. 6 7 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Good morning, 8 Mr. Adams. Do you have co-counsel today? 9 MR. ADAMS: Yes, I do. We have co-10 counsel, Mr. Celo, here. 11 You can introduce yourself. 12 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Mr. -- you're 13 on mute, Mr. Celo. We still can't hear you, sir. 14 MR. CELO: Any better, Mr. Chairman? 15 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Yes, we can 16 hear you now. Can you please introduce yourself 17 for the record? Please spell and state your 18 name, please. 19 MR. CELO: And I do apologize. 20 Somehow my speaker settings and microphone 21 setting got switched. Attorney Anthony Celo, 22 Assistant Attorney General, C-E-L-O. Good 23 morning, Mr. Chairman and members of the Board. 24 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Good morning. 25 Good morning.

1	Ms. Chaverri, can you please spell and
2	state your name for the record, please?
3	MS. CHAVERRI: Good morning,
4	everybody. My name is Katie Chaverri, C-H-A-V-E-
5	R-R-I. I am here on behalf of the licensee, Mr.
6	Eric Flannery, who is also here in my office with
7	me.
8	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Can you please
9	have Mr. Flannery spell and state his name for
10	the record, please?
11	MR. FLANNERY: Eric Flannery, E-R-I-C
12	F-L-A-N-N-E-R-Y.
13	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Good morning.
14	All right.
15	All right. Good morning, everyone.
16	All right. The Board has before it today a
17	summary suspension hearing involved in Drane
18	Flannery Restaurant, trade name, The Big Board,
19	Retailer's Class CT, located at 421 H Street N.E.
20	This is Case Number 21-CMP-00006.
21	On January 26, 2022, the Alcoholic
22	Beverage Control Board reviewed Investigator
23	Report Number 22-CMP-00006, which contained
24	allegations that the Respondent was in violation
25	of D.C. Regulations and Mayor's orders.

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1 As a result of the ongoing 2 noncompliance through the public emergency, the 3 Board voted six to nothing on January 26, 2022, to refer the case to the Office of Attorney 4 5 General for consideration of a summary suspension of the establishment's license. 6 7 The Respondent was initially served 8 notice of this matter by personal service on 9 January 28, 2022, by Supervisor Investigator Mark 10 Brashears, and again by electronic mail service 11 by ABRA employee Danette Walker. Both forms of 12 services are permitted under 23 DCMR Section 13 1703. The Respondent requested a hearing on 14 February 2, 2022, under D.C. Code Section 25826C. 15 On February 4, 2022, the Respondent 16 filed a continuance motion requesting a six 17 weeks' continuance for the purpose amongst other reasons to retain counsel. The Board through 18 19 Board Order Number 2022-046 granted in part and 20 denied in part the Respondent's continuance 21 motion. 22 The Board granted Respondent a oneweek continuance. The Board further in its order 23 24 advised the parties that the Board based on the 25 emergency nature of this case was not inclined to

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grant any further continuances.

2 Today, the Board will be hearing 3 testimony from the Office of the Attorney General, the Respondent, and their respective 4 5 The purpose of this hearing is so witnesses. that the Board can determine under D.C. Code 6 7 Section 25826 whether the operations of the 8 Respondent present an imminent danger to the 9 health and safety of the public. To that end, the Board asks that the 10 11 parties stick to the facts and issues related to 12 the incident. The facts and issues are those 13 contained in the summary action notice dated 14 February 28, 2022, and the investigative report 15 for Case Number 22-CMP-00006. The Board is only interested in 16 17 hearing about these matters that can be used to establish whether the establishment is an 18 19 imminent danger to the health and safety of the 20 public. The Board will begin this case by 21 hearing the opening statement from the government 22 represented by Assistants Attorney General Walter 23 Adams and Mr. Anthony Celo, followed by opening 24 statement by Katie Lynn Chaverri on behalf of the 25 Respondent.

But before we begin with opening 1 2 statements, are there any procedural matters the 3 parties would like to bring to the Board's 4 attention? Mr. Adams? MR. ADAMS: At this time, Mr. 5 Chairman, the District is not aware of any 6 7 procedural matters. The only thing that we will say is that the District does have -- we filed an 8 9 exhibit list where we intend to have at least 10 five witnesses testifying on our behalf. 11 However, outside of that, there are no other 12 procedural matters. 13 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Thank you. 14 Ms. Chaverri? And I'm -- pronounce 15 your name again for me one more time so that I 16 make sure that I get it right moving forward, 17 please? 18 MS. CHAVERRI: No, Mr. Anderson, you 19 said it perfectly. It's Chaverri. 20 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Chaverri. 21 Thank you. 22 MS. CHAVERRI: Yes. And there's 23 nothing at this time that we're aware of on 24 behalf of the Respondent. 25 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right. The

Board notes that both parties have filed a number 1 2 of pre-hearing exhibits, and for the government, 3 a lengthy witness list. As you know, the Board is not here to manage your cases, but I do have 4 5 responsibility to manage the hearing. Are there any subject areas or 6 7 specific exhibits that the parties can stipulate 8 to that we can simply put into the record and 9 reduce the need for lengthy examination and cross-examination? 10 11 I know that I'm aware that the 12 government -- I've seen the government's exhibits 13 and witnesses. I've also seen your client did 14 put some documents, so Mr. Adams said that he has 15 five witnesses. 16 Do you plan to call any witnesses 17 today, ma'am? 18 MS. CHAVERRI: The only witness that 19 I would call would be my client to make brief 20 statements in response to any questioning that 21 the government might ask. We do not have an 22 objection to stipulating to the exhibits that I 23 only briefly reviewed. 24 I don't have any reason to object to 25 their admission for today's purposes, so in order

to expedite the process, I'd be happy to 1 2 stipulate to the admission of those exhibits and 3 to any testimony. CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right, so 4 5 moved. All right. MS. CHAVERRI: I don't know if there 6 7 is any written testimony. I didn't see any 8 affidavits necessarily, but if there are any, 9 yes, we approve of those. 10 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right. So, 11 what are the exhibits that the government wishes 12 to move into evidence? 13 MR. ADAMS: Mr. Chair, we have 17 exhibits that we listed on the list here. 14 The 15 first six of the exhibits relate to what we plan 16 to provide as background testimony regarding the 17 nature of the emergency given rise to the Mayor's 18 orders, so we plan on having an expert witness, 19 so we have the curriculum vitae of Dr. Anil 20 Mangla, who is the chief epidemiologist for the 21 Department of Health. 22 (Whereupon, the above-referred to 23 document was marked as Government 24 Exhibit No. 1 for identification.) 25 MR. ADAMS: Along with that, he has

1	several graphs. Exhibit 2 is an immune system
2	graph.
3	(Whereupon, the above-referred to
4	document was marked as Government
5	Exhibit No. 2 for identification.)
6	MR. ADAMS: Exhibit 3 is a vaccination
7	graph.
8	(Whereupon, the above-referred to
9	document was marked as Government
10	Exhibit No. 3 for identification.)
11	MR. ADAMS: Four is a graph regarding
12	outbreak information.
13	(Whereupon, the above-referred to
14	document was marked as Government
15	Exhibit No. 4 for identification.)
16	MR. ADAMS: Five is regarding the
17	infections, COVID infections by age range chart.
18	(Whereupon, the above-referred to
19	document was marked as Government
20	Exhibit No. 5 for identification.)
21	MR. ADAMS: And, also, 6 discusses the
22	impact of the face masks, how face masks
23	essentially reduces spread.
24	(Whereupon, the above-referred to
25	document was marked as Government

1	Exhibit No. 6 for identification.)
2	MR. ADAMS: So, the reason that we
3	have these exhibits is by, for the record,
4	information regarding why there is an emergency
5	with that and to establish the emergency.
6	We are providing Exhibits 7 through
7	12 are the relevant case reports completed by the
8	ABRA investigators.
9	(Whereupon, the above-referred to
10	documents were marked as Government
11	Exhibit Nos. 7-12 for identification.)
12	MR. ADAMS: Exhibit 13 is an email
13	that uses part of the investigation for January
14	22, which is Case Number 22-CMP-00006, is
15	documentation from the Department of Health.
16	(Whereupon, the above-referred to
17	document was marked as Government
18	Exhibit No. 13 for identification.)
19	MR. ADAMS: We also are providing a
20	chart regarding what the, I guess, the violations
21	of the Mayor's Order for across the city as of
22	February 1st.
23	(Whereupon, the above-referred to
24	document was marked as Government
25	Exhibit No. 14 for identification.)

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MR. ADAMS: We have information from 1 2 Department of Health. 3 (Whereupon, the above-referred to document was marked as Government 4 Exhibit No. 15 for identification.) 5 MR. ADAMS: As well as for the 6 7 Exhibits 16 and 17, which is information from Big Board, including one being a Facebook post and 8 9 Exhibit 17 being a video based upon an interview done or video created by Mr. Flannery or created 10 11 on behalf of Mr. Flannery. 12 (Whereupon, the above-referred to documents were marked as Government 13 Exhibit Nos. 16-17 for 14 15 identification.) 16 MR. ADAMS: So, those are the exhibits 17 that we have identified for the Board. 18 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: So, they're 19 admitted without objection. 20 (Whereupon, the above-referred to 21 documents were received into evidence 22 as Government Exhibit Nos. 1-17.) 23 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: On behalf of 24 the Respondent, there were some submissions. Are 25 there any documents -- what's the government's

position on the submissions that were done by the 1 2 Respondent? 3 MR. CELO: Mr. Chair, there are certain exhibits that we will allow the admission 4 5 of without objection, and certain that we will object to. The non-objectionable exhibits are D, 6 7 E, F, H, and I. We have no objection to those exhibits. 8 9 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: I'm sorry. D, 10 E, F, and what? I'm sorry. 11 MR. CELO: H and I. 12 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right. So, 13 D, E, F, H, and I are admitted without objection. 14 And if Respondent wishes to call, to rely on the 15 other documents once they, once those are 16 presented, then we'll hear arguments. And if 17 there are objections, we'll make a ruling on whether or not those documents should be allowed 18 19 in the record. 20 All right. So, the procedure this 21 morning that the government will go first. If 22 the government has an opening statement, they'll 23 provide an opening statement, then we'll have an 24 opening statement from the Respondent. Once the 25 government has presented its opening statement,

and the Respondent is going to present its 1 2 opening statement, then the government will 3 present its case by calling its witnesses. The Respondent will have an 4 5 opportunity to cross-examine the witnesses. Once the Respondent has cross-examined the witnesses, 6 7 Board members will have an opportunity to ask questions. Once the Board members have asked 8 9 questions, and I will give the Respondent an 10 opportunity to recross the witness, and then the 11 government will have an opportunity to redirect 12 questions of that witness. Once the government has presented its 13 14 case, then the Respondent will present its case. 15 Respondent can elect to make an opening statement 16 at this juncture or they can make an opening 17 statement once they have presented their case. 18 All right. Mr. Adams, are you still 19 with us? Okay. Fine. All right. 20 MR. ADAMS: I'm still with you. 21 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right. 22 Thank you. One of the beauties of doing this 23 virtually, if someone disappears from my screen, 24 then I'm going to ask questions to see whether or 25 not they're still there, so you had disappeared

from my screen for a moment.

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2 All right. So, does the government 3 have an opening statement they wish to make? Yes, we do, Mr. Chairman. 4 MR. ADAMS: 5 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right. Go ahead, Mr. Adams. 6 Yes. 7 MR. ADAMS: Thank you very much, Mr. Chairman and Members of the Board. And may it 8 9 please the Board, this case is about a bar owner 10 doing exactly what he said he was going to do. 11 Eric Flannery said that The Big Board wouldn't 12 follow the Mayor's order and the Board's 13 rulemaking designed to protect the District of 14 Columbia from a deadly pandemic. And The Big 15 Board has done exactly that. 16 The Big Board has, and it continues to 17 refuse to enforce the mask mandate, check for 18 proof of vaccination, or post signs about vaccine 19 and mask rules. Because of that, The Big Board's 20 operations present imminent danger to the health 21 and safety of the public, and this Board should 22 affirm the summary suspension. 23 Today you'll hear from Dr. Anil 24 Mangla, he's the chief epidemiologist from the Department of Health, about just how dangerous 25

The Big Board's flouting of the pandemic rules is for community. He'll describe that right here in D.C., COVID-19 has killed nearly 1,300 people, has stretched the hospitals to a breaking point, and has ravaged the city. He'll describe how The Big Board's action specifically exacerbate this problem.

Bars are among the top three leading source of outbreaks for COVID. For adult-centric activities, it is the top source of outbreaks. And the Mayor's order that The Big Board has decided to flout our designs to stop community spread and to help prevent hospitalizations and deaths.

You'll also hear from five ABRA investigators who can describe exactly what Big Board is doing. At each time, Big Board refused to enforce the mask mandate, check for proof of vaccination, or post signs about vaccine and mask rules.

Starting on January 14th of this year,
the day before the vaccine requirement took
effect, Investigator Rhoda Glasgow went to The
Big Board. She went to advise The Big Board
about the rules taking effect and to -- and at

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1 that time, she saw that The Big Board's employees 2 were not wearing masks, so she issued a verbal 3 warning for failure to comply with the 4 requirement.

5 At the time that she also tried to 6 educate the owner regarding the Mayor's orders, 7 and Mr. Flannery indicated to her that day that 8 The Big Board would not comply with the vaccine 9 checking requirements. And they did exactly what 10 they said they would do.

11 On January 15th, ABRA Investigators 12 Kevin Puente and Vanessa Pleitez went to The Big 13 Board. No vaccine or mask rule signs. Staff did 14 not wear masks. No one checked for vaccine 15 status of patrons that arrived.

16 This time, Investigator Puente told 17 Mr. Flannery about the face masks and vaccine 18 status requirements and provided him copies of 19 the Mayor's orders and the required signs about 20 the masks and vaccine status.

21 Mr. Flannery said at that time that he 22 had no face mask for him or his employees to wear 23 and that "Until the Mayor changes her mind on the 24 orders, I'm not going to change mine."

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Investigator Puente issued Big Board

a written warning about the face masks and a verbal warning about checking for vaccine status and posting signs.

4 On January 18th, Investigator Mark 5 Ruiz went to The Big Board. Again, no vaccine or 6 mask rule signs, the staff wasn't wearing masks, 7 nobody was checking for vaccine status of those 8 who were inside. Investigator Ruiz issued a 9 citation about the face masks and written warning 10 about the vaccine status and signs.

11 On January 20th, Investigator 12 Christopher Condon went to The Big Board. Again, 13 no vaccine mask rule signs posted, staff wasn't 14 wearing masks, no check for the vaccine status of 15 those who were inside. On that day, Investigators Ruiz and Mitchell then came to The 16 17 Big Board that night to issue a citation about the vaccine status and the face masks. 18 It 19 continued.

January 21st, a Department of Health Inspector went to The Big Board. She observed no masks being worn by staff and that nobody was checking the vaccine status of those who were inside. And she asked a server to wear a mask, the employee's response was, "It is not

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required."

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2	Then, on January 22nd, lastly,
3	Investigator Puente returned, went to The Big
4	Board. He observed, again, no vaccine or mask
5	rule signs posted, the staff wasn't wearing
6	masks, that nobody checked for vaccine status of
7	those who were inside. Investigator Puente
8	advised Mr. Flannery that the establishment was
9	in violation of the Mayor's orders.
10	Simply stated, Members of the Board,
11	the establishment flouts the rules. The evidence
12	will show that The Big Board is putting its
13	patrons at risk, the staff at risk, and everyone
14	in the District at risk by deciding they won't
15	follow the rules, and it won't do its part to
16	limit community spread of the deadly COVID-19
17	virus.
18	Mr. Flannery said Big Board would not
19	follow the rules, and again, Big Board has shown
20	it is going to do exactly what he said it would
21	do. So, as a result, the operations of The Big
22	Board does present imminent danger to the health
23	and safety of the public, and we will show that
24	that's the case. The Board will, should affirm
25	the summary suspension. Thank you.

1	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Thank you.
2	Do you wish to make an opening
3	statement at this juncture, ma'am?
4	MS. CHAVERRI: Just a brief one, sir.
5	My client doesn't contest much of the evidence
6	that has been, that will be presented today, and
7	that we've seen in the exhibit list. It should
8	be noted, however, that for many, many months,
9	almost two years, my client absolutely complied
10	with all of the mask mandate rules that were in
11	place.
12	The day that he discovered that he
13	needed to remove barstools from his
14	establishment, he did so. He moved tables out.
15	He became a carryout-only facility. He followed
16	all of these rules. And then when the Mayor
17	lifted the mask mandate, things changed. The
18	business reopened fully, and then again, the law
19	changed.
20	At this time, my client is simply
21	exercising what he believes to be his rights to
22	permit his business to continue to operate
23	because without being required to check
24	vaccine cards from everybody who enters the
25	establishment is a burden that should not be

placed on the owner of the business, and it's something that impedes his ability to operate, so at this time, my client understands that there's a conflict that he honestly believes that the law that is currently in place is not actually furthering the public interest and is instead hindering business operations, and that's why his conduct has been what it is.

9 If the Mayor were to promulgate a law 10 that accurately and narrowly addresses the 11 issues, certainly he would comply as he did in 12 the past. He's got a clean track record, ten 13 years of business on H Street, has never been a 14 problem to the community, and just wishes to be 15 able to continue to operate so that he can keep his employees employed and allow them to have 16 17 food on the table for their families. Thank you. 18 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right. Ι 19 think that I'm -- we're at a space in this case 20 where the government has stated that the 21 Respondent has refused to comply with the 22 requirements, and you're basically stating that your client has conceded, and so I'm not sure 23 24 what is it that this Board has been asked not to

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do because, yes, I'm asking what is it that this

Board has been asked to do if the government stated that these are the regulations you haven't complied with?

Your client has said, "Yes, we have not complied with it," and I'm not hearing that your client is going to say that "Effective today, I'm going to comply with it," so --

8 MS. CHAVERRI: Well, Mr. Anderson, to 9 respond to you, the only thing that I can think of that would be a compromise and a way to meet 10 11 in the middle here would be -- and this is 12 something that I have proposed to counsel for the 13 government, very informally, we were only engaged 14 yesterday, so, of course, it's been very 15 difficult to prepare for this, but looking at the big picture of what we would request is relief 16 17 from ABRA would be that ABRA consider entering 18 into an agreement with the Respondent to permit 19 him to operate a carryout business.

Now, I understand that ABRA only has jurisdiction over the license with respect to alcohol and beverages, but, you know, obviously, we have to work with the Department of Health and with BCRA as well, but our proposed resolution would be something that allows the business to

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continue, to operate, to permit its employees to be, to receive their paychecks and to permit Mr. Flannery to operate the business in a limited capacity sort of, you know, understanding that he cannot, he believes, you know, legally and morally that he cannot comply with the Mayor's order as it currently stands.

He can and is willing to comply with 8 9 the laws that apply to take-out facilities where 10 his employees will be wearing masks. People who 11 come and pick up food would be wearing masks. 12 Very similar to Panera and Dunkin Donuts and Jimmy John's and all the places that I frequent 13 14 every day here downtown where I don't need to 15 show the vaccine card when I walk in.

And we're asking for that relief as a 16 17 compromise while, you know, Mr. Flannery deals with his legal issues in the appropriate forum, 18 19 which I personally do not believe is before ABRA. 20 I think that that's a bigger question for, you 21 know, the United States District Court or another 22 jurisdiction to consider, so that would be the 23 relief that we would request today.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Well, one of the things that the Board can do, we can go in

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recess and you and Mr. Adams can have a 1 conversation. And if there is an offer in 2 3 compromise that the government wishes to bring to 4 the Board for the Board's consideration, the 5 Board will listen to that, so I'll ask Mr. Adams, do you want us to take, for us to go into recess 6 7 for you to speak to --8 MR. CELO: No. 9 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Mr. Adams? Mr. 10 Celo? 11 MR. ADAMS: Mr. Celo will address 12 that. 13 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Mr. Celo? 14 MR. CELO: No, Mr. Chair. At this 15 time, we have -- counsel is right that we have 16 discussed that as a possibility; however, at this 17 time, no offer in compromise along those terms is 18 possible. 19 We do not have sufficient information, and we do not believe that that relief is 20 21 appropriate right now, particularly considering 22 that it would be a conditional offer to continue 23 their non-alcohol-related business when there are 24 other summary suspensions and shutdowns from 25 other agencies that we have no control over or

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authority to speak for.

As a result, the requested relief is not appropriate or possible for us to consent to at this time and there is no offer in compromise currently on the table.

MR. ADAMS: And I would ask that, Mr. 6 7 Chairman, with all due respect to the position 8 that's been stated by the establishment, 9 essentially, we're -- because this is an 10 emergency hearing that was requested by Mr. 11 Flannery himself, so the District's intention, 12 and we certainly don't want to take up any more 13 time as necessary for the Board, but we just to 14 be able to set the record so that the record is 15 established for the Board and so that the Board 16 can make a decision on whether to affirm the 17 summary suspension or not.

18 And, so we think that in this case 19 that it's really -- especially with -- because it's the first time with us dealing with these 20 21 emergency rules, it's just best for us to go 22 ahead and put on the evidence and then, you know, 23 if anything happens afterwards, you know, that --24 we can raise it to the Board at that time. 25 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: But I just want

to make sure that all parties are aware. Our jurisdiction falls over the service of alcohol, so I know that once we issue our summary suspension notice, I believe that was on January 4 5 28th, requesting, demanding that they no longer serve alcohol, and so that's -- so whatever decision that we issue today would be whether or not they will be allowed to sell and serve alcohol.

The other operation of their business, 10 11 that's not within ABRA's purview, so we're only -12 - this only has to do with whether or not they will be allowed to serve alcohol based on their 13 14 refusal to comply with our regulations regarding 15 the mask mandate and the vaccine mandate with regarding the sell and service of alcohol, so as 16 17 long as that's clear.

18 Whether or not they can continue selling food or any other service, that's not 19 20 within ABRA's jurisdiction, and so we could issue 21 a decision today saying you can continue selling 22 alcohol or no you can't continue selling alcohol 23 and that does not, that's not going to impact the 24 operation of your business whether or not you can 25 be open.

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1	All that our decision is whether or
2	not you can sell or serve alcohol based on the
3	perceived violation if it's been proven by the
4	government that you are not compliant with the
5	established regulations, so with that said, we'll
6	have a hearing since it's not apparent that the
7	parties are able to reach any compromise, and we
8	will make a decision, and we'll make a decision
9	once we hear the testimony that's presented by
10	both sides.
11	All right. What I'm going to do
12	what I will do is that once you call your
13	witness, Mr. Adams, I will ask that that person's
14	right be elevated, so who's the first witness
15	you're calling, sir?
16	MS. CHAVERRI: Your Honor oh,
17	sorry. Mr. Chairman, it will be Dr. Mangla.
18	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: I'm sorry. I'm
19	sorry. Hold on.
20	Yes, ma'am?
21	MS. CHAVERRI: I'm sorry, Mr.
22	Chairman. I was just going to say, I've already
23	stipulated to the admission of testimony, and
24	also we it's an uncontested matter at this
25	point.

Do we really need to go through with 1 2 the full substance or, you know, we would concede 3 that without an agreement from the government, which we still think, you know, I still would 4 5 propose that the conditional agreement is appropriate, but absent that, I mean, I don't 6 7 know if we need to go through with all of this? 8 Of course, I defer to you, but based 9 on our position, you know, I think that we can just hear the Board's ruling assuming that it 10 11 would be, you know, a denial. 12 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Well, we 13 haven't heard any testimony, so the Board does 14 not have -- the Board doesn't have any 15 submission. Yes, we did an investigative report 16 and there's an allegation that certain refusals 17 have occurred, but I don't know that 18 independently, so I'm not quite sure what it is 19 that the Board will make a determination. 20 MS. CHAVERRI: Okay. Fair enough. 21 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: I mean, if the 22 parties want to provide a proffer of each 23 witness, what the witness is going to testify to, 24 and if, to streamline this process, if the 25 parties can agree that Mr. Adams or Mr. Celo, if

1	that's and I can't tell the government how to
2	present its case, but I'm just saying if that, if
3	there's an agreement that the government can
4	provide a proffer of each witness's testimony and
5	there's an agreement that this is so, and once
6	that proffer is in the record and then the
7	proffer testimony is in the record, and then we
8	can have closing arguments and both sides ask the
9	Board to make a decision, that could be
10	acceptable, but that's up to the government. I
11	can't tell the government how to present its
12	case.
13	MS. CHAVERRI: Okay. Sure.
14	Understood. Thank you.
15	MR. ADAMS: I'll say this, Your Honor.
16	We appreciate Ms. Chaverri's sentiments, however,
17	we think that it is the best interest for all
18	parties involved to simply just put on the
19	record, again, we'll make this as expeditious as
20	possible; however, we think it's best for us to
21	move forward and ensure that there's a proper
22	record for the
23	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Okay, that's
24	fine. I'm sorry. Again, so who's your first
25	witness, Mr. Adams?

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1	MR. ADAMS: Dr. Anil Mangla.
2	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Ms. Fashbaugh,
3	can you please elevate the rights of Dr I'm
4	sorry, what's her last name, please?
5	MR. ADAMS: It's Mangla.
6	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Mr. Mangla,
7	please.
8	MS. FASHBAUGH: This has been
9	accomplished.
10	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Thank you.
11	MR. CELO: Mr. Chair, before I begin
12	questioning Dr. Mangla
13	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Mr. Celo, one
14	of the things I would ask that you do is that
15	please so we can have a clear record, just
16	identify yourself before you ask the question,
17	please. All right, so go ahead, Mr. Celo.
18	MR. CELO: How would like me to handle
19	reference towards exhibits? Should I share my
20	screen or will we have the administrator unlock
21	the exhibits when we request them?
22	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: No. If you
23	have the documents, then I'll allow you to share
24	your screen and all right, so let's have
25	Dr. Mangla, can you raise your right hand,

2 WHEREUPON, 3 DR. ANIL MANGLA was called for examination by Counsel for the 4 5 Government, and after having been first duly sworn, was examined and testified as follows: 6 7 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right. Your witness, sir. 8 9 DIRECT EXAMINATION 10 BY MR. CELO: 11 Dr. Mangla, please state and spell 0 12 your name for the record? 13 Α Yes. It's Anil Mangla. First name A-14 N-I-L, and the last name Mangla, M-A-N-G-L-A. 15 0 What is your current position? I'm the state epidemiologist for the 16 Α 17 District. And can you briefly describe what that 18 0 19 position entails? Yes, so the position entails a few 20 Α 21 things. Number one is I am the subject matter 22 expert for all infectious diseases. I am also 23 over all the investigations for infections, 24 especially at this time COVID. I'm also 25 spearheading a team that does all the contact

investigation for the District. And finally, I also am part of the team that recommends all the guidances.

Q And your curriculum vitae has already been entered into evidence, so I'm not going to go over that, but can you briefly just describe the different positions you've held as an epidemiologist in your career?

9 Α Absolutely. My career started 20 10 years ago in public health. I have -- prior to the two years, I've been in D.C. as the state 11 12 epidemiologist as well as the supervisory 13 epidemiologist. Prior to this, I served as the 14 deputy health director for the City of San 15 Antonio, as well as the director of public health 16 and associate professor for the UIW School of 17 Medicine, and then prior to that, I was the director for immunizations in infectious disease 18 for the State of Georgia and the acting state 19 20 epidemiologist for Georgia. Prior to that, I was 21 the chief epidemiologist for the State of 22 Indiana.

23 MR. CELO: Mr. Chair, at this time, I
24 offer Dr. Mangla as an expert witness.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Ms. Chaverri,

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do you have any objection? 1 2 MS. CHAVERRI: No objection. 3 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Without 4 objection, Dr. Mangla has been presented as an 5 expert witness and will be accepted. All right. 6 Go ahead. 7 BY MR. CELO: 8 Dr. Mangla, are you familiar with the Q 9 Board's orders -- I'm sorry. Are you familiar with the Mayor's orders concerning bars and 10 11 restaurants in the District of Columbia? 12 Yes. Α 13 And can you please explain to the 0 14 Board what is the purpose of the orders 15 surrounding COVID-19 and the vaccinations? The orders are that there is a 16 Α Yes. 17 mandatory -- it's a mandate for individuals to be showing their vaccination cards and people to be 18 19 vaccinated when entering these facilities. And why are -- well, let's start with 20 0 21 the mask order. Why is the mask order relevant 22 and important in the time of COVID? 23 Yes, so a mask order is crucial in the Α 24 layered mitigation of COVID within the District 25 as well as nationally. The COVID-19 virus, which

is a variant of the Omicron, is very infectious. It is an airborne disease.

3 That means it is spread by breathing, by coughing, by sneezing, by talking, by eating, 4 5 and so it is very clear that when you wear a mask, you're actually protecting any of these 6 7 minute particles that are coming out of your 8 mouth, and so these particles are airborne. If 9 there's another person on the other side, they 10 could be exposed and because of the 11 contagiousness, individuals get infected much 12 quicker than the previous strength that we have 13 seen in D.C. or nationally. 14 MR. CELO: At this time, Mr. Chair, I 15 request permission to share my screen. 16 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Ms. Fashbaugh, 17 can you please allow Mr. Celo the opportunity to share his screen? 18 19 MS. FASHBAUGH: This has been 20 accomplished. 21 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Thank you. 22 BY MR. CELO: 23 Dr. Mangla, I am sharing with you what Q 24 has been marked and entered into evidence as 25 Government's Exhibit 3. Please let me know if

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you can see this.

A Yes, I can.

3 Q Can you please identify what this4 exhibit is?

5 A Yes. This is an exhibit kind of 6 showing the importance of individuals that are 7 vaccinated as well as boosted.

8 Q And can you please describe what each9 column here shows?

10 A Absolutely. So, the first column that 11 is a column on the far left is when an individual 12 is fully vaccinated with a booster, they are ten 13 times less likely to get infected compared to an 14 individual that is unvaccinated.

15 The middle column, actually, 16 reiterates the importance of a booster, so if 17 anybody that is fully vaccinated with a booster is two and half times less likely to get infected 18 19 compared to someone who's fully vaccinated, which 20 means the initial two doses that they got, and 21 then, of course, four times less likely to die 22 which is really important because we are seeing an increase in the death rate. 23

And then the third one is actually really focusing on if you're fully vaccinated and

boostered, you are 20 times less likely to die compared to anybody that is unvaccinated.

Q I'm moving down to page two of this exhibit. And this shows a chart. Can you please explain what this chart is and what it shows?

Yes, so this chart actually is showing 6 А 7 the local data on individuals that have been fully vaccinated compared to individuals that 8 9 have not been vaccinated. And this is actually assisting us in how the cases of unvaccinated 10 11 appears compared to individuals that are 12 vaccinated and boostered. The graph really shows 13 that if you are boosted and if you are 14 vaccinated, your likelihood of getting infected 15 is significantly, orders of significantly less than individuals that are not vaccinated. 16

Q When did the Omicron surge begin?
A My apologies. The Omicron surge began
just after Thanksgiving. As a matter of fact,
internationally, it started Thanksgiving weekend.

21 Q So, I don't know if you can see my 22 mouse here, but this spike on the right hand 23 starting right around November 28th, would that 24 correlate to the Omicron surge?

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Yes.

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Q And, so, in the time of Omicron, are
 vaccines even more important for helping to
 reduce the spread?

Yes, vaccines are very important to 4 Α avoid spread for two reasons. Number one, the 5 6 vaccine does two things. Number one is the 7 vaccines help protect an individual from being 8 infected, and number two, vaccines actually help an individual who is infected from transferring 9 10 the virus to others in a very less manner 11 compared to people that are unvaccinated.

12 Q I'm scrolling down to what is page 13 three of this exhibit. Can you please explain 14 this chart to the Board?

15 A Yes. This is local data kind of 16 showing individuals that are vaccinated and 17 boosted, have a much, much less likelihood being 18 hospitalized compared to individuals that have 19 not been vaccinated.

20 Q And this chart shows a red line that 21 is hovering near zero as fully vaccinated. Does 22 that refer to fully vaccinated but not boosted? 23 A Yes, it does.

Q Okay. And, again, on this chart, it starts at November 29th, but would that be the

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Omicron spike?

Α Absolutely.

0 And does this spike in hospitalization 4 put a strain on the District? And can you please 5 explain what strain, if any?

Oh, absolutely. We actually had a 6 А 7 significant strain and that was, as a matter of 8 fact, Christmas weekend where my staff worked 9 significantly, and I'll tell you why. We 10 actually had to provide a new guidance for the 11 city of the District regarding individuals, all 12 healthcare workers, that actually were getting infected and were being isolated and quarantined, 13 14 and we had to approach CDC to change some of the 15 quidelines to allow individuals to work because 16 there was a significant shortage of staff members 17 and that was a very huge concern with the infrastructure of hospitals and staff operating 18 19 within the District.

I'm turning to what has been marked 20 0 21 and admitted as Government Exhibit 4. Are you 22 familiar with this chart?

> Α Yes.

24 Can you please explain it? Q 25 This is a chart that one of my Α Yes.

teams, which is the data team provides the District on a weekly basis. We update this on every Monday of the week. This chart actually identifies the number, not cases, but the number of outbreaks that occur within the District. And as you can see, we have stratified that by different locations.

8 Q Looking at specifics here, bars and 9 restaurants have had 58 outbreaks during this 10 pandemic, correct?

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Yes.

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12 Q And as far as I can see, that is the 13 third leading cause of outbreaks behind K through 14 12 school and daycare. Is that correct?

15 I just want to kind of make it Α Yes. clear that it's not throughout the entire 16 17 There's a very clear distinct pandemic. timeline. And if you look at the timeline, this 18 19 is between July 30, 2021, to February 2022, so that number is that timeline. If it's the entire 20 21 pandemic, it will be higher.

Q Thank you for clarifying. So, the two leading causes, schools K through 12 and daycare/childcare, are primarily child-focused activities, correct?

1 Α Yes. And if we look at the spike in 2 Okay. 0 3 outbreaks as it relates to bars and restaurants, I see here that were 24 outbreaks the week of 4 5 December 10th. Is that correct? 6 Α Yes. 7 The Mayor's order reimposing the mask Q mandate from bars and restaurants was December 8 9 18th, was it not? 10 Α Yes. 11 So, as I read this graph, there were 0 12 24 outbreaks the week before the mask mandate 13 went into effect and 3 outbreaks the week that 14 the mask mandate went into effect, correct? 15 Α Correct. And since that time, we have only seen 16 0 17 two outbreaks stemming from bars and restaurants? That's correct. 18 Α 19 Q Now, in terms of adult-centric activities, can we infer from these numbers that 20 21 bars and restaurants are the leading source of 22 outbreaks for adult-centric activities? 23 Α Yes. 24 And is there any overall conclusion 0 25 regarding the source of outbreaks that you can

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draw?

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A Yes. Overall conclusion in the outbreaks is very clear. These outbreaks occur where people gather where they unmask. You know, vaccination plays a very vital role and that's because this is airborne.

7 Because of Omicron specifically being a strain or variant that has a smaller or shorter 8 9 incubation period as well as, even more important, it is more transmissible, if you're in 10 11 an enclosure where there's not much ventilation, 12 where there's a large amount of people, where 13 there's crowds, where there's talking, eating, 14 laughing, there is a very high possibility of 15 people getting infected.

16 Q Turning to what has been marked and 17 admitted as Government Exhibit 5, can you please 18 explain this table?

A Yes. This table actually provides an
analysis stratified by the number of cases that
we have received in D.C. by age groups.

Q And looking at the table on the left, if we look at the percent column for age groups 24 20 through 44, by my math that's about 52 percent 25 of all cases?

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Correct.

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2 Would you agree that that age group, 0 3 20 to 44, is the most likely to frequent bars in the District? 4 5 I would assume that, yes. Α Looking at Government Exhibit 6 0 Okay. 7 6, this is another table. Can you please briefly explain this table for the Board? 8 9 Α Yes. This table was a publication 10 that was peer-reviewed and released a week ago. 11 It clearly identifies the importance and the 12 success of individuals wearing masks. 13 As you can see from the data, the 14 control was, the reference of the control as we 15 call it is line one. That means there was 16 individuals that were unmasked. 17 And then you go down, they have three 18 different types of masks. You have a cloth mask, 19 you have a surgical mask, and then you have an 20 N95. It is very clear if you wear a mask, let's 21 start by a cloth mask, you are 56 percent less 22 likely to get infected, if you wear a surgical 23 mask, you are actually 66 percent less likely to 24 get infected, and if you wear N95, it is very 25 clear that you are 83 percent less likely to get

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infected.

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2 Q And looking at page two of this 3 exhibit, this is a different table, but can you 4 please describe the importance of this table and 5 what that means to the Board?

Yes, so this table kind of, again, is 6 А 7 related to the use of masks, but is related to 8 how often you use the mask. And as you can see, 9 it's very clear if you wear a mask all the time, 10 you are less likely to, you are 66 -- so you are 11 actually 54 percent less likely to get infected, 12 and if you wear it most of the time, you are 45 13 percent less likely to get infected, so again, 14 very clearly signifying the importance of masks.

Q And because I'm not a scientist or a statistician, could you please just briefly explain on the right of both of these tables, we have an odds ratio adjusted and unadjusted pvalues. Can you just explain what those are and what those mean for our understanding?

A Yes, so an odds ratio is the odds of someone getting infected, so it is -- you interpret it as two. If the number is one, that means it's stationary. There is no, you know, there is not an individual that is a certain fold

at risk or protective, right, so if the number is higher than one, say, two, that means the likelihood of someone being infected is two times higher.

5 If it's a number that's less than one, then it means it's protective. The way we look 6 7 at this is it's one minus the odds ratio to give 8 you a percentage, so for example, if you had --9 you know, I'm looking at the last one, all the 10 time, it's 0.44, so that's your odds ratio. It's 11 protective, so 1 minus 0.44 gives you 0.56, which 12 is 56 percent.

13 The more important number is a p-14 A p-value actually signifies the value. 15 significance. Significance means there is a 16 clear comparison between the control group and 17 the group that wore masks and any number that is 18 a 0.05 or less means it is very significant, so 19 if you look at the last one, most of the time and 20 all the time, those numbers are 0.07, 0.01. That 21 means these are very significant when we're 22 looking at odds ratios, and when we're looking at 23 the use of these, in this particular case, masks. 24 All right. Now, Dr. Mangla, I would 0 25 next like to show you one of petitioner's

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1 exhibits, which has been admitted into evidence, 2 Exhibit E, and I'm showing that on my screen. 3 Are you familiar at all with this exhibit? And I 4 can scroll out if you need to see the larger 5 context. Yes, I see it very clearly. 6 А 7 Now, this exhibit purports to be the Q 8 daily case rate for the District of Columbia. 9 Does that part appear accurate to you? 10 Α Yes, it is. 11 Okay. And right around this November 0 12 time that we've seen in the other charts, we do 13 see a very large Omicron spike, correct? 14 Α Yes. 15 Now, cases seem to have been falling 0 16 since late January, but right now, the daily case 17 rate according to this is 31.1 per 100,000. 18 Α Correct. 19 Q Is that still above the substantial community spread line? 20 21 Yes, absolutely, so again, you know, Α 22 everything is relative, so relative to where we 23 were with the peak in the pandemic, we're doing a 24 phenomenal job where we are. However, if you 25 look at those colored lines, where we should be

is something known as "minimum community spread." 1 And the minimum community spread is five cases or 2 3 less. We're nowhere near five cases. If you look at the number, as you 4 5 said, it's 33, which is 7-fold higher than where we should be, and so even if you look at the 33, 6 7 that's where we were last year December, and last 8 year December that was significant, so, yes, it 9 may look like we're decreasing, and we are moving in the right direction, but we're nowhere near 10 11 where we should be, which is less than 5 cases 12 per 100,000. 13 0 And talking specifically about last 14 year in December, the numbers are not precise on 15 this chart, but it does appear that we are right 16 around the same peaks as we saw at the height of 17 the third, second, and first waves of the COVID 18 pandemic. Is that an accurate interpretation? 19 Α Correct. 20 So, even though we're far less than 0 21 the worst of Omicron, are we still roughly as bad

23 two years?

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A I agree, yes.

MR. CELO: Okay. I'm going to stop

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as the worst we saw of the pandemic in the last

sharing my exhibits at this time, Mr. Chair. 1 2 BY MR. CELO: 3 Q And, Dr. Mangla, looking at all this 4 data, and I realize that it was a lot we got 5 through very quickly, but can you tell the Board where are we in the pandemic and what, if any, 6 7 need is there for masks and vaccine mandates? We're nowhere near where we should be 8 Α 9 as the graph has clearly illustrated. We're still sevenfold higher than where we should be to 10 11 get any of these mandates removed. That's number 12 one. 13 Number two, again, to err on the safer 14 side, you know, just because of what happened 15 last year and because of this variant being 16 unpredictable, masks should continue because we 17 know masks is safe. Even more important, the 18 best prevention for this type of a virus is 19 clearly get vaccinated. Vaccinations have shown to increase 20 21 the amount of antibodies. These antibodies do 22 two things again. It's going to help individuals 23 who are exposed to avoid them getting infected. 24 That's number one. 25 And number two is the spread that we

talk about. Even if an individual is infected,
 their spread to others is also going to be
 increased because of vaccinations.

Unvaccinated individuals, two things 4 5 are going occur. They're going to get infected, number one. That causes a burden to the state. 6 7 Number two is they're going to be actually 8 transmitting this to others, and we may, you 9 know, cause another explosion of numerous cases regarding the pandemic, so again, the masks and 10 11 the vaccine mandates are of crucial essence to 12 continue with the trend we see right now.

13 Q And if a bar or restaurant were to not 14 follow the mask rule or the vaccine check rule, 15 would that pose an imminent threat of harm to the 16 community?

17 So, from science and from data-driven Α 18 evidence that we have seen, I will agree, 19 absolutely, yes. And the reason behind it is, 20 again, as we saw the number of outbreaks in 21 restaurants and bars have been increasing over 22 the past few weeks here in the District. Number two is it's clear that this is airborne, and if 23 24 you are in an enclosed area without a mask, not 25 vaccinated, you are at very high risk of getting

the disease, and number two, spreading the
 disease.

Q Dr. Mangla, are there any other considerations concerning the Mayor's orders that we have not discussed which you believe the Board should be aware of?

A No, we've discussed all. I also just want to make it very clear that we are not in the clear zone as you have seen that the death rate nationally still continues to go up, and so this is a concern. People don't look at that, but, you know, we are seeing almost 2,000 deaths per day nationally.

14 Q Dr. Mangla, were all of your expert 15 opinions today offered to a reasonable degree of 16 scientific and medical certainty?

A Yes.

18 MR. CELO: No further questions at19 this time.

20 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Thank you.
21 Do you have any questions for the
22 witness?
23 MS. CHAVERRI: Yes, Mr. Anderson.

24 CROSS EXAMINATION

BY MS. CHAVERRI:

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Q So, my first -- first of all, good
 afternoon, Dr. Mangla.

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Good afternoon.

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Q It's hard to see whether, I guess, even get called out. So, I have a few questions. With respect to the Government Exhibit 4, that exhibit refers to an outbreak. Can you describe for us the definition of an outbreak?

9 Α Yes. An outbreak is two or more cases 10 that are epidemiology linked in a certain area, 11 so again, an outbreak could be, not a case, but 12 an outbreak that could be linked, meaning there 13 was a very clear link within the facility where 14 one person was actually infected and exposed and 15 infected others.

And I say "others" because the link could not just have been one person, but it could be secondary transmission to more than one within that area, so when we say "one," when we look at one outbreak, it may be one outbreak, but there may be ten people associated with just that one outbreak.

Q Okay. And thank you for that. What
would be -- if I were to identify somebody who
was COVID-positive, who was in the same family as

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somebody else who had traveled to a restaurant,
 would the two of their cases be considered an
 outbreak?

A That's a really good question. No. Our definition of outbreak on our dashboard makes it very clear that these outbreaks are outbreaks within areas, and they are not related to family or household contacts.

9 Q Thank you. You mentioned that 10 restaurants and bars are considered the largest 11 source of outbreaks or infection among adults. 12 Is that right?

13 A From the data and from the outbreaks14 with that age group, correct.

15 Q And have you reviewed any specific 16 data with respect to bars and restaurants within 17 the District of Columbia when reaching that 18 conclusion?

19 Α Well, we -- I mean, this is very clear when we are looking at our data analysis. 20 We 21 actually make a very robust data set to actually 22 provide us with this type of information, so this 23 information is completed by a robust team of data 24 analysts as well as epidemiologists to make these 25 types of conclusions.

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Q So, have you reviewed records and data
 from specific restaurants within the District of
 Columbia?

A What we do is in every case that comes in is thoroughly investigated, and we then conclude on the data we collect from individuals that were infected, that means our cases, and then we also interview all the contacts that that case was in touch with.

10 Q And do you know how many restaurants 11 or bars within the District of Columbia have had 12 outbreaks?

13 A I don't disclose that. It's just we14 use aggregate data.

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You use aggregate data?

A Well, I mean I have the numbers. I just can't tell you which bars or what, you know, where we kind of -- I mean, we get that information. I can't share it because of privacy.

21 Q But can you tell me how many bars and 22 restaurants in the District of Columbia have had 23 an outbreak?

A I don't have that information on hand, but I can provide it to my attorney.

1	Q Thank you.
2	MS. CHAVERRI: I have no further
3	questions for this witness.
4	Thank you very much, Dr. Mangla.
5	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right.
6	Thank you. Any questions by any Board members?
7	All right, there are none.
8	Do you, Mr. Celo, do you have any
9	redirect?
10	MR. CELO: No redirect, Mr. Chair.
11	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right.
12	Thank you.
13	Dr. Mangla, thank you very much for
14	your testimony today. Have a great day, sir.
15	THE WITNESS: Thank you. Bye-bye.
16	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right. Do
17	you have another witness?
18	MR. ADAMS: Yes, Mr. Chairman. Our
19	next witness is Rhoda Glasgow. I will state that
20	we will provide testimony for her. She did not
21	have an investigative report, and then
22	afterwards, after her testimony, Mr. Chairman, I
23	think the government will discuss our ability to
24	be able to make proffers or at least to ensure
25	what's being covered by the stipulations by The

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1 Big Board, and with that said, then we might be 2 able to make proffers from that. 3 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right, fine. 4 5 Ms. Fashbaugh, can you please elevate the rights of Ms. Glasgow? 6 7 MS. FASHBAUGH: This has been 8 accomplished. Thank you. 9 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Good morning, 10 Ms. Glasgow. Can you raise your right hand, 11 please? 12 WHEREUPON, RHODA GLASGOW 13 14 was called for examination by Counsel for the 15 Government, and after having been previously sworn, was examined and testified as follows: 16 17 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Thank you. Your 18 witness, sir. 19 MR. ADAMS: Thank you very much, Mr. Chairman. 20 21 DIRECT EXAMINATION BY MR. ADAMS: 22 23 Ms. Glasgow, can you please state and Q 24 spell your name for the record? 25 Rhoda Glasgow, R-H-O-D-A, Glasgow, G-Α

1 L-A-S-G-O-W. 2 And, Ms. Glasgow, you're an 0 3 investigator for the Alcoholic Beverage Regulation Administration, correct? 4 5 Yes, I am. Α And how long have you been in that 6 0 7 position? Approximately three years. 8 Α 9 As part of being an investigator, have 0 10 you conducted investigations related to the --11 first of all, are you familiar with the Mayor's 12 rules and orders regarding the current COVID 13 emergency? 14 Yes, I am. Α 15 And how did you become familiar with 0 that, with those? 16 17 With the Mayor's Order 2021-47, that's Α 18 staff and employees must be wearing masks, 19 patrons must enter the establishment wearing 20 masks. And Mayor's Order 2021-148 says that you 21 have to provide your vaccine before you enter an 22 establishment, your vaccine card before you enter 23 an establishment. 24 And did you -- during your time as an 0 25 investigator, you provided checks for various

establishments for compliance with those 1 2 requirements? 3 Α Yes. 4 0 So, turning to January 14th of 2022, 5 were you on duty? 6 Α Yes. 7 And what was your assignment in Q 8 general on January 14th? 9 Α My assignment on January 14th, we were assigned to go to establishments to educate them 10 11 on the Mayor's orders that were going into effect 12 on the 15th. And on that day, I visited The Big 13 Board. 14 And which requirement was going into Q 15 effect on the 15th? The Mayor's Order 2021-148 which 16 Α 17 requires establishment to ask patrons for their vaccine card along with their ID. 18 19 Q And you checked several establishments that day for their compliance? 20 21 Α Yes, I checked a couple. There were 22 three establishments I got to that night. 23 Did you have occasion to come to The Q 24 Big Board? 25 Α Yes.

Q And what happened when you were at The
 Big Board?

A So, I entered the establishment, and I saw that the staff were not wearing masks. I proceeded to the bar area, and I asked the bartender for the ABC manager or owner, and he directed me to the owner.

8 I went to the owner, Mr. Flannery, and 9 I identified myself as an ABRA investigator, and 10 I advised him that we are aware that he has been 11 posting that he would not be compliant with the 12 Mayor's order. And I'm just here to let him know 13 that, you know, I gave him all the details of the 14 Mayor's order that was going into effect.

I asked him if he was going to comply with it. I asked him if he was familiar with it. He says, yes, he is familiar with the Mayor's order. I asked him if he was going to comply with it. He responded shaking his head no.

And I told him, well, his staff needs to be wearing masks today because that order went into effect on December 20th, and he said, "You came here, you gave me my verbal warning, so now..." in a gesture, he was like, "...you can go now.."

1 And what happened at that point? Q Well, I completed my regulatory 2 Α 3 inspection. He signed it, and I exited the establishment. 4 5 And very quickly, so your purpose in 0 6 going to the establishment was in part as it be 7 the establishment regarding the requirements and to ensure that they'll be able to comply? 8 9 Α Yes. 10 Q Very quickly -- the Board's 11 indulgence. 12 Α I'm sorry? 13 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: There's no 14 question? 15 MR. ADAMS: No question. CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: 16 There's no 17 question. There are no questions. MR. ADAMS: I would like to share a 18 19 screen, Mr. Chairman. 20 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Ms. Fashbaugh, can you please allow Mr. Adams to share his 21 22 screen? 23 MS. FASHBAUGH: This has been 24 accomplished. 25 BY MR. ADAMS:

I just want to make sure. Are you 1 0 2 able to -- Ms. Glasgow, are you able to see my 3 screen at this point? 4 Α Yes. 5 Now, I'm showing to you what has 0 already been made as the District's Exhibit 14. 6 7 And what is this -- exhibit appears to be a 8 chart? 9 Α Yes, it's a chart of establishment that were in violations of the Mayor's order. 10 11 This is like a running spreadsheet, so we are 12 aware of the steps we need to take because it's a 13 tier step of violations, so if, like for 14 instance, The Big Board is, which is on line 11, 15 their first charge that day was staff not wearing 16 masks, so the next, we would know for the next 17 investigator when they go there, the next tier of violation would be a written warning. 18 19 Q And just to be clear, you state that, you point to line 11. Does line 11 reflect the 20 21 visit that you made on January 14th? 22 Yes. Α 23 And it reflects a violation, which was Q 24 the staff not wearing masks? 25 Α That is correct.

And this is, this chart is created for 1 Q all establishments in the District as of February 2 3 1st of 2022? 4 Α Yes. 5 I'm going to stop sharing MR. ADAMS: screen. I have no further questions for Ms. 6 7 Glasgow. 8 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Ms. Chaverri, 9 any questions for Ms. Glasgow? 10 MS. CHAVERRI: No questions at this 11 time. Thank you. 12 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Any questions 13 by any Board members? 14 MR. SHORT: Yes, Mr. Chair, I have 15 one. 16 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Go ahead, Mr. 17 Short. 18 MR. SHORT: Good morning, Investigator 19 Glasgow. 20 THE WITNESS: Good morning. 21 MR. SHORT: Thank you for your report. 22 Looking at Exhibit 14 which we just saw on the 23 screen, you said you went there on the 14th of 24 January and that you were there to educate and also to let them know that the Mayor's order was 25

in place and that the following day on the 15th, 1 it would be even a little more stringent. 2 Is 3 that correct? 4 THE WITNESS: Yes. 5 MR. SHORT: And you addressed the owner at that time with Mr. Flannery? 6 7 THE WITNESS: Yes. 8 MR. SHORT: And you addressed him as of an agent of the city working for ABRA as an 9 10 investigator? 11 THE WITNESS: Yes. 12 MR. SHORT: And, again, what was his 13 response to you? THE WITNESS: I asked him if he knew 14 15 about the Mayor's order. He said, "Yes." Ι 16 asked him if he was going to comply with the Mayor's order. He stared at me in my face that, 17 18 for like five seconds, then he shook his head, 19 and he said, "Look, you came here, you gave me my 20 verbal warning, now you can..." in a gesture that 21 you can leave. 22 MR. SHORT: To your knowledge, was 23 that the very first ABRA warning he received to 24 your knowledge? 25 THE WITNESS: Yes.

1 MR. SHORT: Okay. I do thank you. 2 Thank you for your testimony. 3 That's all I have, Mr. Chair. CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Thank you, Mr. 4 5 Short. Any other questions by any Board members? All right. Ms. Chaverri, do you have 6 7 questions of the witness based on the questions 8 that was asked by Mr. Short? 9 MS. CHAVERRI: No, I do not. Thank 10 you. 11 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Mr. Adams, do 12 you have any redirect? 13 MR. ADAMS: No, Your Honor. No, Mr. Chair. 14 15 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right. Ms. 16 Glasgow, thank you very much for your testimony. 17 All right. Thank you very much. 18 THE WITNESS: Thank you. 19 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Mr. Adams, do 20 you have another witness? 21 MR. ADAMS: Before we call any other 22 witnesses, we want to revisit statements that 23 were made by Ms. Chaverri. First of all, we want 24 to -- the District wants to understand that the 25 nature of what's being stated, so our question at

this point would be whether the establishment 1 2 stipulates to facts stated and the other 3 exhibits, essentially the other investigative reports, which would be -- briefly, Board's 4 5 indulgence just to make sure that I have that list. That will be Exhibits 7, 8, 9, 10, 11, and 6 7 12, as well as Exhibits 13 and 15. 8 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: That's for you, 9 ma'am. Do you stipulate -- so you're talking 10 about the case reports. What are the case 11 reports, Mr. Adams? 12 I can go through that MR. ADAMS: 13 individually, so -- and I apologize. I have too 14 many documents going on at the same time. 15 MS. CHAVERRI: I think I'm generally 16 aware of the ones you're referring to, and if 17 they are just duplicates of the report of the 18 investigator, I'd stipulate to that. It's no 19 problem. MR. ADAMS: And I do want to make --20 21 it should be good for us to at least read into 22 the record. All right. So, for the record, Mr. 23 Chairman, the exhibits specifically is for 24 Exhibit 7, which is Government's Exhibit Number 25 7, which is a case report for Case Number 22-CIT-

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2	This is dated January 15, 2022, and is
3	drafted by Investigator Kevin Puente and records
4	the events that occurred on January 15 where both
5	he and Investigator Pleitez was at the
6	establishment. Includes photographs taken by
7	Investigator Pleitez of both the, a bartender and
8	the photograph of Mr. Flannery being handed the
9	actual signs that were to be posted at the
10	establishment as well as copies of the Mayor's
11	order.
12	It also includes the regulatory
13	inspection form and the citation that was, the
14	written citation that was issued by the
15	investigators on that day, so that is the
16	Government's Exhibit Number 8. Government
17	Exhibit Number sorry, 7. My apologies. This
18	is Government Exhibit 7.
19	Government Exhibit Number 8 is for
20	case report, is a case report for Case Number 22-
21	CIT-0010. This is for January 18th of 2022.
22	This was provided by Investigator Ruiz who made
23	observations at the establishment regarding
24	compliance at that time.
25	He provided a for this specific

report is regarding the Citation Number 4215, which was for an amount of -- I apologize; I just want to make sure that I have that right -- yes -- in the amount of, that was the citation for \$1,000 for staff not wearing masks. And it also includes a photograph of unmasked patrons and a staff member as well as Mr. Flannery. And it also includes the Citation 4215 itself.

9 Exhibit 9, Mr. Chairman and members of 10 the Board, is for a case, is for Case Number, or 11 Investigation Number 22-CIT-0011, again, by 12 Investigator Ruiz for January 18th. There's a 13 separate investigative report for the same visit; 14 however, this documents the citation that was 15 issued, which was a written warning for the failure to check the vaccinations. And it 16 17 includes facts regarding that visit as well as the citation itself. 18

19Exhibit 10 is Case Report, or is a20case report for Case Number 22-CIT-00013. This21is -- the date for this is January 20, 2022, for22a visit conducted by Investigator Condon.23We will note that there -- it states

we will note that there -- it states
within the report that it occurred on January
18th, which is an error which will be explained

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by the next exhibit. It also has a copy of receipt as well as a citation issued, which is 4217, which leads us to the next exhibit which is the updated version of the very same, of Exhibit 10 for Case Number 22-CIT-00013, which updates the fact that the incident -- or the report was for observations made on January 20th.

8 We also as a part -- this will be 9 Exhibit 12, which is for Case Number 22-CMP-00006 for -- the date is for this is for January 22nd, 10 11 which was the last visit by ABRA, which was 12 conducted by Investigator Puente which includes 13 facts. It also includes a regulatory inspection 14 form as well as a, which would be a second 15 exhibit, of that exhibit, of Exhibit 12, which is 16 a food and establishment inspection form 17 completed by the Department of Health that was 18 dated from January 21st that mentions that the 19 establishment was out of compliance.

It is important to note that within this was noted within his report that he, that Investigator Puente incorporated the investigation done by the Department of Health on January 21st.

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And the corollary to that is Exhibit

1	No. 13, which is, has already been admitted,
2	which is an email that was provided by the DOH,
3	Department of Health, Investigator Hilda Benge
4	which states her observations from her visit on
5	January 21st, that Investigator Puente included
6	his consideration when he created the case report
7	for that's stated in Exhibit 12.
8	So, those are some of the exhibits.
9	The other exhibits there's another exhibit,
10	Exhibit 15, and I'll allow my co-counsel, Mr.
11	Celo, to proffer the information for Government
12	Exhibit 15.
13	MR. CELO: Mr. Chair, Exhibit 15 is a
14	series of Department of Health records which were
15	incorporated into Mr. Puente's, Investigator
16	Puente's investigation by reference. These refer
17	to three separate DOH investigations occurring on
18	January 19th, January 21st, and February 1st of
19	2022.
20	All three of which identified
21	violations for not having employees wear masks,
22	not checking vaccination status of patrons, and
23	not having patrons wear masks when they were not
24	eating or drinking, and ultimately resulted in a
25	summary suspension from the Department of Health,

Food, and Safety Division issued at approximately 1 2 six p.m. on February 1, 2022. 3 MR. ADAMS: And, Mr. Chairperson, if 4 the Respondent stipulates to those facts, you 5 know, we proffered those are facts that would be testified to by our witnesses. 6 7 MS. CHAVERRI: Hi. In response to 8 that, we're okay with Exhibit 15 and stipulating 9 to those facts. We would like to make a note for 10 the record that with respect to Exhibit 12, there 11 is a statement on the page Bates marked 56 that 12 Mr. Flannery stated that he, in quotes, "He is here to violate me for not following the Mayor's 13 14 order." 15 Mr. Flannery just wants to note for 16 the record that he, in fact, did not say that. 17 He thinks that that's a misstatement, so, you 18 know, we don't object to the admission, but just 19 wanted to note that we do object to the content 20 of that particular statement. 21 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Mr. Adams? 22 MR. ADAMS: Mr. Chairman, if anything 23 else, Mr. Chairman, we can just have Investigator 24 Puente -- we're fine with the rest of the 25 stipulations that are made. Since there is

dispute regarding that quotation, we can provide 2 direct examination by Investigator Puente on 3 their statement.

> MS. CHAVERRI: Thank you.

5 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right. So, where are we then? We can admit those -- we can 6 7 admit, I mean, those exhibits without -- and 8 there's a stipulation that the parties have 9 agreed to the contents of all the exhibits with 10 the exception of the statement that was 11 attributed to Mr. Flannery.

12 I'm not quite sure if we necessarily 13 need direct testimony on that because that's -we'll take the statement for what it's worth. 14 15 I'm not sure at the end of the day if that's that important as a fact that we need to call a 16 17 witness just for that factual statement since the 18 rest of the report has not been disputed, so if 19 the Respondent has stipulated to that, then there 20 is really no need for us to have any witnesses 21 testify to the contents of these reports. 22 MR. ADAMS: Understood, Mr. Chairman.

23 I believe that we agree with the Chair's 24 recommendation. We do not need the rest of the 25 material (audio interference).

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1	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: So, where then
2	are we then, Mr. Adams?
3	MR. ADAMS: With the stipulations to
4	both the admission of the exhibits, as well as
5	the contents of the exhibits, we believe the
6	government can rest this case.
7	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: I'm sorry. I
8	did not hear what you said, Mr. Adams. The last
9	thing, I didn't hear what you said. You trailed
10	off.
11	MR. ADAMS: I apologize. I agree. I
12	did trail off. Thank you. The District can rest
13	this case with, since we do have we have a
14	stipulation to the contents of the admitted
15	exhibits.
16	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right.
17	Thank you. All right.
18	Ms. Chaverri, we can take a ten-minute
19	break or we can I mean, we've been going since
20	ten o'clock. Normally, I would take a break
21	after two hours, but we could take a ten-minute,
22	15-minute break before you present your case or
23	we can go straight ahead, so it's your call.
24	MS. CHAVERRI: We would like to take
25	a 10-minute break just to use the restroom and

whatnot.

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2 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right. So, 3 we're off the record for ten minutes. I will say it's 11:30. We will be back on the record at 4 5 11:40. (Whereupon, the above-entitled matter 6 7 went off the record at 11:29 a.m. and resumed at 8 11:40 a.m.) 9 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right, we're back on the record. 10 11 MR. ADAMS: Thank you, Mr. Chairman. 12 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right. Do 13 you have a witness you wish to call, ma'am? 14 MS. CHAVERRI: Chairperson Anderson, 15 we've decided that we are not going to present any further or affirmative evidence in the matter 16 17 and that the Respondent rests. 18 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right. Mr. Adams, do you wish to make a 19 20 closing statement? And what I'm asking in the 21 closing statements by our -- and I'm not sure if 22 Mr. Adams you're ready for closing statement, so 23 if you need a further break for us to, for both 24 parties to prepare for closing arguments, I'll 25 accommodate that. Are you ready to make closing

arguments or do we another break? 1 2 MR. ADAMS: Well, Mr. Celo, I think, 3 is ready to make one. CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: I'm not sure 4 5 who's making that, but -- all right, so if the parties are ready to make a closing statement 6 7 that's fine. All right. So, what I'm asking the 8 parties to do, what I'm asking the government 9 specifically, what is it that the government, what is it the government is asking the Board to 10 11 do? And for the respondent, I'm asking 12 specifically what is it that is being requested from the Board. 13 14 And I just want to just get some 15 clarification. I know that the proffer that at 16 least the stipulation that the respondent was 17 asking, I think, was asking something about a 18 carryout and delivery. 19 And just generally, I don't know whether or not this licensee has such an 20 21 endorsement on their license, so the Board itself 22 cannot, couldn't order a carryout and delivery endorsement unless such a request has been made 23 24 by the, from the licensee to the agency, and then 25 we would go through that process to see whether

or not such an endorsement can be issued, but I'm 1 2 just saying generally, the Board just doesn't say 3 one can do carryout and delivery, that there has to be a process that the licensee would have to 4 5 follow independently by requesting and then the agency would make a determination whether or not 6 7 such an endorsement can be issued for that type 8 of license generally, okay? So, I just wanted to 9 clarify generally how such an endorsement would 10 come about. 11 All right, so, Mr. Celo, you do have 12 an opening statement? Go ahead, please. 13 MR. CELO: Yes, Mr. Chairman. 14 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: I'm sorry. 15 I apologize. Closing. Closing. 16 MR. CELO: And before I present my 17 close, I do ask to reserve time for rebuttal 18 close if necessary. 19 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: That's fine. 20 MR. CELO: Thank you. Mr. Chair, 21 ladies and gentlemen of the Board, may it please 22 the Board? This is a case in which the facts are 23 not in dispute, in which the law is clear, and 24 which the evidence is uncontested. 25 Mr. Flannery and Big Board made a

public statement that they were not going to follow the rules that the Mayor laid out, and they proceeded to not follow those rules.

There has not been testimony, but you will see in the evidence and in the proffers that there were a total of eight different investigations all of which found violations consistent throughout.

9 Every time an investigation occurred, 10 there were no signs of masks being worn by the employees, there was no check of vaccination at 11 12 the door, there was no sign of masks being worn 13 by patrons who were not engaged in eating or 14 drinking. There is no dispute that these 15 violations occurred, nor is there any dispute in the harm that this could cause the District. 16

17 Dr. Mangla testified before you in great detail about exactly how hard COVID has hit 18 the District and exactly why the Mayor's orders 19 20 are in place. Bars and restaurants constitute 21 the third-leading source of outbreaks in the 22 District of Columbia, and they constitute the leading source of outbreaks for adult-centric 23 24 activity. Once you get outside a school and 25 daycare, bars and restaurants are how this

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1 disease spreads.

2	Now, we looked in depth at Government
3	Exhibit 4. And if you examine that and look in
4	the timeframe with the relevant context, we had a
5	major spike in outbreaks in bars and restaurants
6	the week of December 10th. Twenty-four outbreaks
7	that week.
8	The Mayor imposed the mask mandate
9	order on December 18th. The week he imposed it,
10	there were three outbreaks in bars and
11	restaurants. Since then, there have been two.
12	These rules are in place for a reason, and they
13	work.
14	We saw through Exhibit 3 the effect
15	that vaccination has on transmission,
16	hospitalization, and death due to COVID. We saw
17	that the vaccination check is necessary to help
18	protect the community from imminent harm and to
19	help prevent the spread of COVID-19 in bars and
20	restaurants.
21	The purpose of these rules is not in
22	dispute. The facts of this case are not in
23	dispute. I do not know exactly what Big Board is
24	seeking from this Board, but I can tell you that
25	the appropriate outcome of this hearing is an

indefinite summary suspension. 1 2 Their continued operation places the 3 community at risk and cannot be allowed by this Board. Thank you. 4 5 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Thank you. Ma'am, a closing? 6 7 MS. CHAVERRI: In closing, we're 8 simply going to say -- and good afternoon to the 9 Board again -- that Mr. Flannery and the licensee 10 believe that the regulations around the vaccine 11 card are simply unfounded, that there is no 12 reason for checking vaccine status. We 13 understand the mask mandate; however, we believe 14 that this is just going too far and too intrusive 15 into the business's operations. 16 And for that reason, Mr. Flannery and 17 the licensee respectfully request, as we stated 18 earlier, a modified license or modified grants of 19 rights that would permit the restaurant to 20 operate in a carryout basis with the 21 understanding that masks would be used and that 22 patrons that come in will be wearing masks to 23 pick up the food or the alcohol depending on, 24 obviously, the Department of Health's input into 25 this.

So, again, our position is simply, you 1 2 know, as stated by ABRA, we understand we're not 3 contesting the facts at issue here. My client understands precisely what is happening, and his 4 5 number one goal is to preserve the value of his operation, one that's been in northeast D.C. for 6 7 the last ten years, and to continue to serve the 8 public and what has in track history been a safe 9 manner. 10 And that's all we have. Thank you. 11 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Thank you. 12 Mr. Celo, you said you reserve the 13 right for rebuttal. Do you wish to make any 14 rebuttal arguments? 15 Yes, Mr. Chair, I do. MR. CELO: 16 Ladies and gentlemen of the Board, there were two 17 arguments made in that close. Number one that 18 the regulations are unfounded. The science in 19 this case is clear. Dr. Mangla's testimony was 20 clear and convincing. The regulations exist for 21 good reason. 22 The second argument they raised is 23 that it is too intrusive into the business 24 operations, that they go too far, that they're 25 too much of a burden to check vaccination on the

patrons.

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2	Now, I did not have a chance to ask	
3	Mr. Flannery about this, but if you look at the	
4	photographs, which are admitted into the record,	
5	this is a small bar. It has a small footprint.	
6	There is a bar with seating at the bar, a single-	
7	lane walkway, and then seating at the windows.	
8	There is no separate seating area. There is no	
9	separate restaurant in this facility.	
10	That means that Mr. Flannery has a	
11	legal obligation to check ID for everyone who	
12	enters his establishment. I ask you, how can it	
13	be that it is too intrusive to check vaccination	
14	cards for every patron when he already checks	
15	every ID?	
16	There is no basis for the claim of	
17	intrusiveness. There is no basis for the claim	
18	that the regulations are unfounded. There is	
19	only one outcome that makes sense before this	
20	Board, and I renew my request for an indefinite	
21	summary suspension of Big Board. Thank you.	
22	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right.	
23	Thank you.	
24	All right, the record is now closed.	
25	The Board has up to three days to issue a	

decision, and we will issue our decision within 1 2 three days. 3 All right. I want to thank both 4 parties for their presentation today. And, yes, 5 I just want to thank both parties for their presentation today. All right. 6 7 So, as chairperson of the Alcoholic Beverage Control Board for the District of 8 9 Columbia and accordance with D.C. Code Section 10 2574B of the Open Meetings Act, I move that ABC 11 Board Holder close the meeting for the purpose of 12 seeking legal advice from our counsel on Case 13 Number -- give me one minute please -- on Case 14 Number 22-CMP-00006, The Big Board. 15 Pursuant to D.C. Official Code Section 16 2574B4 off the Open Meetings Act and deliberating 17 upon Case Number 22-CMP-00006, The Big Board, for the reasons cited in D.C. Official Code Section 18 19 2574B13 of the Open Meetings Act. 20 Is there a second? 21 MR. SHORT: Mr. Short, I second. 22 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Mr. Short has seconded the motion. I will now take a roll call 23 24 vote on the motion that has been properly 25 seconded. Mr. Short?

1 MR. SHORT: Mr. Short, I agree. 2 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Mr. Cato? 3 MR. CATO: Bobby Cato, I agree. 4 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Ms. Crockett? 5 MS. CROCKETT: Rafi Crockett, I agree. CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Ms. Hansen? 6 7 MS. HANSEN: Jeni Hansen, I agree. 8 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Mr. Grandis? 9 MR. GRANDIS: Edward Grandis, I agree. CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: 10 And Mr. 11 Anderson, I agree. 12 As it appears that the motion has 13 passed 6-0, I hereby give notice that the ABC 14 Board will recess these proceedings to hold a 15 closed meeting at the ABC Board conference room pursuant to Section 2574B of the Open Meetings 16 17 Thank you very much. This case is Act. 18 adjourned. Have a great day. 19 And I'll now ask all Board members to return to executive session for further 20 21 development. Have a great day. 22 (Whereupon, the above-entitled matter 23 went off the record at 11:52 a.m.) 24 25
