3	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right, so
4	now let's move let's all move now to our
5	calendar afternoon calendar. The first case
6	in our afternoon calendar is a protest hearing,
7	Case No. 21-PRO-00081, Dix Market, License No.
8	116408. Ms. Fashbaugh, can you please elevate
9	the rights of the parties in this case please?
10	MS. FASHBAUGH: Sure thing. Please
11	stand by. Chrissie Chang, your rights have been
12	elevated. The Licensee is not present. Mary
13	Gaffney, your rights have been elevated. I'm not
14	seeing Antoine Holmes. Vanessa Pleitez, your
15	rights have been elevated. That is all, Mr.
16	Chair.
17	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right. Mr.
18	Holmes is one of the protestors, so we need to
19	find Mr. Holmes unless there is someone else
20	representing the ANC. Ms. Chang, have you had
21	any conversations with Mr. Holmes today regarding
22	his appearance at the at this roll call
23	hearing?
24	MS. FASHBAUGH: Chairperson
25	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: I'm sorry.
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MS. FASHBAUGH: -- I see that Gina 1 2 Bulett has her hand raised. 3 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right. 4 MS. FASHBAUGH: Gina, I unmuted you. 5 MS. BULETT: Yes. Mr. Holmes is not here today, but I am here today on behalf of 6 7 Northeast Boundary Civic Association. And our 8 Civic Association President, Dr. Gaffney as well. 9 She is also an ANC leader within 7C. She is here 10 today. 11 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Who's 12 representing the -- Who is representing the ANC 13 today? 14 MS. BULETT: Dr. Gaffney -- Mary 15 Gaffney. 16 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Why doesn't Dr. 17 Gaffney say something? She's on the -- She's on 18 19 MS. BULETT: Well probably because she 20 can't unmute. 21 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Her rights were 22 elevated, so that's why she's -- that's why she's 23 on my screen. Ms. Fashbaugh, have you unmuted 24 Dr. Gaffney? 25 MS. FASHBAUGH: Her rights have been

elevated and I just manually unmuted. 1 2 MS. GAFFNEY: Dr. Gaffney's unmuted 3 now. CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right, 4 5 thank you. Good afternoon, everyone. All right, 6 this is a protest hearing, case for Dix Street 7 Liquor. Let me have the parties introduce themself for the record. Let's start with the 8 9 Licensee. 10 MS. CHANG: Hi. My name is Chrissie 11 I'm the author and agent for the owners, Chang. 12 EZRA S. Inc and sole owner, Mr. Dawit Ggiorgis 13 right now is joining the hearing. And yeah, so I 14 represent the Applicant. Thank you. 15 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Is that person 16 -- Is that person -- Hold on, Ms. Chang. For 17 some reason, I'm hearing -- I'm not hearing you So is there someone else in the same 18 well. 19 location as you who's also online? 20 MS. GAFFNEY: Okay --21 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right. Dr. 22 Gaffney, can you please mute your phone --23 please, ma'am? I need everyone to mute their 24 The only person -- all the phones need to phone. 25 be muted. And when I call on you to introduce

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1 yourself, then you can unmute yourself. So let's 2 start again. All right Ms. Chang, who is your 3 client? And is that person -- has that person been unmuted? Are they online? 4 5 MS. CHANG: Okay. Yeah, they are on the phone -- Mr. Chair, (audio interference) is 6 7 That's what I understand. on the phone. 8 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right. Can 9 you put the person's phone number in the chat so 10 Ms. Fashbaugh can elevate their rights? Because 11 I don't know how many people are -- I don't know 12 how many people are online on the phone. 13 MS. CHANG: (audio interference), can 14 you please unmute? 15 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Who's speaking? 16 MS. CHANG: I'm sorry. My name --17 This is Chrissie Chang on behalf of the owners, 18 the renewal applicant. And could you please 19 unmute the Applicant, Dawit Ggiorgis please? 20 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: What's the last 21 four digits on their phone number? 22 MS. CHANG: Okay. Phone number --CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: The last four 23 24 digits of their phone number. 25 MS. CHANG: 1705.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Ms. Fashbaugh, 1 2 do you see a 1705 to unmute please? 3 MS. FASHBAUGH: I do not. Does he have a different name? 4 5 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: I think they're on the phone -- they're on the phone. 6 7 MS. CHANG: Yeah, the owner's wife --8 owner's wife, (audio interference), the 0961 9 please. 10 MS. FASHBAUGH: I've elevated Faseka 11 Sheferaw. 12 MS. CHANG: Yes, she is owner's wife. 13 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right. 14 There's still an issue, Ms. Chang with your --15 with your volume. I'm not sure. I'm hearing --16 I'm not hearing you well. And I don't know -- I 17 thought it was because someone else was logged 18 in. Is there someone else in your office who is 19 also logged in on this call? 20 MS. CHANG: No, it is just me. It is 21 just me. 22 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right. 23 MS. CHANG: Let me (audio 24 interference). It is actually pretty -- What 25 about -- How about now?

CHANG: Oh, okay. 4 5 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Turn your volume down some and speak again. 6 7 MS. CHANG: Hi. Yeah, how about now? 8 Can you hear me please? 9 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: I can hear you. 10 Let me see something. I can hear you, but you're 11 -- All right. Let's start it again. All right, 12 so the -- All right. All right. Can you please 13 spell and state your name for the record again, 14 Ms. Chang? 15 MS. CHANG: Sure. Chrissie Chang, C-16 H-R-I-S-S-I-E. My last name is C-H-A-N-G. 17 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: And what's your 18 role in this -- in this matter today please? 19 What's your role in this hearing, Ms. Chang? MS. CHANG: I am an authorized 20 21 representative of the owner, EZRA S. Inc, renewal 22 applicant. The sole owner is Mr. Dawit. 23 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right. Is 24 he on the phone? Can he please spell and state 25 his name for the record -- the owner of the

establishment, please spell and state your name 1 2 for the record please. 3 MS. CHANG: Can I say his name? Can 4 I say his name? 5 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: You can call his name. 6 7 MS. CHANG: Mr. Dawit Ggiorgis. CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Is he there? 8 9 I need him to state and spell his name. 10 MS. CHANG: Could you please unmute 11 Faseka Sheferaw please. She keeps texting me 12 that, you know, that (audio interference) didn't 13 unmute me. 14 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right. Ms. 15 Fashbaugh, can you please unmute Ms. Sheferaw 16 please -- S-H-E-R --17 (simultaneous speaking) 18 MS. FASHBAUGH: She's been elevated, 19 but I unmuted her as well. 20 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Ms. Sheferaw, 21 are you -- are you there? 22 Yes, sir. MS. SHEFERAW: I'm here. 23 Can you hear me? 24 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Yes, I can hear 25 you.

1 MS. SHEFERAW: Great, yes. 2 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Are you the 3 owner or are you the owner's wife? I'm the owner's wife. 4 MS. SHEFERAW: 5 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: So is the owner 6 there? He was on and all of the sudden the 7 system failed, so he's trying to call in. We've been online since 1 o'clock. 8 9 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Well, this 10 hearing started at 1:30. 11 MS. SHEFERAW: Right. 12 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: It started at I came on at 1:43. So has he been able to 13 1:30. 14 -- Is he calling in or is he -- or does he -- Is 15 he going to be on the telephone or is he going to 16 be --17 He's trying to use the MS. SHEFERAW: phone to call in because the website didn't work 18 19 now. 20 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: But it works 21 for you. Why doesn't it work for him? 22 MS. SHEFERAW: We're not in the same 23 location. Sorry. 24 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Can you find 25 out when he has called in?

1	MS. SHEFERAW: Yes, sir.
2	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: And then give
3	me the last four What's the last four digits
4	of his phone number?
5	MS. SHEFERAW: 1705.
6	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right. So
7	Ms. Fashbaugh, can you please look for 1705
8	MS. SHEFERAW: Let me call.
9	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: to see when
10	that number has shown up please.
11	MS. FASHBAUGH: I have unmuted a
12	caller user with a number starting with a 5. I
13	cannot see the last four digits. But you're
14	unmuted if you are the business owner
15	potentially.
16	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: I'm sorry.
17	(audio interference)
18	MR. GGIORGIS: Hello?
19	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Can you
20	identify yourself please? Hello. Can you
21	identify yourself please?
22	MR. GGIORGIS: Hello?
23	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Can you please
24	identify yourself?
25	(audio interference)

1 MR. GGIORGIS: Hello? 2 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Can you please 3 identify yourself, sir? MR. GGIORGIS: Dawit, last name 4 Gerorias, Dix Market. 5 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Can you spell 6 7 your first name, sir, and your last name, sir? 8 MR. GGIORGIS: My name is Dawit, last 9 name Ggiorgis, G-G-I-O-R-G-I-S. 10 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Sir, can you 11 please spell your first name again please? 12 MR. GGIORGIS: Dawit, D-A-W-I-T. 13 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: And your last 14 name again please, sir? Spell your last name 15 again please, sir. 16 MR. GGIORGIS: G-G-R-I-O-R-G-I-S. 17 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: And you're the 18 owner of Dix -- you're the owner of Dix Market? 19 MR. GERORIAS: Yeah, I'm owner of Dix 20 Market. 21 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Thank you. All 22 right, Ms. Sheferaw. 23 MR. GERORIAS: I'm almost (audio 24 interference) 25 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: I'm sorry, sir?

1	MR. GGIORGIS: Almost half an hour
2	here. I don't know if (audio interference)
3	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Sir, this
4	hearing was scheduled to start at 1:30.
5	MR. GGIORGIS: I'm sorry.
6	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: at 1:30. I
7	called the case at 1:45. I don't want anyone to
8	be complaining that they've been here for a half
9	an hour waiting. Okay?
10	MR. GGIORGIS: Okay.
11	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: We have a
12	schedule and we're trying to comply as closely as
13	possible to the schedule, sir. Okay? One of the
14	beauties of doing this remotely virtually, at
15	least you didn't have to be sitting in our if
16	we were doing this in-person, you would have been
17	sitting in the hearing room for all this period
18	of time. But at least you can be either in your
19	office in your business or you can be out
20	doing other things and make yourself available
21	for this hearing. So I am trying to keep this on
22	a schedule and try to be accommodating for
23	everyone's time. Okay? Thank you.
24	All right. Ms. Faseka, can you please
25	spell and state your spell your first and your

last name for the record and your relationship to 1 2 this business, ma'am? Ms. Faseka, are you there? 3 MS. SHEFERAW: Ms. Faskea is my wife. CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: I'm asking her 4 5 Is she on the line? All right. to speak, sir. MS. CHANG: She said she is muted 6 7 right now. 8 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Ms. Fashbaugh, 9 can you please -- if she is muted --10 MS. SHEFERAW: There you go. 11 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: -- then unmute 12 her please. Ms. Faseka? 13 MS. SHEFERAW: Okay, I am unmuted. 14 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Can you please 15 16 MS. SHEFERAW: Faseka, sorry. 17 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Ms. Faseka, can 18 you spell and state -- spell your first name and your last name and your relationship to this 19 establishment? 20 21 Yes, sir. MS. SHEFERAW: I apologize 22 for everything, sir. My name is Faseka, F-A-S-E-23 K-A, last name Sheferaw, S-H-E-F-E-R-A-W. And I 24 am the wife of Dawit Ggiorgis. 25 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Thank you,

Dr. Gaffney, can you please spell and 1 ma'am. 2 state your name for the record and your 3 relationship? And explain to us who do you represent in this matter. 4 5 MS. GAFFNEY: Mary Gaffney, M-A-R-Y G-A-F-F-N-E-Y. I represent the ANC. 6 7 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Thank you, 8 Ms. Bulett, can you please spell and ma'am. 9 state your name for the record? And who do you represent, ma'am? 10 11 MS. BULETT: G-I-N-A B-U-L-E-T-T. Ι 12 represent Northeast Boundary Civic Association. 13 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Thank you. 14 MEMBER SHORT: Mr. Chairman, if I 15 might. 16 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Yes, Mr. Short. 17 MEMBER SHORT: I'd just like to go on 18 the record as knowing -- I do know and have 19 worked with for many years, Dr. Mary Gaffney 20 through the ***2:07:04 Community Development 21 Organization. But that would have no bearing on 22 what takes place in this hearing today. I just 23 wanted to acknowledge that. Thank you. 24 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Thank you, Mr. 25 Ms. Pleitez, can you please spell and Short.

state your name for the record please?
INVESTIGATOR PLEITEZ: Vanessa
Pleitez, V-A-N-E-S-S-A. Last name is P-L-E-I-T-

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Thank you. Is
there anyone else from either side that I have
not recognized before we we move on? Have I
recognized all the participants in this case?
Okay, all right.
All right then, this matter comes
before the Board as a protest on the application
to renew a license by EZRA, trade name Dix Street
Market Dix Market, I'm sorry, Retailer's Class
A, License No. ABRA-166408, located at 6221 Dix
Street NE.
By way of background, the Board's
record reflects the following: The license
application was placard on August 20th, 2021.
ANC 7C represented by Chairperson, Antoine Holmes
filed a protest on October 25th, 2021. A second
protest was filed by the Northeast Boundary Civic
Association on October 25th, 2021, represented at
that time by Dr. Mary Gaffney. Both protestant
groups were granted standing at the roll call

Now things have been brought to the 1 Board's attention that as a result of mediation 2 3 and continued legal association, only one issue 4 remains in dispute. And that is the hours of 5 operation, specifically the closing time for the establishment. Is that correct? 6 7 INVESTIGATOR PLEITEZ: Correct. 8 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Dr. Gaffney? 9 MS. GAFFNEY: I would yield to Gina. 10 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: And Ms. Bulett, 11 is that correct? 12 MS. BULETT: Yes, it is. 13 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right. If 14 so, the Board is inclined to propose the 15 following format for today's hearing. Namely the 16 parties can stipulate on the record to those 17 issues where agreement is reached. And then for 18 the one remaining issue in dispute, the Board is 19 willing to take oral argument from each side as 20 to why the establishment should close at the hour 21 they're requesting. Are the parties agreeable to 22 that format? 23 FEMALE PARTICIPANT: Yes. 24 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Ms. Chang? Ms. 25 Chang?

1	MS. CHANG: Yes.
2	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right
3	(audio interference)
4	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Yes, Ms. Chang?
5	You were saying yes. That's all you're saying.
6	You weren't actually asking a question?
7	MS. CHANG: Actually, sorry. (audio
8	interference)represent. Could you please repeat
9	that again?
10	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: I'm saying
11	that, it's my understanding that the parties are
12	in agreement in most in all issues with the
13	exception of the hours of operation the
14	closing time. Is that correct?
15	MS. CHANG: That's correct. Yes, sir.
16	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right. And
17	so what I'm asking is that I would be if
18	that's the case, the Board would be inclined for
19	the parties to stipulate on the issues that
20	could stipulate on the record the issues that
21	they are in agreement to. And that we would then
22	just hear testimony on the one remaining issue,
23	which is the closing hour where the Applicant
24	would tell the Board why it believes that it
25	should close at a specific time. And the ANC and

the Civic Association would give testimony on why 1 2 they believe that they want a shorter hour. 3 And so what I'm saying, would the 4 parties do that? I would then ask that the 5 issues that are agreed to, that you would put that on the record and we would -- this would be 6 7 the Board order -- this would be a part of the Board order. And then the Board would just 8 9 listen to testimony on both sides on the hours --10 the closing hours. 11 MS. CHANG: Okay. Can I start the 12 reason of the -- Can I start (audio interference) 13 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: You're breaking 14 up. 15 MS. CHANG: Can I start the (audio 16 interference) 17 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Ms. Chang, I 18 think it's your internet connection. 19 MS. CHANG: Okay. I would like to 20 test it, yes. 21 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Ms. Chang, I 22 think the problem is it's your internet 23 connection because you are --24 MS. CHANG: Yes. 25 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: -- every couple

1 of seconds, you're freezing. 2 MS. CHANG: Okay. I am hearing well. 3 I'm seeing you very well. And I'm not sure this 4 is an internet connect problem in my location --5 (simultaneous speaking) MS. CHANG: Do you want me to (audio 6 7 interference) some other place? 8 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Am I the only 9 one having problems hearing Ms. Chang? All 10 right. Ms. Chang, when I look at my screen --11 MS. CHANG: Sure. 12 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: -- I see that 13 your screen in freezing. Okay? So that tells me 14 -- I've been doing this for two years, so I can 15 tell who is having internet -- (audio 16 interference). Your internet, ma'am, is not 17 stable. All right, for everyone, yours breaks 18 up. We can't hear you. 19 MS. CHANG: I'm being moved now 20 downstairs. 21 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Yes, can you 22 move to --23 (simultaneous speaking) 24 MS. BARTH: Let me try. 25 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Yes, can you

move to another location where your --1 2 MS. CHANG: Okav. 3 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: -- internet works better, ma'am? 4 5 (pause) MS. CHANG: Sir, is this better? 6 7 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Yes, Ms. Chang. 8 Much, much better. 9 MS. CHANG: Oh, okay. Thank you very 10 much. 11 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right. 12 MS. CHANG: Sorry everybody about this 13 problem and issues. Okay, so --14 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right. So 15 what I stated earlier is that it's my 16 understanding that the parties through mitigation 17 negotiation, they have agreed to almost all issue 18 with the exception of the hours -- the closing 19 hours. So what I'm -- what I'm proposing is that 20 the parties would stipulate by putting on the 21 record, what are the issues that were agreed to. 22 So we'd offer that as a stipulation. We'd put in the Board order. And then we would just have 23 24 testimony from the parties on why the Licensee is 25 requesting the specific hour that they're

1	requesting for closure. And the ANC and/or the
2	Neighborhood Civic Association would present
3	evidence on why they want different hours. So
4	what I'm saying, is this agreeable to both sides?
5	Is that agreeable to you, Ms. Chang?
6	MS. CHANG: Yes.
7	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: And I believe
8	that I I did hear from Ms. Bulett that, that
9	was agreeable. Is that correct, ma'am?
10	MS. BULETT: Yes.
11	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: And so what I'm
12	also asking, if that's so, will the parties
13	are the parties willing to waive the examination
14	of the Board's witness because there would be no
15	need for the Board's witness to testify? Because
16	she would just testify she would be testifying
17	She's now qualified to testify on the
18	appropriateness of hours. So she would just
19	testify on what is it that she saw from her
20	perspective. Is that agreeable?
21	MS. GAFFNEY: Yes.
22	MS. BULETT: Yes.
23	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right.
24	Thank you. Ms. Chang?
25	MS. CHANG: Yes, sir.
1	n

1	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right.
2	Thank you, Ms. Pleitez. You just did such a
3	wonderful job that your testimony is no longer
4	required today. You can watch You can watch
5	the hearing if you so desire, but you're not
6	you're not mandated to be there to be here.
7	All right, so prior to us So what
8	I would ask is that I would ask you, Ms. Chang
9	to provide the Board with the stipulation of the
10	issues that you have agreed to. And we will
11	memorialize this as part of our Board order. And
12	then after that's done, then we'll have testimony
13	from you and your client why that you're
14	requesting the hours that you're requesting. And
15	then the protestant will provide us with reasons
16	why they are seeking shorter hours. Is that
17	agreeable?
18	MS. CHANG: Yes, agreeable.
19	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Are there any
20	Outside what I just stated, are there any
21	other issues that we need to address prior to us
22	starting?
23	MS. CHANG: There is no other issue,
24	sir.
25	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right. Ms.
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1	Bulett, any issues on your side for us to
2	MS. BULETT: I would just like to say
3	we do really appreciate Investigator Pleitez's
4	followup in this process. It's been very
5	refreshing.
6	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Well thank you
7	for that representation, Ms. Bulett. And it
8	appears that I myself read the Board order I'm
9	sorry, her case report and I see that she had
10	attended meetings with both sides. So thank you
11	for the representation that you made. And maybe
12	that's one of the reasons why this case is not
13	going to go to a full hearing. It's just going
14	to go We're just going to have arguments on
15	the hours. So thank you for the representation
16	that you made on behalf of one of our employees.
17	Thank you very much, ma'am. All right?
18	All right. So Ms. Chang, can you tell
19	us what are what are the issues that the
20	parties have agreed? What's the agreement
21	What's the stipulation? So tell me what is it
22	that the parties have agreed upon? And we will
23	put this This will be memorialized as part of
24	our Board order.
25	MS. CHANG: Sure. Right now, the
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hours (audio interference) the Board is 12 -- you 1 2 know, the closing time is 12:00 a.m. 3 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: No. Hold on, 4 Ms. -- No. What are the issues that you guys 5 have agreed to? Tell me what is it that -- tell me everything that the parties have agreed to. 6 7 And we'll put that -- That will be part of the 8 record. 9 MS. CHANG: Okay. 10 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: So here's what 11 I want from you -- What is it that --12 (simultaneous speaking) 13 MS. CHANG: Okay. Everything that we 14 15 (simultaneous speaking) 16 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Everything that 17 both sides have agreed to. Okay. 18 MS. CHANG: 19 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: This is a 20 stipulation --21 (simultaneous speaking) 22 MS. CHANG: Yes. Both sides -- Okay. 23 We agreed with -- Because I came to downstairs, 24 so please let me go to upstairs. I'm very sorry. 25 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: We will wait.

We will wait, ma'am. Take your time. Take your 1 2 time. Don't run up the stairs. 3 (pause) 4 MS. CHANG: Okay. I would like to 5 start with the camera issue. We agreed with all 6 the camera requirements. And then you know, I 7 provided the work contract signed by the (audio 8 interference) owner that the camera is going to 9 be installed as required. And the window repair 10 11 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Hold on. 12 MS. CHANG: -- the Applicant wanted to 13 wait for the city's help but decided to stop 14 waiting for it. And that window repair is going 15 to be all completed by February 25th. 16 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Ms. Chang, can 17 you hear me? 18 MS. CHANG: And all the proof as the 19 signed contract was provided. 20 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Ms. Chang? 21 MS. CHANG: And the (audio 22 interference) Yes? 23 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Can you hear 24 me? 25 MS. CHANG: Yes.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right. 1 Ι 2 need you to go --3 MS. CHANG: I can hear you, but it's 4 lots of like, you know --5 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Yeah. And the reason why --6 7 MS. CHANG: -- this connection is 8 still --9 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: You're right. 10 MS. CHANG: -- you have a problem --11 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Right. When I 12 don't speak it's because I see that you're having 13 -- at least from the video perspective, that 14 you're having some issues. So that's why --15 (simultaneous speaking) 16 MS. CHANG: Oh, I can't hear you. 17 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: You can hear 18 me? 19 MS. CHANG: Okay. CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: So when I don't 20 21 speak, if you're addressing is because I don't 22 speak, it is because something is going on with 23 the camera. 24 I apologize to interject. MS. BULETT: 25 She might have some luck if she turns off her

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Sometimes with the internet issues like 1 camera. 2 that, it helps. 3 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Yeah. I was 4 just about to suggest she do that. Thank you. 5 Thank you, ma'am. But I'll wait for her to come 6 back. 7 Call-in user with the MS. FASHBAUGH: 8 number starting with 7, you are unmuted. 9 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Ms. Chang, why 10 don't you --11 MS. CHANG: Yes, join by the phone. 12 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Right. So yeah, all right. So just turn your camera off. 13 14 Just turn your camera off please and I think 15 you'll be fine. 16 MS. CHANG: Okay. 17 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: And we can hear 18 you. 19 MS. CHANG: I think this way is (audio 20 interference) 21 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Yes, ma'am. So 22 just turn your -- so just stay on the call-in and 23 just log off the other one. Okay? 24 MS. CHANG: Let me leave (audio 25 interference).

20	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Sheferaw, yeah.

22	Chang, then I'll have you I'll have you tell
23	me the terms. Okay? What I want you to do is
24	specifically tell me camera This is what we
25	want to do for the camera or whatever it is say

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1	this is the issue. This is the resolve this
2	is how we're going to resolve it. Okay?
3	MS. SHEFERAW: Yes, sir.
4	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: That's what I'm
5	requesting.
6	MS. BULETT: Mr. Anderson, would it
7	help if I This is Gina Bulett. Would it help
8	if I try to summarize everything and they can
9	agree or disagree with my summary?
10	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Well normally
11	what normally what we would do is because the
12	Applicant is the one that it's the Applicant's
13	license, so therefore they're the ones who will
14	say to me that this is what I have agreed to. So
15	normally I would have the Applicant tell me what
16	it is. And then the Protestant would say yes.
17	But I need it to be from the Applicant's
18	perspective. But I also need Ms. Chang on the
19	line and she's not here.
20	So whoever's going whoever's going
21	to tell me what the concerns are, I need both
22	sides. So whoever can do a better job and put it
23	together. Ms. Bulett, if you have it, fine. But
24	I need Ms. Chang to be on the line because I need
25	to I need to make sure that what you're saying

as per the Licensee, that the Licensee agrees to 1 2 what you're saying. So yes, I'll have you do 3 that. But I'll wait for Ms. Chang to come back. 4 MS. BULETT: Faseka, is it okay if I 5 summarize? MS. SHEFERAW: It's okay with me. 6 7 MS. BULETT: Okay. 8 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right. But 9 I need -- But I need Ms. Chang to come back because Ms. Chang has identified herself to us as 10 11 the representative for the establishment. So I 12 don't want to -- I do not want to move forward 13 without her coming back online. 14 MS. GAFFNEY: Right. 15 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: So I don't know 16 what -- Ms. Fashbaugh, is Ms. Chang connected to 17 us because she was on the phone. I don't know 18 what happened. 19 MS. FASHBAUGH: She is unmuted on the 20 phone and I don't see her computer online. 21 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Right. I think 22 she left the computer, but is she -- is she 23 unmuted on the phone because we were having 24 So she's unmuted on the phone? issues? 25 She is, yes. MS. FASHBAUGH:

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Ms. Chrissie 1 2 Chang, can you please identify yourself please? 3 MS. GAFFNEY: She needs to press *6. CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Ms. Bulett, let 4 5 me ask you a question. Have you guys memorialized like a settlement agreement, but 6 7 that has all the issues with the exception of the 8 time? Do you guys have that? 9 MS. BULETT: And I --10 (simultaneous speaking) 11 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: I'm sorry, 12 who's speaking? Who's speaking? 13 MS. BULETT: This is me, Ms. Bulett. 14 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Okay. 15 MS. BULETT: Chairman Anderson, so 16 that was my intention yesterday to finalize the 17 draft so we could get it signed. But 18 unfortunately we couldn't come to an agreement on 19 that. But I have all the issues pulled up. Ι 20 can summarize to you what we have agreed on. 21 What we agreed on in back and forth negotiations 2.2 and where we still are. 23 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right. Ms. 24 Chang, can you hear me? I can't hear you, Ms. 25 Ms. Chang, I cannot hear you. Chang. I can't

1 hear you. I can't hear you, Ms. Chang. MS. BULETT: I think she's back on the 2 3 computer and she's muted. 4 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right. But 5 she's unmuted on the phone, but I'm still not 6 hearing her on the phone. Because she has the 7 phone in her hand, so she's -- Ms. Chang, are you 8 -- Ms. Fashbaugh, can you please unmute her also 9 on the computer too? 10 MS. FASHBAUGH: She's unmuted. 11 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Ms. Chang, can 12 you hear me? 13 MS. CHANG: Yes. I can hear you well. 14 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right. 15 This is what -- This is what we're going to do, 16 Ms. Chang. Okay? 17 MS. CHANG: Yes. 18 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Ms. Bulett, 19 she's going to lay out what the issues are --20 what the agreement is. I'm going to write them 21 Please listen to them. At the end of the down. 22 list when she's done, I'm going to ask you to 23 confirm that you -- that your client has agreed 24 to these. Is that okay with you? 25 MS. CHANG: Yes. Yes, please do.

1 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Go ahead, Ms. 2 Bulett. 3 MS. BULETT: Okay. Let me just pull 4 up our original document. Okay, so we agreed on 5 the issues regarding public space cleanliness and maintenance. That was no issue. We also had no 6 7 issue on the signage, loitering or illegal 8 activity, how to handle that. And then we made 9 some suggestions regarding fresh food and local 10 product sales, that perhaps they could also 11 enroll in DC Essential Kitchens -- Healthy 12 Corners Program. 13 The one piece of that, that we did not 14 agree on is the volume of gross receipts of 15 alcohol sales. The above -- That was fine. 16 And then just the general cooperation with ANC 7C 17 and with these boundaries, that was fine. And 18 then we had some issues to delve into regarding 19 participation in the community. And then 20 obviously no issues with notice and opportunity 21 to cure. 22 So what we went back and forth in, in 23 deliberations, let me pull that up. And I 24 apologize, I am on the phone. So I am in-between 25 email accounts as well. Okay, so in deliberation

and discussion, we came to the table (audio 1 2 interference) Northeast boundary as 7C because 3 Dix Market is struggling to address some of the issues. Per the cameras, we had a meeting. 4 We 5 met with Faseka and Dawit. I showed Faseka where we need the camera. Basically on the front of 6 7 the store, we just need a full 180 view, so she needs the direction. The window furthest to the 8 9 right when you're looking at the store, it just needs to come out at an angle so it can give --10 11 So with their other cameras that they've installed that it can give a full 180 view. 12 So 13 Faseka and Dawit are working on that.

Now the window repair, we're happy to
hear that they are able to make the investment to
repair the window. But we will still work with
them on pressing out District Government for the
facade improvement for that whole corner.
Because that may even better, you know, the outer
look of their store.

We did concede to the percentage regarding the alcohol sales. That was the issue that was in under the fresh foods and such. We do understand that they're struggling to keep their business afloat. We personally and still

consistently feel that alcohol was a bad choice for them because they entered into an already saturated market. And they had limitations regarding and constrictions because they do have a very small store.

However, our expectation is that they 6 7 work with us over the next couple years to find 8 something that they can be successful at, that 9 can be of benefit and health to our community. 10 So we are willing as a Civic Association ANC to 11 try to help them figure out that nitch that can 12 help their business thrive. And we fully believe 13 that they can find something that is of greater 14 benefit and well being to our community.

15 And then participation in the 16 community, we understand because this is a 17 husband and wife team, that they just don't have 18 the capacity to attend all of the meetings that 19 we have -- the ANC meetings, the Civic 20 Association, the MPD safety meetings because we 21 understand, some of us are on like three or four 22 meetings a week. So we just expected the continued commitment from them to work on facade 23 24 improvement and a business pivot.

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Hopefully this pandemic is ending

soon. They're operating next door to a daycare, so we anticipate in the next year, that daycare is going to be booming. So we expect them just to work with us around issues on that corner to make sure that things are safe and presentable for children.

7 Faseka and Dawit and a lot of this 8 issue in our community concern is that their 9 business is located in a really bad intersection 10 in our community. The alley going behind our 11 community -- where the stores are, the big 12 convenient store that moved two down from them 13 and just that corner where they're positioned, 14 that alley behind the store is the super highways 15 for robbers in our community. And so I'm not 16 sure if you're -- how familiar you guys are with 17 what's going on in Deanwood every day, but we're 18 having robberies, we're having shootings. Ι 19 can't recall the last day the helicopter wasn't 20 out.

But we really do appreciate the Faseka and Dawit. I've come to them several times. One of our community members was shot five times on the 30th on his way to work. We just had a robbery of another neighbor Monday night, half a

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block up from the store. They took his car, robbing him as he's coming in from work, putting the keys in the door. And I do appreciate the way they step up to look at their cameras, to communicate, and to try to help keep us safe. So that's where we are in terms of agreement.

7 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right, this 8 is what I'm going to ask the parties to do. I 9 will ask the parties to provide us with a consent 10 agreement to say these are the terms that we've 11 agreed to and provide that to us. And we will 12 append that to the order. Because I think, Ms. 13 Bulett, you were in the process of drafting a 14 sentiment agreement, but that was not done 15 yesterday. So why don't you -- the parties 16 provide us the terms that they've agreed to. And 17 we will append that to our order. Is that 18 agreeable? 19 MS. BULETT: I can work on that

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 MS. BULETT: I can work on that

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 tonight.

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 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: And you'll

22 provide it to Ms. Chang. And you believe that -23 When do you believe that both of you can provide
24 that to the Agency?

MS. BULETT: I am going out of town on

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1	Thursday, so I will have to do it tonight.				
2	MS. BULETT: All right. So I can				
3	email it out. We have, I think several we have				
4	an email chain going that has several ABRA people				
5	on it, so then it can come to you guys.				
6	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: So email it.				
7	Both you and Ms. Chang will send this document to				
8	us to say this is what we have agreed to. Okay?				
9	MS. BULETT: Okay.				
10	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: So what we're				
11	going to have then is just a hearing on the				
12	hours. And I need the Licensee to be specific				
13	why they need the specific hours closing hours				
14	that they're asking for. And I then need the				
15	Protestant to be specific in telling us why they				
16	need their time that's different from what the				
17	Licensee's asking for. Okay? All right.				
18	So Ms. Chang, I'm hoping that we're				
19	not going to have One of the things I'll ask				
20	you to do, Ms. Chang since you're on since				
21	you're on video, you can turn your camera off.				
22	MS. CHANG: Yes.				
23	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Yes, ma'am?				
24	MS. CHANG: Okay. I would like to try				
25	again. Could you please tell me if you hear me				

well?

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CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Yes, ma'am. I
can hear you.

MS. CHANG: Okay, thank you.

5 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: So why don't 6 you now tell us why is it that -- what closing 7 hour -- what are the hours that the Licensee is 8 requesting? And why are they -- why are they 9 requesting those hours? And why is it that Board 10 should grant those hours?

11 MS. CHANG: (audio interference) 12 approved by the Board is 12:00 a.m. This is the 13 closing hours. Closing (audio interference) in 14 the current ABC (audio interference). And the 15 protestors (audio interference) concerns to our 16 safety -- the owners and (audio interference) 17 appreciate the -- appreciate it. However, the owner and his wife would like to -- (audio 18 interference) 11:00 p.m. as closing hours. 19

Yeah, the owner is closing the
operation around 10:00 p.m. during this pandemic.
But the owner needs flexibility for some busy
nights to avoid a violation such as an after hour
sale. The owner is not able to agree with 10:00
(audio interference) to make a complete closing.

The owner needs some time to remove customers, 1 2 you know, inside of the -- on the premises. 3 As for the safety concerns, the owner 4 and his wife promise to utilize their discretions 5 The owner would like to ask the to the fullest. protestors to give him a chance to prove that 6 7 11:00 p.m. (audio interference) indicated as the 8 closing time in (audio interference) from the 9 community. And also if needed, this issue can be 10 discussed again in two years when the next 11 renewal is required. 12 And then (audio interference) located in the -- like 10 foot radius. And their ABC 13 14 license closing time is still 12:00 a.m. And I 15 understand that they're closing basically, you 16 know, 10:00 p.m. right now. They just like a 17 little flexibility, a little later than 10:00 18 So this is what the owner requests the p.m. 19 Board to (audio interference) the 11:00 p.m. as 20 the closing time to be indicated in the ABC 21 license. Thank you. 22 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right. 23 Thank you, Ms. Chang. Ms. Bulett? 24 Hi, yes. Chairman MS. BULETT: 25 Anderson, it is correct that Skip's Liquor does

have the license hours, but they consistently 1 close at 10 o'clock. And the reason our 2 3 community has not had to do a settlement agreement with them is because they are very 4 communicative with Dr. Gaffney and very vigilant 5 regarding resolving community issues. 6 7 Unfortunately, the block outside their business is ripe with a lot of illicit activity. 8 They 9 struggle with the same things that Dix Market does in terms of being in a an epicenter of 10 11 really bad activity and dangerous activity. 12 They've done a lot of things regarding 13 lighting, cameras, preventing loitering They 14 even took money out of their pocket and fenced in 15 a next door property that wasn't theirs, but they 16 did it for community safety because people were 17 trying to operate a drug trafficking and human

They too have been victims of robbery, so they understand the seriousness of it. And unfortunately right now with how our neighborhood

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is with the sharp, really jarring increase of robberies and violent crimes in our neighborhood, 2 Monday and last night, we had robberies in our neighborhood. The police keep coming back to 4 5 that alley behind the stores. And two doors down, the bigger -- it's a big convenient store, 7 they too have been robbed. For them to be open and the only one -- that store that's been robbed, that also closes at 10:00. For them to 10 be open that one hour, it just puts a bulls eye 11 over the store.

12 And there's no amount of money that 13 they can make in that hour that would be worth 14 putting Faseka and Dawit at risk. There just 15 isn't. They need to go home at night to their So that little bit of money that they 16 families. 17 can make in that hour is not worth the increased 18 risk of being alone and open that hour when we 19 know the robbers are right behind the store in 20 the alley.

21 And you know, it's also just not about 22 Faseka and Dawit. I had to go down there Monday 23 night because of the robbery that happened to my 24 neighbor, to talk with them about if they saw 25 anything on the camera. They took my neighbor's

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keys, his wallet, his money and then they went and stole his car. So you have two people riding around in a stolen car probably robbing other people, doing other illegal things.

It is a risk for the entire community 5 safety and we're already stressed out and 6 7 honestly scared because, I mean we went from pre-8 pandemic, our violent crime being lower to now 9 two years into the pandemic, it's really spiking 10 in a very scary way. And no amount of money is 11 worth putting them at risk. And there's no 12 amount of actions that they can take that will 13 mitigate the risk because it doesn't matter that 14 they have cameras, they will stay come in there, 15 stare right into the camera and pull out a gun 16 and rob the store.

17 Faseka and Dawit cannot, you know, 18 exit the store -- like there's not a plexiglass, 19 bulletproof tunnel that let's them exit the store 20 to their car safely. They're going to still have 21 to come outside. We really need them to close at 22 10 o'clock for everybody's sake, for the 23 community's sake, for their safety. CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Anything else 24

24 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Anything eis25 you wish to say, Ms. Bulett?

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It was a pleasure getting 1 MS. BULETT: 2 to know Faseka and Dawit in the process, I know 3 that we were really at odds. We do appreciate the way they engage our community. 4 It's 5 sometimes unlikely to have folks, particularly when they live elsewhere and are doing business 6 7 in our community, engage our most struggling 8 members of our community with respect. But I've 9 universally heard good things about them. And I 10 understand like you think that, you know, when 11 you engage even the most struggling person with 12 respect that it protects you from robberies, but I know it does not. 13

14 I had my friend when she was staying 15 with me in 2014 in front of my house, half a 16 block up from their store, boys surrounded her. 17 Dragged her by her hair, kicking her to get her 18 I speak to everybody in the community. purse. 19 They knew me. They knew my friend who was 20 staying with me. We treated everybody with 21 respect, but it didn't prevent a robbery. 22 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right. Ms. 23 Chang, do you have any questions of Ms. Bulett

24 and Ms. Bulett, do you have any questions of Ms.
25 Chang?

1	MS. CHANG: Yeah. Again, the owner					
2	and I do appreciate the concerns and fully					
3	understand about the safety issues. But they					
4	just, you know Again, just because you know,					
5	the citywide renewal actually last year and					
6	almost a year passed. So I would like to suggest

24	interference) the community.					
25	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right. All					

right. Do you have any questions of Ms. Chang, 1 2 Ms. Bulett? 3 MS. BULETT: I don't. I have a 4 general statement though. 5 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right, go ahead. Go ahead. Go ahead, ma'am. 6 7 I think when we talk MS. BULETT: 8 about harm to the community, there are times that 9 are, you know, they're irreparable. There's situations of harm and trauma that you just can't 10 11 go back from. When the bullet's out of the gun, 12 you don't get it back. And so I don't think 13 waiting and seeing when we're in a crime surge 14 right now is the responsible way to move forward 15 to protect the community, especially when we are 16 in (audio interference) what should be two safe 17 and sacred places for children. 18 You have a daycare right next door. 19 At the block of 61st and Dix, you have a small private school. We don't need -- and even if 20 21 it's overnight when the children are home, what 22 have you, those should still be safe spaces 23 because at the end of the day if somebody gets 24 shots and killed, the police are out there. The 25 coroner's truck is out there. They'll be over

there with the tap until the following morning, what have you. And we don't need kids walking across that to go to school.

We already have a situation had at 4 61st and Dix where there's a memorial up and 5 6 literally someone took a picture of the woman 7 under the police sheet lying dead on the ground. She hit some PCP and it was laced with Fentanyl. 8 9 And she just -- she died there and that was it. So there's just some situations of harm that we 10 11 don't get to go back from.

MS. SHEFERAW: Is it possible I canspeak -- add on?

14 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: On what? No, 15 I mean I will just let -- where we are is I just 16 -- each side has given me -- has given the Board 17 reasons why we should agree with their side 18 regarding the hours. And I mean I've heard a 19 lot, but I'm not quite sure -- I know that Ms. 20 Chang is representing your interests. Is it 21 something that she has not said that you need to 22 take -- I 'm not asking you to respond to what 23 Ms. Bulett just said. She's the representative 24 and is it that she has not stated what it is that 25 you're seeking as far as the hours are concerned?

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She did. I just wanted 1 MS. SHEFERAW: 2 to express a little bit more. 3 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Well, I believe 4 that -- I mean okay -- A little bit more -- go 5 I'm sorry. Ms. Chang, can Ms. ahead, ma'am. Sheferaw, can she speak? Ms. Chang? 6 7 MS. CHANG: Yeah. 8 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Go ahead, ma'am. 9 MS. SHEFERAW: Yes. 10 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Yeah. Go 11 ahead. 12 MS. SHEFERAW: I just want to add on. 13 I'm grateful for the community. I understand the 14 concern. I'm very thankful. And at the end of 15 the day, we want to go home as well. We do close 16 at 10:00 right now. However, having restriction 17 only going to make it harder for us. We are 18 struggling right now in the store. So we wanted 19 that one hour grace period during the summertime 20 or you know, if it gets better. But as of now, 21 we do close at 10 o'clock because of everything 22 that's going on. 23 However, we just want them to trust us 24 and let us, you know, show them and prove to them 25 that we are able and we'll work with them,

whatever needs to be done. But the 10 o'clock 1 2 restriction, the violation and all that stuff, 3 only going put us in more debts than, you know, we are right now. So that 11 o'clock doesn't 4 5 mean that we're going to close at 11 o'clock every single day from today and on, we do close 6 7 at 10:00. But we just want to have that 8 flexibility and coming from 12 o'clock to 11 9 o'clock and from 10:00 to 11:00, I think is fair 10 enough to say that it is workable.

11 And you know, in two years if it needs 12 to be fixed, we will fix it if we don't obey by 13 what they say or how they like it. But right now 14 because we're struggling, because a new store 15 came right next to us opened, our business is 16 qone. So the extra hour, the extra 30 minutes 17 gives us a little bit of help. It helps us a lot. 18 So that's why during the Summer we want to 19 stay a little bit open if that's possible. Ι 20 appreciate it.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right,
thank you. All right. Any questions by any
board members? Any questions from any board
members? I guess -- I just have a question, Ms.
Bulett.

1	MS. BULETT: Yes, I'm here.
2	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Yeah, I know.
3	When you talk about them closing earlier, but can
4	you attribute whether I know that you say that
5	you're concerned for their personal safety. But
6	how can you Are you able to tie their later
7	hours to specific crimes in the neighborhood that
8	generated from their late their specific late
9	hours?
10	MS. BULETT: Well Chairman Anderson,
11	if you think about it, where do robbers like to
12	strike? They like to strike where there's less
13	people out, where there's less people around,
14	where there's less businesses open. When you
15	have the other two businesses main businesses
16	in the community closing, then their the only
17	ones open. It's a small store. They're right
18	next to the robber's super highway. I mean, you
19	know, it just exacerbates risk. You know?
20	And in addition, you know, nothing
21	stopped that guy in October who went into their
22	neighbor two doors down. I mean I watched the
23	MPD video. You know, one of the most respected
24	men in our community. He's been in our community
25	doing handyman work forever, was the person that

quarded the cars when the church was in -- that 1 building used to be a church before it was a 2 3 convenience market. He would be out monitoring 4 the cars every Sunday as they were lined up. 5 That didn't stop that man from showing that man the gun in his -- in his coat pocket and 6 7 robbing that store. I mean these late night 8 hours, I mean it just exacerbates the risk. You 9 have the cover of darkness and then you have 10 every other store closed around it. It's just 11 not a good situation. 12 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right. Any 13 other questions by any of the board members? 14 MEMBER GRANDIS: Mr. Chairman? 15 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Yes, Mr. Grandis. 16 17 MEMBER GRANDIS: Who was speaking? 18 I'm trying to look at the screen. 19 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right. Who 20 do you want to -- who do you want to address --21 MEMBER GRANDIS: The person who was 22 speaking just now. It wasn't Ms. Chang, it was 23 the --24 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Ms. Chang --25 (simultaneous speaking)

1	MS. CHANG: Yes, I'm here.					
2	MEMBER GRANDIS: No, no, no.					
3	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Hold on. Hold					
4	on, Mr. Grandis.					
5	MEMBER GRANDIS: Yes.					
6	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Ms. Chang is					
7	the representative. Mr. Faseka is the wife of					
8	the owner. I don't know if she is I do not					
9	know if she's on the license. But she has been					
10	identified as the wife of the owner. So I'm more					
11	so addressing whatever questions I think is					
12	better addressed to Ms. Chang and Ms. Bulett					
13	because they're the sole representatives.					
14	MEMBER GRANDIS: Yes. It's Ms. Bulett					
15	then. Ms. Bulett, I want to thank you for being					
16	a witness today and participating. You mentioned					
17	the crime that's in the neighborhood. But maybe					
18	I missed hearing you, is there any of this crime					
19	that you have mentioned, which is very serious.					
20	None of us want this in any of neighborhoods.					
21	But is any of this crime that you're talking					
22	about related to this establishment?					
23	MS. BULETT: No, it's not. But it's					
24	happening around the establishment and we don't					
25	want the establishment to be targeted. That					

corner they're on is very dangerous and MPD has long identified the alley behind those stores as basically the source of the robberies in our neighborhood. And that's only escalated in recent weeks.

I mean the robbery last night, I 6 7 happened to be out running errands. The cops are 8 in that alley with the flashlights looking in the 9 dumpsters to see if they, you know, threw a gun 10 or something. They came out of that alley when 11 they robbed my neighbor Monday night. When they 12 shot my neighbor five times on his way to work, 13 they came out of that alley. You know, and 14 that's literally two -- two doors down from where 15 they operate.

So we know that high risk people are 16 17 in and around there. That corner has been very bad for violence for a long time. We do not 18 19 think Faseka and Dawit are the cause, but they 20 could be targeted just because they're close. 21 Why would you travel somewhere to rob somebody 22 where you can just go around the corner, throw a 23 face mask on and get away?

A lot of the robberies and crimes that are in our neighborhood remain unsolved including

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back when the barbershop next to Faseka and Dawit 1 2 was open, they had a murder in there of a young 3 man. And then I think about a year later, they 4 had a multi-person shooting, including the 5 shooting of a five-year-old, still unsolved. The folks came out of the alley to do it. 6 7 Over the summer, argument down at 8 Watts Park. Started at Watts Park on a Monday 9 late morning. I think Monday before noon, that 10 kid that was in the argument down there was in 11 the alley behind the store. Before noon, that 12 boy was shot five times in that alley behind the 13 store. It is a hot spot. 14 Thank you, Ms. Bulett MEMBER GRANDIS: 15 for giving me more information. Thank you very 16 much. 17 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right. Any 18 other questions by any of the board members? 19 MS. GAFFNEY: Mr. Anderson? 20 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Yes, Dr. 21 Gaffney. 22 MS. GAFFNEY: (audio interference) 23 have you received more comments, that's fine. 24 Gina has spoken very clearly and honestly about 25 the situation. But I just want to add that, that

store is probably as large as a one-bedroom per 1 And (indiscernible due to accent) on one 2 se. 3 side of it in the room and whatever little 4 whatnots on the shelf. You think it's a grocery 5 store, but it isn't. And I just think the 6 investment was in the wrong place. And we are 7 trying to get them to comply with the other 8 stores in the community that closes at 10 9 o'clock. That's what we're trying to do. We're 10 trying to be very aware of the situations that's 11 happening in the community. And I think Gina has 12 explained those opportunities very well. 13 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right. 14 Thank you, ma'am. All right. Any final comments 15 -- any final comments you want to make, Ms. 16 Chang? 17 (audio interference) MS. CHANG: Yes. 18 the crime (audio interference) activities around 19 the store. And I believe (audio interference) 20 understand. You know, my client is the one who 21 fully understands what's going on. But as long 22 as all the criminal activities is not directly related to the store, still I do believe that the 23 24 store needs to prove like (indiscernible due to 25 accent) next two years about the -- to prove

themselves -- to prove themselves that the 11:00 p.m. close is not going to be a big -- you know, it's going to be a big problem, you know, for the community. Okay?

5 And they are hard workers. And you know, (audio interference) really smart. 6 And 7 because all the communications and they do 8 understand. And actually, this is their first 9 business. And they did not understand about what 10 to do towards community, you know (indiscernible 11 due to accent). Now through all these procedures 12 and now they got learned and they are 100 percent 13 willing to communicate with the communities. And 14 they know all the (audio interference) and you 15 know, the Civic Association authority, you know, 16 to represent the community. And they clearly 17 understand they're a part of the community 18 members. All I ask is just give them, you know, 19 the two years to prove themselves. That's all I 20 ask please. 21 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right. 22 They are struggling. MS. CHANG:

MS. BULETT: Chairman Anderson --

(simultaneous speaking)

MS. CHANG: Please help us --

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1 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: I'm sorry. 2 Hold on. 3 MS. CHANG: Yeah. 4 MS. BULETT: I apologize. I'm sorry 5 (simultaneous speaking) 6 7 MS. CHANG: Please help this business 8 survive. 9 (simultaneous speaking) 10 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Hold on. Ms. 11 Bulett, hold on. I didn't give you -- I didn't 12 give you permission to speak, ma'am. So hold on. 13 I wasn't sure if I was going to, so just hold on. 14 One can only speak when I give you permission to 15 So hold on please, ma'am. Ms. Chang speak. 16 wasn't done speaking. I want to make sure that's 17 she's done speaking. Are you done, ma'am? 18 MS. CHANG: So just so you know --19 Yeah. 20 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Are you done 21 speaking? 22 MS. CHANG: Please -- Yes, I'm done. 23 And I would like to finally -- I would like to 24 request the chance to prove themselves, you know, 25 to the community please. Thank you so much.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: 1 All right, thank you. 2 You have the last word, Ms. Bulett. 3 MS. BULETT: Okay. Chairman Anderson, I think there's also been some confusion. 4 This 5 is not a matter of Faseka and Dawit or Dix Market proving themselves. You know, the only people 6 7 that need to "prove themselves" or change their 8 behavior are unfortunately the significant number 9 of young people running around with guns in our 10 community and selling drugs in our community and 11 engaging in illicit behaviors, human trafficking, 12 drug trafficking, what have you that make our 13 community a dangerous place. So this is not about like a moral 14 15 test, do we think Faseka and Dawit are up for the 16 task. It is just a statement of fact that there 17 is nothing that they can do to protect their 18 safety and prevent a robbery, especially when we 19 have such a spike in violent crimes and so many 20 young people that are engaging in such high risk 21 behaviors in concentration around the store. 22 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right. 23 Thank you, ma'am. All right. Okay, I'm going to 24 bring this hearing then to a close. The parties 25

will provide us the consent order, meaning the

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consent agreement for all the issues that they 1 2 have agreed upon. Once we are in -- Once the 3 Board receives this information, we will add that to the decision that we will make regarding the 4 5 hours -- and the hours of operation, what's been The Licensee is being requested that 6 requested. 7 there will -- that their license -- that they be allowed to operate until 11:00 p.m. and the 8 9 Protestant is asking that they should close at 10 10:00 p.m. All right? Okay.

11 All right, so this hearing then is --12 the record is closed. All right, as Chairperson 13 of the Alcohol Beverage Control Board for the District of Columbia in accordance with DC 14 15 Official Code Section 2574(b) of the Open 16 Meetings Act, I move that ABC Board hold a closed meeting for the purpose of seeking legal advice 17 18 from our Counsel on Case No. 21-PRO-00081, Dix 19 Market, pursuant to DC Official Code Section 20 2574(b)(4) of the Open Meetings Act. And 21 deliberate upon Case No. 21-PRO-00081, Dix Market 22 for the reasons cited in DC Official Code Section 23 2574(b)(13) of the Open Meetings Act. Is there a 24 second?

15	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: And Mr.				
16	Anderson, I agree. As it appears that the motion				
17	has passed, 6-0-0, I hereby give notice that the				
18	ABC Board will recess these proceedings to hold a				
19	closed meeting in the ABC conference room				
20	pursuant to Section 2574(b) of the Open Meetings				
21	Act. Thank you very much. The Board will issue				
22	a decision within 90 days. Thank you very much.				
23	Have a great day. And I want to thank the				
24	parties for agreeing to most of the issues in				
25	this complaint in this protest. So I want to				

thank the parties for agreeing to most of the issues. And so therefore, the Board will make a determination on whether or not the Licensee will be allowed to operate at 11:00 or they have to close at 10 o'clock. All right, thank you very much and have a great day. (simultaneous) Thank you. (Whereupon, the above-entitled matter went off the record at 3:09 p.m.)
