I placed in the 5 Chat that this case will be called at 1:30 p.m., 6 7 this afternoon. So, Buddy's D.C. will move to 8 1:30 p.m. and I place it in the Chat earlier this 9 morning. And so let me quickly do our agenda and then we'll -- so let's go back to our calendar, 10 11 and the first case on our calendar, it's Case Number 27-CMP-00084, Buddy's D.C., License Number 12 13 123008. 14 Mr. Jameson, can you please elevate 15 the Government and the parties in Buddy's D.C., 16 please. 17 MR. JAMESON: They have been elevated. 18 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Thank you, sir. Good afternoon. We'll start with the 19 20 Government. 21 Good afternoon, Mr. Emmick, can you 2.2 please spell and state your name for the record.

MS. HAMPTON: And I am Carly Hampton, C-A-R-L-Y, H-A-M-P-T-O-N, and I'm another owner of Buddy's.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Good afternoon, everyone.

Mr. Emmick, are there any preliminary matters in this case?

MR. EMMICK: Not that I'm aware of.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right.

Then, fine. So, we are moving forward then with a Show Cause Hearing and basically this is the way the Show Cause operates.

The Government has the burden so the Government will go first and basically the basically the parties will then have an opportunity to start with the Government to give an opening statement. After the Government gives their opening statement, the Licensee can give an

opening statement or they can defer to give the opening statement until after the Government has presented its case.

The Government will call its first witness. Once the Government has called its first witness then the Licensee will have an opportunity to cross-examine that witness. Once the Licensee cross-examines the witness the Board will have an opportunity to ask questions of that witness. Then both the Licensee and the Government will have an opportunity to do follow-up questions based on the questions the Board asks. And the Government redirect.

Once the Government has presented and rested its case, then the licensee will have an opportunity to call witnesses to present its case. Once the Licensee has witnesses to call, I will swear them in. Their representative will ask direct question. The Government will have an opportunity to cross-examine. Then the Board will have an opportunity to ask questions and we'll go back through the process. And once the case is done, then both parties will have an opportunity to do closing statements.

6	will be the lead person in this case?
7	MR. MASON: I'll be the lead person.
8	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right. So,
9	give me your name again, sir?
10	MR. MASON: Grant Mason.
11	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Mr. Mason. And
12	meaning that you will be the person who will
13	cross-examine the Government's witness. And
14	because you can't both people cross-examine, and
15	then I guess you will be asking and presenting
16	your case.
17	Do you have witnesses to call or are
18	both of you going to testify? How will that
19	work?
20	MR. MASON: It will be the two of us
21	testifying.
22	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right. So,
23	are you going to ask her questions, how do you
24	plan to do that?
25	MR. MASON: Yes, I can ask her

1 questions. 2 MS. HAMPTON: Would I be able to ask 3 him questions or no? CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Well, then you 4 5 can ask him questions but I just want one person 6 per witness. Okay. So, you can do that once 7 your case is presented. Okay? 8 MS. HAMPTON: All right. 9 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right. So, 10 does the Government wish to make an opening 11 statement? 12 MR. EMMICK: Yes, Mr. Chairman. 13 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Yes. Go ahead, 14 sir. 15 MR. EMMICK: Thank you. May it please 16 the Board on the early morning hours of Sunday, October the 1st, 2023, at around 12:43 in the 17 18 morning, Investigator Ruiz responded to a complaint at Buddy's DC located at 3234 11th 19 Street, Northwest in Washington, D.C. in Columbia 20 21 Heights. 2.2 When Investigator Ruiz arrived patrons 23 were still hanging out on the patio summer garden area of the establishment, including some that 2.4

still had drinks in their hand. The investigator

was also able to capture video and audio footage of the patron milling around on his cell phone which the Government intends to introduce this afternoon.

Buddy's knows itself as a neighborhood meeting space and a sports bar with elevated food. And, apparently, on the night in question the patrons that evening were watching an event on the outdoor TVs that ended well after midnight.

After briefly meeting with the neighbor who made this noise complaint,
Investigator Ruiz met with Mr. Grant Mason the owner of the establishment and Ms. Carly Hampton another reported owner of the establishment. He pointed out to them that he could hear noise and observe people well after 12 a.m.

Ms. Hampton didn't deny that patrons were still at the summer garden but pointed out that per their settlement agreement she tried to justify it by saying that on that particular evening there wasn't loud or live music.

However, the plain language of the establishment's voluntary Settlement Agreement and their ABC license spells out the hours of

operation of the sidewalk caf, and summer garden shall be until 12 a.m. on Saturdays. There's no carve out to allow people to hang out in the summer garden as long as the establishment cuts off service. In this instance, 12 o'clock means 12 o'clock. And while it's true that to the establishment's credit they've undertaken many efforts to ameliorate the noise efforts this Board even recognized a few short days after this particular incident on October the 4th, 2023, however, in this instance on that night and into those early morning hours, they failed to cease operations by midnight which constitutes a substantial change in operation when they didn't have Board approval to extend their hours and, therefore, we're asking that the Board find that the establishment is in violation of the sole charge under Title 25, Section 762(A) and (B) 13.

Thank you.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Thank you.

Was it Mr. Mason or Ms. Hampton do you want to make an opening statement or do you defer until you present your case?

MS. HAMPTON: We'll defer until we present our case.

24	Investigator with the Alcoholic Beverage and
25	Cannabis Administration.

2	been an Investigator with the Alcoholic Beverage
3	and Cannabis Administration.
4	INVESTIGATOR RUIZ: Five years.
5	MR. EMMICK: And were you working in
6	that capacity on the evening of September 30th
7	into the early morning of October the 1st, 2023?
8	INVESTIGATOR RUIZ: Yes
9	MR. EMMICK: And did you respond to
10	any locations?
11	INVESTIGATOR RUIZ: Yes.
12	MR. EMMICK: What location was that?
13	INVESTIGATOR RUIZ: I responded to
14	Buddy's DC.
15	MR. EMMICK: And do you recall where
16	that's located?
17	INVESTIGATOR RUIZ: 11th Street, 3234,
18	Northwest.
19	MR. EMMICK: And what city or
20	jurisdiction is that in?
21	INVESTIGATOR RUIZ: The District of
22	Columbia.
23	MR. EMMICK: And what prompted you to
24	respond to that location?
25	INVESTIGATOR RUIZ: I was assigned by

1	my supervisor to respond to an ABCA Hotline
2	complaint of noise coming from the establishment
3	and the operation of the summer garden beyond its
4	licensed hours.
5	MR. EMMICK: And to take a step back,
6	what day of the week was September 30th, 2023?
7	INVESTIGATOR RUIZ: It was Sunday,
8	September 30th of Saturday.
9	MR. EMMICK: And October 1 would have
10	been Sunday?
11	INVESTIGATOR RUIZ: That is correct.
12	MR. EMMICK: If I could ask the Board
13	to take judicial notice that September 30th of
14	2023 and October 1st of 2023 were Saturday and
15	Sunday, respectively.
16	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: So noted.
17	MR. EMMICK: And, Investigator, what
18	time did you arrive at the establishment?
19	INVESTIGATOR RUIZ: It was
20	approximately 12:43 a.m.
21	MR. EMMICK: And when you arrived on
22	site what did you observe?
23	INVESTIGATOR RUIZ: So, I arrived on
24	site, of course, respond to the Complainant's
25	residence first which butts up to the

1	establishment. The front area of the summer
2	garden as well. While going to that
3	Complainant's door I looked over and you could
4	see into the summer garden and saw that there
5	were still multiple patrons. TVs were still on.
6	They appeared to be watching an event and that's
7	when I took some video of that and then went in
8	to visit with the Complainant.
9	MR. EMMICK: And the patrons that you
10	observed in the summer garden did they appear to
11	have any beverages in the vicinity?
12	INVESTIGATOR RUIZ: Yes. There
13	appeared to be beverages amongst the tables.
14	MR. EMMICK: Now to take a step back,
15	Investigator, as part of your duties as an
16	investigator with ABCA did you prepare a report
17	in this instance?
18	INVESTIGATOR RUIZ: I did.
19	MR. EMMICK: And if I could have the
20	Chair's permission to share my screen?
21	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Mr. Jameson,
22	could you please allow Mr. Emmick to share his
23	screen.
24	Go ahead, sir.
25	MR. EMMICK: Do you recognize what I'm

1	slowly scrolling through on my screen at this
2	moment?
3	INVESTIGATOR RUIZ: Yes.
4	MR. EMMICK: And what do you recognize
5	that to be?
6	INVESTIGATOR RUIZ: That's the Case
7	Report that I drafted for the incident.
8	MR. EMMICK: And you mentioned a
9	moment ago that you also were able to capture
10	audio and video of the occasion, is that correct?
11	INVESTIGATOR RUIZ: Correct.
12	MR. EMMICK: Please a moment of
13	indulgence, Mr. Chair. Give me one moment to fix
14	my screen over here.
15	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Sure.
16	MR. EMMICK: And for the purpose of
17	identification, if I could just play the first
18	few moments of what I was proffered the video in
19	this instance.
20	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Sure, go ahead.
21	MR. EMMICK: Investigator, do you
22	recognize the first few seconds of that video?
23	INVESTIGATOR RUIZ: Yes. Walking up
24	the steps.
25	MR. EMMICK: Okay. And with the

1	Chair's permission can I play the remainder of
2	the video?
3	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Any objection
4	by the Hamptons, Ms. Hampton and Mr. Mason?
5	Thank you. Go ahead.
6	Well, I'm sorry, only one person can
7	answer. But, anyway, all right. Go ahead, sir.

10	last few moments of that video?

16	INVESTIGATOR RUIZ: Yes.
17	MR. EMMICK: And that was included in
18	your Case Report?
19	INVESTIGATOR RUIZ: It was.
20	MR. EMMICK: Mr. Chair, at this
21	juncture I would ask that the Board admit
22	Investigator Ruiz' report as Exhibit Number 1
23	which would be the video from that evening per 23
24	DCMR 1713.10?
25	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: I'll just let

1	the licensee know that by operation of law the
2	Case Report is a part of our record but it's just
3	automatically a part of the record that the Board
4	can rely on by operation of law.
5	Okay. So, moved.
6	MR. EMMICK: And if I could once again
7	share my screen.
8	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: You should
9	still have
10	MR. MASON: I object.
11	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: I'm sorry,
12	what's the hold on, hold on, Mr.
13	Emmick. Hold on.
14	MR. MASON: I'm just noticing that
15	there is
16	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Hold on one
17	minute, please.
18	Mr. Emmick, close your screen, please.
19	I'm sorry, what is it you're objecting

EMMICK: No, problem, Mr. Chair. 20 I'm now showing for the purposes of 21 identification Government Exhibits Number 4, if I 2.2 could have permission to share my screen? 23 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Yes. 2.4 MR. EMMICK: Investigator, do you 25 recognize what is depicted on the screen if

17	document a part of the Case Report or is this a
18	separate document?
19	MR. EMMICK: It was not part of the
20	Case Report other than the fact that it was a
21	screenshot from the video that was part of the
22	Case Report.
23	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right. Any
24	objection?
25	MR. MASON: Can we object to it?

1 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: What's the 2 nature of your objection, sir? 3 MR. MASON: If it's not part of the 4 Case Report. 5 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Okav. And? MR. MASON: As we said it before I 6 7 don't even -- I can't validate the time in which 8 this is from. 9 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: And so, Mr. 10 Emmick, is there any -- is there a time stamp in 11 the sense of the -- I don't know when this 12 document was, how can you -- we need some 13 validation. 5	that the Summer Garden was allowed to operate.
6	MR. EMMICK: And after you met with
7	the neighbor what did you do then?
8	INVESTIGATOR RUIZ: Oh, with the
9	neighbor. I thought it was with the Licensee.
10	After I met with the neighbor I met with the
11	Licensees at the establishment.
12	MR. EMMICK: And who specifically did
13	you meet with at the establishment?
14	INVESTIGATOR RUIZ: Ms. Hampton, Mr.

17	individuals that are here on behalf of the

EMMICK: 15 occasions where you responded to the location and 16 found that there wasn't, that the noise complaint 17 was not founded? 18 INVESTIGATOR RUIZ: I don't recall. I believe one time I did not find too much 19 20 complaint founded. Yeah, one time, I believe. 21 can't recall exactly when that was. 2.2 MR. EMMICK: A brief indulgence, Mr. 23 Chair. I could not share my screen to 2.4 25 Government Exhibit Number 2 which was part of the

1	Case Report.
2	MR. EMMICK: Investigator, do you
3	recognize what's on the screen as Government's 2?
4	INVESTIGATOR RUIZ: Yes. That is the
5	ABC license for the establishment.
6	MR. EMMICK: And if I could draw your
7	attention to the Summer Garden hours, what are
8	the Summer Garden hours, specifically on
9	Saturday?
10	INVESTIGATOR RUIZ: Saturday Summer
11	Garden hours of operation were from 6 a.m. to 12
12	a.m.
13	MR. EMMICK: And the hour of sales?
14	INVESTIGATOR RUIZ: 11 a.m. to 12 a.m.
15	MR. EMMICK: And if I could now draw
16	your attention to Government Exhibit Number 3
17	which was part of the Case Report. Do you

19	INVESTIGATOR RUIZ: Yes. That would
20	be their Settlement Agreement.

9	MR. EMMICK: And, Mr. Chair, at this
10	point I could move in Government's 2 and 3 which
11	were also part of the Case Report.
12	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: So moved.
13	(Whereupon, the documents were marked
14	for identification and received in evidence as
15	Government Exhibits 2 and 3.)
16	INSPECTOR DIEHM: Brief indulgence,
17	Mr. Chair.
18	And, Investigator, when you met with
19	Mr. Mason and Ms. Hampton what, if anything, did
20	they state to you about the Summer Garden's
21	operation that evening?
22	INVESTIGATOR RUIZ: They talked about,
23	I believe Ms. Hampton talked about no loud of
24	live music being allowed on the Summer Garden.

1	their Settlement Agreement that you were

11	Mr. Mason or Ms. Hampton, who will be cross-
12	examining the witness?
13	MS. HAMPTON: I'll do it.
14	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Go ahead,
15	ma'am.
16	MS. HAMPTON: Okay.
17	CROSS-EXAMINATION
18	MS. HAMPTON: Investigator Ruiz, you
19	responded to a Hotline complaint, right?
20	INVESTIGATOR RUIZ: That's correct.
21	MS. HAMPTON: And the complaint whose
22	home you went to was Mr. Almeda, correct?
23	INVESTIGATOR RUIZ: That's correct.
24	MS. HAMPTON: And you stated
25	previously that you had come to Buddy's

1 previously on other complaints, correct? 2 INVESTIGATOR RUIZ: That's correct. MS. HAMPTON: And were all of these 3 4 complaints by the same neighbor? INVESTIGATOR RUIZ: Yes. 5 MR. MASON: All right. Are you aware 6 7 that we had a hearing in October and according to 8 the findings of fact that we had zero violations 9 after 20 plus, after 20 plus investigations. 10 MR. EMMICK: Objection, Mr. Chair. 11 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: What's the 12 nature of the objection? 13 MR. EMMICK: Relevance. I think that 14 the Board's record speaks for itself and whether 15 or not they had other violations in the past isn't relevant to whether there was a violation 16 on the night in question, October the 1st or the 17 18 early morning of October the 1st. 19 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: I'm going to --20 can you respond, ma'am, to the objection before I 21 make a ruling? Yeah. 2.2 MS. HAMPTON: I think it also 23 speaks to what is going to be discussed as we continue this case in terms of this one 2.4 25 individual who has constantly been trying to find

ways to, I guess, puts is in the sense of violating which is something that we are not doing. And as we continue to go through and discuss further in terms of what we're being accused of now, this is also going to tie back in.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right.

MS. HAMPTON: Uh-huh.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right. I'm going to sustain the objection because the question is that as stated by the Government on this particular occasion what occurred. So, it's irrelevant that this one individual might make 20 complaints --

MS. HAMPTON: Uh-huh.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: But on this particular night when a complaint was made the investigator is stating what they found. So, I'm going to overrule the objection and so that the witness can answer the question if he can.

INVESTIGATOR RUIZ: I don't know. I wasn't part of that hearing.

MS. HAMPTON: All right. Well, if maybe we c pull up the findings of fact, we have submitted it into evidence, if that's needed for

1 us to submit it or we can just --2 MS. HAMPTON: We can take note of 3 this. CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: 4 I'm sorry, I -hold on a minute. Mr. Emmick, my apologies. 5 ruling was to sustain the objection not to 6 7 overrule the objection. So, I gave all the 8 reasons why I agree with you but I gave the wrong 9 determination so I apologize. So, the ruling was to sustain the 10 11 objection and that the witness should not answer 12 the question because it is not relevant. 13 let's move on to another area, ma'am, I'm sorry. 14 MS. HAMPTON: Yes. And question for 15 you all because the attorney has said that 16 there's a sold charge and is that only the 25726B13 Of --17 18 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Hold on. Hold 19 on. 20 The Show Cause Hearing notice 21 basically states that, hold on, let me open the 2.2 notice. 23 The Show Cause notice we are only 2.4 speaking about what happened on Saturday, October 25 1st, 2023, at 12:43 a.m. That is the only issue

1	that you're being charged with, is that you
2	operated after your hours. From what I'm being
3	told your Settlement Agreement and your license
4	says that you're supposed to operate on a Summer
5	Garden at 12 o'clock and you were operating at
6	12:43. So, that is the only charge that we are
7	discussing today. What happened on October 1st,
8	2023, at 12:43 a.m. Okay?
9	MS. HAMPTON: All right.
10	And, so, Investigator when you
11	approached the initial resident what was it that
12	you heard?
13	INVESTIGATOR RUIZ: I heard
14	MS. HAMPTON: Voices?
15	INVESTIGATOR RUIZ: patron sounds,
16	yes. Yes, sounds, TV sounds so it's nothing
17	there mostly patron noise.
18	MS. HAMPTON: Mostly patron noise.
19	INVESTIGATOR RUIZ: Yes.
20	MS. HAMPTON: Okay. And was this
21	noise at a conversational level?
22	INVESTIGATOR RUIZ: I would say it was
23	at a conversational level. Maybe slightly higher
24	but not much more.
25	MS. HAMPTON: Okay. An when you left

1 the neighbor's residence, what did you see as you 2 came into Buddy's. Were there people on the 3 patio? 4 INVESTIGATOR RUIZ: Everybody was 5 dispersing at that time. So, there was a lot less individuals on the patio. I believe there 6 7 was only a couple of people left to include the 8 ownership. Uh-huh. 9 MS. HAMPTON: INVESTIGATOR RUIZ: The staff. 10 11 MS. HAMPTON: And were the TVs on? 12 INVESTIGATOR RUIZ: No, they were 13 turned off. 14 MS. HAMPTON: Okay. 15 INVESTIGATOR RUIZ: I believe. MS. HAMPTON: You believe like --16 INVESTIGATOR RUIZ: I believe that 17 18 they were turned off when I came around the other side. 19 20 Okay. And during your MS. HAMPTON: 21 investigation did you see people being served 2.2 alcohol? 23 INVESTIGATOR RUIZ: I seen the servers 2.4 just what they had in front of them at the time. 25 MS. HAMPTON: Correct. And --

1 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Sir? Sir? 2 Mason, you can't ask her any question. I mean or 3 if you're going to do I can't hear, because I can 4 hear you so you can write a note but only one 5 person can ask questions, sir. 6 MS. HAMPTON: Okay. And was there, 7 your previous investigations when you had been 8 called out to Buddy's due to complaints so, Mr. 9 Almeda, was there ever anything founded? there ever a violation of noise or anything of 10 11 that nature? 12 MR. EMMICK: Objection, Mr. Chair, at 13 this point in time I believe this is just an 14 attempt to re-ask the same questions here? 15 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Yes. I'm going 16 to sustain the objection. As I stated before, 17 this case is about what happened on this specific 18 date and not what happened before or after, but 19 just exactly what it is that the investigator saw 20 on October 1st, 2023, at 12:43 a.m. 21 MS. HAMPTON: And, Mr. Ruiz, when you 2.2 came into Buddy's and you and I spoke, didn't we 23 have a conversation about there not being any 2.4 service happening on the patio?

1 think I do recall it that particular conversation 2 but I believe I explained the hours of sale including sale, service and consumption that the 3 alcohol had to removed as well as patrons being 4 5 there past 12 a.m. because of the ultimate operation of the Summer Garden. 6 7 MS. HAMPTON: Correct. And didn't we 8 have the conversation I explained to you that 9 there was no alcohol being served and that what the lawyer had mentioned earlier that there was 10 11 beverages but those beverages were water. 12 were no sales being made. There was no alcohol 13 being served or food since you denied --INVESTIGATOR RUIZ: After review of 14 15 the video with the patrons there appeared to be 16 alcohol on the table. But amber drinks and cups appeared to be a bottle as well on the table. 17 18 MS. HAMPTON: A bottle of what because we don't allow bottles outside. 19 20 INVESTIGATOR RUIZ: It appeared to be 21 a bottle of beer, I believe, if I recall 2.2 correctly. 23 Okay. All right. MS. HAMPTON: 2.4 And when you were also in the space,

in the establishment you wrote in your report

1 that you got a phone call from Mr. Almeda stating 2 that he could hear music in his home. Correct? But, when you answered that call I was there with 3 you and do you recall me saying to you, is this 4 5 loud to you? Objection, as to the form 6 MR. EMMICK: 7 of the question, Mr. Chair. 8 MS. HAMPTON: Okay. I can rephrase it. 9 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: 10 She's not an 11 attorney so I'll give her some leeway. Well, at 12 least she has not presented herself as an 13 attorney, let me put it that way. 14 MS. HAMPTON: I can rephrase it. 15 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: No, it's, 16 ma'am, I'm giving you the benefit of the doubt. 17 So, okay. So, I'll give her some leeway in 18 asking the questions. So, ask your question, 19 ma'am. 20 Okav. When you were in MS. HAMPTON: 21 the establishment and you received a phone call 2.2 from Mr. Almeda about there still being loud 23 music playing, do you recall us having the conversation about the sound level and your 2.4

interpretation of the sound in that moment when

2	INVESTIGATOR RUIZ: Yes.
3	MS. HAMPTON: In your opinion was that
4	music loud?
5	MR. EMMICK: Objection, Your Honor,
6	relevance. This doesn't go to the ultimate issue
7	of whether or not they were operating after
8	hours.
9	MS. HAMPTON: Oh, okay.
10	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Yes, and let me
11	also clarify, attempt to.
12	MS. HAMPTON: Yes.
13	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: You were not
14	charged with the noise complaint.
15	MS. HAMPTON: Okay.
16	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Because the
17	only charge that you were charged with is
18	operating after 12 o'clock. So, because if you
19	were charged with a noise then, yes, you can ask
20	those questions. But it's strictly that you're
21	operating
22	MS. HAMPTON: Okay.
23	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: after your
24	Board approved hours.
25	MS. HAMPTON: Okay. And so to kind of

1	wrap it up in a sense. Investigator Ruiz, are
2	you aware that Buddy's does not sell beer
3	bottles?
4	INVESTIGATOR RUIZ: I'm not aware, no.
5	MS. HAMPTON: Yes. Our facility does
6	not have any glass bottles aside from like
7	Champagne or Prosecco. So, it's not possible for
8	us, Buddy's to have sold beer bottles
9	MR. EMMICK: Objection, Your Honor,
10	asked and answered.
11	MS. HAMPTON: Okay.
12	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: And you're
13	making a statement, ma'am. I need you to ask in
14	a question.
15	Do you have any more questions you
16	wish to ask?
17	MS. HAMPTON: Not at this moment.
18	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right.
19	I have a question to ask Mr. Ruiz.
20	What is it per the license what are
21	the times for the Summer Garden?
22	INVESTIGATOR RUIZ: 6 a.m. to 12 a.m.,
23	Fridays and Saturdays.
24	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: And what does
25	a 12 a.m. timeline mean? What exactly does that

1 mean, 12 a.m.? 2 INVESTIGATOR RUIZ: It means that at 3 12 a.m. all patrons and basically the operations 4 of the Summer Garden what we're talking about and 5 that means all patrons and drinks and stuff are being removed from the Summer Garden area. 6 7 operation is stopped at that time and it's pretty 8 much closed. 9 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right. 10 Any other questions by any Board 11 members? 12 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: This is not your time, ma'am. You'll get another 13 14 opportunity. 15 All right. 16 Yes, Mr. Short? 17 MEMBER SHORT: Yes. I'd just like to 18 ask -- Investigator Ruiz, did you inquire as to 19 this operation having a time that they stopped 20 serving alcohol or a close down time? Last call. 21 INVESTIGATOR RUIZ: I did not inquire about that. 2.2 23 MEMBER SHORT: Would you normally ask if they have a last call policy or last call? 2.4 25 INVESTIGATOR RUIZ: Sometimes I have

1	but I didn't in this case.
2	MEMBER SHORT: Okay. Can you tell us
3	what was the last call have done at 12. It's
4	supposed to close at 12 midnight, correct?
5	INVESTIGATOR RUIZ: Correct.
6	MEMBER SHORT: And then so what would
7	happen if the last call was at that time?
8	INVESTIGATOR RUIZ: Last call was done
9	at midnight and people would be up and leaving,
10	bills to be paid. There would be an active
11	motion of departure.
12	MEMBER SHORT: Was that appearing when
13	you got there?
14	INVESTIGATOR RUIZ: Not when I
15	initially arrived, no.
16	MEMBER SHORT: And what time was that?
17	INVESTIGATOR RUIZ: Approximately
18	12:43 a.m.
19	MEMBER SHORT: Thank you very much.
20	That's all I have, Mr. Chair.
21	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Any other
22	questions by any of the Board members?
23	Go ahead, Mr. Grant.
24	MEMBER GRANT: Mr. Ruiz, good
25	afternoon to you.

1	INVESTIGATOR RUIZ: Good afternoon.
2	MEMBER GRANT: You may have stated
3	this before but just for my clarification can you
4	recall how many people were on the premises when
5	you arrived at 12:43 a.m.?
6	INVESTIGATOR RUIZ: I would say
7	approximately 15 or more. I don't know the exact
8	number?
9	MEMBER GRANT: Fifteen or more. Is
10	there a range that you can give me?
11	INVESTIGATOR RUIZ: Just probably
12	between 15 and 25 maybe.
13	MEMBER GRANT: Okay. Thank you.
14	That's my only question for now. Thank you.
15	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Ms. Hampton,
16	now you can ask Mr. Ruiz questions but based on
17	the questions that were asked by the Board.
18	MS. HAMPTON: You answered a question
19	in terms of operation, correct? Where can you
20	find that definition of operations under ABCA's
21	D.C. Code, Title 25 or is this just your
22	interpretation of operations?
23	INVESTIGATOR RUIZ: It's the
24	interpretation of the operation of a business.
25	Question was in regards to the hours from 12 a.m.

1	An operation means it's the end, it's closing.
2	Everybody should be leaving, not still partaking
3	in viewing of televisions or beverages in front
4	of them. All that should have been cleansed up.
5	MS. HAMPTON: So, with all due
6	respect, that is your interpretation of
7	operation?
8	INVESTIGATOR RUIZ: Yes, that's the
9	law.
10	MS. HAMPTON: Thank you.
11	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Do you have any
12	other questions, ma'am?
13	MS. HAMPTON: Only
14	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Based on the
15	questions that the Board asked.
16	MS. HAMPTON: Is the operation spelled
17	out anywhere in like the agreement or in the code
18	book to ABCA?
19	INVESTIGATOR RUIZ: I don't recall
20	seeing a definition, just law of the
21	establishment to cease operations at the licensed
22	hours.
23	MS. HAMPTON: Okay. Thank you.
24	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Mr. Emmick, any
25	redirect?

1	MR. EMMICK: Yes. One quick question.
2	REDIRECT EXAMINATION
3	MR. EMMICK: Investigator, do you
4	recall how long you were at the neighbor's
5	residence before you returned to the
6	establishment or went into the establishment?
7	INVESTIGATOR RUIZ: I recall maybe
8	under if that 10 minutes maybe.
9	MR. EMMICK: Thank you, nothing
LO	further from the Government at this point.
L1	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right.
L2	Thank you, Mr. Ruiz, for your testimony. You're
L3	free to go.
L4	Does the Government have another
L5	witness?
L6	MR. EMMICK: No, the Government rests.
L7	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right. Ms.
L8	Mason, I'm sorry, Mr. Mason or Ms. Hampton. I
L9	don't know why I wrote your names down and I

MR. MASON: As I said before Buddy's DC is a neighborhood space. We have continued to comply and make sure that we were following all things in both our Settlement Agreement and on an ABRA -- I think is the issue at hand today is about interpretation. And when giving Mr. Ruiz' interpretation of what it says, we have gone above and beyond to make sure that we stay within that realm.

I think that this issue is not a violation, it's in the interpretation. Before midnight, cleared off all alcoholic beverages, made sure that Buddy's DC is always in compliance with what goes on with what the expectations are and we try to continue to do so. And I think that it will be proven through our testimony that we have stuck with that and have continued to make sure that we are operating well within the law and the expectations of the ANC as well as the ABCA Board.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right. So, do you have a witness you wish you call?

MR. MASON: Yes. I will call Dr.

Hampton.

DR. HAMPTON: Mr. Ruiz came in. At this time the patio was completely cleared. He came in and said that he saw patrons on the patio. To him I responded and said, well, there's no one outside now. He said that there was. I told him that I was not going to deny that people were on the patio.

I also informed him during that conversation that service had previously ended before midnight and that there was no service going on outside.

1 Ouestion. What are the MR. MASON: 2 operating hours of the establishment on the 3 What time does the establishment close 4 on weekends? 5 DR. HAMPTON: The establishment closes, we have until 2:00 a.m. in the morning on 6 7 Friday and Saturday. 8 MR. MASON: Okay. So, at the time of 9 what is presumed to be after midnight, 12:43 Mr. Ruiz came over, the establishment was still open 10 11 but the issue was there were people even at that 12 time when he came over still on the patio being 13 workers, being us, different people but the crowd 14 that was there, the 15 odd people or so that he 15 said that were possibly there had begun to 16 disperse. 17 DR. HAMPTON: Yes. 18 MR. MASON: Correct? So, I guess my 19 next question is in your opinion, had you 20 discontinued operation of that patio? 21 DR. HAMPTON: Yes. There was no 2.2 operation going on. There were no orders being 23 There were no orders being given at that taken. 2.4 time. 25 MR. MASON: Right. And so in your

1 opinion how are held to gather or move people off 2 of the property? What were you told was the best 3 means for you to do so? To, so we have signage 4 DR. HAMPTON: 5 outside that notes what the patio hours are It's on the wall on the patio. 6 specifically. 7 In addition to that to inform people 8 that they can no longer be served that at this 9 point as far as outside patio goes that service will only be inside. And we give people 45 10 11 minute notice so at 11:15, essentially, is when 12 we tell people the patio closes at midnight so on 13 the sign then last call for that is anywhere between 30 minutes and 15 before midnight. 14 15 MR. MASON: Okay. And my next 16 question is, are you familiar with the Settlement 17 Agreement that is in place for the address which, 18 I believe was signed in 2012. 19 DR. HAMPTON: Yes. 20 MR. MASON: Or 11 and between 2011 21 and the ANC. 2.2 DR. HAMPTON: Yes. MR. MASON: Being familiar with that, 23 2.4 do you have any contacts or any memories of what 25 operations is and how it has been spelled out in

that document?

DR. HAMPTON: No. There's no description of what operates is in the Settlement Agreement or in the code book of office, under the section definitions.

MR. MASON: Okay. I also have a question to ask. Are there other businesses on your same block that have similar, the same closing time and operation times as you?

MR. EMMICK: Objection. Mr. Chair, relevance as to other establishment's Settlement Agreements licenses might dictate.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Let me --

MR. MASON: Can I state why I'm asking

this?

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Yes, go ahead,

MASON: I'm only saying, bringing this up because we have several businesses that are on the same block and none of them says it specifies what operating is nor does it say, it only says in one that I could find that no sales or food can be served during those operations, so after a certain time. 3	sustaining the objection and we'll move forward.

1 MEMBER SHORT: -- how long have you 2 had your business been established here? What 3 was your opening date? DR. HAMPTON: We opened in November of 4 5 22 so it's been about 15 months or so. MEMBER SHORT: 6 The question I had 7 earlier to the Investigator, since you've been in 8 the business have you heard anyone talk about 9 last call and what does that mean to you? DR. HAMPTON: I feel like last call 10 11 means that, you now, this is your last 12 opportunity to purchase food or drinks because, 13 you know, the area will be, you know, we're no 14 longer going to be serving. And the patio, the Summer Garden rather is different than inside. 15 16 So, it's last call for the patio but people are 17 more than welcome to stay inside and, you know, 18 Was that answering your question? 19 MEMBER SHORT: But, let me ask you 20 this. 21 When the Investigator got there, Investigator Ruiz got there at 12:40 --2.2 23 DR. HAMPTON: Yes. Uh-huh. 2.4 MEMBER SHORT: Why were people still 25 sitting on your patio with drinks in front of

them?

DR. HAMPTON: So, the thing is that people were on the patio. There were no alcoholic beverages at all. There weren't even sodas. People were still on the patio because there was a sporting event that went over and so people were still watching the sporting event.

Since why when he left Mr. Almeda's residence and came to Buddy's everybody was gone because they knew they could no longer serve drinks or alcohol or food or anything at all. It was just watching the end of this sporting event and then they were gone.

MEMBER SHORT: Do you have any signage in that area to alert people that they must be quiet after your closing hours and there can't be any drinks in front of them?

DR. HAMPTON: Correct. There's a sign on the patio which was also brought up in our previous hearing that states specifically, multiple times stating to please keep your noise levels down and be courteous of our neighbors.

And there's also in the patio time is also listed there as well for patrons to see.

MEMBER SHORT: Ordinarily, how long do

you let persons stay on your Summer Garden after you officially close at 12 midnight?

DR. HAMPTON: That was, it's not a

normal occurrence. That was literally, yeah, like that is it. My concern is that I don't want to force people off. Physically I'm not going to do that. I can tell --

MEMBER SHORT: Thank you for your answer but let me say this to you.

DR. HAMPTON: Yes.

MEMBER SHORT: If you knew that people staying there whether you forced them off or not because you like, would you force them off?

DR. HAMPTON: Oh, most definitely.

MEMBER SHORT: Okay.

DR. HAMPTON: I would call the police, I guess, to do that. But as a new small business in the area that we're in like I don't, I understand what you're saying. I don't want, you know, want customers to feel we're going to call the cops on them because they weren't being disruptive. They weren't, you know, because again in my mind we weren't operating. Everyone on that patio was aware of that. There was no service being had. It was them just watching the

20	forgive me.

25	was trying to say is that is when I this night

1 is when I was made aware and so when we did have 2 an event where we felt like it may go over we did 3 apply to ABCA for that. So, yes, we are aware now and we have since then taken steps to make 4 5 sure that we are in line with what the Board 6 requires. 7 MEMBER SHORT: So, are you willing 8 because this Board can't make you do anything 9 other than what you want to do to make sure you have --10 11 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Mr. Short. 12 MEMBER SHORT: Yes. 13 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: You can't ask 14 that question, sir. Not at this -- this is not a 15 fact-finding hearing so this is --16 MEMBER SHORT: Thank you, Mr. Chair. 17 Getting back there was a question 18 asked, I think from you to someone regarding operations of your business. 19 20 Uh-huh. DR. HAMPTON: 21 MEMBER SHORT: And since you signed 2.2 yourself here before this Board today regarding 23 operations that apparently had run afoul of the 2.4 law because the Investigator testified as much.

What are you going to do to make sure this

doesn't happen again?

DR. HAMPTON: And that's the thing that since that we've been aware, again, of Mr. Ruiz' interpretation of operations. I assume that this is the same, you know, wording that you all have. And since then, since that very same day, that same night after having the conversation with him we have made sure that people are off the patio. We're not forcing them off. We let them know. We turn the TVs off and that in itself is going to, you know, remove people. But, you know, we have taken the steps. I feel like that has been a learning experience. We no longer operate at 12:01 on the patio. We let --

MEMBER SHORT: Okay. This is my last question.

Since you've now been before the Board today --

DR. HAMPTON: Yes.

MEMBER SHORT: -- information you got about operations and other things, should an investigator come to your establishment at 12:40 this weekend coming, would they find people in your business?

1 Inside the business, DR. HAMPTON: 2 yes. On the patio, no. 3 MEMBER SHORT: No, where you had the violation for your Summer Garden? 4 5 DR. HAMPTON: Correct. No, they will 6 not. 7 MEMBER SHORT: How can the Board be 8 sure of that? 9 DR. HAMPTON: I feel like because, I 10 feel like you can be sure of that because, again, 11 like we're new. We're a new small business when we're learning certain things as we go. I didn't 12 13 even know that afternoon about substantial 14 changes. We were made aware of it. So going 15 forward what we've done when we felt like it's 16 possible to go past 12 o'clock, we apply for it. 17 I feel like, you know, I know you guys 18 don't know me. You know us. But I personally 19 feel like you can trust that we're going to do 20 all the things. 21 We informed of signage. We have 2.2 signage. We take the proper steps to try and 23 make sure that our business is still for the entire community. We don't want to be a business 2.4

that has to come before you because of

1 violations. Like we're trying to operate by the 2 book. And so we'll --3 MEMBER SHORT: Thank you very much and I don't want to take up anymore of the time with 4 5 the Board today. DR. HAMPTON: 6 Yes. 7 MEMBER SHORT: The --8 DR. HAMPTON: I would also like to say 9 that ABRA has come since then. I'm sorry, Mr. Short. 10 11 MEMBER SHORT: Go ahead. 12 DR. HAMPTON: I just want to say that 13 ABRA has come out multiple times since October 14 because there is one neighbor who calls 15 consistently and there has been no issue. Thev 16 come all the time. They do and this is the only 17 thing that you will see on your docket from us. 18 MEMBER SHORT: Believe it or not. 19 have other businesses that have the same problem. 20 And most of them solved them to stay in business 21 and hopefully you will do the same. That's all that I have, Mr. Chair. 2.2 23 DR. HAMPTON: Thank you. 2.4 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Thank you, Mr. 25 Short.

1 Go ahead, Mr. Grant. 2 MEMBER GRANT: Dr. Hampton, thank you 3 for being with us today and I hope things are well with you. 4 5 I got a couple of questions for you. 6 How many employees do you all have in 7 total at Buddy's? 8 DR. HAMPTON: In total or on a night, 9 a given night? 10 MEMBER GRANT: Both. 11 DR. HAMPTON: So, operating we have 12 two dishwashers. So, maybe about 15 staff 13 members total. On a given night bartender-wise, 14 no more than two. Two or three and there's 15 bartenders. 16 MEMBER GRANT: Do you recall how many 17 people throughout the night or I would guess the 18 crescendo or crux of the night were in attendance 19 at Buddy's? 20 I'm not 100 percent DR. HAMPTON: 21 I mean it, I'm not 100 percent sure. Like we, I am not sure. Like if could have been like, 2.2 23 I don't know, throughout the whole night, maybe, 2.4 I don't know.

Okay. Mr. Ruiz he

MEMBER GRANT:

1	stated during his testimony that when he arrived
2	there was between 15 and I believe 20 to 25
3	people that were on the premises. Is that your
4	recollection? That range?
5	DR. HAMPTON: It's possible. I don't
6	think that there was like, more than like 15
7	there.
8	MEMBER GRANT: Okay. Okay.
9	I believe that may be all of my
10	questions, Mr. Chair. I'll give it back to you.
11	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right.
12	Thank you.
13	Mr. Emmick, any questions of the
14	witness based on the questions that were asked by
15	the Board?
16	MR. EMMICK: Mr. Chair, if I could
17	share my screen.
18	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Go ahead,
19	please, you should the right.
20	REDIRECT EXAMINATION
21	MR. EMMICK: I'm now presenting what
22	was previously submitted to the Board as
23	Respondent's Exhibit 1.
24	Dr. Hanson, this is a photograph or a
25	screenshot from your surveillance footage from

1 the night at issue here today. 2 Yes, and you can see on DR. HAMPTON: the time stamp that it's like 5 seconds after 3 midnight. And if you were to zoom in on all the 4 5 tables all you will see is water. And the patrons sitting on the rail have nothing in their 6 7 hands. 8 MR. EMMICK: But it's a fair and 9 accurate depiction of the scene that night at 12 o'clock midnight? 10 11 DR. HAMPTON: At 12 o'clock, yes. But 12 not at 12 --13 MR. EMMICK: And is it fair to say 14 that there's at least more than 10, possibly more 15 than 15 people sitting apparently watching TV at 12 o'clock? 16 DR. HAMPTON: At 12, yes. But that is 17 18 not an image at 12:40 where some people have left. 19 No, I understand there is 20 MR. EMMICK: 21 a difference between 12 and what you testified to 2.2 and 12:45. 23 DR. HAMPTON: Uh-huh. 2.4 MR. EMMICK: But after midnight, at 25 12:05, five seconds after the hour, there's still

1 a number of patrons in your Summer Garden patio 2 at that point in time watching TV. 3 DR. HAMPTON: Correct. MR. EMMICK: Nothing further, Mr. 4 5 Chair. CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: 6 Mr. Mason, do 7 you wish to ask here any follow-up questions 8 based on the question, any redirect based on the 9 questions that were -- any redirect questions? 10 MR. MASON: Yes. My redirect would be 11 this all goes back to what we consider --12 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: You're asking 13 questions, sir. You're asking her 14 questions. 15 MR. MASON: I'm asking her, what would 16 you at that moment in time were you under the 17 impression that you were no longer operating 18 after midnight? 19 DR. HAMPTON: Correct. Because there 20 was no service going on. There was no alcohol 21 being served. There's no alcohol out there. 2.2 People at midnight are aware that the patio is 23 They were informed that there is no closed. 2.4 service being had. And, yes. 25 MR. MASON: My next question is, per

1 our, at that time approximately how many -- was 2 there service going on inside of the establishment and was it viewed inside of the 3 establishment at that same time? 4 DR. HAMPTON: Yes. There was service 5 6 going on and there were some people inside, yes. 7 MR. MASON: Okay. So, those people 8 that were outside that were no longer being 9 served, and did not have service did they have 10 the option to go inside or was it too many people 11 there? 12 DR. HAMPTON: They had the option to 13 go inside. 14 MR. MASON: So, was it space for them? 15 DR. HAMPTON: I mean --Objection. 16 MR. EMMICK: Relevance. 17 Whether or not there were patrons inside or not, 18 doesn't go to the ultimate issue of whether or 19 not people were in the Summer Garden. 20 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: I'm going to 21 sustained the objection. Let's move on. 2.2 MR. MASON: No redirect. 23 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right. 2.4 Dr. Hampton, thank you very much for 25 your testimony. All right. Do we have, Mr.

1	Mason, do we have another witness?
2	DR. HAMPTON: Yes, Mr. Mason.
3	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Mr. Mason, can
4	you raise your right hand?
5	Do you swear or affirm to tell the
6	truth and nothing but the truth?
7	MR. MASON: Yes.
8	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Your witness,
9	Dr. Hampton.
10	DIRECT EXAMINATION
11	DR. HAMPTON: Okay. Mr. Mason, you
12	are aware of the Summer Garden hours, correct?
13	MR. MASON: Yes.
14	DR. HAMPTON: And you are aware that
15	the Summer Garden service ends at 12 midnight?
16	MR. MASON: Yes.
17	DR. HAMPTON: Are people that are
18	inside of Buddy's allowed well, actually, I'll
19	say this.
20	
21	On the night in question were there
22	alcoholic beverages being served at all or and
23	food being served after midnight on the patio, on
24	the Summer Garden?
25	MR. MASON: No.

1	DR. HAMPTON: The water that you saw
2	in the video image out there was that previously
3	out there directly or was that brought out to
4	them?
5	MR. MASON: It was already there.
6	DR. HAMPTON: Okay. In that image
7	that was shown at 12, around 12:40 that night was
8	there the same amount of people that was in that
9	photo on the patio during that time?
10	MR. MASON: No.
11	DR. HAMPTON: And why do you think
12	that people, why there was not that any people on
13	the patio?
14	MR. MASON: Because from my opinion it
15	had gone over. Some people who wanted to
16	continue in a specified space came inside of the
17	establishment.
18	DR. HAMPTON: Okay. Why would they go
19	into the establishment versus staying on the
20	Summer Garden?
21	MR. MASON: Because there is no
22	service outside after midnight.
23	DR. HAMPTON: Okay. In your opinion,
24	prior to that night did you feel like you were in
25	compliance with ABCA and the Settlement Agreement

1	in terms of Summer Garden operation?
2	MR. MASON: Yes.
3	MR. EMMICK: Objection, Mr. Chair.
4	Outside it's not relevant, it's outside the
5	scope of the ultimate issue of October the 1st in
6	terms of what had happened before leading up to
7	that point.
8	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right. I
9	will sustain the objection. Just reminding we ae
10	only talking about what happened on
11	DR. HAMPTON: Okay.
12	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: the day in
13	question. All right.
14	DR. HAMPTON: So, on the day in
15	question did you feel like Buddy's was operating
16	in accordance to the ABCA and Settlement
17	Agreement definition of, well, do you feel like -
18	-
19	MR. MASON: Yes.
20	DR. HAMPTON: Okay.
21	MR. MASON: Yes. We felt I as the
22	principal owner thought we were in compliance.
23	DR. HAMPTON: Okay.
24	MR. MASON: I was only been told by
25	Mr. Ruiz after that, his expectation was that

1	everyone be cleared, not that service just be
2	terminated. Had to be cleared and since that
3	date we have made sure that everyone is either
4	off or there is a substantial change application
5	put in in case someone may be out there. But
6	even then there is still no service outside after
7	midnight.
8	DR. HAMPTON: Okay. And when you
9	applied for the substantial changes did you apply
LO	for substantial changes for the Summer Garden
L1	hours before, after this incident, correct?
L2	MR. MASON: Yes.
L3	DR. HAMPTON: And at that time, ABRA
L4	notified you that
L5	MR. EMMICK: Objection, relevance.
L6	DR. HAMPTON: I was just going to
L7	state that we applied for it and she also
L8	supported it. That was all I was going to I
L9	don't know.
20	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: It's
21	MR. MASON: Not relevant?
22	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: It's not
23	relevant to the day in question.
24	MR. MASON: I think that what I was
25	just trying to get at is the fact that this

1	instance, this isolated situation is not
2	something that
3	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: This is what
4	you can do. When you close
5	MR. MASON: Oh, okay.
6	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: that's the
7	argument you make
8	MR. MASON: Okay.
9	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: When you do
10	your closing you can make those type of
11	arguments.
12	MR. MASON: Okay.
13	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Say whatever
14	you want to say to wrap up the case to convince
15	the Board. Okay. But that's not appropriate in
16	this juncture.
17	And I'll just say, a lot of the
18	relevance, the objections that were made when you
19	make a closing argument you can argue those if
20	you so desire. But you can't ask those questions
21	at this juncture. All right?
22	DR. HAMPTON: Okay. I think I
23	understood.
24	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right. You
25	have any other questions on yeah.

1	DR. HAMPTON: On the day in question,
2	yes.
3	Okay. As far as operating you're
4	aware that there is signage on the patio, right?
5	MR. MASON: Yes.
6	DR. HAMPTON: Have you made patrons
7	aware of the signage?
8	MR. MASON: Yes.
9	DR. HAMPTON: Is the signage somewhere
10	where patrons can clearly see it or is it hidden?
11	MR. MASON: It's in clear view.
12	DR. HAMPTON: Okay. And how many
13	signs are on the patio indicating the hours and
14	the asking of patrons to watch their sound levels
15	MR. MASON: Two.
16	DR. HAMPTON: Two of which one?
17	MR. MASON: Two allowing, telling them
18	to watch their sound level and giving the hours.
19	DR. HAMPTON: Uh-huh.
20	MR. MASON: Bring it all together.
21	DR. HAMPTON: Yes. And what was to
22	happen say you walked on the patio that
23	afternoon, that evening and someone asked you for
24	a drink? What would happen? What would have
25	happened?

1	MR. MASON: I would they would be
2	directed that they would need to go inside to
3	order food or drinks and remain inside.
4	DR. HAMPTON: So, they could not come
5	outside with what they purchased inside?
6	MR. MASON: No, they cannot. Because
7	the door that goes from inside to outside on that
8	side of the building is closed.
9	DR. HAMPTON: Okay. Thank you.
10	No further questions.
11	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Thank you. Is
12	there another witness or do you rest?
13	DR. HAMPTON: Rest.
14	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right.
15	Thank you.
16	MR. EMMICK: Your Honor, or Mr. Chair,
17	if I could very briefly inquire?
18	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: I'm sorry. Let
19	me see. I never had the opportunity to cross-
20	examine Mr. Mason.
21	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Oh, you didn't.
22	MR. EMMICK: No, sir.
23	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: I apologize.
24	I apologize, sir. Why didn't you alert me prior
25	to, I apologize, sir. Go ahead.

1 CROSS-EXAMINATION 2 MR. EMMICK: Mr. Mason, there was 3 testimony earlier in this proceeding that there was a sporting event on, is that correct that 4 5 night? MR. MASON: 6 Yes. 7 MR. EMMICK: And that sporting event 8 continued on past midnight? It did. 9 MR. MASON: 10 MR. EMMICK: And you didn't turn off 11 the TVs at midnight? 12 MR. MASON: The TV, most nights we 13 don't turn the TVs off at midnight. That's part 14 of allow people to see that we're still open and 15 they come inside even though they're not allowed 16 on the patio at that time the TVs remain on. MR. EMMICK: After 2 a.m. as well? 17 18 MR. MASON: They remain on until we 19 completely close. 20 But to be clear, you MR. EMMICK: 21 didn't clear patrons from the Summer Garden area 2.2 at any point after midnight. You left the 23 sporting event to continue to play? MR. MASON: On that evening we allowed 2.4

the sporting event to continue to play by

1	clearing them on that, we allowed the sporting
2	event to continue to play.
3	MR. EMMICK: You didn't clear them out
4	at midnight?
5	MR. MASON: We did not clear them out
6	at midnight because we weren't under the
7	impression that we needed to clear them out.
8	MR. EMMICK: So, that's a no?
9	MR. MASON: That is a no.
10	MR. EMMICK: I have nothing further,
11	Mr. Chair.
12	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right. All
13	right.
14	And the Board has had an opportunity
15	to ask questions. The Board has already asked
16	questions of Mr. Mason, is that correct? The
17	Board has not asked questions of Mr. Mason? All
18	right.
19	DR. HAMPTON: We asked him questions.
20	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Okay. All right.
21	Any questions of the Board of Mr.
22	Mason?
23	MEMBER GRANT: Yeah, just a brief
24	question.
25	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Mr. Grant,

yeah.

MEMBER GRANT: Mr. Mason, thank you for being here. A couple of things with you outside of being here for the hearing today.

Can you just briefly describe your relationship well the establishment's relationship with the ANC in the area, just briefly if you can. Any communication, any sort of judgment call on your relationship with the ANC.

MR. MASON: I believe that we have an ongoing relationship. We have found it to be a slow moving relationship. Right now we are trying to work in getting a new Settlement Agreement. This started last December upon us opening to which our license was challenged. But the ANC, because of the neighborhood we're in good standing with them. But because of this scenario with the neighbor we've been presented of moving forward. So, right now we're still held to a Settlement Agreement that's unlike any other business in our corridor.

So, it's a little bit, it's tenuous because we go to everything. We speak to them and they promise that some things will change but

we haven't been able to get past anything because we have this one neighbor that continuously calls and bothers even though we've had neighbors on our behalf that live next to us and across the street from us call but we just can't, we just haven't had any movement. So, right now we're under a Settlement Agreement like I said that's from 12 years ago that doesn't even relate to the business or what's going on in the neighborhood even.

MEMBER GRANT: One follow-up question.

Earlier when Dr. Hampton was being examined by Mr. Short here on the Board he asked a question about the likelihood of us being able to believe that you all won't have any additional challenges with meeting the limitations of shutting off operations at midnight. Do you recall that interaction?

MR. MASON: Yes, I do.

MEMBER GRANT: Do you recall the questions that I had for Dr. Hampton around the number of staff that were on site during the night in question?

MR. MASON: Yes, I remember.

MEMBER GRANT: And then do you recall

1	the photograph that Mr. Emmick posted of the
2	folks sitting out on the patio?
3	MR. MASON: Yes, I do.
4	MEMBER GRANT: In your estimation, do
5	you all have enough staff on site to be able to
6	insure that that number of people will be able to
7	leave the patio to go back inside or to leave the
8	premises all together?
9	MR. MASON: Yes, we have enough staff.
10	MEMBER GRANT: Okay.
11	Those are my only questions, Mr.
12	Chair, thank you.
13	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Thank you Mr.
14	Grant.
15	Do any other Board members have
16	questions?
17	Mr. Emmick, any questions, of Mr.
18	Mason based on the questions asked by the Board?
19	MR. EMMICK: No, Mr. Chair, thank you.
20	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Dr. Hampton,
21	any questions of Mr. Mason, any redirect
22	questions of Mr. Mason based on the question
23	any redirect questions of Mr. Mason?
24	DR. HAMPTON: Yes. Just in relation
25	to what Mr. Grant asked as far as the

1	relationship with the ANC.		
2	REDIRECT EXAMINATION		
3	DR. HAMPTON: Has Buddy's ever		
4	participated or has Buddy's ever implemented		
5	things for the community with the ANC?		
6	MR. MASON: Yes. We're very active		
7	with the ANC. We hope to clean up across the		
8	neighborhood. We're very active in the community.		
9	Not only in the neighborhood but throughout D.C.		
10	DR. HAMPTON: So, as far as like the		
11	events you were saying Buddy's organized a		
12	community clean up with the ANC?		
13	MR. MASON: Yes.		
14	DR. HAMPTON: And didn't Buddy's also		
15	organize with the ANC a toy drive where neighbors		
16	could drop stuff off and we donated it?		
17	MR. MASON: Our relationship with the		
18	ANC overall is good. It's just we had an issue		
19	with the Settlement Agreement being amended.		
20	DR. HAMPTON: Correct.		
21	MR. MASON: In some regards, that is		
22	it.		
23	DR. HAMPTON: Okay. Thank you.		
24	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right.		
25	Thank you very much. Is that your last witness?		

DR. HAMPTON: Yes.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right. Are the parties ready to close? The parties ready to close?

MR. EMMICK: The Government is ready, Mr. Chair.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right. So, basically where we are now, we're going to do closing. So, the Government will tell us specifically what it is that they want the Board to do and I want the Licensee to then in their closing share what is it that they want the Board to do as regarding this matter.

So let's start with the Government.

MR. EMMICK: Thank you, Mr. Chair.

The Government based on the evidence presented and the testimony here today has met its burden of substantial evidence and proves the sole charge that the establishment was in violation by operating after hours without having first gotten Board approval. Specifically, a violation of Section 25-723A and E13 and asking that the Board impose a modest and reasonable fine under Section 25823A1.

You heard the testimony of the

Investigator who responded to a noise complaint that evening. Arrived on the scene at 12:43. He could hear noise and saw patrons in the Summer Garden area which the Board also had an opportunity to review the cell phone video that he captured.

The patrons were apparently watching a sporting event that continued well past midnight. He then met with Mr. Mason and Dr. Hampton who didn't deny the patrons were there after midnight who apparently cleared out after the sporting event wrapped up when the Investigator was in the neighbor's residence.

He reviewed with them their Settlement Agreement and their ABC ABRA license and pointed out that not only the sales have to end but operations have to end at 12 midnight.

While I understand that there may be misunderstanding about that in this instance. As the idiom goes, events of the law is no defense. And by way of comparison, I would point out to the Board that just because you stop serving doesn't mean that you can continue to operate. That's the whole point of having a separate definition under the ABC licenses. By that same

reasoning, then someone could say, well, I've discontinued service at midnight as per my ABC license but I left the TVs on until 5 a.m. so that somebody could, you know, stay until the early hours and carry on, watch a sporting event or something of that nature.

Again, the plain language of their license and the Settlement Agreement provides that operation is to terminate and cease at 12 a.m.

And the other thing that I think is noteworthy is that Mr. Mason testified and Dr. Hampton testified both very credibly but that the TVs stayed on and so I believe it's reasonable to conclude that although service and sale of alcoholic beverage did terminate, that patrons stayed on the scene in the Summer Garden well past the hours of operation. And so for those reasons we would ask that the Board impose, again, a modest fine in this instance.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Thank you.

Dr. Hampton or Mr. Mason, who is going to make the closing statement?

DR. HAMPTON: T will.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Go ahead.

DR. HAMPTON: I would say that, you know, Buddy's DC has been trying to operate within the standards that have been set by ABRA and within our Settlement Agreement.

I would like to point out that there is nowhere in the ABCA code in a Settlement Agreement that specifically and clearly spells out what the definition of operation is.

Now, you know, going through the process that has happened we are very now well aware of what our expectations are moving forward. Again, since that date, we haven't allowed anyone to be out on our Summer Garden past midnight. By even the TVS being on, the patio gates are closed and locked. There's a sign from inside the establishment leading outside that also says, closed. So, people cannot access it.

I would like the Board to please take into consideration and note that we were operating in what we felt was compliance to the Board. We weren't serving alcohol. We weren't serving food. We weren't taking, you know, taking any orders or anything of that nature. We try our best to adhere by what the laws and

regulations are. Signs being posted to people, you know, going forward. We do note that the five people that the patio closes and they will have to, you know, remove themselves from the patio now. And people don't have an issue doing so. They fully understand what the situation is. But, again, I can sully assure you and the Board that you don't have to worry about if we will be back here for the same instance. We've taken steps and have gone through since being made aware of this since that date as far as going about applying for substantial changes until we hopefully get out Settlement Agreement amended so that we are treated the same way as the rest of the establishments on our block.

I would also like to note that even despite the TVs being on, there is no sound being played from the TVs so that doesn't add to any noise.
