The Alcoholic Beverage Control Board met via WebEx videoconference, Chairperson Donovan W. Anderson presiding.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right, our
final calendar event for the morning is a fact
finding hearing for case number 23-251-00003, Air
Restaurant, license number 117404. Mr. Orellana,
can you please elevate the rights of the
licensee, and the licensee's counsel, which is
Andrew Kline, the ABRA investigator, Jeremy
Zollarcoffer, and Sergeant Vernick from MPD,
amongst others please?
MR. ORELLANA: Henock Andargie, your
access has been elevated. That appears to be all
Chairman.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Thank you. Can
everyone please turn their cameras on? I don't
see okay, Mr. Zollarcoffer is there
MR. ZOLLARCOFFER: I'm not sure why
it's not showing me. Can you see me? I see the
background.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: No, I can see
the are you sitting in front of the camera,
sir?
MR. ZOLLARCOFFER: Yeah.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Well, if you're

1	sitting in front of the camera, if I see a
2	background, I should see you. I'm seeing your
3	background, so that tells me that you're not
4	sitting in front of the camera.
5	MR. ZOLLARCOFFER: I'm sitting
6	directly in front of the camera, sir, I'm not
7	sure.
8	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Why don't you
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10	MR. ZOLLARCOFFER: Let me stop the
11	video, I'll try, and stop, and then start.
12	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Yeah, why don't
13	yeah, I mean if I'm seeing your background, I
14	should see you. So, why don't you log off, and
15	log back on, and maybe you will or maybe
16	you're a ghost, that's why we're not seeing you.
17	MR. ZOLLARCOFFER: Not sure where to
18	even find that on the laptop.
19	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: So, why don't
20	you log off, and log back on, sir? And Mr.
21	Orellana can elevate your rights again. Are you
22	still there Mr. Zollarcoffer? Because I'm still
23	seeing your
24	MR. ZOLLARCOFFER: I'm here, sir, I'm
25	just trying to get the video to show. I'm

1	working with Jose right now to see if I can get
2	it to go.
3	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Well, while
4	we're waiting, let's have the parties identify
5	themselves for the record. Let's start with Mr.
6	Kline.
7	MR. KLINE: Yes, good morning. Andrew
8	Kline, A-N-D-R-E-W Kline, K-L-I-N-E, here on
9	behalf of Air.
10	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: And is the
11	licensee here?
12	MR. ANDARGIE: Yes, this is Henock
13	Andargie, owner at Air.
14	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Can you spell
15	your name for the record, please sir?
16	MR. ANDARGIE: Yes, Henock, H-E-N-O-C-
17	K, last name is Andargie, A-N-D-A-R-G-I-E.
18	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Good morning,
19	thank you. I see Sergeant Vernick, I don't see
20	you, but I see you're on the screen. Can you
21	please turn your camera on, and identify yourself
22	for the record please? Mr. Orellana, do you know
23	what's going on with Sergeant Vernick?
24	MR. ORELLANA: Sergeant okay.
25	MR. VERNICK: Sergeant Vernick,

1 Metropolitan Police Department, sorry about that. 2 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right, so 3 can you please spell your name, sir? MR. VERNICK: V as in victory E-R-N-I-4 5 C-K. CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right, 6 7 thank you. Mr. Zollarcoffer, now I can see you, 8 can you please identify yourself for the record 9 please? 10 MR. ZOLLARCOFFER: Yes, sir. Good 11 morning Mr. Chairman, members of the boards, my 12 name is Jeremy Zollarcoffer, it's J-E-R-E-M-Y Z-O-L-L-A-R-C-O-F-F-E-R. 13 14 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right, good 15 morning sir, good morning. All right, Mr. Kline, 16 this is a fact finding hearing, and as you're aware, at a fact finding hearing, the board is 17 18 just collecting information about an event that 19 occurred on December 17th, 2022. The board has 20 not made any determination about what our final 21 action is. 2.2 We're just collecting information.

We're just collecting information. As you are aware, the parties are not under oath, the board cannot order your client to take any specific action, and at the end of this hearing,

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the options that the board has is to either no further action, or just submit this report to the Office of Attorney General for further action.

So, those are where we are.

And so, basically the background, on December 17th, 2022 a verbal altercation inside the establishment led to the ejection of a patron. The ejected patron attempted to reenter the premises, but was rejected. The shooter then leaves the establishment, or the alleged shooter then leaves the establishment, and after getting into a fight with the victim, pulls out a gun, and shoots the suspect.

The report indicates that another person was shot, and that the shooter brandished the weapon towards a group of people. So, I'll have Mr. Zollarcoffer, he can just update the board on the report that he has written. Then it's my understanding that Sergeant Vernick, you're also from MPD, wanted to be here, so you can do your input.

And then Mr. Kline, you can speak on behalf of your clients, and I might have some questions for your client. But we'll see where we are. This is where we are. Any questions

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before we start?

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MR. KLINE: No, sir.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Thank you. Mr. Zollarcoffer, can you just bring us up to date why we're here today, sir?

MR. ZOLLARCOFFER: Sure. So, on
Saturday, December 17th, 2022 at approximately
1:15 a.m. Investigator Zollarcoffer was
monitoring Adams Morgan, and observed several MPD
officers, and Fire Emergency Medical Services
responding to a call for service around the 2400
block of 18th Street Northwest. The incident
became taped off immediately by MPD.

Investigator Zollarcoffer met with MPD 3D Sergeant Dale Vernick, and other on scene MPD officers. MPD advised Investigator Zollarcoffer that there was a shooting that took place, and the victim was laid out on the sidewalk receiving life saving emergency chest compressions.

Investigator Zollarcoffer entered Air Restaurant to assist in gathering any interior, or exterior video surveillance that might have caught the shooting incident on video that took place directly outside of the establishment.

Investigator Zollarcoffer made contact

with ABC Manager Mohaiw Adeen, and informed him of the shooting incident, and that ABRA, and MPD are trying to locate where these two individuals were prior to the incident. While reviewing, and searching video footage inside of Air Restaurant, Investigator Zollarcoffer spoke with the owner, Mr. Henock Andargie, via telephone.

And requested all interior, and exterior video footage of the shooting incident that took place be provided to ABRA within 48 hours of request. On Tuesday, December 20th, 2022, Investigator Zollarcoffer visited Air Restaurant, and met with owner, Mr. Andargie, who provided all video footage as requested.

After review of the video footage,
Investigator Zollarcoffer determined that both
victim, and suspect were inside of Air Restaurant
socializing with each other prior to the shooting
incident. Investigator Zollarcoffer also
determined that the suspect got through the
security pat down search checkpoint, entered Air
Restaurant with a loaded handgun, exited the
establishment, and committed a homicide directly
after walking out the front door of Air
Restaurant.

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I do have some video exhibits to share if I share my screen.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: You can share the video rather than you just reading your report verbatim, just summarize what is it that occurred. But you can show us the video just to bring us -- provide some information. So, Mr. Orellana, can you allow Mr. Zollarcoffer to share his screen please?

MR. ORELLANA: Okay.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Thank you.

MR. ZOLLARCOFFER: One second please.

So, the first, I'll show you Exhibit No. 5.

Exhibit No. 5 is going to show the victim entering the establishment first. Are you able

to see?

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CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Yes, sir.

MR. ZOLLARCOFFER: I'll point him out when he comes up. So, that's him coming up right now. Hold on a second. This is the victim walking up the stairs into Air Restaurant, right here at the curb. This just shows him entering. I'm going to show Exhibit No. 6, it shows the suspect entering Air Restaurant. The suspect being this guy right here with the grey sweater,

and brown Timberland boots.

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The suspect appears to handshake the security, and get pat searched briefly coming in. I have another view of that, him coming up the stairs, which I can show. These are the three others that came in with the suspect. Suspect coming in last right here. Entering Air Restaurant. I'll also show Exhibit No. 7, Exhibit No. 7 shows the alleged aggressor, the victim after the verbal altercation.

Excuse me, I'm going to go to Exhibit No. 4, I apologize. Exhibit No. 4 shows the victim, and suspect socializing inside of Air Restaurant, and then get into a verbal altercation prior to the shooting. Exhibit No. 4. This is the suspect, you'll see the victim walk over here, and kind of join the group here, and get into whatever they're getting into.

It appears this person right here had an issue with the victim first?

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: What person to the --

MR. ZOLLARCOFFER: With the cursor, can you see the cursor?

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Yes.

MR. ZOLLARCOFFER: It appears he got into some type of issue with the victim first, because he kind of, if you can see the body language come. Let me get to the exact point here.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Where was this Mr. Zollarcoffer? Where was this in the establishment?

MR. ZOLLARCOFFER: I believe this is on the second floor summer garden, it's an outdoor, kind of a deck summer garden, I believe so. Words are apparently exchanged, his crew kind of gets up. I think this is where security intervenes, and separates the alleged aggressor. So, they sit back down at approximately -- let me get to the point here, I think 2:45.

So, at this point they had been separated. You'll see security staff come over, and kind of acknowledge, here they are right here, that he's kind of been kicked out, or I'm not sure what the message was relayed at this point, but they exchange a handshake, and I believe that's when he tells him that the other aggressor has been kicked out.

Where was I? So, I'm going to show

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1 Exhibit No. 7, shows the alleged aggressor, 2 victim after the verbal altercation being 3 escorted outside of the establishment by security staff. You'll see him come over, and sit down in 4 5 his chair while he waits for security to make their mind up on whether he's going to be removed 6 7 from the establishment, or not, I believe. 8 This is just another view of when they 9 were initially separated I believe. He sits down in the chair. Security makes their way over to 10 11 him, and this is when they remove him from the establishment. I'll show now Exhibit No. 8. 12 13 Exhibit No. 8 shows the victim attempting to 14 reenter the establishment, but is denied by 15 security at the front door. 16 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: 17 approximately how long after? 18 MR. ZOLLARCOFFER: That he attempted 19 to try, and come back in? 20 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Yes. 21 MR. ZOLLARCOFFER: I believe it was 2.2 immediately. 23 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Okay. MR. ZOLLARCOFFER: He was removed from 2.4 the establishment, and he left his friend, he 25

walked in, I believe with one other. And he was out there by himself trying to get back in after he was just kicked out, and he was denied. So, he kind of sits around here for a few minutes trying to negotiate with the security staff to let him back in, and he's unsuccessful in getting back in.

They talk for awhile. He hangs out there for several minutes, and then kind of walks away, but stays in the immediate area right around here. Next I'll show Exhibit No. 9, shows the suspect exiting the establishment approximately ten minutes later. You'll see him walk by, he leaves pretty quickly, and appears to be by himself walking, and leaving.

He has a black jacket with a hood on, you'll see him pass, and walk down. That's him right there, leaving. Exhibit No. 10 shows the suspect exit the front door of the establishment, walk directly up to the victim on the sidewalk. The two individuals appear to exchange brief words, and then the victim appears to punch the suspect in the face.

The suspect then steps away, reaches into his waistline, pulled out a handgun, and

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fired approximately nine rounds at the victim.

The victim was pronounced dead on the scene by

Dr. Robert Holman, medical director from D.C.

FEMS at approximately 1:40 a.m. That's him

leaving now, they kind of go over to this corner here where the cursor is. That's the victim right there, standing with the black jacket.

That's the suspect standing next to him right here. You see the suspect? I'll let you watch. You'll see the suspect flee going northbound on 18th Street. I'll run it back again. The victim is right here, he appears to punch the suspect first, which creates a separation. The suspect then reaches into his waistline, pulls out a gun, and shoots several rounds, I counted approximately nine rounds.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: So, let's back up a little bit Mr. Zollarcoffer. Now, the shooter, you're saying that -- was the shooter the person who entered the club, and greeted the security guard, and they did a handshake with security, and then he entered the establishment? Was that the person that we're talking about?

I can pull that video back up, but the shooter is

MR. ZOLLARCOFFER:

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That is correct.

the same person as the suspect who --

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: So, when he entered the establishment, he greeted the security by doing a handshake, and then the security did some type of pat down, is that correct?

MR. ZOLLARCOFFER:

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: And so, you're saying then that it would appear that -- well, let me ask you a question. Based on the video that you have, when the suspect exited the

establishment, did it appear that he went to a

That's correct.

car, or did he go directly to the victim?

MR. ZOLLARCOFFER: No, he went directly to the victim. You can see him -- this view that you're looking at, Exhibit No. 10 is the front door of the establishment. So, he walks directly out of the front door, he immediately goes over to this little corner, which is to the left of the entrance if you're walking out, and he gets into some type of additional verbal altercation with the same person he had a problem with upstairs.

And that's when he pulls out his weapon, and shoots him.

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1 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: The question I 2 was trying to ask you, does it appear that the 3 suspect had contact with anyone else after he exited the club -- I'm sorry, the restaurant, 4 5 prior to him interfacing with the victim? 6 MR. ZOLLARCOFFER: Absolutely not, I 7 don't believe that's the case. I believe he had 8 the weapon on him, he walked directly out. 9 don't see anybody pass off any weapon, or anything like that. 10 11 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: So, you're 12 saying that it would appear that the suspect went 13 in the establishment with a weapon, left with a 14 weapon, and then it would appear that without 15 having any other interaction with anyone else 16 outside, that person utilized the weapon to commit a crime, is that what the video would tend 17 18 to show? MR. ZOLLARCOFFER: 19 That's correct, 20 sir. 21 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right, go 2.2 ahead. 23 MR. ZOLLARCOFFER: So, this is my final exhibit, Exhibit No. 10. This basically 2.4 shows the shooter, the suspect leave the 25

1 establishment, re-engage with the person he just 2 had a problem with on the sidewalk directly after walking out the front door. And had -- and 3 committed a shooting, and homicide right out 4 front. So, this is my final exhibit for video 5 exhibits. 6 7 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: You can close 8 your screen, what else do you have to share to 9 summarize your report? 10

MR. ZOLLARCOFFER: That's it, I'm available for any questions, but --

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: But let me ask you a question, based on the report, did you find any potential violation by the establishment?

MR. ZOLLARCOFFER: No, I didn't find any additional violations. They currently have a -- they're a restaurant CR license, they do have a security plan, which is kind of vague. There was a settlement --

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: What does their security plan speak to regarding pat down, what is it that is supposed to occur when someone approaches the establishment? Is that covered in their security plan?

MR. ZOLLARCOFFER: I don't believe so.

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It focuses more on security training, ID checking, making sure -- front door staff must ID check for anyone who reasonably appears less than 21 years old. It goes over procedures for handling intoxicated patrons, conflict resolutions, nothing on the entrance, more on pat searches specific, or any kind of warning, or anything like that.

They do have wands that I've seen upstairs when I went up, and they use them periodically, but nothing is written, or required of them to do it. I know after monitoring -- after the fact of this incident, I did see the following night that they started using hand wands as extra precaution.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Now, let me ask you a question. You said that the security plan talks about conflict resolution. Conflict resolution for whom?

MR. ZOLLARCOFFER: It states right here, if you observe an altercation inside -- I believe this is addressed to their security staff. If you observe an altercation inside of the establishment, you are to attempt to diffuse the situation in a non-aggressive manner, and

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call additional staff for assistance. If the altercation occurs between two parties, firstly, your goal is to separate the two parties.

Then ascertain the aggressor, and escort outside the establishment. If the situation appears to be uncontrollable, security personnel should contact MPD for assistance. I don't believe that they called MPD of any issues, because I don't believe that they were aware that it started in their place, and it happened out on the street.

I think the ShotSpotter was the initial notification that there's been a shooting, and it kind of narrowed it into that area, and that's when they found the victim laying on the sidewalk. And then I teamed up, I asked Sergeant Dale Vernick where should we look? So, immediately I saw that Air had video surveillance, so I said let me see if they were able to catch this video, and they did.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: So, did you have an opportunity to speak to security of the establishment?

MR. ZOLLARCOFFER: No, I didn't. I spoke with ABC manager, I believe there was a

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1 head of security up there, who I spoke with 2 briefly, but no, nothing -- I spoke with the 3 owner, and I spoke with the ABC manager. CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: 4 I quess what 5 I'm trying to find out, were you able to ascertain why did security escort one person out 6 7 of the establishment? MR. ZOLLARCOFFER: I can't confirm 8 9 exactly why, but I believe it was because they got into some type of verbal altercation in the 10 11 summer garden. The victim appeared to be the aggressor, so per their policy, now that I'm 12 13 reading, they escort the alleged aggressor out of the establishment first. 14 15 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: And so, their 16 security plan just says they escort the person 17 out, and that's all? 18 MR. ZOLLARCOFFER: Yeah. 19 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Is there 20 anything else about what is it that they're -- I 21 guess I'm just trying to find out, in the 2.2 security plan itself, it doesn't state what 23 procedures should they follow, they just escort 2.4 the person out, and that's it?

MR. ZOLLARCOFFER:

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Yeah, and if it

becomes uncontrollable to notify MPD, that's more specific. They have a note here for security training, so this security that they have is all trained in house. So, all security personnel will be trained in house on procedures to keep staff, and customers safe. Inside security is responsible for maintaining order, and ensuring the safety of our patrons.

Outside security is responsible to

Outside security is responsible to check Ids, maintaining peace, and order, visibly intoxicated individuals are not to be admitted.

Nothing more specific on entrance, or pat downs in the security plan.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Thank you, Mr. Zollarcoffer. I'm going to ask Sergeant Vernick to add, and then after that the board members can ask questions of the investigator, and the sergeant. Sergeant Vernick, do you have a camera you can turn on sir?

MR. VERNICK: Can you see me?

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: No, I can't see you, sir.

MR. VERNICK: I don't know why it's not turning the camera on. Let me try that.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Okay, now I can

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see you. All right, sir, what is it can you add to this report, sir?

MR. VERNICK: So Jeremy, great briefing, I think you hit the nail right on the head. I responded to a ShotSpotter response, I believe it actually came up on Belmont Street, Belmont Place, generally right across the street about a block away from Air Restaurant. Never had a problem at Air Restaurant before, but once we started looking, I think there was — when we started looking, I believe there was another officer that came over the radio with something about Madam's Organ, and gunshots.

So, we zeroed in on that area, got there. I saw actually two marines attempting life saving measures on the victim of the shooting. I saw shell casings in the general area. We found an additional female victim who had been shot in the leg, I believe. I believe she is to be a wholly innocent victim of errant gunfire.

And also made contact with the owner of Madam's Organ who stated that the shooter had actually threatened him with the gun post the shooting. Like right after the shooting he had

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pointed the gun towards him, and the crowd at Madam's Organ, and then fled north on 18th Street. While I was there, the security guards, and honestly I can't recall if it was the same guy that's in the video.

But they offered no information as to the suspect actually coming out of their club. It was pretty much almost dumb luck that we were able to go to the club, and it wasn't so much me, it was Jeremy, and then it was my supervisors, and the homicide squad that came up. From what I understand, the Air Restaurant was cooperative, and was able to -- I believe they were able to view some video that night.

But within 48 hours were able to get the entirety of the video that they had.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: On an unrelated matter, has the suspect been apprehended, are you aware?

MR. VERNICK: Mr. Anderson, I am not aware of the details of the case. Our violent crimes branch tends to hold most of that information pretty close to themselves. I can't even get into the case files to look on my own. They're very secure files.

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CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right, thank you. Do you have anything else you want to add, sir?

MR. VERNICK: No. I do think the little dap up at the beginning when the suspect entered the club, I think it shows knowledge that he was carrying, and I think just based on body language that maybe the security guard knew he was carrying also, so I'm not really cool with that. But as far as the actual club itself, I don't have a problem with the way they conducted business.

I do have a little issue with the security company, and how they handled the situation.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Thank you, sir.

All right, any questions by the board members of
the investigator, or Sergeant Vernick? Go ahead

Mr. Grandis.

MEMBER GRANDIS: Investigator, in your presenting documents for us today, one of them, and it's been discussed a couple times, was the video of the suspect entering. Did you -- were you able to find a video of the victim entering?

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Yeah, he did

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show us.

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MEMBER GRANDIS: Well, I thought I saw the victim on the second floor, I meant of him entering the establishment like you have for the suspect.

MR. ZOLLARCOFFER: Yeah, so I wasn't provided the front door of the victim walking in. I was able to locate the victim on that first set of steps leading up showing him enter the establishment, but I don't have the front door entrance like I do the shooter.

MEMBER GRANDIS: Thank you. And I think you testified that it's only an opinion that when the suspect left the establishment he seemed to go towards where the victim was, as opposed to going to a car, or another location, and coming back, did I hear that correctly?

MR. ZOLLARCOFFER: That's correct. On Exhibit No. 10 you can see the suspect leave directly out of the front door, and walk directly over to the victim.

MEMBER GRANDIS: I think the Chairman mentioned, and I just want to highlight, I didn't see any video, and because once again, it's a long night, I'm not asking to see all of it, but

it does clearly seem, at least in appearance, that the security guard who patted down the suspect before they did the pat down, they did a handshake.

And I wonder if you observe, was that characteristic of the security guard giving most people hand checks as they came in, or you did not really have a chance to observe that on video, or directly?

MR. ZOLLARCOFFER: No, I don't believe that to be a common scenario. I believe that either he knew them prior, or some type of -- maybe he recognized him in that kind of nature. But no, it seemed to me that the suspect walked up like hey, take it easy on me, we good? And gives him a handshake, and then the security guard goes through with his pat search.

MEMBER GRANDIS: So, I would say from what you just stated that you would concur with what the police officer has testified to, that from his knowledge of the scene, that the security guard, and the suspect seemed to acknowledge each other, and also I thought he said that he was concerned about the pat down itself.

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1 MR. ZOLLARCOFFER: It appeared to be 2 that way. I'm not sure what the words were exchanged, but I certainly didn't see him get his 3 ID checked like other patrons walking in on the 4 5 video that was provided me. Thank you for adding MEMBER GRANDIS: 6 7 that, that's helpful. MR. ZOLLARCOFFER: The video that was 8 9 provided doesn't show him being IDed as well. 10 MEMBER GRANDIS: Did you have a chance 11 to inquire with the establishment to interview 12 the security quard in question? 13 MR. ZOLLARCOFFER: I think the night 14 of, I did request to speak with him, but by the 15 time we got upstairs, MPD, and others to search 16 the video, when I asked where he was, I don't believe he was there. The head of security was 17 18 out front, so I think that's what delayed it. And then after the fact I didn't make contact 19 20 with the security guard to get any further 21 details on what was said, or anything at the 2.2 front door. 23 Just for clarity, you MEMBER GRANDIS: 2.4 said that when you were looking with the

establishment for some video, that the security

guard was not visible to you, and you were told he was doing carding at the front door, or had he left? I was just trying to make sure I understood what you said.

MR. ZOLLARCOFFER: I can't confirm either way. I just don't believe that he was available, maybe he had left, I don't recall exactly. I remember him not being able to speak for some reason, maybe he was handling something else. I was more so trying to see whether, or not these two were inside, and what happened at that point. Because at that point we didn't even know if the two parties were inside of Air, and we were trying to establish that first.

MEMBER GRANDIS: Prior to you being assigned to do the investigation, had you ever done a visit to that establishment while working?

MR. ZOLLARCOFFER: I've never done -I'm familiar with the establishment. I never did
an official regulatory inspection of the
establishment, but I am familiar with the
restaurant, and it being there, and them coming
on the scene in 2021, I was familiar with the
establishment.

MEMBER GRANDIS: And in your report,

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1 what did you find regarding past violations? 2 MR. ZOLLARCOFFER: Not many, not many 3 at all. They're fairly new, they had one settlement agreement violation, I believe. 4 5 me double check here. At the time the case was written, they had one violation on February 5th, 6 2022 for failure to follow settlement agreement, 7 and the board requested a warning. 8 9 MEMBER GRANDIS: Thank you. Mr. 10 Chairman, thank you very much. 11 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Thank you, Mr. 12 Grandis. Any other questions by any other board 13 Mr. Kline, anything? members? 14 MR. KLINE: Thank you, Mr. Chairman. 15 Good afternoon, Investigator Zollarcoffer, I hope 16 I pronounced your name correctly. 17 MR. ZOLLARCOFFER: That's correct. 18 MR. KLINE: So, the security footage 19 also has audio, correct? 20 The one video. MR. ZOLLARCOFFER: 21 Exhibit No. 10 is the only one that was provided 2.2 with audio, I believe that's their Ring system on 23 the front door, which is separate. So, that was 2.4 the one that was able to provide video, and why

you were able to hear the gunshots.

1 So, you don't have any MR. KLINE: 2 knowledge as to what was exchanged between the 3 security guard who did the pat down, and the 4 suspect, do you? 5 MR. ZOLLARCOFFER: No, I'm not sure. 6 MR. KLINE: It's pure speculation, 7 isn't it? MR. ZOLLARCOFFER: Yeah, I'm not sure. 8 9 Just off of their body language, on how they kind 10 of initially engaged, but to know exactly what 11 was said, I don't know for sure. 12 MR. KLINE: So, if the two knew each 13 other, and the suspect did not have a weapon, and 14 we'll get to whether he did, or not in a minute, 15 but if they knew each other, would the body 16 language have been any different? I'm not sure, I'm 17 MR. ZOLLARCOFFER: 18 not sure that they do know each other. It just 19 appeared that there was an acknowledgment prior 20 to the pat down, that hey, I don't know what was 21 said. But it appeared that there was some type of communication prior to the pat down, and he 2.2 23 went in for his slight pat of the inside of the 2.4 jacket. Nothing more than that.

MR. KLINE:

So, I mean I think we can

1 conclude that they probably knew each other from 2 what we saw in the video, right? 3 MR. ZOLLARCOFFER: 4 MR. KLINE: No? 5 MR. ZOLLARCOFFER: I mean it's all speculation like you had referred to. There's no 6 7 way to know whether, or not they knew each other, 8 or not. 9 MR. KLINE: So, if they didn't know 10 each other, what would be your theory as to why 11 it was they related to each other in the way that we saw in the video? 12 MR. ZOLLARCOFFER: Kind of similar to 13 14 when you enter an establishment, and you don't 15 want the security guard to go overboard on the 16 pat search, because they might find something. 17 MR. KLINE: So, your position is you 18 think that the security guards habitually don't 19 do their job simply because an entering patron 20 suggested they shouldn't? 21 MR. ZOLLARCOFFER: No. 2.2 MR. KLINE: I'm a little confused then 23 as to what it is that you're saying with respect 2.4 to what you believe went on between those two 25 people.

1	MR. ZOLLARCOFFER: I'm not exactly
2	sure what went on, I'm just sharing
3	MR. KLINE: Fact of the matter is you
4	don't know.
5	MR. ZOLLARCOFFER: I'm sharing the
6	video of the entrance of the suspect walking in
7	who doesn't appear to be IDed, and is pat
8	searched very lightly, and there's an exchange of
9	a handshake prior to the pat search, so I'm just
10	adding the three up, and providing this
11	information to the board.
12	MR. KLINE: Now, did the suspect to
13	you look like he was under 21 years of age?
14	MR. ZOLLARCOFFER: Very possibly could
15	have been.
16	MR. KLINE: That wasn't my question,
17	whether he possibly could have been. My question
18	is did he appear to you to look like he was under
19	21 years of age?
20	MR. ZOLLARCOFFER: I can't confirm.
21	But an ID check would have confirmed.
22	MR. KLINE: That's not my question.
23	You've seen the video?
24	MR. ZOLLARCOFFER: Yes.
25	MR. KLINE: Do you have an opinion as

1	to how old you think he is?
2	MR. ZOLLARCOFFER: No, I don't.
3	MR. KLINE: None at all? How long
4	have you been an ABC investigator?
5	MR. ZOLLARCOFFER: Four years.
6	MR. KLINE: What did you do before
7	that?
8	MR. ZOLLARCOFFER: I've been in law
9	enforcement for 15 years.
10	MR. KLINE: For 15 years. You're
11	telling me you've been in law enforcement for 15
12	years, and you have no opinion as to how old you
13	think that person is?
14	MR. ZOLLARCOFFER: Would he be 21?
15	Possibly, very possibly, but you never know,
16	these kids, sometimes 19, they look older Mr.
17	Kline. There's no way you can tell unless you
18	ID, unless they knew each other.
19	MR. KLINE: All right, and if they
20	knew each other, it's quite possible that the
21	security guard knew that he was over 21, correct?
22	MR. ZOLLARCOFFER: If that's the case.
23	MR. KLINE: So, if that were the case,
24	would there be any need to ID him at that point?
25	MR. ZOLLARCOFFER: I think it's good

practice to ID people. Especially, so that would mean he knew the woman in front of him, the security knew him, and the person following. He didn't ID any of the group that walked in with him.

MR. KLINE: Okay, so in your experience, don't these security guards repeatedly work at the same establishment, or indeed work at establishments around town?

MR. ZOLLARCOFFER: That's correct.

MR. KLINE: And it wouldn't be unusual for them to get to know people that frequent the particular establishment that they're working, or perhaps other establishments around town that the individuals frequent, that wouldn't be unusual, would it?

MR. ZOLLARCOFFER: Sure, that could be common practice. But like when even Sergeant Dale Vernick went to go ask whether, or not he knew this person entering, the head of security who was there denied, or didn't know the person, saying I don't know who.

MR. KLINE: Okay, but the head of security was not the person that had the exchange with the suspect, was it?

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1	MR. ZOLLARCOFFER: I'm not sure.
2	Maybe Sergeant Vernick can speak to that, but
3	MR. KLINE: We'll get there in a
4	minute. I'm asking what you know at this point.
5	So, it's reasonable to presume that a security
6	guard who regularly works in front of night life
7	establishments might know some of the patrons,
8	right?
9	MR. ZOLLARCOFFER: Absolutely.
10	MR. KLINE: And if a security guard
11	working in front of this establishment, or who
12	commonly worked in front of other night life
13	establishments saw somebody they knew, then it
14	wouldn't be unusual for them to do a hand check,
15	or handshake, would it?
16	MR. ZOLLARCOFFER: Right, exactly.
17	MR. KLINE: It was a greeting, wasn't
18	it?
19	MR. ZOLLARCOFFER: It appeared that he
20	did know him, yes, and that he was allowing him
21	in.
22	MR. KLINE: Okay, he was allowing them
23	in. But he then proceeds to pat him down,
24	correct?
25	MR. ZOLLARCOFFER: Right.

1 MR. KLINE: And you're saying that 2 there's something different in the way that he 3 was patted down than others that you observed on video entering the establishment, the way they 4 5 were patted down? Well, he only went 6 MR. ZOLLARCOFFER: 7 for the inside of the jacket. He didn't really 8 go around the back of the waistband, he certainly 9 didn't go down the pant leg, or was there any wand out there. So, to me, it's kind of a 10 11 generic pat down, along with a handshake, and he 12 was allowed into the establishment. 13 MR. KLINE: Okay. Now, you watched a lot of video with respect to this incident, 14 15 correct? 16 MR. ZOLLARCOFFER: I watched the video 17 that was provided, and you're able to see as 18 well. 19 MR. KLINE: Okay, and were you 20 provided all the video that you requested? 21 MR. ZOLLARCOFFER: Yes, Mr. Henock --2.2 Andargie, sorry sir. Yeah, he gave me -- he knew 23 what I was looking for. He knew that there was a 2.4 shooting, he knew that somebody had been murdered 25 out front, and he was very helpful in getting me

1 specific video so I can try to see who shot this 2 person, and who was killed, and who was the 3 suspect. So, he gathered it together, and it was 4 very helpful. 5 He included both suspect, and victim entering, exiting, the shooting, the front door, 6 7 So, the video you see now is all that's 8 been provided to me. 9 Okay, and you didn't see MR. KLINE: on any of the video, there's no video that shows 10 11 the suspect with the weapon inside the establishment? 12 13 MR. ZOLLARCOFFER: No, it was -- no. I mean it was hidden. 14 15 MR. KLINE: Okay, so based on what you 16 concluded, and based on what we've seen in the 17 video, it appears that the suspect exited the 18 establishment with the weapon, correct? 19 MR. ZOLLARCOFFER: That's right. 20 MR. KLINE: All right, but we don't 21 have any way of knowing whether it may have been 2.2 transferred to him by someone else within the 23 establishment when he was in there, do we? MR. ZOLLARCOFFER: I mean there's a 2.4 25 million scenarios.

MR. KLINE: Right, there are, aren't 1 2 there? 3 MR. ZOLLARCOFFER: But it appears that 4 he came in with a weapon, and exited with a 5 weapon. 6 MR. KLINE: And you say he came in 7 with the weapon because of the video covering the 8 pat down, is that the only evidence of that? 9 MR. ZOLLARCOFFER: I'm just going off the fact that he exited the establishment, walked 10 11 directly out front. So, somebody entered the 12 establishment, he walked out -- excuse me, he 13 left the establishment, and shot this guy 14 directly after walking out the front door. weapon was passed through. 15 16 MR. KLINE: Right, but we don't really 17 know how it got into the establishment, correct? 18 MR. ZOLLARCOFFER: It appears that 19 this suspect brought it in with him. 20 MR. KLINE: And the appearance of that 21 is based on what, solely on the pat down video, 2.2 or was there other evidence of that? 23 Well, the pat down MR. ZOLLARCOFFER: 2.4 video of him entering, and then him exiting, and 25 shooting, and killing somebody right out front.

1	MR. KLINE: Right, but exiting, and
2	entering are two different acts, right?
3	MR. ZOLLARCOFFER: That's correct.
4	MR. KLINE: If you walk out of a place
5	with something, it doesn't necessarily mean you
6	walked in with it, does it? You said there are a
7	million scenarios as to what might have happened,
8	and how it is that he walked out of that
9	establishment with a weapon, right?
LO	MR. ZOLLARCOFFER: Right, so I'm
1	assuming on the information that was given to me
L2	that he entered the establishment with a gun.
L3	Whether, or not
L4	MR. KLINE: I get that, and I'm trying
L5	to get at the basis for your assumption.
L6	MR. ZOLLARCOFFER: The video that was
L7	provided, that's my basis.
8	MR. KLINE: But there's nothing else,
L9	it's just the video that was provided?
20	MR. ZOLLARCOFFER: Right. Do you
21	agree that he left the establishment, and shot
22	somebody on the sidewalk?
23	MR. KLINE: I get to ask the questions
24	today investigator, I apologize, but that's the
25	way this works.

MR. ZOLLARCOFFER: No, I understand that, but you're trying to paint the picture that it possibly was passed off, but do you agree that this person walked out, and shot, and killed, somebody is dead?

MR. KLINE: Look, I fully appreciate that, and the establishment fully appreciates that, and it's tragic, and it's sad, and there isn't any question about that, let's be clear about that, and I'll get to that when I get an opportunity to address that.

MR. ZOLLARCOFFER: Let's be very clear.

MR. KLINE: Now, in terms of conflict resolution procedures, we talked a little bit about that when you were talking earlier. The establishment followed their conflict resolution procedures with respect to the exchange between the suspect, and the victim, correct?

MR. ZOLLARCOFFER: Yeah, I believe so. Initially, the verbal altercation that happened in the summer garden, the two were separated, security made the decision that he was the aggressor, and they kicked him out. So, per their security agreement, they did follow that

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1 part. 2 Okay. And you said that MR. KLINE: you're familiar with this establishment? You may 3 not have been assigned to investigate there 4 5 previously, but you are familiar with it, 6 correct? 7 MR. ZOLLARCOFFER: Yeah, I know that 8 they came on the scene, their initial license was issued October 27th, 2021. 9 MR. KLINE: Okay, and in your previous 10 11 knowledge, did you have an opportunity to observe 12 the way that they handle their entrance 13 procedures, and their other security protocols? 14 MR. ZOLLARCOFFER: No. I just know 15 that they had a security presence out front, and 16 they do their pat searches, and sometimes they 17 have a wand, sometimes they don't. 18 MR. KLINE: Okay. Mr. Chairman, 19 that's all the questions I have of the 20 investigator. I have one, or two for Detective 21 Vernick. 2.2 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: If he's still 23 there, you're welcome to go ahead, and ask

questions, he should still be there. Sergeant

Vernick?

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1 MR. KLINE: Sergeant Vernick, good 2 afternoon. 3 MR. VERNICK: How are you doing? Ts my video going? 4 5 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Yes, sir. MR. KLINE: Yes, thank you very much, 6 Now, you said that it was 7 Good afternoon. ves. 8 your impression that the security guard had 9 knowledge that the suspect had a weapon? MR. VERNICK: I would say based off my 10 11 25 plus years of law enforcement experience in 12 reading body language, that it appeared to me 13 that the security guard, and the suspect of the 14 homicide knew each other, and that an improper 15 pat down search was conducted. Let's call it a 16 pat down search for the camera was conducted. which point, obviously I don't think either party 17 18 knew that there was going to be a homicide 19 shortly thereafter. 20 But I do, based off the body language 21 of the two, it does appear that the security guard allowed a firearm into the establishment. 2.2 23 So, it's your conclusion MR. KLINE: 2.4 based on that video, based on body language in 25 that video that that security guard knowingly

1 violated his obligation, and allowed a weapon 2 into the establishment? MR. VERNICK: Obviously I don't have 3 any audio to confirm that, but based off my 4 experience dealing with human interaction, it 5 appears that the security quard absolutely knew 6 7 that he was allowing contraband into that 8 establishment. 9 MR. KLINE: And you base that upon what, the fact that they seem to know each other? 10 11 MR. VERNICK: Yeah, and the mediocre 12 at best pat down. I'm the close zone sergeant 13 for the U Street Corridor, I don't necessarily 14 work in the Adams Morgan area, but I do see pat 15 down searches, several hundred a night, and that 16 was one of the worst I have ever seen. 17 MR. KLINE: All right, I have no 18 further questions at this time. Thank you. 19 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Ι 20 have some questions for the owner, Mr. Kline, is 21 he going to speak? Yeah, he will, but I'd 2.2 MR. KLINE: 23 like to at least make some sort of opening in 2.4 terms of where we are, and why we're here before

we do that.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Go ahead.

MR. KLINE: Yes. I do want to say that two lives are potentially shattered, one has ended, and presumably if the suspect has been apprehended, or is apprehended, he's going to be spending a long time in prison. So, it's -- we share that it is just unbelievably tragic, and horrific that are out on a Saturday night, and this is the result.

There isn't any question about that, and I don't want that to get lost here. I know why we're here. But I don't want that to get lost. I mean it's just unbelievable that that's where we are. And it's also unbelievable, as Mr. Grandis indicated in an earlier hearing, that we seem to have incidents like this weekly. Whether they be guns, or knives, or other weapons, and it's just -- I don't know how we got here, but we're here.

And people like Mr. Andargie, and other operators have to deal with this, and in those cases do what they can, and do the best that they can to deal with this. When we approach these fact findings, as the board knows, and I've said this many, many times before, we

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think the goal here, there are a few things that we're doing here. One is what happened? Two is what did we do right?

Three is what did we do wrong? And four is how can we do better? And the four is the forward looking, and it's what did we learn, what can we do better. So, in this case I want the board to know unequivocally that going forward, and actually it's already started, that there is wanding for everything other than corporate events closed to the public.

The security plan will be amended, and will be submitted to the board, which will contain that change. The only reason we didn't do it previously is that we wanted to be before you, and see if there were other items in the security plan that we may want to address, and strengthen. One of those, from what we've heard, and this will be done, will be to strengthen the section of the security plan that deals with conflict resolution.

Because I think that that was focused on, and I think it's appropriate that that be fixed. The wanding is already being done, as I said, we'll submit an amended security plan, but

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there are a lot of guns, and weapons in this town, and this country now, and it's very, very tragic, and it's unfortunate. As I said, two lives are going to end up being shattered, and one ended as a result of this horrific event.

And I make Mr. Andargie available for any questions that you might have.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Thank you, Mr. Kline. I've been on this board for seven, and a half years now, and this is the first time I've actually seen the video, this is just not about the establishment, we've seen the video of two individuals that you know that it's not going to end right, and it's somewhat troubling for me, and this is not about the establishment.

So, I'm not blaming the establishment, it's just that watching this video was somewhat traumatic for me, because you now know the ending, and that's somewhat upsetting for me unfortunately.

MR. KLINE: I mean, I don't think any of us would be human members of a civilized society if we were not very disturbed by what we witnessed in those videos.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right, so

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1 Mr. Andargie, how many people were working 2 security that night? And before, what security 3 company do you utilize? MR. ANDARGIE: We have in house 4 5 security. CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: You have in 6 7 house security? 8 MR. ANDARGIE: We don't have the 9 security outsourced. 10 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: So, are the 11 security employees personal employees of your 12 establishment? 13 MR. ANDARGIE: Yes, sir. 14 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: And so, 15 typically how many security officers do you have? 16 This is a Saturday night, so what are your --17 you're a restaurant, you have a restaurant 18 license, so what are your hours of operation? 19 MR. ANDARGIE: On Friday, 5:00 p.m. 20 until 3:00 a.m., and then on Saturday it's 11:00 21 a.m. until 3:00 a.m., and then on Sunday it's 2.2 11:00 a.m. until 10:00 p.m. 23 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: And your 2.4 kitchen operates until what time on Friday, and 25 Saturday?

1 MR. ANDARGIE: Friday, and Saturday it's roughly about 11:30 p.m. We have a late 2 night menu that somewhat continues until 1:00 3 a.m. depending on how busy we are. 4 5 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: And so what happens -- so, tell me about what happens in your 6 7 business model -- tell me about what happens in 8 your establishment say between 11:00 p.m. to 9 closing, tell me what's the environment like? 11:00 p.m. until 10 MR. ANDARGIE: 11 closing, people are still -- it just turns into 12 more of people just having drinks, or meeting, 13 staying after dinner, and just listening to music 14 primarily. 15 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Do you have a 16 dance floor? 17 MR. ANDARGIE: We don't really have a 18 dance floor. We have an area for dancing, but 19 it's not a dance area at all. CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Prior to asking 20 21 -- the investigator, and Sergeant Vernick 2.2 testified, I asked all board members do they have 23 any questions of the two witnesses. And prior to 2.4 having Mr. Kline asked questions, I asked all 25 board members if they had questions.

MEMBER SHORT: No.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Yes, Mr. Short,
I asked questions, and that is why Mr. --

MEMBER SHORT: Mr. Chair, if I possibly could, and I think that everything would be born out if you look at the rolls, you may have thought you asked after the sergeant testified. The Attorney Kline made some comments, and then you moved directly to something else. No one was asked from the board to ask questions of Sergeant Vernick, if I'm not mistaken, and I could be.

But I believe that I missed -- because I waited for the opportunity to question Sergeant Vernick, which I understand you probably will give us a chance to now, but I don't remember you stating on the record does any board member have questions for Sergeant Vernick. Thank you Mr. Chair.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: I specifically stated after I questioned the investigator, and Sergeant Vernick, as I said, that board members may ask specific questions of Mr. Zollarcoffer, and I specifically stated that after Sergeant Vernick testified, board members would have an

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1	opportunity to ask questions. And Mr. Grandis
2	asked questions of both. You elected not to.
3	But I'll give you an opportunity, sir. I'll give
4	you an opportunity.
5	MEMBER SHORT: I do thank you, Mr.
6	Chair.
7	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right, sir,
8	so tell me about so, you're saying what
9	type of endorsements do you have on your license,
10	sir?
11	MR. ANDARGIE: We have the
12	entertainment endorsement. We have the summer
13	garden endorsement, we have, I believe that's
14	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Do you have a
15	cover charge?
16	MR. ANDARGIE: No, we don't have a
17	cover charge but we have the permission do that
18	on our license as well.
19	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: So, on that
20	night how many people were working security?
21	MR. ANDARGIE: We had nine on that
22	night.
23	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: So, tell me the
24	placement of security, so how many people were
25	working in the interior, and how many people were

working outside?

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MR. ANDARGIE: For that night, depending on the time of night, we have at least two to three individuals on the front area, and then we have people on -- there's nobody on -- we don't have the first floor, so it's primarily just the second floor, and then a mezzanine on that second floor that leads to the outdoor summer garden. So, we have --

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Okay.

MR. ANDARGIE: So, we have three essentially on that exterior front part. And then we have the rest on the main floor, which is the second floor of the space, and then we have additional security on the mezzanine, as well as one on the outdoor portion.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: And so what is your occupancy as per your ABC license?

MR. ANDARGIE: Let me pull that out, it's 250 I believe.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: not your certificate of occupancy, but on your ABC license, your ABC license is 250?

MR. ANDARGIE: Yes, I believe it does say 250, I will double check right now. It's

1 actually, our capacity is 300, but our settlement 2 agreement is 250. CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: 3 All right, thank you. So, what is the admissions process to 4 5 -- you said you're in late night, so you're a restaurant, so we're now talking about late 6 7 night, say maybe 10:00, 11:00, what's the 8 admissions process to enter the establishment? 9 MR. ANDARGIE: The process is ID, then followed by a pat down search. This was at that 10 11 time, now we have added the wanding as well. 12 that's essentially the intake procedure for when 13 people arrive at the front door. We first check 14 their IDs, then we do a pat down search. 15 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: So, how would 16 you describe -- so, who does the training for 17 security? 18 The head of security, MR. ANDARGIE: 19 which is Wolford Perry. 20 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Was that the 21 person who did the pat down in the video? 2.2 MR. ANDARGIE: No, it's not. 23 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Now, so would 2.4 you consider the pat down that was done at the front door, was that appropriate? 25

1	MR. ANDARGIE: It was I'm not
2	really a person that is in the security business,
3	so I don't necessarily know what is considered
4	proper, per se. But of course I would like a
5	more thorough search in the future, and that's
6	how we and usually how people are searched a
7	little bit more, I guess involved, as far as like
8	but he did have a lot of winter clothing on as
9	well.
10	So, there is that. So, I would
11	prefer, of course, a more thorough search, yes.
12	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Now, does this
13	individual, the person who was working the door
14	during the night in question, is this person
15	still employed by the establishment?
16	MR. ANDARGIE: I believe he still is,
17	but not at the front door, intake area.
18	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: So, do you know
19	whether, or not the victim, and the shooter, do
20	you know whether, or not they were regular
21	patrons at your establishment, or were they known
22	to your establishment?
23	MR. ANDARGIE: I am not positive as to
24	how regular they were as far as patrons. I
25	believe the one, the suspect was has

frequented there before.

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CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Now, did you have an opportunity to speak to your security about the -- about what occurred for them to escort one individual out, do you know what happened?

MR. ANDARGIE: From my understanding, I believe the person that ended up being the victim was being loud, and they were just essentially being irate about something. But was asked, and he seemed very calm when he was asked to leave the place. And I think in the video it shows that he comes over to the other side of the outdoor area, and he waits as security escorts him out of the space.

But he was viewed as the person that was the aggressor at that point.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: I don't know what I saw on that video. I saw a bunch of people standing around, and I saw people had money in their hands, and then I saw someone came over, and then -- so, what was going on for your security to determine that this person's the aggressor, for them to escort the person out?

Because I'm seeing --

MR. ANDARGIE: He was, from my understanding, he was yelling, or his voice was being heard in an aggressive tone, so he was asked to leave at that point. And that's when they -- essentially security saw that something might be bubbling, at which point they separated that individual from that area.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: So, what is your procedure for escorting someone out of the property? Tell me from beginning to end, what's the procedure?

MR. ANDARGIE: The procedure is, when there's a verbal -- depending on if it's a verbal, or physical altercation, this one was a verbal altercation. So, the parties were separated. One individual was with one security person, that was viewed as the aggressor. They talked to him, he seemed to be compliant, and we waited for another security member to help escort this individual to the bottom floor.

And he was followed down the stairs with two security people, and there was one at the top of the stairs.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: But, so when someone is escorted out, are they escorted out,

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and left at the front door, and then turned back, or what happens? That's what I'm trying to find out.

MR. ANDARGIE: Yeah, so it was viewed as just a verbal altercation, and the guy just was escorted outside the space. It wasn't necessarily viewed as a very -- it wasn't a physical altercation, it wasn't anything of the sort, where it was something where we had to address, or call police for. It was just an argument that we asked the individual, and they seemed to be familiar with each other, I believe.

So, we just asked that individual to be escorted out of the space.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: And the video showed that he tried to get back in the space?

MR. ANDARGIE: Yes, sir.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: And the video also showed that he was not allowed back in the space, but he still was hanging around the front. I mean is this, do we -- I know that it's public space, but is this typically what we do? I mean are you allowed to ask the person to move along from the -- I'm just asking, because in this particular case he tried to get back in, and he

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was still hanging out at the front of your business.

MR. ANDARGIE: From my understanding, I don't believe we have the right to do that, and I think sometimes that might escalate a certain situation, if you tell somebody you're not allowed to be in front of the space, or business. So, sometimes that is something that we don't necessarily have control of.

MR. KLINE: If I could jump in here, and I'll defer to Sergeant Vernick, but I mean, I think they can ask that they move along, but after that --

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: I was just asking what is it that the club normally does. Because here it is that you escort someone out, and that the person attempted to get back in, and so the person's still hanging around. So, I'm just trying to figure out what it is that they do. Because you clearly have an altercation that occurred inside.

You place someone outside, and they're trying to get back in, and they're still hanging out there, so there's a potential for something to happen, because the person, this individual

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didn't just say okay, fine, I'm leaving, and just leave the area. The question I'm asking, and I don't know who, I mean does it appear to you, sir, that a weapon was brought inside based on the video that we've seen?

Does it appear to you that a weapon was brought inside of your establishment?

MR. ANDARGIE: I'm not sure if there was a weapon brought inside the establishment, but it's certainly possible.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Because the shooter came into your establishment, and the shooter left your establishment, and it doesn't appear that there was any interaction with anyone else outside the establishment before the shooter shot the person. So, it would tend to show that the shooter got access -- if he did not enter the establishment with a gun, that at some point he was able to have, or to get a weapon inside the establishment for him to come out, and shoot someone.

I guess what I'm just saying, based on the chain I'd ask whether, or not when the shooter exited the establishment, did he have any interaction with anyone else, did he go to his

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car? But it would appear that he just came out of your establishment, went to the victim, had some type of contact, and then immediately shot.

So, I guess what I'm saying, it would appear that someone got into your establishment with a weapon.

MR. ANDARGIE: Yes, it appears.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: And I guess moving forward, if you eject someone from the establishment, and they're still hanging around the establishment after the ejection, what is it that you think that your establishment can do?

MR. ANDARGIE: As far as what we can do is, I guess trying to tell the individual -- to be honest with you, I'm not sure if our staff had told him to move along, or not. But he was denied entry, and he seemed to drift away from the field of view, so I don't know how far necessarily we can ask him to leave the space, or leave the area.

Because in some instances there are people that have friends inside, or somebody has significant others, or something along those lines. So, there is some limitations in the practicality of what we can say to them, as far

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as legally what we can as well. So, I just -- we can just -- I don't know where else we can go with it as soon as they're outside of the space, as far as directing them, or asking them to do certain things.

MR. KLINE: Mr. Chair, if I may, I'm going to recommend that we put in the security plan that individuals that are escorted from the establishment be asked to leave the area, and told if they don't leave the area that MPD will be contacted. Now, I'm not saying we're going to contact MPD every single time, because that may not be warranted, and that's a judgement call.

But asking them to leave the area, and saying that MPD will be contacted may have the effect of getting most people to move along. And if they don't, then I think a decision has to be made by trained security at that point as to what to do next, in terms of whether it's warranted to call MPD at that point.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Fine, thank you, you know we can't order you to do anything, but you have volunteered to add the security plan, so that a legally sufficient security plan be provided to the agency within 30 days, that it

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1 will address wanding, it will address conflict 2 resolution, and as you stated, if someone is escorted outside the establishment, the 3 procedures that the security will follow to 4 5 advise the person to the extent that they're able to advise them to move along. 6 7 All right, Mr. Short, you can have an 8 opportunity to ask questions of Sergeant Vernick, 9 and you can also ask questions of the licensee. 10 MEMBER SHORT: Thank you very much, 11 this is for Sergeant Vernick, if he's still with 12 us, Mr. Chair? 13 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: He's still on the line, sir. 14 15 MEMBER SHORT: Hello Sergeant Vernick, 16 thank you for your service to our city. How many 17 years have you served in public safety in MPD? 18 MR. VERNICK: I'm been with MPD coming 19 up on 20 years here in July, and a total of 25 20 years in law enforcement, plus a bachelor's 21 degree in criminal justice. 2.2 MEMBER SHORT: Thank you so very much 23 for your service, and all you bring to the city. 2.4 So, your testimony will be very important to me,

and to our board regarding this situation.

you said something about your responsibilities with night life in the vicinity of that area, or some part of the city, can you briefly explain to us again what that is?

MR. VERNICK: Yes, sir. I am a sergeant out of the third district. My primary role is I runt eh night life unit, which essentially covers the U Street Corridor. U Street one, or two blocks north, or south from 14th down to 9th, to include the 1900 block of 9th Street, and we even kind of kick that over towards Georgia Avenue, because some newer clubs have moved slightly out of that area.

So, I run a team of about 12 officers, and they are highly trained in dealing with everything from violent crime, to bar fights, to helping out some of our regulators with ABRA, and the fire department. Also I deal with a lot of the traffic control officers, DPW, tow cranes, all that for the night life task force.

MEMBER SHORT: Okay, that sounds like you've really got your hands full, and that you are quite apt at dealing with it, and giving this board some information that might help us make the appropriate recommendations we're going to

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make after this hearing. On this particular area, on 18th Street, let's just say on your beat period, in the third district with night life.

Has weapons inside of clubs, or inside of the establishments with ABC licenses, how would you describe that now versus five years ago?

MR. VERNICK: So, I have only been a night life sergeant for about four years. I will say that since the task force, the task force that I'm part of came into effect back in June with multi government agencies, I want to say just during the hours of our task force while we're working, I think my last count was 59 firearms, and that's been in the last, let's call it nine, ten months of working.

MEMBER SHORT: So, just firearms alone, 59, how about knives, or other weapons, or what could be considered to be a weapon that could injure a person inside of an ABC establishment? You said 59 guns, what about other weapons, knives, and this is double layered. So, the 59 guns, and whatever you're going to give us about knives, and other offensive weapons.

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What has been your vision of how we stop this? Thank you.

MR. VERNICK: Mr. Short, honestly, thank you for asking. So, honestly, knives are not illegal in the District of Columbia.

Generally if someone's trying to enter a club with a knife, it has been my experience that if caught by security, security will either take it, and whether they get it back afterwards, I'm not sure, and, or tell people to return it to their vehicles.

I have only had maybe one, or two serious crimes committed with knives. Do get a little pepper spray here, and there that comes into the clubs. But the majority of our violent crimes stems from firearms, and like I said, during the task force hours of operation, since June time frame, we've gotten 59 firearms during our regular tours of duty out of the U Street Corridor.

Not necessarily in clubs, but right in that immediate area. So, gun violence particularly, has, I believe picked up dramatically throughout the city. So, what I see in the U Street Corridor is most of the clubs do

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some kind of wanding procedure. But what then happens is people don't leave their guns at home, they leave them in their cars. Now we deal with a lot of thefts from auto, and then people breaking into cars.

Not necessarily looking for money, phones, laptops, whatever, but they're looking strictly for guns, and they're getting them, we get several a week.

MEMBER SHORT: Okay, now nationally, as well as locally, which we're talking about today, guns have seemed to be just a terrible problem. This is my better than 8th year with the ABC board, besides my years as public safety with other agencies in the district government, and I am established at the number of guns inside of nightclubs in the District of Columbia within the last eight years, or so.

Especially within the last three to four years. Are there any recommendations that you as an MPD sergeant with the task force would say to an owner of any night club, or any ABC establishment in the district that might help situations like the one we are here having the hearing about today?

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MR. VERNICK: Yeah, Mr. Short, I'd like all the owners, because I know that this is on public record, to know that I'm available. I can be reached via email through my government email system, dale.vernick@dc.gov, at any time, and I would be more than happy to do a one on one with them, and talk to them about security. Talk to them about their security plan, cameras, magnetometers.

I think wanding is okay, I think it's a stop gap. I think legit magnetometers like you would see at an airport, I do know that there's a couple clubs that have gone to those, and it really seems to keep the guns out of the club. I do think that even in a situation like the one we had here, the guy running the magnetometer could just turn it off, and still wand the guy, and it would look like he wanded him appropriately.

So, I think you need something that's a little bit more error -- so you couldn't defeat it as easily. I mean if you're trying to get a gun, or kill somebody, or do whatever, you're going to do it. But I don't think this was one of those situations, I think this was a situation that just kind of happened.

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And to the owner, I really, when you were asked the question about the guy, once he was put out of the club, asking him to leave, like your attorney said, maybe the threat of calling the police will help, it's been my experience that it doesn't. But I do say you really don't have the right to tell people to not stand in front of your bar.

We even run into that problem as fully dressed officers, so I get it, it's a tough problem in the city right now.

MEMBER SHORT: Okay, now another thing that has come to our attention here on the board dealing with public safety is our council has passed, or is in the processing the security guards for these night clubs, restaurants, places that sell alcohol, and anything in the public, that their security be registered, and that their security have some training from MPD. What is your opinion on that?

MR. VERNICK: I think it sounds great in theory. I don't know if MPD has the ability to do that. I have actually had several night club owners requesting that through ABRA, there is some kind of training for conflict resolution,

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whether it's hiring an outside company, but honestly for all the night clubs.

Because most things that happen outside the night club, actually happen in the club first, and then they just come outside. So, we don't really go into a lot of night clubs, not until after the fact. Most owners don't want us inside there, and honestly I don't like taking my firearm, and my weapons, and all that stuff into a packed night club, it's too tight, and it gives you a slightly -- it makes things a little bit more dangerous than just waiting outside.

So, I do think that there should be some kind of classes, some kind of training. I'm okay with the security officers management branch having the companies all registered, and the security guards registered, maybe background checks, whatever, I'm okay with that process.

But I think there really needs to be training, like an industry wide training in the district to help some of these security guards.

MEMBER SHORT: Thank you very much.

And lastly, maybe you know the answer to this,

and maybe you don't. And maybe Investigator

Zollarcoffer can help us with this. I'd just

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like to know after the shooting took place outside, did, or did not this establishment shut down, or did they continue selling, and serving drinks? Either one of you can answer.

MR. ZOLLARCOFFER: Go ahead sergeant, if you know.

MR. VERNICK: Yeah, Jeremy, I think
I'm pretty close on this. I think they stopped
allowing people in, I think they started shutting
down. I think they were allowing people to close
out their tabs, and stuff instead of just
emptying out, but I don't think they continued
serving. However, I will add that I was dealing
with the crime scene, not necessarily Air.

MEMBER SHORT: I do understand, and I do thank you very much for your testimony, it's been quite compelling. And I do want to thank on the record, Investigator Zollarcoffer, because investigator, your report was quite up to date, and gives us as a board something to work with. We can ask a lot of questions, and we can have a lot of things answered.

But the initial report is very urgent in us making the appropriate decision as whether, or not to take further action. I saw on the

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video for myself, and thank you for providing that to us, someone enter the club, be patted down, someone leave the club, and shoot someone immediately upon leaving the club. It seems to me that that person had the gun when they came out of the club.

And it's not even consequential to my thinking whether he had it when he went in, or not. But he had the pistol, and shot someone immediately coming out of the club, and again, this person was let out of the club, and allowed not to come in, which was a good thing. But then to stand there, and wait for the perpetrator to come out, and shoot him down, and kill him.

Shot nine times. This city has got to do a better job, all agencies, including this one, ABRA, and the ABC Board, and MPD, and all agencies involved with the night life, we've got to do a better job of making sure these young people just from going out in the night, having a few drinks. Thank you very much for your testimony, thank you, Mr. Chairman, for allowing me to ask those questions.

MR. VERNICK: Thank you, Mr. Short.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Do you have any

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1 questions of the owner, Mr. Short? 2 MEMBER SHORT: Nothing of the owner, 3 sir, no. CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: 4 Okay, I just 5 want it for the record that Air Restaurant is not a club, it's a restaurant, it's a CR restaurant, 6 7 it's not a club, I just want the record to reflect the license that they have is a CR 8 9 license, which is a restaurant, and the owner did -- and restaurants are -- their kitchen has to be 10 11 operational at least two hours before closing. And I believe that the licensee has 12 13 testified that their kitchen is open at least two 14 hours prior to closing. All right, any other 15 questions by any board members? Go ahead, Mr. 16 Grandis, who are you asking questions of, sir? 17 MEMBER GRANDIS: The owner. 18 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Okay, go ahead, 19 sir. 20 MEMBER GRANDIS: At this point, good 21 afternoon. You are one of the managing members 2.2 of the LLC that owns the license? 23 Yes, sir. MR. ANDARGIE: MEMBER GRANDIS: And I think from 2.4 25 reading the report, you were not present when

1	this altercation occurred, is that correct?
2	MR. ANDARGIE: No, I was not present
3	at that location, no.
4	MEMBER GRANDIS: And when did you
5	first learn about the altercation?
6	MR. ANDARGIE: Roughly, it was later
7	that night, or early in the morning hours. I got
8	a call, and I rushed over.
9	MEMBER GRANDIS: Do you remember who
LO	made the call to you?
L1	MR. ANDARGIE: My manager, Dean, Mr.
L2	Hayne.
L3	MEMBER GRANDIS: And was this type of
L4	conversation something that would be typical for
L5	you to hear from your establishment?
L6	MR. ANDARGIE: No.
L7	MEMBER GRANDIS: So, were you
L8	concerned about what you heard?
L9	MR. ANDARGIE: Yes, I was very
20	concerned, yes.
21	MEMBER GRANDIS: Do you think possibly
22	that maybe you should have gone over, and had a
23	meeting with your staff that was present that
24	evening, so you could get clarification yourself?
25	MR. ANDARGIE: I'm sorry, in what

1 MEMBER GRANDIS: Did you think that 2 perhaps with this type of horrendous incident, 3 which you say is unusual for your establishment, 4 did you think when you were called that perhaps 5 you should have gone over --6 MR. ANDARGIE: I did go over. 7 MEMBER GRANDIS: You did? Yes, I did. 8 MR. ANDARGIE: 9 MEMBER GRANDIS: I didn't see that in 10 the report, I saw --11 MR. ANDARGIE: Yes, I came over, I was 12 at that space until the wee hours, until probably 13 6:00 a.m., because I was with the officers at the 14 scene. 15 MEMBER GRANDIS: Okay, thank you. So, 16 during that period when you were over, was there 17 an opportunity to talk to any of your staff? 18 MR. ANDARGIE: I was mainly dealing 19 with the officers, and helping them with the 20 video, and helping them, essentially the 21 technical issues, as far as getting it onto a 2.2 hard drive. 23 MEMBER GRANDIS: And since the 2.4 incident was, I think December 17th, if I 25 recollect that from reading, and this is 90 days

later, have you had any of your staff go for any type of training that ABRA offers in these last 90 days?

MR. ANDARGIE: We have -- we did do an additional training, but we have looked into getting additional training for all the staff members. And we had started adding -- we started getting wands, and we also do have SOD on our -- when we can get it.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: You mean RDO?
MEMBER GRANDIS: RDO, yeah.

MR. ANDARGIE: Yeah, RDO, I'm sorry.

MEMBER GRANDIS: So, you said that there has been some training. For this purpose of our understanding actions that the licensee has taken, what type of training have you had your staff do in the last 90 days?

MR. ANDARGIE: The one thing was with searchers, we did have an issue, or at least what we thought could change, we had different searchers that worked at different hours, because there is a level of fatigue if you just have one assigned searcher. So, we do have two searchers that take turns during the course of the night because of fatigue, because it is a laborsome job

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	to search an individual one by one.
2	So, we do have to male searches, as
3	well as a female searcher now.
4	MEMBER GRANDIS: And that was internal
5	training, correct?
6	MR. ANDARGIE: Yes, internal,
7	everything was internal.
8	MEMBER GRANDIS: So, have you had any
9	training that's offered by ABRA, or any other
10	entity for a CR, or a CN outside of what you
11	internally have done in the last 90 days?
12	MR. ANDARGIE: No, we have not.
13	MEMBER GRANDIS: Did you interview the
14	security person who was at the top of the stairs,
15	who is the one who was doing the pat down? I'm
16	sure you saw all these videos back then. Did you
17	have a one on one interview with that person?
18	MR. ANDARGIE: With the person that
19	was at the front?
20	MEMBER GRANDIS: No, the one who did
21	the lazy pat down.
22	MR. ANDARGIE: I myself didn't, the
23	security manager did discuss that with that
24	individual.
25	MEMBER GRANDIS: And you didn't have

1 an interest in doing that? 2 MR. ANDARGIE: The security manager 3 was the one that was handling that at that time at least, in that situation. I was dealing with 4 5 the other situations in regards to dealing with the officers at the scene. 6 7 MEMBER GRANDIS: So, you -- but you 8 were aware that this security person is the one that had that encounter in the video where it 9 10 looked like there was some type of 11 acknowledgment, whether it was familiar, or not 12 familiar. But then the pat down itself did not 13 go behind to the back, or down the legs. It was 14 very clear that the pat down was just in the very 15 front of the individual. 16 So, you have not had any concern about 17 that? 18 MR. ANDARGIE: I had concern, but it 19 was addressed by his direct superior, the 20 security manager. 21 MEMBER GRANDIS: Do you know where 2.2 this person had gotten security training? 23 MR. ANDARGIE: In house, I believe. 2.4 It was all in house, the security training that 25 that individual has had, from my recollection,

1 and I believe he may have had security training 2 elsewhere as well. Chairman, I believe 3 MEMBER GRANDIS: I've asked what I wanted to of the licensee. 4 5 Thank you, sir, for being here today, thank you 6 very much. 7 MR. ANDARGIE: No problem. 8 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Thank you, Mr. 9 Grandis. Any questions by anyone else? MR. KLINE: This licensee was asked 10 11 about ABRA provided training, and I've heard other licensees asked, and forgive me, educate 12 13 me, because I'm not aware of any ABRA provided 14 security training. And I just went to the 15 website to see if maybe I missed something --16 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: It was just 17 general, I think the question was the general 18 training that we offer, but we do not offer --19 MR. KLINE: Got it, okay. 20 MEMBER GRANDIS: And I think my 21 statement did say ABRA, or other outside 2.2 training. 23 No, I got it, I just MR. KLINE: 2.4 wondered if there was ABRA security training, I 25 want to know about it. If I'm missing something,

1 I want to know. Thank you, yeah. 2 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: And I just want 3 to correct the record, it's no longer ABRA, it's ABCA, A-B-C-A. 4 5 MR. KLINE: As of three days ago, you said, right? 6 7 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: As of the 26th 8 of March. MR. KLINE: It'll take me awhile to 9 get used to that after a lot of years. 10 11 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: ABCA, A-B-C-A. 12 All the backgrounds will change probably in the 13 But if you go on our website, it's the fall. 14 Alcohol Beverage and Cannabis Association, okay? 15 All right, any other questions that any other 16 party has? I want to thank -- this is what we 17 have agreed to today, that the licensee, within 18 the next 30 days will provide a legally 19 sufficient security plan to the agency. 20 And the security plan specifically, 21 outside of the regular procedures for a legally 2.2 sufficient security plan, it will look at 23 addressing wanding, it will also look at more so address conflict resolution, and at least there's 2.4

a statement that will be added, which I'm not

quite sure if it can be implemented, that the staff will advise folks that they need to move along, if not, they're going to call MPD.

That's what they volunteered to do, so we're not going to dissuade them from doing that.

So, that's the only thing that we have agreed on today. I would like to thank --

MR. KLINE: One more, Mr. Chairman, if I may?

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Yes, Mr. Kline.

MR. KLINE: Mr. Andargie is going to take Sergeant Vernick up on his offer to confer, and see what else might be done. Because this establishment does not believe that it's done learning today. There are certainly lessons that are learned from this horrific incident, but Sergeant Vernick clearly has a great length, and breadth of experience, and Mr. Andargie is going to take him up on the offer to meet one on one, and talk about what else might be done.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right,
thank you for that representation. I mean that's
something outside of us, but as I stated before,
I've been in this position for seven, and a half
years, and this is actually the first time that

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I'm watching a video, and knowing that a human person will lose his life at the end of the video, and it did not leave me with a good feeling.

So, I am somewhat troubled by that.

But this is not something I'm attributing -- I

just want the record to reflect I'm not

attributing this to the establishment, I'm just

stating that as a human being I am impacted by

what I just saw. All right. So, I just want to

thank everyone for their presentation today.

Sergeant Vernick, thank you for being here today.

Mr. Andargie, thank you for being here, and being very forthright. Mr. Kline, and lastly, but not least, Mr. Zollarcoffer, excellent report. One of the better reports that I've seen that this agency has provided. And from what I heard, it is your action that -- it's based on your action that you were able to help the MPD toward solving this crime. So, I want to thank you for the extra effort that you did in ensuring that hopefully MPD is closer to solving a crime if it has not been solved at this juncture.

So, again, thank you very much for the

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work that you do on behalf of the residents of the District of Columbia. So, where we are today, the board will determine whether, or not this will be a no further action, if we determine that there are no ABRA violations that have occurred, or if we determine that some violation has occurred, then the board will submit this case to the Office of the Attorney General for them to see if there is a violation for them to prosecute.

But that's just what happens at a fact finding hearing, okay? So, thank you very much for your presentation today, have a great day.

MR. KLINE: Thank you.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right, as far as the board is concerned, it is now 1:43, and of course we have run past our 1:30 hearing. I have advised the public that we will come back to a public hearing at 2:15. So, we will come back to a public hearing at 2:15. I will ask all board members to come back to executive session at 2:10, at 2:10. I just want to have maybe a quick five minute executive session at 2:10.

But we will rejoin the public hearing at 2:15, so have a great lunch, and I will see

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1	board members in executive session at 2:10, and
2	we will come back to the public hearing at 2:15,
3	okay? Thank you.
4	(Whereupon, the above-entitled matter
