3	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: The next case
4	on our calendar is a cease and desist hearing for
5	an unlicensed establishment, it's called the
6	Weekend Social Club. And so Mr. Orellana, can
7	you please elevate the rights of Mr. Puente, Mr.
8	Zollarcoffer and also the licensee for the
9	Weekend Social Club, please?
10	MR. ORELLANA: Kevin Puente, your
11	access has been elevated.
12	Investigator Jeremy Zollarcoffer, your
13	access has been elevated.
14	Binyam Gebreyohannes, your access has
15	been elevated.
16	That is all, Chairman.
17	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Thank you.
18	Mr. Gebreyohannes, if you have a
19	camera, can you please turn it on, please, sir?
20	Mr. Gebreyohannes? Are you there,
21	sir?
22	MR. GEBREYOHANNES: Yes, can you hear
23	me?
24	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: I can hear you,
25	sir. Do you have a camera you can turn on, sir?

1	MR. GEBREYOHANNES: Yes, I'm on my
2	laptop. However, I don't know how to use WebEx.
3	How do I activate the camera on here?
4	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: You don't see
5	an icon there just to tell you to turn the camera
6	on?
7	MR. GEBREYOHANNES: Start video
8	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Yes.
9	MR. GEBREYOHANNES: HD User Facing,
10	Change, Self-Viewable Location.
11	Am I able to be seen now?
12	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Not yet, sir.
13	MR. GEBREYOHANNES: I see myself.
14	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Well, if you
15	can see yourself, we'll probably begin to see you
16	shortly.
17	MR. GEBREYOHANNES: Okay, it says
18	(audio interference).
19	I'm on.
20	I apologize.
21	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: That's fine,
22	sir.
23	(Audio interference)
24	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: If you're
25	having some video problem, we can move on. I

1 prefer to see folks, but if you don't have video, 2 we'll move on. 3 MR. GEBREYOHANNES: Okav. 4 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right. So 5 let me have the parties identify themselves 6 already. Let me start with you, Mr. Puente. 7 Please identify yourself for the record, sir. 8 9 MR. PUENTE: Kevin Puente, K-E-V-I-N, P-U-E-N-T-E, ABRA Investigator. 10 11 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Thank you. 12 Good morning, Mr. Zollarcoffer. Can 13 you please spell and state your name for the 14 record, identify yourself, sir? 15 MR. ZOLLARCOFFER: Yes, sir. Good 16 morning, chairman and members of the board. 17 name is Jeremy Zollarcoffer, it's J-E-R-E-M-Y, Z-18 O-L-L-A-R-C-O-F-F-E-R. 19 CHAIRMAN ANDERSON: Mr. Gebreyohannes, 20 can you please spell and state your name for the 21 record, please, sir and your relationship to this 2.2 case? 23 MR. GEBREYOHANNES: Yes, sir. My name 2.4 is Binyam Gebreyohannes, B-I-N-Y-A-M, G-E-B-R-E-25 Y-O-H-A-N-N-E-S, owner of the Weekend Social

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CHAIRMAN ANDERSON: All right. Good morning, sir.

All right, this is a fact-finding hearing, sir. At a fact-finding hearing the board cannot order a party to take any specific The board it's informal and other parties are sworn in, we are just gathering facts to make a determination what is the next steps in this case. I think in this particular case it appears that the board issued a cease-and-desist order which is Court Order No. 2023-185, because the agency -- oh yes, I can now see you -- the agency received notification from a neighbor that there was a noise violation going on at the The agency, the investigator went over and saw that there was an event, and they determined that there was not a proper license, was not existent for that, on that, I think it was on March 10th.

It's my understanding that another investigator went back, and we also received a noise complaint on March 11th, 2023, and another one of our investigators went back and saw the same thing that was occurring on March 11th. And

so the board issued a cease-and-desist. You decided that you requested a fact-finding hearing so you can explain yourself.

So what we're going to do this morning, sir, is that I'm going to have the two investigators share with the board what was observed on March 10th and March 11th. The board members are welcome to ask questions of the investigator once the investigators have shared their report. And once the board members have asked questions of the investigators, then you are welcome to ask questions to any of the investigators. And then if you want to give us your position or your business model and explain to us what's going on, that is your option. at the end of the hearing, the options that the board has to take, the board can decide that there's no further action.

Well, I guess in this particular case because the board had issued a cease-and-desist so the board then can make a determination whether or not it is going to lift the cease-and-desist or whether or not it's going to keep it in place until you have applied or received a license. But as I said before, it's informal,

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1 we're just gathering facts to determine what is 2 going on, your business model, and what action if any the board should take. 3 Any questions, sir, before we move 4 5 forward? No, I fully 6 MR. GEBREYOHANNES: 7 understand, Chairman Anderson. CHAIRMAN ANDERSON: All right, thank 8 9 you, sir. 10 All right, so I'll start. Mr. Puente, 11 were you the investigator who went on March 10th? 12 MR. PUENTE: Yes, sir. 13 CHAIRMAN ANDERSON: All right, so can you tell us, share with us what happened on March 14 15 10th and why were you at the establishment -- I'm 16 sorry, the address on March 10th, please? 17 MR. PUENTE: Yes, sir. So about 11:00 18 p.m. on March 10th ABRA Supervisor Investigator Jason Pruill received a hotline call regarding 19 20 1540 N. Capitol St. NW regarding loud music 21 emanating from the establishment. The caller 2.2 also advised patrons were entering and exiting 23 the establishment. I conducted a records check and determined that there was no active ABC 2.4 25 license for that address; the last ABC license

was held in October 2021 and it was cancelled. did a record check for one-day licenses, did not observe any one-day licenses being issued for I did a quick social media check that address. and found the club to be calling itself as the Weekend Social Club which had an active website; on the website it kind of showed a nightclub inside 1540 N. Capitol. I then proceeded to the Department of Licensing and Consumer Protection website to confirm if there was a C of O. There were two C of O's held for that address; the 1st Floor for a fast food carryout for 12 people and the 2nd Floor for office space only. So at that time myself and Investigator Jeremy Zollarcoffer went out to the establishment about 11:45, we contacted D.C. Fire Marshal's office to have someone respond as well based off the information we gathered already. We arrived, we observed the front door open, a security quard front door advised us it was a private event, a private club event birthday party. I advised him that there's no such thing as private in the city. This spot holds an active C of O in the public space. few minutes later Mr. Gebreyohannes came out, along with his manager; I advised him the same

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1	thing that there's nothing called private clubs,
2	especially when there's alcohol involved along
3	with a public space permit. I asked who's
4	providing alcohol, he advised me it was a
5	caterer. At no time could they produce a
6	catering license for us. Investigator
7	Zollarcoffer he went inside with the fire marshal
8	to conduct a walkthrough, and I'll let him speak
9	about that.
10	CHAIRMAN ANDERSON: Sir, who did you
11	say you're going to have speak to?
12	MR. PUENTE: Investigator
13	Zollarcoffer. He did the walkthrough inside with
14	the fire marshal's office.
15	CHAIRMAN ANDERSON: Okay, on the 10th.
16	MR. PUENTE: Yes, sir.
17	CHAIRMAN ANDERSON: All right. So Mr.
18	Zollarcoffer, why don't you continue from Mr.
19	Puente left off, sir?
20	MR. ZOLLARCOFFER: Okay. Yes, when we
21	first entered the establishment on the 10th we
22	noticed that there was quite a few people on the
23	1st Floor consuming alcohol. I think there was
24	about 40-50 people the first night on the 1st
25	Floor. We seen people consuming alcohol,

dancing, drinking, kind of having a regular night at the event space, appeared to be a night club scene. And that's what I seen inside on the first night.

I don't believe it was occupied on the 2nd Floor; it was just the second night that they were occupying the 2nd Floor. But the first night there were about 40-50 patrons there on the first level.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right, so on the 10th, so what action, if any -- and I'll start with you Mr. Puente -- so what action, if any, did ABRA take on the 10th?

MR. PUENTE: Yes. So after conferring with the fire inspector, we agreed that the venue needed to be shut down due to the C of O only listing 10 people, no more than 15 people inside, and they had no alcohol license, no catering license. So, by that time it was almost approaching 2:00 a.m., so Mr. Gebreyohannes agreed to shut it down and cleared it out. We advised him that either he needed to get a catering license or an updated C of O if he wanted more people. Also, because the previous spot which was -- the previous spot had a kitchen

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1 in the back of the restaurant, so they kind of 2 removed that. So I said you can get the 3 occupancy increase, but you just need to go through the proper channels to get the increase. 4 5 So yeah, the venue got shutdown, everyone cleared out, so then fire, MPD and ABRA 6 7 left. 8 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right. So 9 Mr. Zollarcoffer, what happened on the 11th? 10 MR. ZOLLARCOFFER: On the 11th, 11 similar thing; approximately 10:00 p.m. 12 Investigator Puente and Zollarcoffer arrived at 13 the establishment and observed the security guard 14 standing at the front door. Once again, 15 Investigator --16 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Why did you 17 guys --18 (Simultaneous speaking) 19 MR. ZOLLARCOFFER: We seen another 20 ABRA hotline called for noise and patrons 21 entering and existing the establishment. 2.2 another ABRA noise complaint came in through our 23 hotline. 2.4 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right, so 25 what did you see once you got there on the 11th?

MR. PUENTE: When we arrived, sir, the
first thing that I noticed was the main entrance
door it was being obstructed with the roll-down
metal door on the outside and they had a side
entrance which was open. So myself and Mr.
Zollarcoffer approached, Mr. Zollarcoffer entered
security, shut the door and locked it. At that
time we didn't call for MPD assistance. Inside
there was approximately 150 people on the 1st and
2nd Floor. A lady came out and advised me it was
a retirement party/birthday party and she was
confused on why ABRA was there. Full
transparency, it was a bunch of off-duty MPD
officers. I advised them that this spot is not
properly licensed, there's no alcohol license,
there's no catering license. And they were
upset, the off-duty officers agreed that they
were going to leave because they didn't want no
issues. Inside just people pouring out from
upstairs and downstairs. Again, no catering
license could be produced or one-day license.
This time we dumped out all the alcohol and
everyone cleared out. Mr. Gebreyohannes wasn't
there the second night, his manager was Mr.
Mohammad, and I advised Mr. Mohammad of the same

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thing the previous night that you guys can't have an event here until your occupancy increase, or if you do, it has to be less than ten people. Then I advised them that the roll-down door cannot be obstructing the front door, especially with people inside and the front door being locked.

We did take video of the second night, if you'd like to see it, sir.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Sure. Mr. Orellana, please allow Mr. Puente to share his screen, please.

MR. PUENTE: Okay. Can you see my screen, sir?

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Yes.

MR. PUENTE: So that's the video, sir. As I pointed out, that's the main entrance there being obstructed by the outside steel door. So that was my main concern that they only had one entrance in and out and it was through a vestibule on the side, and with that amount of people inside, something tragic could happen if something were to happen. And I also want to share the website with you, sir. This is the website for the event space.

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1 So as you can see it's advertised as 2 the Weekend Social Club, first level --3 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: I'm not seeing the website, sir. 4 5 MR. PUENTE: Can you see it now, sir? CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: No. 6 I saw it 7 briefly, but it disappeared, so. 8 MR. PUENTE: All right. How about 9 now? CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Well, this is 10 11 still a video I believe. Okay. All right, this is a -- all 12 13 right. 14 MR. PUENTE: Yeah, this is the Weekend Social Club site that I found which shows the 15 16 inside of the establishment, it advertises event space, up here there's a rights and services for 17 18 the 2nd Floor which has 175 quests for the 1st 19 Floor, which I don't think you can go that high 20 based on my experience. The 2nd Floor as well, 21 75 guests which I think is a little too much 2.2 based on my experience as well. It has a 23 catering policy, there was no caterer on both 2.4 nights at the location. 25 That's it, sir.

1	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Thank you. So
2	Mr. Zollarcoffer, anything else you want to add?
3	MR. ZOLLARCOFFER: No, Mr. Chair.
4	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Any questions
5	by any board members of both investigators?
6	MEMBER SHORT: Yes, Mr. Chair. I have
7	a question, please.
8	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Go ahead, Mr.
9	Short.
10	MEMBER SHORT: Either one of you
11	investigators can answer this question.
12	Let's go to the first night which was
13	March 10th. What time did you get there on March
14	10th?
15	MR. PUENTE: We arrived about 11:45
16	p.m.
17	MEMBER SHORT: What time and also
18	you said there was a fire department person who
19	came out also.
20	MR. PUENTE: Yes, sir.
21	MEMBER SHORT: What time did the fire
22	department person get there?
23	MR. PUENTE: He arrived, I want to say
24	about 30 minutes after us, so closer to midnight
25	or a little bit after midnight.

1	MEMBER SHORT: What was determined
2	after the fire marshal got there on the 10th?
3	MR. PUENTE: He said the C of O said
4	exactly what I showed him, office space on the
5	2nd Floor and the 1st Floor no more than 15
6	people inside. And we agreed that with that
7	amount of people inside, it was they couldn't
8	have that many people inside, so we had to clear
9	it up.
LO	MEMBER SHORT: Okay, so on that
1	particular night, the egress, how many doors were
L2	available for people to enter or egress on the
L3	10th?
L4	MR. PUENTE: They had two doors open.
L5	MEMBER SHORT: Is there a front and a
L6	rear, or are they both on the side or?
L7	MR. PUENTE: They're both on the front
L8	side on N. Capitol Street.
L9	MEMBER SHORT: So there's no rear?
20	MR. PUENTE: I didn't see any when I
21	was there.
22	MEMBER SHORT: So everybody coming and
23	going have to come in from N. Capitol Street?
24	MR. PUENTE: Yes, sir.
25	MEMBER SHORT: So, if there's an

1	incident on N. Capitol Street, how do people get
2	out?
3	MR. PUENTE: That's a good question,
4	sir.
5	MEMBER SHORT: Okay. Now, how about
6	let's go to March the 11th. What time did you
7	get there on March the 11th?
8	MR. PUENTE: We got there
9	approximately around 9:30 p.m.
10	MEMBER SHORT: What did you observe
11	when you got there on the 11th?
12	MR. PUENTE: They only had one door
13	open for egress and the egress on the main front
14	door was obstructed by the roll-down steel door.
15	MEMBER SHORT: How many people
16	approximately were in the building?
17	MR. PUENTE: I would say somewhere
18	near 150.
19	MEMBER SHORT: And the C of O that was
20	on the record says only 15 on the 1st Floor and
21	only office space on the 2nd Floor; is that
22	correct?
23	MR. PUENTE: Yes, sir.
24	MEMBER SHORT: Did the fire marshal's
25	office respond on the second night?

1 MR. PUENTE: I called them but they 2 didn't get out there until after. Since it was a 3 lot of off-duty cops, they agreed that they're just going to shut it down because they don't 4 5 want no issues. MEMBER SHORT: So again, when was the 6 7 cease-and-desist order issued? 8 MR. PUENTE: It was shortly after 9 this, about a week after. 10 MEMBER SHORT: Were they still 11 operating up until the cease-and-desist order 12 came in? 13 MR. PUENTE: I did not see them, we've 14 been monitoring it, but I know approximately two 15 weeks ago, two investigators went by on a night 16 shift and observed an event occurring, I believe 17 it was an illegal cannabis event. 18 MEMBER SHORT: So, in spite of a 19 cease-and-desist issued by ABCA officials, they 20 were operating illegally; is that correct? 21 MR. PUENTE: Yes, sir. 2.2 MEMBER SHORT: How did that night end 23 up? 2.4 MR. PUENTE: Let me check my records 25 real quick.

1 I believe the investigators -- I'm not 2 sure, sir. I'm having a hard time locating the 3 email that the investigators sent me. 4 MEMBER SHORT: Okay, so I guess what I'm trying to find out is -- and knowing that 5 you're not a public safety expert -- but in your 6 7 time as an ABRA investigator, or ABCA 8 investigator -- do you think that the conditions 9 there were unsafe? 10 MR. PUENTE: Yes, sir. 11 MEMBER SHORT: And the fire marshal's office did tell them to close it down? 12 13 MR. PUENTE: Yeah, after me and the 14 inspector conferred for a few minutes, he agreed 15 that it needed to end. 16 MEMBER SHORT: Has there been any 17 further monitoring by the agency since March 18 11th? Yes, sir. I've been 19 MR. PUENTE: 20 going by nightly when I work nights that I've 21 gone by. 2.2 MEMBER SHORT: Have you observed any 23 other activities there as far as illegal 2.4 activity? 25 MR. PUENTE: No, sir.

1 Thank you. That's all MEMBER SHORT: 2 I have, Mr. Chair. Thank you very much for the 3 report. CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: 4 Any other 5 questions by any other board members? I just want to ask -- all right, no 6 7 other questions? 8 One final question before I transfer 9 it to the owner. Did either investigator have any conversation with the landlord of the 10 11 property? 12 MR. PUENTE: No, sir. Not the 13 landlord. 14 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Okay, right. 15 Mr. Gebreyohannes, you're free to ask questions 16 of the investigators, or maybe you can explain to 17 us from your perspective what's going on, sir. 18 MR. GEBREYOHANNES: On 4/10 when the 19 two ABRA officials stopped by and stopped us 20 during our event, he did ask and request any sort 21 of licensing, and I did partner with Louis J. 2.2 Matsikis who owns a catering company. However, 23 unknowingly I didn't know it was based out of 2.4 Virginia; they had told me it was registered in 25 D.C. And this was the sheet I presented to

Official Kevin Puente, an attempt to show him that we were operating in compliance. And then he in return stated that this was not D.C. registered company, he attempted to look up the licensing under that name, and that's when I found out we weren't running under correct compliance. Up until then I was under the assumption that I was running compliantly with D.C. regulations.

Just a quick rundown on my business; we are not a night club. We have a night club setting or a bar setting; however, my business is revolved around giving residents, all local people, the space to rent by the hour, whatever affair, which is mainly birthday parties. I have plans such as KIPP DC, the other event that he stopped the following day was a retirement and 50th birthday for MPD officials. I create a safer space for residents/locals to throw a private event which requires a quest list and it usually maintains friends, family, co-workers. Ι am less likely to have, you know, any type of problems or issues at our establishment.

Now, after knowing that, the second event following the 11th, I did allow, I did

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mention this issue with my client for that
following day, and she mentioned had a caterer
who was also licensed in D.C. And she said that
they would just drop off food and presents.
However, miscommunication, the caterer was not
present, the food was not present, but even so
after finding out throughout the weeks that, you
know, you have to a caterer present, the food
present, license present this is my first
business in D.C. so it has been a hurdle learning
the rules and regulations here. Since then I
have not operated with any event that requires
I was stopped on March 31st by the same two
officials that Kevin had mentioned; however, we
worked/partnered with Tony and Henry from Grub
Rockstar Catering who are registered in D.C. and
have a kitchen I think on 10th Street, if I'm not
mistaken. And that night we presented the
license, food was present, a receipt for alcohol
that was purchased by whoever was present, and
that was all confirmed by the two officials that
were there, and we were allowed to continue with
that event that evening. Following after you all
stopped on $4/20$, with another agent was on a
Thursday, I think his name was Matt, Matthew. He

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also then did his routine check-up of how, you know, ABRA does, to make sure we're under compliance. That event had no alcohol involved, it was more of a vendor public style event. He did his routine check and also checked out us to continue for the evening. Those were the only two days that ABRA officials came.

Aside from that I've only had kids parties, 16 and under birthdays to just remain compliant and stay afloat as far as my business goes.

For compliance or just to update the occupancy, I've been working with Daniel Calhoun and Abdul Mizikir -- sorry if I'm not saying that right -- in order to get the correct C of O and up my occupancy load for both lists.

Aside from that, yeah I have not operated for several weeks. The only two events I've had was on March 31st and 4/20, and then lastly on -- I'm sorry, on 4/23 which was recent, which was also an event that didn't have any alcohol involved or present.

Aside from that, yeah the business that I have is, just revolves around private event space. That's what I was trying to explain

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1 to Officer Kevin Puente and his partner; we don't 2 operate like a night club. My main source of 3 income for this company is the space rental; everything else would be a secondary source of 4 5 income. So right now I'm in the middle of, just 6 doing a temporary partnership with Grub Rockstar 7 Catering and then applying for my own license, if 8 I'm able to with ABRA being lenient enough to remove the cease-and-desist so I continue the 9 10 process. 11 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right, let 12 me ask a question. So --13 MR. GEBREYOHANNES: I'm sorry to 14 interrupt. I do have a rear exit, they just 15 never went far back enough to check. 16 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right, so 17 on the 10th, so who purchased the alcohol on the 18 10th? 19 MR. GEBREYOHANNES: Say that again. 20 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Who purchased 21 the alcohol on the 10th? 2.2 MR. GEBREYOHANNES: I have my partner 23 who's a third-party member. I only rent the 2.4 space, everything else is third party. 25 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Well, who, who,

1 who is -- all right, so you rent the space, but 2 whose event was it -- you said that you rent the 3 space, so who brings in the alcohol and the food or whatever's served there? Who's in charge of 4 5 that? MR. GEBREYOHANNES: At the time it was 6 7 Louis J. Matsikis, and then following after was 8 Tony and Henry from Grub Rockstar Catering which 9 was --CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: 10 So --11 MR. GEBREYOHANNES: Sorry. 12 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: You're saying 13 on the 10th when we got there, there was a 14 Virginia caterer, that's what you're saying, and 15 I think you showed us some document, but you were 16 told that that person was not a licensed caterer; 17 is that correct? 18 MR. GEBREYOHANNES: Correct. Then on the 19 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: 20 11th when there was another event when we went 21 there on the 11th, I was told that alcohol was 2.2 So who was the person who provided the 23 alcohol during that period? 2.4 MR. GEBREYOHANNES: That was just the

remaining alcohol from the present day.

1 wanted to make sure that the caterer that was 2 there was properly licensed in order to be able to have it for consumption. 3 4 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: But you know 5 you can't. All right, I'm not. 6 All right. 7 MR. GEBREYOHANNES: For me the rules 8 are all new. I'm just now finding out, you know, 9 all the rules and regulations for how this works. 10 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right. 11 Now, our investigators testified -- and I know 12 you were not there on the 11th -- but the 13 investigators testified that -- all right, so who provided security, who provided security for --14 15 who provided security on the 10th and the 11th? 16 MR. GEBREYOHANNES: I provide the 17 security for the establishment. 18 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: You provide the 19 security. 20 I am the security, MR. GEBREYOHANNES: 21 yes. 2.2 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Now, why is it 23 that the security did not allow our investigators 2.4 to go in on the 11th? What was that all about? 25 MR. GEBREYOHANNES: I have no clue.

1 I told them after hearing that situation, anytime 2 forward you must allow ABRA to come in and do 3 their job. The last two times that they did, they did so. I gave them no issues, they walked 4 5 right in, Matt and the other two agents that were on March 31st, 4/20. 6 7 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Now, what is 8 the current occupancy of the building? I mean, I 9 saw the video; it looks like a large space, but 10 do you have an updated certificate of occupancy 11 for the building?

MR. GEBREYOHANNES: It's currently pending process. If you may know, it does take several weeks to several months in some cases. When I first got both C of O's, one took nearly two months, the other one almost three.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: And so, so the current certificate of occupancy, what does that state?

MR. GEBREYOHANNES: This one says 12 with a max of 27.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: So if you have a certificate of occupancy that says 12, how can you have more than 12 people in the facility?

MR. GEBREYOHANNES: Again, this is --

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I didn't even know what that was on that sheet until that day the first time we got stopped and the fire marshal inspected. This is my first business in D.C., a lot of this was new to me, knowing the operator -- no real excuse, I am learning as I go, that is the truth.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right, so you also stated that you're the one who hires, provides the security. So who are these people that you hire for security, where do they come from?

MR. GEBREYOHANNES: Local. One from work, I have other like night club referrals.

Anthony just happens to be a good guy. I just keep strict run North Capitol, I want to make sure my clients are safe, these are private events. So yeah, that's pretty much it.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: So you're having private events, but you're having private events, sir, in that commercial space. If you're having private events, because you're having -- you can have a private event in a house, in a private house and we do not have any jurisdiction over a private house, sir. But if you're having an event in a commercial space,

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sir, you have to have a -- and if you're serving alcohol, you have to have a license. You either have to have a license, you either have to apply to us for a one-day license or you have to have a caterer who -- or you have to have a caterer who provides the food and the alcohol is incidental to the event. And that caterer has to be there the entire time.

MR. GEBREYOHANNES: Understood.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: And if you -you can apply from our agency for a temporary one-day license. However, when you apply for a license, even if you apply for a permanent license, you have to give a certificate of occupancy. And the agency would not grant you a license for more than what's on your certificate of occupancy. So if your certificate of occupancy says 12, or if you come tomorrow and apply for a one-day license, we're going to give you if we think you qualify a one-day license for 12 people because the certificate of occupancy says not more than 12 people can be there, or whatever it says. So, your certificate of occupancy you can't have our license, whatever license that if we were to give you a license it

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cannot exceed your certificate of occupancy.

That is what controls.

Now, we might say your certificate of occupancy might say 100 people, but we might give you a license that says 80 people. And if we give you a license that says 80 people, if you're going to serve alcohol, only 80 people can be there and not 100.

MR. GEBREYOHANNES: Understood, Chairman.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: So, do you have any idea, sir, when is it that you will get an updated certificate of occupancy?

MR. GEBREYOHANNES: I'm working diligently now with two gentlemen that I've mentioned. I've also requested my landlord's to bear with me on rent for at least two months as, you know, we're paying pretty high rent over here. Hopefully within the next four to eight weeks I should be able to have an updated C of O with the occupancy load that fits more my businesses.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Now, all right, who was the caterer that was there on the 11th?

I know you said a Virginia caterer was there on

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1 the 10th, so who was the caterer that was there 2 on the 11th? 3 MR. GEBREYOHANNES: It actually was the same person that I'm currently partnered now, 4 5 Tony and Henry. But again, there was miscommunication; their job was to just drop off 6 7 the food and they weren't present the entire 8 time. So therefore, no license or the owners of 9 the license were present, just the food. CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: So they just 10 11 dropped off the food. So, and you're using 12 alcohol that you had left over from the night 13 before? 14 MR. GEBREYOHANNES: Correct, from a 15 previous caterer. 16 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: And that the previous caterer from Virginia, so they're the 17 18 ones who went and bought the alcohol and brought the alcohol? 19 20 (Simultaneous speaking) 21 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Now, you said 2.2 Tony and Henry. I mean, is it -- is that the 23 name of the catering company or individuals? 2.4 MR. GEBREYOHANNES: 25 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: What's the name

1	of the catering company?
2	MR. GEBREYOHANNES: Grub Rockstar
3	Catering.
4	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: I'm sorry,
5	what?
6	MR. GEBREYOHANNES: Grub Rockstar
7	Catering.
8	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Grub Rockstar
9	Catering?
10	MR. GEBREYOHANNES: Correct.
11	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: G-R-U-B, Rock
12	is it one word or two words?
13	MR. GEBREYOHANNES: It's two separate
14	words Grub, Rock.
15	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Grub Rockstar
16	Catering.
17	MR. GEBREYOHANNES: Correct.
18	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: While I'm
19	asking the question, could one of the
20	investigators check to see, is that the name
21	all right, could one of the investigators check
22	to see if you find that name, Grub Rockstar
23	Catering.
24	So you're saying that these are the
25	people that you currently contract with to

provide alcohol and I guess whatever events that you're having; is that correct?

MR. GEBREYOHANNES: Yes, under the assumption that I'm able to continue business, they are who I'll be working with. So in the midst of the time that I was all looking for (audio interference) and they're the ones that I saw.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Now, you know that even if you have a license caterer who's going to come and provide alcohol and food, your certificate of occupancy still says 12, you're still going to have a problem?

MR. GEBREYOHANNES: Yes, I won't operate until the C of O occupancy is fully updated with the correct number. This is just a number that they give us for the space that we have.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Mr. Puente?

MR. PUENTE: Yes, sir. Grub Rockstar

Catering is active; it looks like they got their

first license in July 2022 and they just renewed

their catering license on March 13th, 2023 for

the next year.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right, so

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1 they are a licensed caterer in D.C., but as a 2 licensed caterer, aren't the supposed to provide the food and the incident of alcohol, not just 3 drop food off? I'm not - I'll leave that open. 4 5 All right, before, let me see --So, I want to ask you one more 6 7 question about the security, sir. So, you said that -- how do you find 8 9 the security again, who you utilize for the 10 place? 11 MR. GEBREYOHANNES: That's been the 12 same gentlemen since we started the company. Ι 13 was referred from a friend who he works for. 14 think it's a club on 9th Street, but I do 15 security because we require a guest list for our 16 Because we're not, you know, open to the 17 general public, let's say any member here had a 18 birthday party assuming we had an occupancy load 19 for like 50 people and you have 50 quests coming, 20 then the event takes place, security would check 21 ID, you know to initiate pat-down and make sure 2.2 you're on the guest list for the host event. 23 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Any questions 2.4 by any board members?

Yes, Mr. Chair.

MEMBER SHORT:

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I'd

1 like to ask a question. 2 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Yes, sir. Go ahead. 3 MEMBER SHORT: Please forgive me, sir. 4 5 I'm not even going to try to pronounce your name. No worries. 6 MR. GEBREYOHANNES: 7 MEMBER SHORT: I'll just call you 8 Can you give us your background on Binzoner. 9 business of any type? 10 MR. GEBREYOHANNES: Yeah, so --11 MEMBER SHORT: Anytime you've been in 12 business anywhere, even other than D.C. 13 MR. GEBREYOHANNES: Yes, I own Elite 14 Prints, that's in Alexandria, Virginia. 15 know, I have a marketing background and we do 16 commercial screenprinting and embroidery. 17 a lengthy list of corporate clients, a lot of 18 schools, small businesses, but for the most part 19 that's just commercial printing, screenprinting, 20 embroidery. So my clients are also out there 21 like a PPW or PPR -- yeah, so they do like kid's 2.2 uniforms for basketball, Boys & Girls Club. MEMBER SHORT: Okay, I'm trying to 23 2.4 stick with -- your business small here and 25 Washington D.C. and out, I don't think you'll be

1 printing anything out of your location. 2 MR. GEBREYOHANNES: No, no, no. Let's stick with that. 3 MEMBER SHORT: Now, you sound like you've been educated quite 4 5 well and you speak quite well. Thank you for 6 that. 7 Now, didn't you have a clue that you 8 needed to read books or read the code and 9 regulations for the city before starting to operate a business in the District of Columbia. 10 11 MR. GEBREYOHANNES: Mm-hmm. 12 honest, I just went head first. When COVID came 13 by, my business went bad and I just did some 14 research on event space and chose a space. 15 MEMBER SHORT: Okay. 16 MR. GEBREYOHANNES: Just to reiterate, 17 my business model is rental of space; anything 18 extra I try to outsource to third party, you know 19 whether it's food, beverages, decor, birthday My main focus --20 signs, it doesn't matter. 21 MEMBER SHORT: Okay, that sounds 2.2 Now, what I want to get to is on March 23 the 10th and March the 11th. 2.4 MR. GEBREYOHANNES: Yes, sir. 25 MEMBER SHORT: Just allege -- I'm glad nothing did happen bad -- but suppose someone had got injured or hurt or even there was a death -- who would be responsible if you went to court in the District of Columbia and the judge asks you how did these people wind up dead?

MR. GEBREYOHANNES: To be honest, it would be my fault, maybe, from not following coordinates I guess.

MEMBER SHORT: What do you think the judge would say to you after you that answer?

MR. GEBREYOHANNES: I'm not sure.

MEMBER SHORT: Okay, not a problem.

I really think, if I can suggest anything to help you, and that's what this board is here to do -
I think you need to get a copy of all the rules, regulations, guidelines. I think you need to probably go to our website, I think you need to call our office and ask how you could operate your rental business when it comes to the sales, service and delivery of alcohol in the District of Columbia. And I'm quite sure anyone you talked to in our licensing division would be able to give you a full information regarding how to operate safely and properly in the District of Columbia. We can't make you do anything; we can

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1	only ask the only thing I'm going to ask you
2	is will you please give our office a call and
3	find out what you need to do before you get your
4	C of O and what you plan to do with your business
5	model. Can we agree that somebody would do that?
6	MR. GEBREYOHANNES: Yes, I will
7	appreciate the information.
8	MEMBER SHORT: Okay, thank you.
9	That's all I have, Mr. Chair.
10	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Thank you. Any
11	other questions by any other board members?
12	MEMBER GRANDIS: Mr. Chairman?
13	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Good morning,
14	Mr. Grandis.
15	MEMBER GRANDIS: Sir, you may have
16	stated this, but when was the first time in D.C.
17	that you had an event like this? I think a
18	birthday party or retirement or some type of
19	event where alcohol was being served. When was
20	your first one?
21	MR. GEBREYOHANNES: Are you stating
22	our first time being open?
23	MEMBER GRANDIS: You don't have a
24	license, so I don't know what you mean by being
25	open I'm just asking, you said that during the

1 pandemic, like many people we all suffered 2 economically, and if I heard you right, that's when you decided to do this kind of event. 3 I'm asking when was your first one? 4 5 MEMBER GRANDIS: Okay, this was with Rebel Taco before they shut down. 6 So we were 7 more of a promoter at that time, so they were fully licensed there on U Street, and I took my 8 9 model which is booking events, but I booked them through other venues. So because I didn't have 10 11 my own, I would service these events at other 12 venues, as I do now. Some of the events that I 13 booked go through Ozio's, 1831 on M Street, and 14 D.C. Capital Bar & Grill -- these are all 15 partnerships that I've built in the last few 16 So I provide a service to them which is 17 also increasing business with them. 18 MEMBER GRANDIS: Once again, if I 19 understand what you're explaining, is that you've 20 been doing similar events since 2020, 2021? 21 MR. GEBREYOHANNES: 2021, yeah. 2021. 2.2 MEMBER GRANDIS: And you mentioned 23 some names of licensed establishments. 2.4 MR. GEBREYOHANNES: Mm-hmm. 25 MEMBER GRANDIS: In any of these

1 situations did the licensee explain to you that you needed to get a license of some sort from the 2 3 city or the ABC? Did any of them ever say 4 anything to you about asking your credentials? 5 MR. GEBREYOHANNES: At the time, no, because I didn't have a venue. 6 I didn't get my 7 venue until 2022. These were already established 8 venues, so all I did was create a website to book 9 events, make my booking fee and have a venue for my clients to have to host these events, and 10 11 these are all licensed locations. 12 MEMBER GRANDIS: Okay, so now you --13 you used the term "venue," so in your thinking, this tax situation that we're talking about here 14 15 now based on this investigative report is because 16 it's at your venue? 17 MR. GEBREYOHANNES: I'm sorry; could 18 you repeat the question? 19 MEMBER GRANDIS: You used the term 20 "venue." 21 MR. GEBREYOHANNES: Mm-hmm. 2.2 MEMBER GRANDIS: So, was it in your --23 so you now have a venue; is that what you're --2.4 but when you did these two events, was it in your thinking that that was your venue? 25

1	Because you used the term I'm just
2	trying to understand what your business model and
3	whether or not you follow any city's procedure on
4	getting the right type of licensing, insurance,
5	et cetera. So you used the term "venue," so in
6	your mind when you booked these two events, was
7	that your venue?
8	MR. GEBREYOHANNES: Are you talking
9	about the events for the 10th and the 11th?
10	MEMBER GRANDIS: Yes. Yes, sir.
11	MR. GEBREYOHANNES: Yes, so my space
12	would be the rental space, correct.
13	MEMBER GRANDIS: So in your mind that
14	rental space was your venue?
15	MR. GEBREYOHANNES: Correct.
16	MEMBER GRANDIS: And what is the name
17	of your company?
18	MR. GEBREYOHANNES: The Weekend Social
19	Club.
20	MEMBER GRANDIS: And is that
21	registered with the city at all?
22	MR. GEBREYOHANNES: Yes.
23	MEMBER GRANDIS: And where is it
24	registered?
25	MR. GEBREYOHANNES: It's I have a

1	copy if you want me to fill out the copy.
2	MEMBER GRANDIS: No, sir. I'm just
3	asking you which agency did you register with?
4	MR. GEBREYOHANNES: Under D.C. So I
5	filed my regular LLC and I got a basic business
6	license, and also two trade names under whichever
7	website that we're able to do so. I mean, that's
8	how I could get my C of O's.
9	MEMBER GRANDIS: But if I follow the
10	tax situation, you don't have a C of O.
11	MR. GEBREYOHANNES: I do have two C of
12	O's.
13	MEMBER GRANDIS: For this particular
14	location?
15	MR. GEBREYOHANNES: Yes, they might be
16	under Five Lounge, which was the whole trade
17	name, but I bought the Weekend Social Club trade
18	name and added to, you know, the business in
19	order to change the name of it.
20	MEMBER GRANDIS: So, you actually have
21	a C of O in the name of the Weekend Social Club?
22	MR. GEBREYOHANNES: No, that's my
23	trade name. It's Haru Group, LLC. I'm sorry.
24	MEMBER GRANDIS: Okay, so you have a
25	C of O and that C of O is for the location where

1	these two events were?
2	MR. GEBREYOHANNES: Correct.
3	MEMBER GRANDIS: And were you
4	purchasing the alcohol from a wholesaler or the
5	alcohol for the first night? Just help me
6	understand, who did you get that alcohol from?
7	I think you stated it; I just wanted
8	to make sure I got it.
9	MR. GEBREYOHANNES: It's Steve Louis.
10	J. Matsikis representative.
11	MEMBER GRANDIS: Who are they?
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13	MR. GEBREYOHANNES: At the time I
14	thought they were a licensed caterer in D.C., but
15	their license is in Virginia.
16	MEMBER GRANDIS: Did you have
17	insurance for this space that you say you have a
18	C of O for? Did you have business insurance,
19	liability insurance?
20	MR. GEBREYOHANNES: Yes.
21	MEMBER GRANDIS: You do?
22	MR. GEBREYOHANNES: Yes, with Liberty.
23	MEMBER GRANDIS: Chairman, I think
24	that's all. I'm just trying to make sure I
25	understand what was the thinking of this

individual.

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Thank you for your answers, sir.

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MR. GEBREYOHANNES: My pleasure.

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CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right, Mr.

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Gebreyohannes. I want to get some clarification

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because I think a lot of us are confused. So,

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you have this business called the Weekend Social

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MR. GEBREYOHANNES: The business model

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CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right, so what is it that you provide? So I come to your -

booking.

- I go on your website and I rent your space for a birthday party -- what is it that you provide me?

MR. GEBREYOHANNES: So, I provide the space, an on-site manager and security. And then I require them to either have a caterer or, you know, hire one through us at the time, which would either be the Louis that I have or they would provide their own. So, I've adjusted my model since to where it's now through Grub Rockstar Catering Company whose licensed, because I don't want to take the risk anymore, and follow coordinates of all events from here on out. they're at my location, then that has to be catered for food and beverages. If it's any other venue, these other venues are fully licensed such as Ozio's, 1831 and D.C. Capitol Bar & Grill on East Capitol Street. They will then take care of the host with the other services that they offer. But aside from that I would just keep my booking fee for sending them the business.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right, so you create the space and if they want to serve food and alcohol, then they either have to go to

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your preferred caterer or they have to get their 1 2 own caterer to cater the event; is that correct? MR. GEBREYOHANNES: 3 That's correct. We're similar to like a banguet hall; we just 4 have a bar and lounge setting. So a banquet hall 5 is another space that we just rent that would be 6 7 available for rent, a caterer would be available. 8 I'm not sure if they're allowed to bring their 9 own food and alcohol, but from back-in-the-day cases, that's how it used to be. But I just 10 11 provide scenery that my clients prefer which is 12 a bar and lounge setting. 13 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: And so you 14 provide a manager and you provide security; is 15 that correct? 16 MR. GEBREYOHANNES: Correct. 17 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: What is it that 18 a manager does? 19 MR. GEBREYOHANNES: He just runs the 20 operations, make sure my clients are catered to. 21 You know, A/C, if they need tables, utensils, 2.2 just all of the above, anything that my clients 23 need they will tend to. 2.4 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right. 25 MR. GEBREYOHANNES: Yeah, that's

1 solely from my location. At other venues the 2 other venues would be responsible as far as staff 3 and customer service. CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: 4 Just -- I quess 5 the way you have explained before is that you 6 have been acting as a promoter for other venues, 7 and other venues that they have you provide the 8 clientele or you provide the -- I'm sorry; you 9 provide the clientele and either/fro, but now you decided that you want to be the venue. So that's 10 11 now your business model; it's like you now want 12 to operate your own venue. 13 So, are you thinking about applying for a license for this establishment? 14 15 MR. GEBREYOHANNES: Yes, Chairman. 16 After doing some research, after being stopped on 17 the attempt on the 11th, I ceased all operations 18 regarding alcohol. That way I can move forward 19 and attempt to get a license of my own, and also 20 update the CO's within my property. 21 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: So, one of the -- okay, so you said that you have a landlord, so 2.2 you're renting the space; is that correct? 23 That is correct. 2.4 MR. GEBREYOHANNES: 25 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: So, what is it

1 that -- what type of establishment is it that 2 your landlord believes that you are operating? MR. GEBREYOHANNES: He knows I'm 3 4 running an events space business. 5 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right. Any questions by any of the investigators, any of the 6 7 board members want to ask before I try to wrap 8 this hearing up? MEMBER GRANDIS: Mr. Chairman, I know 9 I've asked a bunch of questions. 10 11 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Yes, Mr. 12 Grandis. 13 MEMBER GRANDIS: Now with this 14 dialogue -- thank you. Sir, when you went to 15 this particular space about these two, what the 16 investigation report is about, you met with the 17 owner of the building or a tenant that is leasing 18 the space that you are now using? 19 MR. GEBREYOHANNES: I'm sorry; could 20 you repeat the question? 21 MEMBER GRANDIS: When you located this 2.2 particular space as the subject of these two 23 nights' investigation, had you gotten a lease from either the landlord who owns the whole 2.4 25 building or that portion of the building or a

tenant that was renting the building or a portion of that building that you used?

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON:

MR. GEBREYOHANNES: I'm not sure if I fully understand your question. But if have -- I do have a lease here if that's what you're asking.

MEMBER GRANDIS: Mm-hmm.

MR. GEBREYOHANNES: From Sahid or Atolla Al Mahmidian.

MEMBER GRANDIS: I'm not stating myself well enough for you to understand the question. I'm not concerned about the person's name at this point, but did that person represent themselves as the owner -- owner, okay -- the owner of that building or the premises of the area that you're using? Or did that person represent themselves as a tenant who has a lease from the owner for that building or that portion of the building? Because I'm utterly not following what the chain of ownership is. did -- the person who gave you permission, was that person the owner of record of the building or the space that you're using, or the tenant? MR. GEBREYOHANNES: No, that person

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1 was the owner of the building who gave me the 2 lease. 3 MEMBER GRANDIS: Okay, so owner of the 4 building. 5 MR. GEBREYOHANNES: Right. MEMBER GRANDIS: And did the owner of 6 7 the building in that lease give you permission to 8 sell alcoholic beverages; is that in the lease 9 that you have? MR. GEBREYOHANNES: 10 Yes. 11 MEMBER GRANDIS: If you're not clear, that's fine. 12 13 MR. GEBREYOHANNES: I would have to 14 double check, but to my knowledge, yes he knows 15 I'm currently running an events space business 16 which also may consume alcoholic beverages. 17 MEMBER GRANDIS: Well, he may know 18 that, but it may not be in the lease, okay. 19 So let's move on from there. 20 MR. GEBREYOHANNES: Mm-hmm. 21 MEMBER GRANDIS: If that is the case 2.2 that the person and you have permission to be in 23 that space, knows you're going to be selling 2.4 alcoholic beverages, did they ask you for a copy 25 of your ABC license or one-day license, or

anything from the ABC agency?

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MR. GEBREYOHANNES: No, I was not asked.

MEMBER GRANDIS: And it was in your mind until this hearing that you could just go find a space in D.C. regardless of how it's licensed or permitted, or C of O that you simply could go there and have a party that sells alcoholic beverages?

I'm not challenging you; I'm just trying to get your thinking that you could just go anywhere in the city and just have a special event for a birthday or whatever without city knowledge and approvals?

MR. GEBREYOHANNES: Not exactly. So, when I first wanted to have my own space, I knew that we did have to get C of O's and for me that was just being able to say that I operate the space not knowing in full detail, you know, occupancy load, et cetera. But no, I wasn't just getting a space in order to just, you know, have alcohol to serve and consume; I knew that I at least needed a caterer if I didn't have an ABC Class C license or a temporary license. This entire time I told you I was under the assumption

1	that the current caterer that I was working with
2	was licensed and registered in D.C. After
3	finding that afterwards, unknown
4	MEMBER GRANDIS: Assumptions can be
5	dangerous. So you didn't even inquire if the
6	caterer was licensed in D.C.?
7	MR. GEBREYOHANNES: Well, no. He
8	presented me this sheet that I showed to the
9	first agent, and that's when he acknowledged that
10	this isn't a D.C. caterer's license.
11	MEMBER GRANDIS: Right. So, you say
12	you have two C of O's, if I heard you correctly?
13	MR. GEBREYOHANNES: Yeah, one for
14	upstairs, one for downstairs. I was required to
15	do so.
16	MEMBER GRANDIS: And the one for
17	downstairs, what is the occupancy on that C of O?
18	MR. GEBREYOHANNES: From my memory it
19	says 12.
20	MEMBER GRANDIS: And were there 12 or
21	less people in that space when our investigators
22	were there?
23	MR. GEBREYOHANNES: It was more than
24	12.
25	MEMBER GRANDIS: The 2nd Floor, you

1 say you have a C of O, sir. 2 MR. GEBREYOHANNES: Correct. 3 MEMBER GRANDIS: What is the C of O 4 for; is it for a restaurant, is this for office 5 space, what does it say on that C of O? 6 MR. GEBREYOHANNES: It just says 7 office space. 8 MEMBER GRANDIS: And did you have 9 people that were part of the event on the 1st Floor accessing the 2nd Floor on those two 10 11 evenings? 12 MR. GEBREYOHANNES: Not on both 13 evenings. Just on the second, that's it. 14 MEMBER GRANDIS: So on one of the 15 evenings you knowingly had a C of O that clearly 16 said office, but you allowed individuals to go on the 2nd Floor? 17 18 MR. GEBREYOHANNES: Yes. To be 19 honest, a C of O stating that if it's office 20 space, if I'm unable to rent my space for event 21 use whether it's an office or a bar or, you know, 2.2 a kitchen space, I assumed at the time the space 23 is a space. 2.4 MEMBER GRANDIS: Okay. Sir, 25 assumptions can be dangerous.

MR. GEBREYOHANNES: Mm-hmm.

MEMBER GRANDIS: Imagine if there was an emergency in that building -- up till now even -- the expectations of people who are there is that you have the right license so that they know that they're safe in that space.

So, I want to thank you. I'm just thinking that there's some education that you need to put yourself through to be a responsible business person offering alcohol in the city.

MR. GEBREYOHANNES: I understand.

MEMBER GRANDIS: Chairman, thank you.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right, I'm going to bring this hearing to an end. The board will make a determination, the board will take this matter under advisement and whether we're going to lift the cease-and-desist. But one thing, the only thing I will leave with you today, sir you are -- you have a commercial space and if you are going to allow, in order for alcohol to be served, even alcohol that has been given away, in a commercial space, a license is required, and a license can be obtained either by you applying for a license from the agency, a permit license, a one-day license, a temporary

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one-day license, or you utilize a caterer and both -- if a one-day license is being utilized, the licensed owner or ABC manager has to be there for the entire period, or if there is a caterer that if -- if there's a catered event, the caterer provides food, alcohol that's incident to the food, and either the caterer or ABC manager has to be at the event the entire time, okay? So that's where we are. But the board will make, will take this matter under advisement and we will let you know as soon as possible whether or not we are going to lift the cease-and-desist or whether or not it will remain in place until further action, okay?

Do you have any other questions, sir?

MR. GEBREYOHANNES: No, I'd just like
to say it is -- I mean, I take full
responsibility, obviously, for my failure of not
fully understanding compliance and I'd just like
to request some leniency in giving me a second
chance in order to be compliant and run this
operational group.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right.

Thank you very much, sir. Have a great day.
