CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right, the
next case on our calendar, we have another factfinding hearing. And this case is DC's Finest,
License No. 120530. Mr. Orellana, can you please
elevate the rights of the Licensee, excuse me, in

MR. ORELLANA: Bob Simmons, your access has been elevated. Matt Lawson-Baker, your access has been elevated. And that appears to be all, Chairman.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Thank you. Hi, good morning, everyone. Good morning.

MR. SIMMONS: Good morning, gentlemen.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: I would like the parties to introduce themselves for the record. Please spell and state your name for the record. I'll start with you, Mr. Simmons, and your relationship.

MR. ORELLANA: Yes, sir. Here.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Yeah. I need you to introduce yourself for the record, sir.

Do you mind spelling and state your name, sir?

MR. SIMMONS: I'm sorry, yeah. Robert

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this case?

1 Simmons, DC's Finest. 2 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: And what's your 3 relationship? Are you the owner, sir? MR. SIMMONS: Yeah, owner. 4 5 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Mr. Lawson-6 Baker, please spell and state your name for the 7 record, please, sir. 8 MR. LAWSON-BAKER: Good morning, Board 9 members, it's Matt Lawson-Baker, and I'm also an owner of DC's Finest with Bob. 10 11 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right. 12 Good morning, sir. All right. 13 MR. SIMMONS: For full disclosure, 14 he's my son-in-law, too, if you're looking at the 15 16 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right. 17 hold on a second. 18 Now this is another license that has 19 been in safekeeping. And so what we're trying to 20 find out is where are we in bringing this license 21 back into production? Because I'm not sure if 2.2 you'd overheard the hearing before. One of the 23 concerns that the Board has, as you're aware, we 2.4 are expanding the program in November, the

unlicensed. And we are all aware that there are

a significant amount of unlicensed facilities operating in D.C. In November, ABRA will allow these unlicensed facilities - they will be able to apply for licenses to, yeah, to operate.

One of the concerns that we have been told by a lot of these facilities is that D.C., we don't have enough product. So therefore, they don't want to apply for a license, because they are afraid that they would not be able to operate, because there is not sufficient product on the market.

And so you have a cultivation license. And I know that once the law was changed, you were also given the opportunity that you automatically were also given that manufacturer license. So please let us know where you are with this facility and able to operate.

MR. SIMMONS: Go ahead, Matt.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: And when you speak, just identify -- I guess if you're speaking, Mr. Lawson-Baker, so when you speak just identify yourself. We have a court reporter, so just to make sure that when you speak identify yourself when you're speaking.

MR. LAWSON-BAKER: Yes, so Matt

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Lawson-Baker. I'd like to give you the update on where we are at DC's Finest. Just for the record, we're also the owners and operators of Alternative Solutions. We've been operational since 2015, and we currently command over 40 percent of the market share. So we are very integrated in this program and heavily invested. And we're not looking at changing that approach.

Investigator Peru, good to see you, thanks for joining. We have a big property that's in process right now in Chillum Place. It's 65,000 square feet total.

We've been through a few delays in getting our project up and running due to the existing building going through a reconstruction which is at its final stages and final punch list right now. They just finished the exterior paving on the weekend. So we're finally getting that building ready to be built out.

Our design process, we have finalized the permit plans and the permit package as of Monday. And we're due to submit the permit set hopefully tomorrow. We're just finalizing the application with our expediter.

We are also going down the fast track

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process that's now available through permitting, so we're doing everything we can to expedite that process.

We've spent over a quarter of a million on the design. We've gone through many iterations trying to forecast what this market is actually going to look like, and it's a lot of crystal ball stuff.

You know, we've been riding the roller coaster of D.C. for many years, as I mentioned before, so there's a bit of a gamble and a bit of a hood that the market is going to be there to fulfil the requirements that we're going to go produce all of this cannabis.

But we feel confident that our plan of attack should be very effective for the program and be able to support a lot of additional businesses coming into the program.

So I'm saying all that, I know you want exact timelines. For what we're being told, the permitting process can take three months, can take six months, because of the new systems that have been set up within -- since they changed from DCRA.

Any help we can get on that to

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expedite it would be fantastic. I know you guys are not directly associated with them, but as soon as we get the permit in hand, that the contractors are already lined up, we've already ordered out all the materials, we're going to start bringing in the materials while we're waiting for the permit so that everything is onsite.

And our construction timeline is four months from when we get the permit until when we get plants in the ground. Then from plants in the ground it's a nine, ten week growing cycle plus four weeks dry cure package.

So in a perfect world, if we got the permit in October, you know, we'd be built out by January and starting to grow so that by April next year we're getting product to market.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Thank you, Mr. Peru, can you identify yourself on the record, please?

MR. PERU: Investigator Jason Peru with ABCA Enforcement.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Mr. Peru, do you any questions, or any comments, or anything, regarding DC's Finest?

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MR. PERU: Yeah. No, I'll just say that Matt has always been very responsive with any calls and questions regarding Alternative Solutions. And we had a recent conversation in reference to the new location.

I have been up there and seen, and have watched the build-out take place from the roofing of the building to the actual physical building being complete on the structure itself.

So yeah, you know, I will just say that I think that we are moving in the direction they're claiming that they're moving in, from what I can tell. And as time gets closer for them to complete the build out, and we're looking at all the requirements from security, to access, and all that stuff, we'll have a conversation.

But I believe that what Matt is saying in this timeframe is very possible based on what I have physically seen out there and what he's before done so far.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Thank you, Mr.

Peru. Any questions by any Board members?

So either Mr. Simmons, or Mr. Lawson
Baker, any final comments you want to make?

MR. SIMMONS: Just that I was born in

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D.C., and we're excited to be here, and we're not a national, we're a local bunch of guys. Matt's background in building development, as well as mine, has helped us keep things moving and giving you the answer, Mr. Peru, that you need to see that we're serious about this. So we're looking forward to continue what we're doing, and I thank the Board on our behalf for monitoring and helping us along.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right, just a quick question. I know you're saying it's a large facility. So how much product do you believe that, once the facility is up and running, how much product can you guys produce?

MR. LAWSON-BAKER: So, right now, we're taking it with -- we are phasing the building because, as I said before, nobody knows how this market's going to play out. So our phase one is 30,000 square feet. It'll double our existing capacity, so what we're doing in Alternative Solutions will double.

What we're planning to do there is fill in all the products that were not currently making, because if the market doesn't grow, which is a possibility, you know, you're adding your

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licenses, but there's no guarantee the patients are coming with those licenses.

So if the market doesn't grow, our goal is to produce all of the products that we're not currently producing and putting on the market. So that way we'll still be able to keep the business afloat and wait for the market to grow.

So doubling what we're doing now, you know, would double our flower output from 200 to 400 pounds a month. An then all of our material for extracts and other products, pre-rolls, tinctures, vape cartridges, the whole lot would double from, again, 200 pounds of trimmed process to 400 pounds.

At a minimum, you know, we've got a state of the art facility design in this new building. The building that we're currently operating, and Investigator Peru will be able to confirm this, but we've been renovating and upgrading every year to keep it at a very high standard. And with the new building, you know, everything we've learned over the years is going into that to make it more efficient and produce greater yields.

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So I'm interested to see how the market will play out. And I don't think anyone can tell us how many patients we're going to have to work the numbers back from a demand point of view. It's really going to be just wait and see.

So as the market grows, and if we're selling everything we're growing, and we can foresee that, we can expand into the rest of the building very quickly from there.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Now what, I know that you feel that you have current facility, so what is it that you currently produce, and what are some products that you anticipate you want to produce --

MR. LAWSON-BAKER: So right now our major product is flower, obviously. And then our number two is vape cartridges, pre-rolls, after that then tinctures. We do topicals and we do concentrates.

The concentrates we do are limited, because the demand is really not there. But what we plan to do in the new building is increase our extraction capabilities. Right now we currently just to ethanol extraction.

In the new facility, I would like to

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do hydrocarbonate extraction, along with more solventless extraction, so we can provide the full array of products including all edible products that are currently allowed in the program along with a bigger line of concentrates that we don't currently provide.

And since you brought that up, I do have a question relating to that, and I'm hoping that the process for getting these products into the market will be streamlined or improved.

Because going through the route at DOH adds another layer of complexity and delays everything.

So I think it could be split up even further into the product lines where, you know, you don't need to get a full kitchen approval to make all edible products. Because there's a lot of products you can make in the edibles line that you don't need a fully-fledged kitchen.

So, yeah, I think that's something that I'd like to discuss with Sean and Investigator Peru in going into figuring out ways that we can make that process more efficient on our side.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Thank you. I

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have it. Are you aware there are certain -- in food production it still adds a little time to the Department of Health. So I'm not quite sure, but I know that our agency will provide you whatever assistance that we can as far as the Government that's can certainly try to make -- ensure that the business succeeds, if it gets the products that are needed.

And especially I know that the unlicensed market, there are certain products that they offer that I'm not sure if you currently offer. And so if we are going to bring those unlicensed businesses into the licensed market, then we need to provide them the options that they currently produce, so wherever it is that they get their current products from.

MR. LAWSON-BAKER: Yeah. And the new facility will have all of that in DC's Finest.

But what I'd like to do is get some products early into market so that when they do change over we already have them in the market.

And we can do that in our current facility, but it's how you define edibles. Is it a pharmaceutical product or is it a baked goods or, you know, a kitchen product? So, I mean,

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there are some definitions there that can be played around with.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Well, I think that that's discussions you need to have with our Director, also with Mr. Gordy and Mr. Peru. And whatever it is that the Board can do to assist that process, we will be open once that conversation has been brought to our Director and to see what it is that the Board can do to -- or to the Mayor, or the Council, to assist you in making sure that that occurs.

MR. LAWSON-BAKER: Okay, I have one final question. And you don't have to answer it if you don't want to. But is there any way that the Board can provide any assistance with the permit process, expediting it?

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Well, I think that -- Mr. Peru, can you answer that question? What is it that, from your end, Department of Buildings, can do as far as the Department of Buildings is concerned?

MR. PERU: I mean, we definitely have contacts there that we can reach out to. I mean, have you submitted things yet? Is that what you're asking -

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(Simultaneous speaking.)

MR. LAWSON-BAKER: Once it's submitted then I can, I'll send you over the full application so you can see it. And then any assistance in the process will be helpful. I don't want it to end up being six months, because it got stuck on someone's desk with some random comment.

MR. PERU: Okay, and I'll deal with Mr. Gordy. We can definitely, if you've got the resources we can maybe, you know, ask for assistance, look at it, from DLCP.

MR. LAWSON-BAKER: Much appreciated.

MR. PERU: Yeah.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Our agency has

- I'll say that agency will do whatever it is

within our power to assist you. But you have to

let us know. I mean, I can't promise that were

going to solve the problem. But at least if you

let us know, then we will work to see what can be

done to ensure.

I know that this government wants to make sure that we offer one of the best industries in the country. So I'm saying that the entire government is behind what you are

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1 doing. And so whatever it is that we can do to 2 ensure that you succeed then we will do that to 3 ensure that you are able to bring your product onto market as quickly as possible. 4 5 MR. LAWSON-BAKER: Fantastic. 6 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Okay. All 7 right --8 MR. LAWSON-BAKER: That's aligned with 9 our goals --10 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: I'm sorry. 11 MR. LAWSON-BAKER: I'd say said that's 12 aligned with our goals as well. We want to be 13 the best in country, and we've got a very high 14 standard of high quality product that we produce. 15 And we want to continue that. 16 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Thank you, sir, 17 for your representation today. Before we close, 18 and questions by any Board members? 19 Do you want to say something, Mr. 20 Grandis? 21 MEMBER GRANDIS: Thank you. Mr. 2.2 Lawson-Baker, after this hearing, if you could 23 provide the agency with some of your insight on 2.4 this, sort of what I think you're talking about 25 as a kitchen light type of thing, as our Chairman

1 says, we have to stay in our lane, and DOE stays 2 in their lane, and the Department of Building 3 stays in its lane, but we all try to work 4 together. 5 It could be helpful if you had some ideas that can be documented on maybe a less 6 7 formal process for the kitchen issue when it 8 relates to the kind of products that you're 9 talking about. If you have some insight, that 10 could be helpful to the agency. I'm just 11 offering that. But I think we all concur with the 12 13 Chairman that the District wants to become not 14 only competitive or stay competitive, but be an 15 example for the rest of the nation. So on these 16 kind of topics, it's a learning curve for all of 17 But your insight we would benefit from. 18 Thank you. 19 Mr. Chairman, thank you. 20 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Thank you, Mr. 21 Grandis. Mr. Short? 2.2 MEMBER SHORT: I'd just like to say to 23 Mr. Bob Simmons and to Matt Baker. 2.4 MR. LAWSON-BAKER: Sure. 25 MEMBER SHORT: Your presentation was

1 pretty well together, and thank you for that. 2 And to Mr. Simmons, you're not alone. There are a few of us Washingtonians left in this city. 3 And as you know, this --4 5 MR. SIMMONS: I may predate you I go to 1947, Old Providence Hospital. 6 though. 7 They tore it down after they recycled me. 8 MEMBER SHORT: No, you do not predate I was born in the front bedroom of 719 9 me. 10 Langston Terrace, NE. 11 MR. SIMMONS: Oh, really? 12 MEMBER SHORT: 1946. 13 MR. SIMMONS: Oh, no. Well, good. 14 MEMBER SHORT: Welcome to the club. 15 Thank you very much, Mr. Chair, that's all I 16 have. 17 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right, 18 Thank you, Mr. Lawson-Baker, Mr. thank you. 19 Simmons. It's actually my first opportunity to 20 meeting you formally in this process. So thank 21 you for the work that you've done. We look 2.2 forward to continuing working with you to make 23 sure that this process works. 2.4 You want to say something, Mr. 25 Simmons?
