CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: We're back on the record. Our next case is a fact-finding hearing on three pub crawls. I'm going to call all three cases at the same time.

The first case is a pub crawl for DC Halloween Crawl 2022, Project DC Events. The second event, it's Reginald Eliacin, the Halloween Hip Hop Bar Crawl, RegMoPromo Holdings. And the third one, the applicant is Miranda McLean. This is for Nightmare on M Street, Lindy Promotions.

Ms. Fashbaugh, can you please elevate the rights of the parties for the pub crawl, please? There's three pub crawl hearings, please.

MS. FASHBAUGH: Please stand by. Alex Lopez, your rights have been elevated. Andrew Kline, your rights have been elevated. Andrew Huff, your rights have been elevated. Captain Sherrelle Williams, your rights have been elevated. Captain Craig Solgat, your rights have been elevated. Mike Silverstein, your rights have been elevated. Kevin Puente, your rights

have been elevated. Reginald Eliacin, your rights have been elevated. M. Fisher from RegMoPromo, your rights have been elevated. And we have one more person who I am going to elevate, Mike Bramson.

That is all, Mr. Chair.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Thank you. Mr. RegMo, I need you to mute your phone, please.

Good morning, everyone. If you have a camera, can you please turn your camera on, please. Is there anyone here from the BID?

Okay, good. All right, good.

All right. Good morning, everyone.

So I'm going to have everyone introduce themself for the record. So let's start with, let's start with the representative from -- Mr. Lopez, so let me have you introduce yourself for the record, sir, and then we'll have -- we'll start with you, Mr. Lopez. Mr. Lopez, are you there? I'm sorry. That's one of the reasons why I ask everyone to turn their cameras on because, at least if your camera is on, I can tell that you're there.

Okay. Let me start with you, I'll start with you, Mr. Kline, since I believe I know who you represent. So go ahead, Mr. Kline.

4	Mr. Huff, can you please spell and state your
5	name for the record, please?

7	Mr. Chairman. My name is Andrew Huff. Andrew,
8	common spelling. Last name Huff, H-U-F-F. And
9	I'm with the Golden Triangle Business Improvement
10	District. Thank you.
11	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Mr.
12	Silverstein.
13	MR. SILVERSTEIN: Mike Silverstein, M-
14	I-K-E, S-I-L-V-E-R-S-T-E-I-N. ANC 2B06. Did you
15	hear me?
16	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Yes, sir. I've
17	heard you. Good morning, Mr. Silverstein.
18	MR. SILVERSTEIN: Thank you, sir.
19	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: So, Captain
20	Solgat, are you able to speak now? No. Still
21	not. We'll come back. I believe everyone has
22	identified themself for the record.
23	We're having this pub crawl hearing,
24	and one of the reasons we're having this pub
25	crawl hearing is that these three pub crawl

operators have requested pub crawls around Halloween. And the Board is always reminded that Halloween, several years ago we had events around Halloween and that was a perfect storm. It's my understanding, since the Board has established rules and regulations regarding pub crawls, that we have not had those concerns subsequent. That's my understanding, that's my belief. We have not had any, at least -- well, that's my belief.

But, again, because it is around Halloween, although it is not on Halloween, we want to make sure that the operators are providing appropriate services, that they're complying with the regulations. So that's one of the reasons why we contacted them today for them to present. We'll get some response from the BID, the Golden Triangle BID, which is one of the areas where the pub crawl will be. We'll also talk to Reginald regarding U Street. And just to make sure that the parties are complying with our rules and regulations, and then we will move forward.

Oh, I'm sorry. I did not have Mr.

Puente introduce himself for the record. So, Mr.

	Puente, can you please spell and state your name
2	for the record and where you're currently
3	employed, sir?
4	MR. PUENTE: Yes, sir. Kevin Puente,
5	K-E-V-I-N, P-U-E-N-T-E, ABRA. I'm an
6	investigator.
7	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right.
8	Good morning.
9	Mr. Kline, since you are here
10	MR. SOLGAT: Just real quick, can
11	anybody hear me?
12	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: I'm sorry. Who
13	is that? Someone is speaking.
14	MR. SOLGAT: Thank you.
15	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Yes, sir. Can
16	you introduce yourself for the record, sir?
17	MR. SOLGAT: All right. Yes, so,
18	again, my name is Captain Craig Solgat, spelled
19	C-R-A-I-G, last name is Solgat, S-O-L-G-A-T. I'm
20	a captain of the 3rd District, which encapsulates
21	the U Street corridor.
22	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right.
23	Good morning, sir, and welcome.
24	All right. So we can start with Mr.
25	Kline. You're here, and so maybe you can tell us

what it is that, as far as Project DC Events, what is it that you have to offer regarding the pub crawl, the request for a pub crawl on September 30th, 2022 and this DC crawl -- so the DC Halloween Crawl is on October 29th.

MR. KLINE: Correct.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: And there's also a DC, I'm sorry, a Santa Crawl on September, I'm sorry, on December 10th, 2022. So maybe, Mr. Kline, you can just provide some more information to us. What is --

Sure. Thank you, thank MR. KLINE: you, Mr. Chairman. I appreciate that. And thank you for holding this hearing. As, Mr. Chairman, you pointed out, we've had these fact-finding hearings for a number of years. Since what was then described as the perfect storm occurred, and that's seven years ago if you can believe it. But I think, Mr. Chair, you are correct. With the regulations that the Board put in place and the operators' compliance with those regulations, we have not had a repeat of what we saw seven years ago.

My client, as you stated, would like to do a Halloween crawl on October 29th from the

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hours of 2 p.m. to 10 p.m. It is anticipated that there will be between 2500 and 3500 patrons. They have filed a comprehensive security plan, as well as a trash management plan.

In terms of security, they will have 30 of their own staff who will be there monitoring. And as you will see from the plan, each of the establishments involved will also have security and will maintain security for their premises. Mr. Lopez has found that that has worked well over the last number of bar crawls that he's organized and held and that the establishments have done their part.

I want to speak for a minute about trash management because I think that was an issue that came up after the last bar crawl and we were here with the BID, representatives of Golden Triangle BID. There were some discussions about the BID taking over the post-cleanup, the management of the post-cleanup. Mr. Lopez -- those discussions were never finalized, but he remains open to pursuing that.

In lieu of that, there is a trash management plan. He also plans to take photographs after the cleanup is done, so there

isn't any question about what's been done. And we're happy to make those available to the Board, as the Board sees fit.

In addition to the security that will be provided by his organization and the security that will be provided by the individual establishments -- and this is not part of his plan, it's something that he and I have discussed in the past week -- he is committed to bringing in a minimum of two reimbursable detail officers. As the Board knows, reimbursable detail officers are not assigned to any particular establishment but are available in the community where they're deployed. And he's expressed a willingness to do that, and I wanted to communicate that to the Board, as well.

So that's a summary. We're happy to answer any questions that the Board might have with respect to what is planned.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right.

Thank you. Mr. Bramson, what is it that you're planning for your event, please?

MR. BRAMSON: Yes, it's a very similar, we have a very similar plan. But we hired, aside from each bar having their own

security, which has worked well in the past, and we've told them to have even more than normal, what worked well for us last year is we hired a third-party company called Next Level Security. There's four of them, two at each registration bar. Once registration, which is usually the busiest time, they kind of scatter and check in on each bar. So aside from our staff, which is around 20 to 30, as well, we also, in addition to that, the security of the establishments, we have a third party, which I think was a requirement last year that we had and worked out really well.

And then we also hired, same as last year, it's Bayside Cleaning, and they start at 2 a.m. But I do remember the conversation last year having the, you know, kind of the BID take over that, and we reimburse them for that. I still think that's kind of the best idea instead of having, you know, three different companies. I'm not sure which one Project DC hired, but we hired another company. I'm sure the BID has their regular one that comes, you know, at the end, at 4 a.m. or 6 a.m., whatever time they come. So I'm still open to that, as well.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: So, Mr.

Bramson, you're asking for how many people for 1 2 your event, sir? 3 MR. BRAMSON: We have about 2,000 people. 4 5 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: So the request to the Board is for how many? For 2,000? 6 7 MR. BRAMSON: Yes. 8 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: And what are 9 the hours? 10 MR. BRAMSON: The hours are 2 p.m. to 11 10 p.m. 12 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: And what area, 13 what specific, what area are you requesting --14 MR. BRAMSON: Dupont. 15 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Dupont. All 16 RegMo Promotions, can you tell us what's 17 been requested and when? 18 MR. ELIACIN: Thank you, Mr. Chairman, 19 for having us. Yes, we're going to be doing our 20 bar crawl 2 to 10 p.m. along U Street and 14th 21 It's going to be on October 29th. 22 are anticipating 1,500 to 2,000 people. security plan, we have, I believe we're going to 23 24 have about five security guards, in addition to 25 the security that's inside the bars. We work

with DevilDog Security as far as that.

And we also, our registration points are pretty much during the time of, the scheduled time of the bars, so we always have either our staff, which is generally, at least, we have eight to ten staff members and maybe, like I said, about five security guards, and we kind of -- as well as us. We manage the whole event, and we'll have somebody at each one of the locations in order to do check-in and also as far as to provide extra security, as well.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Thank you. Mr. Huff, as far as part of the BID, do you have any comments you want to make?

MR. HUFF: Sure. I'm going to have a brief testimony, but I'm happy to read into the record if this is the appropriate time.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Go ahead, sir.

MR. HUFF: Thank you. Good morning, members of the ABC Board. My name is Andrew Huff. I'm the Associate Director for Member and Government Relations at the Golden Triangle Business Improvement District. I appreciate the opportunity to testify before you today regarding the proposed Halloween bar crawls in the Golden

Triangle neighborhood.

As you know, the BID has testified on several occasions before this body, beginning in 2015 regarding the adverse impacts on the neighborhood resulting from multiple bar crawls, including serious issues of both public health and public safety. As we know from the bar crawls that took place last Halloween, there is still a long way to go to ensure that attendees have a safe experience and the neighborhood is not left in disarray the following morning when business owners, workers, residents, and visitors arrive on the Golden Triangle.

Considering what we know about this year's applications, as well as our past experience, we have a couple of concerns we'd like to raise to the Board, the first of which is the number of expected attendees and crowd control. Establishments and sidewalks are already at capacity on Halloween and Halloween weekend in the Golden Triangle. Adding additional people can cause overcrowding and dangerous situations for pedestrians, as we saw this past Halloween.

Additionally, the amount of trash

produced and left behind for others to clean, namely our ambassadors, not a contracted company but our ambassadors, which is also a direct result of this overcrowding. We've presented on several occasions photographs of the condition of the neighborhood during and after these events.

The second issue is post-event cleaning. We have seen repeatedly, in spite of Board-mandated cleaning requirements, the neighborhood totally trashed the morning after these events. Even with contracted cleaners, our ambassadors are left with the job of cleaning up the streets and sidewalks of the neighborhood. We have recently been fortunate to enlist assistance from the District's Department of Public Works and have already requested their assistance for this event, as we have very little faith the promoters will follow through on their requirements in a thorough manner. Cleaning should not take place when the permitted event ends but rather when the neighborhood empties out and should focus on the entire block face where participating bars are located, not just the area adjacent to each establishment.

The Golden Triangle BID works hard to

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support all of the businesses in our neighborhood and to help ensure their success. The pandemic continues to impact the Central Business District and the many small businesses located here. We strive to balance these types of events and activities with the impacts they have on the greater community.

Thank you for the opportunity to testify, and I'd be happy to answer any questions you may have.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Thank you, Mr. Huff. Mr. Silverstein on behalf of the ANC, please.

MR. SILVERSTEIN: Thank you, Mr. Chairman. First, the 2015 event upon which all of this is predicated, was, in fact, the perfect storm, and it involved three different pub crawls all happening at the same time. It did not, at that point, involve a pandemic. It did involve Halloween.

The question is do we really -- is there any public good in holding multiple pub crawls on the same week as Halloween? Because, in reality, we're going to be pulled down here anyway. Halloween is a special holiday in D.C.

It is one that we all appreciate, that we all enjoy, and everyone comes out for it. The idea that anyone needs an additional pub crawl or two or three on a day when the police are going to be stressed anyway and are understaffed anyway, I don't think that it makes sense.

I support pub crawls; I always have.

But this is one of those things. You say you're
going to offer RDOs. We're having problems

staffing RDOs as it is now. We're going to get
them during the day on a day when the police are
going to be out because everyone knows the

Saturday before Halloween is a big party night,
it is the party night in the city. That and, of
course, the Wednesday before Thanksgiving are the
two nights that everybody goes out to party.

This is just not a good idea. And, you know, as much as I respect especially RegMo who have done just such an outstanding job on U Street, it's a question of whether this is the right time. It's almost like pushing too many, trying to put ten pounds of potatoes in a five-pound sack in terms of putting people on the sidewalk, safety issues. And, of course, the history of all of these groups, cleaning up at

10:00 or 10:30 when, in real life, the party continues whether the quote, unquote, event doesn't. And so the place is a mess, there were broken windows last year, there were people who walked into the businesses that were open and used their facilities. It just, it was very, very difficult.

I don't see public good in doing it, but, if you do, and I respect that if you do, please keep the numbers low. Please, please keep the numbers low. It's like unringing a bell. We made a terrible mistake in 2015. Let's be careful what we do this year and not find ourselves in a position where we wish we had done something a little more cautious.

I didn't have prepared statements. I didn't want to make this into some kind of performance. But I just have a bad feeling about this because of all the things that have been going on in the world and in our community, and I don't want us to be doing anything that we'll regret. That's all.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Thank you, Mr. Silverstein. Captain Williams, do you have anything you want to state about pub crawls?

MS. WILLIAMS: Good morning, everyone, again. Last year, we had complaints about the cleanup with the pub crawls. I'm looking now to research any criminal offenses that we had last year, but, on hand, in 2020, we did have four violent crimes, three robberies. The year before, we didn't have anything. In 2018, we had two. So right now, and I'm just trying to pull up our stats to see what we had, what was reported last year during the Halloween season.

So the only thing that I would offer to this testimony is that the RDOs are important for us. We will have our SOD units there to reinforce police visibility with the help of the Department of Transportation, with DDOT, and DPW to help close off the streets and enforce parking violations and so forth.

So that's all that I have to offer to the testimony from my perspective.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Thank you,
Captain. Thank you. Captain Solgat, any
comments you wish to make?

MR. SOLGAT: Yes, good afternoon, everybody. Thank you for having me. First thing, I just wanted to address the issues

regarding, that Captain Williams was talking about. On our end of the U Street corridor, there's been a massive effort with the task force in place. However, it's very, very important to remember that the task force does not begin until 9 p.m. and all the resources are not available at that time. These pub crawls are designed to start at 2:00 in the afternoon, so these resources are not available to us.

Beyond that, I want to echo the sentiments of everybody for 2015. However, now, in 2022, there's a lot of change that's happened, especially within the District and anything you want to say with social media. I do have concerns, as the BID said, with these three events becoming one massive event. And I think with social media and the communication and how quickly people can do so, these locations are not too far from one another, and they could have the potential to escalate into one that no one is prepared for.

In regards to ANC and what they were speaking of, as well, yes, MPD will be stressed then and we do have a problem already fulfilling the RDO program. So asking for more may not even

be feasible. The fact of the matter is I'm looking at specifically RegMo Production security plan. I read it and went over it completely. Listening to what you guys said earlier, you have your staff at every single location. Your plan says four staff members. You have 14 locations. That seems like that's not possible to cover all of them.

You talked about security that's already on site. The security that's already on site is already built that capacity for what their bar is established for, and that's not going to be at 2:00 to 10 p.m., according to your staffing. Again, this is also an increased event with Halloween. You should expect a larger crowd, so that would beyond it.

You talked about having DevilDog
Security. That's five security guards you want
to hire for an estimated on the low end 1,500
people. That would be one security guard for 300
people. That is not even feasible. I would
suggest that you increase your security potential
by a factor of ten. That would mean one security
guard per 30 people. That is much more feasible
and that's realistic of what even a police

officer could manage.

Specifically, with the overall increasing type of thing, we would have to have serious reservations in approving these three collaborative events at the same time. That's all I have.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Thank you. Any questions by any Board members?

MEMBER SHORT: Mr. Short.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Go ahead, Mr.

Short.

MEMBER SHORT: Thank you very much.

Just for the record, we're talking about 7500

people if all of these pub crawls are granted the numbers they want. Seventy-five hundred people, and that's not to include the regular crowd that's normally there on U Street and in Dupont.

So I see one pub crawl says they're going to be at Dupont Circle, which is Connecticut Avenue. And another one said they're going to be -- what address did they give? Well, it was in the same vicinity, so we're talking about having 5500 people between those two pub crawls for Connecticut Avenue.

I'm just very, very worried, very

leery. There have been comments made that there was no complaints about last year or any other years. I think we've heard some testimony from some people today that that's not true. There were complaints. And we're hearing from the police department they can't handle 7500 people between U Street and those smaller sidewalks and Connecticut Avenue, which on a Friday or Saturday night without a pub crawl you can't traverse the sidewalks. Seventy-five hundred people is just too many.

I want to go on the record as saying, as the public safety person on the Board, I am against 7500 people being on these three pub crawls at the same time in the same hours. I think it's very dangerous. I think, as we've heard said many times, it's not if Washington, D.C. will have disastrous situations like other cities, but it's just when.

And, again, we're hearing about the perfect storm. We had three during the perfect storm, three pub crawls permitted at the same time with these same types of numbers. We had it all the same happen on the same weekend. So the perfect storm is being brewed up again.

I would just like for us to really think, and I'd really like to ask the police officers, the two captains from the 3rd District and the 2nd District -- and thank you for your service, both of you -- if I could get one of you to comment on 7500 people between U Street and Connecticut Avenue. And someone mentioned, if they all join into one pub crawl, there's no way, and I do know when they had the perfect storm, the last one, every police officer in the District of Columbia had to be summoned to Connecticut Avenue because they couldn't get any public safety vehicles through: ambulances, fire engines. No public safety was available until they called all of the policemen from every area, every PSA in this city, which means the other citizens of the city weren't protected.

That's all I have to say for this time, and I'd really like, if I could, to get also someone else to talk about the trash. We're hearing now that somebody wants to pay to BID, and I'd like to know are there any contracts with the BID or is this just a pie in the sky. The streets were torn up, trash and litter, human fluids all up and down the streets. And I don't

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think that's a healthy thing for this city and I don't think it's a healthy thing for this board to again have three pub crawls on the same night and same hours, the same day, the same night, the same hours, as we did seven years ago, which didn't work out so well for us.

Again, I'm just saying a word of caution. I, as a Board member, think 7500 is much too much; 1500 to 2000 on U Street is much, much, much too much. I think if someone has requested, maybe the ANC or someone will testify, maybe if we put the numbers at a reasonable, manageable number, MPD would be a lot more satisfied, whoever is going to have to do the trash cleanup will be a lot more satisfied, and it will be a lot more manageable. It's just too many people, and that's my testimony.

Thank you for allowing me to speak.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Any other

questions by any of the Board members? Go ahead,

Mr. Grandis.

MEMBER GRANDIS: I want to thank each of the participants today for taking time. I'm sure you all have very important things to be doing right now, so thank you to help us evaluate

this. 1 2 Mike, if I could ask you a couple of 3 questions. These three applications --CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Mr. Short, can 4 5 you please mute your phone, please? Mr. Short, please mute your phone, please. Mr. Bramson, 6 7 please mute your phone, please. 8 Go ahead, Mr. Grandis. 9 MEMBER GRANDIS: Mike, did you hear my 10 question? These three events are all for 11 Saturday night, correct? 12 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Who are you 13 asking the question? The events are October 14 29th. There are three pub crawls on October 15 29th, on October 29th. 16 MEMBER GRANDIS: Which is a Saturday 17 night. 18 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: It's the 19 Saturday before Halloween. Halloween is Monday. MEMBER GRANDIS: And if it wasn't even 20 21 Halloween weekend, Saturday night in those areas 22 are very busy regardless because we have a lot of 23 good licensees, both restaurants and taverns, in

those areas that are busy on a Saturday night,

and we're grateful that there is activities now

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after COVID somewhat that people can go out. So it's going to be a busy night anyway.

Also, from my experience when I was a bit younger, because Halloween is on Tuesday this year, I believe that some establishments thought having events for Halloween on Thursday nights, some have it on Friday night, some will have it on Sunday night, some will have it on Monday night, and, if you're not too exhausted, some will have it on Tuesday night, which is Halloween. So, Mike, in the recent years, are you familiar with events on other nights when Halloween is, like, on a Tuesday, like I just restated?

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Who are you asking a question of, Mr. Grandis?

MEMBER GRANDIS: As I said, Mr.

Chairman, I'm talking to Mike Silver -- I mean,

I'm happy to have anyone chime in, but Mike is on
the ANC for Dupont Circle, which seems to be the
location of two of these events, if not three.

Mike.

MR. SILVERSTEIN: Well, yes. I mean, Saturday night is the night that everybody is off that everybody goes out to party. And when it's

that close to Halloween, that will probably be the largest night. And we do have a vibrant nightlife culture to begin with down here.

MEMBER GRANDIS: Gratefully.

MR. SILVERSTEIN: Absolutely agreed.

MEMBER GRANDIS: Thank you, Mike. I now have a question for the three applicants, and I don't know who wants to speak up. But are you all coordinating with the other two applicants, particularly the ones that are in Dupont Circle? I believe there are two that would be considered Dupont Circle. Can the applicants just inform the Board what type of communication and coordination you all have had in preparing the applications and also coordination, if any, for that night?

MR. KLINE: I don't think there's been any coordination. I do want to point out that, in terms of my client, the area stretches all the way down to G Street, so I think it's important to note that, you know, G Street is not traditionally Dupont Circle. So, I mean, north - south, this is nine blocks. This is not concentrated within, you know, a four-block area. It's quite a large area, 17 establishments.

2 Silverstein. There will be a lot of people out

certain things with respect to trash cleanup.

And I'm going to expand on what you asked, Mr. Grandis, simply because I think it's an appropriate time. Mr. Short asked about any agreements with the ANC. There aren't at this point, but at least Project DC Events has submitted a detailed trash management plan that calls for trash cleanup to begin at 5 a.m., not at 10:00 at night, not when these establishments

close, but when the neighborhood is empty. And, certainly, by 5:00, it will be empty, and they're

going to be done by 9:00.

If, in the meantime, we've remained willing and open to reaching agreement with the ANC in terms of them handling trash cleanup and the pub crawl operator paying for it, we're more than happy to do it. We've had one or two conversations about it, happy to get with Mr. Huff and see if we can finalize those. But in the event we can't, we do have a very good solid trash management plan, and I don't think that should be overlooked.

People are going to be out, and it seems to me it would be better for them to be out in the situation that's a bit more supervised through these regulations, which I don't think we can ignore have been effective since 2015 in mitigating the effects of this activity. I'm not going to say that, you know, there are no issues. When you get a lot of people out for hospitality, yes, it has to be managed. But I think the Board, and the Board is to be commended, has done a good job of setting forth a framework after 2015 to make sure that it is managed. And I can say, at least on behalf of my client, this applicant, that what's been submitted reflects thought and reflects the issues that need to be

addressed, including, you know, just a simple thing. Yes, trash cleanup is going to start at 5 a.m., not at 10:00 at night.

MEMBER GRANDIS: Mr. Kline, thank you. Because you are representing one of the applicants, I would think that particularly, on this particular weekend, that these applicants could be very successful if one of them had it on a Friday night of this weekend, as opposed to a Saturday night. And I would even say, venture to say that one of them could be very successful if they did it on Sunday night. People who enjoy Halloween are going to go out, and I see a pub crawl as a type of activity that can be utilized when an area is not well frequented, you know.

We know we're going to have thousands of people in D.C., not just in our neighborhoods but have thousands of people. Georgetown used to have a reputation of Halloween, if I remember that correctly, and it still may. I think our MPD is going to be overworked even without pub crawls.

You know, this Board supports pub crawls, and you know that, Mr. Kline. We support them. But this particular night is almost an

invitation for not a problem because the applicants are not professional and sophisticated but just because of the numbers. And I really think that, in the future, I wish now but the application is already in, I really wish these type of businesses would communicate with each other and come to us with a coordinated plan because I know it's competition, but, my God, U Street and Dupont Circle don't need a lot of invitations to go out.

So I am concerned about the magnitude of three sanctioned pub crawls on the Saturday of Halloween. I just have to be honest about that. But I do think we can work things out. But I'm just sharing for the future I wish we could learn that there is coordination and that we could learn that maybe they could look at other nights than just Saturday night. Thank you.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Hold on one minute. I think Captain Solgat had his hand up. Go ahead, sir.

MR. SOLGAT: Thank you, Mr. Anderson.

Just specifically to address the trash cleanup

effort that was brought up by Mr. Kline, for

those of you that are aware of the Mayor's

initiative with U Street, multi-unit task force has been going on recently. Trash cleanup has already been established. The Department of Public Works always comes to all these locations, so I don't believe these three organizations are going to be bringing anything new to the table that isn't already there. It almost seems to be redundant to have another service doing the cleanup that's already going to be done.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Go ahead, Mr. Huff. I think, Captain Solgat, I think one of the things that, when the Board started to formalize the pub crawls and issue licenses, as part of our requirements, they have to do a trash cleanup because that was one of the issues that was brought to our attention by the BIDs and the ANCs. So we do require that the pub crawl operators, that they do trash cleanup and that they provide extra security. So that's part of our requirement that this is what they need to do.

I think, from what I've heard, because there are other people on the streets, so the pub crawl operators might clean the street up, but then there are still folks on the street. So at

least I would think that if they're going to do trash cleanup, maybe they need to do it at a later hour because I think, especially from what I've heard and I think Mr. Huff, of course, will speak about that, is that there are issues even last time with trash pickup. And it might not necessarily be from the pub crawl operators, but there is still trash on the street.

So go ahead --

MR. SOLGAT: Mr. Anderson, and I agree with you directly. I agree with what you're saying, and I understand that is a requirement. It was just more to speak on Mr. Kline's point to say that these BIDs, essentially, are bringing additional resources to the table. Yes, they are, but it's something that we're already going to be doing anyway. So I don't think that's necessarily a net positive for it.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Captain Solgat,

I think when we had a previous hearing earlier

this year, the Golden Triangle BID was

complaining that the city wasn't doing its part.

I think that was their position. Although the

operators might have been cleaning, they could

not get the city to -- but I can't speak for the

Golden Triangle BID, so let me hear what Mr. Huff
-- I'll get to you, Mr. Silverstein. Let me hear
what Mr. Huff has to say.

MR. HUFF: Sure. Thank you. Yes, just to clarify, in the Golden Triangle, we did not have the support of the District Department of Public Works until very recently. And through speaking directly with Mike Carter, the director, and, you know, they don't do anything, you know, too grandiose, but they do provide a packer, a small packer, so that when their cleaners and our ambassadors are picking up trash, we can throw it right into a, directly into a trash truck, as opposed to us having to take it out to Fort Totten or somewhere else.

I am happy to hear that the cleanup time has been advanced to 5 a.m. and hope that that will help address some of our bigger concerns. And we also remain very open to any conversation with Mr. Kline or any of his clients. It may be too late for this time, but in the future in terms for the BID providing these services at an agreed-upon cost. And we provided some preliminary numbers to Mr. Kline, and we're happy to continue that conversation in

the future. It may be more efficient for everybody involved.

Thank you.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Thank you, Mr. Huff. Yes, Mr. Silverstein.

MR. SILVERSTEIN: Just very briefly. The multi-agency task force creation has been a game changer, and I want to thank everyone at ABRA and everyone in the city who has moved forward on this. It's exactly the kind of thing that we need to do and what we needed to do for the longest time. Thank you.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Mr. Bramson, I think you had something you wanted to say.

MR. BRAMSON: Yes, I've kind of been listening to everyone and have a few points I want to touch base on. One, in terms of the coordination, us and PDC may have not spoken directly, but Lindy and Project DC have coexisted for a long time, you know, in the same area. There was, I think, St. Patty's Day, we both had a bar crawl at the same time, which is also a big holiday event. I don't think there was any issues with that one from what I was told.

One regulation that the Board had come

up with which I thought was a great idea was that no bar can participate in both bar crawls, which, in a way, it's a coordination itself. So, you know, if Project DC has ten bars and we have, you know, ten, the participants are separated between those areas. So in a way, it is a coordination because we can't overlap with the participating bars. I think that has been super helpful. And when we both did St. Patty's Day, you know, they had their bars, we had our bars.

So that was one thing that was really helpful, so, yes, we haven't coordinated directly but indirectly we sort of have. And, again, we've coexisted, and, you know, we didn't have any issues with that bar crawl.

You know, we've been doing this for a long time now, and participants go to their bars, for the most part, but they don't leave their area. So the fact that there's another bar crawl on U Street, they're not coming over to Dupont. They paid their ticket, they paid for their specials, which are very different than the other groups. They have their specific wristbands. Those wristbands are not going to be allowed into the Dupont bars. So I am very, very confident

that the U Street bar crawl is not going to 1 2 affect the Dupont, and I don't think the Dupont 3 bar crawl is going to affect U Street. One thing that is coordinated between 4 5 the --CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: 6 Mr. Bramson, 7 just hold on. Mr. Bramson, just hold on one 8 minute, please. I have to step away, so just 9 hold for one minute. So we're off the record for 10 a couple of minutes, please. I apologize. Okay. 11 Hold on. 12 (Whereupon, the above-entitled matter 13 went off the record at 12:10 p.m. and then went 14 back on the record at 12:11 p.m.) 15 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: I apologize. 16 We're back on the record. Okay. Go ahead, Mr. 17 Bramson. 18 MR. BRAMSON: Yes, I was just kind of 19 stating that I'm confident that the U Street 20 won't overlap with Dupont and vice versa. 21 we've done this for a long time, and the reasons 22 really being that each, you know, you have your 23 specials, you're in that area, you have a 24 wristband that lets you into those bars. 25 One thing that Project DC and us do

coordinate a few days before the event is the color of wristbands so that we don't overlap. We've never had an issue with that before. So, for example, we're red, they'll be green. Those are wristbands that let you in to those participating bars.

So, again, we've closed this for a long time, so we know what works. So we don't want their participants in our bars and vice versa, and the bars don't either. So that's another, you know, way that we've kind of managed over the years. I remember that in 2015 we had separate wristbands, but there was a third company that didn't even have a license came in there with selling fake wristbands, and that was one of the issues that -- I don't even think they showed up to those hearings in 2015. But that was one of the issues that we saw that I think that we've overcome.

The other thing is that the bars, you know, they reach out to us months in advance for this bar crawl. Yes, they're all busy at 10:00 or 11:00 at night. Some of the clubs don't get busy until midnight. But they're looking for business from 1 to about 9 p.m. or 1 to 10. This

is a big day for them, and they would be slower during the day regardless. Some of them may double their sales, and a lot of them need this. So they're really anticipating this day and the event is during the day. I understand that puts a little bit more pressure on MPD, but, at the same time, this is a big day for those bars. So that's kind of why they wouldn't even accept us on a Friday night knowing, obviously, people work during the day on Friday, so they wouldn't come. So, you know, for us, this is really the only day they could do it, unless they chose another weekend completely.

So also, like Project DC, our bars span about nine blocks minimum from some of the bars, so it is more spaced out. It's not all in one condensed area. There are a lot of bars. The most popular bars, I would say, are in that Dupont area, but, you know, we try to space it We have our registration bars spread out, out. as well, so we don't get hit all at one time. Registration is, you know, for our crawl, it's a six-hour, you know, from about four to five I think Project DC is a little bit hours' span. But that also spaces out the time that longer.

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people are coming into the area. So we've seen people come in at 2, and, you know, they probably go home 7 or 8. But then we see that late rush come in, as well.

And I think I touched base on everything. I do agree with the post-cleanup. It does seem like we're all duplicating efforts. I think that if we could coordinate with the BID and, you know, all contribute to that, that seems to make the most sense. But, of course, you know, we're always open for that discussion.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right.

Thank you, Mr. Bramson. Any other questions,

anyone who wants to -- I have some questions that

I'm going to ask, but I want to have other Board

members ask questions first and I want people to

weigh in before I assume specific questions.

Hold on a minute, Mr. Short. Let me see if there are any other Board members who have questions that they want to ask. Any other questions by any other Board members? Go ahead, Mr. Short.

MEMBER SHORT: Thank you very much, Mr. Chair. I just wanted to put on the record that, after seven years ago, 2015, the Board

then, at that time, came up with District of Columbia Municipal Regulations, specifically 712, pub crawls, which is the law. The law. And specifically dealing with 712.7, the litter plan required by 712.5(f) shall set a time frame within which the litter removal vendors will remove litter from the geographic area in which a pub crawl occurs. The time frame shall require that the litter be removed by no later than 10 a.m. the day after the pub crawl. In fact, the whole pub crawl regulation addressed every issue that was brought before the Board after the perfect storm, so to speak.

So there are regulations that address every issue, including litter and including how the bars will be regulated during pub crawls.

It's on the record, and I think we got away from doing what those pub crawl regulations have required, and that's what I want to have on the record that there are municipal regulations. And if those are followed, we don't have the overcrowding and we don't have the litter problems if the pub crawl regulations, which this Board ratified and had sent to the council and the council made it law.

Thank you very much for allowing me to speak, Mr. Chair.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Thank you, Mr. Short. I just want to clarify the record. pub crawl, it's my understanding that the pub crawl operators, they are in compliance with the I think the issues that we've been regulations. having is that they have been cleaning up as per the regulations, but they have been cleaning up too early. And so, therefore, they go and clean the street up and, because there's still folks on the street, there are still litter on the streets. So that's one of the reasons why I believe the conversations was that, rather than they clean up two hours after the event, then they probably need to clean up once the bars have But that's something we can negotiate. closed.

All right. So I have some specific questions I want to ask. Now, this is for Project DC Events. Now, for Project DC Events, did you apply for a pub crawl around Halloween last year? Did you apply for that last year? This is for Project DC Events.

MR. LOPEZ: Hi. Sorry. Can you repeat the question, Mr. Anderson?

16	event any different this year than last year?			
17	MR. LOPEZ: No, sir.			
18	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: So what type of			
19	drink specials or special offers are being			
20	provided to participants?			
21	MR. LOPEZ: What type of drink			
22	specials?			
23	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Yes, sir.			
24	MR. LOPEZ: We have a beer special, we			
25	have a well drink special, and we have a shooter			

special.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: I apologize for the noise in the background. I know that we have, we've spoken about the litter plan, but tell me specifically what is the security plan that you have in place for your event.

MR. LOPEZ: Sure. So, yes, we were granted a license last year. I want to say it was 2,000 people that the Board ended up going with for both Project DC Events and Lindy. But in terms of security, we coordinate with every participating venue. In terms of the specials, we have 30 staff members, like Mr. Kline said at the beginning of the call.

After check-in is over, usually our check-in goes from 2 p.m. and we close up maybe five hours later, depending if people are late. So worst-case scenario will be 6 - 6:30 that we close up. And after that, our staff members, we go from bar to bar assisting.

In terms of anything that's different between this year's event and last year's event, it's literally the exact same thing. Nothing has changed. We've had the same model for the last seven - eight years. There's no differences.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Now, was there any incidents or any incidents you thought you could have done, anything that you thought you could have done better as a result of us approving the pub crawl for last year?

MR. LOPEZ: I think the only thing that I'm seeing, we use Bayside Cleaning, LLC., and I think Lindy Promotions also uses them. I do want to say, I'm not 100-percent sure, I think that RegMo may use them, too. Do you guys, RegMo, you guys use them, as well?

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: I think they have agreed that they do.

MR. LOPEZ: So the only thing is maybe the bandwidth to have a cleanup for three different companies the same morning would be something that we need to talk about. And I did talk to Mr. Kline actually this week, you know, because I think, in my eyes, having an agreement with the BID would make the most sense moving forward in terms of making sure the BID is always happy with the post-event cleanup.

I know that we briefly touched on this at the post-event hearing a few months ago, and I do want to say that maybe she had a rough idea,

9	But in terms of communication, yes, I
10	mean, everything is done via email, and,
11	obviously, we email FEMS and MPD with our
12	application and our security plan and litter
13	plan.
14	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right. So,
15	basically, you've had this event last year and
16	the Board approved 2,000 participants, and so
17	you're asking, roughly, for those same numbers
18	again this year; is that correct?
19	MR. KLINE: For 3,500.
20	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: I said roughly.
21	So you're asking for, what's the minimum you're
22	asking for?
23	MR. LOPEZ: The minimum is 2,500, Mr.
24	Anderson.
25	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: So you're

asking for 2,500 to 3,500. That's what you're 1 2 asking for? 3 MR. KLINE: Yes. And just, you know, 4 to answer your initial question in terms of how 5 did last year go, the only thing that we're aware of is this trash issue that we talked a lot about 6 7 and the Board had a post-event fact-finding 8 hearing about. That's the only issue that we're 9 aware of with respect to last year. 10 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right. 11 Thank you. All right. Now, let me, I have some 12 similar questions that I want to ask. 13 getting to you, Reginald, because you're a 14 different area, so let me have Project, I'm 15 sorry, Lindy Promotions. 16 So for Lindy Promotions, do you have, 17 did you request last year a Halloween crawl? 18 MR. BRAMSON: Yes, we did. 19 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: And do you 20 recall about how many participants were approved 21 for this event? 22 MR. BRAMSON: It was around 2,000 last 23 That's why we kept it around the same just 24 because we don't think we would top that. So I know we were right under 2,000, and that's why we 25

went with the same number this year.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right.

Thank you. What type of drink specials, if any,

4 are being offered to the participants?

MR. BRAMSON: Similar. We always offer a beer, a shooter, and a well drink from the hours of the crawl.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: So tell us about the security plan that you have provided.

MR. BRAMSON: Yes, not to be repetitive, very similar to Project DC's. I'd say the only difference is that we, I don't know if they did it or not, too, but we hire, in terms of our own staffing that does focus on the registration bars and roams to check in on bars, all the bars are told to staff as if it's, you know, 10:00 at night. So they're staffing their bars fully staffed from the beginning of registration all the way through.

And then, in addition to that, we hired Next Level Security, which is a third-party security company that starts at the registration bars and focuses on those and then roam. So we do hire a third-party company, as well, to just help with the flow and just check in on things.

We do reach out to MPD not only with email but we give them a call. Miranda has been really great about reaching out to them ahead of the event, letting them know how many participants we have the day of. Usually, numbers do increase. You know, numbers can sometimes be slow up until two or three days before, but we do let them know a couple of days before or the day before if we have significant changes. You know, we've been doing this, the bar crawl is having our 24th anniversary, something like that, so we have some experience with it.

But, yes, very similar. I think the only real difference is just hiring that third-party security.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: So how many extra staff members -- I'm sorry. Between security and your staff members, how many bodies are we talking about?

MR. BRAMSON: Around 40.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right. So this is for RegMo Promotions and basically the same question. Did you apply for a pub crawl permit last year for a Halloween event?

MR. ELIACIN: Yes, we did.

MS. FISHER: Yes.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: And how many participants were approved for this event.

MR. ELIACIN: We were approved for up to 800, I believe.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: And how many are you requesting this year?

MR. ELIACIN: This year, we said 1,500 to 2,000 in anticipation of possibly having more people.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: If we approved 800 last year, why are you approving 1,500 and you're hearing what's been said? Why are you then requesting 1,500 to 2,500?

MS. FISHER: Because, last year, we went a little bit lower because of coming right out of the pandemic. We didn't think it was going to be that big. After we got closer to the day of, our sales were near maxing out, and then we ended up getting, when I got home the next day, I ended up answering about 500 emails being, like, I'm sorry I didn't respond to you, we were hosting the event of people who wanted to attend

and could not because we were sold out online.

So we have a max number, and we cut off our sales so we cannot go over what you have permitted us to do for the day.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right.

Thank you. So tell me about your security plan and litter plan.

MS. FISHER: So one thing for us is not just the security plan but for how we run our crawl is that we have check-in from 2 p.m. to 10 p.m. So at any point of time where a bar is open for their time slot, we have a RegMo person or two representing our door front either helping with directions, helping with confusion, giving wristbands, just checking guests in. On top of that, we have a security person for each bar, along with a whole entire bar security staff who knows to be fully staffed like it is midnight on a Saturday from the time that they are open.

We also only do, like, three or four-hour increments at each bar with it getting -so, like, say, because check-in is kind of slow
around, like, 2 p.m., so we'll only do a threehour slot at the first bar, and then we
incrementally open a bar and close another bar

throughout the day so not all the bars are 1 2 flooded and we also don't have 10,000 people 3 trying to come out to 30 different 4 establishments. 5 Another thing with our security plan is that we just keep somebody at the door. We 6 7 also keep a security person from the venue at the 8 door checking their IDs for the guests with 9 wristbands or not, and then they're fully secured inside. 10 11 And, also, I just want to MR. LOPEZ: 12 add one thing. As far as --13 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Mr. Lopez, hold 14 I'm going to get back to you. Just hold on on. 15 a minute. I'm going to get to you also, Mr. 16 Silverstein. I have some specific questions I 17 wanted RegMo to respond to. Then I'll open it 18 back up. 19 I'm sorry. So, ma'am, can you 20 identify yourself? Who are you again, ma'am? 21 MS. FISHER: Me? 22 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: 23 MS. FISHER: Monisa Fisher from 24 RegMoPromo. 25 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: We have a court

reporter, so, when you're speaking, I just want to make sure that -- so I'll ask everyone, when you speak, just identify yourself so the court reporter can capture who is speaking, okay?

All right. So about how many extra bodies in the sense of security and staff will staff if the pub crawl is approved by the Board do you envision?

MR. ELIACIN: Actually, I'm Reginald Eliacin. I just wanted to speak on this, Mr. Chairman, from RegMoPromo.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Yes, go ahead.

MR. ELIACIN: Okay. Great, sir. I guess what we're trying to say also, we have, like, a lot of venues that are approved to be part of the bar crawl. The thing is we kind of, sometimes we have to have less venues because a lot of times we do end up having less venues on the actual day, depending on, you know, how many people actually come because a lot of times a lot of folks end up getting tickets more last minute.

So we want to prepare for more, but, like, sometimes, it's just really not as many.

But we're completely willing to comply as far as if we need to have more security, even just in

case it does end up being, like, the full amount 1 2 of people that actually show up for the event. 3 mean, we have no problem doing that. MS. FISHER: We can double to triple 4 5 with the Board's recommendations, whatever you all would like. We are willing to listen to what 6 7 your needs are to make our guests as safe as 8 possible and to make the Board feel good about 9 our safety procedures. 10 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Now, what 11 communication, if any, have you had with any 12 District of Columbia agencies regarding this proposed pub crawl? 13 MR. ELIACIN: We've sent emails to the 14 15 MPD, the DPW, the FEMC, I'm sorry, FEMS, as far 16 as to give them our plans of litter removal, security, overview, everything. Everything part 17 18 of the application process that has been required 19 is what we've done. 20 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Thank you, sir. 21 Mr. Silverstein, you need to make a statement, 22 sir? 23 Yes, Mr. Chairman. MR. SILVERSTEIN: 24 I just wanted to say that I have an appointment 25 that I have to leave for now, and I wanted to

drop off and I did not want to do that without 1 2 thanking you folks for holding the hearing and 3 apologizing for having to leave. Thank you, sir. CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Thank you, Mr. 4 5 Silverstein. Thank you for your participation 6 today. 7 All right. I think, Mr. Lopez, you 8 wanted to say something. 9 MR. LOPEZ: No, I'm sorry. I never 10 raised my hand. 11 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: You were 12 speaking earlier, and I told you I would get back 13 to you, so that's why I was giving you an 14 opportunity now to speak because I told you I 15 would get back to you once I was finished with 16 Reginald. But all right. 17 MR. KLINE: Mr. Chair, if I may --18 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Yes, Mr. Kline. 19 MR. KLINE: Thank you. The one thing 20 I wanted to add is, I mean, one difference is Mr. 21 Lopez does have a larger number of bars lined up 22 this year, which, you know, would accommodate a 23 larger amount of people. It was 15 last year and 24 17 this year. So in terms of capacity, there's

several hundred more in terms of capacity, and

we'd certainly ask the Board to take that into consideration.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: I also want to alert the parties that I see that, as if these pub crawls are approved, the participants are aware that one bar cannot participate in more than one pub crawl. And from what I see here is that 1830, One Bar, Abigail, Admiral, Bar and Lounge 54, Blackfin American Pub, Bottomline, Caf, Citron, Decades, Mayflower Club, Nero DC, Ozio, Phantom DC, Public Bar Life, Rewind, Rosebar Lounge, Saint Yves, Sign of the Whale, Toyko Pearl, and Twelve after Twelve. I believe these establishments have, it appears they're on more than one pub crawl request. So the parties will need to negotiate who it is that, I'm sorry, what licensee is going to operate for their pub crawl.

And, secondly -- I'm getting to you, Mr. Huff. And, secondly, we have a new staff member which is for the pub crawl operators. I need the pub crawl operators for future, moving forward, any time you need to send an email to Derrick Brooks, B-R-O-O-K-S, number one, at DC.gov. And his phone number is 202-306-0779.

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He is our Director of Enforcement, so you need to copy Brooks, B-R-O-O-K-S, number one, at DC.gov on all your communications regarding pub crawls.

Mr. Huff, I think you had your hand up, sir.

MR. HUFF: Sure. Thank you. Just as a point of information, I would encourage the Board to take a look at the list of proposed establishments. Some of those establishments, and this is what happened last time, as well, are no longer in operation. So what that amounts to ultimately is more people at fewer establishments.

For example, Sign of the Whale caught on fire. They're not open. And there are others on the list, I believe, as well that closed during the pandemic that are no longer in operation. So I would encourage the Board to take a closer look at the list of proposed establishments.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Well, thank
you, Mr. Huff. They are supposed to provide us a
final list of the establishments. I think these
applications were done a while back, so I'm not
sure, because these events are for October 29th,

so they had to have applied to us a while back 1 2 because we have a 60-day time line. So I believe 3 these applications came in in the fall, and, so, 4 therefore, these are their wish list of 5 establishments. But they will provide us with a finalized list. If it's approved, they'll 6 7 provide us with a finalized group. 8 I'm sorry. It's Chief Derrick Brooks. 9 He's the head of our Enforcement Division. 10 Now, prior to bringing, I'm going to 11 have, Captain Williams, do you have any comments 12 you want to make before I bring this hearing to 13 close? 14 No, I don't have any MS. WILLIAMS: 15 more comments. Thank you. 16 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Thank you, 17 ma'am, for being here today. I'm not sure if 18 Captain Solgat is still here. I don't see him on 19 my screen. 20 All right. Do you have any final 21 comments you want to make, sir, prior to bringing 22 this hearing to closure? MR. SOLGAT: Yes, just one. 23 I was 24 listening. I did hear the representatives from

I do think it is admirable that you would

RegMo.

like to increase your security staff. I'm glad to hear that there's the plan of not necessarily a free-for-all of all the bars simultaneously, but I do think that a coordinated effort needs to take place because, like Mr. Huff was saying, there's going to be a situation where there's going to be an influx of people at certain locations.

And, presently, your plan that you submitted that I reviewed list five, you have five staff members. I think that needs to be amended and updated to be more accurate to reflect the actual size and scale of what you're doing and just replicating something from last year when you are trying to at least double the size would at least call for an amendment to it.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right.

Thank you, sir. Let me see. I'm going to have everyone do closing, but I want to make sure that

Mr. Puente, I know I have not called on you, sir. Any concerns that you have? Maybe you could talk about the experience of last year with the approval of these pub crawls. As an investigator, any concerns, if any, you want to

bring to the attention of the Board, sir?

MR. PUENTE: Yes, sir. I've been working the pub crawls since 2015. I'm the one that authored the report from the perfect storm. The biggest thing that we see every year, probably around 6:00 is when we see the heaviest foot traffic in the Golden Triangle area. Last year, there were a lot of people in the street walking and just loitering. I had to call Commander Bedlion of 2D, and he got officers down there. We tried contacting DDOT, but DDOT wasn't coming on until almost 9 p.m., so they couldn't start traffic control measures until that time.

So that was the biggest thing. If the security from the pub crawls can try to keep them out of the street so no one gets hit, that was the biggest issue that we had last year.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right.

Thank you, Mr. Puente. Mr. Huff, any final comments you want to make before -- I'm going to come to the Board, I'm going to come to the operators last, so you're going to have the last word. So, Mr. Huff, any comments, any final comments you want to make?

MR. HUFF: No further comments. Thank

you.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right.

Thank you. Thank you, Captain Solgat, for being here today, sir. Thank you very much.

All right. RegMo, any final comments you want to make?

MS. FISHER: Just a couple. Well, first of all, I wanted to ask the Board is there a number that you all do feel comfortable with with three events going on at the same time? Is there a way that we can maybe all adjust our numbers so that the Board is happy and ABRA is happy is my first question.

And then also I just want to add because we never spoke about our drink specials, and our demographic is a lot different than the Dupont demographic. Our drink specials, yes, we still have a beer. Our beers all start at \$5.00, not at \$3.00. Most of our drink specials, they're not rails. So they're usually, even if it's a rail rum punch or a rail margarita, they're usually, like, \$7.00 - \$8.00 Jack Daniels, \$9.00 Hennessy, \$8.00 Titos. So they're not like, they're at a more elevated price point, which also brings out a different demographic.

So sometimes, when it comes to, like, our crowds colliding, it's definitely not the same kind of crowd. So you wouldn't have to, I think, worry as much as our crowds intersecting at a point because our crowd is coming out for a different thing and their crowd is coming out for a different thing also.

So I just wanted to make that quick point.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right.

Thank you. Do you have anything else you want to make before I close? Any final comments you want to make?

MR. ELIACIN: No, I think we're good, yes. We also talked about our crowds also, we have our wristbands that have our company name on it, and we coordinate with the establishments before so they know exactly which ones are going to be part of the bar crawl. Nobody else is going not be doing a bar crawl at the same time that we're doing it on U Street. So, yes, I think that's about it.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right.
Thank you very much. Mr. Bramson.

MR. BRAMSON: I think I kind of

covered everything from before. The only last thing I want to say about the capacity issues, the one way we calculate capacity is the capacity of the bars on the crawl. So one thing that we make sure we do, and I'm pretty sure that the other companies do this, as well, but we ask the bars what their capacities are and we never exceed that total. So if all our participating bars are, you know, I could say right off the bat it's at least 3,000 people and we only have 2,000, we know that we're within that capacity. So we try not to ever exceed that number, so I think that's how at least we calculate our number to make sure that we're safe, make sure that, you know, if people just happen to walk in, that there's enough room for everyone.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Thank you, Mr. Bramson. Mr. Kline on behalf of Project DC Events.

MR. KLINE: Yes. Thank you, Mr. Chairman. And, again, thank the Board for holding this hearing. I certainly appreciate the concerns that were raised by Mr. Silverstein, Mr. Huff, Mr. Short, and Mr. Grandis, and you, Mr. Chair.

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I think what's important to note is a few things. The Board reacted to these issues after what we've all called this perfect storm, and I think it's worked. And I think, in terms of what you have before you in Project DC Events, you have an operator who has shown that he will follow the rules, that he will comply with the regulations, and that, when an issue is raised, such, for example, the trash management, he will respond and react and address it, even if it's something that's not precisely required by the regulations. So what I'm saying to you is he is to be trusted in terms of what he's asked for.

And, lastly, as I said before, I think we're better off with these bar crawl operators, which gives the Board, at least indirectly, some supervision of what goes on in the neighborhood. I think we've created a terrific mechanism for oversight management, and I think the fact that there has not been any repeat of what happened seven years ago in the issues that we've heard about relate to trash, which is a problem but different than outright public safety, I think is a testament to what's been done has worked.

And, lastly, I want to close with,

yes, this is a strain on resources. Anything that creates revenue and provides opportunity is going to come with some cost. But aside from these bar collaborators, these businesses need this right now. I mean, they need shots in the arm that these operators provide by providing these opportunities, and we would ask the Board to -- it's a balance. I mean, the Board is always balancing. But we would ask the Board to also put that into the mix in terms of what numbers there should be and how much to restrict.

I think you have some good operators before you. I think they play by the rules. I think you will trust them. And we would ask that Project DC Events be approved and be approved for a suitable number, given the number of establishments involved.

Thank you, Mr. Chair.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Thank you, Mr. Kline, for your close. We had this because we want to make sure that we do not have a repeat, and I'll say, as Chairman of the Board, I did chair the hearing that we had seven years ago after the perfect storm. And I just generally, I just want to say at least I have not heard since

that event that we have had a significant amount of concerns. I know that we took two years off because of the pandemic. I'm just stating that I still have not heard, but we want to make sure if we're going to approve pub crawls around Halloween weekend that we hear what the operators are requesting and also what the community is saying. And so the Board will look at what is requested by the operators, and we will also take into consideration what the community is saying, and then we'll make a determination that we think is in the best interest of the residents of the District of Columbia. And so the Board will take this matter under advisement, and we will issue a decision.

I know that, I guess for Project DC

Events, I know that you had also, we did talk
about December, but I guess you're the only one
requesting a pub crawl around December, the Santa

Crawl, so we will make a decision at that time.

I think that's a little bit different because,
since there's no other event, I think, at least
currently, no other operator has requested that
same date. But we will make a decision on what
numbers, if any, we will approve for that event

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also, but we will take the matter under advisement and make a determination.

I want to thank everyone for their participation and presence today, and thank you very much. And as I said before, we'll take this matter under advisement and we'll issue a decision shortly on whether or not we will approve pub crawl events for October 29th, 2022. Thank you very much. Have a great day.

Mall right. We are at the end of our morning calendar, and it's 12:51 and the Board needs to have lunch.
