The Alcoholic Beverage and Cannabis Board met via WebEx videoconference, Chairperson Donovan W. Anderson presiding.

CHAIR ANDERSON: All right. All right, let me call the next case on our calendar. I'm going to call out -- Do we have Megan Bean or someone from Halloween Bar Crawl Entertainment Factory, LLC? Do we have -- Do we have that person on the line?

MR. ORELLANA: I believe Vance and Alex are associated with this.

CHAIR ANDERSON: All right. So the parties then from that pub crawl then can -- Yes. All right. Okay. Can you identify yourself for the record please?

MR. TRENDOV: For the record, my name is Vance Trendov.

MR. ROACH: My name is William Roach.
MR. TRENDOV: And we also have a couple other people that are joining this conversation as well.

CHAIR ANDERSON: All right. So let me -- Well, why don't we -- And who are those people and then I would like the folks to spell their name for the record starting with you also. So who are the other people that needs to be -- who
needs to be --
MR. TRENDOV: Megan Bean and Aleskey Silenko. I believe Alex is in here, but he is muted. That is the other Alex you guys were referring to earlier.

CHAIR ANDERSON: All right. And so is the Megan person --

MR. TRENDOV: I believe she's also on the call with Alex.

CHAIR ANDERSON: All right.
MR. TRENDOV: I don't know if they're having issues getting in or --

CHAIR ANDERSON: Well, I see two Alex's on the line. So I'm just trying to see who -- I don't see a call-in user. So are they able to unmute -- Mr. Orellana, are you able to unmute? I see two Alex's on the line. I'm not sure who's there. I see a call-in user.

MR. SILENKO: It looks like I can -I can drop down.

CHAIR ANDERSON: All right. Do you have a camera, sir?

MR. SILENKO: I'm trying to activate it.

CHAIR ANDERSON: All right. Well,
let's -- So let's start back with the initial two persons.

MR. SILENKO: Mr. Chair, we have a call-in, so that I can put my phone on speaker and have Megan participate per that using a headset.

CHAIR ANDERSON: Okay.
MR. SILENKO: Is it possible to approve that call-in?

CHAIR ANDERSON: I think you have a call-in, so can you please elevate the call-in please?

MR. SILENKO: I'm sorry. Say that one more time.

CHAIR ANDERSON: I'm asking our IT individual to unmute the call-in.

MR. ORELLANA: I sent a request to unmute.

MS. BEAN: Okay.
CHAIR ANDERSON: Thank you. *6.
PARTICIPANT: There we go.
MS. BEAN: Can you hear me?
CHAIR ANDERSON: Yes. Hi.
MS. BEAN: Hi. This is Megan Bean.
CHAIR ANDERSON: All right. All
right. All right, let's -- let's get back to the -- All right. So let's start with the two individuals who identified themselves initially to spell and state their name for the record please. Now you're on mute, sir.

MR. TRENDOV: Vance Trendov. That's spelled V-A-N-C-E, last name T-R-E-N-D-O-V.

MR. ROACH: And my name is William Roach, W-I-L-L-I-A-M, Roach, R-O-A-C-H.

CHAIR ANDERSON: The call-in, spell and state your name for the record please.

MS. BEAN: Megan Bean, M-E-G-A-N B-E-A-N.

MR. SILENKO: And Aleksey Silenko, that's A-L-E-K-S-E-Y and Silenko, S-I-L-E-N-K-O.

CHAIR ANDERSON: All right. So the name of this -- the name of this pub crawl is -I'm sorry -- is the following -- It's the Entertainment Factory, LLC Halloween Bar Crawl. So can you -- Who is Entertainment Factory, LLC? Can you explain to us what is that company and tell me about -- I'm asking who is this

Entertainment Factory, LLC. Who can explain that to us?

MR. SILENKO: So we are an event
company -- a bar crawl company.
CHAIR ANDERSON: Who's speaking? Just for the Court Reporter, just identify yourself.

MR. SILENKO: This is Aleksey Silenko.
CHAIR ANDERSON: Go ahead, sir.
MR. SILENKO: Yes. So we are a bar crawl company and event company. We plan events and bar crawls.

CHAIR ANDERSON: Sir, as I said before, I'm not familiar with your company. Can you tell us your history? I'm unfamiliar with you all.

MR. SILENKO: Sure, yes.
CHAIR ANDERSON: Hold on a minute. One of the reasons why I did not ask the question before if you were listening to the first hearing, Washington D.C. Events 12 years, we have had several fact-finding hearings with them, so I didn't have to go through and ask them to tell us who they are. I am not necessarily familiar with this company, sir, so I'm trying to -- I want you to tell us who you are. That's all I'm asking.

MR. SILENKO: Yes, definitely. So I apologize for that. We originally started in Minneapolis, Minnesota. We are from this area.

We started doing events and planning events locally here in 2017. Ever since that time, we have planned events naturally and done a lot of bar crawls nationwide. We have a team of nine staff and three owners; myself, Vance, and Billy. And we have other staff as well that help us out, manage events, make sure that we're keeping up and doing things that we should be doing.

CHAIR ANDERSON: You stated that you've been in business since 2017. So have you been approved to participate in a bar crawl in D.C. prior? And which one and when was that?

MR. SILENKO: Yes, we have. Megan, which events do you -- were the --

MS. BEAN: The ones that we've been approved for -- We had one over the Summer, it was a Pride bar crawl. That one was approved. And then we also -- That one -- The one for Pride was in and around Dupont Circle and at the top of sort of Penn Quarter. And then we also did a St. Patrick's Day bar crawl that was approved back in March, which was around U Street. So we've done other events in D.C. that were under 200, so we didn't have the license. We have tried to do the license back in that time, but unfortunately we
didn't get it in time. We didn't send in the permit 60 days ahead of time, so we were denied for those. But the first events that we did, which was under 200 participants was last year for Pride, which would have been June 17th, I believe.

CHAIR ANDERSON: Now tell me about -- Do you have -- Do you have a litter plan that you have put together for this if this bar crawl was approved?

MS. BEAN: Did you say a "liquor plan"?

CHAIR ANDERSON: Yes.
MS. BEAN: Oh, litter plan. Sorry. My mistake. Yes, we have a third party contractor that we work with for our cleanup, Bayside, LLC. We worked with them for our event over the Summer, as well as for St. Patrick's Day. They've done our cleanings since we have been getting approved for our license.

CHAIR ANDERSON: So what is the -what is your understanding of what is expected in regard to cleanup after this for a bar crawl?

MS. BEAN: My understanding is that all of the sidwalks and surrounding areas need to
be free of litter, including different kinds of trash, alcohol bottles, et cetera. And that the areas around the establishment that are participating in the crawl need to be cleaned.

CHAIR ANDERSON: Can you describe the event that you're -- I guess the proposal is from Saturday, October 28th from 4:00 p.m. to 12:00 a.m. So please describe the event that you're planning to have.

MS. BEAN: Yeah. So we typically have our check-in/registration from 4:00 p.m. to 6:00 p.m. That's where the crawlers will go to our check-in location. They receive their badges, any swag items we typically give away like souvenir cups and anything else that we have for them. And then from there after they check in, they're approved to go to the venues that we have listed on our events as they wish until 10:00 p.m. That's typically when the crawl technically ends and then we have an after-party that is hosted from 10:00 p.m. to 12:00 a.m. at one specific location. So that's sort of the last ending of the crawl. It's just the after party. CHAIR ANDERSON: Well, how many participants are you expecting if this bar crawl
is -- bar crawl is approved?
MR. SILENKO: We're estimating possibly 500 plus or minus. We're just estimating at the moment, but that's -- I believe that's what we are looking at currently.

CHAIR ANDERSON: I'm trying to figure out exactly how many -- how many -- what is the number are you requesting from this Board if you are approved this bar crawl -- this pub crawl. I'm sorry. I don't know why I keep on saying "bar crawl" -- pub crawl.

MR. SILENKO: Sure. So originally on the paperwork, we did request for 2,000 people. But we did per previous conversation and we would definitely agree to make sure that is not over 1,500 and limit our -- limit the possibility of tickets to being under that number.

CHAIR ANDERSON: Now is this -- Is this pub crawl in any way different than other pub -- the other pub crawls that you had -- you were previously approved for?

MS. BEAN: No. It's pretty much the same structure to the "T" as the one that we were approved for over the Summer, which would have been for Pride. They follow pretty the same
timeframe, the same sort of structure in terms of we have one check-in location, depending on how many, you know, participants we have if we need more check-ins, we'll do that. But one check-in and then the crawlers can go to any venue on the list.

CHAIR ANDERSON: Now currently we have three pub crawls -- three different organizations who have -- who have requested having a pub crawl in the Dupont Circle area. So are you -- What is your understanding of what establishment can participate in the pub crawl? And are you aware that a establishment cannot participate in more than one pub crawl?

MS. BEAN: So upon speaking with some of the venues in the area, typically on Connecticut many of them had told me that they were already participating in another event and so they declined our event. So some of the ones that I did speak with, I was under the impression that they were not participating in other events. So upon, I guess, hearing from them, I did know that -- became aware of that. Prior to this event, I don't think we've run into this situation with another company where we knew that
it wasn't -- a location wasn't able to participate in more than one event. But hearing the first hearing, it does sound like some of the venues that are participating in that event are also participating in ours. Or said that they would participate in ours.

CHAIR ANDERSON: But are you aware though that none of the -- none of the venues can participate in more than one pub crawl?

MS. BEAN: Yes.
CHAIR ANDERSON: Now what measures do you have in place to engage with MPD in order to prevent violence or to encourage public safety?

MR. SILENKO: Currently we have a security team hired to be there with our event manager who is checking in on the venues. The security team that we have hired has worked our other events as well. And they would be the ones responsible for making sure that violence and things, I guess aren't happening. They typically -- our event manager is required to go to all of the venues, especially during the crawl. So I think typically the security sticks with them to ensure that all the venues and everything -everything's running smoothly.

CHAIR ANDERSON: And so what plans do you have in place to prevent underage drinking and to control excessive drinking?

MS. BEAN: Yeah. So at our last event, I think it worked out well. We actually printed out fliers for our event manager to have to promote safe drinking, not excessive drinking, et cetera. So that information was available at the check-in for all of our participants to review, take with them, et cetera.

MR. TRENDOV: There's one other thing that I just want to point out is we've done over 1,000 events before and this is a big thing that comes up for us that we want to make sure the bars and venues do the best job. We started with wrist bands that would go across someone's wrist and we actually found that there was a lot of confusion when it came to venues and bartenders and thinking that, that wrist band is some sort of indication that, that person is age-verified. So we changed into a lanyard that someone wears that indicates that they're on the event. It's really easy for them to see, but we send out emails and text messages to the bars telling them hey, they are going to be wearing vests. Make
sure you age verify every single venue and make it very clear that it's important that every venue does do age verification.

MR. ROACH: In our emails and online, we also post not to drink -- overly drink, safe ways to get home, things like that ahead of the event to all of our crawlers.

CHAIR ANDERSON: Now we talked about security earlier, so tell me a little bit about how many security officers do you plan to hire? And specifically, what is -- what is their role?

MS. BEAN: Yeah. So when I have chatted with our security team prior to submitting our pub crawl event forms, we had scheduled two based on the amount of people that we had for St. Patrick's Day. I believe we also had two for Pride. But the amount of security officers that we will have will be based on the amount of tickets we sell. So I have plans to chat with our security team a couple weeks prior to the event just to give them an idea of where we're at ticket wise. If we need to have more security officers there, we for sure can do that.

In terms of their role, based on what I've chatted with them about, their role to sort
of be with our event manager and just make sure everybody's ID'd properly and ensure that there is no violence or otherwise negative things happening during the event.

CHAIR ANDERSON: All right. I'm not saying this the amount that we are going to approve, but we're throwing out 1,500. So if we approved 1,500, how many security officers do you plan to hire based on a 1,500 number?

MR. TRENDOV: Yeah. So I can kind of take that one. So our security officers work in conjunction with the security teams at the venues. At our event around the size of 1,500 people, we would probably go up from two to at least four, maybe six. But we do also ensure that the venue has plenty of security on their own team as well. As our security -- Yeah.

CHAIR ANDERSON: All right. Any questions by any board members? Go ahead.

MEMBER SHORT: So before I do that, Mr. Chair, so we're having three events on the 28th?

CHAIR ANDERSON: Mr. Short, yes.
MEMBER SHORT: Excuse me?
CHAIR ANDERSON: There are three pub
crawl applications on our agenda today. Nothing has been approved. There are three pub crawl applications on our agenda for October 28th.

MEMBER SHORT: So Megan Bean is with this team. Correct?

MS. BEAN: I'm sorry. What was that?
MEMBER SHORT: Megan Bean --
CHAIR ANDERSON: This hearing -- Hold on. Hold on. Hold on, Mr. Short. This factfinding hearing that we're having is for the Entertainment Factory, LLC, their Halloween bar crawl application.

MEMBER SHORT: I understand that, Mr. Chair. And I have the print-out that I printed out, what was sent to us from Legal. Three events. Okay, first of all, let me get back to Megan. Megan, you said this is the largest one -- largest pub crawl you've applied for in the District. Correct?

MS. BEAN: No. The Pride bar crawl that we did over the Summer, we also applied for 2,000 participants, but we only sold 166 tickets. So we had applied for events of this size for Pride and also for our St. Patrick's Day event as well. We didn't sell that many tickets, but
that's what we applied for.
MEMBER SHORT: Okay. Well, I guess the question I want to ask you is are you familiar with the District of Columbia Municipal Regulations 712, which governs the pub crawls, which is the law? And have you read it?

MS. BEAN: I believe so. Is that listed on the pub crawl event form or is it in a different location?

MEMBER SHORT: So let me ask this question another way. Are you familiar with Pub Crawls D.C. Regulations 712?

MS. BEAN: Not off the top of my head, no.

MEMBER SHORT: Okay. Well, Megan I have a problem with someone who's having -- going to ask to have 1,500 people. It sounds like if all three are approved, it would be 4,5000 people on Connecticut Avenue. And you don't know anything about the regulations. You've never read them.

MR. TRENDOV: So we have read these. I'm looking at them right now and we, along with Megan have all read these together.

MEMBER SHORT: Okay, all right. Well,

Megan said she hadn't. I'm glad you clarified that. Okay.

MR. TRENDOV: She may be confused --
MEMBER SHORT: Do me a favor since you're reading them right now. Go to Section -Go to Section 712.7.

MR. TRENDOV: Yes, sir?
MEMBER SHORT: Tell me what you understand about Section 712.7.

MR. TRENDOV: Absolutely. So we have to have a litter plan that we create with our cleaning crew and are required to clean up by no later than 10:00 a.m. the following day. However, we in the past have had them clean up that night after the pub crawl is complete --

MEMBER SHORT: I understand that. Just don't go too far.

MR. TRENDOV: Oh sorry, sir.
MEMBER SHORT: That's been a big problem with us and pub crawls. They clean up the same night that it happens, but the crowd doesn't go home.
(simultaneous speaking)
MEMBER SHORT: And then at 10 o'clock the next day or 6 o'clock the next morning, the
people are complaining because you cleaned up the night of while people are still throwing trash down. That doesn't work out too well. So according to the law, it's supposed to be cleaned up by 10:00 a.m. the next morning. So you heard -- I know you heard the last testimony, didn't you?

MR. TRENDOV: Yes, sir. I did.
MEMBER SHORT: Okay. What did this person say happened with them to keep them from getting in problems with 712.7?

MEMBER SHORT: They're requiring photographs as we have done in the past as well, sir.

MEMBER SHORT: Okay. Now another problem that this Board has had is that when there are more than one pub crawl, one person says well, that's not my trash. The other person having the pub crawl, it's their trash. But the law states any one of you that is wrong on that night, the law can come after you or the District law can come after you because 712.7 was written to keep people from pointing the fingers at one another. That's why I do it -- I might as well be honest. I have a situation when there are
more than one or two at the same time.
MEMBER SHORT: Yes, sir. I was -- I had a solution I was going to suggest, but I will wait for you to finish, sir.

MEMBER SHORT: No, go ahead. What's your suggestion, sir?

MR. TRENDOV: Yes, sir. We actually wanted to request that we are able to work closer with the Project D.C. group so we can be in closer communication, as well as if our event is not looking like it will hit that certain number, we want to make sure that everyone here is able to enjoy the event. And that if we a month before the event are only estimating 1,000 people, if we could pass along the other 500 -MEMBER SHORT: Please don't do that. We've had that happen before.

MR. TRENDOV: Okay. Yes, sir. That's why I was just asking.

MEMBER SHORT: Wait a minute. Let me please finish, sir. You can say ten days out you didn't get your numbers, but you're still allowed to have that number and you give somebody else the authority and they say well, it's not my fault because this guy told me I could have 1,000
more. Please don't do that.
MR. TRENDOV: Yes, sir. I understand.
MEMBER SHORT: So you said you've read these pub crawl regulations.

MR. TRENDOV: Yes, sir. We have read these in the past. Yes, sir.

MEMBER SHORT: And so what does it say about numbers and how you stick to your numbers? Tell me what it says. I've got a copy in front of me. Tell me what it says.

MR. TRENDOV: Sorry. We have to have our -- We cannot go over our allotted attendance. I'm confused by what your question is. We sell tickets online. Every single one of our events has a separate city. So when you buy a ticket to our event, it's listed under each individual city. So we know at all times how many tickets we have sold. And we have a limit on there as well, so the event cannot be oversold. Eventbrite has that in their system.

MEMBER SHORT: So if you oversell, what recourse does the city have?

MR. TRENDOV: There's no possibility of overselling based on the ticket regulation that Eventbrite has set up.

MEMBER SHORT: That's a good answer. MR. TRENDOV: Yes, sir.

MEMBER SHORT: So when the
investigator who's in charge of the pub crawl comes to you and says tell me right now many tickets have you sold, you will be able to tell them how many you sold in Washington D.C. Correct?

MR. TRENDOV: Yes, sir. Absolutely. Correct.

MEMBER SHORT: And you're very
familiar with the Pub Crawl Regulations?
MR. TRENDOV: I would say so. Yes, sir.

MEMBER SHORT: Okay. Tell me then how you understand 712.7 again, under B1 and 2. What does it say?

MR. TRENDOV: Yes, sir. So litter will be cleaned up from both sides of the street of the entire block. So I would say from -- I can pull up the map here. So for example if the crawl was on Connecticut Avenue, we would be responsible for both sides of the street, cleaning up any trash and debride that would be there, including vomit or any other bodily fluids
to make sure that they're cleaned up prior to -I believe you said 6:00 a.m. It said 10:00 a.m. on the permit -- on the information. But we would make sure that --

MEMBER SHORT: Normally on Dupont Circle, people start complaining at 6:00.

MR. TRENDOV: Yes. I understand, sir. We can --

MEMBER SHORT: Because if they call at 10:00, it doesn't get done.

MR. TRENDOV: I understand, sir.
MEMBER SHORT: Okay. I'll just say this. It sounds like you have the right answers. Again, we had a perfect storm with over two pub crawls at once and I will remember having a situation with that. That's just my -- I'm just one board member. That's my personal recollection of the perfect storm. And luckily no one died that night because Metropolitan Police had to pull all the parties out of all the other precincts and districts all over the city to come to Connecticut Avenue because someone did not -- We didn't even have any rules at that time. But since we've had those rules, we have a little better control. And hopefully you will be
-- And I have no reason to doubt that you won't be -- a responsible applicant.

But anyway, that's all I have at this time, Mr. Chair. And hopefully we don't have any situations after this event on the 28th. Thank you very much. That's all I have, Mr. Chair.

CHAIR ANDERSON: Thanks, Mr. Short. Any other questions? Go ahead, Mr. Grandis. MEMBER GRANDIS: Thank you. I want to thank you all for the information you're providing us today. You may have submitted sort of the map of the route or the blocks that you'll be using, but I have to say, I can't find it. So can you -- one of you just give me an idea when you're talking about Dupont Circle, what streets are you actually talking about? What blocks? What streets?

MR. TRENDOV: Yeah, I'll leave that to Megan. She is -- She's specifically dealing with the venues.

MEMBER GRANDIS: Thank you.
MS. BEAN: Yeah. So currently we have our check-in location on I Street and then we have --

MS. BEAN: Yes.
(simultaneous speaking)
MS. BEAN: A little bit lower than Dupont.

MEMBER GRANDIS: That's not in Dupont Circle. I'm sorry?

MS. BEAN: Yeah, it's a little bit
lower. It's a little bit lower than Dupont -(simultaneous speaking)

MEMBER GRANDIS: Okay. So the checkin is there. So then when they pick up their tickets, what happens at that point? They walk back up to Connecticut?

MS. BEAN: Yeah. They can go to any venue on the list. So if they wanted to go to the furthest venue away as soon as they get. They're supplied -- they're more than welcome to. We don't have like a list where they like, you know, go to X, Y, Z at, you know, a certain time. They're free to go to whichever venue they would like to.

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(simultaneous speaking)
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MEMBER GRANDIS: -- the hundred block -- the street names in the hundred blocks. You said "the farthest one", what's the farthest one
from I Street?
MS. BEAN: I believe it is -- would be 1300 Connecticut, but as we heard from the last, that was Phantom. So there are not eligible to participate, so they're no longer participating. So we'll have to pull them. So it would be -the other one that we have would be the 2100 block of K Street and the 1800 block of $M$ Street.

MEMBER GRANDIS: 1800 block of M Street? "M" like Mary?
(simultaneous speaking)
MEMBER GRANDIS: So it's sort of -It's somewhat spread out. Actually, I would say it's from like K Street around Connecticut, up to M Street as opposed to M Street on Connecticut Avenue up to the Circle. So you're below the Circle, I think.

MS. BEAN: Correct.
MEMBER GRANDIS: Okay. Had you all -Is this -- Would you say based on what you heard from the other applicants earlier, would you say these are the same blocks or there are just a few overlaps that you all anticipate most of yours will be different venues than they are looking
for?
MS. BEAN: It sounds like there would be overlap, but it also sounds like there are venues participating in multiple events that will not be able to participate in multiple events if you catch my drift. So we probably will -- you know, we're going to have to go back to these venues and see what's actually going on. So it sounds like initially there would have been some overlap. But with only being able to participate in one event, previous venues won't be able to participate in all of them.

MR. GOODWIN: And none of your -- None of your -- At this time, none of your venues are on the 17 Street Corridor or the U Street Corridor?

MS. BEAN: No. No. None of our venues are there.

MEMBER SHORT: And what about the 18
Street Corridor up towards Adams Morgan, no?
MS. BEAN: No, I don't believe so.
MEMBER GRANDIS: Okay. Well, from what I'm hearing today, I know this is sort of outside of the Bible, but there are two applicants who seem to have sort of a similar
request. Maybe you all need to talk together because you can't have more than one venue -- one venue cannot have more than one participant. So maybe you all need to have a conversation among yourselves to sort of get that straightened out because you don't want to leave that up to the -The Agency can't straighten that out for you all.

MS. BEAN: Sure. Sure. MEMBER GRANDIS: We want you to be successful, but it just sounds like that there's not communication between you and the other applicants. And that may be because this is the first year with three applying -- three different companies applying for the same area. But there needs to be coordination because we don't want to put our Agency in the situation to say wait a minute, you know, X venue on M Street has already been assigned to this group. You can't use them yourself. So is there -- Have you all had any thought about how you prevent this kind of problem from happening?

MS. BEAN: Yeah. I guess from my perspective hearing from some of the venues on Connecticut that straight up told you they're
participating in a different event -- I had assumed that the ones that $I$ had reached out to you were, you know, fair game. They weren't participating in any other events. Said yes to us. So now going back to them and saying, you know, are you for sure not participating in any other events because this is going to cause issues. So understood completely.

MEMBER GRANDIS: Whether you all do it now in September as opposed to October -(simultaneous speaking) MEMBER SHORT: Mr. Chairman, I'm fine. I just wanted to try to get clarification on how they're going to determine which company has which venue. Thank you.

MR. TRENDOV: There's also --
CHAIR ANDERSON: Identify yourself please.

MR. TRENDOV: Oh, Vance. One thing I just wanted to point out too -- and Alex before with the -- with his company stated that he had a similar problem that we have too where if you go onto a Google search and do "D.C. pub crawls", three companies actually come up here that aren't even a part of these hearings -- the fact-finding
hearings. One of the biggest problems that we have is actually -- is exactly what he said his company is specifically saying, Dupont Circle, listing a venue, listing the area, and selling tickets online. So that's just one thing I wanted to point out because I understand the Board and wanting to limit the size of the event and the number of people that come down there.

The most difficult thing for us is when we do actually limit tickets and then we see other companies that are continually selling tickets where there's no -- where there's no regulation. That's just kind of a question I had for the Board on if we're working together, limiting the entire size of the event, how we are working together to make sure these companies are selling tickets.

CHAIR ANDERSON: Well, I think the -I'm not sure if you're aware that every establishment that participates in pub crawl, they have to list your license. So they have to have your license in their establishment and they cannot have more than one license. So they have to have a copy of your -- If you're approved, you have to provide them a copy of your license. And
there's only one license per establishment.
Because of Halloween, I will make sure the Agency has its investigators out. And so we will check with the approved pub crawl operators if we approve all three pub crawls to make sure that they have maintained their numbers. And of course if not, we will bring them in if there is such a violation. And then if that operator applies in the future for a pub crawl, the Board would look at whether or not they have complied with our previous orders regarding numbers. And that will make a determination whether or not we will approve any further applications for any of these companies.

As you have stated, if an individual has a -- has listed an illegal pub crawl on their Eventbrite, because they're not an approved operator, the Board doesn't necessarily have a whole lot of action that we can take for someone who is not approved. But as your company with the other two companies didn't apply for a license -- did apply for a maximum license and so therefore each time you have a pub crawl, then you apply for a substantial change license to have an event. So that's what we will move
forward with.
Any other representation you need to -- you want to make regarding your -- Yes, Mr. Short.

MEMBER SHORT: As our first applicant testified and who had the right answer, it is your duty if you are given a license from this Agency in this city and you found out someone's selling tickets illegally and you don't turn them in and that's proven, then you shouldn't ever have another pub crawl event or any other event in Washington D.C. So what would you do if you did find out someone was selling tickets previous to an event? Would you call and report them to ABRA -- ABCA?

MR. ROACH: Absolutely. We would have to do that because it causes market confusion. It causes many, many issues that we have with people. People show up to our events all the time assuming they've got a company to our event when really they bought some random ticket from pubcrawls.com, which is actually one of the companies that has listed several events for Halloween coming up in D.C. And we're sharing those ones and we will be sharing them with Didi
who is our ABCA representative, as well as we can call it in as well.

MEMBER SHORT: I would recommend you call our Agency and call MPD --

MR. ROACH: Okay.
MEMBER SHORT: -- because the bottom line is if they're selling tickets illegally, MPD can arrest them because of this pub crawl regulation. Okay?

MR. ROACH: Yes, sir.
MEMBER SHORT: And then protect yourself and protect your business interests because if something terrible happens with overcrowding, then your name becomes associated with illegal dangerous activities in Washington D.C. And we've seen it happen all around the world where big crowds of people are together and somebody does something harmful.

I'm a retired D.C. fireman after 33 years. I used to run the Fire Marshall's Office. That's the reason why I use so much caution. I've seen some of the problems that can happen when people don't pay attention to the laws and rules. And the reason why I try to keep as many -- a limit to the number of people who are
allowed down there on Connecticut Avenue. But just me as one board member, I'm giving my experience because I'm not saying this just to breathe on my guns and to say it because in spite of someone else. I'm saying it because I have knowledge of people safety that maybe some others don't have -- 33 years worth. But thank you very much. That's all I have, Mr. Chair.

CHAIR ANDERSON: Thank you, Mr. Short. Any other questions from any other board members? Any final comments you want to make in this hearing? If Ms. Bean or anyone else wants to say anything -- a final comment before --

MR. ROACH: No, sir. Thank you.
MR. TRENDOV: Thank you very much.
MR. SILENKO: I thought we were on unmute. No, we do not have any questions at the moment.

CHAIR ANDERSON: All right. The Board will take this matter under advisement. We will make a determination on whether or not we are going to approve the pub crawl. And if we do, what numbers will we approve. I just want to remind you that an establishment cannot participate in more than one pub crawl. And if
an establishment participates in your pub crawl, a copy of your license has to be provided to them and they need to have that license -- a copy of that license in their establishment.

MR. ROACH: I did have one question about that, sir, because I want to make sure that we're crystal clear with the venues so that even if they don't have regulations, that we know them. Given an example, if a crawler from another company comes to the door of one of the venues that are on our crawl and that person wants to come in, is the venue supposed to turn them away at the door or are they supposed to not offer the specials that the crawlers would receive? Or how should they go about that if they can see the wrist band from another bar crawl?

CHAIR ANDERSON: They are aware that they can only participate in one bar crawl as I stated. They're aware that can only participate in one bar crawl. The ABCA Board does not get involved in -- If there's three bar crawls -- If the three pub crawls are approved, the Agency doesn't get involved in the sense of the -- You have to figure out who is going to participate in
your -- in your crawl and that information is provided to investigators. So our investigators will know that there's not more than one establishment participating in the crawls because we have to approve the establishment.

Now the establishments are aware of the regulations. They are aware what they should or shouldn't do. And if our investigators come out and see that they are participating in more than one bar crawl, then we will take a corporate action against that licensee.

MR. ROACH: Thank you, sir.
CHAIR ANDERSON: All right. Thank you very much for all your presentations today. And as stated, we will take this matter under advisement and we will relay to you shortly what action or what decision the Board will take on your application. Thank you very much. Have a great day.

MR. SILENKO: Thank you very much. Have a great weekend.
