CHAIR ANDERSON: The next case in our calendar, we have a fact-finding here is the pub crawl regarding -- The Applicant is Alex Lopez and it's the D.C. Halloween Crawl 2023 Project D.C. Events for October 28th, 2023.

Good afternoon. Mr. Orellana, can you please elevate the rights of -- actually there's an investigator, Mr. Alex Lopez.

MR. ORELLANA: Alex Lopez, your access has been elevated.

CHAIR ANDERSON: And I'm not sure if Mr. Lopez -- I'm sorry, go ahead.

MR. ORELLANA: Investigator Mikea Nelson, your access has been elevated. And I'm going to elevate another Alex just in case.

MR. LOPEZ: I'm here. Can you guys hear me okay?

CHAIR ANDERSON: I can hear you, sir. I would love to see you though. Who is with you -- Who -- Okay, fine. Who's this other Alex? Is this someone who's on your team?

MR. LOPEZ: I am not sure to be honest with you. I was having some issues and I tried
to download the app on my phone, so I am -perhaps it's -- you can take off the other Alex just in case it's my phone.

CHAIR ANDERSON: All right.
MR. LOPEZ: Thank you.
CHAIR ANDERSON: All right. Good afternoon, everyone. So I would like everyone to introduce themself for the record. Let's start with you, Mr. Lopez.

MR. LOPEZ: Sure. My name is Alex Lopez and I'm with Project D.C. Events.

CHAIR ANDERSON: Ms. Nelson, can you identify yourself for the record please? INVESTIGATOR NELSON: I'm ABCA Investigator Mikea Nelson.

CHAIR ANDERSON: Good afternoon, Ms. Nelson. All right. So Mr. Lopez -- and it's my understanding -- Well, you did apply for a pub crawl -- to have a pub crawl on October 28th from 2:00 p.m. to 10:00 p.m. and this is on October 28th. And it's -- I guess it's called the D.C. Halloween Crawl 2023. Halloween is a sore spot with this Board, so the Board normally does not grant pub crawls for Halloween. But this is the -- It's my understanding it's the 28th and

Halloween is the 31st, which is a Tuesday after this Saturday. So just tell us -- And one of the reasons why we're having this public hearing is because it is around Halloween. And so I just want you to tell us what is your business model, what is it that you're requesting? Where is it that this pub crawl would -- if it was approved, what neighborhood? And approximately how many people are you requesting permission for the Board to grant?

MR. LOPEZ: Sure. So this would be an event that we are in the process of planning. If everything gets approved, it's on the 28th. The application currently states 2:00 p.m. to 10:00 p.m. I know the Board, you know, made a change last year and changed the hours and amended the hours, not just for us, but the other two companies that were approved in D.C. for 1:00 p.m. to 9:00 p.m. Not sure if the Board's going to do that again. We've applied for an expected number of 2,500 participants to 3,000. So for us, this is going to be, I believe the twelfth annual one -- Halloween crawl that we have -we've put together. Other than that, I'm open to answer any questions the Board has.

CHAIR ANDERSON: Tell me, describe the event for us.

MR. LOPEZ: Sorry, Mr. Anderson. You got cut off. What was your question?

CHAIR ANDERSON: Yeah. Describe the event.

MR. LOPEZ: Sure. So we have check-in hours. Usually it's the first four to five hours, depending on what time the event starts. That's when participants come to the check-in locations, pick up their wrist band. We have a party souvenir. That's when they get their wrist band, they get a route map, and they're free to visit the participating venues.

For this event actually, we've been in the process of talking with the Nightlife Task Force because I know the Board wanted us to communicate with them for this event. So obviously we're trying to finalize our approval for this event before finalizing a potential time with them. Our form of contact there has been Chief Morgan and Brendan Smith. So we've been in communication with the Nightlife Task Force just to make sure that there is extra personnel in Dupont Circle.

CHAIR ANDERSON: All right. So let's answer the question. So you plan to have this event in Dupont Circle. So specifically where in Dupont Circle?

MR. LOPEZ: Around M Street and Connecticut, that's -- Those are usually the venues we work with.

CHAIR ANDERSON: And how many establishments do you -- Approximately how many establishments do you anticipate would participate in this pub crawl?

MR. LOPEZ: We normally have anywhere from 15 to 18 venues that participate for Halloween.

CHAIR ANDERSON: Tell us about the security plan that you have in place if this pub crawl would be approved by the Board.

MR. LOPEZ: Sure. So depending on the capacity that we are approved for, that's essentially how we pick how many check-in locations we have. We usually pick the larger venues to be check-in locations. And per our application, that check-in process would begin at 2:00 p.m. That's essentially when everybody comes in and we scan their tickets and they get a
wrist band and a party favor. We usually have anywhere from eight to 12 staff members for check-in location. And our check-in closes usually around 5:30 to 6:00 p.m. and you know, our staff goes around to make sure everything's going smoothly.

CHAIR ANDERSON: Let me ask one question. What are the numbers again that you're asking for?

MR. LOPEZ: 2,500.
CHAIR ANDERSON: And tell us about what plans you have in place to prevent underage drinking and to control excessive drinking.

MR. LOPEZ: Sure. So for this event, we -- I mean every venue that's participating in the bar crawl knows that they have to staff very, very heavily in terms of security. Every venue has a waste bucket outside to prevent alcohol from going in and out. No matter if a participant has a wrist band, every venue needs to recheck IDs for participants to go inside. So a wrist band is not a guarantee that they cannot show an ID at the entrance. So as far as that, I mean yeah, every venue is staffed to the "T", plenty of security, plenty of staff. And
obviously after our check-in, we make our rounds ourselves.

CHAIR ANDERSON: Tell me about how you intend to coordinate with the security of each establishment.

MR. LOPEZ: Sorry. What's the question, Mr. Anderson?

CHAIR ANDERSON: I have no idea why I'm having problems with my laptop. Tell me how is that you intend to coordinate with the security of each -- Be specific, how do you intend to coordinate with the security of each establishment?

MR. LOPEZ: Sure. So we have -- I have constant communication with all the -- all the venue managers. Everything that's via phone, everything that's on via text message. They handle and manage all the security teams. But in terms of communication, I personally -- I am in charge of dealing and communicating with all the general managers/ownership of each venue.

CHAIR ANDERSON: Perfect. Any questions of Mr. Lopez? Yes, Mr. Short.

MEMBER SHORT: I have some questions, Mr. Chairman. Good afternoon, Mr. Lopez.

MR. LOPEZ: Good afternoon, Mr. Short. How are you?

MEMBER SHORT: We've seen each other over the years, haven't we?

MR. LOPEZ: Almost a decade, yeah.
MEMBER SHORT: Over a decade, okay. Well, just for the public record -- This is on the public record.

MR. LOPEZ: Sure.
MEMBER SHORT: And it would -- I'm going to base my view on your information that you give us today. And I know you're always very truthful with us and thank you for that. But Mr. Lopez, is this the first time you've ever had a Halloween pub crawl?

MR. LOPEZ: No, sir. We've --
MEMBER SHORT: How many have you had? How many have you had, Mr. Lopez?

MR. LOPEZ: I would say 11 or 12.
MEMBER SHORT: Eleven or twelve.
MR. LOPEZ: Yeah. Well, over ten.
MEMBER SHORT: Okay. Well, when you first got started, we didn't have any regulations on pub crawls. Did we?

MR. LOPEZ: No, sir.

MEMBER SHORT: And what is the reason why we do have pub crawl regulations now?

MR. LOPEZ: I would say perhaps eight years ago was the perfect storm where Halloween was on a Saturday and there were multiple companies that were approved for the same neighborhood. And it just -- It was very, very busy. I know that the --

MEMBER SHORT: I'm going to stop you right -- I'm going to stop you right there. Approximately how many people were -- with all of those different persons who had functions, when we had our fact-finding regarding that, how many persons did we come up with approximately there to cause a perfect storm?

MR. LOPEZ: I'm not sure. I mean this was so long ago.

MEMBER SHORT: Was it about 20,000? Would you say $20,000 ?$

MR. LOPEZ: I'm not -- I could not give you an answer, Mr. Short. I know --

MEMBER SHORT: I'll help you a little bit.

MR. LOPEZ: Yes, sir.
MEMBER SHORT: It was upwards of

20, 000 because someone oversold what they were allowed to sell. Correct? Some people did. I'm not saying you.

MR. LOPEZ: Correct.
MEMBER SHORT: But that created the perfect storm.

MR. LOPEZ: Correct. But I think it was also a combination of just people coming to the neighborhood outside of the event.

MEMBER SHORT: I understand. So since you mentioned that --

MR. LOPEZ: Yes.
MEMBER SHORT: -- did you sell the appropriate number you were supposed to have sold?

MR. LOPEZ: Mr. Short, this was eight years ago.

MEMBER SHORT: I understand. But let me freshen your --

MR. LOPEZ: Sure.
MEMBER SHORT: -- your memory a little bit because I still have all my records from that day. And my records reflect that there was a person that came from New York City selling tickets here. There was a person from the D.C.
area who was selling tickets here without any permission or anything. And that some people -I'm not mentioning any names -- oversold because they made mistakes on how they counted their tickets. So we came up with 20,000 people and the perfect storm shut down that portion of Northwest Washington D.C. And it was the testimony of the Metropolitan Police that they had to call every available officer from all the other wards to get control of Connecticut Avenue again. Do you recollect any of that?

MR. LOPEZ: I do recollect that now that you bring it up --

MEMBER SHORT: Okay.
MR. LOPEZ: -- because this was part of -- this was part of our -- of the fact-finding hearing that we had post event where there were a couple of companies from outside of D.C. that promoted Halloween in our city.

MEMBER SHORT: Well, that's fair because that's part of what I was asking. And I don't want to hold up all of your time --

MR. LOPEZ: Sure.
MEMBER SHORT: As a result of that, we kind of got things under control again, didn't
we?
MR. LOPEZ: We did.
MEMBER SHORT: Okay. And we decided that we were going to allow up to a certain number because the BID from Dupont Circle came in and testified that they couldn't handle what happened. They couldn't clean up all the trash. MPD came in and said what happened. So we got regulations. And as long as this city lives by those regulations, I don't have a problem with pub crawls.

And we also came up with from the new board members -- and the people in the public who are not as familiar with this -- we came up with the regulations that for the first time, people who had pub crawls in Washington D.C. like they had in Montgomery County and Virginia would have to pay a fee. And they would also have to clean up after themselves.

MR. LOPEZ: Sure.
MEMBER GRANDIS: And so I'll just to have to say this, last year, I don't know how or why, but it happened, some people didn't clean up after themselves because they cleaned up at 12 o'clock, but at 6 o'clock in the morning, the BID was complaining because the clean-up didn't
happen. But the regulation says that by 6 o'clock the next morning, the pub crawl persons would do that. So if you're allowed to have this pub crawl, will you make sure that the street is cleaned up by 6:00 a.m. like is in our regulations?

MR. LOPEZ: Yes. And to address -- to address a couple of your points, Mr. Short, that's one of the --
(simultaneous speaking)
MEMBER SHORT: Well, wait a minute. First of all, just to be clear, you on the public record are saying now that if you're allowed to have a pub crawl on the 28th of October 2023, by 6 o'clock on the 29th, the street will be as best you can make it with your -- because you have a company. Correct?

MR. LOPEZ: Yes, sir.
MEMBER SHORT: All right. And they're going to -- they're going to make sure by 6 o'clock in the morning that we don't have to worry about what we worried about over the years?

MR. LOPEZ: That is correct.
MEMBER SHORT: All right. Okay, go
ahead. You were in the middle of --
(simultaneous speaking)
MR. LOPEZ: Sure. So I do remember that conversation exactly and I do remember, you know, they -- Essentially one of the things we discussed with you and I think when Mr. Kline was on the call with us was the fact that, you know, the BID moving forward, they wanted to make sure that they were the ones that were doing the cleaning. And us as a company, we were going to pay for that because --

MEMBER SHORT: The regulations didn't deal with any of that, does it? The regulations that we have passed and the law says that you as the person who gets the permit will make sure. So we can't say the BID or anybody else had any responsibility by 6 o'clock the next morning. The law says and the regulations that were passed that you, the person who's the Applicant for a pub crawl would make sure that happens.

MR. LOPEZ: Correct.
MEMBER SHORT: Do you remember that?

MR. LOPEZ: I do.
MEMBER SHORT: Okay. Let's stick with the law. Let's don't go --

MR. LOPEZ: Sure. No worries.
MEMBER SHORT: -- where Mr. Kline said because Mr. Kline is not the law of this Board. MR. LOPEZ: No worries. MEMBER SHORT: Okay, thank you. Go ahead.

MR. LOPEZ: No. So one of the things we've been doing with our -- with our clean-up company is we're asking for pictures. So postclean up, we receive pictures. I send those pictures and the paid invoice over to Mr. Gordy just to make sure that, you know, there's --

MEMBER SHORT: And that's at 6:00 a.m. in the morning.

MR. LOPEZ: Correct.
MEMBER SHORT: Okay.
MR. LOPEZ: Correct.
MEMBER SHORT: Okay. Go ahead.
MR. LOPEZ: So their cleanup -- their cleanup starts after the venues close. So there is no venue that's open while the cleanup is taking place. So the cleanup starts around 4:30 in the morning.

MEMBER SHORT: Okay. I understand that. We are past that. The law says that it
will be cleaned up by 6 o'clock in the morning. So let's go to another issue. The other issue I want to bring up is --

MR. LOPEZ: Sure.
MEMBER SHORT: -- we had more than one, two, or three different persons that the ABC Board at that time allowed more than three vendors selling over \$2,500 each and that was a catastrophe. Was it not?

MR. LOPEZ: Are you still talking about the perfect storm?

MEMBER SHORT: I'm talking about -Okay, no. Let's leave the perfect storm alone because the regulations came to correct that.

MR. LOPEZ: Sure.
MEMBER SHORT: Did you have a pub crawl last year?

MR. LOPEZ: We did, Mr. Short.
MEMBER SHORT: Were there any issues?
MR. LOPEZ: We had a call with the Board after that event if you recall because our company hosted the Halloween event in multiple cities if you recall --

MEMBER SHORT: I understand. But let's just stick with Washington D.C. because I
don't have anything to do with New York or Boston or any place else.

MR. LOPEZ: Sure.
MEMBER SHORT: Let's just stick with D.C.

MR. LOPEZ: Sure.
MEMBER SHORT: Were there any issues
last year and what were they?
MR. LOPEZ: The issue that we faced is the ABRA investigator came over to me and asked what our numbers were. And because all our three events were under one dashboard, it was not -- we couldn't give them numbers.

MEMBER SHORT: Okay. Stop right there. Stop right there.

MR. LOPEZ: Sure.
MEMBER SHORT: So that won't happen if you're allowed to have a permit again this year. Would that happen again?

MR. LOPEZ: It would not.
MEMBER SHORT: And how can we be guaranteed of that?

MR. LOPEZ: We've been working with our ticket merchant for this. So now we can separate cities even though all the QR codes are
going to be under one scanning platform.
MEMBER SHORT: So not a problem if an investigator comes to you and says to you, how many tickets did you sell? You will be able to tell them in Washington D.C. -- We don't have to talk about the Boards and the other cities -- if the investigator from Washington D.C., our ABCA investigator says to you, Mr. Lopez, how many tickets do you sell? What would you say to her or him?

MR. LOPEZ: I will pull up the device and I will answer her, the number that it shows on the screen.

MEMBER SHORT: Okay. So we won't have -- So we won't have that problem again this year?

MR. LOPEZ: That is correct.
MEMBER SHORT: And you've always been pretty honest with us and I trust what you say.

MR. LOPEZ: Thank you, Mr. Short.
MEMBER SHORT: All right. Now again, the only issue I would have is to your knowledge, are there going to be more than one pub crawl in that area this year?

MR. LOPEZ: To my knowledge, yes. To my knowledge that I'm aware of from what I've
heard from other venues and licensees, U Street is going to have one --

MEMBER SHORT: We're talking about -yours is going to be on Connecticut Avenue. Right?

MR. LOPEZ: Yeah.
MEMBER SHORT: Let's just stick with Connecticut Avenue.

MR. LOPEZ: Sure.
MEMBER SHORT: Are there going to be more than one Halloween pub crawls for the 28th of October 2023 on Dupont Circle?

MR. LOPEZ: Yes. If the Board approves the other company, yes.

MEMBER SHORT: Okay. Well, let me ask you this.

MR. LOPEZ: Sure.
MEMBER SHORT: So that we can keep in compliance with what we've been doing and what we've got the MPD to buy into and other city agencies to buy into and especially the BID, the Business Improvement Division of Dupont Circle, we can handle certain numbers. And you know what those numbers are. Correct?

MR. LOPEZ: I do.

MEMBER SHORT: All right. So knowing that there's going to be another one, what number would you give so that the other person could also have one at the same time you're having one that could be managed and we won't have the problems that we've had in previous years. No more perfect storms. What number would you give this Board today and the citizens who are tuned in to this public session of the ABCA Board dealing with your event October 28th, 2023? And again, we trust you. We know you. We've dealt with you over the years. You know what are situation is. What number could you give us knowing that we've had situations before -numbers that we could work with, with another -another applicant just like yourself for October 28th at Dupont Circle?

MR. LOPEZ: I understand the question. So for Halloween, we average anywhere from 15 to 18 venues. Given the capacity of said many venues, 1,700 to 2,300.

MEMBER SHORT: Okay. And then on Saturday night normally --

MR. LOPEZ: Sure.
MEMBER SHORT: -- Dupont Circle
without even being a holiday or being Halloween, there's a crowd. Correct?

MR. LOPEZ: That is correct.
MEMBER SHORT: All right. So knowing those numbers, knowing the number you're going to bring -- that you're going to sell tickets to and knowing there's another vendor, what number could you comfortably say to this Board you would like for us to approve for the 28th of October 2023? Because I want to work with you.

MR. LOPEZ: Thank you. I mean we definitely want to work with the Board too.

MEMBER SHORT: Thank you.
MR. LOPEZ: 1,750 to 2,000?
MEMBER SHORT: So you said 1,750. Suppose we said 1,500 for you and 1,500 for the other person, would that work? That's 3,000 people. That's still a lot of people. Think about the city --

MR. LOPEZ: Yes, sir.
MEMBER SHORT: -- your long history with us --

MR. LOPEZ: Yes, sir.
MEMBER SHORT: -- the numbers you've given us. And I'm just asking you as a board
member who wants to work with you and vote yes on your application, would 1,500 work with you?

MR. LOPEZ: Yes, sir. We can make that work, Mr. Short.

MEMBER SHORT: All right. Thank you very much. Mr. Chairman, I believe Mr. Lopez. We have a long history with him. So if he can have 1,500, I think if the other applicant -- if we can work on those numbers, $I$ think we can get the Police Department and we can get the BID and everybody else to go along with it. And I think that it would be a reasonable -- a reasonable assumption that Mr. Lopez and the other -- I won't mention any names -- the Applicant at this time can work it out on the 28th so that the business can go on, Halloween can go on. The businesses on Connecticut Avenue should be happy and all the _ coming to celebrate Halloween can be happy and safe. So with that said, Mr. Chair, I am finished. Thank you, Lopez. And thank you, Mr. Chairman for allowing me to ask these questions and get Mr. Lopez to commit to 1,5000.

MR. LOPEZ: It's always a pleasure, Mr. Short.

CHAIR ANDERSON: Thank you, Mr. Lopez. MEMBER GRANDIS: Chairman, when you have time, I'd like to ask a question. Where's my video? There's my video. I've been having some problems. May I ask a question? CHAIR ANDERSON: Go ahead, Mr. Grandis.

MR. LOPEZ: Good afternoon, Mr.
Grandis. How are you?
MEMBER GRANDIS: Fine, thank you. You were explaining to us, but I don't think we gave you a chance to finish --

MR. LOPEZ: Sure.
MEMBER GRANDIS: -- what was -- what was your working relationship with the BID Masters?

MR. LOPEZ: Sure. So essentially when the perfect storm happened --

MEMBER GRANDIS: Let's not say years ago. I don't want to -- We don't need to talk about that.

MR. LOPEZ: No worries. Okay. Okay.
MEMBER GRANDIS: Just last year --
MR. LOPEZ: No worries.
MEMBER GRANDIS: -- because it was two
years ago that we had complaints from the ANC and the BID.

MR. LOPEZ: Right.
MEMBER GRANDIS: And I believe this past year, we did not get complaints because we understood that you worked with the BID regarding the cleanup. So could you just for our record here, remind us what you did -- how you coordinated with the BID?

MR. LOPEZ: So one of the things that we're asking for when it comes to the cleanup, is we're demanding pictures. That way we have proof to show the BID if anything -- if they want proof that the streets were cleaned, so that's one thing that we've been doing. And I mean we've been, you know, obviously emailing those pictures to Mr. Gordy. But the thing that kind of, you know, made me question the direction in which the BID wanted to go in, the BID initially asked for them to take care of the cleanup and for us as a company to pay for that. And we thought in our head, you know, that's a win-win because they know exactly how to clean. They have their staff already. And we have no issues in obviously paying the BID for the post-event cleanup. I'm
not too sure where that conversation went or if it's going to happen again, but that's essentially a conversation that started I would say maybe like a year and a half ago for this event.

MEMBER GRANDIS: So just to make sure I understand. This past year when you had your event, the cleanup was actually performed by the Cleaning Team that the BID has and you had took pictures at 6:00 in the morning or your team took pictures at 6:00 in the morning to show that it had been cleaned. Am I repeating what I thought you said?

MR. LOPEZ: No, the cleanup was done by a third party company that we hired called Bayside, LLC. And after we had the call with the BID -- and our lawyer was present on the call -we are demanding pictures of the post-cleanup now.

MEMBER GRANDIS: And did you get them last year?

MR. LOPEZ: We did.
MEMBER GRANDIS: And did it look like it was clean?

MR. LOPEZ: It did.

MEMBER GRANDIS: Okay. So while the statute makes -- the regs may say that you are responsible for cleanup, $I$ don't think it says you can't have a third party as long as you're coordinating and you're there or you have staff there and you make sure that the cleaning that the city demands occurs. So I don't think we want to micro manage how you get the cleanup done as long as you know you're responsible for it.

MR. LOPEZ: Correct.
MEMBER GRANDIS: Okay? So my
recollection is that we did not get complaints last year. It was two years ago and it was based on -- and you brought this up about you saying you talked to the BID about a year and a half go -- well before that, they had complained about the cleanup situation from two years ago and we had a hearing. And they came in and then we talked to you and we talked to other promoters that do this type of thing. And my understanding is last year it worked out fine. So do you have a different recollection that the cleanup didn't go well last year?

MR. LOPEZ: No. It worked out fine and we're definitely more on our end, I guess you
could say we micromanaged in terms of hey, these are the times that you have to be in Dupont by. The cleanup needs to be finished by this Summer. Please send proof -- pictures, videos.

MEMBER GRANDIS: Well you know, like I said, as long as you get the -- you meet the requirements of the city on what type of cleanup and where the cleanup is and you provide us pictures that document the time and the date, then I think we're satisfied.

MR. LOPEZ: Thank you, Mr. Grandis.
MEMBER GRANDIS: And I look forward to working with this Board in making sure that the numbers that we finally come up with are suitable because as you know, there are other companies that want the same night. And you know, I -- And Mr. Short is correct. We are concerned about narrow sidewalks. We are concerned about, you know, people who are not -- who don't have your tickets that try to get involved with some of your establishments. But you've had a lot of -you've had a lot of experience and I think we can work well with you again and we look forward to you having a successful event. But please be concerned about the numbers because numbers are a
factor when you have narrow sidewalks and people in costumes and things. Thank you. Mr. Chairman
(simultaneous speaking) CHAIR ANDERSON: Let me get back -I'm going to get to you, Ms. Nelson. Let me -- I want to get back to Mr. Lopez regarding numbers. Now I need specifically from you, what area -- is it just Dupont Circle? Is it just the Dupont Circle area or is it farther? So what specific area are you seeking approval to have this pub crawl?

MR. LOPEZ: Sure. So we have a few venues that are closer to I Street. But I would probably say about 80 percent plus of our participating venues are on M Street and Connecticut.

CHAIR ANDERSON: All right. So the majority of your participants are going to be in the Dupont Circle area. Is that correct?

MR. LOPEZ: Correct.
CHAIR ANDERSON: And so I know you had a conversation with Mr. Short regarding numbers, so I just want to make sure that whenever the Board -- the entire Board makes this determination about numbers, what is that you
have requested and why did you request whatever numbers you requested?

MR. LOPEZ: Sure. I mean the reason we requested this number was because we have, you know, 15 to 17 venues that usually participate for this event. And given the capacity for said venues, $I$ mean I think in my eyes, you know, the 2,500 made sense. But again, we're definitely looking and willing to work with the Board when it comes to that figure.

CHAIR ANDERSON: I know last year -What area was this pub crawl? Is this the same area you had the pub crawl last year?

MR. LOPEZ: Correct.
CHAIR ANDERSON: It's my understanding the Board approved last year 1,500 participants for this pub crawl. Why did you or why are you then seeking an increased number this year?

MR. LOPEZ: If I'm not mistaken, we also seeked to have 25 to 30 to 3,000 last year. It's a number for us that makes sense when it comes to the number of venues. So we have, I know, 1,500 was the number the Board decided to move forward after both companies spoke in front of you for the fact-finding hearing. It's not
that we're asking for an increase. I think for us it's more of a number that makes sense given the number of venues that we have. But again, I mean it's also a thing where if another company is approved, I understand that 1,500 could make more sense. But when we apply and sit in front of you, it's also with the premise that, you know, we are the only company that could potentially host this event. So we don't think of another company when it comes to us, you know, applying or writing a security plan.

CHAIR ANDERSON: Well, you're talking about "make sense". What do you mean by "makes sense"? I need you to be specific in your -- I mean I'm asking this specifically because I'm not comfortable when folks throw numbers out without explaining these numbers. So you said "makes sense". So what does it mean, "makes sense"? MR. LOPEZ: Sure. So the reason why we chose 2,500 was because we have about 17 venues that are, you know, that gave us the green light to participate in this event. And a lot of our venues that we work with are nightclubs and they have a very, very big capacity. So for us, the 2,500 approval made sense in a way where, you
know, our venues are large. I mean just to give you one, Bravobravo near Farragut, I mean they're capacity is over 400 people. You know, we have Ozio that potentially holds over 400 people. And Abigail -- You know, there's venues we work with that are very, very spacious and large. And when we applied and chose 2,500 , that was the reason. I know that there is another company that's looking to apply and get approved for the same date, so I do understand that the Board perhaps needs to reduce that. But that's essentially how we chose 2,500.

CHAIR ANDERSON: All right. Ms. Nelson, I'm going to bring you in. Who are you? Just tell us the work group -- who are you? Where are you employed, ma'am?

INVESTIGATOR NELSON: Good afternoon, everyone. I am an ABCA investigator, Mikea Nelson.

CHAIR ANDERSON: How long have you been working for ABCA?

INVESTIGATOR NELSON: For four years.
CHAIR ANDERSON: Now are you familiar with pub crawls?

INVESTIGATOR NELSON: Yes, sir. I am.

CHAIR ANDERSON: Have you ever gone out and monitored any pub crawls?

INVESTIGATOR NELSON: Yes, I have.
CHAIR ANDERSON: Are you familiar with this provider of the pub crawl?

INVESTIGATOR NELSON: Yes.
CHAIR ANDERSON: Have you had a chance to review the establishments that the operator has proposed to be the sites or establishments that would participate in this pub crawl?

INVESTIGATOR NELSON: Yes, sir.
CHAIR ANDERSON: Are there any establishments in your estimation who are not able to participate in this pub crawl based on either settlement agreements or has violations by this Agency?

INVESTIGATOR NELSON: Yes, sir.
CHAIR ANDERSON: What establishments in your view are unable to participate in this pub crawl?

INVESTIGATOR NELSON: The Mansion Lounge/The Manor has a settlement agreement that prohibits them from participating in bar crawls.

CHAIR ANDERSON: Is that the only establishment -- Is that the only establishment
on the list that was provided that you believe should not participate -- that is unable to participate if the Board was to approve this bar crawl -- this pub crawl?

INVESTIGATOR NELSON: Yes, sir.
CHAIR ANDERSON: Any questions or comments that you have to make, Mr. Lopez?

MR. LOPEZ: Sure. If I produce an email, the updated settlement agreement, Ms. Nelson, is that something I can email to you or do I have to email it to the Board?

CHAIR ANDERSON: What type of settlement agreement are you talking about?

MR. LOPEZ: I know this has been brought up, but the Phantom, I believe last year had a -- they had a settlement agreement that pretty much allows them to participate in pub crawls. I want to say they've emailed that to me in the past. Is that something that I could potentially email you, Ms. Nelson?

INVESTIGATOR NELSON: Absolutely.
(simultaneous speaking)
CHAIR ANDERSON: I hear what you're saying, Mr. Lopez, but I would hope that the Agency would have the official records of all the
establishments. I would hope that the Agency would have the appropriate settlement agreement because the -- whatever settlement agreement the establishment would have had, would have to -was voted upon by this Board. So I would hope that the Agency as the official body of the records would have the updated -- would have the updated settlement agreement for all the establishments in the District of Columbia. I would want you to -- I will ask Ms. Nelson to review our records to make sure that we have the most updated settlement agreement. I mean, you can provide it to her, but I think any settlement agreement that controls is what it's -- whatever agreement that is maintained currently by the Agency.

MR. LOPEZ: Sure. The only reason I say that is because the Phantom participated in two events this Summer and the Phantom was approved by the Board to be a venue that participates. So I know they had that issue over a year ago and they had to get the settlement agreement fixed. But again, I mean I'm definitely willing to help and you know, find a solution for that, Ms. Nelson.

CHAIR ANDERSON: All right. I would ask that you to provide the settlement agreement and I hope that Ms. Nelson will look to ensure that the Agency has the correct settlement agreement for this establishment. The question I was asking was if Ms. Nelson had any specific questions for you.

INVESTIGATOR NELSON: Yes, I do if you don't mind, Mr. Chair.

CHAIR ANDERSON: Go ahead.
INVESTIGATOR NELSON: I know you stated previously that the number you were looking to seek was 2,500; however, upon reviewing your website and reviewing the application, there was a range. And from working the pub crawl, I tend to see that there are more people participating than what is absolutely applied for. So do you have a plan in place to make sure that we stay at the exact number of tickets that are sold, instead of people purchasing tickets and passing them out to other people?

MR. LOPEZ: Sure. So one of the things that we've been -- we've been very, very proactive in the last -- especially this year is
-- There's a lot of -- There's a lot of third party companies that -- it's usually around St. Patty's. It's usually around Halloween that I just set up a ticket merchant, hey, I'm going to set up Eventbrite and just try, you know, to sell tickets and make money. What we're doing as a company is as soon as we see companies that are selling tickets for Dupont Circle, we report them. So Mr. Gordy gets an email. I know -- I don't know if it's Didi or someone else, but we report third party companies outside of Lindy and outside of Project D.C. so that ABRA knows exactly hey, there's this company and there's this company and this company that are also selling tickets for this. So that's one thing we're being very, very proactive about. Another thing is -- I mean this is something we've seen is the fact that there is a $U$ Street bar crawl that happens the same day. And you know, we've definitely seen those people come towards Dupont after 6 o'clock. And on our end, we're definitely trying to make sure that, you know, if there's only two companies that are approved to sell tickets, only two companies sell tickets, not six or seven. And that's something
that, you know, we've been reporting and obviously emailing Mr. Gordy.

INVESTIGATOR NELSON: Thank you, Mr. Lopez. If you don't mind, Mr. Chair, I do have one more question.

CHAIR ANDERSON: Go ahead.
INVESTIGATOR NELSON: Will your company be assisting with the establishment's controlling the lines?

MR. LOPEZ: That's something that we do, especially at the check-in locations. The check-in locations when the event happens, we get the majority of the people because everybody needs to go check in, so we have about ten to 12. Depending on the event, sometimes it's eight. But for Halloween and St. Patty's, it's usually ten to 12 staff members that are at each check-in location. And yeah, we assist with the line. INVESTIGATOR NELSON: Thank you. CHAIR ANDERSON: All right. Any other questions of Mr. Lopez by any board members? Go ahead, Mr. Short. You're on mute, Mr. Short. Mr. Short. Mr. Short, you are on mute.

MEMBER SHORT: Forgive me, Mr. Chair. Please forgive me. This is for the investigator.

Investigator, let's not talk about a pub crawl night on a Friday. What is normally the population -- Bravobravo was mentioned. What is normally their crowd capacity when it's even a pub crawl on a Friday night?

INVESTIGATOR NELSON: Mr. Short, if you don't mind, $I$ can check the records and give you the exact capacity of Bravobravo.

MEMBER SHORT: Not a problem. The point I'm trying to make is on Friday nights, whether there's a pub crawl in the area or not, Connecticut Avenue is crowded.

INVESTIGATOR NELSON: Yes, it is.
MEMBER SHORT: Okay. So the 1,500 number that Mr. Lopez and I talked about earlier is something that we think that is feasible public safety wise to accommodate the normal crowd and the pub crawl crowd. And hopefully we don't get a lot of feedover from the other pub crawls or other pub crawlers on U Street. But the bottom line is Mr. Lopez knows the business well. And I do appreciate so much, Mr. Lopez, you saying you could work with the 1,500. And that's the reason why I as a former public safety person for the city, think 1,500 for you and

1,500 for the other person, along with the normal regular crowd we have there, especially when the city is prepared. The Police Department knows because you sent them information. Is that right, Mr. Lopez?

MR. LOPEZ: That is correct.
MEMBER GRANDIS: And all pub crawl
persons after we did the regulations are required to notify the Police of the crowd they intend on having. So that means preparations from the DPW gets notified and all the other persons get notified. And so it makes thing work a little more harmoniously. And so again, I'll say to the Board, I appreciate Mr. Lopez's professionalism in agreeing that 1,500 is workable with him, especially with another person having a pub crawl the same night and with the normal crowd that's there on a Saturday night. And I think that, that's a win-win for the business community, the Applicant, and for our responsibility as the Board. Thank you very much, Mr. Chair, for allowing me to question and get what I had on my chest off. Thank you.

CHAIR ANDERSON: Thank you, Mr. Short. Ms. Nelson, what shift do you work on? Ms.

Nelson.
INVESTIGATOR NELSON: I apologize, Mr. Chair. I currently work day shift; however, we are required to work every other weekend night shift.

CHAIR ANDERSON: All right. So when does the next shift start?

INVESTIGATOR NELSON: 7:30 p.m.
CHAIR ANDERSON: Are you familiar with, I guess it's Dupont Circle area like where this pub crawl is supposed to -- if it's approved, where it would occur?

INVESTIGATOR NELSON: Absolutely.
CHAIR ANDERSON: Now when is that you believe that -- I missed in your -- Have you worked this -- Have you worked in this area on a Saturday night?

INVESTIGATOR NELSON: Yes, sir. I have.

CHAIR ANDERSON: So typically when is it that this area becomes saturated with participants?

INVESTIGATOR NELSON: During the pub crawl or on a typical Saturday night?

CHAIR ANDERSON: On a typical Saturday
night, yeah.
INVESTIGATOR NELSON: I'm sorry?
CHAIR ANDERSON: Yeah, on a typical Saturday night.

MEMBER SHORT: This is a Friday night, isn't it, Mr. Chair?

CHAIR ANDERSON: Saturday night, Mr. Short.

MEMBER SHORT: The 28th, okay. Thank you.

INVESTIGATOR NELSON: On a typical Saturday night, I would say this area becomes busier between 10:00 p.m. and 11:00 p.m.

CHAIR ANDERSON: Okay. All right. Any other questions for Ms. Nelson or Mr. Lopez before we move on to another case? All right. Thank you very much, Mr. Lopez. The Board will take this matter under advisement and we'll advise you what decision the Board will make regarding whether or not we will approve the pub crawl and what number. It's my understanding that we have two other fact-finding hearings and I'm just trying to get some clarification if all three pub crawls are going to be in the same area. That's one of the reasons I was just
asking you specifically what area the pub crawl will occur.

All right. So we will take this matter under advisement and we will alert you to the decision that the Board makes. Thank you very much, sir. Have a great day unless you want to say something else before I close this hearing?

MR. LOPEZ: No. I just wanted to say it's always a pleasure speaking to you and Mr. Short. I'm looking forward to the answer and it's always a pleasure.

CHAIR ANDERSON: Thank you, sir. Have a great day.
(Whereupon, the hearing in the aboveentitled matter was concluded at 2:50 p.m.)
