3	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: The next case
4	on our calendar is Case Number 23-251-00020,
5	Power Night Club/Lounge/Restaurant, License
6	Number 104228. Good morning again, Mr. Orellana.
7	Can you please elevate the rights of the
8	licensee, the licensee's counsel, I believe MPD
9	Officer Jose Hernandez, and Investigator Garcia,
10	and if there's anyone else on the line for this
11	case.
12	MR. OWATE: Okay. Mr. Kline, your
13	access have been elevated. Cameron Mixon, your
14	access has been elevated. Investigator George
15	Garcia, your access has been elevated. Officer
16	Hernandez, your access has been elevated. That
17	appears to be oh, Abeba Beyene, your access
18	has been elevated. That appears to be all,
19	Chairman.
20	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Thank you.
21	Good morning. Can I have everyone appear on
22	camera if you have that ability? Mr. Beyene, B-
23	E-Y-E-N-E, if you have a camera, can you turn
24	your camera on, sir? All right. Let's start
25	with the introductions. Mr. Kline, can you
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1 please identify yourself for the record, please? 2 MR. KLINE: Yes. Good morning, Mr. Chair, members of the Board. Andrew Kline on 3 behalf of Power Night Club. 4 5 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Mr. Mixon? MR. MIXON: Also on behalf of Power 6 7 Night Club. 8 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: I see that your client is on the line, Mr. Kline with his client. 9 Abeba Beyene. 10 MS. BEYENE: 11 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: I'm sorry. Ι 12 apologize, ma'am. Can you please spell and state 13 your name for the record. 14 MS. BEYENE: Okay. First name, Abeba, 15 A-B-E-B-A, last name Beyene, B-E-Y-E-N-E. 16 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Thank you, 17 And this is one of the reasons why I ask ma'am. 18 people to be on camera, because --19 MS. BEYENE: Yes. 20 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: -- I would not 21 call you Mr. or Mrs. Harves (phonetic) so I 2.2 apologize. 23 It's perfectly fine. MS. BEYENE: 2.4 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: I apologize for 25 that. Officer Hernandez, can you please identify

1	yourself for the record?
2	MR. HERNANDEZ: Yes. Jose Hernandez
3	with the Fifth District of Metropolitan Police
4	Department.
5	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Can you please
6	spell your name, sir?
7	MR. HERNANDEZ: Oh, I'm sorry. Yes.
8	First name is J-O-S-E, last name is H-E-R-N-A-N-
9	D-E-Z.
10	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Thank you. Mr.
11	Garcia, can you please identify yourself for the
12	record and also spell and state your name?
13	MR. GARCIA: G-E-O-R-G-E, Garcia, G-A-
14	R-C-I-A.
15	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right.
16	Good morning, everyone. Welcome. All right.
17	This is a fact finding hearing, Power Nightclub
18	located at 2335 Bladensburg Road NE, related to
19	an incident. This is and the MPD requested a
20	fact finding hearing related to an incident that
21	took place on Saturday, July 22, 2023,
22	specifically during an incident outside of the
23	establishment, an unknown suspect began shooting
24	towards the establishment. Three people were
25	struck by gunfire. Two victims suffered gunshot

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wounds to their legs and one to their shoulder. All were transported to local hospitals for treatment. The incident occurred at approximately 4:28 a.m. after the establishment closed while patrons were continuing to loiter in front of the establishment.

7 All right. So this is a request for 8 a fact finding hearing so I can supply -- by MPD. And so what I will do, Mr. Kline, I will have 9 both MPD and the Investigator present. The Board 10 11 will ask questions of Officer Hernandez and Mr. 12 Garcia. Once the Board has asked questions of 13 the Investigator, Mr. Garcia, then you will have 14 an opportunity to ask questions if you so desire 15 also as individuals and then if you want to give your client's version of the facts in this case. 16

As you are aware, this is a fact finding hearing. At a fact finding hearing, the Board is only gathering facts. We're trying to find out what happened. The Board has not made any determination about the next steps.

At the end of this hearing, these are the decisions that the Board could possibly take -- can possibly take. The Board can decide that no further action is necessary, or the Board can

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1 refer this matter to the Office of the Attorney 2 General for further investigation, and the Office of Attorney General would be the body who could 3 determine whether or not this matter will result 4 5 in a show cause hearing. As you're also aware, at a fact finding hearing, the witnesses are not 6 sworn, and so this is somewhat informal because 7 8 we're still gathering information about the 9 incident. Any questions by anyone before we 10 start? 11 MR. KLINE: None from the applicant. 12 Thank you. 13 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right. Thank you. Let's start off with -- I can either 14 15 start off with Mr. Garcia or you, Officer 16 Hernandez. I know that this is a request from a 17 fact finding hearing by MPD, so I'll start off 18 with Officer Hernandez, if there's anything that 19 you can -- you want to add why is it that 20 Assistant Chief -- I'm sorry -- Acting Chief of 21 Police Smith, why is it that she requested this 2.2 fact finding hearing. 23 MR. HERNANDEZ: So one of the reasons 24 why the Chief requested this is because of the incident that occurred. You know, it's a very 25

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1 violent situation that happened in front of their 2 location where, like you stated before, three individuals were shot in front of the 3 establishment. And even after witnessing part of 4 5 the video and stuff, there are other persons that were in front of the location that were also 6 7 shooting back at the shooters. So you had a gun 8 battle basically essentially happening in front of this establishment. It's not a first -- it's 9 10 been a -- it's happened way in the past. I mean 11 it's -- it has -- it's been a few years since 12 it's happened before, but it's happened. 13 And basically, the Chief just wants to 14 see what can be done about this, what security 15 plans are, things of that nature so that going forward we can deem this establishment to be 16 running at a smoother capacity for the clients 17 18 that go to the location. 19 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Just a quick 20 question -- couple of questions, Officer 21 Hernandez. How was MPD made aware of the incident? 2.2 23 MR. HERNANDEZ: We were made aware of 24 the incident because of ShotSpotter and phone calls being made to the OUC and 911. 25

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1	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Do you know if
2	the establishment itself called 911, or were
3	these do you know who called 911?
4	MR. HERNANDEZ: I can't say for
5	certain who did. I do know that one of the
6	managers did call 911. He stated that he had
7	called so but we can't determine who made the
8	phone calls.
9	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Now in your
10	in MPD's investigation, was the establishment
11	cooperative with the investigation?
12	MR. HERNANDEZ: Yes. The
13	establishment was very cooperative. They
14	assisted us with everything they could, you know,
15	providing video, information, who was working,
16	witnesses, things of that nature, so they were
17	able they were very cooperative.
18	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: And just
19	generally, are there any security or safety
20	recommendations that you could make regarding
21	this establishment?
22	MR. HERNANDEZ: One of the biggest
23	things that I would say is that not to let people
24	once the club let out, not to let people just
25	loiter around and hang out; you know, try to get
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the staff come out and just tell everybody to go home and not just hang out in front of the establishment.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: I'm aware that there is a no loitering law in D.C., so I'm just asking you what is it that you believe they can do to move folks along?

Outside of, you know, 8 MR. HERNANDEZ: 9 trying to get out there and just keep pushing people along, you know, we would have to take a 10 11 look at what -- cause I haven't reviewed their security plan in terms of what has -- when was 12 13 the last time it was updated and things of that 14 nature. I'm sure Investigator Garcia got -- has 15 that. He can talk a little bit more about that, 16 but in terms of the establishment doing anything 17 different. It's different because like, you 18 know, their promoters, they need to do better, a 19 better job of having an established relationship 20 with their promoters. Their promoters bring 21 folks that, you know, have ties to local, you 2.2 know, gangs, affiliates, people that is on MPD's 23 radars that, you know, essentially -- we find out 24 from flyers who they're bringing to the 25 establishment and from there, we do -- our intel

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1 unit goes in and checks to see if these people 2 are, you know, verified, especially when they're from the local area. And a lot of times -- you 3 know, I've spoken to Ms. -- to Mimi (phonetic) 4 5 about these, and she's done a great job of, you know, once we find out who they are basically 6 7 saying, you know what, I'm just closing my doors and canceling the events. So she's done a great 8 9 job when it comes to that when she's advised of who is being brought in. But I think it's one of 10 11 those that, you know, you could possibly like 12 avoid it just by talking to your promoter and 13 saying, hey, look, you need to make sure that 14 there's no ties to streets, you know, when you 15 have promote -- when you have, you know, their 16 talent or whomever performing, you know, coming 17 into the establishment, cause a lot of times, you 18 know, they don't know so they just say, okay, 19 yeah, book them. And, you know, that ends up 20 becoming a situation because you have individuals 21 from different neighborhoods coming to the 2.2 establishment, and you could end up having 23 potential violent situations that happen at your establishment. That's one of the things. 24 25 Outside of that, anytime that I've --

1 you know, I've worked at this establishment, the 2 only thing I would say is, you know, there shouldn't be no favoritism played to as far as 3 who comes in. You know, everybody should be 4 5 checked. Everybody should be -- you know, if you see that somebody is rowdy, you know, in line, 6 7 they should automatically be told no, you know, because that person could potentially turn into a 8 9 bigger situation once they get into the establishment and start getting alcoholic 10 11 beverages in there. You know, it's -- so these 12 are different things that I have noticed and, you 13 know, that that's -- you know, and I've gotten these from -- sometimes like I'll find it from my 14 15 own research, and other times I'll hear it from, 16 you know, above. So we're talking about it comes to our commander form our intel unit that comes 17 18 from downtown. 19 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Thank you,

Officer Hernandez. Any questions of Officer
Hernandez by any Board members? Go ahead, Mr.
Short.

23MEMBER SHORT: Thank you. Good24morning, Officer Hernandez.

MR. HERNANDEZ: Good morning, sir.

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1	MEMBER SHORT: How many years have you
2	served with the Metropolitan Police Department?
3	MR. HERNANDEZ: I've been with the
4	Metropolitan Police Department for approximately
5	12 years.
6	MEMBER SHORT: How many years have you
7	served there in the Fifth District where this
8	licensee's business is?
9	MR. HERNANDEZ: Eleven years.
10	MEMBER SHORT: So you know the area
11	quite well, I would imagine?
12	MR. HERNANDEZ: Yes. And I've
13	also, I've been the Reimbursable District
14	Officer. Basically, I'm in charge of the
15	handling the scheduling and anything having to do
16	with the establishments that operate out of the
17	Fifth District.
18	MEMBER SHORT: So the RDO which you
19	were just referencing, reimbursable detail, do
20	they have one or have they ever had one at this
21	licensee's location?
22	MR. HERNANDEZ: Yes. They've had it
23	in the past. They always request it every month,
24	so they're doing their part in terms of asking
25	for officers to work at the location and things
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and making sure that they are doing their due diligence to make sure that we're around. I'm in constant communication with Rico (phonetic), who's one of the general managers, and also Ms. Mimi. We always talk about whether we -- you know, they're able to get RDO services and things of that nature.

8 Unfortunately, because -- and I've 9 told Mimi a few -- you know, a lot of times that because we're so short-staffed and the Department 10 11 is basically running nonstop overtime, that clubs 12 are not being prioritized by a lot of the 13 officers. So at this point, there's not a lot of 14 clubs that are getting officers to work the RDO 15 program.

16 MEMBER SHORT: Okay. Now in previous hearings, we've had -- or fact findings we've had 17 18 with this licensee, the ANCs and the community have been complaining about loitering in front of 19 20 this location. Do you think no loitering signs 21 would help out? And also, if part of their 2.2 security plan that they make sure that the front 23 is clear within a reasonable time after they 24 close, would that help?

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MR. HERNANDEZ: I believe it would.

1 I believe it definitely would. I'm not sure if 2 they don't already have no loitering signs. I'm not 100 percent sure but yeah, one of the biggest 3 things is, you know, once you let people out -- I 4 5 mean most folks do end up just leaving. I think that night was a special circumstance, because 6 7 they had the approval of the city to operate a 8 later time because of the World Cup. So -- but 9 even with that being said, you know, as far as the security just coming out and kind of telling 10 11 everybody, hey, you know, go home, get in your cars and get off the block, I think that would 12 13 greatly, you know, help when it comes to any type 14 of situation escalating to the point of violence 15 that happened on -- over the summer.

MEMBER SHORT: So again, would you just repeat for us what actually happened the night of this incident while we're having this fact finding?

20 MR. HERNANDEZ: So that night we 21 received a call and we also got the sounds of 22 gunshots where gunfire erupted in front of the 23 location towards the establishment where three 24 people were shot. There was also different 25 casings that were located for -- by different

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guns, so there was basically a shootout that essentially occurred while you had a few hundred people running out of this establishment and inside the establishment and everywhere, complete chaos that day.

6 MEMBER SHORT: So I guess we were 7 fortunate that no one on Bladensburg Road, which 8 is a major roadway, got a stray bullet or two 9 themselves; are we fortunate about that?

MR. HERNANDEZ: Absolutely, because during that time, we still had traffic coming and going from that area, even some of the club goers were leaving that -- the general area. So yes, it's very fortunate that no one was hit with a stray bullet.

16 MEMBER SHORT: Well, hopefully, before 17 the day is over, maybe the licensee, the owner, 18 or her attorney can explain to this Board how 19 they're going to be handling loitering, because 20 the basic problem was, it seems to me with my 21 knowledge of public safety, if you have a crowd 2.2 inside and you have a crowd on the sidewalk, when 23 a shooting breaks out and the people start to get 24 out of the club, they can't get out because of 25 the people loitering in front of the club, which

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is really a hazard for the traffic and the community. And ANCs have been complaining for years about loitering at this location. And I think it's time for this Board and also for the licensee to start making some serious decisions regarding how they're going to handle the loitering and complaints from the citizens in that community.

9 Thank you very much for your testimony today and hopefully, we won't have this to happen 10 11 anymore, but a shootout is a very dangerous 12 thing. We've got too much shooting going on so 13 I, as a Board member, just think that we need to 14 do more than what we have been doing. We just 15 can't keep letting or allowing this to occur, 16 because we do have some power as the ABC, a 17 Board, in regulating some of these issues, 18 especially when it comes to loitering and it comes to violence and complaints from the 19 20 citizens and it sounds like complaints from MPD. 21 Thank you very much for your testimony 2.2 today. I appreciate it. That's all I have, Mr. 23 Chair. 24 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Thank you, Mr.

Short. Any other questions by any other Board

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members? Go ahead, Mr. Grandis.

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2	MEMBER GRANDIS: Thank you. Officer
3	Hernandez, we all want to thank you for being
4	here today. We know you have a very busy
5	schedule, and your information on behalf of MPD
6	is very important to us to be able to, you know,
7	get through this fact finding and come up with
8	recommendations, so thank you for that.
9	You mentioned that this incident
10	occurred on a night when that establishment had
11	received permission to be open later because of
12	the World Cup?
13	MR. HERNANDEZ: Yes, sir.
14	(Simultaneously speaking.)
15	MR. HERNANDEZ: Yes, sir.
16	MEMBER GRANDIS: Go ahead.
17	MR. HERNANDEZ: I'm sorry. Yes. They
18	did receive a special permit to be able to
19	operate for longer hours. I believe the permit
20	was for 24 hours or serving later and then
21	stopping at a certain time but still maintaining
22	to be open.
23	MEMBER GRANDIS: Do you know if within
24	that block or that vicinity there were other AB -
25	- after license establishments such as nightclubs

1 or taverns that are nearby that establishment? 2 MR. HERNANDEZ: The closest one would be about a quarter of a mile, Republic on 24th 3 Place and Bladensburg. Other than that, there is 4 5 no other establishment that's ABCA mandated, you 6 know, to be open -- that's open in that area. 7 MEMBER GRANDIS: And you say that you 8 viewed videos at -- observed that the videos were 9 able to take -- operating when this incident occurred, correct? 10 11 MR. HERNANDEZ: Yes. 12 MEMBER GRANDIS: And does that --13 would that video show that the unfortunate 14 individuals who were hit by gunfire had either 15 re-entered or exited that particular facility? 16 MR. HERNANDEZ: Yes. So at the time, 17 it was -- I want to say it was way passed their 18 usual hours so yes, and there was -- there's 19 nothing in that area besides a Metro bus station. 20 But it's like, you know, one of the work stations 21 where they keep their buses and things of that 2.2 nature right across the street from them. Other 23 than that, there's nothing else operating on the 24 block. 25 MEMBER GRANDIS: Thank you. Once

again, would the video show or did you have witnesses tell MPD that the gunfire that was returned -- if I heard you correctly, it became sort of like a gun battle between various people. Were any of the people with guns observed either entering or coming out of that establishment?

7 MR. HERNANDEZ: So that's one of the 8 things that was undetermined, whether it was --9 they were inside or not. Usually, they're really good about, you know, checking people and things 10 11 of that nature to make sure that nothing goes 12 inside, no weapons go inside. I can't speak 100 13 percent sure saying that the weapons made it 14 inside or they didn't. I really don't know. Ι 15 know that the -- there was a few different calibers that were found at that location and in 16 different locations, so that was one of the 17 18 things that we were made to understand that 19 something happened that -- where two different people had -- at least two different people had 20 21 different guns and that, yeah, they were cross-2.2 firing.

23 MEMBER GRANDIS: And I think my final 24 question is that there were three individuals who 25 were struck who were outside of the

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1 establishment; is that correct --2 MR. HERNANDEZ: Yes. 3 MEMBER GRANDIS: Does MPD have any information that any of those three people had a 4 5 weapon on them; did they return -- any of them return fire? 6 7 MR. HERNANDEZ: We don't have that 8 information. Our detectives are still doing 9 their investigation, so because it's still ongoing, I really don't have that much 10 11 information about it. 12 MEMBER GRANDIS: So there were no guns 13 confiscated that evening -- that morning? 14 MR. HERNANDEZ: No, sir. MEMBER GRANDIS: 15 Okay. Thank you. 16 Mr. Chairman, that's all. Thank you. 17 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Thank you, Mr. 18 Grandis. Any other questions by any other Board 19 members? I'm going to give you an opportunity to 20 ask questions, Mr. Kline, if you want, but I'm 21 going to have the Investigator go ahead, and then 2.2 you can ask questions of both the Investigator 23 and the officer. 24 Mr. Garcia. Good morning, Mr. Garcia. 25 Mr. Garcia, how did you become aware of this

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1 incident, sir? 2 MR. GARCIA: We were notified by MPD 3 that a shooting occurred at Power Nightclub on July 22nd. 4 5 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: And once you were notified by MPD, what did ABCA do and 6 7 specifically, what did you do? 8 MR. GARCIA: So we -- well, MPD initiated a DPM number, which is a 251 9 investigation, and our office received it and 10 11 assigned it, and it was assigned to me. After it was assigned to me, I did contact the licensee to 12 13 speak about the incident that occurred and took 14 place at the establishment along with officers, 15 along with the victims that were involved in the 16 incident, along with security staff as well. CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: So did you go 17 18 to the scene that night? 19 MR. GARCIA: On the night in question, no, because we received a 251 notification after 20 21 it occurred, and ABCA, our investigators, and at 2.2 4:00 a.m. -- we received the notification at 23 4:25. 24 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right. So 25 when is it that you went to do your investigation

at the establishment?

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MR. GARCIA: So the investigation was assigned to me on Monday, July 24th, and I began my investigation on July 25th.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: And so what is it that you were able to ascertain?

7 MR. GARCIA: So the first thing I did 8 was I visited the establishment to obtain video 9 footage of the night and the incident that occurred. I believe it was Friday, July 28th 10 11 that I visited the establishment to obtain camera 12 footage, which the establishment provided, but it 13 was something with the cameras that it overrided 14 (sic) everything prior. So everything that I 15 received on that particular day was the same 16 video footage, because when it was loaded onto the USB, it was loaded and it was overriding the 17 18 previous video that was recorded. So I did have to revisit the establishment to obtain additional 19 20 footage, which I happily did and the 21 establishment was cooperative in providing.

And while my visit in obtaining the footage, I also did -- was able to speak to eight of the security staff that were at the establishment on the night of the incident.

1 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: As a result of 2 your investigation, what is it that you were able 3 to gather?

MR. GARCIA: So one thing that I was 4 able to determine that -- I do have the video 5 footage, but from a different angle of the video 6 7 footage, you can see at one point in time shortly 8 before the incident that -- you see maybe about 9 roughly, I'm going to say, four to six, four to 10 seven male patrons leaving out of the 11 establishment, one from the front entrance and 12 maybe five to six from the back -- from the rear They're both -- the ones in the back are 13 exit. 14 running into a vehicle across the street from the 15 establishment and entering a vehicle where 16 shortly after they do drive off, and that's when 17 the incident takes place. So I'm not sure if an 18 incident -- I can't really confirm whether there -- an incident or an altercation took place on 19 20 the inside of the establishment, but I can -- I have determined from the video footage that the 21 2.2 patrons did not enter the establishment with the 23 I was able to determine that. weapons. 24 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right. But

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let me ask you a question though. Did you

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1 request -- you stated that you saw individuals 2 exiting the establishment and enter a car. Did 3 you ask the video for maybe -- for that time 4 period of the -- of those individuals inside the 5 establishment? I'm sorry. Say that 6 MR. GARCIA: 7 again? 8 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: No. I'm trying 9 to find -- your -- you stated that you were unable to ascertain whether or not the incident 10 11 was -- that there was anything that occurred at 12 the establishment prior to the incident. Once 13 you saw folks exiting -- you said you saw four 14 people exiting the back and enter the car. 15 MR. GARCIA: Correct. 16 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Correct. So 17 I'm saying did you request video for the -- maybe 18 for the minute prior to their departure from the 19 establishment? And if you did request video, 20 what is that -- did you see? 21 MR. GARCIA: So I mean after they left 2.2 the --23 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: No. Prior to 24 25 MR. GARCIA: -- establishment?

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: -- No. 1 Prior 2 to them leaving. You stated that you saw --3 MR. KLINE: Yes. I did request it. CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: 4 And --5 MR. GARCIA: Yes. I did request it and I did see it, but there was no interact --6 7 there was no altercation that you can visibly I'm not sure if -- so from my conversations 8 see. 9 with suspects that I interviewed and suspects along with the staff and everyone, a visual 10 11 altercation did not take place. A lot of people 12 were wording it such as "words were exchanged" 13 but no altercation took place. 14 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Now based on 15 your view of the footage, the video footage, do 16 you have a view on the cameras that are being utilized by this establishment for the interior? 17 18 Does that provide you with -- are there any blind 19 spots from what you can tell? 20 No, because if you look MR. GARCIA: 21 at all the angles of their security cameras, one 2.2 angle might be specified in one direction, but 23 they do have another camera at a wider angle that covers both of those camera views. So if one 24 25 camera view -- cause originally, the footage that

1 I was provided first didn't provide me enough 2 views of the actual scene on the outside of the establishment. But after obtaining additional 3 footage, I was able to see a wider spectrum of 4 5 the outside of the establishment. CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: 6 But just 7 generally, you -- did you have an opportunity to 8 interview the victims? 9 MR. GARCIA: I did contact on multiple occasions all three victims, but I was only able 10 11 to speak to one. 12 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: And so what 13 were you able to find out based on your conversation with that one victim? 14 MR. GARCIA: So the victim did advise 15 16 me that the establishment was closing, and it was 17 a let out happening so everyone was just exiting 18 the establishment. The victim also stated that 19 he was unaware of where the shooting was coming 20 from. He didn't see who was shooting. He iust 21 felt it, heard it, and as soon as he felt it, he 2.2 took cover on himself. He said prior to that, 23 while on the inside of the establishment, he didn't have any altercations. He didn't witness 24 25 any altercations. He said inside it was just a

1 regular day -- regular night, in the evening. He 2 said while he was outside, he also didn't witness 3 any altercations either but overall, he said he didn't hear any commotions while outside. All he 4 5 heard was gunshots being fired, and that's all he heard. 6 7 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: What were --8 what are the Board-approved hours for this establishment? 9 MR. GARCIA: The establishment is able 10 11 to operate Sunday to Thursday, 2:00 p.m. to 2:00 12 a.m. and then Friday to Saturday, 2:00 p.m. to 13 3:00 a.m. 14 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: So for --15 during the time of this incident, what were --16 what was the approved hours of operation for this 17 day? 18 MR. GARCIA: So the establishment did 19 have extended hours that day. If I'm not 20 mistaken, the establishment was able to operate 21 'til 5:00 a.m. 2.2 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Do you know 23 whether or not the establishment has a security 2.4 plan? The establishment does 25 MR. GARCIA:

1	have a security plan.
2	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Do you know
3	whether or not the establishment complied with
4	the security plan?
5	MR. GARCIA: Well, the only thing that
6	I found in the security plan that the
7	establishment was in violation of, that only
8	because I interviewed the staff, the staff seemed
9	to have different stories. But most of the staff
10	stated that they did not receive training.
11	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Let me ask you
12	a question. Are you aware if this establishment
13	has been inspected by ABCA investigators
14	recently?
15	MR. GARCIA: I am not. As far as any
16	particular investigation or?
17	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Generally,
18	whether or not regulatory inspections and
19	generally if you're aware.
20	MR. GARCIA: Well, if we're speaking
21	as to their history, typically, whenever there's
22	a history, we have had our investigators go out
23	and conduct regulatory inspections at most
24	locations. But from the history, their last
25	history was in September 7th of 2020, so I'm not

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1 sure when the last date an investigator conducted 2 a regulatory inspection. CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Thank you. 3 A]] right. And I guess Garcia, did -- you stated 4 5 that there was some confusion regarding training regarding the security plan. So did you conclude 6 7 that any -- on whether or not any ABCA violations 8 occurred during that night? 9 MR. GARCIA: No. Thank you. 10 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Any 11 questions by any Board members? Go ahead, Mr. 12 Short. 13 MEMBER SHORT: Thank you, Mr. Chair. Investigator Garcia, how many years have you been 14 with ABCA? 15 16 MR. GARCIA: Four, sir. 17 MEMBER SHORT: Four years? 18 MR. GARCIA: Yes. 19 MEMBER SHORT: And you stated that you derived that there was a violation to the 20 21 security plan because of the lack of training; is 2.2 that correct? 23 MR. GARCIA: That's correct. 24 MEMBER SHORT: Did you write any 25 violation notices?

1 MR. GARCIA: No. T did not. 2 MEMBER SHORT: Can I ask you why not? 3 MR. GARCIA: Because I put it in the case report. That's what the -- that's where my 4 5 investigative report is in. MEMBER SHORT: But doesn't violations 6 require you to take action and some -- either a 7 8 written notice or some type of notification other 9 than putting it in a report? 10 MR. GARCIA: That actually depends on 11 the violation. So for example, if an establishment violated -- was violated for a no 12 13 ABC manager violation, that would have required me to issue them a citation on site. 14 If the establishment violated -- was violated for a 15 16 substantial change, that would require me to 17 write a case. That does not require me to issue 18 notice of violation. I would just notify the establishment of the violations, and it would be 19 20 typed up in an investigative report. MEMBER SHORT: 21 Okay. Well, I quess I 2.2 want to ask why did you then testify today that 23 there was a violation of their procedures for 24 training? How did you come to that rationalization? 25

1 MR. GARCIA: After I concluded my --2 after my investigative report, I was actually looking into ABRA records to find the 3 establishment's ABCA license, certificate of 4 5 occupancy to see whether they had a settlement agreement along with a security plan. And after 6 7 thoroughly looking through the security plan and 8 coinciding with the interviews, I determined that 9 the establishment wasn't providing adequate 10 security training to the employees. 11 MEMBER SHORT: Okay. Well, that 12 sounds correctly because normally, when we have 13 incidents of violence, we as a Board put in the -14 - make sure that legal puts in the -- something 15 into their security plan that they get 16 appropriate training and that they keep that training on hand. So they did not have that that 17 18 night, correct? 19 MR. GARCIA: I'm sorry. They didn't 20 have what? 21 MEMBER SHORT: Any proof of the 2.2 training that you say they didn't get? MR. GARCIA: 23 The night of the 24 incident? 25 MEMBER SHORT: Yes. The night of the incident.

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2 MR. GARCIA: Okay. I'm not 3 understanding.

MEMBER SHORT: Did the training -- did the lack of training have anything to do with the incident that you were sent there to investigate?

7 MR. GARCIA: I can't determine that 8 because multiple staff said that they received 9 training, but on the other note, other staff said 10 that they didn't receive training. So it's -- it 11 doesn't look like all of the employees are 12 receiving the same amount of training that 13 they're stating they're receiving.

14 MEMBER SHORT: Okay. So thank you for 15 that and duly noted. I'll make sure that the Board does take that under advisement when we are 16 talking about this. But is it possible that you 17 18 could show us -- you have the video tape? 19 MR. GARCIA: I do. 20 MEMBER SHORT: Does it show the 21 shooting? So it's three different 2.2 MR. GARCIA: 23 It doesn't exactly show the shooting, angles. but I was able to pinpoint different times of 2.4

when the shooting started, when the victims -- I

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1	mean I'm sorry when the suspects left the
2	establishment and how some patrons were
3	preventing the incident from taking place.
4	MEMBER SHORT: Okay. Mr. Chairman,
5	can he share that information? Can the
6	Investigator Garcia share that with us? I'd like
7	to see it.
8	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Mr. Garcia, do
9	you have those videos available, sir?
10	MR. GARCIA: I do.
11	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right. Mr.
12	Orellana, can you please give Mr. Garcia the
13	opportunity to share his screen?
14	MR. GARCIA: Can you guys see my
15	screen?
16	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Yes, sir. And
17	Mr. Garcia, can you please describe what it is
18	that we're looking at once you play the video,
19	sir?
20	MR. GARCIA: Give me one minute.
21	Okay. I'm just going to start off with this one.
22	So this is the footage. I'm actually going to
23	forward it to 2835. All right. So I'm going to
24	actually start it here. It seems to be the let
25	out of the establishment. Can you see my mouse
I	1

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moving as well?

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2	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Yes, sir.
3	MR. GARCIA: Okay. So from this
4	entrance, you're going to see a gentleman in a
5	white tank top exit the establishment holding a
6	sweater along without a cap running across the
7	street in about in a few seconds, right now.
8	So the gentleman seems to be with a white tank
9	top running across the street. He dropped the
10	cap on the floor and then he runs in the
11	direction of a vehicle. So I'm just going to
12	play this to its entirety so you can see it, put
13	it all together when I show the other footage.
14	You're also going to see that gentleman in the
15	white tank top come back up to here with two
16	females after a black SUV drives off.
17	So as of this moment, no gunshots have
18	been fired, nothing has happened on this
19	particular view of the footage. I'm going to
20	pause it here just so you can see that that was
21	the SUV that was driving off. As you see, that
22	SUV drove off and these patrons were with those
23	individuals that drove off.
24	At this point is when the fire started
25	off, and everyone begins dispersing from the

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1 qunfire. On a different footage, I was able to 2 observe that one of the patrons, this one here seems to be firing back, but I can't confirm nor 3 deny that. But that individual was seen putting 4 5 something -- putting an item back into his waistband as he runs off, this one here. 6 That's 7 one camera view. So for this one, this is pretty 8 much the entirety of this particular footage. 9 At this point, you're just going to 10 see everyone running and trying to get away in a 11 different but any questions from that? 12 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: I don't have 13 any questions. 14 MEMBER SHORT: No more questions from 15 MR. GARCIA: 16 Okay. So this footage is 17 the wider -- as I was describing before, this 18 footage actually from the opposite angle of the establishment. It covers the entire side that we 19 20 actually are looking for. So as you can see my 21 mouse, this vehicle is the vehicle in question 2.2 that conducted the drive-by, that conducted -well, that the gentleman got into. So this is 23 24 the vehicle that special education off in the 25 previous camera footage. But we are going to

forward this to -- so 42740.

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2 You see the gentleman here -- I'll pause it just for a quick minute -- the gentleman 3 here doing the same thing in the previous 4 5 footage, running over. But I want you to pay attention to the rear exit. 6 I want you to put 7 your focus on the rear entrance. As you can see, 8 a whole bunch of individuals run from the rear 9 exit. From my understanding, I counted six. No. 10 I'm sorry. Hold on. No. They're in the car. 11 In about 10 seconds. All right. There we go. 12 There we go. We have one, two, three, four, 13 five, six patrons running out of the rear exit to 14 get into that black SUV, and all of them get in 15 except for the gentleman in the white tank top that ran out of the front exit. You can also see 16 three females running behind the vehicle as well, 17 18 but they sit there for maybe a few seconds. As 19 you can see, the vehicle drives off.

Gunshots go off. If you look at my mouse again, the gentleman here in the baby blue T-shirt comes over to this sidewalk tucking an item back into his waistband. I'm not sure if he was one of the -- I'm not sure what the item was, but -- and that -- I'll say one thing. Yes.

1 That's pretty much the entirety of the video. 2 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right. 3 Thank you, sir. Do you have any questions, Mr. Short or any other -- Mr. Short first and any 4 5 other Board members. 6 MEMBER SHORT: No. That pretty much 7 -- basically, I'm going to just hope that we get 8 a little more training, professional training for 9 the staff. But thank you, Mr. Chair. That's all I have at this time. 10 11 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Any questions 12 by any other Board members? Mr. Kline, any 13 questions? I'm sorry. Mr. Kline, I can't see 14 you but I see you raised your hand. So I was 15 about to ask you, Mr. Kline, do you have any 16 questions for the Board member or any -- I'm sorry -- for any -- for the investigator or for 17 18 the police officer? 19 MR. KLINE: Do I -- I apologize. Ι 20 had to switch devices which is why I was --21 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: I see you are 2.2 now on the beach, Mr. --23 MR. KLINE: I'm on the beach. 24 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Right. 25 MR. KLINE: I have to switch devices,

1	so I had to go somewhere warmer and sunnier.
2	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Okay.
3	MR. KLINE: Good afternoon,
4	Investigator Garcia. So there was an exchange
5	with Board Member Short about potential
6	violations. As I understand your testimony, you
7	don't make decisions on violations unless it's
8	something very obvious, like a lack of manager.
9	You just write up the facts, write the report,
10	and then the Board makes the decisions on
11	violations; is that basically what your testimony
12	was?
13	MR. GARCIA: Correct, depending on the
14	violation.
15	MR. KLINE: Right. If it's something
16	that's very straightforward, no manager on the
17	premises, then you can obviously write a citation
18	or something like that
19	MR. GARCIA: Correct.
20	MR. KLINE: applies, it's up to you
21	to just present the facts to the Board, and then
22	the Board makes the decision, correct?
23	MR. GARCIA: Correct. The only way I
24	would have actually put a violation is
25	substantiated if I could actually determine for a

1 fact that that establishment wasn't providing 2 adequate training to their staff. 3 MR. KLINE: Okay. But ultimately, those facts are adjudicated by the Board, right? 4 5 MR. GARCIA: The facts are adjudicated by the Board? 6 7 MR. KLINE: Right. 8 MR. GARCIA: No. _ _ 9 MR. KLINE: The Board makes --10 MR. GARCIA: -- was --11 MR. KLINE: -- the Board makes 12 findings and there's evidence and decides what 13 the facts are and then makes the conclusion, 14 right? 15 MR. GARCIA: Correct -- correct. 16 MR. KLINE: All right. Thank you. We 17 appreciate that approach and that's why I comment 18 on it, because we don't always see it. Some 19 investigators think it might be their job to find 20 violations, and we appreciate that you view your 21 job to investigate those facts. Was -- did you 2.2 find the establishment cooperative throughout 23 your investigation? Yes. The establishment 2.4 MR. GARCIA: 25 was cooperative throughout my investigation.

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1	MR. KLINE: All right. Now is there
2	anything about what happened here that would have
3	been affected by the alleged lack of training
4	that seems to be in question?
5	MR. GARCIA: I'm sorry. What's the
6	MR. KLINE: Would a lack of if
7	there were more training, is there anything about
8	this that would have changed given the incident
9	that occurred?
10	MR. GARCIA: Well, I'm not sure. The
11	I'm not I can't make that determination.
12	MR. KLINE: Okay. Well, what is it in
13	your mind, based upon what your investigation,
14	you think the establishment could have done
15	different or better?
16	MR. GARCIA: In my opinion, I am going
17	to agree with Officer Hernandez when he did state
18	the establishment could better control and
19	promote patrons leaving the establishment.
20	MR. KLINE: Well, the video that we
21	saw, people were leaving the establishment pretty
22	orderly and moving on, weren't they?
23	MR. GARCIA: Yes. But people were
24	actually just staying there.
25	MR. KLINE: Okay.

1 If you actually look at MR. GARCIA: 2 the footage, people were just staying on the outside of the establishment and just talking to 3 each other, which is something that happens 4 5 pretty often at establishments. Sure. And one of the 6 MR. KLINE: 7 reasons that they stay there is they arrange for 8 transportation like Uber and Lyft and picked up 9 by other individuals in front of the establishment, correct? 10 11 MR. GARCIA: Correct. 12 MR. KLINE: All right. So I mean at 13 any establishment, there's a certain winding down period, isn't there? 14 15 MR. GARCIA: You can say that. 16 MR. KLINE: And the best that can be 17 done by the establishment is to have a security 18 presence out there, encourage people to move 19 along, look out for problems, and notify authorities if appropriate, is that --20 21 MR. GARCIA: Correct. 2.2 MR. KLINE: -- fair? Okav. Is there 23 anything more that they can do? 24 MR. GARCIA: Well, I'm going to say 25 after interviewing some of their staff, some of

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their staff could have been trained better. 1 2 MR. KLINE: And how would that --3 again, I'm going to ask assuming that's true, how 4 -- what would have changed? How would have that affected the situation? What different training 5 would have provoked a different response from the 6 7 establishment? 8 MR. GARCIA: Depending on the 9 training, being observant, being able to minimize 10 situations, being able to prevent situations. 11 MR. KLINE: We're talking about this 12 situation. 13 MR. GARCIA: And that's what I'm 14 talking about as well. 15 MR. KLINE: Now you interviewed, you 16 said -- you tried to interview three of the victims. You spoke to one. You spoke to several 17 18 witnesses I believe. Is that correct? 19 MR. GARCIA: Correct. 20 MR. KLINE: Did any --21 MR. GARCIA: Just one witness. 2.2 MR. KLINE: I beg your pardon? 23 MR. GARCIA: Just one. 2.4 MR. KLINE: Just one witness, okay. 25 Did either of them mention this cross-fire from

1 in front of the establishment? 2 MR. GARCIA: No. They did not. So the only evidence that 3 MR. GARCIA: we have at this point of the cross-fire is the 4 5 video where you think somebody's tucking something into their pants that could have been a 6 7 gun, could have been a cell phone, could have 8 been any number of things, and Officer 9 Hernandez's testimony about the different caliber bullets, correct? 10 11 MR. GARCIA: Correct. 12 MR. KLINE: All right. And you said 13 the video coverage in the establishment is good, 14 correct? 15 MR. GARCIA: Excuse me? 16 MR. KLINE: You -- the video coverage 17 in the establishment, security --18 MR. GARCIA: Yes. It's adequate, yes. 19 MR. KLINE: It covers all the areas, 20 correct? 21 MR. GARCIA: Correct. 2.2 MR. KLINE: All right. Turning to 23 Officer Hernandez --24 OFFICER HERNANDEZ: Yes, sir. 25 MR. KLINE: Good morning.

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1	OFFICER HERNANDEZ: Good morning.	
2	MR. KLINE: Officer Hernandez, and	
3	maybe you said this before, what's so what's	
4	your role, at MPD, with respect to nightlife	
5	establishments?	
6	OFFICER HERNANDEZ: So I coordinate	
7	with the night's nightlife establishments, the	
8	RDO Program. I'm the one that schedules them,	
9	the officers, to work at different locate	
10	different bars and clubs at in the Fifth	
11	District.	
12	I also assist with, you know, the ABC	
13	hearings and anything that have to do with	
14	nightlife in the in in in our district.	
15	MR. KLINE: And we appreciate you	
16	doing that and we appreciate your service to the	
17	District, as a Police Officer, but specifically	
18	in this area of nightlife, it's it's very much	
19	appreciated. Now, you've had occasion to work	
20	with this establishment quite closely, correct?	
21	OFFICER HERNANDEZ: Yes.	
22	MR. KLINE: And and they've always	
23	they're always cooperative, aren't they?	
24	OFFICER HERNANDEZ: Absolutely.	
25	They're very cooperative. Mimi is goes above	

and beyond, to try to give us as much
information, or whatever that is needed, to help
with our investigations. She is very forthcoming
with everything.
MR. KLINE: And Mimi has begged for
RDO Officers, hasn't she?
OFFICER HERNANDEZ: Correct. But,
just like I've explained earlier, and even Ms.
Brenda Smith, who is the District-wide RDO
Coordinator, has stated is that, because of the
shortage of officers and this is a voluntary
assignment that no one can be forced to work in
that area.
But, what we have done with the Fifth
District is, we've tried, whenever they're not
completely swamped with calls, to give it special
attention in that general area, because of the
incidents that have happened in the past and in,
you know, particularly, this incident, also.
I'd also like to answer one your
questions, regarding the the what the
training aspect of things. So one of the things
is that, like Investigator Garcia pointed out, is
that you had individuals that were coming
running from the back of the establishment.

1 So one of the things that can be done 2 is that, their security staff should be able to be walking through the parking lot, to make sure 3 that there's no one hanging out and being in that 4 5 -- in those areas, where they're not supposed to 6 be. 7 If you're a club patron and you're attending the establishment, to go party inside, 8 9 why are you loitering in the parking lot, behind where there is non-sufficient lighting, and 10 11 you're basically just hanging out in the back. 12 What is the reason for allowing these 13 individuals to just be back there? If they're 14 not entering the establishment, they should be 15 kicked off the premises and not allowed in, or 16 made to move on. 17 MR. KLINE: And, to your knowledge, is 18 the parking lot under control of the establishment? 19 20 To my knowledge? OFFICER HERNANDEZ: 21 You know, I've seen where people just hang out in 2.2 the parking lot, in the past. Nothing's been 23 said, you know. They can -- they -- they -- they 24 pay to park and they, sometimes, enter the 25 establishment immediately, other times, you know,

1 they're out there for a, you know, for a good 2 while, and then --Right, but my question --3 MR. KLINE: OFFICER HERNANDEZ: -- once --4 5 MR. KLINE: -- to you is, do you know, 6 whether the establishment controls that parking 7 lot? (Simultaneous speaking.) 8 9 OFFICER HERNANDEZ: They control it, in terms of, who parks in the -- in that -- it's 10 11 -- in that parking lot, yes. 12 MR. KLINE: Okay. 13 OFFICER HERNANDEZ: Do they have 14 patrol -- like, somebody walking by there and 15 making sure that there's nobody hanging out, no. I haven't seen it. 16 17 MR. KLINE: Do you think that there 18 might be a benefit to add additional lighting to 19 -- to the parking lot? 20 OFFICER HERNANDEZ: Absolutely, I 21 believe so. Yes. 2.2 (Simultaneous speaking.) 23 MR. KLINE: All right. That might be something that -- that we look at, because we are 24 25 here to explore potential solutions, today. Now,

1 coming back to the RDO Program, so if -- if I 2 have this right, the officers get to select where they work? 3 OFFICER HERNANDEZ: Yes. 4 So every 5 month, I put out an Email, with links, and each establishment has their own link. And, because 6 7 it's voluntary, they have the option of signing up for multiple establishments. 8 And I advise them this, just in case 9 the establishment that they signed up for gets 10 11 filled on the day that they are requesting to 12 work, so I may move them to a different 13 establishment. 14 But, because I know that they've 15 clicked on different establishment, and those dates aren't available, or are available that is 16 how I determine who and where they work. 17 18 MR. KLINE: Okay, but you only assign 19 them to those places that they've put on their 20 list, is that correct? 21 OFFICER HERNANDEZ: Correct. 2.2 MR. KLINE: So in effect -- and I just 23 think it's important that we highlight this, 24 because it seems to be a problem, with me. 25 In effect, the Department is not

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1 determining where these extra officers, for 2 places that are willing to pay -- pay for RDO, are assigned, they're self-selecting and deciding 3 where they're willing to work? 4 5 OFFICER HERNANDEZ: Correct. You know, essentially, yes. I mean, just like any 6 7 other overtime that the Department puts out, you know, you can't -- the only thing that is 8 9 voluntold, if -- if you will, is --MR. KLINE: What is voluntold? 10 11 OFFICER HERNANDEZ: -- is the -- the 12 backfill, right, where we're short in the -- in 13 the section, where you need to handle runs for 14 the -- for the City, which is our main priority 15 for the -- for patrol. 16 That's the only time that you're going 17 to be made to work extra hours, or made to go 18 work at a PSA. But, any other overtime, it's all 19 voluntary. You can sign up for as much as you 20 want, or as little as you want, under the cap of 21 56 hours a week. 2.2 (Simultaneous speaking.) 23 MR. KLINE: Understood. But, 24 apparently, you also can decide where it is that 25 you're willing to work, correct?

1	OFFICER HERNANDEZ: Correct. And
2	that's that's department-wide. You can decide
3	whether you want to work in any ABC
4	establishment, whether you want to work a POTUS,
5	whether you want to work a a baseball game, a
б	soccer game, a you know, whatever, you can
7	pick and choose what you would like to work. It
8	is no different with the RDO Program.
9	MR. KLINE: And, how long have you
10	been with involved with RDO?
11	OFFICER HERNANDEZ: Six years, now.
12	MR. KLINE: Okay. And, the shortage
13	of officers that we're all aware of, has
14	definitely constrained the program, hasn't it?
15	OFFICER HERNANDEZ: Absolutely it has,
16	and because of that, you have a multitude of
17	overtime all over district-wide. So you have
18	a situation where, instead of working four hours
19	at at a at a club or an establishment, an
20	ABC establishment, you can go work six to eight,
21	possibly, even ten hours, you know, in this side
22	in in the District, or something or
23	doing something else.
24	MR. KLINE: So back when we had,
25	maybe, a 1,000 more officers, or whatever the
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1 figure was, the self-selection of where people 2 want to work, worked pretty well, but maybe does 3 OFFICER HERNANDEZ: 4 Yes. 5 MR. KLINE: -- maybe doesn't work, as well, now? 6 7 (Simultaneous speaking.) 8 OFFICER HERNANDEZ: Well, I can't 9 force -- and the Department is not going to force 10 anyone to work at any single establishment. But, 11 I will tell you this, most officers try to shy 12 away from Gogo's. They will --Gogo's? 13 MR. KLINE: 14 OFFICER HERNANDEZ: -- shy away from it. 15 They just don't want to deal with it, 16 because again, they deal with violent situations 99 percent of the time, patrolling the District 17 18 and, when it comes to working certain 19 establishments, they're not -- they're not 20 willing to work it. 21 (Simultaneous speaking.) 2.2 MR. KLINE: All right. Well, let me 23 ask you, similar to what I asked Investigator 24 Garcia -- I mean, you've mentioned the 25 establishment, perhaps, could do a better job of

getting people to move along, I believe? 1 2 OFFICER HERNANDEZ: Yes. 3 MR. KLINE: Okay. And, how would you recommend that they do that? 4 5 OFFICER HERNANDEZ: So you have your 6 individuals inside that'll come in, especially, 7 during let-out, right, your closing hours, and they start pushing everybody outside, right? 8 9 Just like you can push everybody outside of the establishment, because you got to 10 11 get them out, within ten to 15 minutes, you know, 12 so that the cleanup crew can go. 13 But, essentially, also you don't want 14 to get caught with, you know, still having 15 patrons inside of your establishment after yours 16 hours of operation are done. You can, essentially, keep that 17 18 momentum going outside and have them leave your 19 establishment. Because, at the end of the day, 20 you -- you know, anything within a 1,000 feet of 21 the club, or the establishment, still falls under 2.2 the establishment. 23 So the quicker you move folks along and not to loiter in front of the location, or in 24 25 the parking lot of the location, or even, you

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1 know, next to the location, it still falls under 2 -- under their security to push all these people 3 to get into their cars and leave. 4 MR. KLINE: No, I get all that, but 5 how would you suggest, given what we've discussed that we don't have a no loitering law, because 6 7 there are questions about the constitutionality 8 of such a law, what would you -- how would you 9 recommend that they do that, that they get people 10 to move along? 11 OFFICER HERNANDEZ: So one of the 12 things is, is it's just advising them, you know, 13 club's over, have a good night, please go home. 14 You know, you don't have to be forceful about it, 15 just remind folks that, you know, it's time for 16 them to -- to go home. 17 MR. KLINE: Okay. 18 OFFICER HERNANDEZ: You know, or even 19 if they don't want to go home, but they, you 20 know, they can't stay on the block. 21 MR. KLINE: All right. And then, you 2.2 mentioned concerns about the back parking lot. 23 Is there anything else that you might recommend, 2.4 given this incident and/or your general 25 experience with this establishment?

1And, you've indicated it's2cooperative, so I'm I'm sure they'll do it.3So if there's anything else, we we'd love to4hear it.5OFFICER HERNANDEZ: Well, see that's6the thing. So unfortunately, it's it's the7you know, Gogo's are known for a certain you8know. And I hate to say it, because like, I'm9I I've I've been in D.C. all my life, I,10you know, so I've been a part of coming into the11clubs, as a young man, and12MR. KLINE: Sure.13OFFICER HERNANDEZ: you know, being14 it it but, one of the things that we15always, kind of, some of us, shied away from was16Gogo's, because of the violence that always17attracted, you know, due to certain18neighborhoods, you know, having conflicts with19each other and things of that nature.20But, that's something that, you know,21it's it's a it's a market, you know, the22youth are going to come out and do their thing,		
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21 it's it's a it's a market, you know, the	19	each other and things of that nature.

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1	But, one of the things with like
2	training, you know, your security staff is is,
3	kind of, being able to look at certain situations
4	and saying, for example, like, you got an
5	individual that's argumentative at the door.
6	Well, if that person is argumentative
7	at the at the door, and hasn't had any
8	alcoholic beverages, what do you think is going
9	to happen, once he gets inside and does have
10	alcoholic beverages?
11	So, you know, that's a easy you
12	know what, have a good night, you come when
13	you're you're you're in a better better
14	spirits, don't you're not coming in tonight.
15	I
16	MR. KLINE: But we didn't have
17	OFFICER HERNANDEZ: I
18	MR. KLINE: I mean, this wasn't
19	inside, in this situation, correct?
20	(Simultaneous speaking.)
21	OFFICER HERNANDEZ: No, it was not
22	inside. But, if no other place is open, during
23	this time, and the patrons that are coming out
24	see, because that's the thing okay.
25	So if you have different neighborhoods
	•

that are having conflicts with each other, come to the same establishment, you're either going to have a fight that breaks out, which didn't happen, but you have happen what could potentially lead up to, you know, shootings and things of that nature. MR. KLINE: Right, and I want to ask

7 8 you about that, because I think you said, well 9 they should ask the promoter. But, the fact of 10 the matter is, the promoter's not really going to 11 tell them, you know, what the problems are --12 OFFICER HERNANDEZ: No, of course not. 13 MR. KLINE: -- are, they? 14 (Simultaneous speaking.) 15 OFFICER HERNANDEZ: No, the promoter, 16 of course not, because the promoter -- we've had issues with -- where I've had to reach out to the 17 18 establishment, because the promoter will put on

10 establishment, because the promoter will put on 19 their flyers that MPD will be onsite. 20 (Simultaneous speaking.)

21 MR. KLINE: Right. So how do -- and 22 you say, your office knows, which I -- I believe. 23 I mean, I'm sure -- I mean, I know that MPD 24 intelligence is very good, and you tend to know 25 what's going on in the neighborhood.

How do we -- which, I think, is 1 2 probably the most important lesson, here, how do we further cooperation between MPD and the 3 establishment, so the establishment -- and then -4 5 - and then get it -- you know, you heard -- I 6 mean, they cancel. 7 They -- they cancel events that they think is going to be a problem, and if they get 8 9 word, they cancel them. So how do we further the communication, so we minimize these issues? 10 11 It seems to me that, maybe, the -- the 12 -- the biggest question, here, based on 13 everything I've heard, and the Board, of course, will draw their own conclusions. But, based on 14 15 what I've heard, it seems to me that, that's 16 pretty important, how do we do that? 17 OFFICER HERNANDEZ: Well -- I mean, 18 just like in the past, you know, I've communicated with Mimi. Mimi and I have an 19 20 open-line communication, she has my -- my phone 21 number, my cell phone number that she can reach 2.2 me, anytime, you know. 23 If you know who -- who -- so what I've 2.4 done is, like, say for example, other 25 establishments have reached out to me,

1 especially, when local artists are being booked 2 by agents to come, you know, perform at their -at their locations. 3 What they'll do is, they'll reach out 4 to me and they'll ask, hey, so and so is 5 performing at our club, what do you think? 6 And. at that point, I'll come back and I'll do my 7 search -- my research. 8 Reach out to Intel, reach out to our 9 patrol units, and things of that nature, and if 10 11 we know anything, you know, if -- how far -- how 12 involved this person is with the street life, who 13 they're involved with, who they're conflicting 14 with, things of that nature. 15 And then, I'll get back to the 16 establishment and say, hey listen, it's your call, but this and this and this is going on with 17 18 this individual, so there is a potential for 19 folks that are conflicting with them that they're 20 going to come to the establishment and, potentially, create a situation that could get 21 2.2 you in violation. 23 MR. KLINE: Okay. All right. That is 24 all I have, Mr. Chair, at this point, from the 25 witness.

1	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Thank you, Mr.
2	Kline. Thank you. Let me does anyone else
3	have any questions that they want to ask the
4	investigator?
5	MEMBER GRANDIS: Yes.
6	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: This is for the
7	Investigator, Mr. Grandis?
8	MEMBER GRANDIS: Yes.
9	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Okay. Go
10	ahead, sir.
11	MEMBER GRANDIS: Investigative Garcia,
12	thank you for our presentation.
13	OFFICER HERNANDEZ: Thank you.
14	MEMBER GRANDIS: This fact finding is
15	trying to determine what next steps, and one of
16	the things that I feel like there's a gap in my
17	understanding of this incident is that, I have
18	not heard any testimony that any of the patrons
19	were the reason for the violence of that
20	occurring.
21	So let me ask, maybe that has been
22	presented, but let me ask what what I what
23	I'm not clear about. We've seen video, a couple
24	times, of this black car and and, if I
25	understand right, there were like four people out
-	

1 of the back door that ran towards that black car, 2 across the street, is that correct? 3 OFFICER HERNANDEZ: Yes, sir. 4 MEMBER GRANDIS: Is that a yes? I'm 5 sorry. OFFICER HERNANDEZ: Yes. Yes that's 6 7 a yes. 8 MEMBER GRANDIS: And -- and then --9 and then, there were two other individuals that appeared to be leaving from the entrance that --10 11 across the street, to that black car? 12 OFFICER HERNANDEZ: That was a one, 13 not two. 14 MEMBER GRANDIS: One. One, okay. So 15 is there any information that that shooting came from the black car? 16 OFFICER HERNANDEZ: I haven't -- I 17 18 didn't make that determination. 19 MEMBER GRANDIS: So we can't make that 20 -- the only -- no -- the only reason the black 21 car and these people are identified, in the 2.2 testimony today, is because they came out of that 23 establishment? 2.4 OFFICER HERNANDEZ: Correct. 25 MEMBER GRANDIS: But there is no

1 information that the shooting came from any of 2 the occupants in that car? 3 OFFICER HERNANDEZ: No. 4 MEMBER GRANDIS: Okay. OFFICER HERNANDEZ: Not to my 5 investigation. 6 7 (Simultaneous speaking.) 8 MEMBER GRANDIS: And, also, I think we 9 had information from your report that there was no, quote altercation in the inside, but that 10 11 there had been words exchanged, possibly? 12 OFFICER HERNANDEZ: Correct. 13 MEMBER GRANDIS: So words exchanged does not raise to a level of any violation that 14 15 -- that currently at -- after hence, correct? 16 OFFICER HERNANDEZ: That's correct, and it doesn't violate their settlement -- I'm 17 18 sorry, their security plan, either. 19 MEMBER GRANDIS: Okay. So I'm just 20 having trouble figuring out the connection 21 between, in this fact finding, between that 2.2 violent incident, which is abhorrent to everyone, 23 but it's -- there's no relationship to any of the patrons or staff of that -- of that 24 25 establishment, am I interpreting what I've heard,

1 correctly? 2 OFFICER HERNANDEZ: That there's no --3 that --MEMBER GRANDIS: Where's the 4 5 relationship --OFFICER HERNANDEZ: -- there's no 6 connection --7 8 MEMBER GRANDIS: -- between -- right. 9 Where's the relationship between the licensee, or its patrons, causing the violent incident of 10 11 shots being fired? 12 (Simultaneous speaking.) 13 OFFICER HERNANDEZ: But I'm -- I'm not able to make that determination. That's why I 14 15 placed all the facts that I gathered --16 MEMBER GRANDIS: Okay. 17 OFFICER HERNANDEZ: -- and presented 18 it to the Board. 19 (Simultaneous speaking.) 20 Thank you. Okay. MEMBER GRANDIS: 21 Now, I do believe, what we've heard today is 2.2 that, perhaps, the security plan needs to be 23 updated, if that is something that the licensee 24 would voluntarily agree to, is that the correct 25 that the -- perhaps that there could be some

1 improvements in the -- in the security plan? 2 OFFICER HERNANDEZ: Yes, I would agree 3 to that. 4 MEMBER GRANDIS: Okay. And, do you 5 know when this security plan was adopted --OFFICER HERNANDEZ: 6 In --7 MEMBER GRANDIS: -- possibly? 8 OFFICER HERNANDEZ: -- 2019, if I'm not mistaken. 9 10 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: I'm sorry, what 11 year? 12 OFFICER HERNANDEZ: In 2019, if I'm 13 not mistaken. Let me just double-check. Yes, 14 May 18, 2019. 15 MEMBER GRANDIS: Okay. And, do you, 16 from your knowledge, as an investigator, do you 17 know, if the agency has made any improvements, or 18 changes, to the security plan policies, since that date? 19 20 OFFICER HERNANDEZ: I am not sure of 21 that question. MEMBER GRANDIS: That's good -- fine. 2.2 23 So I think I had one other concern. Okay. 24 OFFICER HERNANDEZ: Mm-hmm. 25 MEMBER GRANDIS: One, and I -- I --

1 I've said this before, at other of our hearings. 2 Loitering is not against the law, in D.C., and I 3 wish we would stop using that term, because it's 4 not illegal. Now, I do believe, as we've heard, 5 6 that a licensee has responsibility of 1,000 feet 7 from its establishment, I would imagine, 500 feet from each direction, correct? 8 9 That they have responsibility for 10 telling patrons that, you know, the -- the 11 evening's over, that you need to move -- need to 12 move ahead, as -- but there's -- there's no law 13 -- there's no law that a security person can 14 make, forcibly, someone to move. 15 But, there is an obligation, I think, 16 in that 1,000 feet, for a licensee to take 17 responsibility to try to, I quess, to pick up 18 trash, I think, is also of concern that licensees 19 have outside -- right outside their premises. 20 So putting up no loitering signs is 21 not helpful, because loitering is not illegal. Ι 2.2 guess, they could put signage up that say, you 23 know, be a respectful of the neighborhood and that it's -- it, you know, incommoding is 24 25 illegal.

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1 So therefore, if there are patrons 2 within certain number of feet of the door, I 3 would imagine a security person would have the 4 right to have people move away from the door, because that could be blocking the doorway, for 5 6 public health and safety reasons. 7 So there -- I think that area would be zoned that they can actually forcefully, I don't 8 9 mean pushing, but with a language, saying you cannot stand here. 10 11 So, you know, we do have that, I 12 think, conundrum, you know, conundrum of trying 13 to figure out, how do we move people that, when 14 we legally can't do anything, unless they are 15 rowdy, or causing a problem. 16 But that's something the Agency and 17 this Board has been working on, for years, and 18 I'm sure we'll continue to try to improve that, 19 but I'm just trying to make sure that, if there 20 are some facts that tie any of the patrons that 21 were inside, to this violent incident, I want to make sure that, whoever has that information, 2.2 23 puts it into the record. 24 And I am hearing those, I believe, 25 from MPD and from our investigator that, there is

1 no information that patrons, inside, were 2 actually involved in -- in the altercation, 3 correct? 4 OFFICER HERNANDEZ: That is correct, 5 for me. 6 MEMBER GRANDIS: Okay. So, Mr. 7 Chairman, I -- I'm fine, now. I was just trying 8 to make sure I understood the dots, here. Thank 9 you. 10 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Thank you, Mr. 11 Grandis. Any other -- I'm going to come back to 12 you, Mr. Kline, but any -- anyone have any 13 questions for the Investigator? 14 All right, hearing none. Mr. Garcia, 15 thank you very much for your appearance, 16 although, the hearing is not over, you're free to 17 leave, if you so desire, sir, okay? 18 OFFICER HERNANDEZ: Okay. 19 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right, sir. 20 OFFICER HERNANDEZ: Thank you, 21 everyone, have a good one. 2.2 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Thank you. Mr. 23 Kline, any other comments, or questions, you wish 2.4 to ask, of anyone, sir? 25 MR. KLINE: Just a few comments, I

1	think, at this point. One, is to address Mr.
2	Grandis' inquiry. The licensee, also, has no
3	information, concerning anything happening
4	inside. So there's that.
5	In addition, and I have the Head of
б	Security here, there is training. I'm not sure
7	where the confusion is, but this establishment
8	lets people go through regular training.
9	And, maybe they don't see it, as such,
10	but I have Mr. Gallaway, he's Head of Security.
11	I proffer him. He's been through a formal
12	training course, he's also worked in the industry
13	for many, many years.
14	I thought it was interesting that one
15	of the the one of the peoples has been in
16	law enforcement and, or had been in security and
17	law enforcement, for 25 years, so I mean,
18	certainly, has lots of experience.
19	I understand and when I read the
20	report, I got the concern and I knew that the
21	Board would would ask questions about training
22	and would be concerned about it.
23	But, I also came to the conclusion
24	that, there wasn't anything that I could see, in
25	this incident, or that seems to be apparent that

arises from any lack of training on the part of the establishment.

Ms. Beyene preemptively realized, and she's here and she can address it, herself, but preemptively realized what was about to happen and was actually on the phone with 911, when shots rang out.

Is that, you know, they could see what was happening and knew what was about to happen and immediately got on the phone, with 911, and called and said, you know, there -- there's -something -- there's an issue, something's about to happen and, sure enough, as she's on the phone with them, the shots were heard.

15 So I think this establishment -- and 16 this is a very unfortunate incident. I mean, we 17 don't want to be here. But, I think that they do 18 a good job.

19There were a couple of things that20came out of the hearing, which I think are21constructive. One, is the parking lot. Ms.22Beyene is -- is prepared to install some23additional lighting.

And we'll talk to security and make sure that that's part of the rounds and that --

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and that they do their best to prevent people from congregating -- Mr. Grandis, I won't use the word loitering -- from congregating in that area.

But the other thing that's -- that's apparent to me, and this may be a discussion for another time, off-line, is this -- this RDO Program seems to be broken.

9 And, rather than the MPD deciding 10 where resources are best-employed, given the 11 limited number of officers we have, and the 12 limited number of RDO hours that are available, 13 the officers are deciding for themselves.

14 Now, I don't, you know, in and of 15 itself, I don't see that, as evil, but it seems 16 to me that, given limited resources and, given 17 that, so tragically, we've just seen our 200th 18 killing in the District of Columbia, I think we 19 got to find a better way to have MPD decide where 20 these limited resources are going to be 21 allocated.

And that's way-above my paygrade, but I just think I got to put it out there that, it seems to me that, because -- because, Mimi is --I mean, I've seen the text, and we're prepared to

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1 put them on, where she has just begged for RDO 2 and is willing to pay for it and has -- has 3 always gone above and beyond, but can't get any officers. 4 5 Because they're, you know, you heard -- you heard from Officer Hernandez, they don't 6 want to work there. 7 I don't -- I don't blame them, personally. 8 9 But, I think that, when we have limited police resources, we have to figure out 10 11 how best to employ them, so that we minimize the -- the threat of violence, the threat of death, 12 13 the threat of injury. 14 And I just thread that out, as an 15 aside. I mean, all in all, tragic situation, at 16 any time weapons are -- weapons are involved, of 17 any kind, whether they be guns, or knives. 18 But, I think you heard, I know you 19 heard that this establishment does a good job of 20 keeping them out of the establishment, and there 21 isn't any evidence that these weapons were in the 2.2 establishment, doesn't minimize the fact that 23 some people were shot, which is truly unfortunate. 2.4 25 But, this licensee remains prepared to do whatever is in her power to -- to try to prevent such a situation from happening in the future, and will take any recommendations that the -- the Board has, investigative staff has, or what have you.

One other point, do with it what you 6 7 will, this process, in terms of, bringing licensees before the Board, with these inquiries, 8 9 I think, could be better served, by bringing the licensee in with investigative staff and sitting 10 11 down and saying, hey, what went on here, like, 12 what -- what have we learned, what can we do 13 better, and it being more cooperative.

Because, it's pretty threatening to licensees. Not that the Board's not fair, I'm not saying that, I'm just, you know, I throw it out there, for what it's worth.

But, we all got to work together to try to figure our way through this -- what seems to be a very difficult period, and I think this licensee is -- is more than prepared to do whatever she can do, to do her part. I'm happy to answer any questions, or any issues that the Board might have.

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CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: I have some --

I have some questions I want to ask Mr. -- Mr. Kline. However, I need to correct the record. We're having a fact finding hearing, because an incident occurred at this establishment.

The incident occurred and a request was made to us, by the Acting Chief of Police, to have a fact finding. So this is one of the few mechanisms that we do have, where we can bring in the licensee, bring in the investigator, bring in MPD.

11 All that we're doing is gathering 12 facts and, I believe, fact finding hearings, 13 generally, are very helpful, because as -- we 14 have not, as I stated before, we have not made a 15 decision that we're going to take any -- any 16 action against this establishment. What we're 17 trying to do is, we're acting on request of the 18 acting Chief of Police, to investigate what's 19 occurred, and we might determine, at the end of 20 this -- this hearing that, you know, this -- this 21 establishment, the incident occur -- is an 2.2 incident occurred, based on the general consensus 23 of what's going on in the District, at this 24 moment, and this licensee is harmless, in a sense 25 of the event -- event that occurred. So that's

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1 all that we're doing here. That's --2 MR. KLINE: I know that, Mr. Chair, 3 and I --CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right. 4 MR. KLINE: -- and I --5 6 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right. 7 MR. KLINE: -- I'm -- I'm aware --8 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right. 9 MR. KLINE: -- and I wasn't --CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right. 10 11 MR. KLINE: -- in any way, casting any 12 aspersions on the Board, or what's going on 13 here, today, I just, I'm trying to be constructive and I --14 15 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right. 16 MR. KLINE: -- I, you know, I hope it 17 wasn't taken that way. 18 (Simultaneous speaking.) 19 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Well, thank 20 I -- I -- it wasn't taken, but for -- for vou. 21 the -- for the general public, who is listening 2.2 to this hearing. 23 Because, as you know, we're on YouTube, I want to alert them, just to -- to 24 25 share with them, the process that's been followed

and why we're here today.

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MR. KLINE: Understood.

3 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right. My 4 question that I have and, either, yourself or 5 your client can respond, which I don't 6 understand.

7 The video tended to indicate that, and 8 Mr. Garcia stated that it appears that 9 individuals were running from the back of the 10 establishment, and so maybe you can provide some 11 clarification.

Is it the back of the establishment 12 13 from parking lot and -- and if -- if -- how are -- how are folks let out of this establishment, 14 15 and are they let out in the front door, and --16 and -- and -- or, maybe, you can explain, why were these people running from the back and --17 18 and what -- and what's this back they were 19 running from?

20 MR. KLINE: Ms. Beyene, you want to 21 address that, please?

22You're on mute, ma'am, I can't hear23you. You're on mute.

24 MS. BEYENE: Can you -- can you hear 25 me?

1 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Yes, ma'am. 2 MS. BEYENE: Yes, thank you for the The establishment has two exit door, 3 question. one entrance, but two exit door. The back of the 4 5 establishment is not accessible for people to let 6 out. 7 The people you see on the video, came 8 out, is from the side door. That is the -- one 9 of the door we use to -- to let people out, side door and front door. 10 The back -- two of the back doors are 11 12 -- were never used for people to get in, or to 13 leave -- to come out, to exit. 14 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: But the 15 questions, though, I -- and -- and, you know, 16 videos are -- I mean, I see someone running. Ι mean, it's like -- is it -- is it typical, 17 18 running out of the front door, or the side door 19 20 MS. BEYENE: Mm-hmm. 21 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: -- that you see 2.2 someone running out of the establishment? Ι 23 mean, I would be concerned, if I see, it's 24 closing time and I see -- I see people running 25 out, what does that indicate?

1	(Simultaneous speaking.)
2	MS. BEYENE: To be honest with you,
3	sir, people run out all the time. This is just
4	it happened all the time. The minute
5	MEMBER GRANDIS: Mr. Chairman, if I
б	may? Earlier, in the video, I mean, I noticed
7	it, too.
8	(Simultaneous speaking.)
9	MS. BEYENE: Yes, people
10	MEMBER GRANDIS: Several seconds
11	before, you know, 20 seconds, or whatever, before
12	the incident, I mean, there were just people
13	running up the street. I mean, there's a guy
14	that, kind of, runs and kind of, dances, so I
15	mean, there are people running. I mean, I don't
16	know what
17	MS. BEYENE: Yes, so I'm just saying
18	
19	(Simultaneous speaking.)
20	MEMBER GRANDIS: in a regular
21	basis, you see this happen. In any events,
22	people run out. The minute we turn on the light,
23	some people run out, through the exit. And they
24	run to, once they exit the door, they run to
25	their car.

1	Some people walk, some people run.
2	Some stand around, waiting on, most of time,
3	Uber. But, running from the establishment, it
4	happened all the time.
5	(Simultaneous speaking.)
б	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right.
7	Thank you, ma'am, for providing that
8	clarification, because and, maybe, because I
9	have not I have not been going to clubs and
10	leaving at closing
11	MS. BEYENE: I know.
12	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: time,
13	because
14	MS. BEYENE: Yes.
15	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: to me, I
16	to me, it it it was surprising, and I'm
17	to me, it would indicate that, maybe, something
18	was going on
19	MS. BEYENE: No, they run. And they
20	run all the time.
21	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: someone
22	I someone is running out of a out out of
23	the club, but I if you're saying this is
24	typical behavior
25	MS. BEYENE: Always.

1 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: -- of club get 2 -- goers, I mean, I'm not in a position to -- to 3 contest that. All right. 4 (Simultaneous speaking.) 5 MS. BEYENE: I see. CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Now, ma'am, 6 7 were you present the night of the incident? MS. BEYENE: I'm always there. 8 Yes. 9 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: And so tell me, 10 what typically, what security do you have and 11 what -- and, specifically, tell me about the 12 security personnel this particular night? 13 MS. BEYENE: We open Fridays. 14 Unfortunately, the business is slow, because of a 15 lot of car breaking in the neighborhood. It's 16 been that way for about a year, now. 17 We lost several nights that we used to 18 have weekly events, people don't come around, 19 because in -- at night, you'll have 20, 30 car 20 breaking. 21 So people put it out in the social 2.2 media, when you go to this neighborhood, when you 23 go to this -- this establishment, around my area, 2.4 as actually about four or five establishments 25 around that area, people -- a group of guys will

come and break cars.

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2 Mr. Hernandez is present a few times 3 when that happen. So because of that, the business slow down. So right now, we open on 4 5 Fridays. So that particular Friday, I had nine 6 7 security staff working. We have five outside, 8 four inside the establishment. The five, 9 outside, will be -- one, will be taking I.D. 10 We have three way of searching. The 11 first person will check your I.D. and use one, up 12 and down, to see if you're carrying anything. 13 The second person will -- the second security 14 will search you. 15 And, once you pass that, the last 16 person, before you get in, which is the ---, will 17 search you, again, to go to the establishment. 18 You have to be searched three times, to be able 19 to enter the establishment. This is --20 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Let me ask you 21 a question, is it --2.2 MS. BEYENE: Yes? 23 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: -- both, males and females are --2.4 25 MS. BEYENE: Yes. Yes.

1	(Simultaneous speaking.)
2	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Okay.
3	MS. BEYENE: It's males and females,
4	all the time. We have three way we're searching,
5	before you get, which a lot of people complain,
6	you know.
7	They don't feel like, if one person
8	searching me, why you searching me again? Just
9	to make sure we have three way of searching. So
10	at that particular night, yes, I open and close,
11	all the time. I'm always there.
12	If emergency happen, I have a security
13	manager, who stays for me, which very, very
14	rarely. That particular night, we open around
15	I can't tell you the exact time.
16	I remember, one of my security manager
17	came to me. He said, I observed a couple of cars
18	are parked across the street, which is where the
19	Metro entrance is, but the people are sitting in
20	it, sitting there, guys sitting in the car, and
21	they didn't came in, they just sitting in their
22	car.
23	So when a situation like that happen,
24	the I I when I don't have detail, which
25	I try every, every week, I call police. I call

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1 911 and I explain to them my concern. 2 This particular night, immediately when he -- when he informed me that -- when he 3 informed me that, I call 911. In fact, I was on 4 5 the line with the operator, explaining my 6 concern, where I'm calling from. 7 You can hear a gun -- she can hear the 8 She said, I can hear it. I said, qun shot. 9 please send officers, I hear a gun shot. That's what took place. 10 11 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right. 12 MS. BEYENE: So the police didn't take 13 them -- it took them less than, really, a minute, 14 when they appear in front of the establishment. 15 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: So how many 16 cameras do you have in the establishment, ma'am? 17 MS. BEYENE: Sixteen. 18 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Is it possible 19 that, and again, this is voluntary, for you to 20 provide the Board with a diagram of your camera 21 location? 2.2 MS. BEYENE: Yes, of course. 23 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: So what is it 24 that you believe you can do, to prevent incidents 25 like these from occurring?

1	MS. BEYENE: Whatever it takes, the
2	establishment will do. However, when we're not
3	even open I can give you an example. I have
4	cleaning staff, in the middle of the week, on
5	I believe, on Tuesday, people were getting shot
6	around that area.
7	They run behind the building. The
8	place is not open. It's around six 6:00 p.m.,
9	6:30 p.m. My cleaning staff called me, saying,
10	they're shooting outside.
11	So this incident, this kind of
12	incident happens in that neighborhood for the
13	past year, all the time. Robbery, all the time.
14	Breaking cars, all the time.
15	I think what is really crucial and I
16	think is important to have is a police detail in
17	front of the door and, at the same time, Mr.
18	Hernandez request more lighting in the parking
19	lot, which I'm going get ready to do,
20	immediately, even though, I have sufficient
21	lighting.
22	But, if it's more lighting needed, I
23	will definitely do that, anything the Board
24	requests, I'm getting ready to do, to eliminate
25	from this type of situation happen.

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1	In addition to that, if you look at my
2	911 record, every anything, anything, if my
3	establishment is open, or not, anything I see
4	around the area, I call 911.
5	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right,
6	ma'am, thank you for your presentation. Any
7	MS. BEYENE: Thank you.
8	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: any
9	questions from any Board Members? Go ahead, Mr.
10	Short.
11	MEMBER SHORT: Thank you, Mr. Chair.
12	And, good afternoon
13	MS. BEYENE: Good afternoon, sir.
14	MEMBER SHORT: Ms. Abeba?
15	MS. BEYENE: Yes.
16	MEMBER SHORT: It's been my
17	experience, and this is my third term on the
18	Board
19	MS. BEYENE: Yes, sir.
20	MEMBER SHORT: and things are
21	constantly evolving, when it comes to security.
22	(Simultaneous speaking.)
23	MS. BEYENE: Yes, sir.
24	MEMBER SHORT: And one of the newest
25	and innovated things that MPD has done, and the

1 District Council passed, what -- for people that 2 do security business, especially, in places of public assembly that they be registered with the 3 District of Columbia Police Department. 4 And I'll 5 give you a good example of that, and I think your attorney knows, as well. Although --6 7 MS. BEYENE: Yes, sir. MEMBER SHORT: -- some people have 8 9 been in the business and industry for 25 years, 10 or longer, they have never had their backgrounds 11 checked. 12 And, sometimes, when you ask them to 13 get their backgrounds checked, they check out, 14 which means, they are not, or may not be, 15 suitable to be in security, for different 16 reasons, and I heard you say to the Chairman that 17 you would not mind the cameras being checked out. 18 But, I do believe, since we've revised 19 our security plans that, a portion of that, and your attorney can bear this out, also, is that we 20 21 have an investigator come out and walk through, 2.2 with the cameras, and we have it -- to look at 23 the angles and different things that you have inside of the club. 24 25 Maybe you need it, maybe you don't,

1 but if you're going to be sending a diagram, I 2 would suggest that you do get an investigator to 3 come out and take a look. 4 (Simultaneous speaking.) 5 MS. BEYENE: Yes, sir. 6 MEMBER SHORT: And, do you have a 7 camera outback? 8 MS. BEYENE: Yes, sir. 9 MEMBER SHORT: You have cameras on the front and the back. We saw the cameras on the 10 11 front today. I -- I have it -- I have 12 MS. BEYENE: 13 it at the back. No blind spot. But, if additional camera is requested, I am willing to 14 15 do it, immediately. 16 MEMBER SHORT: Well that's -- that's 17 not exactly what I'm saying, but --18 MS. BEYENE: Yes, sir. 19 MEMBER SHORT: -- when the 20 investigator comes out, the investigator may talk 21 to you about some of the things to that, but --2.2 MS. BEYENE: Yes, sir. 23 MEMBER SHORT: -- again, what I would 24 ask, as a Board Member, is since the new laws and 25 regulations are out, now, regarding security

1 companies, security personnel that they be 2 registered with the District of Columbia government, would your -- would your company be 3 willing to do that? 4 5 (Simultaneous speaking.) MS. BEYENE: Of course. 6 7 MEMBER SHORT: Okay. 8 MS. BEYENE: That's yes. 9 MEMBER SHORT: So -- thank you, and I hope that the other Board Members have heard 10 11 that, and we will -- and we can -- we can make 12 sure that's a part of your security plan, 13 whenever it's submitted to us. 14 MS. BEYENE: Thank you. 15 MEMBER SHORT: Thank you, Mr. Chair, 16 that's all I have, at this time. 17 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Thank you, Mr. 18 Ms. -- Ms. Beyene, I guess the question Short. 19 I'm going to ask you, are the -- the security 20 that you employ, are these -- is it a third-party 21 company, or are they employees of your -- are 2.2 they just independent contractors from the --23 MS. BEYENE: I have -- a few 24 independent contractors, some are my employees. 25 They've been there, since we opened.

1	(Simultaneous speaking.)
2	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right,
3	thank you. All right.
4	MEMBER GRANDIS: Mr
5	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right.
6	(Simultaneous speaking.)
7	MEMBER GRANDIS: Mr. Chairman, may I?
8	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Yes, Mr.
9	Grandis, go ahead, sir.
10	MS. BEYENE: Yes, sir.
11	MEMBER GRANDIS: Thank you. Ma'am, I
12	I want to thank you, for explaining some of
13	the issues that Board Member Short asked you
14	about.
15	Because, I think, once again, this
16	being a fact finding, the more correct
17	information we have, the better we can make a
18	determination, so thank you for that. You
19	mentioned that there are three levels of
20	security, to get in.
21	MS. BEYENE: Yes.
22	MEMBER GRANDIS: But, also, you you
23	testified, and they're not related to that, but
24	you also testified that there is a side door that
25	you're sure isn't

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1 MS. BEYENE: Yes, exit door. 2 (Simultaneous speaking.) 3 It's exit only? MEMBER GRANDIS: 4 MS. BEYENE: Exit only. 5 MEMBER GRANDIS: And is it -- is it unlocked for exit, the whole evening, or at 6 7 closing time? 8 MS. BEYENE: We unlock it, at the end 9 of the night, to let people out. Security is present in that door, from the time we open, 10 11 until we close. Once --MEMBER GRANDIS: 12 Okay --13 MS. BEYENE: Go ahead, sir. 14 (Simultaneous speaking.) 15 MEMBER GRANDIS: Go ahead. No, no, qo ahead. 16 17 MS. BEYENE: Once we close, that door, 18 we use it, as second exit. MEMBER GRANDIS: So if I understand 19 20 correctly, now, the only entry location to enter 21 is the front door, and that's why you have --2.2 MS. BEYENE: One hundred percent. 23 MEMBER GRANDIS: -- and that's why you have the three levels of security? 2.4 25 MS. BEYENE: One hundred percent.

1	MEMBER GRANDIS: Okay. The side door
2	is locked, through the evening, until closing?
3	MS. BEYENE: Because it's emergency
4	exit, you can you cannot open it, from outside
5	
6	MEMBER GRANDIS: But you can push it
7	
8	MS. BEYENE: but you can push it
9	open.
10	(Simultaneous speaking.)
11	MEMBER GRANDIS: Okay.
12	MS. BEYENE: Yes.
13	MEMBER GRANDIS: Are security
14	personnel assigned to be at that location, the
15	whole evening?
16	MS. BEYENE: All the time. From the
17	time
18	MEMBER GRANDIS: The whole evening?
19	MS. BEYENE: we open, until we
20	close.
21	MEMBER GRANDIS: So if somebody pushed
22	it open to because, you know, they want to
23	exit, and also, they'll push it open to let
24	someone in, during the course of the evening, but
25	you're saying that would not happen, because of

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1 2 MS. BEYENE: Absolutely not. MEMBER GRANDIS: -- the training of 3 4 your security staff? 5 (Simultaneous speaking.) MS. BEYENE: Yes, sir. Absolutely 6 7 No one can come in, through that door. not. 8 MEMBER GRANDIS: My last question --9 my last question is, in any of the videos that were presented today that we viewed, were your 10 11 security staff visible in any of those videos? 12 MS. BEYENE: Yes. One of the video, 13 you see, if I count right, five of the securities 14 were at the door. They, all, of them have 15 security shirt, it say security on the back of their shirt. 16 17 (Simultaneous speaking.) 18 MEMBER GRANDIS: They're at the door, 19 but were they visible, were those five people visible in the video? 20 MS. BEYENE: 21 Yes. MEMBER GRANDIS: Okay, I just -- just 2.2 23 wanted to make sure, because --2.4 MS. BEYENE: Yes, you can see them --25 (Simultaneous speaking.)

1	MEMBER GRANDIS: Okay. Well, thank
2	you. Mr. Chairman, I I I'm I that's
3	all I have. And, I want to thank you, ma'am, for
4	your good
5	MS. BEYENE: Thank you
6	MEMBER GRANDIS: explanations of
7	what how you run your club, thank you.
8	(Simultaneous speaking.)
9	MS. BEYENE: Thank you, sir.
10	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right.
11	Thank you. All right. Any any questions, by
12	anyone of any other parties?
13	(No response.)
14	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right. Mr.
15	Kline, I've said this, of course, this is a fact
16	finding hearing, any final comments you want to
17	make, before I bring this hearing to closure?
18	MR. KLINE: No, I think we've covered
19	it and, I think, Ms. Beyene has demonstrated to
20	the Board her seriousness, as an operator, her
21	willingness to do whatever she can to minimize
22	and prevent these situations, and her willingness
23	to listen to suggestions that anyone might have,
24	whether it be MPD, the Board, investigative staff
25	from ABCA, about how things might be improved and

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-- and be safer.

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2 I -- I -- I think -- I hope it's apparent to the Board that she's committed to 3 that and is serious about it. Thank you. 4 5 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right. Thank you, Mr. Kline. What is it -- the only 6 7 agreement that we have, we have two agreements today that your -- your client has agreed to. 8 9 And, I think, she stated that Officer Hernandez had also spoke of that, to look at the 10 11 parking lot, to make a determination if 12 additional lighting could be installed. 13 And then, as far as the Board is 14 concerned, is that she will provide us with a --15 a diagram of the cameras, and so I'll ask that 16 that be provided to the Board, within 30 days. I -- as I stated before, it's a fact 17 18 finding hearing. The Board will take this matter 19 under advisement and the options that the Board 20 has, is to make a determination that there are no 21 -- no -- for take -- to take no further action. 2.2 Because, we have determined that there 23 -- that the licensee has complied with the law, and so therefore, their action did not attribute 2.4 25 to the shooting.

1 Or, if the Board believes that there 2 are actions that this licensee could have taken, 3 then we will submit this matter to the Office of Attorney General, for them to make a 4 determination, whether or not any laws have been 5 violated. 6 7 So that's -- that's our -- so --8 currently, we'll take the -- the Board will take this matter under advisement, for further action. 9 10 Thank you, very much, for your presence today. 11 Officer Hernandez, thank you, for 12 always being available to testify and, thank you, 13 very much, have a great day. 14 OFFICER HERNANDEZ: Thank you, Mr. 15 Chair, Members of the Board. 16 (Simultaneous speaking.) 17 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right. 18 MS. BEYENE: Thank you. 19 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right. 20 Thank you. 21 (Whereupon, the above-entitled matter 2.2 went off the record at 12:41 p.m.) 23 24 25
