CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: The next case on our calendar is Case Number 20-CIT-00569, La Molienda, License Number 60398. Ms. Andrews, can you please elevate the rights of the parties in this case, please?

MS. ANDREWS: Sure. Stand by. Ms. Jordan, your rights have been elevated. Mr. Ayala, your rights have been elevated. Investigator Puente, your rights have been elevated. That's all, Mr. Chair.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Thank you very much, Ms. Andrews.

MS. ANDREWS: Mr. Cohen, you can go ahead and log off.

MR. AYALA: Hello? Hello? Good morning.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: I'm sorry. Hold on one minute, please. I will call -- Mr. Ayala, you're there. Just hold on one minute, please.

MR. AYALA: Okay.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Mr. Ayala, can you please mute your microphone, please?

MR. AYALA: What you say?
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Mute your microphone, please, sir.

MR. AYALA: Oh, okay.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right. Good morning, everyone. This is a show cause hearing for La Molienda. If you're not speaking, I'm asking that everyone mute your telephone. When you need to speak, you should unmute your line. If you have a camera, please turn your camera on so -- I like to see the parties that I'm speaking to. If you have a camera, please turn your camera on. If you do not have a camera, then that is fine.

So let's start with Ms. Jordan. Please state and spell your name for the record, please.

MS. JORDAN: Good morning, Board members. Janika Jordan on behalf of the government, J-A-N-I-K-A J-O-R-D-A-N.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Good morning, Ms. Jordan. Mr. Ayala, can you please spell and state your name for the record and your relationship?

MR. AYALA: Yes. My name is Teofilo

Ayala. It's T-E-O-F-I-L-O. Ayala is A-Y-A-L-A. And I'm the owner of the place.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Mr. Ayala, do you have a camera you can turn on, sir?

MR. AYALA: Well, $I$ had some troubles to connect with the computer, you know, using my cell phone.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Sir, if you don't have a camera that's fine. All right. All right. Ms. Jordan, if we go to a hearing, does the Board have any witnesses that they wish to identify -- does the Agency have a witness they wish to identify and if they do, who is that person?

MS. JORDAN: Yes. The Agency has Investigator Kevin Puente.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Mr. Puente, can you please identify yourself for the record by spelling and stating your name, please?

MR. PUENTE: Yes, sir. Kevin Puente, K-E-V-I-N P-U-E-N-T-E, investigator with ABRA.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Good morning, Mr. Puente. I'm sorry. Mr. Ayala, do you have any witnesses? If this matter goes to a hearing, do you have any witnesses you plan to call?

MR. AYALA: No.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Oh, just yourself. Okay, fine.

MR. AYALA: Yes.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right. Ms. Jordan, are there an preliminary matters in this case?

MS. JORDAN: There are no preliminary matters.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right. All right. So this is an opening statement. So, Mr. -- I'm sorry. This is a show cause hearing. Mr. Ayala, this is the way that the matter will proceed today.

The Government will go first. The Government will have -- they will have -- they will provide an opening statement. You also would have an opportunity to provide an opening statement.

An opening statement is not -- you're not testifying. You're just going to say this is the case, and these are the witnesses $I$ will call or these are some of the defenses that $I$ will make. You do not have to make an opening statement at this time. You can make an opening
statement once you present your case.
So the Government will make an opening statement. You can make an opening statement if you so wish. The Government will call its first witness. When the Government calls its witness, the Government will conduct direct examination off its witness, Mr. Puente.

Once the Government has concluded its direct examination of Mr. Puente, then you will have an opportunity to ask questions of Mr. Puente based on the incident that occurred.

Once the Government has concluded its case with its witness, then you can present your case. And what $I$ will also do once you present your case, I will swear you in. You will present your case. If you have any witnesses you wish to call, you will call them. The Government will then cross-examine you, ask questions of you and the Board might ask questions of you also.

Once that's done, both parties will make closing statements and the Board will then take this matter under advisement for a determination. But the Board will conclude the case, and we will go into executive session. And we will make a determination, and we will issue a
decision within 90 days of today.
Do either side have any questions that they wish to ask of me prior to us starting this case?

MS. JORDAN: No, Mr. Chairman.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Mr. Ayala, do you have any questions, procedural-wise, how this matter will go today?

MR. AYALA: No.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right. Thank you. All right. Does the Government wish to make an opening statement?

MS. JORDAN: Yes. Thank you. OPENING STATEMENT

MS. JORDAN: Good morning, Board members. We are here today in the show cause matter of Los Brothers, Inc., trade name La Molienda, located at 3568 14th Street Northwest.

The Show Cause Notice issued in this matter concerns the charges that the licensee operated after allowed hours, did not place tables more than 6 feet apart, permitted more than six patrons be seated as a table, did not keep a reservation $\log$ and permitted patrons to sit at a staffed bar in violation of 23 DCMR

Section 810 and that the licensee served patrons closed containers of alcohol in violation of 23 DCMR Section 7213.

The evidence will show that on Sunday, November 1, 2020, at approximately 12:30 a.m. Alcohol Beverage Regulation Administration Investigator Kevin Puente and Supervisory Investigator Mark Brashears were monitoring establishments on 14th Street Northwest when they observed a crowd inside the establishment.

They entered and observed patrons sitting at tables and at a staffed bar consuming alcoholic beverages.

The patrons were being served alcoholic beverages at the bar and at tables. The tables were not 6 feet apart and more than 6 patrons were at a table.

The investigators identified themselves to owner, Mr. Ayala, and when they requested to see a reservation log, the owner was unable to provide one.

The evidence will also show that the establishment's patrons were being served alcohol in closed containers. Thank you.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Mr. Ayala, do
you wish to make an opening statement now or you will reserve to make an opening statement once you present your case, sir?

MR. AYALA: Yes. I can do it later when I present my case, yes.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right.
That's fine. All right. Does the Government have a witness in which to call?

MS. JORDAN: The Government would like to call Investigator Kevin Puente. WHEREUPON,

## KEVIN PUENTE

was called as a witness by Counsel for the Government and, having been first duly sworn, assumed the witness stand, was examined and testified as follows:

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Go ahead. Your witness, Ms. Jordan.

## DIRECT EXAMINATION

BY MS. JORDAN:
Q Could you please state and spell your first and last name again for the record?

A Kevin Puente, K-E-V-I-N P-U-E-N-T-E.
Q Where are you currently employed?
A The Alcoholic Beverage Regulation

Administration.
Q And what's your position at Alcoholic Beverage Regulation Administration?

A Investigator.
Q How long have been an investigator?
A Approximately 6-1/2 years.
Q What are you duties and responsibilities as an investigator?

A I conduct inspections and investigations of licensed ABC establishments in the District of Columbia.

Q Are you familiar with La Molienda?
A Yes.
Q How are you familiar with the establishment?

A I visited the establishment on November 1, 2020.

Q And what happened at that visit?
A At approximately 12:30 a.m. in the morning, myself and Supervisory Investigator Mark Brashears were monitoring establishments along 14th Street Northwest when we observed a crowd inside of La Molienda.

We approached the establishment. We observed people sitting at the bar. We observed
alcoholic beverages being consumed and bartenders making alcoholic beverages.

MS. JORDAN: Investigator Puente, I'm going to stop you for one moment. I think we have lost Mr. Ayala.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Oh, I'm sorry. Thank you. Mr. Ayala, are you there? Ms. Andrews --

MR. AYALA: Hello. Can you hear me?
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Yes, Mr. Ayala.
MR. AYALA: I'm here.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Is there something going on with your Internet? I mean, we need to make sure that you're always there. Are you in and out?

MR. AYALA: Yes. I hear everything, yes.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right.
Okay. So just mute your microphone, sir. And you did not show up on your screen. That's one of the reasons -- our screen, that's why we stopped. So that's one of the reasons why I prefer to see folks so therefore if they disappear from my screen, $I$ can always tell that they're not there. All right. Okay. You're
fine. Go ahead, Mr. Puente. BY MS. JORDAN:

Q Mr. Puente, if you can just go back and describe your visit on November 1.

A Yes. So myself and Supervisory Investigator Mark Brashears, we approached the establishment. We observed patrons sitting at the bar. We observed a bartender making alcoholic beverages. We observed alcohol being consumed at tables as well as closed containers of alcohol sitting in buckets on the tables.

Q And about what time did you enter the establishment?

A We entered at approximately 12:35 a.m.
Q What else happened?
A We went inside. We identified ourselves to the owner, Mr. Ayala. I observed that the tables were not 6 feet apart, more than six patrons were sitting at the table. We asked Mr. Ayala if he was aware of the mayor's emergency order during our coronavirus pandemic and that all establishments had to close at midnight.

Mr. Ayala advised me that it was daylight savings time so he could stay open until

2 o'clock. I advised him that during the mayor's order all holidays and daylight savings time hours were not allowed due to the mayor's emergency order.

I asked Mr. Ayala to see the reservation log. He could not produce one. We also observed many tables had closed containers of the alcohol in buckets on the tables.

MS. JORDAN: If I can have permission to share content?

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Ms. Andrews, can you please allow Ms. Jordan to share her screen, please?

MS. ANDREWS: Sure. Stand by. Okay, Ms. Jordan, you can now share your screen.

MS. JORDAN: Thank you.
BY MS. JORDAN:
Q I'm going to show you a document marked as Government Exhibit 1 for identification. I'll scroll through briefly just so we can chat briefly. Do you recognize this document?

A Yes.
Q And what is this document?
A That's my case report I generated.

Q Is it part of your job as an investigator to draft case reports?

A Yes.
Q Is this a fair and accurate representation of the case report that you created for La Molienda in Case Number 20-CIT00569?

A Yes.
MS. JORDAN: Mr. Chairperson, at this time the Government would like to move Government Exhibit 1, the Case Report, into evidence.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: It's so moved. And one of the reasons why I'm not asking the permission of the licensee because it's part of the Agency's record. So we don't need a licensee's permission to move our own documents into the record. So moved.
(Whereupon, the above-referred to document identified as Government Exhibit 1 was received into evidence.) MS. JORDAN: Thank you.

BY MS. JORDAN:
Q Investigator Puente, directing your attention to Exhibit 1 of the Case Report, what is this document?

A This is a photograph. It shows several patrons sitting at the bar. You will observe a bucket of alcohol right on the bar with closed containers inside the bucket.

Q And, Investigator Puente, directing your attention to Exhibit 4 of the case report, what is this document?

A This is another photo that we took outside that shows patrons sitting at the bar consuming beverages as well as the bartender behind the bar making alcoholic beverages.

Q And directing your attention to Exhibit 6 of the case report, what is this document?

A A photograph of patrons sitting at tables not 6 feet apart, tables with patrons more than 6 as well as closed containers of alcohol on the tables.

Q And directing your attention to Exhibit 7 of your case report, what is this document?

A This is my regulatory inspection I conducted.

Q And can you describe this document?
A Oh, yes. This is what we check when
we go into establishments during the mayor's emergency order. We had a regulatory form drafted to check all the requirements for the mayor's emergency order that shows if an establishment has a reservation system for preparing food items, 50 percent occupancy, seating no more than 6 feet apart or 6 at a table.

Q And can you quickly run through the fines and violations noted on this document?

A Yes. Seating was not spaced 6 feet apart, more than six at a table, alcohol service after midnight, no reservation log, patrons seated at the bar and alcohol being served in closed containers.

MS. JORDAN: Thank you. The Government doesn't have any further questions.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Mr. Ayala, do you have any questions of Mr. Puente?

MR. AYALA: Yes. When he come in, I explained to him, you know, that there was a change in time.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Mr. Ayala, remember, you're asking a question to Mr. Puente. So remember, you're not asking me a question.

MR. AYALA: Okay. Okay.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: You're asking him a specific question. Any questions on his testimony, sir?

CROSS -EXAMINATION
BY MR. AYALA:
Q Well, you know, the only question 1 can ask him and tell him, you know, is, you know, those guys that were sitting at the bar, they moved from one table to talk to the waitress. She was behind the bar. And that's why they were sitting there. And $I$ think the distance, it was 6 feet.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: No. Mr. Ayala, I'm sorry. You're not testifying. You're asking Mr. -- so why don't you ask him how did he know that -- you're saying that you think it was 6 feet.

So why don't you ask him how was he assured that the folks were not sitting -- how did he know that folks were not -- there wasn't a 6 feet distance between them. Ask him that question. I think that's what you're trying to ask him. So ask him that.

MR. AYALA: Yes. That's, you're
right. You know, that's the question.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Ask him that question, sir.

BY MR. AYALA:
Q Him, you know, that how he did determine, you know, there was not 6 feet because we set up --

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: No, Mr. Ayala.
Yes. So, remember, you're not having a conversation. You're asking him a question. I know what you're asking, and I'm not supposed to -- so just what you're saying, just ask that in the form of a question to Mr. -- so how did he know that the witnesses, that the occupants were not 6 feet apart? You ask him that, sir.

BY MR. AYALA:
Q Yes. That's what I asked him, you know. I mean, that's what I'm trying to ask him, how he determine he was not 6 feet, he being across from all the tables, you know. And how --

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Give him a chance to answer the question, now, sir.

MR. AYALA: All right.
BY MR. AYALA:
A Yes, sir. We observed patients could
barely walk in between the chairs. A person is not 6 feet wide. So that's how we could tell.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Do you have any other questions you wanted to ask him, sir?

MR. AYALA: No. That's the only thing I can ask then because, you know, when I set up the tables from center is about 6 feet. But these people, you know, sometime they move the chairs and things like that, you know, and that's what I think has happened, you know. They don't organize it, you know, seating properly. And that's what has happened all the time, you know, and --

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Mr. Ayala, I'll give you an opportunity to explain your case when you present your case.

Now Mr. Puente just testified, and he testified about what he observed and what he observed, why is it that he wrote you a correction. So this is your opportunity to question why he wrote you to state that you did something incorrect?

I'll give you an opportunity, and I'm going to swear you in and then you can state what your position is. But just now you're asking
questions of Mr. Puente. Do you have any other questions of Mr. Puente?

MR. AYALA: You see, I had to -- then I can ask him, you know, is the same thing that I asked him before, you know, how he determine, you know, that it was not 6 foot?

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Well, he testified that --

MR. AYALA: Well, that's the only thing.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Okay.
MR. AYALA: That was.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right.
Thank you. Mr. Puente, how were the licensees informed that they had to -- that the occupants had to be -- that the participants in the -- I'm sorry, that the customers had to be six feet apart that separates them. How did he know -how did this licensee specifically know that this was the requirement?

MR. PUENTE: During the emergency order, ABRA made an effort to send out mailers as well as investigators going around advising establishments as well as ABRA hosting training sessions about the mayor's emergency order and
the requirements of 6 feet apart.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Do you know whether or not this particular licensee was provided that notice?

MR. PUENTE: I do not, sir.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Any other questions? Any other questions by any other participants and, I'm sorry, any of the Board members?

MEMBER GRANDIS: Mr. Chairman?
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Yes, Mr. Grandis.

MEMBER GRANDIS: Is it appropriate to ask Inspector Puente some questions at this point?

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Yes, sir. It's your opportunity to ask him questions, yes, sir. MEMBER GRANDIS: Thank you. Investigator Puente, we want to thank you for your presentation and your providing us the Administrative Case Report. So thank you for that.

Looking at the pictures that are exhibits to your report, did you have any observations about wearing masks by the patrons
and the staff? Did you have any observations on that?

MR. PUENTE: I saw when I was there most of the patrons didn't have masks on because they were consuming the alcoholic beverages when we walked in.

MEMBER GRANDIS: And I noticed in exhibit -- on several exhibits, but Exhibit, I think 1, if I can read that properly, and Exhibit 5, it looks like those are photographs that include the bar area. Is that correct?

MR. PUENTE: Yes, sir.
MEMBER GRANDIS: And under the mayor's emergency, what was the policy on bar service in relationship to this particular bar and patrons sitting at it?

MR. PUENTE: During the mayor's emergency order, if there was a staffed bar by employees, no patrons could be allowed to be seated at the bar.

MEMBER GRANDIS: And from your knowledge, was this a staffed bar or was this a bar that patrons could be sitting at?

MR. PUENTE: When we walked there was a bartender making beverages behind the bar.

MEMBER GRANDIS: And I think you also observed something about this was the evening that daylight savings time was taking effect?

MR. PUENTE: Yes, sir.
MEMBER GRANDIS: And how were licensees notified that daylight savings time would not be allowed under this particular mayor's order?

MR. PUENTE: ABRA sent out emailers notifying licensees that due to the mayor's emergency order there was no holiday extended hours or the extension of the one hour for daylight savings.

MEMBER GRANDIS: Notification was via email from the Agency to licensees?

MR. PUENTE: Yes. We sent out a generic email notifying people of holiday hours and extensions. But during the emergency order for that entire year, there was no holiday extended hours of daylight savings extension.

MEMBER GRANDIS: Inspector Puente, did you research whether or not this particular licensee's email was part of that drop?

MR. PUENTE: No, sir, $I$ did not.
MEMBER GRANDIS: Do you have knowledge
on whether or not the Agency has this licensee's email?

MR. PUENTE: I do not, sir, no.
MEMBER GRANDIS: Chairman, thank you.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Thank you, Mr. Grandis. Any other questions by any of the Board members? All right. Mr. Ayala, do you have any questions of Mr. Puente based on the questions that I asked and Mr. Grandis asked?

MR. AYALA: No.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right. Ms. Jordan, do you have any questions of Mr. Puente based on the questions that were asked by the Board?

MS. JORDAN: No, Mr. Chairperson, thank you.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right.
Thank you. All right. Thank you. Does the Government have another witness?

MS. JORDAN: The Government does not have another witness at this time.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Does the Government rest?

MS. JORDAN: The Government rests but would like to make a closing argument when
appropriate.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: I know. I know.

MS. JORDAN: Okay.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: I know. All right. Sorry. So you rest at this moment, yes?

MS. JORDAN: Yes.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right. Mr. Ayala, this is your opportunity to explain your position. WHEREUPON,

## TEOFILO AYALA

was called as a witness for La Molienda and, having been first duly sworn, assumed the witness stand, was examined and testified as follows:

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Say whatever you want to say, how to prepare us.

DIRECT TESTIMONY
MR. AYALA: Okay. On that particular day, you know, I didn't receive any notice from the ABRA concerning holidays. But I know we had to close at 12:00, you know. But we were very sure staying open because we're -- I feel like we can use that hour. Had we know, we don't close curtain. We don't close anything. We are open
because I thought we can use that hour, you know, and that's what $I$ state.

I never been happen anything, penalty or fine in that type of situation for 17 years there in this place. So that's the only reason that we stayed until the time.

On the other hand, you know, I tell him, you know, there was a guy there in the bar that was sitting, he was asking for a drink, and we cannot move and that's why he stayed sitting there.

And the other guy they moved from the table to the bar, asking things, you know, and back to the beer -- I don't know what he was, you know, really. I don't remember. I was right there.

And that's the only thing I explained to the inspector, you know, that the reason that I stayed that hour was we were going to close at 1:00 that night, you know. And that's the only, I can explain, you know, and I say, you know, that it was wrong I find out. But I do it because I feel like we can use that hour. That's the only situation that crossed my mind.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Anything else
that you wish to say, sir?
MR. AYALA: What?
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Anything else you want to say?

MR. AYALA: No.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Ms. Jordan, do you have any questions that you want to ask Mr. Ayala?

MS. JORDAN: Yes, Mr. Chairperson. I just have a couple questions.

CROSS-EXAMINATION
BY MS. JORDAN:
Q First I wanted to ask Mr. Ayala, how has the ABRA been communicating with you regarding this ongoing case?

A What? Could you repeat again? How?
Q Yes. What method has ABRA used to communicate with you regarding this case?

A Well, they send a letter you know, they come in with the letter to the restaurant.

Q Has ABRA also been communicating with you by email?

A Yes, lately, yes. I consented in that case through this time, you know, they communicated with the email.

MS. JORDAN: No further questions, Mr. Chairperson. Thank you.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Any other questions by any of the Board members? Mr. Ayala, how long has your restaurant been open? How long has this establishment been open?

MR. AYALA: It's been open 17 years.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Seventeen years.

MR. AYALA: Yes.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: And were you aware of COVID?

MR. AYALA: Yes.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Were you aware of the --

MR. AYALA: (Simultaneous speaking.)
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: I'm sorry, you said what?

MR. AYALA: I say in fact, $I$ get COVID one month later, and $I$ stayed 14 days in the hospital.

## CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: I'm sorry to

 hear that, sir. Were you aware of the restrictions that the Government and the mayor and now ABRA imposed based on COVID tobusinesses? Were you aware of those restrictions?

MR. AYALA: Yes, yes.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: So how were you aware of these restrictions, sir?

MR. AYALA: Well, I don't remember, but $I$ hear on the news, and $I$ read it in the media, you know, in Facebook, things like that, you know, showing another person, and I get it from there. But I don't remember exactly how I get it, but $I$ got it.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: So tell me technically, prior to COVID, what were your hours? Tell me about your restaurant. How did your establishment operate prior to COVID?

MR. AYALA: Well, we open, very normally, we open at 11:00 and we close at 2:00 in the morning Sunday through Thursday and Friday and Saturday until 3:00 in the morning.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: And so during COVID, what were your hours?

MR. AYALA: It was different times because sometimes in the beginning we opened for carry-out. But then, you know, after, you know, the 23 rd of December, it was only carry-out. We
decide to close the whole place for a month, you know, a whole month until January, I think, it was 22 of this year.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: So --
MR. AYALA: From December 21, mm-hmm.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: So how did you know you could only do carry-out? How did you know -- who told you you could -- I mean, you established -- you were running your establishment and people were able to come in and sit and buy food, is that correct, prior to COVID? Is that correct?

MR. AYALA: Yes.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: So how did you know you could only do carry-out?

MR. AYALA: I hear the news, you know, and I take it from the internet, you know, the information, you know.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: So you used that information --

MR. AYALA: Everybody knows, you know, that it is going to be like that when the mayor say, you know, it's going to be only open for carry-out.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: So everybody
knew that the mayor said that you could only do carry-out. Is that correct?

MR. AYALA: Yes, yes.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: And is it correct that everybody knew that the mayor said what time you could close your business?

MR. AYALA: Yes. I expected that. I explained what was my situation, you know, that I get confused about the change in hours. Because always, always, you know, we used that hour before the COVID.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right. So why did you close your business down for a significant period of time? Why did you do that? MR. AYALA: Because there was no business. You know, we can't survive, you know, paying a cook, paying a waitress to take the orders, you know, and stay for 10 hours open doing $\$ 50$ carry-outs a day because it was prior time, you know, we were open for the carry-out. So the time I decide to close because -- first of all, I was sick. I was in the hospital in December. So I decide to close it because, you know, there was not much business for carry-out. CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Ms. Jordan, any
questions you wish to ask the licensee based on the questions that the Board asked?

MS. JORDAN: No, Mr. Chairperson.
Thank you.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right.
Thank you. All right. Thank you. That's all you have to say, Mr. Ayala?

MR. AYALA: Yes.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right. Thank you. All right. Does the Government wish to make a closings statement?

MS. JORDAN: Yes, Mr. Chairperson.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Go ahead, ma'am.

## CLOSING STATEMENTS

MS. JORDAN: The Government has proven by a preponderance of the evidence that the licensee violated the mayor's orders and served alcohol in closed containers.

We heard from Investigator Puente that on Sunday, November 1, 2020, Investigator Puente and Supervisory Investigator Brashears were monitoring establishments along 14th Street Northwest when they observed a crowd inside of La Molienda at approximately 12:30 a.m.

They entered and observed patrons sitting at tables that were less than 6 feet apart and had more than six patrons at a table. They also observed patrons sitting at a staffed bar and being served alcoholic beverages at the table in the bar.

Investigator Puente has also pointed this out to us today through the exhibits that were attached to his investigative report.

We also heard from Investigator Puente that he advised the owner of the time and that under the mayor's orders the establishment had to stop selling, serving and allowing consumption of alcohol at midnight.

Further, when Investigator Puente asked to see the reservation log, none could be provided. Investigator Puente stated and described in photos of the incident that the establishment was serving alcohol in closed containers.

The Government has therefore proven the charge in the Notice to Show Cause. The Government recommends that the Board apply a penalty consistent with DC Code Section 25-830. Thank you.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Mr. Ayala, this is your chance to tell us what is it you want the Board to do?

MR. AYALA: Well, first of all, you know, there was a submission, the order, you know, what the Ms. Jordan say, you know, of the Inspector Puente asked for it, we don't find it. But we have it. But then we find it and provide it next -- we do have the numbers and names. But the waitress puts them where, you know, and they keep it in the basement because they fill all the book. And we find it. At that time when Mr. Puente was there, we don't find it, you know, but we do have it. We do have it.

To me I can ask, you know, to avoid the fine, you know, because I just asked you because we have difficult, difficult times to stay in business. And some mistake that I do in 17 years, that's what $I$ ask if we can avoid it.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right.
Thank you. The record is now closed. And do the parties wish to file proposed Findings of Fact and Conclusions of Law or waive their right to do so?

Meaning, at least for you, Mr. Ayala,
do you want the Board to make a decision on what was presented today? That's short -- that's what I'm asking that we make a decision. The record is now closed, and the Board will make a decision on what penalties, if any, we will impose on your establishment? Yes?

No, we're not making a decision. I'm just saying that the record is now closed and do you wish us now to proceed to make a decision on what was presented today? I'm waiting for an answer from you, Mr. Ayala.

MR. AYALA: Oh, I'm sorry. I don't know about that, you know.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Just, yes, your response is yes. The record is closed. The record is now closed. And you're not going to file any other paperwork, you just want the board to move forward to make a decision based on what was presented today and what Ms. Jordan presented today?

MR. AYALA: Yes.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Okay. All
right. And I know that when I deal with nonattorneys, I try to be as flexible as possible, Ms. Jordan, and to explain to them the process.

So I hope you recognize what I'm doing. Okay. All right. The record is now closed.

All right. So let me close the record and -- all right. Hold on one minute, please.

As Chairperson of the Alcoholic
Beverage Control Board for the District of Columbia in accordance with DC Official Code Section 2574(b) of the Open Meetings Act, I move that ABC Board hold a closed meeting for the purpose of seeking legal advice from our counsel on Case Number 20-CIT-00569, La Molienda, pursuant to DC Official Code Section 2574(b)(4) of the Open Meetings Act and deliberating upon 20-CIT-00569, La Molienda, for the reasons cited in DC Official Code Section 2574(b)(13) of the Open Meetings Act. Is there a second?

MEMBER CROCKETT: Ms. Crockett
seconds.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Ms. Crockett has seconded the motion. We will now have a roll call vote on the motion. Mr. Short?

MEMBER SHORT: Mr. Short, I agree.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Mr. Cato?
MEMBER CATO: Bobby Cato, I agree.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Ms. Crockett?

MEMBER CROCKETT: Rafi Crockett, I agree.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Ms. Hansen? MEMBER HANSEN: Jeni Hansen, I agree. CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Mr. Grandis? MEMBER GRANDIS: Edward Grandis, I agree.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: And Mr. Anderson, $I$ agree. As it appears that the motion has passed, $I$ hereby give notice that ABC Board will recess these proceedings to hold a closed meeting in the ABC Board Conference Room pursuant to Section 2574(b) of the Open Meetings Act.

I want to thank everyone for their presentation today. The Board will issue a decision within 90 days, Mr. Ayala. So we will issue a decision within 90 days what the final determination will be regarding this case? Okay? MR. AYALA: Okay. CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Thank you very much, sir. Have a great day.

MR. AYALA: You, too.
MS. JORDAN: Thank you.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Thank you, Ms. Jordan.
