3	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Our final case
4	for the afternoon is Case No. 20-PRO-00047,
5	Handle 19, License No. 117027. Ms. Andrews, can
6	you please elevate the rights of the parties in
7	this case, please?
8	MS. ANDREWS: Sure, stand by. Mr.
9	Thomas, your rights have been elevated. Mr.
10	August, your line has been unmuted. Mr. Shane
11	August, your rights have been elevated.
12	MR. AUGUST: Thank you. Thank you
13	guys.
14	MS. ANDREWS: Mr. Wise, your rights
15	have been elevated. Ms. Morin-Burns, your rights
16	have been elevated.
17	MS. MORIN-BURNS: Thank you.
18	MS. ANDREWS: Mr. Dansby, your rights
19	have been elevated. Mr. Jayaraman, I'm not sure
20	if I pronounced it right, please forgive me, your
21	rights have been elevated. Mr. Bhadelia, your
22	rights have been elevated. And Ms. Kaufman, your
23	rights have been elevated. That's all, Mr.
24	Chair.
25	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Thank you. I'll

have the parties identify themselves for the 1 record. Let's start with the Licensee. 2 3 MR. THOMAS: Good morning. Ian Thomas, 4 attorney for the Applicant. 5 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Is the Licensee here with you, Mr. Thomas? 6 7 MR. THOMAS: He should be on the line. 8 Mr. Shane August and Mr. Rudy August. 9 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Can they 10 identify themselves for the record, please? 11 MR. AUGUST: Yes. Good afternoon. 12 Shane August, President of Handle 19. S-H-A-N-E 13 last name August like the month, A-U-G-U-S-T. 14 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Who else? 15 MR. AUGUST: No one else at the moment. 16 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: So let's start 17 with the ANC. They're one of the Protestants, 18 the ANC, is that correct? You need to turn your, 19 I'm sorry. We can't hear you. Yes, go ahead, 20 sir. I can't hear you, sir. Still can't hear 21 you. 22 MR. JAYARAMAN: I'm having difficulties 23 on my computer so I'm calling in, so I'd ask for 24 a number starting with --25 MS. ANDREWS: We can hear you.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: I can hear you. 1 2 I can hear you. Spell your first and last name, 3 sir. 4 MR. JAYARAMAN: Sure. First name is 5 Chandler, C-H-A-N-D-E-R, last name is Jayaraman, J-A-Y-A-R-A-M-A-N. I am representing Advisory 6 7 Neighborhood Commission 6B. 8 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Can we have the 9 I think it's the Wise group? Can you group? 10 introduce the group, sir? 11 MR. WISE: I'm here, Brian Wise, but 12 the designee is now Liz Burns, who I believe is 13 also on the line. Can you hear me? 14 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Okay. 15 MR. WISE: Okay. 16 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: I'm sorry. Who 17 is with you, Mr. Wise? MR. WISE: So I'm here. Liz Burns is 18 19 the designee for the group of 15, and I believe 20 she is on the line, as well. 21 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Ms. Burns, can 22 you please identify yourself for the record, 23 please? 24 MS. MORIN-BURNS: Yes, I can. Just for 25 clarification, my legal last name is Morin, M-O-

1	R-I-N, but I go by my married name of Burns		
2	socially. This is Elizabaeth Morin.		
3	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: I'm sorry, Ms.		
4	Morin-Burns. I apologize, tell me the name		
5	MS. MORIN-BURNS: It's a legal hearing,		
6	sir. I just want to make sure there's no issues		
7	that would cause us to get tripped up later on		
8	because the name is wrong or hyphenated and it's		
9	not the right legal name. My legal name is		
10	Elizabaeth Morin, but you can call me Elizabaeth		
11	Morin-Burns socially.		
12	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Okay, thanks.		
13	Who else is here for the group?		
14	MS. MORIN-BURNS: We have several from		
15	the group of 14. Wuhan Dansby should be on the		
16	line. We have Mark Burns, who is sitting right		
17	here next to me.		
18	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Well, I need		
19	them to identify themselves.		
20	MR. BURNS: Hello. My name is Mark		
21	Burns, M-A-R-K B-U-R-N-S.		
22	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Who else?		
23	MS. MORIN-BURNS: They are not with me,		
24	but they have called in separately.		
25	MR. DANSBY: This is Wuhan Dansby.		

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Hold on. 1 You 2 said Mr. Wuhan Dansby? Go ahead. 3 MS. MORIN-BURNS: Wuhan, yes. I'll let 4 all of the others identify themselves. 5 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Go ahead, Mr. Dansby. 6 7 MS. WISE: This is Carolyn Wise. 8 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: I'm sorry, hold 9 Let's back up. Mr. Dansby, can you please on. 10 identify yourself for the record and please spell 11 your name? 12 MR. DANSBY: Sure, it's Wuhan, W-U-H-A-13 N D-A-N-S-B-Y. 14 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Who else do we 15 have? 16 MS. WISE: This is Carolyn Wise, C-A-R-17 O-L-Y-N W-I-S-E. 18 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Who else do we 19 have? 20 DUNNIELA KAUFMAN: Dunniela Kaufman, D-21 U-N-N-I-E-L-A K-A-U-F-M-A-N. 22 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Who else do we 23 have? Ms. Morin-Burns, were there other folks 24 who identified themselves in the chat who had to 25 leave?

1	MS. MORIN-BURNS: Yeah, I believe there	
2	were some other that identified themselves on the	
3	chat that may have had to leave. Thomas Palmerly	
4	may have been one of them.	
5	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Can you spell,	
6	if you know, let me see. Hold on. I'm trying to	
7	see if I can read the chat.	
8	MS. MORIN-BURNS: But if not, I believe	
9	we have a couple of extras just as security in	
10	the event the other five did not show. I think	
11	we've actually hit our legal five requirement.	
12	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: We only need	
13	four members you only had to have four members	
14	today, and you have identified Mark Burns, Wuhan	
15	Dansby, Carolyn Wise and Kaufman. You have now	
16	provided the requisite group, so I make a motion	
17	that standing be granted to the Morin group. I	
18	make a motion that we officially grant full	
19	standing to the Morin group. Is there a second?	
20	MEMBER SHORT: Mr. Short, I second.	
21	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Mr. Short has	
22	second the motion. We will now have a roll call	
23	vote on the motion that has been properly second	
24	by Mr. Short. Mr. Short?	
25	MEMBER SHORT: Mr. Short, I agree.	
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1	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Mr. Cato?	
2	MEMBER CATO: Bobby Cato, I agree.	
3	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Ms. Crockett?	
4	MEMBER CROCKETT: Rafi Crockett, I	
5	agree.	
6	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Ms. Hansen?	
7	MEMBER SHORT: Jeni Hansen, I agree.	
8	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Mr. Grandis?	
9	MEMBER GRANDIS: Ed Grandis, I agree.	
10	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Mr. Anderson, I	
11	agree. The matter passes 6-0-0 so standing has	
12	now been granted to that group of five or more.	
13	Ms. Morin is the designated representative for	
14	this group. Are there any preliminary matters	
15	that needs to be brought to the Board's	
16	attention?	
17	MS. MORIN-BURNS: No.	
18	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Mr. Thomas?	
19	MR. JAYARAMAN: Mr. Anderson, this is	
20	Commissioner Chander Jayaraman.	
21	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Oh I'm sorry,	
22	Mr. Jayaraman. I'm sorry, go ahead, I apologize.	
23	MR. JAYARAMAN: No need to apologize.	
24	We do want to note that there are also abutting	
25	neighbors who are also Protestants on the case	

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that are on the line. I'm not sure if you want 1 2 to recognize them first before I speak to our 3 request that we filed today for a motion for 4 continuance. 5 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Hold on a minute. Mr. Thomas, from your perspective, who 6 7 was protesting this license? MR. THOMAS: It's my understanding that 8 9 the Protestants for this license are ANC 6B, the 10 group of five that the administration just recognized, and then two abutting neighbors. 11 One 12 Mr. Bhadelia, who I see on the line, and another, 13 Mr. Moynahan who I do not see on the line, 14 although he operates through a power of attorney. 15 The power of attorney may be on the line. 16 To the extent that the abutting 17 neighbor that Mr. Moynahan or the person who he represents isn't on the line, though, we would 18 19 request dismissal of this matter for failure to 20 appear at a status hearing. 21 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Is Mr. Moynahan 22 represented? Did Mr. Moynahan appear today? 23 MS. MORIN-BURNS: He may have left 24 early and left a message in the chat. Can you 25 check the chat?

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1	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: I'm trying to	
2	MR. THOMAS: He may have referenced	
3	that he is the power of attorney for Mr. Quetsch.	
4	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: I'm not being as	
5	successful as I need to be in reading the chats.	
6	If someone can look at the chat to see what is it	
7	that Mr. Moynahan has stated?	
8	MS. MORIN-BURNS: If he's not in the	
9	chat room, he lives right next door to us so	
10	we're going to have my husband run down and grab	
11	him on the phone.	
12	MEMBER CROCKETT: Mr. Chairman, this is	
13	Rafi. I do not see that name in the chat.	
14	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: So his name is	
15	not in the chat, so therefore unless where is	
16	Mr. Bhadelia?	
17	MR. BHADELIA: Good afternoon. I'm	
18	here.	
19	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Can you state	
20	and spell your name for the record, please?	
21	MR. BHADELIA: Yes, absolutely. I'm an	
22	abutting property owner and my name is Ahmed A-H-	
23	M-E-D last name Bhadelia, B-H-A-D-E-L-I-A.	
24	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: This is being	
25	protested by the ANC, the group of five or more,	

Mr. Bhadelia. Unless we hear from Mr. Moynahan 1 2 within the next two to three minutes, I'm going 3 to dismiss Mr. Moynahan. MR. JAYARAMAN: Mr. Chairman, we would 4 5 object --MR. BHADELIA: I would just ask for --6 7 MR. JAYARAMAN: -- to the dismissal of 8 an abutting neighbor who is situated directly 9 behind this establishment. 10 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Mr. Jayaraman --11 I should know how to pronounce your name, so I 12 don't know why I'm having a problem today. 13 MR. JAYARAMAN: Three syllables, Jay-14 ra-man. 15 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Jay-ra-man. Mr. 16 Jayaraman, as you know this matter was scheduled 17 for a hearing at 1:30. I have been very 18 accommodating. I've made it known to parties 19 that if for some reason you are unable to 20 participate, you can't stay on the line, identify 21 yourself in the chat to say I was here and I had 22 an emergency, I had to leave. You can't do that 23 in court. 24 MS. MORIN-BURNS: I apologize. I have an email from Mr. Moynahan. I think it may have 25

been an error on my part. He details me some language that he thought could be inserted into this meeting. I think he thought that if he just sent that to me that he was going to be okay and didn't have to attend. He's an older gentleman. He's in his 90s, so I apologize. There may just be a little bit of a hangup, but again, he lives right next door.

9 My husband is on the call and he's 10 going to try and knock on the door and get him to 11 at least wave his hand and say hello. I know 12 that you gave the party from Georgetown nearly 45 13 minutes to be able to get their people squared 14 away, so would appreciate about a five-minute 15 pause just to ensure that we can have all parties 16 taken care of.

17 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: I gave the 18 people from Georgetown almost 45 minutes because 19 they were having technical issues in getting 20 online. No one had to go search for someone. 21 That's why I said, so I don't have -- it's not a 22 matter -- they were having technical difficulties 23 and what I was doing was working with the people 24 who were having technical difficulties. I think 25 it's unfair for me to wait here for you to go

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knock on someone's door to say oh by the way. 1 Ι 2 apologize that he's 90 years old, but that's not 3 -- so unless --MR. WISE: To be fair, we've been 4 5 waiting for two and a half hours. MR. THOMAS: Can I chime in, please, 6 7 because --8 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Hold on, hold 9 on, hold on --10 MR. THOMAS: -- because --11 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Hold on, hold 12 I'm sorry to cut you off. I'm sorry to come on. 13 off this way. This is very trying for all of us. 14 I have been sitting in front of this screen since 15 9:30 this morning, okay? I have been doing that. 16 So don't tell me that you're doing it for two and 17 a half hours. I've been flexible by saying if 18 you can't wait online, just put on the chat that 19 you were online and that you had to go. 20 If this was not in a person and if you 21 were not there, I would dismiss your case, but I 22 gave options. So if you guys knew that this 23 person wasn't going to be there, you could have 24 had him sign in and say to him that just sign in 25 and then you can go on with your happy life. If

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he's not here, and I'm going to make the motion, 1 2 and if he appears before we vote, yes, he'll 3 still have standing. But I'm going to make a 4 motion to the Board that Mr. Moynahan be 5 dismissed from this proceeding. Is there a --MS. MORIN-BURNS: Can you please have 6 7 your IT support ensure that -- my husband was 8 calling in --9 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: I'm sorry, do 10 what? 11 MS. MORIN-BURNS: My husband should be 12 trying to call in from his phone from the 13 neighbor's. Can you check with your IT support 14 to ensure that Mark Burns' call is not being 15 ignored? MS. ANDREWS: There's the one call-in 16 17 number and that is Mr. Chander. 18 MS. MORIN-BURNS: It would probably be 19 a WebEx. MEMBER CROCKETT: I second the motion. 20 21 MR. WISE: I think a lot of the 22 assumptions here are because we're assuming that 23 everyone is tech savvy. Mr. Moynahan is 24 representing the abutting neighbor. He has the 25 power of attorney.

MR. THOMAS: I fail to see why any of 1 2 the party of five has standing to make any 3 argument on behalf of Mr. Moynahan. They are not 4 his representatives. It's actually not legal for 5 them to make representations for him. Their motion has been made by the Board. It has been 6 7 seconded. It should be voted on. This is now outrageous. We are now three hours into this. 8 9 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: So I made a I think Ms. Crockett had second the 10 motion. 11 I'm going to have a roll call vote -motion. 12 MR. WISE: It's discriminatory against 13 people that are elderly that don't know how to 14 use the technology. That's the problem. We're 15 asking for a little bit of recognition that if we have to cite ADA --16 17 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Who's speaking? 18 MR. WISE: It's Brian Wise. CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Mr. Wise --19 MR. WISE: A little bit of 20 21 accommodation due to ADA for people who don't 22 know how to use technology. 23 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Mr. Wise --24 MS. MORIN-BURNS: I have Mr. Quetsch, 25 who is online.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: I'm sorry, I'm 1 2 Mr. Wise? Mr. Wise. sorry. 3 (Simultaneous speaking.) CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Ms. Morin, hold 4 5 The representation that was made on please. before was not that Mr. Moynahan had issues with 6 7 technology, not that Mr. Moynahan was 90 years 8 old. The representation that was made by Ms. 9 Morin was that he thought he could put in a 10 statement and by putting that statement that 11 would be sufficient. That was her 12 representation. 13 I do not want anyone to state that the 14 ABC Board is not being accommodating to someone 15 who is not tech savvy or for someone who has ADA. 16 That's not the representation. 17 MR. WISE: May I respond to that? 18 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Yes, sir. 19 MR. WISE: Your remedy for not being 20 present was to enter something into the chat log. 21 If someone doesn't know how to use the chat log, 22 that is due to age or due to any protected class, 23 that would be a reason for giving them an 24 accommodation. 25 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: I have been very

accommodating for this entire hearing, but I was 1 never told he was on the line. What I was told, 2 he thought he could put in a statement and that 3 was sufficient. When it was told that was not 4 5 sufficient, it's like let me run next door to go get him. I don't want to hear that we're being 6 7 discriminatory. That is not the case. Even if he doesn't have his own 8 9 standing, he can join in with the group. His 10 rights can be covered by any of the parties. Is 11 Mr. Moynahan on the line? Is he there? Is he 12 there? MS. MORIN-BURNS: This is a reminder. 13 14 I have the abutting neighbor on my phone right 15 here on video. 16 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: The question I'm 17 asking, is Mr. Moynahan there? If Mr. Moynahan 18 is there, can he identify himself for the record? 19 MS. MORIN-BURNS: Mr. Moynahan is the 20 power of attorney for Mr. Quetsch. Mr. Quetsch 21 is on the phone right here. 22 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Hold on, I'm 23 Hold on, Ms. Morin. Have you -- hold on, sorry. 24 hold on, hold on. Has Mr. Moynahan prior to this 25 hearing provided this power of attorney to the

ABC Board to say someone else is representing 1 Has that been done? 2 him? 3 MR. THOMAS: It has not. MS. MORIN-BURNS: Mr. Moynahan is the 4 5 power of attorney for Mr. Quetsch, who is the abutting neighbor. Mr. Moynahan is not here. 6 7 Mr. Quetsch is. He is the abutting neighbor. 8 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: I'm sorry, I'm 9 sorry. Mr. Thomas, I was not at the roll call 10 hearing. Who is Mr. Moynahan from your 11 perspective, sir? 12 MR. THOMAS: My understanding is that 13 Mr. Moynahan is a power of attorney for whoever 14 the resident is. I have never seen a power of 15 attorney. I do not believe one was provided with 16 his protest letter. I also for that matter do 17 not believe that any of the group of five is 18 permitted legally to represent him or to bring 19 him on through a cell phone. I agree with the 20 Board's perspective that his rights are 21 represented by the ANC, which is here protesting. 22 There is a group of five that is protesting, as 23 well, as well as another abutting neighbor. We 24 have been here a long time and if he doesn't 25 show, he doesn't show.

MS. MORIN-BURNS: I have the actual 1 2 neighbor on video available to speak. 3 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Who is the 4 neighbor? Who's that? 5 MS. MORIN-BURNS: His name is Walter Quetsch. He is the owner of the abutting 6 7 property. 8 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: And who was at 9 the roll call hearing? 10 MS. MORIN-BURNS: Mr. Moynahan, who was 11 his representative. 12 MR. WISE: His power of attorney was 13 registered with --14 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Mr. Thomas, are 15 you an attorney, sir? 16 MR. THOMAS: I am. 17 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Mr. Thomas, was 18 Mr. Moynahan as the representative of Mr. 19 Quetsch, was he provided -- did the Board's agent 20 grant him status as an abutting property owner at 21 the roll call hearing? 22 MR. THOMAS: It was some status. Т don't remember if it was conditional or not. 23 24 MR. BHADELIA: Excuse me, Mr. Chairman. 25 I was at the hearing.

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1	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Who's speaking?	
2	Who is speaking?	
3	MR. BHADELIA: This is Ahmed Bhadelia.	
4	I am the other abutting property owner. I live	
5	next to Mr. Quetsch. I was at the roll call	
6	hearing and I'm happy to sign under penalty of	
7	perjury that I was at the hearing and Mr. Quetsch	
8	was provided status as an abutting property	
9	owner, not conditionally.	
10	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: But I'm saying	
11	Mr. Quetsch was, but was Mr. Quetsch at the	
12	hearing or was Mr. Moynahan at the hearing?	
13	MR. BHADELIA: Mr. Moynahan was	
14	representing Mr. Quetsch as the power of	
15	attorney.	
16	MR. WISE: And that was registered in	
17	the protest letter that was originally filed with	
18	the ABRA Board.	
19	MR. THOMAS: With all due respect, I	
20	object to every single one of these other	
21	Protestants representing the rights of another	
22	Protestant. They're not permitted to represent	
23	the right of an abutting property owner. The	
24	complaining property owner has to represent	
25	themselves. So with all due respect, I	

understand what they're doing. I don't fault 1 2 them for it, but they can't represent his rights 3 here. They can't vitiate his rights here. Ι 4 don't --MS. MORIN-BURNS: No issues with our 5 representation. He's right here to represent 6 7 himself. 8 MR. THOMAS: Excuse me, I'm speaking. 9 MR. WISE: He's on the phone. 10 MR. THOMAS: Again, I'm speaking. I'm 11 lodging my objection for the record. There's a 12 court reporter here. I'd like to have the 13 opportunity to speak. Thank you very much. I do 14 not believe that any of these other people have 15 the ability to represent his rights. This hearing was called almost 20 minutes ago and the 16 17 abutting property owner was not here. Under the 18 DC Municipal regulations he should be dismissed 19 for failing to appear. MR. BHADELIA: Mr. Chairman, with all 20 21 due respect, I live next to Mr. Quetsch. He is 22 significantly -- he is an older gentleman. Ι have to help him many, many times here as one of 23 24 his neighbors. You yourself said if he appears, 25 which he has, before ABRA is to vote, then you

would count him. He has appeared. 1 I think it 2 would be a miscarriage of justice, frankly, if 3 you were not to include him. His representative 4 showed up at the status hearing as well as at the 5 mediation. We have him right here for you to consider for his status. 6 7 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: So we're saying 8 that Mr. Quetsch is there? 9 MR. BHADELIA: That is correct, as the 10 video is showing. I apologize for cutting you 11 off. 12 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: So can Mr. 13 Quetsch identify himself for the record, please? 14 MS. MORIN-BURNS: Honey, can you put 15 Mr. Quetsch on the phone and let him identify himself for the record? 16 17 MR. QUETSCH: Hello. MS. MORIN-BURNS: Hold on one second. 18 19 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Can you identify 20 yourself, sir? 21 MR. QUETSCH: Do you have a question? 22 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Can you identify 23 yourself for the record, sir, please? 24 MR. BURNS: Yes, sir. You just need to 25 give your first and last name.

MR. QUETSCH: My first and last name. 1 2 I'm Walter Quetsch Q-U-E-T-S-C-H, 310 C Street 3 Southeast. CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: I'm trying to 4 get some clarification. 5 The information I was provided was that Walter B. Quetsch was granted 6 7 standing and that Mr. Eric Moynahan has the power 8 of attorney for this person. Because Mr. Quetsch 9 is here and Mr. Moynahan -- I will move forward with standing. 10 11 MS. MORIN-BURNS: Thank you. 12 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: So standing is 13 provided to ANC, the group of five, Mr. Bhadelia, 14 and Mr. Quetsch. All right? 15 MR. THOMAS: Just for the record, I 16 just want to note my objection that the failure 17 to appear should have resulted in dismissal and 18 that Mr. Quetsch cannot be represented by these 19 other Protestants. I understand their position, 20 but I just want to note my objection for the 21 record. 22 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: That's alright 23 if you want to put something on the record, Mr. 24 Thomas, but what I've had now, it was confirmed 25 that at the roll call hearing Mr. Quetsch was

provided standing as an abutting property owner and that a power of attorney was issued to the Agency by Mr. Moynahan. That was confirmed by the Agency that that was presented at the roll call hearing.

I know that I was making a motion and there was some confusion, but we didn't vote on the motion because of all the confusion and based on the time, Mr. Quetsch appeared personally for this hearing.

11 MR. THOMAS: I understand that. Mv 12 concern is this. I have never seen Mr. Quetsch 13 personally and what we have had is another 14 Protestant holding up a cell phone with a video 15 fo someone else. I do not know who that person 16 is. I cannot confirm who that person is. While 17 I don't try to ascribe ulterior motives to any of 18 the other Protestants, I do think that the rules 19 are clear that you need to be physically present.

I understand we live in a time where being physically present with one another is not actually possible. I understand that we have to appear virtually, but what we now have is not just virtual appearance but it's virtual appearance through another virtual appearance by

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doing some sort of video on an iPhone. 1 The 2 decision is going to be the decision, but because 3 I don't know where this is going to go, I just want to note my objection for the record, our 4 5 objection for the record, that the non-appearance did not result in a dismissal. 6 7 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: I'm sorry. 8 Thank you for that, Mr. Thomas. I appreciate it. 9 As an attorney, we all have to zealously 10 represent the rights of our clients, and I 11 appreciate that. The record is noted. 12 MR. JAYARAMAN: Mr. Donovan, this is 13 Chander Jayaraman. I appreciate your consideration of the technical and the conditions 14 15 that we are operating under, which are definitely 16 unorthodox. So I appreciate your leadership and 17 your willingness to ensure that nobody is disenfranchised in this case. So I'm grateful to 18 19 you, sir. 20 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Thank you, Mr. 21 I do take what you say seriously, Mr. Jayaraman. 22 Thomas, and I appreciate that. I think, Mr. 23 Jayaraman, you said you had a preliminary matter 24 that you want the Board to address.

MR. JAYARAMAN: Yeah. ANC 6B filed a

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motion for a continuance in the form of a letter today with ABRA Legal, as well as served all the parties, particularly Mr. Thomas was served with those papers via electronic mail. If that is a preliminary matter, we would ask that the ABC Board grant the motion for continuance.

7 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Mr. Jayaraman, 8 your motion is premature. The reason your motion 9 is premature is because we have not scheduled 10 this matter for a hearing. I do not have a date 11 for the hearing. Maybe on the original protest 12 status information that there is a hearing, but 13 there is no hearing scheduled for this case.

14 MR. JAYARAMAN: Yeah, in the original 15 notice the protest hearing was scheduled for 16 January 6th, and that is the assumption under 17 which I was working off of and it is based on 18 that information that we submitted this motion 19 for continuance.

20 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Yes, sir. As I 21 stated, your motion is premature because the 22 hearing has not been scheduled. I am not able to 23 provide a date for hearing today. We will reach 24 out to the parties and advise them when this 25 matter will be scheduled for a protest hearing.

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There is no reason for us to address your motion 1 2 because there is no hearing scheduled currently. 3 As I stated before, the Board is unable to provide a date today when the hearing 4 5 However, we will reach out to the parties is. shortly to provide them with a date for the 6 7 protest hearing, okay? Are there any other 8 preliminary matters --9 MR. JAYARAMAN: Mr. Chairman, point of clarification. Do we need to withdraw that 10 11 letter? 12 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: You can withdraw 13 it. Why don't you just send in an email? Let me 14 say it this way. You can make a motion to 15 withdraw the letter so that we don't have to 16 respond to it. We normally respond to everything that we get, so if you are making an oral motion 17 to withdraw your letter, it will be withdrawn. 18 19 MR. JAYARAMAN: Well I certainly would like the contents of the letter to be considered 20 21 in terms of the scheduling, so I'm not sure 22 whether I should withdraw it or not. CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Your letter 23 24 stated that the hearing was going to be January 25 6th and it's not scheduled for January 6th.

MR. JAYARAMAN: It further states that 1 2 we would request that it be scheduled for no 3 earlier than February 1 of 2021. That's the key 4 point there. 5 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: That's something that -- the ABC Board/Agency will provide some 6 7 dates for the hearing. If the parties want us to 8 move it to a different date by mutual consent we 9 will move it. What I would ask you to do, I'll 10 ask that you withdraw your motion. Once we issue 11 a notice, if that date does not work then we will 12 change it. I know the parties will jointly work 13 towards scheduling. 14 MR. JAYARAMAN: Yeah, there is a 15 logistical problem with that because that was the vote of ANC 6B. I would have to take a vote of 16 17 the commission in order to retract that, and we don't meet for another month. I will do my best 18 19 by next week when we have our executive committee 20 meeting to bring this up so that we can formally 21 withdraw that, because I can't do it unilaterally 22 and would have to get permission from the commission as a whole. 23 24 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: So you're saying 25 that you can't withdraw it. If you can't --

MR. JAYARAMAN: Not until next week, 1 2 sir. That's all. 3 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Fine. This is 4 actually the last meeting. I doubt it, but this 5 is actually the last meeting that we're supposed to have for the year. Maybe this is why this has 6 7 been such a trying day because we're not supposed 8 to -- as everyone knows, 2020 has been a trying 9 year for all of us in the world. I understand 10 why tempers are short. We are looking forward to 11 the end of 2020 and looking forward to 2021 where 12 we're hoping that things will get better. So 13 that's why --14 MR. THOMAS: Can I make a point --15 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Mr. Thomas, yes, 16 Mr. Thomas. I'm coming to you, Mr. Thomas. Ι 17 just realized this is actually our last scheduled 18 meeting for the year, so maybe this is why it has 19 been so trying today. Yes, Mr. Thomas? 20 MR. THOMAS: In the interest of just 21 trying to find a resolution that doesn't waste 22 the people's time, I would suggest that the motion be denied as moot and that the ANC, should 23 24 they wish to refile it, they can refile it at a 25 later date once the actual date is determined.

That would at least prevent the ANC from going 1 2 back and having to do their whole administrative process, but it would preserve their right to 3 seek the extension should they desire one once 4 5 the actual protest date is set. To me it seems to make the most sense. 6 7 MR. JAYARAMAN: Mr. Anderson, we would 8 prefer to withdraw it than having it be decided 9 to be -- that a vote be cast and we oppose that. 10 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Will you 11 withdraw your motion then, sir? 12 MR. JAYARAMAN: I will be glad to do 13 that once I get approval next Thursday at the 14 executive committee meeting, at which time I will 15 be able to bring it up with a quorum present and 16 I will be glad to do that, sir. 17 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Mr. Thomas, I 18 know that you have argued today. Are you -- I'm 19 trying to figure out the best way to do this to 20 see whether or not the Board should --21 MR. THOMAS: Here's my concern. Here's 22 really what my concern is. My concern is that if 23 there is a motion pending before the Board, I am 24 going to be inclined to protect my client's 25 rights to support some sort of opposition, which

is going to prejudice my client because my client is going to have to use the resources to oppose a motion which will likely end up being withdrawn.

So what I'm saying is that in order to 4 5 not prejudice us because of a premature motion, 6 it makes in my mind the most sense to everybody 7 to just deny it without prejudice as moot, and if the ANC wants to file it again you have me on 8 9 record saying they can file it again and we'll deal with it in the normal course. But I do not 10 11 see why we have to wait a week to find out if it 12 will, in fact, be withdrawn.

13 While Commissioner Jayaraman 14 represents that they intend to withdraw it, he 15 still needs to get the votes of his remaining ANC 16 counterparts. If they don't provide those votes 17 then I'm sitting here and I don't know whether to 18 oppose it. I may have to oppose it. It doesn't 19 seem to make a lot of sense. I know 2020 is not 20 the year where a lot of things make sense, so I'm 21 hoping maybe we can go out on a positive note? 22 But I just don't see a reason why this needs to 23 languish for a week.

24 MR. JAYARAMAN: It's not something that 25 the ABRA Board, since today is the last date of

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the meeting, it would not be something the Board
would even address until they return to session.
Is that correct, sir?

4 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: We have a 5 hearing and you have raised the motion. Mr. 6 Thomas, you have orally responded to the motion. 7 I'll say this to you, Mr. Thomas. You have 8 orally responded to the motion. Is that your 9 answer or do you want to write something? And 10 then I'll make a ruling.

11 MR. THOMAS: I got the motion 15 12 minutes before I logged onto this, which seems 13 like an eternity ago but it was only 15 minutes 14 before I logged on. Honestly, I don't 15 necessarily know that I need to write something, but I also haven't had a chance because I've been 16 17 on this call, to have a conversation with my client about whether he would want a more formal 18 19 response. I do not believe that their relief 20 sought is warranted right now for exactly the 21 reasons what were articulated previously about 22 there not being a date set anyway in the first 23 place.

I leave that on the record, but I don't want to waive a right to file a written

response because legally I don't have the 1 2 authority to do that on behalf of my client, and 3 I wouldn't want to deprive him of my counsel separate and apart from today's meeting. 4 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Mr. Thomas --5 MR. JAYARAMAN: Mr. Anderson, likewise, 6 7 I don't have the authority unilaterally to withdraw because --8 9 MR. THOMAS: Here's what I will do. We 10 will stand on the arguments that have been raised 11 here today by me in opposition to their request, 12 that it's premature, that a hearing hasn't been set and that it should be denied. 13 14 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: With that said, 15 I make a motion that we deny the motion as it 16 being premature because a hearing has not been 17 scheduled as yet. MEMBER CROCKETT: Ms. Crockett seconds. 18 19 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Ms. Crockett has second the motion. We'll have a roll call vote 20 21 on the motion that has been properly second by 22 Ms. Crockett. Mr. Short? 23 MEMBER SHORT: Mr. Short, I agree. 24 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Mr. Cato? 25 MEMBER CATO: Bobby Cato, I agree.

10	denied because it's moot, because a hearing has		
11	not been scheduled. It can be refiled once the		
12	hearing is scheduled. It's moot because there is		
13	no legal issue for you to request it, okay, sir?		
14	MR. JAYARAMAN: Thank you.		
15	MR. THOMAS: Thank you, Mr. Chair.		
16	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Are there any		
17	other preliminary matters that anyone wants to		
18	address?		
19	MR. THOMAS: Not at this time from the		
20	Applicant.		
21	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: From you, the		
22	ANC, Mr. Jayaraman?		
23	MR. JAYARAMAN: Not at this time, Mr.		
24	Chair.		
25	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: From the		
I	I		

1 abutting property owners? MR. BHADELIA: Not at this time. 2 Thank 3 you for your time. CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: From the group? 4 5 From the group? MS. MORIN-BURNS: Not at this time. 6 7 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Thank you. 8 Since everybody has been online, I don't need to 9 read the instructions anymore about how to do a 10 protest hearing, is that correct? Is that 11 correct? 12 MS. MORIN-BURNS: Correct. MR. JAYARAMAN: That is correct. 13 14 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Okay thank you. 15 Before I close this here and I'm taking a 16 personal (phone ringing) who's phone? I know 17 it's not my phone ringing. Everyone mute your 18 lines, please. I can tell whose line it is. If 19 I go on the second screen I can tell who is -- I 20 don't want to embarrass anyone by saying whose 21 phone is ringing because I can see whose 22 microphone is open. This is unrelated. Mr. 23 Jayaraman, are you no longer an ANC Commissioner? 24 MR. JAYARAMAN: I will not be an ANC 25 Commissioner as of December 31st.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: I just want to 1 2 thank you for your service to the residents of 3 the District of Columbia, sir. That is all I was 4 saying since I think I read that you're no longer 5 an ANC Commissioner. I want to thank everybody for -- this has been a long day and I would like 6 7 to thank everyone for their time and their 8 energy. 9 If the parties are able to settle this 10 matter, the Board supports settling the matter. 11 If the parties want to litigate this matter I 12 will see you in the new year when this matter 13 will be litigated. Thank you very much for your 14 participation today. Happy holidays. Have a 15 happy and safe holiday. On behalf of the Board, I hope that 2021 is much better for all of us 16 17 than 2020 was. Have a great day. Thank you. 18 MR. JAYARAMAN: Thank you for your kind 19 words, Mr. Chair, and happy holidays to the 20 entire Board, as well. 21 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Thank you, Mr. 22 Jayaraman. Thank you. 23 (Whereupon, the above-entitled matter 24 went off the record at 4:28 p.m.) 25
