5	on our Show Cause Hearing Calendar is Case No.
6	17-CMP-00621, Atlas Performing Arts Center,
7	License No. 85207.
8	Would the parties approach and
9	identify themselves for the record, please?
10	MR. CHATTRABHUTI: Good morning, Mr.
11	Chairman. Pete Chattrabhuti on behalf of the
12	District of Columbia.
13	MR. BURKA: Good morning.
14	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Hold on one
15	minute. Please, hold on. I'm sorry, go ahead.
16	MR. BURKA: Good morning, Mr. Chair.
17	Robert Burka for the Atlas.
18	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Good morning.
19	If you could get the microphone.
20	MR. BURKA: Robert Burka for the

includes Michael Lewis and on my far left is our

Chattrabhuti, you didn't introduce yourself.
MR. CHATTRABHUTI: Oh, yes, Pete

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Good morning.
Are there any preliminary matters in this case?
MR. CHATTRABHUTI: Yes, Mr. Chairman.

22	Thank you.

MR. BURKA: I'll try to remember to 1 2 stay seated. CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: 3 No. I --4 whatever makes you comfortable. 5 MR. LEWIS: Runs counter to all of his training. 6 But I'm saying 7 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: it's not -- you don't have to, but if it makes 8 9 you -- and I'll say this to you. I usually call 10 most people sir. I'm not very comfortable 11 calling folks by their first name. And it's just 12 the way I am, so I'm fine with that. Okay. 13 Thank you. So moved. 14 Any other stipulations, Mr. Chattrabhuti? 15 16 MR. CHATTRABHUTI: Not at this time. 17 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Now, well, why 18 are we here then? Why are we -- what are we --19 what's the purpose of this hearing? It's a Show 20 Cause Hearing. If the parties have stipulated to 21 the facts, so are we -- is the purpose of the

hearing the penalty phase? Is that what the

1	arguments are going to be?
2	MR. CHATTRABHUTI: That is the
3	District's understanding. I don't want to speak
4	for them.
5	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Yes, Mr. Burka,
6	tell me. Let me now what because if we are
7	stipulating to the facts, so why are we here
8	then?
9	MR. BURKA: Well, we are here with
LO	respect to hoping to get either an elimination or
L1	an abatement of the penalty, Your Honor.
L2	MEMBER SILVERSTEIN: You've got to
L3	speak up.
L4	MR. BURKA: You don't want me to stand
L5	up, but speak up.
L6	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: We need to
L7	your voice is being recorded, so make sure the
L8	microphone is used, yes.
L9	MR. BURKA: Okay. Your Honor, we
20	don't contest the underlying results of the
21	investigation. Indeed, as I indicated in the
22	letter I sent late last week, we conducted an

investigation and have found other shortcomings that we are trying to correct.

I have submitted a letter. If you wish, I have a hard copies of it with me to distribute in the event you didn't get it. But the bottom line, and by the way, if it will make your life easier, I could -- we could stipulate to the facts of this letter.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Right.

MR. BURKA: Or alternatively, I can call witnesses whom I have here with me now. But the bottom line is there is a new sheriff in down.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Okay.

MR. BURKA: We learned of these violations after the investigation. We were -- the person then in charge of our cafe --

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Let me -- I'm not trying to cut you off. I'm going to give you an opportunity, because I also read your letter. What is it in a sense of what is the recommendation? The Government is saying what's

What is the Government asking? So at least I'll know what it is, so if the Government is saying a \$10,000 fine and you are either saying I'm only going to pay -- I want to pay \$5,000 or I don't want to pay a fine. So at least I'll know what is it that, as far as the penalty stage, what it is and so therefore we will take in consideration. Yes, sir?

MR. BURKA: A number was given to us prior to my submitting a letter or developing the record that we are going to be talking about.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Right.

MR. BURKA: So I don't know what the District's recommendation is now.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: I don't know.

He needs to let me know, because I still don't know.

MR. BURKA: However, prior to the status conference on, I believe, February 7th, we were offered \$2,500 as a fine.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Is that still

the Government's position?

MR. CHATTRABHUTI: Yes. The -- as this is a second tier -- second primary tier violation, our recommendation would be between \$2,000 and \$4,000 to the Board's discretion.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: And so what is it that -- the argument that you are asking is that you are asking us, you are asking the Board -- and which I'm going to listen to it, but I just want to know what is it that I'm listening to to make a determination? So what is it that you are asking that the Board do as far as penalty?

MR. BURKA: We would love to have the penalty eliminated. We confess to having done what we did. We are trying to right the ship.

We are still in the investigatory stage and we have made great strides and we would hope the Board would take that into account by remembering that everything that we pay the Board in the form of a fine, comes with terrible contribution, which reduces our ability to help the community

and provide services to the community.

and I need to -- and I'll just let you know up front, I am not sure since you are guilty of the violation. I'm not sure if, from a legal perspective, the Board is empowered to eliminate the fine. I don't know. But that's something that our legal office will advise us to say whether or not that's -- even if the Board wants to do it, whether or not we are able to do that.

So you can make the arguments and then at the end of the arguments, then we will discuss it and make a determination what is it that we can or can't do. Okay?

MR. BURKA: Sure.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: So you can present the way you want to present then.

MR. BURKA: Well, do you want live witnesses or do you want --

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: It's -- you tell me how. I have read the letter, so you -- if you want to go through the letter just to put

it on the record to say what the position is and why is it that you are asking the Board not to fine you.

MR. BURKA: Well, let me just go through the letter very quickly --

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Sure.

MR. BURKA: -- without going into detail.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right.

MR. BURKA: The cafe -- our internal organization was different. The cafe was then under the direct supervision of our Executive Director, who frankly is spread very thinly. When he learned of the routine inspection in, I believe, mid-September of last year, he. the next day, met with the cafe manager. He learned what she had done, learned that she misunderstood what the rules were about whom she could acquire alcoholic beverages from and then he instructed her to please, obey the law. I mean, that's what we are supposed to be doing. And with that, he let her go, let her go on running the cafe.

She left in late December for reasons unrelated to what we're here for today. And we reorganized and put Mr. Gross, who is on my far left, in charge of the cafe directly. He has a background in alcohol beverage sales and management, both in the District and in Virginia. He is a licensed manager.

He conduct -- he has began an investigation in late December and is still conducting that investigation. We found a number of questionable actions, including possibly additional improper purchases from retailers.

We are trying to avoid these problems from occurring again. Among the problems we discovered were:

- (A) Continued sales from improper -improper purchases from retailers.
- (B) We discovered bad recordkeeping, which we are now straightening out.

We are -- he, basically, has opened up accounts with significant proper wholesalers and is insisting that all purchases come through his

office, so that no problems can occur.

He has also taken steps to have our internal financial people when they do their bookkeeping to be on the lookout for any improper purchases, so it can be reported to both me and to the Executive Director for action to be taken, including, if appropriate, reporting it to the Board.

He has also to ensure that we don't have a repeat of the problems that I heard earlier this morning, we are in the process of instituting a universal identification check for anyone trying to purchase alcoholic beverages.

We became aware of a voluntary agreement which will either terminate and then redo with the local ANC that they can do changes or alternatively, we are going to -- or alternatively, we will try to modify the current agreement. We haven't decided which.

We are still in the investigatory stage. To our knowledge, we are in compliance with all ABRA Regulations and we intend to stay

that way.

In addition, we met last week with the Assistant General Counsel, Mr. Berman, for the purpose of seeing how we could tweak this to be better and he gave us a number of suggestions, including, for example, the training programs that are available.

Mr. Gross has already signed up for the April 5th owner's training program in order to get more nuances about this. And in addition, we have gotten a bunch of guides, which we are now reading and following.

So as I said earlier, there is a new sheriff in town. We are trying to change -- to have a regime change. We are trying to avoid this from happening again.

My instruction from the board chair and from Mr. Lewis is we want to be good corporate citizens. We want to do not only well by the community, we want to do well by all legal requirements, both in letter and spirit.

So it's in that sense that we are here

and, you know, I suppose -- and again, we are 1 2 going to be reviewing things. If, for example, we see a receipt from a retail liquor store, we 3 4 are going to look into it. If it's a purchase of 5 a case of Coca-Cola and a bag of ice, I don't think we've got a problem. But we are going to 6 7 look into those kinds of things to make sure that's all it is and not an improper purchase. 8 9 So that's where we stand. We would 10 love to see the fine either eliminated or abated. 11 Again, it's not coming from my pocket. I appear 12 as a volunteer, so is Mr. Lewis, neither of us 13 are being compensated, but the bottom line is 14 that everything that we pay, there is going to be 15 something not available to help the community. 16 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Anything else 17 you want to say? Is that it? 18 MR. BURKA: Unless you want to hear 19 directly from our Vice Chair or from our 20 Director? 21 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: I mean, it's up 22 I'll -- if they are going to say to you.

Α 10 Could you state your name and Q 11 occupation for the record? 12 Α My name is Michael Lewis. I am a 13 mediator and arbitrator for JAMS based in 14 Washington, D.C. 15 0 I gather you are one of us? You're an 16 attorney? 17 Α I am by training, yes. 18 And what is your connection with the 0 19 Atlas? 20 I am currently vice chair of the board Α 21 and chair of the Operations Committee that 22 essentially covers the facilities and also now

covers the cafe. That has not always been so, but has been so for the past, I guess, four months roughly.

Q And are you compensated by the Atlas for your --

A No, I don't. No, I am not. No. It's just something I do because I think it's important.

Q Could you give us the background of the Atlas? What it is and what it provides for the community?

A Yes. When I grew up, the Atlas was a --- when I grew up here, the Atlas was a movie theater. It ceased being a movie theater after '68, the riots and the general degradation of the H Street Corridor. And it has now been in operation as a performing arts center roughly 10 years now. A few visionaries that did not include me had the notion that creating a forum where all sorts of performing arts could be put on and to really not only bring arts to the community but to help revitalize that part of the

District.

And I think that has been successful and the Atlas has given credit for helping to revitalize the H Street Corridor. But that's essentially what it is, a performing arts center where all sorts of art, dance, music, theater are put on.

Q Do you have a sense as to the sources of funds that the Atlas uses to provide the services it does to the community?

A As a member of the board, yes, I do.

The funding includes charitable contributions

from individuals, Government grants and funds

from foundations. Those are the, I think, three

categories.

Q Is it a fair inference that any fine you pay here will reduce the amount of funds we have available?

A Well, we never have enough money, so any fine clearly will reduce the money available for Atlas operations.

Q And in your capacity as vice chair and

1	chair of the Operations Committee, have you given
2	instructions to Mr. Gross and to others about the
3	future operation of the cafe?
4	A Well, absolutely. Although, frankly,
5	by the time we understood this problem, Mr. Gross
6	had already put in place ways of dealing with it
7	so that we wouldn't have these problems in the
8	future.
9	Q All right.
10	MR. BURKA: I have no further
11	questions.
12	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Mr.
13	Chattrabhuti?
14	MR. CHATTRABHUTI: I have no
15	questions, Mr. Chairman.
16	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Any questions
17	by any Board Members? All right. Hearing none,

11	THE WITNESS: Yes, I do.
12	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Have a seat,
13	please. Your witness, sir.
14	THE WITNESS: Good morning, gentlemen.
15	DIRECT EXAMINATION
16	BY MR. BURKA:
17	Q Could you, please, state your name for
18	the record, sir?
19	A Roy A. Gross.
20	Q And what is your current occupation?
21	A Director of Operations for the Atlas
22	Performing Arts Center.

1	Q Do you have any background in managing
2	or supervising sale of alcoholic beverages in a
3	retail context?
4	A Yes. Prior to my employment at the
5	Atlas, I was the an employee of Arlington
6	County Government where I was working as the
7	operations manager for Artisphere, their art
8	center in Rosslyn. In my capacity there, I was
9	the manager of the only alcoholic beverage
LO	license by a county Government in the State of
L1	Virginia.
L2	Q And here at the Atlas?
L3	A I also run now the I oversee the
L4	alcoholic control as part of my job as director
L5	of operations.
L6	Q And you are a licensed manager?
L7	A Correct.
L8	Q When did you become the supervisor or
L9	manager at the cafe?
20	A Shortly after December after the prior
21	manager had left the organization.
22	Q And what and when she left, what

steps did you take relative to the -- those operations?

A Well, it was immediately where we had some violations pending before you guys that we are speaking of now, but in order to understand more fully the operation as it stood, I launched an investigation into the current operations and during that, we found additional violations or potential additional violations, which we intended to disclose immediately.

Also, there was a zero ID check policy and I changed that immediately to 100 percent ID check. It just made way more sense than risking anything. And also, we put in controls where I, as the Director, now oversee every purchase that goes out to avoid those kind of violations.

But also, I am directly overseeing the alcohol instead of our executive director, who didn't have the time to focus on that.

Q And what did you -- in your investigations, did you find any other problems that you decided to correct?

Yeah, I was not satisfied with the 1 Α 2 recordkeeping procedures. It was a manilla folder with receipts in it, that wasn't 3 4 sufficient for me. Additionally, we said the ID 5 check policy that we wanted to institute. there were some additional purchase violations we 6 investigated receipt-by-receipt. 7 And just for the record, you have seen 8 Q 9 the record, you have seen the letter that I have

Q And just for the record, you have seen the record, you have seen the letter that I have submitted to the Board. Does the attachment to that letter reflect the additional purchases that you just referred to?

A Yeah, that's accurate.

Q Okay. Did we also meet with the Assistant General Counsel Jonathan Berman?

A Yes, we did. And some of the conversation we had already implemented. For example, the licensee training process that is on April 5th, I had already signed up for that to understand better the District Regulations, because my experience comes from Virginia. I am already finding that Virginia was quite a bit

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1	more strict than some of the regulations we have
2	here, so but to understand more, I'm looking at
3	the Licensing Regulations now.
4	Q And in addition to training, you got
5	some guides, guidelines?
6	A Yeah, there is some guidelines. We
7	also need to change the license the name of
8	the licensee and some other administrative things
9	we need to focus on, too.
10	Q To your knowledge, since you have been
11	in charge of the cafe, are we in compliance with
12	the ABRA Regulations?
13	A To the best of my knowledge, yes.
14	MR. BURKA: I have no further
15	questions.
16	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Thank you. Mr.
17	Chattrabhuti?
18	MR. CHATTRABHUTI: No questions, Mr.
19	Chair.
20	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Any questions
21	by any Board Members? Hearing none
22	THE WITNESS: Thank you, gentlemen.

1	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: step down.

15	think I'm going to be largely repetitive of my
16	opening statement and I think it was understood,
17	but
18	MEMBER SILVERSTEIN: Please, speak up.
19	MR. BURKA: I'm sorry, I'm trying
20	to be polite, but I'm not
21	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: No, he has a
22	hearing impairment, so that's why.

1 MR. BURKA: I'm totally apologetic. 2 I'm raising my voice, but it's not out of Okay? If I could? What I started 3 disrespect. 4 to say is in any closing I would make, it would 5 be repetitive of what I said in my opening. think you understand the facts now. We are doing 6 7 everything we know how to do to straighten out the ship. And we are trying to ensure that we 8 9 are not only in compliance with the technical 10 requirements, but also the requirements in 11 spirit.

At the same time, with respect to the fine, again, anything that we pay is going to be money not available to help the community, so in that regard, I would recommend and request that the Board either abate it or eliminate it to the extent it is able to do so.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Okay. All right. Thank you, sir. Mr. Chattrabhuti, is there any final comments you want to make before I close the record officially?

MR. CHATTRABHUTI: Just to preserve

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the record, I think there is no dispute between the parties that there was a violation of D.C. Official Code Title 25 § 113(a)(5)(A) and that this Board has the authority to take any proposed action pursuant to D.C. Official Code Title 25 § 823(a).

And again, I would -- the Government would recommend that this Board find Atlas theater within those prescribed statutory ranges that the codes allow for.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right.

Thank you. The record is now closed.

The Board will issue a decision within 90 days.
