CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right. The next case in our calendar, it is a fact-finding hearing regarding Atlas Brew Works, License Number 116137 and 116079. Would the parties please approach and identify themselves for the record, please.

MR. COX: I am Justin Cox with Atlas Brew Works.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right. Good morning, Mr. Cox. This is a -- maybe you can -- the Board decided to have a fact-finding hearing because we're not -- I'll say, I'm not clear, so maybe you can explain to us what it is that you're trying to do, sir.

MR. COX: Yes, I mean, simply, we're -- the location is on Half Street, SE, and our desire is to both brew beer and produce wine and cider on that premise.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Now, on which one of the premises, on the Half Street location?

MR. COX: On the Half Street location, yes.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: I don't
understand your business, so what is it that you have? You have two licenses and are they at the same location or a different location?

MR. COX: The two that we've applied for are the same location.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right. So you've applied for a manufacturer A, winery, and a manufacturer $B$, brewery?

MR. COX: Correct.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right. So tell me about this concept. What is it that you're trying to do?

MR. COX: So I mean, simply, just that we want to produce both beer and wine in the same premise. So we have, I mean, our equipment that we use to brew beer is able to produce wine and ciders as well, which, cider is considered a wine in the regulatory sense.

So we're applying for both licenses to be able to both produce beer and produce wine and cider.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Now, you're aware that they are different requirements for a Class A and a Class B license.

MR. COX: Yes.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: And so what are your plans for keeping separate books and records for a Class $A$ and a Class $B$ manufacturer's license?

MR. COX: So I mean, just exactly that, to keep them separate. We have an online -- or our brewery management software, we will have a second instance of that software that handles the wine and cider portion, because we have to do separate reporting for the Federal Government as well, and I submitted some documentation ahead of the hearing of our approvals from the Federal Government for both the brewery and the winery.

So we already have that requirement on another level, so we'll be doing the same for the District level.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right. So how do you go about ordering alcohol? So how would you, because you have an -- so explain that process of how would you order alcohol, so whether or not you're going to order from wholesalers for private events, or will you be ordered -- or will they -- or will you do your orders under one license?

MR. COX: So if we're --
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: If we were to grant the license.

MR. COX: Right. I mean, so we will not be serving outside alcohol at the location, except for in the case of a private event, and I guess that's a good question to talk with you all or with ABRA about, with the dual license, for which license we would purchase the outside alcohol under.

That's not a very large part of our business model, it's a little ancillary, so honestly, $I$ have not thought about which license it would go under, but obviously happy to, you know, put it under whichever license makes sense for ABRA and the investigators to make sure we have the paperwork where it is. I'd probably need some guidance on that.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: I don't believe that you can -- because I believe you'd have to order, if you're having a private event, then you'd have to order alcohol from wholesaler.

MR. COX: Right.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: And I think that we need to provide -- so you're saying that
you're looking to us for guidance, what it is that you need to do.

MR. COX: Yes, I think so. As you said, with the two licenses, I haven't thought about that, we have a manufacturer's license for a location in Ivy City already, and when we order alcohol through wholesalers for -- or when you order alcohol for private events, we do it through wholesalers and we, you know, obviously do it under our manufacturer's license in that location.

If they were granted in Half Street, you said we'd have two license, and so for which of those we order under, yes, I think I would need guidance from you all of what's preferential to make sure that the paperwork is in order for your investigators.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Now, so what products will you be making with the winery license?

MR. COX: We will make a cider and we'd like to make a red and a white wine.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: And so where will you be getting your ciders and grapes from?

MR. COX: I mean, suppliers. You
know, the sourcing of apple juice to make cider, which is the base ingredient, it's just, take apple juice and then add yeast to it, we will be sourcing that.

I've been looking at some places and some orchards in Virginia, and also in Washington State, and then for grapes, it's sort of a similar thing. We've not really gotten far enough down the path of sourcing the juice for the wine, because that component is a little bit more important for the end flavor of the product, rather than in cider, the apple juice is a little bit more fungible, I guess.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Now, do you intend to transport beer manufactured from your West Virginia location to the new location or vice versa?

MR. COX: We do.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: So if you're going to do that, how much do you believe of the beer sold at the new location is being brewed at the new location?

MR. COX: I mean, obviously, I'm estimating, because we've, you know, not opened and seen what demand is, but $I$ assume that -- we
have the capacity at Half Street to brew what I expect to be about 75 to 80 percent of the beer that we'll need at that location.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: And the rest of it, you'll --

MR. COX: And the rest, correct, would come from our Ivy City location.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: And I believe that we probably need to provide you some guidance on what's acceptable. I don't know, but I believe that's something that needs to be further explored within -- with the Licensing Division.

Now, let me say this to you, are you aware that wine or cider produced at the new location cannot be transported to your brewery on West Virginia Avenue?

MR. COX: Yes.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: And how will you -- what assurances are you going to give the agency that you're not going to do that?

MR. COX: I mean, our assurance that we're going to be following the rules and regulations. I understand. I mean, this would obviously be a different licensing scheme at the

Half Street location than we have at Ivy City, and understand that we need to make sure that we're staying within the, you know, proper activities for each of those different licensing schemes.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: I guess, just generally, $I$ mean, why is it that you guys want to have both licenses in one location. Just general, why is it that you want to have both an $A$ and $a$ in the same location?

MR. COX: Well, simply, because we want to be able to produce and sell beer, and produce and sell wine and cider, so without -obviously, if we just have the manufacturer's Class B license, we would only be able to brew beer, but we want to be able to produce and sell wine and cider as well.

So it's a new product line for us that we're exploring with this, and also, I think it would be a good thing for our customers on Half Street.

## CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: So your

 business model, your -- is it that you have that much business that you'll be able -- that you believe that it's feasible that you'll be able toproduce products at your West Virginia location and also on the Half Street location?

The reason I'm asking, because I'm asking the question in the sense that, you could decide that -- do you brew currently? What do you brew on West Virginia Avenue?

MR. COX: Just beer.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Just beer?
MR. COX: Yes.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Are you going to sell cider or wine on West Virginia?

MR. COX: No.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Any other questions by any Board --

MEMBER SHORT: I just had one.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Go ahead, Mr. Short.

MEMBER SHORT: Good morning, sir.
MR. COX: Good morning.
MEMBER SHORT: I guess what I'd like to explain, you'll be selling the beer and wine on SW premise, correct?

MR. COX: SE, yes.
MEMBER SHORT: SE, forgive me. And can you just give me the business model? I mean,
how is the place setup, how is it -- how's the seating, how is it -- is it going to be, like, a tavern, a bar, or?

MR. COX: I guess in appearance, we'll have, you know, when you walk in, we have two bars, we have, kind of, a main bar in the middle, and then one to the side, and we have a kitchen as well, so we'll be serving food, all the alcohol that we'll be selling there will be alcohol that we produce, whether it's beer that we produce onsite, and SE, the wine or cider that we produce onsite in SE, or beer that we have produced at our location in Ivy City on West Virginia Avenue.

So I think from the consumer standpoint, the difference will be that there will be no outside alcohol. We won't have any liquor and we won't have any outside wine or beers, we'll only --

MEMBER SHORT: Only your products that you produce.

MR. COX: Correct. Yes. And so that's exactly that.

MEMBER SHORT: Volume, how much do you think you'll be producing?

MR. COX: Beer-wise, I'm estimating we'll be doing, $I$ hope to do, about 1100 barrels per year. It's ambitious. I know.

MEMBER SHORT: And the other product? Cider.

MR. COX: The wine and the cider, honestly, $I$ don't -- we've never sold wine or cider before, and so $I$ don't have an idea of what that pull through is going to be, but we'll be producing them in batches.

It's the same equipment that we're producing our beer on and so the, gallon-wise, we'll be looking at probably doing -- starting the cider with a half batch, which will be about 10 barrels or so, and see how that goes, and probably the same with the wine.

MEMBER SHORT: And my last question, the capacity of -- how many seats or seating will you have in that location, SE?

MR. COX: I believe the applied for capacity is about 175.

MEMBER SHORT: All interior?
MR. COX: Yes.
MEMBER SHORT: Okay. Thank you. That's all I have, Mr. Chair.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: This is a first impression, in the sense that, this is the first time that we've been asked to have an $A$ and $a$ B in the same location. And I'm not sure what we're going to do.

In a sense that, the implications and we need to make sure that you comply with the law, and so $I$ don't know what the Board's --

MR. COX: And of course, and I've spoken to ABRA staff, kind of, throughout the planning of this, about what's possible, and what's legal, and what's not, and it seems, 1 guess, with the -- I don't remember exactly which bill it was, maybe the omnibus in 2018, allowed manufacturers to hold multiple licenses of different classes, and so I mean, that was, you know, passed into law.

And I understand what you're saying on the, kind of, logistics of having them co-located at one location, but I'm happy to work with you all, and with ABRA, and everybody, to make sure that we have whatever records, and paperwork, and our business model is complying with all the rules and regulations out there.

We want to be in compliance and are
happy to be open and help with you all to make sure that we're doing that.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right. Okay. We'll take this under advisement in the sense of we'll discuss it and provide whatever directions to the Licensing Division, who will let you know what the next step is.

MR. COX: Okay.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Thank you. MR. COX: Thank you very much. CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Have a great day.
