3	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right. Our
4	next case is Case Number 19-CMP-00050, BIN-1301,
5	License Number 91682. Will the parties please
6	approach and identify themselves for the record,
7	please.
8	MR. LEE: Good morning, Mr.
9	Chairperson. John Lui on behalf of the District
10	of Columbia.
11	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Good morning,
12	Mr. Lui.
13	MR. COSTLEY: Janon Costley, BIN-1301.
14	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Mr
15	MR. COSTLEY: Costley, C-O-S-T-L-E-Y.
16	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: C-O
17	MR. COSTLEY: S-T-L-E-Y.
18	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Mr. Costley.
19	MR. COSTLEY: Yes.
20	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Good morning.
21	MR. COSTLEY: Good morning.
22	MR. BAILEY: David Bailey on behalf of
23	1301 Wine and Bar.
24	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: I didn't hear
25	your last name.

1	MR. BAILEY: Bailey.
2	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Bailey. Good
3	morning, Mr. Bailey. Good morning. Are there
4	any preliminary matters in this case?
5	MR. LUI: No, Mr. Chairperson. We are
6	ready to proceed.
7	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right.
8	This is a show-cause hearing status I'm sorry,
9	this is a show-cause hearing. Did the parties
10	disclose any documents that they're relying on
11	this morning?
12	MR. LUI: The District did.
13	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right.
14	Were you guys here at the status hearing that we
15	had for this case?
16	MR. COSTLEY: No, we had to have a
17	postpone because it was
18	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: So you were not
19	here at the status hearing leading up to this
20	one.
21	MR. COSTLEY: No.
22	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right.
23	Does the government wish to make an opening
24	statement?
25	MR. LUI: Very briefly. Good morning,

Board Members. We are here today in the show-1 2 cause matter of SST Management, LLC, trading as 3 BIN-1301, located at 1301 U Street, NW. The show-cause notice issued in this 4 5 matter concerns the charge that the licensee 6 failed to follow the terms of the board-approved 7 license by increasing the occupancy of the 8 licensed establishment, in violation of D.C. Code 9 Section 25-823A(7). 10 You will hear today from Investigator Garcia, George Garcia, and the evidence will show 11 12 that the establishment had actually doubled, more 13 than doubled, its occupancy beyond what was 14 approved in its board-approved license. 15 And we have just one witness to call 16 today, Mr. -- Investigator George Garcia. 17 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right. 18 What's your relationship to the establishment? 19 MR. COSTLEY: I'm the general manager. 20 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: And you are 21 who, sir? 22 MR. BAILEY: I'm the agent; 23 representing agent. 24 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: You're the 25 agent?

1	MR. BAILEY: Yes.
2	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: So did you
3	provide what do you mean, you're the agent?
4	MR. BAILEY: The establishment gave me
5	approval to represent them in any hearings and
6	things
7	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: I'm sorry, do
8	we have a copy of that on the
9	MR. BAILEY: Yes, that's been
10	submitted.
11	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right. I'm
12	sorry. Your name again?
13	MR. COSTLEY: Janon Costley.
14	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: C-O-S and
15	you're Mr. Bailey, right?
16	MR. BAILEY: Yes, sir.
17	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: So either Mr.
18	Costley or Mr. Bailey, do you wish to make an
19	opening statement or do you defer until you
20	present your case?
21	MR. BAILEY: We'll defer until we
22	present our case.
23	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right.
24	Fine. Does the Government have a witness?
25	MR. LUI: Yes, Mr. Chairperson.

1	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Who is that?
2	MR. LUI: Investigator George Garcia.
3	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Mr. Garcia, can
4	you raise your right hand, please?
5	WHEREUPON,
6	GEORGE GARCIA
7	was called as a witness by Counsel for the
8	Government and, having been first duly sworn,
9	assumed the witness stand, was examined and
10	testified as follows:
11	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Have a seat.
12	Thank you. Your witness, sir.
13	MR. LUI: Could you please state and
14	spell your first and last name?
15	THE WITNESS: George Garcia, G-E-O-R-
16	G-E, G-A-R-C-I-A.
17	MR. LUI: Mr. Garcia, where are you
18	currently employed?
19	THE WITNESS: ABRA.
20	MR. LUI: And what is ABRA?
21	THE WITNESS: The Alcoholic Beverage
22	Regulation Administration.
23	MR. LUI: And what is your position
24	and role at ABRA?
25	THE WITNESS: I'm an investigator.

1	MR. LUI: And how long have you been
2	an investigator for ABRA?
3	THE WITNESS: For about seven months
4	now.
5	MR. LUI: And what are your duties and
6	responsibilities as an investigator for ABRA?
7	THE WITNESS: I conduct inspections
8	and investigations of ABC-licensed establishments
9	in the District of Columbia.
10	MR. LUI: And are you familiar with
11	BIN-1301?
12	THE WITNESS: Yes.
13	MR. LUI: How are you familiar with
14	this establishment?
15	THE WITNESS: On March 23, 2019, we
16	went to do an inspection, as we were tasked with
17	the Board's task force.
18	MR. LUI: What happened that evening?
19	THE WITNESS: The establishment were
20	on a compliance list for ABRA for noise, so we
21	went into the establishment just to notify them
22	of the complaint, and their occupancy was a
23	little over, just by looking at it.
24	MR. LUI: And then what happened after
25	that; that evening?

	THE WITNESS: Well, myself,
2	Investigator Felicia Dantzler, along with
3	Investigator Mark Ruiz, went into the
4	establishment to conduct a regulatory inspection
5	and just to make sure, and I went into the
6	establishment to conduct an occupancy check, so I
7	utilized a clicker to count how many people were
8	inside the establishment.
9	MR. LUI: Can you tell me more about
10	the counter? What is it?
11	THE WITNESS: The counter is just a
12	small device that, once you push that button, it
13	counts once, so each time you push the button
14	down, it counts once.
15	MR. LUI: How accurate is the counter?
16	THE WITNESS: It's accurate.
17	MR. LUI: And have you ever used a
18	counter before?
19	THE WITNESS: Yes.
20	MR. LUI: Approximately how many times
21	have you used a counter before?
22	THE WITNESS: I would say more than
23	30.
24	MR. LUI: What else happened that
25	evening when you were on your occupancy check?

1	THE WITNESS: We verified their ABC
2	license, along with the certificate of occupancy.
3	MR. LUI: What was the board-approved
4	license; what did it say?
5	THE WITNESS: For the ABRA license?
6	MR. LUI: Yes.
7	THE WITNESS: Thirty. Their total
8	occupancy was 30 for the inside of the
9	establishment.
10	MR. LUI: And when you utilized the
11	counter, how many patrons did you count?
12	THE WITNESS: Sixty-three.
13	MR. LUI: Mr. Chairperson, at this
14	time, the Government would like the Board to take
15	administrative notice of the case report and
16	Investigation 19-CMP-00050. Public record as
17	well.
18	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: So moved.
19	MR. LUI: No further questions of this
20	witness.
21	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Either Mr.
22	Costley or Mr. Bailey, do you have any questions
23	to ask one person, do you have any questions
24	to ask the investigator? Who's asking the
25	questions?

1	MR. BAILEY: I will be.
2	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Yes, Mr.
3	Bailey.
4	MR. BAILEY: Thanks. So,
5	Investigator, where did you work at prior to
6	being an ABRA investigator?
7	THE WITNESS: Perspecta, as a
8	contractor.
9	MR. BAILEY: As a contractor. As I
10	understand, you stated that, by looking at it,
11	you could tell that it was over capacity.
12	THE WITNESS: Correct.
13	MR. BAILEY: How, by looking at it,
14	could you tell that the establishment was over
15	capacity?
16	THE WITNESS: Because I couldn't
17	maneuver throughout the establishment.
18	MR. BAILEY: Okay. Also, did you
19	notice, were there any changes, additional
20	seating, at the establishment that was created to
21	increase their occupancy?
22	THE WITNESS: I'm sorry?
23	MR. BAILEY: Were there additional
24	seats in the establishment than what was
25	permitted on the occupancy level?

1	THE WITNESS: I can't recall.
2	MR. BAILEY: So you never counted the
3	amount of seats that were at the establishment?
4	THE WITNESS: No.
5	MR. BAILEY: Are you aware that the
6	occupancy load that's listed on the certificate
7	of occupancy is for seating capacity?
8	THE WITNESS: I'm sorry, say that
9	again?
10	MR. BAILEY: Are you aware that the
11	occupancy load listed on the CFO is for seating
12	capacity?
13	THE WITNESS: No, I'm not.
14	MR. BAILEY: Okay. Well, on the
15	certificate of occupancy, where it says,
16	occupancy load, it says, 30 number of seats, and
17	that's what was permitted. That's what the
18	establishment was operating as.
19	My next question is, so you have any
20	training as far as like, you know, knowing what
21	overcapacity could be?
22	THE WITNESS: Yes.
23	MR. BAILEY: Okay. What training did
24	you receive?
25	THE WITNESS: Training from ABRA.

From ABRA. Okay. 1 MR. BAILEY: Did 2 you ever notify the fire marshal, fire inspector, 3 about the possible violation? THE WITNESS: I can't recall. 4 5 MR. BAILEY: You can't recall. Do you recall how many people were outside on the summer 6 7 garden that evening? 8 THE WITNESS: I can't recall. 9 MR. BAILEY: So you never counted the 10 amount of people that were on the summer garden 11 nor the people inside. At any time, could the 12 people that were on the summer garden have 13 entered the establishment while you were in there 14 counting? 15 THE WITNESS: No. 16 MR. BAILEY: They couldn't. 17 Next question is, did you -- when after you 18 discovered this possible violation, what did you 19 instruct the establishment to do at that time? THE WITNESS: I didn't instruct the 20 21 establishment to do anything. The establishment 22 was notified that they were in violation due to 23 their occupancy. 24 MR. BAILEY: And my next question, did 25 the establishment start making people exit out of

the establishment after you informed them of 1 2 that? 3 THE WITNESS: The establishment 4 stopped people from entering the establishment, 5 but I can't recall if they had -- I didn't see anyone exit the establishment. 6 7 MR. BAILEY: Okay. So I mean, how 8 long after you notified them of the violation did 9 you stay? 10 THE WITNESS: I'm sorry? 11 MR. BAILEY: How long after you 12 notified them of the possible violation did you 13 stay at the establishment? 14 THE WITNESS: We were probably at the 15 establishment for about, approximately, 15, 30 16 minutes. 17 MR. BAILEY: So you said, at that 18 time, when you all came in, they stopped letting 19 anybody in after you notified them, but you never 20 witnessed them start telling people that they had 21 to leave out. 22 THE WITNESS: No. 23 MR. BAILEY: No further questions. 24 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Any questions 25 by any of the Board Members? Yes, Mr. Short.

Good morning still, Mr. 1 MEMBER SHORT: 2 Garcia, or Investigator Garcia. 3 THE WITNESS: Good morning. MEMBER SHORT: The statement was made 4 5 and the question was asked, when you saw the number of people in this establishment, did it 6 7 look like it was safe to you? 8 THE WITNESS: No. 9 MEMBER SHORT: And when you counted 10 with your counter, you counted how many people? 11 THE WITNESS: Sixty-three people. 12 MEMBER SHORT: The certificate of 13 occupancy says, what is their maximum number of 14 people they can have in their establishment? 15 The occupancy load says THE WITNESS: 16 30. 17 MEMBER SHORT: Okay. And that means 18 standing, sitting, or anything, just 30 people, 19 correct? Standing, sitting, or whatever. 20 THE WITNESS: Right. 21 MEMBER SHORT: Only 30 people. And 22 when you notified them it was a dangerous 23 condition and you counted the people, did they 24 attempt to abate or get some of the people out, 25 or did they just keep on functioning?

THE WITNESS: The establishment 1 2 continued to function. I'm not sure if they had 3 people exit while my colleagues were outside. 4 didn't witness anyone leave the establishment, I 5 just witnessed people not being able to enter the establishment. 6 7 MEMBER SHORT: So the dangerous condition continued. 8 9 THE WITNESS: Correct. 10 MEMBER SHORT: Okay. And the question 11 was asked, did you call the fire marshal, the 12 District of Columbia Fire Department, and you 13 answered, no? I did not. 14 THE WITNESS: 15 MEMBER SHORT: Okay. Would you do 16 that the next time? Would you call the next 17 time? 18 THE WITNESS: I would. 19 MEMBER SHORT: Good. Thank you. 20 That's all I have, Mr. Chair. 21 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Any other 22 questions by any other Board Members? Mr. 23 Bailey, do you have any questions of the witness 24 based on the questions that were asked by the 25 Board?

1	MD DATIEVA No gin
	MR. BAILEY: No, sir.
2	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Mr
3	MR. LUI: No.
4	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Lui?
5	MR. LUI: No, Mr. Chairperson.
6	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Mr. Garcia,
7	thank you for your testimony. You can step down.
8	THE WITNESS: Thank you.
9	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Does the
10	Government have any other witnesses?
11	MR. LUI: No, Mr. Chairperson.
12	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Does the
13	Government rest?
14	MR. LUI: We just have closing
15	remarks.
16	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Mr. Bailey, how
17	do you present how do you present propose
18	to defend the establishment?
19	MR. BAILEY: Well, the
20	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Are you making
21	an opening statement now? Tell me, are you
22	making an opening statement, you going to
23	testify, which one is it?
24	MR. BAILEY: I'm going to make the
25	opening statement.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: You're going to 1 2 make the opening statement? 3 MR. BAILEY: Right. CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Okay. 4 Go ahead. 5 MR. BAILEY: Okay. The investigator 6 7 stated that the occupancy load says 30, and we're 8 showing the certificate of occupancy, you can 9 clearly see that it states seating capacity. Ιt did not allow the certificate to also include 10 11 what the actual standing capacity is, which we 12 did go down to DC ABRA, there was a lot of mixup with their CFO and the building permit number. 13 14 Finally got that squared away and it 15 actually showed what our total amount of people 16 would be allowed into the establishment, not just 17 seating. The capacity was done based on --18 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: No, are you 19 making -- are you -- all right. I'm sorry to cut 20 you. 21 MR. BAILEY: Okay. 22 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: The reason I'm 23 saying that, if you're testifying, I need to 24 swear you in. If you're just doing an opening

statement, you're fine. That's why I was asking

you which one were you doing, and it appears that 1 2 you're testifying, so --MR. BAILEY: And I need to testify 3 4 then. 5 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Then if you're testifying, then can you raise your right hand. 6 7 WHEREUPON, 8 DAVID BAILEY 9 was called as a witness by Counsel for the 10 Respondent and, having been first duly sworn, 11 assumed the witness stand, was examined and 12 testified as follows: 13 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Okay. Go 14 ahead. 15 THE WITNESS: Going back to what I was 16 stating was that, the actual violation is for, 17 like, when I read up on it, that it is, if the establishment has created an area in which they 18 19 allow additional occupants to come in, the 20 establishment never increased their seating 21 capacity at any time. 22 The amount of seats that were 23 permitted for the establishment was the amount of 24 seats that were in the establishment.

As I was also stating about the CFO,

we had an incorrect CFO that did not also allow or have our -- what the standing capacity in the establishment could be. It only had seating capacity.

We have since then gotten that corrected with DCRA and are filing that in with ABRA so that that will be on record as well.

And once we -- like, their occupancy load that's listed now that the DCRA approved is now 49 people inside, and 31 persons on the outside of the establishment.

We can actually state, that does not include, like, the staff members and things of that nature as well.

So like, one of my biggest concerns is that the establishment itself did not make any substantial changes to the place to allow additional patrons to come in. They continued with the amount of seats that they were permitted to have, according to their CFO and according to what was approved by the board.

And they did stop -- initially, the investigator stated that the establishment stopped people from coming in and then recanted that statement, I think, and saying that the

1	establishment did not stop anyone from coming in,
2	when asked by Board Member Short, said that the
3	establishment did nothing to stop the amount of
4	people from going in, that they continued to
5	operate, but he stated earlier in his statement
6	that the establishment did stop the patrons from
7	coming in, but he did not witness because he
8	did not stay as they asked the people to leave.
9	That's it.
10	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: That's it? Mr.
11	Lui?
12	MR. LUI: On the date of the
13	violation, the ABC license says, capacity, 30,
14	right?
15	THE WITNESS: That's correct.
16	MR. LUI: And on that evening,
17	Investigator Garcia counted more than 30 patrons
18	that evening.
19	THE WITNESS: That's correct, sir.
20	MR. LUI: I have no further questions.
21	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: And so, Mr.
22	Bailey, so how many people did your ABRA say that
23	you can have in your establishment?
24	THE WITNESS: The ABRA license
25	reflects what our seating capacity is.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Which is what? 1 2 THE WITNESS: Thirty seats inside. 3 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: So are you 4 aware that you cannot exceed what's on your --5 irrespective of what your certificate of occupancy states, that you cannot exceed what 6 7 your ABRA license states unless you come back to 8 ABRA and ask them to increase it? 9 THE WITNESS: It was to my understanding that we couldn't increase the 10 11 amount of seats that we put into the 12 establishment, other than what's already been 13 approved. 14 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: I'm sorry, I 15 didn't understand that. That we couldn't 16 THE WITNESS: 17 increase the amount of seats that were already 18 approved by ABRA. 19 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Right, you could or couldn't? You could or could not? 20 21 THE WITNESS: Could not. I'm sorry, 22 yes, could not add additional seats that were not 23 already approved. 24 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: But so are you 25 saying that you could have additional standing

folks?

THE WITNESS: What I'm stating is that, the -- originally, when they got the CFO, it never permitted them to add the amount of people that -- or total allowed inside the establishment. It only allowed for them to have a seating -- what their seating capacity is.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Right.

THE WITNESS: And not what their total amount of people that could be inside of the establishment.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: So what does the certificate of occupancy that you currently have, what does it state? What's the total amount of people that can be --

THE WITNESS: Are you referring to the one that was approved by you all or the one that

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: I'm asking you, you said that you have a corrected certificate of occupancy.

THE WITNESS: Right.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: So how many people does that certificate of occupancy -- how many people can you have in the establishment

based on this, as you state, revised certificate of occupancy?

THE WITNESS: It's 49 persons inside and 31 persons on the summer garden.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: So Mr. Garcia said that there were 63 people inside. Is that right? That was the testimony by Mr. Garcia.

THE WITNESS: Right. He also stated there was no way that somebody could come inside the establishment, so it was either they were told they couldn't come in or they were still going in and out. So that was one of my questions to him, but he said that they wouldn't allow anybody in, but then he said that the establishment, you know, continued to operate.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: I thought his testimony was that -- I thought the question that was asked was that there were no -- that no additional folks were allowed in, but he didn't recall whether or not folks had left to reduce the number.

THE WITNESS: No, in the statement after Board Member Short asked him, he said that the establishment did nothing, and they continued to operate. Continued to operate as normal.

1	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: So what is it
2	that you're saying the establishment did?
3	THE WITNESS: I mean, I'm just trying
4	to get
5	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: I'm asking you,
6	sir. You're defending your establishment.
7	THE WITNESS: Okay.
8	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: So I'm asking,
9	what did the
10	THE WITNESS: Well, I am defending my
11	establishment, I was trying to ask the
12	investigator, was there any way that people could
13	have been still entering and exiting the
14	establishment as he was counting, meaning, the
15	people that were allowed right there on the
16	summer garden, right outside the door, are going
17	in and out of the inside of the establishment.
18	So would it be possible for that
19	person to be another person to be counted as
20	somebody was leaving out.
21	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: So do you know
22	whether or not the establishment has come back to
23	ABRA with this revised certificate of occupancy?
24	THE WITNESS: We have the date to
25	submit, we just got it the other week, and so we

came in -- well, we were going to come down today 1 2 to submit it to ABRA. 3 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Do you have a copy of the document to provide to the Board? 4 5 THE WITNESS: I don't have a copy to give to the Board. I do have our certificate of 6 7 occupancy. 8 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: We could make a copy. You know, sir, if you're coming to a 9 10 hearing, and you're making representation, you 11 need to have a copy of the document to provide. 12 I don't know who you are, although you're under 13 oath, so can we get a copy of the document? 14 THE WITNESS: Yes. 15 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Can you give it 16 to -- any other questions by any other Board 17 Go ahead, Mr. Short. Members? 18 MEMBER SHORT: Your name again, sir, 19 is? 20 THE WITNESS: David Bailey. 21 MEMBER SHORT: Mr. Bailey? 22 THE WITNESS: Yes, sir. MEMBER SHORT: The law states you 23 24 can't have more people in than you're allowed to 25 have, you're only allowed to have 30 people.

1	That's your capacity. Thirty people. Is it
2	correct that you had over 60?
3	THE WITNESS: I cannot testify to
4	that. I was not there, sir.
5	MEMBER SHORT: Did you have 30?
6	THE WITNESS: It was at least 30
7	people in there.
8	MEMBER SHORT: It was over 30?
9	THE WITNESS: I said, it could
10	MEMBER SHORT: Was it over 40, sir?
11	THE WITNESS: From what I gathered,
12	there was at least about 30, at least 30 people,
13	that were in there.
14	MEMBER SHORT: The investigator said
15	he counted 60.
16	THE WITNESS: Yes.
17	MEMBER SHORT: With a counter.
18	THE WITNESS: Yes, sir.
19	MEMBER SHORT: Do you use a counter
20	for people coming in and leaving your
21	establishment?
22	THE WITNESS: They do use a counter
23	now, as when they have a doorman present.
24	MEMBER SHORT: Did you have a counter
25	that night?

1	THE WITNESS: No, they did not.
2	MEMBER SHORT: Okay. The investigator
3	did.
4	THE WITNESS: Yes, sir.
5	MEMBER SHORT: Your current CFO that
6	you are getting a copy made says 49, correct?
7	THE WITNESS: Yes.
8	MEMBER SHORT: You were still over by
9	20-something people, correct?
10	THE WITNESS: Not to
11	MEMBER SHORT: If you had 60 people
12	there, which were counted by the investigator,
13	you don't know how many you had because you
14	didn't have a counter, so you were over the
15	number that I'm looking now, it's it says,
16	49. So were you over even with the new document
17	you just provided? Were you over that night?
18	THE WITNESS: According to what the
19	investigator's stating, yes.
20	MEMBER SHORT: What do you think? Do
21	you think you were over?
22	THE WITNESS: Sir, as I said, I wasn't
23	present at the establishment that night.
24	MEMBER SHORT: Oh, you weren't there.
25	THE WITNESS: No, sir.

1	MEMBER SHORT: Thank you. That's all
2	I have, Mr. Chair. Thank you.
3	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Any other
4	questions by any other Board Members?
5	MEMBER CROCKETT: I have some.
6	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Yes, Ms.
7	Crockett.
8	MEMBER CROCKETT: Mr. Bailey.
9	THE WITNESS: Yes.
10	MEMBER CROCKETT: Your establishment
11	was issued this ABRA license in 2016.
12	THE WITNESS: That's correct.
13	MEMBER CROCKETT: And it clearly
14	states that your capacity is 30, correct?
15	THE WITNESS: Yes, ma'am.
16	MEMBER CROCKETT: Because unlike the
17	CFO that you keep referring to, which says 30
18	seats, the ABRA license itself says, capacity,
19	30. It doesn't make a distinction between seats
20	or individuals.
21	THE WITNESS: That's correct.
22	MEMBER CROCKETT: So at what point did
23	you realize, it's been over three years, that
24	your capacity was only 30 at your establishment?
25	THE WITNESS: Well, I wasn't there

	prior co. I just came on recently for the
2	establishment. So when they called me up and had
3	me come take a look at things, that's when I
4	instructed them that they had to that was the
5	initial, like, I know you're saying 30 seats, but
6	you got to get you need to go back down to
7	DCRA now. They will allow you to add the
8	additional amount of people that you're totally
9	allowed inside the establishment.
10	MEMBER CROCKETT: Okay. Thank you.
11	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Any other Board
12	Members? All right. Yes, go ahead, Mr. Lui.
13	MR. LUI: Just closing remarks.
14	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Do you have any
15	questions?
16	MR. LUI: I have no questions.
17	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: I mean, come
18	on. I'm keeping track. Any questions?
19	MR. LUI: No further questions.
20	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right. And
21	do you have any other witnesses, sir?
22	MR. BAILEY: Other than the GM, he's
23	here, that was actually there at the

3	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Mr. Costley,
4	can you raise your right hand, please?
5	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Are you going
6	to ask him questions?
7	MR. BAILEY: No.
8	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Are you going
9	to ask him questions?
10	MR. LUI: No.
11	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: So why is he
12	is he going to say something?
13	MR. BAILEY: Well, I'll ask him an
14	initial question, but he's just going to testify
15	to what happened that evening.
16	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: No, you need to
17	ask him a question. So since your a witness, Mr.
18	Costley, why don't you go over there.
19	MR. COSTLEY: Yes.
20	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Go over there,
21	please. Can you raise your right hand, please?
22	WHEREUPON,
23	JANON COSTLEY
24	was called as a witness by Counsel for the
25	Respondent and, having been first duly sworn,

1	assumed the witness stand, was examined and
2	testified as follows:
3	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right. You
4	want to ask him a question, sir? And because
5	he's there, I don't want him making statements.
6	You need to ask him questions. You know what
7	he's about to say, so you need to ask questions
8	for him to elicit
9	MR. BAILEY: Okay. That's fine.
10	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Yes.
11	MR. BAILEY: Okay. Mr. Costley, when
12	did you find out about the
13	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Ask him to
14	state his name and his
15	MR. BAILEY: Oh, I'm sorry. Can you
16	state your name for the record and what you were
17	
18	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: who he is,
19	where does he work
20	THE WITNESS: Janon Costley, general
21	manager, BIN-1301.
22	MR. BAILEY: Okay. When did you
23	become aware that you needed to increase your
24	occupancy level on your CFO?
25	THE WITNESS: It was actually, you

know, that evening because, you know, we noticed that the certificate of occupancy was different than total capacity in the space. We noted the space is much larger than 30 seats, but we only had 30 seats as the capacity on the certificate of occupancy.

so I made you aware and you recommended that we should go down and try to address the situation. Our renewal was coming up, so we decided to increase our occupancy and address the issue as a part of our renewal process.

As soon as we were informed by the agent that we had -- we were over occupancy, I addressed it with them on the spot and my manager at the time, you know, also made the reference and showed them that there was a difference between the seating capacity and on the document it says, capacity, so we were confused.

What's the total capacity? Because seating capacity and capacity doesn't include my kitchen staff, the bartender, all the other people that worked there, so it was very confusing for us.

So as soon as they told us that there

may be an issue, we asked people to leave, we put somebody on the door, and we made sure that we addressed the issue at the time until we figured out -- and we've done that since then, until we established what the issue is between the total occupancy of the space versus the seating occupancy.

And that was just -- that's -- you know, we had no issue at the time. We said, hey, there's some confusion between what the certificate of occupancy states and what the actual license states, and we addressed it at the time.

And subsequently, we filed to increase the occupancy, based upon the total occupancy load, as opposed to just the seating capacity.

MR. BAILEY: Okay. At the time the investigator came in, were people still entering and exiting the establishment at the time when they came in?

THE WITNESS: I'm not sure, because there were people in and out, so I'm not sure whether or not people were coming inside from the patio and outside, but once he did come in and we had the initial conversation, and he spoke with

1	my manager, they informed me and we started to
2	have people leave out of the building.
3	MR. BAILEY: And you said, since then,
4	what arrangements have you made to ensure that
5	THE WITNESS: Well, we have somebody
6	on the door and he makes sure that he's looking
7	at the headcount of the space to make sure that
8	we're, based upon our understanding, because we
9	don't want to get another violation, of what's on
10	the ABRA license.
11	MR. BAILEY: That's all.
12	THE WITNESS: On our busiest nights,
13	which would be Thursday, and Friday, and
14	Saturday.
15	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Mr. Lui?
16	MR. LUI: Just some brief questions.
17	Mr. Costley, how long have you been the general
18	manager of BIN-1301?
19	THE WITNESS: A year and some change.
20	MR. LUI: And what were you doing
21	prior to that?
22	THE WITNESS: I own a few businesses.
23	MR. LUI: Any restaurants?
24	THE WITNESS: No.
25	MR. LUI: Are you familiar with the

1	licensing process?
2	THE WITNESS: I've become familiar
3	with it, which is why we have someone that's
4	working with us now that used to be a former ABRA
5	officer.
6	MR. LUI: You testified that you had
7	people leave, could you expand on what you mean
8	by that; had people leave; had
9	THE WITNESS: We made sure that, you
10	know, people exited the building to get to the
11	number that was in question.
12	MR. LUI: What do you mean by that?
13	THE WITNESS: And also, the
14	investigator said, we'll be back in, you know, an
15	hour, whatever, just make sure that your capacity
16	is at what's stated on your ABRA license, so
17	that's what we did at the time.
18	MR. LUI: Did you ask customers to
19	leave?
20	THE WITNESS: Yes.
21	MR. LUI: Okay. You asked customers
22	to leave that night.
23	THE WITNESS: Yes.
24	MR. LUI: No further questions.
25	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Mr. Costley,

how do you keep track of how many people are left 1 2 in your establishment? Prior to this incident, 3 how did you -- how did the establishment keep 4 track of, irrespective of what the number is, how 5 did you keep -- how do you keep track of your 6 occupancy? 7 THE WITNESS: It was based upon -- we 8 typically don't get that busy. I mean, it's a --9 you know, and it's not something that we had to 10 do before, but as the popularity of our venue 11 increased, more people were coming, so we had to 12 have someone at the door that would physically 13 count the people. 14 Until then, we didn't realize that we 15 should have probably had a clicker, but we 16 didn't. 17 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: So what do you 18 have -- how do you keep track of the occupancy 19 now? 20 THE WITNESS: Well, the doorman has a 21 clicker. 22 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Any other 23 questions for any of the Board Members? 24 ahead, Mr. Short.

Mr. Costley, what is

1	your knowledge of the building code in			
2	Washington, D.C.?			
3	THE WITNESS: I don't have that much			
4	knowledge of building codes.			
5	MEMBER SHORT: Okay. Well, let me

9	MEMBER SHORT: The total occupancy			
10	means the number of clients you have in your			
11	building. It doesn't count your staff, it

15	particular night, is that correct?			
16	THE WITNESS: On which document?			
17	MEMBER SHORT: On your certificate of			
18	occupancy.

22	total number of people, so if you have			
23	THE WITNESS: That's not what we were			
24	informed at DCRA.			
25	MEMBER SHORT: Sir, if you don't know			

the building code, I suggest that you get one. 1 2 THE WITNESS: Okay. 3 MEMBER SHORT: You're in business, correct? 4 5 THE WITNESS: Yes. MEMBER SHORT: Hopefully you don't run 6 7 into this problem again. 8 THE WITNESS: Understood, sir. 9 MEMBER SHORT: Thirty means only 10 thirty people, paying customers, your new one 11 says, 49. You can only have 49 customers in your 12 building when you're open for business selling 13 alcohol. Do you understand that? 14 THE WITNESS: Based upon what you just 15 informed me, but based upon the knowledge that 16 we've, kind of, gained over the last couple of 17 weeks in going through this process of trying to 18 19 MEMBER SHORT: This is a question. Ιf 20 you were correct, then why are you sitting there 21 today trying to justify what you didn't count --22 THE WITNESS: I'm not trying to 23 I'm just basing it on -- you asked me justify. 24 about my knowledge, and I'm just addressing my 25 knowledge, that's all. And I said, you may be

right, but based upon the questions that we 1 2 asked, because we did want to understand the 3 difference, and we were told that, yes, there is an occupancy for kitchen staff that would be 4 5 included in the number. We were told that. MEMBER SHORT: Sir, that is not true. 6 7 Only paying customers. You can only have, now, 8 since you're going to submitting this, for 49, 9 but until this is approved, you can only have 30 10 people, paying customers, in your business. 11 Period. 12 THE WITNESS: Okay. 13 MEMBER SHORT: And every time the 14 investigator comes in, counts over, now, 49, or 15 whatever you have posted on the wall in your 16 business, that's seating, standing at the bar, 17 whatever else. 18 THE WITNESS: Okay. 19 MEMBER SHORT: You can only have that 20 number of paying customers in your business. 21 THE WITNESS: Okay. 22 MEMBER SHORT: Hopefully we won't see 23 you again for the same thing. Hopefully not. 24 THE WITNESS: Okay. I hope not

either. We want to be in compliance.

Even when we 6 7 went to DCRA, they also looked at it and said it 8 doesn't include your total occupancy of the 9 space, and we gave them the rendering to the 10 space, with the bar, with the seats that we have, 11 and they actually went through the process of 12 telling us how many people could actually be in 13 the space, and it's based upon the number of bathrooms that we had. 14 15 We only had two bathrooms. We heard from Investigator Garcia that on the evening of March 23, 2019, he visited the establishment to conduct an occupancy check, he reviewed the ABC license, which stated, indicated, that the maximum capacity is 30 people.

He determined that the establishment was in violation by using a counter. The counter is accurate. He has used this counter before.

And on that evening, he determined that there were 63 patrons.

That's double the approved -- what's approved on its license. It's irrelevant what the establishment did that evening in terms of trying to ask people to leave. They were in violation of the board-approved license when the investigator did his investigation, a compliance check, for occupancy.

The Government has, therefore, met its burden by a preponderance of the evidence and has proven the charge. The Government asks that the Board, as provided under D.C. Code Section 25-830, a fine under that code provision. Thank

you.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Thank you. All right, Mr. Bailey, you can wrap-up through a closing statement and then tell us what is it you're asking the Board to do.

MR. BAILEY: In closing, for the establishment, they were not -- unfortunately, were not aware of what they could operate as.

And since then, they have now been made aware of and have made those steps to make sure that these issues do not happen again.

Also, going through the necessary steps to make sure that a proper certificate of occupancy has been done and getting ready to submit that to be approved.

They have hired someone now to be at the door during their busy nights to assure that they do not go over whatever the approved occupancy load, whether it be 30 or 49.

We're asking the Board just to -- if we could possibly get a warning. That's what I would like to have, is a warning, like he had. He did comply that evening with -- excuse me, not comply, but he did, at the end of that night, tell people that they had to leave, and then

stopped people from coming in when he was made 1 aware that he couldn't have more than 30 people 2 3 inside, not just the 30 seats. 4 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right. That's it? 5 MR. BAILEY: Yes, sir. 6 7 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: The record is 8 now closed. Do the parties wish to file proposed 9 findings of fact and conclusion of law or waive 10 their right to do so? Meaning that, do you want 11 the Board to make a decision based on the 12 presentation that was made today, or do you want 13 to read, review -- wait for the transcript to be 14 issued, and then you can read the transcript, and 15 then make legal arguments about what it is that 16 you want the Board to do? 17 The Board to make the MR.
