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CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Good morning, everyone. I would like to welcome you to our meeting scheduled for the District of Columbia Alcoholic Beverage Control Board.

Today is December 5, 2019. I would like to introduce Members of the Board with us today. To my right is Mr. Bobby Cato. To my left is Mr. James Short.

My name is Donovan Anderson. I'm Chairman of the Board. We have three members in attendance today. We do have a quorum to conduct business today.

I would like to mention three things before we get started. First of all, if you have any electronic devices, pagers, cell phones or such please make certain that they are turned off to avoid any interruption of the proceeding.

Secondly, there is a piece of paper on each table. When you come forward as your case is called, please take a seat at the table and please sign in. This is to ensure the correct spelling of your name for the record.

Lastly, please note that today's
hearing, today's meeting of the Alcoholic Beverage Control Board is governed by the Open Meetings Act. Please address any questions or concerns to the Office of Open Government at opengovernmentoffice@dc.gov.

I would note the approximate time is 10:15 a.m. We're off the record for a minute, please.
(Whereupon, the above-entitled matter went off the record at 10:15 a.m. and resumed at 10:15 a.m.)

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Well actually, we are back on the record. All right, our first case and only case today is a protest hearing Case Number 19-PRO-00050, Betty's Gojo, License Number 102500.

Would the parties please approach and identify themself for the record? And before we go on the record, it's my understanding that we have a translator here today.

MR. TEKLE: Yes, Your Honor. I'm the interpreter.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: On behalf of how many?

MR. TEKLE: Two, sir.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right. So, let me -- what language is this?

MR. TEKLE: Tigrinya.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Okay. Hold on, please. Would you both stand and raise your hands, please?
(Interpreters sworn in.)
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right, thank you. There's a sign in sheet there. You can, I would like everyone to sign in there. You also as the interpreter sign in and put next to your name that you're the interpreter, okay.

So, I would ask everyone to identify themselves for the record. I'll start with the Licensee.

MR. BIANCO: Good morning, Mr. Chairman. My name is Richard Bianco. I represent the Licensee in this matter. I have here the two owners of the Licensee entity present to my left.

And I'm going to ask that they clearly and slowly state their names for the record.

MR. EMBAY: My name is Kibreck Embay, the owner of Betty Gojo.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Give me your
last name again, sir, Mr. --
MR. EMBAY: Embay.
MEMBER SHORT: Can you spell it for us, please?

MR. EMBAY: E-M-B-A-Y.
MEMBER SHORT: Thank you.
MS. WELDEGEBREL: My name is Abebe Weldegebrel.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Can you spell your name again for me, please?

MS. WELDEGEBREL: Last name, W-E-L-D-E-G-E-B-R-E-L.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Good morning. The Protestant, now we're at the Protestant.

MS. BLACK: I am. I'm Gale Black, Chair of Advisory Neighborhood Commission 4A representing ANC 4A today.

MEMBER SHORT: Spell your last name, please.

MS. BLACK: B-L-A-C-K.
MEMBER SHORT: ANC, which --
MS. BLACK: 4A.
MS. JEFFERSON: Hi, good morning. I'm Naima Jefferson representing Shepherd Park Citizens Association.

MR. BERGMAN: Carl Bergman, B-E-R-G-M-A-N. I'm Vice President and represent Shepherd Park Citizens Association.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Good morning.
MS. EDWARDS: Paula Edwards, P-A-U-LA, E-D-W-A-R-D-S, Treasurer, Shepherd Park Citizens Association.

MR. MUSGROVE: George Derek Musgrove.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Hold on, please.

MR. MUSGROVE: Sure.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Yes, sir.
MR. MUSGROVE: George Derek Musgrove, designated representative for a group of 15. CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Okay, all right. So, there are one, two, three Protestants in this group, okay. Is that correct? Because there are three Protestants, I'm going to ask that you guys designate one person to do the hearing.

And what that means is that I'll have one person should do, we'll have a person doing opening, closing and the cross examination of witnesses. And so, therefore you can switch who is going to do what parts.

But we shouldn't have more than one person cross examining. Is that clear how this will be done? All right. This is a protest hearing.

And the way this works is that if you haven't done a protest hearing before, the Board will present its witness, the Board will call a witness who, as done in our report, the person will testify about the report.

The Board will ask questions of this witness. Once the Board has asked questions of this witness, then the Board, then the Applicant would have an opportunity to cross examine the Board's witness.

Once the Applicant has cross examined the Board's witness, then the Protestant would have an opportunity to cross examine the Board's witness. And the Board might ask additional questions.

And once that's done, the Applicant will put its case in chief on. Each side, the process that each side will have you can do a five minute opening, a five minute closing and you have an hour and a half to present your case.

I will ask that you do not spend a
significant amount of time doing cross examination because that takes away from your time. So, I think it's best to spend more of your time with direct examination of your witnesses. Yes, Ms. Jefferson.

MS. JEFFERSON: Thank you, Chair. For clarification, how does the time work when there is a translator?

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: I've not really been a stickler for time. But I'm telling you that you have a time limit although there is, we have no other hearing today.

But I am saying that I don't want to be here all day today. As I said, I left here at 1:00 a.m. this morning and I got home at 2:00. And I do have somewhere to go at 6 o'clock this evening.

That is the only comment I have. But I will give you sufficient time to present your case. However, I'll ask that we don't have redundant testimony.

I don't need ten people to tell me the same thing. And if you're going to call a witness they should have a different perspective of what's going on.

And so, use your time. I'm not sure how many witnesses that we have. Let me start with the Applicant, how many witnesses do you have?

MR. BIANCO: Two. I do have a third but, $I$ have named a third but I don't think I'm going to be calling them.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right. So, you currently have two witnesses. And so, how many witnesses do the Protestants have?

MS. JEFFERSON: At max, five.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: They have five, all right. And so, I know that it will drag on because we have an interpreter. So, that's fine. But I've not been a stickler for time.

But I just want us to, I'm saying you have an hour and a half. But use your time wisely. I know that both sides care about it that's why they're here today. All right, yes, ma'am.

MS. BLACK: Question. There is testimony in the record from Ken Giles and ANC 4A had noted the exhibits and the testimony. Will we be able to refer to that?

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: I don't know
what you're talking about, ma'am.
MS. BLACK: I understand that Ken Giles was dismissed for whatever reason.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: I don't know who Ken Giles is. I don't.

MS. BLACK: He is one of the protestants on this matter and he had extensive record that ANC 4A noted in our exhibit list.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Okay.
MS. BLACK: We wanted to make sure that was included. That's, I'm just raising this as a procedural matter right now.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Off the top of my head I don't remember who Ken Giles was. So, if he was a protestant maybe he wasn't granted standing.

But if he's here today he can testify.
If he's identified on another person's witness list he could easily, he can testify if he's identified whatever and you can rely on his documents and he can testify if he's identified.

But the difference, $I$ guess, and off the top of my head $I$ don't remember if that he wasn't granted standing as a protestant. But that doesn't mean he cannot join any other group
and testify.
MS. BLACK: I think it was because he was not an owner of the property although he's a resident, clearly a resident of ANC 4A.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Right. So, you can be a protestant. You can join in a group. You just won't have standing because you're not an owner or the ANC belong to a civic association.

All right. The only diversion I'm going to make today from our, the procedures that I just ordered is that it's my understanding that the Protestant had subpoenaed the Commander of the Fourth District.

And I was told that the Commander is not here but he did send Lieutenant Jenkins in his place to represent him. So, just to accommodate him because he wants to be back out on the street, what I'm going to do is that the Board will present its case and we'll have our witness.

But before the Applicant puts its case on we'll just have that one witness testify. And so, the Protestant can call the one, that one witness, elicit testimony.

Once that testimony is elicited then we'll switch back and then the Applicant will present its case, okay. All right, are there any other preliminary matters before we start?

MR. BIANCO: I did have just one, Mr. Chair.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Yes.
MR. BIANCO: I'd like to invoke the rule on witnesses so anybody who is named as a witness that is not either a Protestant or corporative representative should be instructed to be outside of the room during opening, closing and testimony.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: So, all the folks in the room who will be called today as a witness, can you identify all the witnesses? Who are the witnesses that will be called? So, can you please stand?

And so, because Mr., so there's only four, so who is the fifth? I know that --

MS. JEFFERSON: I'm one of them.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Okay. Yes, no you can stay because you are, because since you are the designated representative you have to stay, but the other witnesses so --

MS. BLACK: What about the Open Government Rule? I mean I don't understand how it can be open and then not allow the public to sit in here.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: This is not the public, ma'am. The person is a witness. And even if you, Mr. Bianco has called the witness which is part of our rule on witnesses meaning that if either party you can do the same thing too.

Either party can say that if a person is going to testify I'm asking that they be excluded so they don't sit in the courtroom and listen to the other person's testimony. So, it has nothing to do with the open government.

This is not the ABC Board that does that. This is just one of the parties exercising their right. And if they had more witnesses, I believe the only two witnesses are the owners. Is that correct?

MR. BIANCO: That's not correct.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Who is the other witness?

MR. BIANCO: Mr. Embay is one of my witnesses.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Yes. And who is the other witness?

MR. BIANCO: And then I have my two witnesses.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: And it's two witnesses and they're leaving the room also. Yes.

MS. JEFFERSON: May I ask a clarification? So, your motion is to ask that all witnesses that are not or just ours?

MR. BIANCO: All witnesses.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All witnesses. But that doesn't, that's not applicable to, because you are the designated representative and you're going to be a witness you are going to be here.

But all witnesses who are not then you have to step out of the room. And we'll find somewhere outside just, you can stay outside and there's a room that, Mr. Pru (phonetic), can you show these witnesses where they can sit, please?

Thank you. Mr. Pru will, and so once we are ready for you we will call you. All right, okay, all right. Any other preliminary issue that needs to be brought to my attention
before we start?
Any other preliminary issue before we start? Any other preliminary issue before we start? We can start, all right. So, we'll start with the Applicant's opening statement.

MR. BIANCO: I'll try to be brief in light of the Board's late night last night.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: We're fine, we're fine. I'm having my coffee.

MR. BIANCO: Betty's Gojo is the establishment that we're here to discuss today. And they are a small, family owned Ethiopian restaurant on upper Georgia Avenue.

It's owned and run day to day operations by a husband and wife team, seated next to me, Kibreck and Abebe. And it's their only job.

It's their only source of income. It's the investment of their nest egg. They came into this business in April of 2018 with no meaningful restaurant experience.

It's their first foray into the restaurant business. And at the end of the hearing today the evidence will show that the operation of the establishment before they came
in - -
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Hold on a minute, Mr. Bianco, sorry to interrupt you. MR. BIANCO: Sure.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right.
We're paying a translator for translation services. I expect translation services to occur. If there are no translation services then the Board should not be paying for a translator.

Mr. Translator, we're paying you to translate for the parties. If you're not going to translate for the party, then we're not going to pay for a translator because that says to me the party doesn't need a translator.

MR. BIANCO: There's translation services. There are two translators and they are switching back and forth.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: I know that, Mr. Bianco.

MR. TEKLE: Do you want me to raise my voice?

## CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: During the

 first, $I$ didn't hear or see nothing going on. I just want to make sure when the first translator was there it appeared to me that he was doing anappropriate job in translating.
When we switched off to the second translator it did not appear to me that there was any translating. Maybe his version of translating is a little bit different.

I just want to make sure that there is actual translation going on --

MR. BIANCO: Understood.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: -- since we are paying for those services. Okay, I apologize to interrupt. Go ahead.

MR. BIANCO: So, they acquired the establishment in 2018 with no meaningful restaurant experience and they are first time in the business.

Once the Board hears the evidence today it will show that the operation of the establishment before they took over is very different from the way the operations established today.

They have made improvements. They have put best practices in place. And a lot of what they have done has been in response to complaints by the neighbors.

Notwithstanding their efforts,
especially within the last six months the neighbors have not been willing to work with them and want nothing more than this establishment to be closed at all costs.

At the end of the day, we'll be able to establish that Betty's Gojo as it's run today is appropriate for the area, for the neighborhood and their license should be renewed. Thank you.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Thank you. Who is going to do the opening? Yes, Ms. Jefferson. MS. JEFFERSON: Thank you so much. Naima Jefferson, Shepherd Park Citizens Association. Good morning, Chair Anderson and Members of the Board. I am here representing the Shepherd Park Citizens Association.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Remember that I just told them they need to translate. So, therefore I need you to go a little bit slower to make sure that the District's dollars are spent wisely. Okay, all right. Go ahead, now.

MS. JEFFERSON: I am the president of the Shepherd Park Citizens Association which we will refer to as the SPCA. I will be leading the collective group of protestants which includes the SPCA, ANC 4A and the group of 15.

I will do the opening and ANC 4A, Chair Black will do the closing. Should time permit, I will be called as a witness and Ms. Paula Edwards will examine me.

Since ANC 4 A is also one of the protestants, we request that the Board recognizes, per the D.C. Code that the ANC's properly adopted written recommendations are entitled to great weight from the Board.

The SPCA, which is in ANC 4A, has been an association under one name or another since 1917 and has consistently been a powerful voice used to express the sentiment of our community. Our community encompasses attractive, stable, low density, single family residential neighborhoods like Shepherd Park, Colonial Village, North Portal Estates and Walter Reed and includes both sides of Georgia Avenue.

Our community is known for its park like ambience, sense of community, open space and family atmospheres. Establishments that are known as bars or night clubs have no place in our community.

Betty's Gojo is located within our boundaries. In 2016, the SPCA in good faith
entered into a settlement agreement. We believe that having an ABRA license in the District of Columbia should be an honor and a privilege and not a right.

This privilege carries great responsibility to the city and the communities in which licensees operate.

However, in this case the application for renewal that is before the Board mocks the entire regulatory process for alcohol licensing in the District of Columbia in that our community, city leaders and officials and even members from the Civic and Citizens Federation question why this establishment's license has not already been revoked and question what does it take for revocation and wonder why our community and all of these volunteers and neighbors that you see behind me have had to take off work to attend a protest hearing for this Applicant's application for renewal.

As we will spell out today and you will hear through testimony and exhibits on the record and submitted in evidence, we are protesting on multiple grounds.

We do not believe that the
establishment is appropriate for our community. It has had an adverse impact on the peace, order and quiet.

The establishment has affected the peace on multiple occasions when the police department has been called to investigate complaints such as assaults, noise, rowdiness, gun shots and fights to name a few.

The establishment has had an adverse impact on real property value and has even been associated with damaged real and personal property. The establishment also impacts residential parking needs and vehicular and pedestrian safety.

Since opening in 2016, Betty's Gojo has either not turned in a quarterly report or when they did submit a quarterly report they have yet to demonstrate one quarter where they even met the food sales requirements to qualify as a restaurant under ABRA rules and regulations.

I want to make sure that we give credit where credit is due. Betty's Gojo should at least be nominated, if not awarded, the most likely to violate ABRA laws and regulations and crowned as an establishment with the most ABRA
violations in a single licensure period.
To make it plain, they have a poor and egregious record of compliance with laws and have an investigative history that demonstrates, regardless of the excuses provided, or the conditions even proffered by this Board to keep the establishment operating, the lack of compliance with ABRA laws and regulations and other D.C. laws is guaranteed, continual, ongoing and not an isolated incident.

We believe that this establishment poses a danger to the health and safety of the public. And also whether taken individually or collectively, there should be no doubt that the Applicant is unfit for licensure.

The Applicant cannot continue to claim ignorance. There is a legal principle that a person who is aware of the law may not escape liability by violating that law merely because they are unaware of the content.

In this incident case the dangerous environment that the Applicant has created operates and even perpetuates presents a continuing and imminent danger to our community. And the Applicant has a clear breach of the
public's trust.
MPD, our Ward 4 Council Member and communities on both side of Georgia Avenue want this establishment closed immediately. Today we pray that the Board will deny the renewal application and suspend and revoke the license immediately in order to protect the public safety and welfare. Thank you.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: The Board will now call its first witness. I call Mr. Kevin Puente. Mr. Puente, can you raise your right hand, please?

WHEREUPON,

## KEVIN PUENTE

was called as a witness by Counsel for the Board and, having been first duly sworn, assumed the witness stand, was examined and testified as follows:

DIRECT EXAMINATION
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Mr. Puente, can you state your name for the record, please?

MR. PUENTE: Kevin Puente.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: And where are you currently employed?

MR. PUENTE: At the Alcoholic Beverage

Regulation Administration.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: And how long have you been employed by the Agency?

MR. PUENTE: Approximately four years.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: And what are your duties and responsibilities?

MR. PUENTE: I conduct investigations and inspections of licensed agency establishments in the District of Columbia.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Are you familiar with Betty's Gojo?

MR. PUENTE: Yes.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: And how is it you're familiar with this establishment?

MR. PUENTE: I conducted a protest investigation.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: And did there come a time that you wrote a report?

MR. PUENTE: Yes.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: And can you share with us what is it you were able to find as a result of your investigation on Betty's Gojo?

MR. PUENTE: Yes. I conducted a protest investigation of Betty's Gojo Restaurant and Lounge, LLC trading as Betty's Gojo which is
located at 7616 Georgia Avenue, NW.
Betty's Gojo is located on the 7600 Block of Georgia Avenue NW between Shepherd Road, NW to the south; Georgia Avenue, NW to the east; Georgia Avenue's alley NW to the north and Kalmia Street, NW to the west.

Renewal application for Betty's Gojo was protested by ANC 4A, Shepherd Park Citizens Association and group of 15 being represented by George Musgrove. The protest issues for all the protestants involved the following.

Adverse impact on the peace, order, quiet including noise and litter provisions, residential parking and vehicular and pedestrian safety.

According to the District of Columbia GIS, there are no schools, recreation centers or public libraries or day care centers located within 400 feet of the establishment.

It was brought to my attention that next to Betty's Gojo was a private religious school called Academia de La Porta.

MR. TEKLE: Mr. Chairman.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Yes.
MR. TEKLE: The interpreter would like
the witness to speak a little slower. CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Yes. I was about to remind you. Thank you, sir. Mr. Puente, please be mindful.

MR. PUENTE: So, next to the establishment there's a private religious school. I confirmed with the District of Columbia Public Schools that school is not an accredited D.C. school with the District.

There are five licensed ABC establishments within 1, 200 feet of Betty's Gojo. The five ABC licensed establishments in the area consist of two Class A retail license which sell beer, wine and spirits; three class CR restaurant licenses.

There are no ABC establishments with a summer garden endorsement within 1,200 feet of Betty's Gojo. All five licensed agencies have settlement agreements and one establishment, Champion's Kitchen has an entertainment endorsement.

On October 10, 2019, I visited Betty's Gojo and spoke to Mr. Bianco and Mr. Embay. I was advised that it was a family owned business and any loss of the ABC license or loss of the
business would be devastating.
(PA Announcement)
THE WITNESS: Any loss of the ABC
license or loss of the business would be devastating to the family and its income. Mr. Embay advised --

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Let's stay off the record for about five minutes and let me see what's going on.
(Whereupon, the above-entitled matter went off the record at 10:44 a.m. and resumed at 10:54 a.m.)

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right. We are back on the record. Go ahead, Mr. Puenta.

MR. PUENTE: I was advised by Mr. Embay that he does not use promoters anymore and only uses music off You Tube. Mr. Embay stated that he has been trying to work with the protestants and community.

On October 12, 2019, I telephonically spoke with Mr. Musgrove, the representative for the group of five or more. Mr. Musgrove stated the following.

They are constantly disturbed by the noise disturbances, fights, have to deal with
trash and litter from the patrons. Their group is constantly awakened throughout the week at night time.

The group of five or more feels that the establishment has a history of longstanding problems as reflected in the Metropolitan Police Department calls for service as well as the ABRA hotline calls.

On October 14, 2019, I telephonically spoke with Ms. Naima Jefferson, the President of the Shepherd Park Citizens Association and Paula Edwards, the Vice President. They both stated the following.

The establishment has a history of long series of issues, has multiple settlement agreement violations, lots of fights and disturbances. Ms. Jefferson stated that the establishment has a history of not filing quarterly statements, DOH violated establishment for hookah.

Ms. Jefferson stated that the SPCA sent notices to cure. At one point she was threatened by the establishment and had to contact Commander Griffin of the MPD.

Ms. Edwards stated that the
establishment has an egregious record constantly operating after hours, patrons congregating in the parking lot behind the establishment. Ms. Jefferson stated that the private religious school next door to the establishment has made several complaints.

At one point the window on the school was broken from the patrons from Betty's Gojo and the establishment, the school had to pay for its own window. Ms. Jefferson stated that Betty's Gojo is not a benefit to the community because of the constant issues, disturbances, lack of respect for the law.

Ms. Jefferson stated that the peace, order and quiet and economic development are all being affected by Betty's Gojo. Ms. Jefferson stated that Betty's Gojo is not a restaurant and acts more like a night club.

Ms. Jefferson stated that if the establishment was audited the books or records will show that it does not make food. Ms. Jefferson lastly added that Councilman Brandon Todd who represents Ward 4 sent a letter to ABRA with concerns regarding Betty's Gojo and that alone should speak volumes.

On October 25, 2019, I received an email from ANC 4A Chair, Gale Black regarding Betty's Gojo. Commissioner Black advised me of the following.

The ANC 4A asked the license not to be renewed. It should not require this level of effort to obtain peace, order and quiet as well as compliance.

Commissioner Black stated that the establishment has not reached out to the ANC 4A regarding the matters. Prior to the submission of their application they invited the establishment to their May meeting but the owners never responded or showed up to the meeting.

Their attorney later reached out to explore whether a settlement agreement could be reached after the application was submitted but was unable to guarantee that the concerns would be addressed, that any agreement could be enforced.

The ANC 4A wants the violations to cease. Within the establishment there are no nearby Metro subway stops in the vicinity of Betty's Gojo.

There are eight Metro bus stops near

Betty's Gojo along Alaska Avenue, Kalima Rd, NW; Eastern Avenue, NW and Georgia Avenue, NW. The establishment was monitored by ABRA personnel for a total of 17 times from August 23, 2019, to August 30, 2019, with one violation found.

On October 31, 2019, the establishment was found operating without an ABC manager or owner on duty. I monitored the establishment on 15 occasions and during those 15 times I observed at night time on the weekends there was limited parking.

Patrons were exiting. Some were loud. Some were causing loud music from the cars. As recently as November 23rd I was, responded to a noise complaint.

When I got there at approximately 2:45 there was a food truck parked outside of the establishment. Myself and another ABRA investigator sat across the street from the establishment and observed patrons exiting the establishment up until 3 o'clock getting food and started to become disorderly.
I had to call MPD for assistance because we observed multiple fights about to start. MPD had the food truck leave the area
immediately and told the crowd to go home. There were 22 noise complaints reported to ABRA that were associated with Betty's Gojo from August 2018 to November 2019. And there's one case still pending with the establishment.

On July 3, 2019, the establishment was found operating after hours allowing patrons to exit with open containers and interfering with an investigator that's still pending with the OIG. There were 41 calls for service from the Office of Unified Communication from September 2018 to September 2019.

Thirty-six of those calls were MPD filed as calls for D.C. Fire, EMS. And on one of those calls on May 13, 2019, resulted in an MPD Chief of Police closure of the establishment. That's all, Mr. Chair.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Are there exhibits attached to your report?

MR. PUENTE: Yes.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: And what are those exhibits? Please identify them?

MR. PUENTE: Exhibit 1 is a copy of the renewal application. Exhibit 2 is a copy of
the ANC 4A protest letter. Exhibit 3 is a copy of the Shepherd Park Citizens Association protest letter.

Exhibit 4 is a copy of the group of five or more protest letter. Exhibit 5 is a copy of Commissioner, ANC 4 Chair, Commissioner Black's responses. Exhibit 6 is a copy of the D.C. Zoning map.

Exhibit 7 is the GIS map of 1,200 feet. Exhibit 8 is the GIS map of 400 feet. Exhibit 9 is the photograph of the front of the establishment on Georgia Avenue.

Exhibit 10 is inside the establishment of the dining area. Exhibit 11 is a photograph of the bar. Exhibit 12 is a photograph of the bar as well as more dining area.

Exhibit 13 is the back dining area. Exhibit 14 is another angle of that back dining area. Exhibit 15 is a photograph of the back dining area as well.

Exhibit 16 is the hallway corridor leading to the back door. Exhibit 17 is the kitchen. Exhibit 18 is the back of the establishment as well as the parking lot.

Exhibit 19 is the stairway leading
down to the basement level. Exhibit 20 is more of the basement. Exhibit 21 shows the bar area of the basement area.

Exhibit 22 is a photograph of the menu. Exhibit 23 is the back side of the menu. Exhibit 24 is my regulatory inspection I conducted at the establishment. Exhibit 25 is a map showing the nearby Metro bus stops from Betty's Gojo.

Exhibit 26 is a parking meter on Georgia Avenue, NW. Exhibit 27 is the photograph of the street parking on Georgia Avenue across from the establishment.

Exhibit 28 is parking on Alaska Avenue, NW. Exhibit 29 is calls for service from D.C. Fire, EMS. Exhibit 30 is MPD's calls for service. And Exhibit 31 is the hotline noise complaint $\log$ that was sent to me.
(Whereupon, the documents referred to were marked as Board Exhibit 1 through 31 for identification.)

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: So, I just, let me go back to, it's 32. So, how many calls for noise infractions or calls for noise infractions were you able to find for this establishment?

MR. PUENTE: I was given that there was 22 noise complaints received to ABRA from August 2018 to November 2019.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: How many?
MR. PUENTE: Twenty-two.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Do you know whether or not out of the 22 how many of these were substantiated?

MR. PUENTE: From what I could tell, none were.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Okay. You had testified about, I think you said you went there. There was some food truck and there was like, what are the hours of this establishment?

MR. PUENTE: The hours of them are 8:00 a.m. to 3:00 a.m.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: And so, you're talking about a food truck. Do you know why there was a food truck?

MR. PUENTE: I do not. My supervisor called me, said he got a noise complaint around 2:45 on November 23rd. Myself and an investigator went.

When we got there we didn't hear any music. All we heard was the food truck, the
engine from the food truck running. We got there at 2:45.

We sat there until 3 o'clock. At 3 o'clock all the patrons exited. People were getting food. People were starting to argue.

Someone's car almost got hit by someone else's car. Then at approximately 3:15 it started to get a little out of hand. I had to call MPD over the radio and they came immediately and told the food truck to go as well as the crowd to leave.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: But the establishment was closed by 3 o'clock?

MR. PUENTE: Yes. Me and my partner, we observed everyone exited the establishment and went to the food truck and ordered food.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: And how many times again did you personally monitor this establishment?

MR. PUENTE: Fifteen times.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: And out of the 15 times, did you observe any ABRA violations during the time of your --

MR. PUENTE: No. The establishment shut down on time. We went in one time after

3:30 and made sure no one was inside. No one was inside.

There was limited street parking on some weekends. During the day time there was plenty of street parking. It was quiet. The establishment wasn't open during the day time. So, mainly at night time in the evening it was open.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Now, Betty's Gojo they have a restaurant license. So, in your observation of this establishment, can you tell me, do you get a sense this is a restaurant, this is a, what is your sense of monitoring the establishment?

MR. PUENTE: From the times I monitored it on one occasion I had seen people eating food.

I was mainly perplexed on November 23rd why there was a food truck parked out front and patrons were leaving from the establishment to get food when the establishment is a restaurant so, the kitchen could have been open until 3:00 a.m.

## CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Do you know

 what time, if you know, what time does thekitchen have to be for a restaurant?
MR. PUENTE: So, for a restaurant they can be open up until closing time. For our law rights if the restaurant wants to shut down the kitchen two hours prior to closing they can shut it down at 1 o'clock.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Okay. Can you just, do you have a picture of what the interior of the restaurant looks like again?

MR. PUENTE: Yes.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Which one is that?

MR. PUENTE: It's going to be Exhibits 10 through 21.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: I don't have any other questions for you. Does any other Board Members have any other questions? Yes, Mr. Short.

MEMBER SHORT: Good morning, Investigator. When you visit this establishment after 12, midnight, on how many occasions have you been there after 12, midnight?

MR. PUENTE: Quite a bit. I can't, I don't know the exact number, sir.

MEMBER SHORT: The activities inside
of the club are they eating, are they, what activities are they, do you see when you go to investigate this establishment?

MR. PUENTE: From my experience there is people eating. There's not many people eating. Music is playing. Hookah smoke, people sitting down doing hookah, some people dancing.

MEMBER SHORT: Can you explain to this Board hookah and who regulates it and is it proper for this restaurant?

MR. PUENTE: Hookah is regulated by Department of Health. From my understanding from speaking with DOH officials there's only ten licensed hookah establishments in the District.

But DOH is so overwhelmed that they can't regulate every single place. So, hookah is a type of smoking device with charcoal and you smoke flavored stuff through a water thing you smoke and that's how I can explain it.

MEMBER SHORT: Does this establishment, Betty's Gojo, do they have a license for hookah?

MR. PUENTE: No, $I$ do not believe so.
MEMBER SHORT: They do have a health
license for smoking hookah?

MR. PUENTE: No.
MEMBER SHORT: But they are doing it every time you go there?

MR. PUENTE: The times I've been there I've seen people doing it.

MEMBER SHORT: Have you ever questioned them if they are allowed to do that?

MR. PUENTE: No.
MEMBER SHORT: Has it been reported to the Health Department?

MR. PUENTE: Yes, from my understanding it has.

MEMBER SHORT: Thank you. That's all I have, Mr. Chair.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Any other questions by any Board Members? Mr. Bianco.

CROSS EXAMINATION
MR. BIANCO: Yes. So, I'd like to direct your attention to Page 7. Do you have your report in front of you?

MR. PUENTE: Yes.
MR. BIANCO: Okay. I'd like to direct your attention to Page 7 which details your days and hours of visits to the premises. And I just want to clarify some language.

Where you write in the findings NAVF that stands for no ABRA violations found?

MR. PUENTE: Yes.
MR. BIANCO: Okay. And again, in your findings once you noted that there was loitering and other times you noted that it was people talking outside. Is that the same behavior, different behavior?

Do you make any differentiation between the two?

MR. PUENTE: The same behavior. People outside talking and congregating.

MR. BIANCO: And you note that there's no on-site parking for vehicles but street parking only, correct?

MR. PUENTE: Yes. I was told that there are some spots available in the back in that parking lot.

MR. BIANCO: Did you learn how many?
MR. PUENTE: I believe, Mr. Embay told me eight.

MR. BIANCO: Now, I want to look at some of the photos you provided which I think speak to the Board's concern about the set-up of the establishment.

Let's look at in your exhibits Number 10. And that's the establishment facing out on Georgia Avenue, correct?

MR. PUENTE: Yes.
MR. BIANCO: Okay. And it appears there's booth seating with low tables there. Do you see that?

MR. PUENTE: Yes.
MR. BIANCO: And in the course of your experience as an ABRA investigator, have you in the past had occasion to investigate Ethiopian restaurants?

MR. PUENTE: Yes.
MR. BIANCO: And the low tables, in your experience, are they dining tables or cocktail tables?

MR. PUENTE: I've seen them used for both.

MR. BIANCO: How about in this particular establishment?

MR. PUENTE: Both.
MR. BIANCO: Now, I want to look at Exhibit Number 30 to your report. And Exhibit Number 30, $I$ believe, is the calls to MPD.

MR. PUENTE: Yes.

MR. BIANCO: Okay. I want to focus for a second on the column that says type. Do you see there where it says type?

MR. PUENTE: Yes.
MR. BIANCO: And do you have an understanding of what that means, type?

MR. PUENTE: I do not. I tried reaching out to MPD. That's the Office of Unified Communications abbreviation. So, the officer I spoke with couldn't provide me much.

MR. BIANCO: Okay. And the, so you don't know what the abbreviations there stand for?

MR. PUENTE: No.
MR. BIANCO: Okay. And there's no way from Exhibit 30 to tell who made these calls?

MR. PUENTE: No.
MR. BIANCO: And if we flip over to Exhibit Number 31. These are the noise complaints, correct?

MR. PUENTE: Yes.
MR. BIANCO: And that was sent to you
in the form of an email?
MR. PUENTE: Yes.
MR. BIANCO: And it states in the
email, does it not, that all of the noise complaints were from the same individual, Ken Giles, correct?

MR. PUENTE: Yes.
MR. BIANCO: And none of them resulted in an actual violation as far as you know?

MR. PUENTE: As far as I know, no.
MR. BIANCO: Now, you gave some testimony in response to Board questions about the 11/23 incident.

MR. PUENTE: Yes.
MR. BIANCO: Was that written up as a violation?

MR. PUENTE: No.
MR. BIANCO: Okay. And were you, do you know what time the food truck arrived at this location?

MR. PUENTE: I do not know.
MR. BIANCO: And during the course of your investigation, did you discover that the food truck was in any way related to my client's establishment?

MR. PUENTE: Yes. As Mr. Embay was out there that night he told me the food truck was supposed to leave at 2:30 and he didn't know
why it was still there at almost 3 o'clock.
MR. BIANCO: Okay. And it was parked on the public street or private property?

MR. PUENTE: Public street.
MR. BIANCO: Okay. Brief indulgence, Mr. Chair. That may be it. I just want to see, I may have one or two more questions. And when you arrived you say Mr. Embay was outside or he was inside?

MR. PUENTE: When I arrived he was initially inside. Around 3 o'clock he came outside.

MR. BIANCO: Okay. Did you attempt to enter the establishment or were you just on the sidewalk?

MR. PUENTE: I was on the sidewalk. The investigator I was with went inside the establishment.

MR. BIANCO: Okay. Did you witness Mr. Embay making any efforts to disburse the crowd?

MR. PUENTE: No.
MR. BIANCO: And is, in your opinion, does anything, can anything be done by the establishment to mitigate people congregating
outside on a public sidewalk?
MR. PUENTE: Yes, because there's a doorman or security guard there. So, he should be kind of telling people to leave, to get going. Especially when I saw the two groups about to start an altercation he could have called 911, called MPD. But MPD did not, $I$ had to call MPD.

MR. BIANCO: But as a general matter, not necessarily on that night in particular.

MR. PUENTE: In general, I've always been told if establishments can't get people away from it call MPD or 911.

MR. BIANCO: The appropriate protocol would be when people are congregating call MPD?

MR. PUENTE: Yes, if they're having trouble.

MR. BIANCO: Okay. And there were a number of calls to MPD. We can't tell the source from the information.

MR. PUENTE: Yes, I can't speak to that.

MR. BIANCO: It could very well be from my client. That's all I have. Thank you, sir.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Who is going to
do the cross? Go ahead, Ms. Jefferson.
MS. JEFFERSON: Thank you. Thank you, Investigator Puente. So, you mentioned on Page 2 of your report that the renewal application was submitted by Mr., I'm sorry, Embay. I'm sorry, I can't, Embay.

And my question for you is, did you look into who the owners were of Betty's Gojo at any time?

MEMBER SHORT: Excuse me. I think you have papers over the top of your microphone.

MS. JEFFERSON: Thank you, I'm sorry. I will repeat my question. Did you look into who the owners of Betty's Gojo might be?

MR. PUENTE: Yes. On file it's Mr. Embay, then Abebe Weldegebrel. That's what we have on file and that's all I can determine right now.

MS. JEFFERSON: Okay. But at no time did you check with DCRA?

MR. PUENTE: No.
MS. JEFFERSON: Okay. You mentioned also on page 2 some of the reasons that the protestants are protesting the renewal application.

Specifically, I want to draw your attention to Exhibit 3 which is from the Shepherd Park Citizens Association protest letter. Do you have it?

MR. PUENTE: Yes.
MS. JEFFERSON: Did you read the entire letter?

MR. PUENTE: Yes.
MS. JEFFERSON: Okay. And I wanted to point out if you look on the third paragraph there are four bullets. And when, can you just read those four, please.

MR. PUENTE: Betty's Gojo has an adverse impact on peace, order and quiet including noise and litter, not limited but including human fecal matter and used condoms.

Betty's Gojo has had an adverse effect on real property values. Betty's Gojo adversely impacts residential parking and vehicular and pedestrian safety.

And Betty's Gojo when compared with nearby ABRA Class C restaurants such as the Nile Market and Kitchen has a poor record of compliance with ABRA laws and regulations and has violated the settlement agreement on numerous
occasions.
MS. JEFFERSON: Is that the same as what you put in Paragraph 3 when you reference Exhibit 3?

MR. PUENTE: Minus the part about the fecal matter and used condoms.

MS. JEFFERSON: And what about Bullet four, is that somewhere on Paragraph 3?

MR. PUENTE: No.
MS. JEFFERSON: Okay. So, that portion was omitted from your report?

MR. PUENTE: Yes.
MS. JEFFERSON: Is there a reason it was omitted?

MR. PUENTE: No, just trying to compile everything I may have overlooked some stuff.

MS. JEFFERSON: Okay, fair enough. The next question $I$ have is on Exhibit 2. You spoke with Mr. Giles.

MR. PUENTE: Yes.
MS. JEFFERSON: And have you, did Mr.
Giles tell you where he lives?
MR. PUENTE: Right above Betty's Gojo.
MS. JEFFERSON: And you've also
mentioned that you've done over the past four years lots of investigative inspections and investigations.

MR. PUENTE: Yes.
MS. JEFFERSON: Do any of those include responding to these noise calls or other issues?

MR. PUENTE: Noise calls in general or just to this establishment?

MS. JEFFERSON: To this particular establishment.

MR. PUENTE: I responded a few times. I don't know the exact number off the top of my head.

MS. JEFFERSON: And that was outside of this inspection?

MR. PUENTE: Yes.
MS. JEFFERSON: Okay. And at any point in time did you meet Mr. Giles?

MR. PUENTE: I have not personally, no.

MS. JEFFERSON: You have not personally met Mr. Giles. Okay. Let's see, you mentioned in your report on Page 3 that Mr. Embay said that they used MPD's reimbursable detail
officers.
MR. PUENTE: Yes.
MS. JEFFERSON: The night where you saw the food truck, was MPD there?

MR. PUENTE: No.
MS. JEFFERSON: They were not there. What about any of the other times in the evenings that you, did you ever see MPD already over there?

MR. PUENTE: No.
MS. JEFFERSON: Okay. You also say that you, $I$ just want to make a clarification. Your verbal testimony on that page you mention Mr. Musgrove but the report says Mr. --

MR. PUENTE: I caught that.
MS. JEFFERSON: You caught that, okay. Thank you. The times that you visited, did you see the surrounding businesses or establishments?

MR. PUENTE: Yes.
MS. JEFFERSON: Okay. Did you happen to see Academia de La Porta?

MR. PUENTE: Yes.
MS. JEFFERSON: On Page 6, you reference that we advised you that it was a private school.

MR. PUENTE: Yes.
MS. JEFFERSON: I'm curious as to why you checked with DCPS if it was a private school?

MR. PUENTE: Just to confirm that it was not a public school or a private school with D.C. Public Schools because sometimes some stuff will show up on the GIS. So, we just double checked.

MS. JEFFERSON: Okay, okay. And you also mentioned on Page 6, the interior you've got several exhibits, Exhibit 10, 11, 12, 13, 15, 16, 17, 18, 19, 20 and 21.

Did you at any time when you personally made inspections, did you count the number of seats in the establishment on both the main entrance and the basement?

MR. PUENTE: No, I have not.
MS. JEFFERSON: You did not, okay. And when you went to the basement was there a means of egress?

MR. PUENTE: Not that $I$ could tell, no.

MS. JEFFERSON: Okay. Were people smoking hookah down there?

MR. PUENTE: Not when I was there.

Every time I've been there the basement was not operating.

MS. JEFFERSON: Okay. On Page 7, you mentioned that the company picks up trash twice a week, D.G. Trash and Hauling. Did you personally witness them picking up the trash or that's what you were told?

MR. PUENTE: That's what $I$ was told by Mr. Embay.

MS. JEFFERSON: Okay. And it was your earlier testimony that none of your visits resulted in an ABRA violation.

MR. PUENTE: Yes.
MS. JEFFERSON: But when I compare on Page 7, October 31st, no ABC manager with Item Number 1 on Page 9, it appears to have a violation.

MR. PUENTE: Yes, that was by another investigator.

MS. JEFFERSON: That was by, so there was one?

MR. PUENTE: Yes, one ABRA violation, yes, by someone else.

MS. JEFFERSON: How many other investigators visited besides you?

MR. PUENTE: Two others.
MS. JEFFERSON: Two others, okay. You also mentioned in your report on Page 8 that there are no parking spots for on-site vehicles. This is under residential parking and vehicular safety, VII, am I giving you the right thing, yes, Page 8?

MR. PUENTE: Yes, I see it.
MS. JEFFERSON: Was that based on your observation?

MR. PUENTE: That was an oversight on my part. I was told there was eight. The parking lot back there I was told that's mixed with the residents above the establishment as well.

MS. JEFFERSON: So, those eight aren't exclusively for this?

MR. PUENTE: From my understanding what I was told that they had eight parking spaces back there. So, I'm not sure if he's counting all eight or just eight in general.

MS. JEFFERSON: Okay. And there are other establishments that have, where it appears that there is parking behind other buildings in that --

MR. PUENTE: Yes.
MS. JEFFERSON: So, there's no way to know who has what parking space?

MR. PUENTE: Yes.
MS. JEFFERSON: Okay. Sorry, on Page 9, you say you observed 36 calls for service for the same period. In your experience over the four years what are the average number of calls of service for MPD over that time frame?

MR. BIANCO: I'm going to object as it calls for speculation.

MS. JEFFERSON: I'm asking based on his experience.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: I'm going to sustain the objection. I mean that's speculation. So, let's move on. Ask another question, please.

MS. JEFFERSON: Okay. So, you also mentioned that there were 22 noise complaints and that was your Exhibit 31.

MR. PUENTE: Yes.
MS. JEFFERSON: And on that Exhibit 31 there was a date. I'm trying to find the paper. There it is. I want to call your attention to July 3, 2019.

And then I want to refer you back to your report on Page 9 under ABRA investigative history.

MR. PUENTE: Okay.
MS. JEFFERSON: So, your previous testimony my understanding was that those noise complaints did not result in any violations. Is that correct?

MR. PUENTE: Yes.
MS. JEFFERSON: But those are the same date, correct?

MR. PUENTE: Yes.
MS. JEFFERSON: So, would you say that your prior testimony may have been inaccurate?

MR. PUENTE: Yes. It wasn't a noise violation. The investigators that responded that night violated the establishment for operating outside of their hours, failing to follow a security plan, allowing patrons to exit with open containers and interfering with an investigation.

MS. JEFFERSON: Okay. Did you at any point read the settlement agreement?

MR. PUENTE: Yes.
MS. JEFFERSON: Okay. And did you reference it anywhere in your report?

MR. PUENTE: No.
MS. JEFFERSON: Not at all, okay. So, you don't have any actual knowledge as to whether they violated any terms of the settlement agreement?

MR. PUENTE: Here in mine, no.
MS. JEFFERSON: Okay. So, I have a question about the process in general. So, as an inspector, how do you know what to look for? Is there like a manual that you have or a checklist?

MR. PUENTE: Yes. If you go to Exhibit Number 24. This is a regulatory inspection form that we always fill out when we do an inspection.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Which one, is it 24 or 25?

MR. PUENTE: I have it as 24.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Mine says 25.
The exhibit that $I$ have says 25.
MR. PUENTE: There was an updated protest report so you may have gotten another version.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: I'm only working with what's given to me. So, Number 24 is the menu and Number 25 is the, so you're
saying it's supposed to be --
MR. PUENTE: 24.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: So, the regulatory inspection is Exhibit 20 what?

MR. PUENTE: 24.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Okay, go ahead.
MR. PUENTE: So, on that inspection form when we enter establishment we put the time we enter. We fill out the license information to ensure that it's all correct.

We identify an owner or an agency manager that's present during the hours of sales. We check to see the certificate of occupancy. We write that down.

We copy the hours of operation and sales. We're checking to ensure that the license is posted, there's ABC window lettering on the posted records showing all their alcohol invoices for the last three years.

That the warning sign is posted. If they get alcohol from outside the District that they have the import permits. And then we advise them of the quarterly statements.

And that's really about it. Then we check for other stuff. For the remaining of the
regulation book we just look for other stuff that we think might be in violation as well throughout the regs.

MS. JEFFERSON: Other regs?
MR. PUENTE: DCMR. So, we all know the DCMR, the ABRA investigators. So, if we see something that sticks out we'll address that as well.

MS. JEFFERSON: Okay. So, this checklist is not exhaustive?

MR. PUENTE: No. This is what we fill out any time we find a violation, any time we do an unannounced inspection throughout the course of the year.

MS. JEFFERSON: Okay. So, is there some type of training that you have to know when to go refer to the regulations and when not to?

MR. PUENTE: Yes. When I was hired I went through an extensive training process. Then throughout the year we attend trainings. We get updated trainings on new laws, regulations we introduced.

MS. JEFFERSON: Okay. On Exhibit 17, can you identify what that is again?

MR. PUENTE: That's the kitchen.

MS. JEFFERSON: Okay. And --
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Can I see what's Exhibit 17, please? I guess I need to find out what exhibit was moved. So, that's, all right, go ahead.

MS. JEFFERSON: It's 18 in the old report.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Right. I still have the old report. All right.

MS. JEFFERSON: When this picture was taken, did you see any food?

MR. PUENTE: No. The establishment was closed. I had a scheduled meeting with Mr. Bianco and Mr. Embay.

MS. JEFFERSON: Okay. So, did you open their refrigerator?

MR. PUENTE: No, I did not.
MS. JEFFERSON: Okay. When, you mentioned the MPD logs. Based on your experience, do the MPD logs capture every complaint a community may have?

MR. PUENTE: I really can't speak to that. That's going to be an MPD question.

MS. JEFFERSON: Okay. You mention on one of the visits that there was, sorry, $I$ think
when you mentioned that there was the fight about to break out, did you see any security there?

MR. PUENTE: I saw a gentleman standing inside the doorway.

MS. JEFFERSON: Okay. But you didn't see anyone else?

MR. PUENTE: No, that was it.
MS. JEFFERSON: Just one, okay. Is it typical, in your experience for a restaurant to have a food truck with patrons leaving to go get food from the food truck and not eating at the restaurant?

MR. PUENTE: From my experience I've only seen it for an event or some kind of event is happening or a festival.

MS. JEFFERSON: Okay. And your previous testimony was that you did not go in the establishment?

MR. PUENTE: No, my partner went in.
MS. JEFFERSON: Your partner went in, okay. Okay, thank you.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right, Mr. Puente. Thank you for your testimony. You can step down.

MR. BIANCO: Mr. Anderson, actually if

I could recross for two more questions.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: From my witness, Mr. Bianco.

MR. BIANCO: I'm requesting permission as opposed to asserting a right.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Two questions but then $I$ would have to give them an opportunity. But it's only based on the questions that Mr. Bianco, two questions of Mr. Bianco.

MR. BIANCO: Yes. Thank you very much for your indulgence. Speaking specifically about the 1031 violation, has that been adjudicated to your knowledge?

MR. PUENTE: No, not yet.
MR. BIANCO: And speaking directly to the issue of surrounding businesses that Ms. Jefferson asked you about, are you aware approximately how far Champion's Kitchen is from this establishment?

MR. PUENTE: It's not far. Maybe half a block at most.

MR. BIANCO: Okay, thank you.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Do you have any questions based on those, based on the questions
that were asked by Mr. Bianco, two questions, no new ground? Just based on those two questions. No?

MS. JEFFERSON: No.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right.
Thank you, Mr. Puente. You can step down. All right. What we're going to do, we're going to go out of order.

So, who called, who subpoenaed the Lieutenant? All right. So, where's Lieutenant Jenkins? Could you raise your right hand, please?

WHEREUPON,

## FRANCIS JENKINS

was called as a witness by Counsel for the Protestant and, having been first duly sworn, assumed the witness stand, was examined and testified as follows:

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right, thank you. Your witness, Ms. Jefferson.

MS. JEFFERSON: Thank you, Lieutenant Jenkins. Can you, for the record, state your name and which station you are assigned to?

MR. JENKINS: Lieutenant Francis Jenkins, Fourth District.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Lieutenant, can you pull the microphone closer to you, please? Thank you.

MS. JEFFERSON: And which PSA are you responsible for?

MR. JENKINS: 401, 402, 403.
MS. JEFFERSON: And Betty's Gojo, which is why we're here today, where is that located?

MR. JENKINS: PSA 401.
MS. JEFFERSON: Okay. And are you familiar with the community surrounding?

MR. JENKINS: Yes.
MS. JEFFERSON: How long have you been serving that PSA?

MR. JENKINS: January of 2018.
MS. JEFFERSON: And did you bring some documents with you today?

MR. JENKINS: Yes, I brought a few.
MS. JEFFERSON: Okay. Can you share with us which documents you brought?

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: No. He can't bring any documents.

MS. JEFFERSON: I subpoenaed them.
MR. BIANCO: They're not part of the
record. I haven't seen them.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Right. We can only, documents have to be in the record as part of the PIP. So, he can testify from memory. You can ask him. But he cannot testify from documents that are not disclosed.

MS. JEFFERSON: Okay. Well there's a possibility they might be already.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Yes, Mr. Bianco.

MR. BIANCO: I would ask that he not refer to the documents that have not been shared with counsel. I don't know what he's looking at.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: I'm asking the lieutenant not to, and he knows not to look at a document that you have not been handed by Ms. Jefferson. Thank you.

MR. JENKINS: Yes.
MS. JEFFERSON: So, I'll start with this. Have you ever responded to a call for service to Betty's Gojo?

MR. JENKINS: I have never responded to.

MS. JEFFERSON: Okay. Have officers that report to you ever responded?

MR. JENKINS: Yes.
MS. JEFFERSON: Okay. And how often do you believe that officers respond to calls for service per week or based on your knowledge? Let me say, based on your knowledge.

MR. JENKINS: Based on my knowledge we did an query into the calls to service to that location and to the 7600 Block of Georgia Avenue. Ran an inquiry from October 30, 2018, to October 30, 2019.

There were 36 direct calls for service to 7616 Georgia Avenue, NW. There were an additional 85 calls for service for that particular block, 7600 Block of Georgia Avenue. And to include other addresses within that block there were 318 calls for service.

MS. JEFFERSON: You said 318?
MR. JENKINS: Yes, ma'am.
MS. JEFFERSON: To the 7600 Block?
MR. JENKINS: To different addresses within that block.

MS. JEFFERSON: Different addresses on that block. And that's over just one calendar year?

MR. JENKINS: Yes.

MS. JEFFERSON: Okay. And did you run any similar reports for let's say the 7700 Block of Georgia Avenue?

MR. JENKINS: I did not.
MS. JEFFERSON: Okay. Did any of these calls of service result in any of your officers having to write, what I believe you call incident reports?

MR. JENKINS: Yes.
MS. JEFFERSON: Do you know how many?
MR. JENKINS: I don't know how many offhand. I would say between five and ten actual reports.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Lieutenant, you're speaking to us not to her. So --

MR. JENKINS: I'm sorry. I would say maybe between five and ten actual reports were made.

MS. JEFFERSON: And do you know the nature of those violations?

MR. JENKINS: We had an assault, ABRA violation, this report. Those were some of them.

MS. JEFFERSON: So, I'm going to direct everyone to Exhibit 26.
(Whereupon, the document referred to
was marked as Protestant Exhibit 26 for identification.)

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Is that from your PIP? Mr. Bianco, do you have Exhibit 26?

MR. BIANCO: I do.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Yes, you can hand it to him.

MS. JEFFERSON: Okay. Can you share with us the date on that report?

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Can you have him, ask him to identify the document first?

MS. JEFFERSON: I'm sorry, thank you. Can you please identify the document?

MR. JENKINS: Well, this is a PD-251 public incident report.

MS. JEFFERSON: Okay, thank you. And what is the report date?

MR. JENKINS: The report date is September 1, 2018.

MS. JEFFERSON: Okay. And how many responding officers are listed?

MR. JENKINS: I have one listed on this report.

MS. JEFFERSON: And how many assistant officers?

MR. JENKINS: They have none listed on the report.

MS. JEFFERSON: Okay. I'm sorry to go back to this. But would the date, can you share the time as well, I'm sorry?

MR. JENKINS: 4:40 a.m.
MS. JEFFERSON: 4:40 a.m., okay. And what was the offense?

MR. JENKINS: Simple assault.
MS. JEFFERSON: Simple assault. And what was the address?

MR. JENKINS: 7616 Georgia Avenue, NW.
MS. JEFFERSON: Okay. Does the simple assault show what the factor was?

MR. JENKINS: Yes.
MS. JEFFERSON: And can you share that with us?

MR. JENKINS: Are you talking about --
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: What exhibit are we at?

MS. JEFFERSON: 24, 26, sorry.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Can I see Exhibit 26? Let me see what it looks like, please? I just want to see. All right, hold on.

I probably was looking at the wrong
one. Go ahead, I don't have, just go ahead, please, yes.

MS. JEFFERSON: Okay, I'm sorry. Was there a weapon or force involved?

MR. JENKINS: The victim was punched with a fist.

MS. JEFFERSON: Punched with a fist. And is there a public narrative at the bottom?

MR. JENKINS: Yes.
MS. JEFFERSON: Can you read that for us, please?

MR. BIANCO: Mr. Anderson, I'm going to object. There's no foundation for this document. It hasn't been authenticated and now he's reading from a report where he has no personal knowledge.

And not only that, the name of the person who actually did take the report isn't here, isn't available for cross examination. It's inappropriate.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: I can't find the exhibit. And so, I was letting you guys go ahead while I try to find it. But I don't have it, the exhibits.

Does someone have an extra copy of
that exhibit that I can have so I can --
MR. BIANCO: Given the volume of documents I have everything electronically. So, I don't have a paper copy.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: I'm looking under the PIP for Protestant and I can't, I don't have the document. So, it's hard for me to --

MS. JEFFERSON: It should be in the record under exhibit --

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: I don't have it. Just give her a copy so I can copy or look at it, okay. I have the big book. It's not in there, okay. That's why I'm asking.

And I'm looking at documents, not the same ones. So, in order for me to make a ruling I need to, I thought I could have winged it. But now there's an objection.

I need to have the document in front of me. Exhibit 26, $I$ have that.

MS. JEFFERSON: May I ask a question while we're waiting?

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: No, you can't ask, yes, you can't ask a question unless you want to withdraw the question that you asked because he raised an objection and I need to rule
whether or not he can answer the question.
MS. JEFFERSON: It's related to his objection.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Well, why don't you withdraw the question.

MS. JEFFERSON: I'll withdraw the question.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Fine, so go ahead.

MS. JEFFERSON: Lieutenant, is it part of your job responsibility to review these public incident reports?

MR. JENKINS: Sometimes, when it's associated with an arrest.

MS. JEFFERSON: Okay. Do you recall whether you reviewed the specific one that was before you?

MR. JENKINS: I do not recall.
MS. JEFFERSON: Okay. But that's the typical practice to do that, for an officer to complete one and then you review?

MR. JENKINS: A lieutenant of our sector will review all arrests.

MS. JEFFERSON: I'm sorry.
MR. JENKINS: A lieutenant of our
borough will review all arrest reports.
MS. JEFFERSON: All the arrest reports.

MR. JENKINS: Correct.
MS. JEFFERSON: Okay. And let me hand that back. So, in that specific instance, are you able to ascertain whether there was an arrest or do these reports reflect whether an arrest actually occurs?

MR. JENKINS: The 251 involved an arrest. I don't know if there's a 163 among these report notes.

MS. JEFFERSON: I'm sorry. I don't know what a --

MR. JENKINS: I'm sorry. A PD-163 is an arrest report. I don't know if these report numbers are also associated with any PD-163 that would indicate an arrest.

MS. JEFFERSON: Okay.
MR. JENKINS: But if it's just the PD251 which is what this document is, it's just an open case report.

MS. JEFFERSON: Okay. So, have you reviewed any incident reports that came from offenses at this establishment at any time?

MR. JENKINS: I don't recall any actual report at that address.

MS. JEFFERSON: Okay. I would like to present Exhibit 30.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: You can, all you have to do is you ask for Exhibit 30 and show it to the witness. Ask him to identify it and you will ask questions.

At the end of him asking, at the end of taking testimony then if you want to move it into evidence then you would request to move it into evidence.

But prior to you just pull the document, show it to him and ask him to identify it and you can have him testify from the document if he's familiar with it.

MS. JEFFERSON: Okay, thank you. I'm going to hand you an exhibit. This is Exhibit 30. Can you turn to the third page? Do you have that copy, sir, Chair?
(Whereupon, the document referred to was marked as Protestant Exhibit 30 for identification.)

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: I don't have your exhibits. And that's what it is. I don't
have a copy of -- I have the ANC's exhibits. I have the group of five or more exhibits, but I do not have your exhibits.

So, that's, the Shepherd Park Citizens Association submitted a separate exhibit, right?

MS. JEFFERSON: Yes.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Yes, I don't have your packet. That's why, all right. But well let me see the document just in case there's going to be an objection so at least, just let me look at it then I'll have you, they're going to try to find the documents.

Okay, you can, here it is, I'm sorry. Go ahead, you can. I'll just look, but go ahead we're going to try to locate so $I$ can look at it. So, go ahead.

MS. JEFFERSON: Can you tell me what this letter is?

MR. JENKINS: It's a club closure request.

MS. JEFFERSON: Okay. Have you seen this letter before?

MR. JENKINS: I have not seen this particular letter, no.

MS. JEFFERSON: Are you aware that
there was a letter written?
MR. JENKINS: Yes.
MS. JEFFERSON: Okay. And how did you become aware of it?

MR. JENKINS: When I was assigned to, when I was summoned for this hearing.

MS. JEFFERSON: For this hearing. But other than that you, as the PSA 01 Lieutenant you were not aware that there was a closure letter from the Chief of Police?

MR. JENKINS: No, ma'am.
MS. JEFFERSON: Are there other
lieutenants who cover PSA 401?
MR. JENKINS: Yes.
MS. JEFFERSON: Okay. And is, can you just, did you know that there was a closure of this establishment?

MR. JENKINS: Yes.
MS. JEFFERSON: You did know, okay. And how did you know?

MR. BIANCO: I'm going to object. The basis of the testimony is going to be that somebody told him.

MS. JEFFERSON: That's what police officers do.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: I'm sorry, go ahead.

MR. BIANCO: He's testifying about a letter that has not been authenticated, that he didn't write, that he never knew about and it's, at this point there's been no foundation should not be part of the case.

MS. JEFFERSON: I'm just going to say police officers, everything that they get is reported from somebody else unless they actually witness it themselves. That's part of their job.

MR. BIANCO: I mean, I can't cross examine somebody who is not here.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: I mean, in this particular case, it's a matter of public record that there was, the Chief of Police sent a closure letter and that this Board acted on the closure as part of their investigative history.

MR. BIANCO: There's a line in the investigative history and $I$ agree that's fair game for the investigator. But due respect, this hasn't been established as public record or business record.

There's no evidence that it's contemporaneously kept in the ordinary course of
their business. All of these are required for admission of such a document.

So, I realize they may be purporting that all of those things are true. But without testimony to support it, it's simply inadmissible.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Where are you going with this testimony, Ms. Jefferson?

MS. JEFFERSON: My question was basically to find out whether he was aware that they had received a MPD closure and he answered the question.

MR. BIANCO: Mr. Anderson, we'll
stipulate to the fact that there was a closure. We don't need to go around five minutes of testimony. The Board acted. The Board knows that it acted.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: So, I'll sustain the objection. Let's move on.

MS. JEFFERSON: Okay. On average when there are calls for service to Betty's how many officers typically go?

MR. JENKINS: At least two squad cars, at least two officers. But if there's a major incident or significant incident at a club
there's going to be, typically three to four scout cars and anywhere between four to five officers for a club incident because we know there is a large crowd.

MS. JEFFERSON: Okay. So, unless there's, I just want to make sure that I understood your testimony correct. When you get those calls for service, and you mentioned earlier there were over 30, there are at least two officers that respond.

MR. JENKINS: Yes.
MS. JEFFERSON: Within the same car.
MR. JENKINS: They could be two separate cars.

MS. JEFFERSON: They could be two separate cars that are sent out. And what makes the difference between whether it's in one car or two? Is it based on where they are?

MR. JENKINS: Typically, the manpower for the night we have officers, we can have two officers per car. Typically we have one officer per vehicle.

MS. JEFFERSON: So, if there's a noise complaint is that a, or a noise call for service is it typically one officer who responds or two?

MR. JENKINS: A noise, depending if it's disorderly or non-disorderly calls require two officers.

MS. JEFFERSON: Okay. Where there's a fight?

MR. JENKINS: Definitely two officers.
MS. JEFFERSON: Okay. What about if there's an assault that results in someone being taken in an ambulance?

MR. JENKINS: That would require two officers. The only thing that requires only one officer is a standard report. So just something like that.

MS. JEFFERSON: Okay. Are you aware that an ABRA investigator was assaulted at 7616 Georgia Avenue?

MR. BIANCO: I'm going to object.
That assumes facts not in evidence. There's no foundation.

MS. JEFFERSON: It's public record. There's a court case.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Well, I'm going to sustain the objection. You need to ask the question a different way because your, ask the question a different way.

You're not an attorney and I'm going to do this. Maybe you need to ask another question, is he aware of, you can ask him about it, yes.

MS. JEFFERSON: Okay. Do you have any knowledge of a report or of an ABRA investigator being assaulted at 7616 Georgia Avenue?

MR. JENKINS: Yes.
MS. JEFFERSON: Did you review the report for that particular incident?

MR. JENKINS: $I$ reviewed it, but not on the night of. I reviewed it once $I$ found out that it had occurred.

MS. JEFFERSON: Okay. Can you tell us any information about the incident itself, the type of assault?

MR. JENKINS: I know there was --
MR. BIANCO: I'm going to object again as this witness has no personal knowledge of this except for reading a report that's not in evidence --

MS. JEFFERSON: That's his job.
MR. BIANCO: -- hasn't been presented. The fact that there's a report, $I$ agree would be his job. But the details, the contents are all
hearsay. I don't have the opportunity to cross examine on that.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: I'm going to overrule the objection. You can cross examine him on the basis of his knowledge. Go ahead, you can answer the question, sir, if you can.

MR. JENKINS: An investigator was on scene at 7616 Georgia Avenue, NW at Betty's Gojo and he was taking photos of the establishment. And two patrons approached him.

One slapped his cell phone out of his hand. The other kicked the cell phone so it was thrown into the street. The investigator picked up the phone and again recording or taking pictures of the suspects and digitally summoned for police to respond.

MPD responded out. It was determined that the, through the video surveillance and the victim's testimony that he was assaulted. The suspects returned to the scene and were ultimately placed under arrest for simple assault, APO on the ABRA investigator.

MS. JEFFERSON: Can you explain what an APO is? I'm sorry, we don't know what that is.

MR. JENKINS: I'm sorry. It's an assault on a police officer but it's also considered on any D.C. official working in any capacity.

MS. JEFFERSON: And is that a misdemeanor or is that a felony? What level does that rise to?

MR. JENKINS: This particular APO was a misdemeanor.

MS. JEFFERSON: Misdemeanor, okay. In the regular course of doing police work the police department uses numbers to identify these public incident reports. Is that correct?

MR. JENKINS: Yes.
MS. JEFFERSON: And so, you have I think still Exhibit 26 in front of you.

MR. JENKINS: Yes.
MS. JEFFERSON: Okay. Does it show a CCN number?

MR. JENKINS: Yes. That's the Central complaint number.

MS. JEFFERSON: So, that's what CCN stands for?

MR. JENKINS: Yes, ma'am.
MS. JEFFERSON: Okay. And what is
that number?
MR. JENKINS: For this assault that occurred on September 1st it's 18, that stands for the year.

MS. JEFFERSON: Okay.
MR. JENKINS: 146557.
MS. JEFFERSON: And you mentioned the 18 means the year. What do those other numbers mean?

MR. JENKINS: Those are just the random numbers.

MS. JEFFERSON: Okay. I would like to admit that as evidence.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: That's Exhibit 26?

MR. BIANCO: That's Exhibit 26 and again we object. This witness has no personal knowledge of what occurred on that evening. He is in no position to testify about it.

I can't cross examine him on what exactly happened or what the basis of his understanding is about whether or not this individual who assaulted whomever was in any way related to my client's establishment. It leaves me in the dark.

MS. JEFFERSON: The two are separate questions. My question was --

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: We're talking about the document. That's, you want to introduce the document in evidence and he's saying that he objects to the introduction of the document into evidence.

MS. JEFFERSON: This is police records. They're publicly available. You can go to any station and get them. It goes to the weight of the evidence.

MR. BIANCO: I don't disagree. But it requires a custodian of records to authenticate the document and you don't have a custodian of records or at least not someone who can establish this one.

MS. JEFFERSON: We --
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: I'm going to overrule the objection. I'll admit it to evidence over Petitioner's, I'm sorry, Applicant's objection. So, I'll admit Exhibit 26 to the record.
(Whereupon, the document previously marked as Protestant Exhibit 26 for identification was received into evidence.)

MS. JEFFERSON: Thank you so much. So, I've attended PSA meetings before. I think they're open to the public. You have them, is it once a month?

MR. JENKINS: Once a quarter.
MS. JEFFERSON: Once a quarter, okay.
And at these meetings the, is it the normal practice that the lieutenants or captains give crime statistics?

MR. JENKINS: Yes.
MS. JEFFERSON: Do they ever give details about specific locations?

MR. JENKINS: Not unless inquired in the meeting.

MS. JEFFERSON: Okay. Have you attended any of the PSA meetings since being there in 2018?

MR. JENKINS: I've attended maybe three meetings.

MS. JEFFERSON: Okay. Did this establishment, meaning Betty's Gojo, did anyone ever mention it?

MR. JENKINS: No, ma'am.
MS. JEFFERSON: Okay. How many officers report to you?

MR. JENKINS: I'm sorry.
MS. JEFFERSON: On average.
MR. JENKINS: On average, the entire shift reports to you. But if you're talking about PSA 401 members there are 12 members assigned the PSA 401.

MS. JEFFERSON: On a shift?
MR. JENKINS: On a midnight shift.
MS. JEFFERSON: On a midnight shift?
MR. JENKINS: Yes, ma'am.
MS. JEFFERSON: Okay. Have you ever, and I may, please forgive me if I'm asked this question. Have you ever responded to any call to 7616 Georgia Avenue?

MR. JENKINS: I have not been to 7616 Georgia Avenue.

MS. JEFFERSON: Okay. What about the alley behind 7616 Georgia Avenue?

MR. JENKINS: I have not responded to the alley.

MS. JEFFERSON: Okay.
MR. JENKINS: Just typically
lieutenants don't respond to calls unless we have a major incident.

MS. JEFFERSON: Okay. And would a
closure be considered or an incident that rises to the level of a closure, would that be something that a lieutenant would normally be called to come after the responding officers?

MR. JENKINS: Yes.
MS. JEFFERSON: Okay. Given your knowledge, the people who report to you respond to a wide range of police calls.

How would you characterize the number of, sorry, calls for service to this location, this particular location versus other similar establishments in your PSA? Would you say it's average, low, high?

MR. JENKINS: I would say high. Most likely because there is no security there. So, you get a high number of calls.

MS. JEFFERSON: Okay, thank you. No further. Well, no questions right now.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Mr. Bianco. CROSS EXAMINATION

MR. BIANCO: You just testified that you would characterize calls to this establishment as a high number. Did you compare it to other calls to other establishments in the area for the purpose of today's testimony?

MR. JENKINS: No.
MR. BIANCO: So, what's your basis for saying that?

MR. JENKINS: Based on the query that we ran for this address.

MR. BIANCO: And that's the one that came up with the 36 calls for this particular address?

MR. JENKINS: That is correct.
MR. BIANCO: Are you familiar with an establishment called Champion's Kitchen?

MR. JENKINS: Yes.
MR. BIANCO: And did you run a similar search on Champion's Kitchen?

MR. JENKINS: No.
MR. BIANCO: Okay. And that establishment is only a couple hundred feet away from Betty's Gojo, correct?

MR. JENKINS: It's in the 7700 Block.
MR. BIANCO: I don't have any further questions.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Any questions by the Board Members? Yes, Mr. Short.

MEMBER SHORT: Good morning, Lieutenant Jenkins.

MR. JENKINS: Good morning.
MEMBER SHORT: Thank you for your service. Thank you for being here this morning. I'm particularly concerned about the resources from the Fourth District that are expended for this particular establishment.

Could you quantify or give us an example on a monthly basis how many calls go to 7616 Georgia Avenue and how many resources from MPD are required, on average?

MR. JENKINS: I can't quantify the monthly response to that location. But on average if you total the incident.

MEMBER SHORT: It's a restaurant, correct?

MR. JENKINS: Correct.
MEMBER SHORT: Are they operating as a club?

MR. JENKINS: They don't have any, a restaurant license.

MEMBER SHORT: It's licensed as a restaurant. But how do they operate? Well, let me ask another question. How many restaurants are in the Fourth District?

MR. JENKINS: That $I$ can't answer.

MEMBER SHORT: How many restaurants are on Georgia Avenue?

MR. JENKINS: Quite a few. I can't give a number.

MEMBER SHORT: The average restaurant on Georgia Avenue get the same police responses as Betty's Gojo?

MR. JENKINS: The average restaurant, no. The problem restaurants, yes.

MEMBER SHORT: Would you consider Betty Gojo a problem restaurant?

MR. JENKINS: Yes.
MEMBER SHORT: And it costs an inordinate amount of police resources. Is that correct?

MR. JENKINS: Correct.
MEMBER SHORT: Do you think an RDO when they are open after 12, midnight would help the situation?

MR. JENKINS: Yes.
MEMBER SHORT: So, an RDO would be the answer that you would give as a lieutenant with your experience. How many years experience do you have, Lieutenant?

MR. JENKINS: Seventeen years.

MEMBER SHORT: Seventeen years. And so, you're saying an RDO detail at the front door of Betty's Gojo, 7616 Georgia Avenue, NW, would alleviate some of the stresses for resources in the Fourth District MPD, Washington D.C.?

MR. JENKINS: I think it would alleviate a lot of it.

MEMBER SHORT: I do thank you very much. Thank you for your time today, sir, and thank you for your answers.

MR. JENKINS: Yes, sir.
MS. JEFFERSON: I have a --
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: No, Ms.
Jefferson.
MS. JEFFERSON: Okay.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: This is the Board's opportunity. And so, when the Board and if I have a question to ask and then we'll go back and, all right.

Mr. Bianco, do you have any questions to ask the Lieutenant based on the questions that were asked by Mr. Short?

MR. BIANCO: I do not, sir.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Ms. Jefferson, do you have a question to ask the Lieutenant
based on the question that was asked by Mr. Short?

MS. JEFFERSON: Yes.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Go ahead.
MS. JEFFERSON: Board Member Short
asked about the calls for service for other restaurants on Georgia Avenue. In your 17 years of experience, how often did you receive a call for service for an incident at a specific 100 Block that's really for something on another block?

MR. BIANCO: I'm going to object. I mean, I suppose it's a technical objection. It's compound. But the practical one is I don't understand the question.

MS. JEFFERSON: So, let me clarify the question.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Yes.
MS. JEFFERSON: You have a 7600 Block and you have a 7700 Block, okay. And every street in D.C. has 100 blocks, correct?

MR. JENKINS: Yes.
MS. JEFFERSON: So, Board Member Short asked you about the calls for service on Georgia Avenue. And my question is, in your experience
in 17 years, how often does someone call for an incident such as on the 7600 Block when it's really for an incident on the 7700 Block? Is that normal?

MR. JENKINS: You're talking about an individual calling police in reference to a crime that occurred it happens quite often where they go to another location.

If you're talking about an incident that happened on a certain location such as an establishment or a school or store or something like that, the reported incident location would usually be to that particular block.

MS. JEFFERSON: Okay. So, it's not for another block if it's related to a specific establishment?

MR. JENKINS: Most of the time it would be that particular block.

MS. JEFFERSON: Okay. No further questions.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Lieutenant, thank you very much for your testimony.

MS. JEFFERSON: Thank you so much.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: You can step down. Have a good day. All right. We'll take a
five minute break and then we'll have the Protestant, I'm sorry, we'll have the Licensee present its case.

And once the Licensee has presented its case then we'll decide if we're going to do a lunch break. I will make that determination based on how many witnesses that we have and how much, where we are in the day, okay, because I want to make sure that it's over by 5 o'clock. Yes.

MS. JEFFERSON: Is it possible if I could get a check for my time, please?

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: As I said, that's not an issue.

MS. JEFFERSON: Okay, thank you.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: The only issue I'm keeping everyone to is that --

MS. JEFFERSON: You've got somewhere to go.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: -- at the end of the day because we're not going to, that hearing is going to take more than three hours. I try to be fair especially we don't have another hearing today.

But I don't want, I want you to be
mindful of everyone's time. So, we'll take a, it's $12: 14$ and we'll be back, we'll come back on the record at 12:20 and then we'll have the Applicant present its case, okay.
(Whereupon, the above-entitled matter went off the record at $12: 13 \mathrm{p} . \mathrm{m}$. and resumed at 12:28 p.m.)

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Who is your first witness?

MR. BIANCO: We call Hewitt Okbagabrr.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: I'm sorry, what's it?

MR. BIANCO: Hewitt Okbagabrr. Can you stand, please? Can you stand? Can you raise your right hand, please? WHEREUPON,

HEWITT OKBAGABRR
was called as a witness by Counsel for the Applicant and, having been first duly sworn, assumed the witness stand, was examined and testified as follows:

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Have a seat and pull the microphone close to your face when you speak?

MEMBER SHORT: Can you have her spell
her last name?
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: No, he's going to do that.

## DIRECT EXAMINATION

MR. BIANCO: Hewitt, is it okay if I
call you by your first name?
MS. OKBAGABRR: Sure.
MR. BIANCO: Okay, great. Are you familiar with Betty's Gojo?

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Ask her to identify herself for the record, please.

MR. BIANCO: Sure. Can you please state your full name for the record?

MS. OKBAGABRR: Hewitt Okbagabrr.
MR. BIANCO: Okay. And could you spell your last name, please, for the Board?

MS. OKBAGABRR: 0-K-B-A-G-A-B-R-R.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Pull the microphone closer to you because I can't hear you.

MR. BIANCO: Hewitt, can you tell the Board if you are familiar with Betty's Gojo at 7616 Georgia Avenue, NW?

MS. OKBAGABRR: Yes, I am.
MR. BIANCO: Okay. And how do you
know it?
MS. OKBAGABRR: I go there to hang out.

MR. BIANCO: Is there any other way that you're familiar with that establishment?

MS. OKBAGABRR: I have a business like 500 feet from there.

MR. BIANCO: Okay. And what's the name of your business?

MS. OKBAGABRR: Nahom Ingera and Grocery.

MR. BIANCO: And what's the address of your business?

MS. OKBAGABRR: 7714 Georgia Avenue, NW.

MR. BIANCO: Okay. And how often do you go to Betty's Gojo to hang out?

MS. OKBAGABRR: Three times a week.
MR. BIANCO: Three times a week. And what times do you go there?

MS. OKBAGABRR: From, sometimes from midnight to 1:30 and sometimes from 9:00 to 2:00 a.m.

MR. BIANCO: And shift back to your business for a moment. You just own the business
or you do you actually work there?
MS. OKBAGABRR: I work there too.
MR. BIANCO: Okay. And what hours do you work at your business?

MS. OKBAGABRR: We open at night from 3:00 p.m. to 11:00 a.m.

MR. BIANCO: And those are the hours that you're actually there?

MS. OKBAGABRR: Yes.
MR. BIANCO: And what do you do when you're working at your business?

MS. OKBAGABRR: We bake Ethiopian food.

MR. BIANCO: So, you bake food. And the times that you go to Betty's Gojo, is it just during the week or is it on both, is it both during the weekend?

MS. OKBAGABRR: Both.
MR. BIANCO: And can you describe it for me?

MS. OKBAGABRR: I visit to get food and to hang out with my friend. It is a good place to hang out for me.

MR. BIANCO: Is it too loud for you?
MS. OKBAGABRR: No. There is no DJ
upstairs. I don't know about downstairs. But there is no DJ, just regular music.

MR. BIANCO: Regular music. By
regular music what do you mean?
MS. OKBAGABRR: Like YouTube, TV.
MR. BIANCO: Okay. And have you
noticed anything about the age, the general age of the crowd that goes there?

MS. OKBAGABRR: Not teenager age but it 25 through 35 is the people that come upstairs.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Ma'am, can you speak up, please?

MEMBER SHORT: Speak into the microphone. Thank you.

MS. OKBAGABRR: Okay.
MR. BIANCO: How long have you been going to Betty's Gojo?

MS. OKBAGABRR: More than three years.
MR. BIANCO: I'm sorry, did you say more than two years or more than three?

MS. OKBAGABRR: Three.
MR. BIANCO: Okay. And did you go
there when there was a prior owner?
MS. OKBAGABRR: Yes.

MR. BIANCO: Do you know who the prior owner was?

MS. JEFFERSON: Objection.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: What's the nature of the objection?

MS. JEFFERSON: It's already been established that there was no prior owner, that this was a continuance of ownership. There was a stock transfer. You all did an order on that.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: I'm going to overrule the objection. She can answer that because I don't, I mean, I don't know. So, let me see what we're dealing with this.

So, go ahead. You can ask the question.

MR. BIANCO: Who was that prior owner?
MS. OKBAGABRR: Betty.
MR. BIANCO: So, the actual Betty of Betty's Gojo?

MS. OKBAGABRR: Yes.
MR. BIANCO: Okay. And what are the, or are there any differences between how Betty ran the establishment and how Kibreck and Abebe run it?
it used to be very crowded. Now it's not that crowded. There's not that much people.

MR. BIANCO: So, your business is a few doors down from Betty's Gojo. But where do you live?

MS. OKBAGABRR: I live in 6650 Georgia Avenue, six blocks from that.

MR. BIANCO: And the times when you have been at Betty's Gojo, have you ever seen any fights?

MS. OKBAGABRR: No.
MR. BIANCO: Any other disturbances?
MS. OKBAGABRR: No.
MR. BIANCO: So, have you ever noticed any trash or garbage on the sidewalk near the street in front of Betty's?

MS. OKBAGABRR: No, I never have.
MR. BIANCO: Have you ever seen anyone from Betty's tending to trash or garbage on the street?

MS. OKBAGABRR: No.
MR. BIANCO: Could you please describe what happens when you go there and when you enter? Can you walk me through that process?

MS. OKBAGABRR: When I go there is
security that check the ID first. If I have a bag they check my bag first.

MR. BIANCO: Do you ever get patted down when you go in?

MS. OKBAGABRR: No. I don't go downstairs.

MR. BIANCO: You don't go downstairs.
MS. OKBAGABRR: No.
MR. BIANCO: Okay. So, have you seen security guards inside of Betty's Gojo?

MS. OKBAGABRR: Yes.
MR. BIANCO: And can you describe what they're doing inside of Betty's Gojo?

MS. OKBAGABRR: Check the ID and sometimes there are two security, downstairs. I don't go downstairs but I see them when they come up and out, yes.

MR. BIANCO: And is there access to the rear parking lot from the inside of Betty's Gojo?

MS. OKBAGABRR: There is a parking lot on the back side.

MR. BIANCO: How do you get to it?
MS. OKBAGABRR: You cannot get in the back door through the bar.

MR. BIANCO: Why can't you get out the back door?

MS. OKBAGABRR: The doors are locked.
MR. BIANCO: The door is locked.
MS. OKBAGABRR: Yes.
MR. BIANCO: Okay. So, if you're going to go to the parking lot you have to --

MS. OKBAGABRR: You have to go the main entrance.

MR. BIANCO: Do you ever eat there?
MS. OKBAGABRR: Yes.
MR. BIANCO: Is the food good?
MS. OKBAGABRR: It's good, yes.
MR. BIANCO: What's your favorite?
MS. OKBAGABRR: Lamb.
MR. BIANCO: The lamb, okay. How
often do you eat there?
MS. OKBAGABRR: Maybe once a week.
MR. BIANCO: Once a week.
MS. OKBAGABRR: Yes.
MR. BIANCO: And when you go there to eat are there other customers eating?

MS. OKBAGABRR: Yes.
MR. BIANCO: And when you're working your overnight shifts at your business, do you
ever hear any disturbances?
MS. OKBAGABRR: No.
MR. BIANCO: Have you ever seen any customers coming from Betty's causing trouble at your place?

MS. OKBAGABRR: Never, no.
MR. BIANCO: Do you think Betty's Gojo is bad for the neighborhood?

MS. OKBAGABRR: I don't think so.
MR. BIANCO: Do you think it's good for the neighborhood?

MS. OKBAGABRR: It's good.
MR. BIANCO: Why?
MS. OKBAGABRR: Because I don't see anything wrong. It is not that loud. Whenever I go it's good.

MR. BIANCO: Is there a rear exit to your business?

MS. OKBAGABRR: No.
MR. BIANCO: Have you ever been in the parking lot behind Betty's?

MS. OKBAGABRR: Yes.
MR. BIANCO: And what have you observed, if anything, when you went back there?

MS. OKBAGABRR: I didn't see anything.

There were just cars parked and they walked to the front door.

MR. BIANCO: Okay. I don't have any further questions. Ms. Jefferson is now going to ask you some questions.

CROSS EXAMINATION
MS. JEFFERSON: Hi.
MS. OKBAGABRR: Hi.
MS. JEFFERSON: Have you ever smoked hookah when you've been at Betty's?

MS. OKBAGABRR: I don't smoke.
MS. JEFFERSON: But you've seen people do it?

MS. OKBAGABRR: Upstairs?
MS. JEFFERSON: Anywhere?
MS. OKBAGABRR: I only see upstairs. I don't go downstairs.

MS. JEFFERSON: And I believe your previous testimony was that you make food?

MS. OKBAGABRR: No, we bake the Ethiopian food. It's making bread.

MS. JEFFERSON: Is Betty's one of your clients?

MS. OKBAGABRR: No, they are not.
MS. JEFFERSON: No further, no
questions.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right, Mr. Short.

MEMBER SHORT: Good afternoon. You just mentioned you always come in the front door when you come into Betty's?

MS. OKBAGABRR: Yes.
MEMBER SHORT: And you mentioned something about the back door.

MS. OKBAGABRR: I park my car if there is no parking at the front. And I have to walk through the front door because --

MEMBER SHORT: Everybody comes through the front door.

MS. OKBAGABRR: Yes.
MEMBER SHORT: That's where you get your ID checked. But now, the back door, is it always locked?

MS. OKBAGABRR: It's always locked, yes. When I try to open it is locked.

MEMBER SHORT: If something happened at the front door or caught fire or something like that, how would you get out?

MS. OKBAGABRR: I would have to ask the owners to open it because it's locked.

MEMBER SHORT: In an emergency, do you think it would be, do you think that's good you have to wait for someone to unlock an exit door?

MS. OKBAGABRR: I don't think so. But at the same time because they don't want people to come through and that's why they lock it.

MEMBER SHORT: I do understand that. But the law says they must have two means of egress when you're inside of the club. So, you have to have a front door so people can get out and a back door.

That's what the law says. So, maybe you need to ask them about that the next time you're there because maybe they need to put a security person at that back door. But the back door should be open.

MS. OKBAGABRR: Okay.
MEMBER SHORT: And we're probably going to ask one of our investigators to check the next time he's there.

MS. OKBAGABRR: Okay.
MEMBER SHORT: Thank you very much.
MS. OKBAGABRR: You're welcome.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Do you have any questions, Ms. Jefferson, based on the questions
that Mr. Short asked?
MS. JEFFERSON: No.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Mr. Bianco, do you have any questions based on the questions Mr. Short asked?

MR. BIANCO: No further questions.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Thank you, ma'am, for your testimony. You may step down.

MR. BIANCO: Mr. Chair, if I could step outside and get my next witness.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Sure.
MR. BIANCO: Thank you very much.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Who is your next witness, sir?

MR. BIANCO: David Andrew.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Can you raise your right hand, Mr. Andrew? WHEREUPON,

## DAVID ANDREW

was called as a witness by Counsel for the Applicant and, having been first duly sworn, assumed the witness stand, was examined and testified as follows:

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Have a seat please and pull the microphone close to you, sir?

DIRECT EXAMINATION
MR. BIANCO: David, is that your last name or is it Andrew or Andrews?

MR. ANDREW: Drew with no S.
MR. BIANCO: With no, s, okay. Sorry about that. Can you just for the record state your full name?

MR. ANDREW: David Andrew.
MR. BIANCO: And, Mr. Andrew, where do you work?

MR. ANDREW: I own Prestige Event Management.

MR. BIANCO: And that's your company?
MR. ANDREW: Yes.
MR. BIANCO: Okay. How long have you owned that company?

MR. ANDREW: Thirteen years.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Pull the microphone closer to you, Mr. Andrew.

MR. ANDREW: Sorry, 13 years.
MR. BIANCO: And what does that company do?

MR. ANDREW: We provide security, bodyguards, venues, marketing, credit card processing, video surveillance, venues,
promoters, everything for the industry.
MR. BIANCO: Do you provide security to bars, restaurants and night clubs?

MR. ANDREW: Yes.
MR. BIANCO: How many bars,
restaurants and night clubs do you represent in D.C.?

MR. ANDREW: Currently just in D.C.?
MR. BIANCO: Just in D.C.
MR. ANDREW: Six, seven.
MR. BIANCO: How about, I'm sorry,
seven. And is that including Betty's?
MR. ANDREW: Yes.
MR. BIANCO: Okay. And how many
overall?
MR. ANDREW: Eleven.
MR. BIANCO: And how would you characterize Betty's? Is it a restaurant, like a bar or a night club?

MR. ANDREW: A restaurant and lounge.
MR. BIANCO: So, you're familiar with the establishment that we're here about, Betty's Gojo, correct?

MR. ANDREW: Yes.
MR. BIANCO: Okay. And they're one of
your clients?
MR. ANDREW: Yes.
MR. BIANCO: And when did you start providing security for Betty's Gojo?

MR. ANDREW: I forget the exact date. It hasn't been that long. A few months.

MR. BIANCO: Has it been six months?
MR. ANDREW: Yes, about six.
MR. BIANCO: And when you started working at Betty's did you enter into a contract with them?

MR. ANDREW: Yes, but I've never worked there.

MR. BIANCO: You've never personally worked there?

MR. ANDREW: No.
MR. BIANCO: But you're familiar with the contract?

MR. ANDREW: Yes.
MR. BIANCO: Did you write the contract?

MR. ANDREW: Yes.
MR. BIANCO: Does the contract call for manpower to be provided to Betty's from your company?

MR. ANDREW: Yes.
MR. BIANCO: Okay. And what specifically does it provide with respect to the number of people you are to provide?

MR. ANDREW: It depends on the size of the crowd and where their parties are located, whether on the first floor or the lower. It's basically based on the agreement they made with ABRA to reopen before $I$ took over.

MR. BIANCO: And that was in May of 2019?

MR. ANDREW: I believe so, yes.
MR. BIANCO: And did Betty's provide you a copy of that agreement?

MR. ANDREW: No.
MR. BIANCO: How were you aware of it?
MR. ANDREW: The last attorney told me.

MR. BIANCO: And --
MR. ANDREW: But in the transfer we didn't question, there was, if they have customers upstairs and downstairs they have to one security at the door at all times to check ID and enforce capacity and search men and check all bags.

MR. BIANCO: And when there's something going on downstairs?

MR. ANDREW: You have to have one downstairs as well.

MR. BIANCO: Okay. And does --
MS. JEFFERSON: I'm going to object.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: What's the --
MS. JEFFERSON: He's not testifying to his personal knowledge. He hasn't been there. He hasn't established the foundation that he's actually even been there.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: I believe that Mr., and maybe if I'm wrong maybe I can be corrected. I think Mr. Andrew said that he's the owner of Prestige Security Management which is the company that's providing security to the establishment. That's what he testified to.

MS. JEFFERSON: But being an owner and working there --

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: But he stated that he has never been there. So, he doesn't, the owner doesn't have to be there. I'm taking that he's giving testimony about, on fulfilling the contract.

MS. JEFFERSON: Well, he said he never
saw the contract.
MR. ANDREW: No, I said -- should I be answering?

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: No, no. All right, I'm going to allow him to testify. But let me see, read on. Go ahead and you can just ask the question.

MR. BIANCO: Well, to be clear you have seen the contract?

MR. ANDREW: Yes, you asked me and I said I wrote it.

MR. BIANCO: You wrote it?
MR. ANDREW: Right.
MR. BIANCO: Okay. And --
MR. ANDREW: I said I hadn't seen the security plan.

MR. BIANCO: So, what the contract calls for is two security guards when there's an event downstairs.

MR. ANDREW: Yes, yes. And if it's a larger event there has to be a third one.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Well, why don't you just let, Mr. Bianco, don't lead the witness. I mean, if he signed the contract you need to ask him what is the contract asks for rather than
telling him what it is.
So, you're an attorney so you know better than that. So, please ask the witness a proper question.

MR. BIANCO: You're correct, Mr. Chair. I'm just trying to get through this as judiciously as possible.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Okay.
MR. BIANCO: So, what does the contract call for in terms of manpower?

MR. ANDREW: One security at the front door. One security downstairs if they're having an event downstairs. If they have a large event of they have an event on both floors I have to have a third one who roams both floors.

MR. BIANCO: And who is responsible for providing that manpower?

MR. ANDREW: Prestige, my company.
MR. BIANCO: Is it you personally or
a company?
MR. ANDREW: As far as scheduling?
MR. BIANCO: Yes.
MR. ANDREW: It's me personally.
MR. BIANCO: And do you provide that security in accordance with the contract?

MR. ANDREW: Yes.
MS. JEFFERSON: Object. We don't have the contract to authenticate what his services actually encompass.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: I'm going to overrule the objection, Ms. Jefferson. Unless you can prove otherwise, Mr. Andrew has identified himself as an owner of Prestige Management that provides security service.

So, unless you can say that there is no security there, that he's not the owner, $I$ mean, I'm going to overrule the objection. So, you can answer the question based on who Mr. Andrew states that he is.

On cross examination you can ask all those questions then.
(PA Announcement)
MR. BIANCO: So, the people that you schedule for Betty's Gojo, is it always the same people or do you send different people there?

MR. ANDREW: Different people.
MR. BIANCO: And how are your people trained?

MR. ANDREW: They're trained by me and by the managers that $I$ train. And they have to
go through the security force training program by Nightclub Security and trained and taught by Robert Smith within 90 days of being hired otherwise they can't work anymore or get a raise.

MR. BIANCO: And what qualifies you to --

MEMBER SHORT: Can you speak into the microphone, please, Mr. Andrew? Speak into the microphone.

MR. BIANCO: And what qualifies you to train people?

MR. ANDREW: Thirty years of experience. I just stopped working myself six years ago except for special events. But before that I worked other than Park and Love every major club in D.C., Maryland and Virginia.

MR. BIANCO: Have you ever personally been there during operating hours?

MR. ANDREW: Yes.
MR. BIANCO: And what nights have you been there?

MR. ANDREW: Tuesday.
MR. BIANCO: What's going on there on Tuesday?

MR. ANDREW: There's a West African

Night which is primarily downstairs. And the regular customers was Ethiopian upstairs drinking, ordering food.

MR. BIANCO: And what have you personally observed, I'm sorry, let me take a step back. Have you been there on nights other than Tuesdays?

MR. ANDREW: I have been there for a couple of meetings with people socially with before $I$ had the contract, before $I$ knew the owners. I don't remember what those, they weren't like late night. They were like for lunch, dinner or stuff like that.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: I can't hear you, Mr. Andrew.

MEMBER SHORT: Please speak into the microphone.

MR. ANDREW: You want me to repeat that?

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: No.
MR. ANDREW: Okay.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: But I'm just saying that $I$ can't hear you.

MR. BIANCO: On the nights you were, on the Tuesdays nights that you were there what,
if anything, did you notice about the noise level at that restaurant?

MR. ANDREW: No one was on the floor when you first walk in. There was some light mood music or anything. And downstairs, I mean, it's normal lounge, club sound music.

But, I mean, it's in the basement so you can't even hear it upstairs on the main floor. You can't hear it outside from the park which is only because I have been.

MR. BIANCO: Is your company to provide security to control the public sidewalk in front of the establishment?

MR. ANDREW: Well, to control it, no. To make sure that they don't loiter and that they leave, yes. We try to do that.

MR. BIANCO: And how do you accomplish that?

MR. ANDREW: Let people know please disburse. If you're waiting your Uber please, you know, step away from the premises or go across the street. That's it.

You can't force them to leave the public sidewalk. You try to.

MR. BIANCO: Okay. Are you familiar
with the rear lot behind the property?
MR. ANDREW: Not really, no. I mean, I know it's there. I haven't been back there.

MR. BIANCO: Do your people check the lot periodically?

MR. ANDREW: No.
MR. BIANCO: From the time your company started providing security at Betty's what changes, if any, have you put into place?

MR. ANDREW: I mean, that's difficult to answer because I don't know what was happening before then. All I know is that, how my employees operate.

They search everyone thoroughly from collar to ankle each time they come in. They check their ID each time they come in. They use their flashlight to search all women's bags, all DJ's backpacks. Any bag that comes in gets searched.

We can't pat down the females. We don't have a female security there. But we will search things thoroughly. The lights are on about ten minutes until closing time.

The music is off or the DJ has to turn the music down low to let people know it's time
to go. You have five minutes. You have to get your drinks. Head to the door and everyone has to be out by 2 o'clock except staff.

MR. BIANCO: Thank you, Mr. Andrew. I don't have any further questions. Ms. Jefferson is going to have some for you now.

MR. ANDREW: Okay.
MS. JEFFERSON: We meet again.
MR. ANDREW: Hi.
CROSS EXAMINATION
MS. JEFFERSON: Let me ask you, where is your business licensed?

MR. ANDREW: To the Taxation Office in Baltimore.

MS. JEFFERSON: In Baltimore, so not in the District of Columbia?

MR. ANDREW: No, it's a Maryland license.

MS. JEFFERSON: Okay. Do you know that it is illegal to operate a business in the District of Columbia without a business license?

MR. BIANCO: Objection.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Hold on. What's the nature of the objection?

MR. BIANCO: Calls for a legal
conclusion.
MS. JEFFERSON: Do you have a D.C. license? I withdraw. Do you have a D.C. license?

MR. ANDREW: No.
MS. JEFFERSON: Okay. Have you observed any camera system or anything at the premises?

MR. ANDREW: Yes.
MS. JEFFERSON: Have you observed the cameras themselves or the video feed from the cameras?

MR. ANDREW: Just the cameras themselves.

MS. JEFFERSON: Just the cameras. So, you don't know whether they work or not?

MR. ANDREW: No.
MS. JEFFERSON: Okay. You mentioned your prior testimony was that you hadn't been to the rear of the lot.

So, I'm curious how did you know that the security that you're providing for Betty's Gojo is adequate and would be able to mitigate any issues or security concerns that they had?

MR. ANDREW: In the back lot?

MS. JEFFERSON: Behind, behind.
MR. ANDREW: I don't. I say that we don't provide, we don't check, the security does not deal with the back lot.

MS. JEFFERSON: So, when you get a contract do you ever go out and assess the establishment and the surroundings?

MR. ANDREW: Yes.
MS. JEFFERSON: But this time you didn't?

MR. ANDREW: Not the back lot. I was told they didn't use it. I was told that the entrance was and the exit was in the front.

MS. JEFFERSON: Okay. So, no exit from the back. You mentioned that you didn't know what was happening prior to you having the contract.

So, how do you know in a situation like that what type of level of services that you need to provide for a particular establishment?

MR. ANDREW: Well, I didn't say I didn't know what was happening. I stated that I didn't know what their security did before, what their security procedures were.

As far as judging what they need
that's going to be based on, number one, their capacity. Number two, what they are willing to pay for.

I can't force a client to take things they're not going to pay for. And number three, the professionalism of my company, my employees.

MS. JEFFERSON: Okay. You were here about maybe a month and a half ago here before the Board --

MR. ANDREW: Yes.
MS. JEFFERSON: -- testifying as a witness for Champion Kitchen.

MR. ANDREW: Yes.
MS. JEFFERSON: I'm sorry, I'm pausing.
(PA Announcement)
MS. JEFFERSON: And do you recall your other testimony, any of it? Okay. During that particular proceeding which was before this Board you made the allegation that the issues that our community has complained about were attributed to Betty's Gojo. Do you recall that?

MR. ANDREW: No, not the issues. You asked me about whether or not $I$ had provided security for Champions when it was on the

Maryland side and was I there. And I said, yes.
And you asked me was I there when they had a stabbing. And I said, no, that was, the allegation was by Betty's Gojo. But I misunderstood your question when I said that.

But referring to that statement was based on that I had heard that they were, that they had an issue with a stabbing there. And I had heard that from ABRA officials.

MS. JEFFERSON: And I think you stated that you had to get them straight or something like that.

MR. ANDREW: I said I had just recently taken them over so I was going to straighten out whatever their issues were.

MS. JEFFERSON: Straighten out, okay.
MEMBER SHORT: Back in the mic, sir, back in the mic.

MR. ANDREW: Repeat it?
MEMBER SHORT: Just back in the mic.
MR. ANDREW: Sorry.
MS. JEFFERSON: So, there are a couple of situations that have happened at Betty's since 2018. And you said you started this year. So, were you there on, what date was that or was your
staff? October 31st was your --
MR. ANDREW: Of this year?
MS. JEFFERSON: Yes.
MR. ANDREW: What day was it on?
MS. JEFFERSON: Thursday. I'm sorry, November 23rd.

MR. ANDREW: Do you know what day that was on?

MS. JEFFERSON: That was a Saturday.
MR. ANDREW: No.
MS. JEFFERSON: I'm sorry, I'm waiting. Were your employees there?

MR. ANDREW: No.
MS. JEFFERSON: So, there was no security that day?

MR. ANDREW: Not that I know of.
MS. JEFFERSON: So, how often do you provide security?

MR. ANDREW: When they request it.
MS. JEFFERSON: Only when they request it?

MR. ANDREW: Right.
MS. JEFFERSON: So, it's not there daily?

MS. JEFFERSON: Okay. No further questions.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: So, Mr.
Andrews, so you're saying that, okay, you've been working there for a couple of months and you only provide security when they request it?

MR. ANDREW: Yes. That's, any, almost 90 percent of our clients. If they have a slow day, if they don't have a promoter, if they don't have a crowd that comes in they don't want to pay for security.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: So, typically when do they request your service?

MR. ANDREW: Tuesday and Wednesday and now Fridays.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: And what time is it that your staff shows up?

MR. ANDREW: 10:00 p.m. until close which is 2:00 a.m. weekdays, 3:00 a.m. on weekends and then however long it takes to get everyone out of there. So, usually about 15 minutes after.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Now, you said you represent seven other, $I$ guess, bars in D.C. Not represent, you provide security. What are
the establishments in D.C. that you provide security for?

MR. ANDREW: I would prefer not to list those.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: I'm sorry.
MR. ANDREW: I would prefer not to list those.

MEMBER SHORT: Excuse me.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Mr. Andrew --
MR. ANDREW: This is a public forum. I've got a lot of competitors.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Mr. Andrew, you're here saying that you provide security and you provide security to other companies and other ABRAs. Do you provide security to other ABRA licensed establishments in D.C.?

MR. ANDREW: Everything in D.C. is ABRA licensed to have alcohol, yes.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: And you're telling me that you would prefer not --

MR. ANDREW: I don't mind telling the Board.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: -- telling the Board?
telling the Board anything, but preferably at a private function so I don't have, I mean, people coming behind me wanting to do things that would jeopardize my business.

I don't have a problem telling the Board anything. But the Board is not the only people here.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: I'm not quite sure how to take that answer. But, you know --

MR. ANDREW: If you would like to pull me aside.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: No, that's not necessary. I just think that, you know, in order for me to make a decision about whether or not they have security or proper security I'm trying to get some information about what type of security that they have.

MR. ANDREW: I can name you a few and I can also list plenty of prior clients. I mean, if I had known I had to bring references I would have brought that for you.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: I'm not asking you for references, sir. Under, you stated that you represent, this is what, you stated, a question was asked and you stated that you
represent seven bars and restaurants in D.C. and that you represent 11 overall.

And I'm just following up to ask you what are these seven restaurants and bars in D.C.

MR. ANDREW: I understand, sir. And as $I$ stated why $I$ would prefer not to make that public to people other than the Board.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right.
MR. ANDREW: Let's just say I've been in D.C. in this business long enough to know that everyone knows who you do business with and what you own. People tend to, that gives people other avenues to come after your business.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Go ahead, Mr. Cato.

MEMBER CATO: How are you doing, Mr. Andrew?

MR. ANDREW: I'm fine. How are you?
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Andrew.
MEMBER CATO: Andrew. So, you
typically provide services for clubs?
MR. ANDREW: Lounges. Mostly, Beacon Hotel has been one of my clients for nine years before they just got bought out. So, I mean, I've done a lot of different places.

MEMBER CATO: So, why would you think that a restaurant would need to hire that security that would search somebody from collar to foot when they walk into a restaurant?

MR. ANDREW: Well, it depends. A lot of high end restaurants have security staff. You may not see them. They may be in a suit or hanging around to make sure, you know, bums off the street don't come in.

If someone gets too drunk they have someone to escort them out. It's always good to have a security presence to step in when necessary.

But a lot of restaurants do. Most restaurants that I've dealt with for security have been when they have events.

Restaurants they have to deal with, you know, supplement their income by allowing people to come in and throw parties or after wedding events or event planners, things like that.

So, because they don't use security on a regular basis they need security for those events. Like the Beacon Hotel. They have their regular guys that walk around.

But they're usually like 60, 70 years old, retired cops who can't do anything except be a presence. But when they have parties on their rooftop or in their ballrooms they need security. So, I provide all the event security for the past nine years.

MEMBER CATO: So, this restaurant typically has events.

MR. ANDREW: I also said it was a restaurant lounge. I wouldn't qualify it as a restaurant. I would definitely qualify it as a restaurant lounge, I mean, because they have a DJ downstairs sometimes.

They have music. They have people that are, it's a lounge atmosphere. Even the restaurant is a lounge atmosphere. It's not just a straight fine dining restaurant.

They have good food, you know. There are chefs there and most of the people who are upstairs are ordering food. Even people who are downstairs when they have events downstairs are ordering food.

They always have someone in the kitchen. So, that's why I said restaurant lounge.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Do you have any other questions?

MEMBER CATO: No.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Yes, Mr. Short.
MEMBER SHORT: Mr. Andrew, I'm just kind of baffled by some of your answers.

MR. ANDREW: I'm sorry to hear that.
MEMBER SHORT: Wait a minute. I'm going to, maybe you can make me not be sorry that you're here to hear what you have to say too. But what I'm trying to figure out, I know in Maryland you have to be registered with the police department for security.

I know in Virginia you have to be registered and pay a license fee. Why don't you think you have to pay a license fee in the District to get registered with the Metropolitan Police Department?

MR. ANDREW: Well, that's a policy issue in D.C.

MEMBER SHORT: It's the law.
MR. ANDREW: I understand you. I also operate in Virginia and $I$ don't have a license in Virginia.

MEMBER SHORT: Well, I'm not talking
about Virginia now.
MR. ANDREW: Well, I'm going to explain why --

MEMBER SHORT: I have authority in Virginia.

MR. ANDREW: I understand what you're saying. So, when I originally started, when I originally moved here in my first venue for Public Gardens when it was still the main club and I went to find out what I had to do to go to the Reeves Center and, you know, and get the security license.

I started LLC in D.C. to go through the full process. But then when I started going around to find out how the other security at all the other clubs in D.C. operate I found out that none of them are licensed.

And then when I talked to the representative at the time, $I$ don't remember her name, who worked in the Reeves Center here who you had to go through which is basically a urine test, a background check and a test you took like 15 minutes to take and now you're a licensed security guard.

MEMBER SHORT: Okay, that's good.

Thank you for that background because what I'm going to say and I'm going to say this on the record and I want everybody to hear this and it's going to be on the transcript.

The next time you come before this Board and you're not licensed in the District of Columbia and paying a fee like everybody else legally does, I'm going to make sure this Board and ABRA reports you to the Metropolitan Police Department.

MR. ANDREW: I understand. If you'll let me finish my answer.

MEMBER SHORT: Okay, wait a minute, please. I'm asking the questions, you answer, please. Thank you very much. I worked for the city for 33 years and I was in the Fire Marshal's Office for about half of those.

I remember the public guns. I know Marc and Ann Barnes, a whole lot of club owners. And most of the people that hire now I know are licensed. They are licensed.

MR. ANDREW: Who?
MEMBER SHORT: Sir, let me say this to you. You are not, correct?

MR. ANDREW: Are not what?

MEMBER SHORT: Are you licensed to operate in Washington D.C.?

MR. ANDREW: Through the Reeves Center, no.

MEMBER SHORT: Okay.
MR. ANDREW: I can tell you don't want to hear my answer.

MEMBER SHORT: That's good. Thank you, thank you.

MR. ANDREW: Can I get my attorney to ask me a question so $I$ can get this on the record unbiased?

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Mr. Andrew --
MEMBER SHORT: Everything is legal.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Hold on.
MR. ANDREW: You are not allowing me to answer.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Hold on, Mr.
Short. Mr. Andrew, you're under cross examination by the Board, sir.

MR. ANDREW: Yes, sir.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: The Board asked you a question. You either answer the question or you don't have an answer or you say I can't answer that question.

You don't ask the Board questions. You don't ask your attorney to ask the Board questions.

MR. ANDREW: I want to ask him to ask me a question.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: No, sir. You can't do that.

MR. ANDREW: I wasn't allowed to answer the question fully. So, you're putting something on record that's going to show a biased position towards me when all I'm trying to do is explain how the law works in D.C.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Sir, you've been asked a question and you answered the question to the best of your abilities. If the attorney who asks the question, I'm sorry, he will have an opportunity to follow up.

And if your attorney believes that he needs to do something to rehabilitate your testimony that's up to him. And, but you can't ask him to ask you a question, sir, if you're in.

MR. ANDREW: Can I be allowed to answer the question?

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Well, I think if Mr. Short asked you a yes or no answer you
answer yes or no.
It is up to your attorney, the person who presents you as a witness, sir, because if you were in a court of law, a court of law in Superior Court or Federal Court the judge would probably find you in contempt, sir, and have you arrested based on the behavior you just. So, I just want to --

MR. ANDREW: Okay.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: This is informal. I don't have that power. But I'm just saying to you, sir, you have to be careful because it's just a certain type of demeanor in the sense that when $I$ ask you a question and say if you're in court and the answers that you gave the judge would ask you to answer the question.

And if you refuse to answer questions he would either have you step down. I'm just advising you of that. But it is up to Mr. Bianco.

Once we go through the process I will give him an opportunity to ask follow up questions if he so chooses. And, but you can only speak when you're being addressed, sir.

All right. So, do you have another
question you want to ask, Mr. Short?
MEMBER SHORT: First of all, Mr. Andrew, let me apologize if my question made you feel uneasy. I'm just trying to get on the record so we can take care of this business appropriately.

Now on the contract that you did with this establishment, do you know the number that's on their certificate of occupancy? Do you know what a certificate of occupancy is?

MR. ANDREW: It was 49.
MEMBER SHORT: Excuse me.
MR. ANDREW: Forty-nine.
MEMBER SHORT: Would you believe I have in front of me the law says they can only have 44 in there? This is their certificate of occupancy that's registered with the District government.

And ABRA only goes by this and we give them on their ABRA, their ABC license the same numbers on here. So, if you're doing 49 you need to redo your contract.

MR. ANDREW: The contract doesn't have anything to do with the --

MEMBER SHORT: I haven't finished my
question. Mr. Andrew, you can only have 44 people in there.

MR. ANDREW: Okay.
MEMBER SHORT: Now, can you explain to the Board your knowledge of hookah? What does it consist of and how is it served?

MR. ANDREW: I don't have anything to do with hookah, sir.

MEMBER SHORT: Do you have anything to do with exits and egress of buildings if you're head of security?

MR. ANDREW: Yes.
MEMBER SHORT: So, it's been testimony given today with this, for the establishment that person is there they go to the back door and try to get out and they can't get out because the exit door is locked.

And that testimony was if something happened they would have to wait for somebody to bring a key for them to get out. Is that true?

MR. ANDREW: Not to my knowledge.
MEMBER SHORT: Have you ever checked the rear exits when you've been there?

MR. ANDREW: When I first took it over. Are you saying the rear exit or the
downstairs rear exit?
MEMBER SHORT: The exit doors. Have you checked the exit doors at this establishment?

MR. ANDREW: I don't believe the
downstairs door which is where customers downstairs would have to exit from in an emergency, $I$ don't think that has a lock on it.

I think there's a lock on the upstairs exit door. But I'm not sure about that.

MEMBER SHORT: Is that legal?
MR. ANDREW: I don't know. I don't know that.

MEMBER SHORT: Let me tell you, no, you cannot lock the exit doors in a place of public assembly. And if the Fire Marshal comes he can either shut you down or give you a fine so you won't do it anymore.

And then report it to ABRA so it goes on your record. If $I$ were you in charge on the contract with this business $I$ would make sure that my personnel checked those exit doors during, before, during and after.

Make sure everybody is out and those doors should be, you know, what panic hardware is?

MR. ANDREW: What panic hardware is? MEMBER SHORT: Panic hardware on doors. Panic hardware which is required for all places of public assembly over 50. So, maybe not in this because this is only 44 . Just describe what you've seen in Betty's Gojo?

MR. ANDREW: Generally, at every venue we stop at ten people under the capacity and do one in and one out after that. So --

MEMBER SHORT: You said 49. So, the way you've been doing that --

MR. ANDREW: So, we would stop them at 40.

MEMBER SHORT: Excuse me.
MR. ANDREW: You should stop them at 40 and do one in and one out.

MEMBER SHORT: Does your security use clickers?

MR. ANDREW: Yes.
MEMBER SHORT: Okay, all right. And again, $I$ apologize if the questions made you feel uneasy. But $I$ would really like the next time you come before this Board if you are registered and paying taxes on a license in the District of Columbia.

MR. ANDREW: I do pay taxes.
MEMBER SHORT: Thank you very much. That's all I have, Mr. Chair.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Do you have any questions, Ms. Jefferson, based on the questions that were asked by the Board? No. Mr. Bianco, do you have any questions for the witness based on the questions that were asked by the Board?

MR. BIANCO: I do. Mr. Andrews --
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Andrew.
REDIRECT
MR. BIANCO: Mr. Andrew, thank you, Mr. Anderson, not necessarily Andersons. Mr. Andrew, I want to ask you something to follow up on the question that Board Member Cato asked you about why you would have to pat somebody down at a club.

Are you aware of a Board order requiring that at Betty's Gojo?

MR. ANDREW: No.
MR. BIANCO: Okay. Moving on to the capacity issue that Mr. Short asked you about. Have you had occasion to review their posted liquor license for capacity?

MR. ANDREW: Not since the beginning.

MR. BIANCO: Okay. Do you recall what the liquor license said with respect to capacity? MR. ANDREW: I thought it was 49. But as I said, either way we always stop ten below.

MR. BIANCO: Understood. And you had a substantial colloquy with Mr. Short on the issue of licensure and you indicated that you were not given the opportunity to provide a full answer.

Without taking a position on this issue, $I$ do want to give you the opportunity to provide a complete answer.

MR. ANDREW: Well, if you go to any club in D.C. and there maybe one percent, but 99 percent you'll find that none of the security guards, bouncers, whatever you want to call them are not licensed through D.C.

The reason, and that's the reason that law does not get enforced is because if you get licensed in D.C. you have to have a uniform and you have to wear a patch with your logo on a uniform like you see the DCRA in places like that.
And club owners and our owners,
restaurants they just don't want that in their
venues. And so, that's why that law has never been enforced.

They would literally have to shut down every club, restaurant, lounge in D.C. that has security because none of them are licensed. And I tried to follow the path.

And when I found that was going to hinder me if I got the license and then we would be required to have that uniform and the patch that $I$ wouldn't have business. And so, that's why I've operated the way $I$ have like everyone else ever since then.

Now, I do pay taxes in D.C. because as a taxable entity because $I$ do business here I have to record that. So, $I$ have to pay taxes through D.C. as well as to Maryland and as well as to Virginia when $I$ do security there.

MR. BIANCO: Thank you very much, Mr.
Andrew. I don't have any further questions.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Thank you for your testimony, Mr. Andrew. You can step down. Do you have another witness, sir?

MR. BIANCO: I do. I'm going to call Mr. Embay.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Is this your
last witness or do you have more witnesses?
MR. BIANCO: This is my last witness.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Okay. Can you
raise your right hand, sir?
WHEREUPON,
KIBRECK EMBAY
was called for examination by Counsel for the Applicant and, having first been duly sworn, assumed the witness stand, was examined and testified as follows. NOTE: UNLESS OTHERWISE NOTED, ALL ANSWERS ARE GIVEN THROUGH THE TRANSLATOR, WHO WAS ALSO FIRST DULY SWORN.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Have a seat. Pull the microphone and whoever is going to speak we need to hear it through the microphone. DIRECT EXAMINATION

MR. BIANCO: Kibreck, for the record state your name and spell your last name.

MR. EMBAY: Kibreck Embay. My last name is $E-M-B-A-Y$.

MR. BIANCO: Kibreck, do you own Betty's Gojo?

MR. EMBAY: Yes.
MR. BIANCO: Are there any other owners of Betty's Gojo?

MR. EMBAY: My wife.
MR. BIANCO: And when did you and your wife purchase the establishment?

MS. JEFFERSON: Objection.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: What's the nature of your objection?

MS. JEFFERSON: It's already been established on the record that there was no purchase. It was a stock exchange that ABRA made an order on this.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: I don't know what it was, Ms. Jefferson. So, he's just, he's the owner of the restaurant and has ownership. And so, whether there was a purchase or a stock transfer $I$ think he's just giving us some background information to let us know when it's, when the process started.

So, I'm going to overrule the objection. So, answer the question, sir.

MR. BIANCO: So, when did you purchase Betty's Gojo?

MR. EMBAY: In April of 2018.
MR. BIANCO: Before Betty's Gojo, did you ever run a restaurant?

MR. EMBAY: No.

MR. BIANCO: Did you ever work in a restaurant?

MR. EMBAY: No.
MR. BIANCO: Before owning Betty's Gojo, what did you do?

MR. EMBAY: I have a company so I used to work there.

MR. BIANCO: Why did you decide to buy Betty's Gojo?

MR. EMBAY: To run as a business, as a restaurant.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: I'm sorry.
What was that answer?
MR. EMBAY: Run it as a business, as a restaurant.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Okay.
MR. BIANCO: Do you work in the
business?
MR. EMBAY: Yes.
MR. BIANCO: How often do you work there?

MR. EMBAY: Seven days.
MR. BIANCO: When did you start working there daily?

MR. EMBAY: Starting from the date of
purchase which is April 2018.
MR. BIANCO: And do you or your wife have any other jobs other than working at Betty's Gojo?

MR. EMBAY: No.
MR. BIANCO: Could you describe the establishment, please?

MR. EMBAY: Betty's Gojo has upstairs and downstairs. The upper side is completely a restaurant. And the downstairs sometimes we operate it with the help of a DJ or TV.

MR. BIANCO: Okay. How often do you have a DJ in the basement?

MR. EMBAY: It used to be about two times a week. But currently it's once a week.

MR. BIANCO: What night?
MR. EMBAY: Tuesday.
MR. BIANCO: And other than you and your wife, what other employees do you have?

MR. EMBAY: Six.
MR. BIANCO: And could you tell me what they do?

MR. EMBAY: You have people work in the kitchen, two bartenders and two servers.

MR. BIANCO: Now, I noticed that you
did not mention any security people as employees. But do you have a security company?

MR. EMBAY: Yes. And the reason why I did not mention them is because I only call them when I need.

MR. BIANCO: And that's Prestige Events that we just heard Mr. Andrew testify, correct?

MR. EMBAY: Yes.
MR. BIANCO: Now, I would like to direct your attention, you have a white binder in front of you that has all of our exhibits in it. Do you see that?

MS. JEFFERSON: I'm going to object to that. I would prefer that he present them to him instead of handing him a binder in which we don't see everything that's in there.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: I'm sorry.
MS. JEFFERSON: I was just objecting. He's left a binder there for him to flip through.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: He has the binder there then he will start directing him what specific document to look at. So, nothing is wrong with him having the binder as long as Mr. Bianco will tell him what document and then
he'll identify the document and then we'll look at it.

MS. JEFFERSON: It's not in here. I don't have his.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: So, what's the first document that he is to look at?

MR. BIANCO: I'd like for you to direct your attention to Exhibit Number 4 in your binder, Tab Number 4.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: I'm sorry. I don't have the documents. So, that's why I'm starting to, okay, go ahead. What documents are we talking about?

MR. BIANCO: On Exhibit 4.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: What's Exhibit $4 ?$

MR. BIANCO: It's a photograph of the front of Betty's Gojo.
(Whereupon, the document referred to was marked as Applicant Exhibit 4 for identification.)

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Okay, all right. Fine, go ahead.

MR. BIANCO: Do you recognize that, Mr. Ballam, sorry, Mr. Embay?

MR. EMBAY: Yes.
MR. BIANCO: What is it?
MR. EMBAY: Betty's Gojo.
MR. BIANCO: Okay. And is that the way that Betty's Gojo looks today?

MR. EMBAY: Yes.
MR. BIANCO: Okay. I noticed that there are two doors on the front of Betty's Gojo. Do both of those lead to your restaurant?

MR. EMBAY: No.
MR. BIANCO: Which one is to enter your restaurant?

MR. EMBAY: The one on the right is the entrance to the restaurant.

MR. BIANCO: Okay. And the door on the left, what's that for?

MR. EMBAY: It takes you upstairs.
MR. BIANCO: Okay. And you testified earlier that the restaurant is two floors. Is it the second floor and the first floor or the first floor and the basement?

MR. EMBAY: It's the first floor and the basement.

MR. BIANCO: What's on the second floor?

MR. EMBAY: Residents in them.
MR. BIANCO: Residents, okay. And at this point, at this time $I$ would admission of Exhibit Number 4.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Do you have any objection?

MS. JEFFERSON: No.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: So moved.
(Whereupon, the document previously marked as Applicant Exhibit 4 for identification was received into evidence.)

MR. BIANCO: And on nights when you have one security guard, where is that security guard stationed?

MR. EMBAY: In the front door.
MR. BIANCO: Okay. So, the front door on the right side of Exhibit Number 4, correct?

MR. EMBAY: Yes.
MR. BIANCO: Okay. Do you have a parking lot?

MR. EMBAY: We have a parking lot for six cars in the back.

MR. BIANCO: At the back. Who parks there?
upstairs, two for us and two for our customers.
MR. BIANCO: And can customers park in the parking lot and enter through the back door?

MR. EMBAY: No.
MR. BIANCO: I would like to direct your attention to Exhibit Number 1 in the binder in front of you.
(Whereupon, the document referred to was marked as Applicant Exhibit 1 for identification.)

MR. EMBAY: Yes.
MR. BIANCO: And do you recognize that?

MR. EMBAY: Yes.
MR. BIANCO: And what is that?
MR. EMBAY: That's a view of parking and Georgia Avenue.

MR. BIANCO: And on Exhibit Number 1 Betty's Gojo is marked by a red pin. Is that correct?

MR. EMBAY: Yes.
MR. BIANCO: And could you please describe for the Board which six spaces are allocated to 7616 Georgia Avenue?

MR. EMBAY: Behind the building. And
where the red vehicle is and the other vehicle I don't know what the color is. There are three parking lots where the red vehicle and there are also three parking lots where the other vehicles.

MR. BIANCO: Are you talking about the light blue vehicle behind 7616?

MR. EMBAY: Yes.
MR. BIANCO: Okay. And do you have the right to use any of the other spaces that are shown in the photo?

MR. EMBAY: No.
MR. BIANCO: Okay. And the photograph that you're looking at, does it truly and accurately depict how Betty's Gojo and the parking lot looks today?

MR. EMBAY: Yes.
MR. BIANCO: Move admission of Exhibit Number 1.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Do you have any objection?

MS. JEFFERSON: I'm sorry.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Do you have any objection to Exhibit Number 1 being in the record?

MS. JEFFERSON: No objection.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Yes, no, I need an answer from you, ma'am.

MS. JEFFERSON: I thought you heard me. I'm sorry. I said no. I'm sorry. I apologize.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: So moved.
(Whereupon, the document previously marked as Applicant Exhibit 1 for identification was received into evidence.)

MR. BIANCO: Have you noticed people hanging out in the parking lot shown in Exhibit Number 1?

MR. EMBAY: Yes.
MR. BIANCO: How often?
MR. EMBAY: There are people always.
MR. BIANCO: And when you see people hanging out in the parking lot, what do you do about it, if anything?

MR. EMBAY: The first thing I do when I see people hanging around in there is to call the police. But one of the main problems my establishment has a community that they take those individuals who hang in the, associated with us but they are always there even when we are closed, when we are working and not working.

MR. BIANCO: So, when you call the police what happens?

MR. EMBAY: Most of the time they don't come. But when they do come they say to me that since they are on the other side they tell me that it is not my property.

MR. BIANCO: Okay. And do you only call the police, what times of day do you have to call the police about the people hanging out in the back?

MR. EMBAY: I do call the police whenever I see people hanging in there. We usually open at 4:00 p.m. And I also see people at night. So, whenever $I$ see people in there I call the police.

MR. BIANCO: And the people that you see in the back lot, are they your customers?

MR. EMBAY: None of them is our customer.

MR. BIANCO: How do you know?
MR. EMBAY: I know my customers and everybody knows them. In fact, I asked the ANC to help me and last week he asked them to get him but they refused.

MR. BIANCO: Brief indulgence, Mr.

Anderson. I'm trying to streamline the testimony as much as possible.

All right, if we could turn all the way to Exhibit 7. Do you recognize, are you there yet?
(Whereupon, the document referred to was marked as Applicant Exhibit 7 for identification.)

MR. EMBAY: Yes.
MR. BIANCO: Okay. Do you recognize what Exhibit 7 shows?

MR. EMBAY: Yes.
MR. BIANCO: What is that?
MR. EMBAY: The back door.
MR. BIANCO: The back door of Betty's Gojo?

MR. EMBAY: Yes.
MR. BIANCO: Okay. And is that the way that it looks today?

MR. EMBAY: Yes.
MR. BIANCO: And I see that there are two signs posted on the back wall of Betty's Gojo. And I want to focus specifically on the sign that is to the right of the back door. Do you see what I'm talking about?

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Are you talking about, what's Exhibit 7?

MR. BIANCO: Exhibit Number 7 is a photo of the rear of the establishment.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Does it have the car and the white truck at the back?

MR. BIANCO: That's correct.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right.
MR. EMBAY: Yes.
MR. BIANCO: Okay. And the sign, the text is not legible. But could you tell the Board what that sign says?

MR. EMBAY: No loitering.
MR. BIANCO: I'm sorry, what?
MR. EMBAY: No loitering.
MS. JEFFERSON: I'm just going to object. That's like tiny.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Yes, I mean I don't know how --

MS. JEFFERSON: It could say, it could say like, pick up your dog food.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: You see I took my glasses off. But maybe I thought maybe, but you didn't object so let's move on. MS. JEFFERSON: No, I did. I just
did.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Let's move on. MR. BIANCO: I move admission of Exhibit Number 7.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Do you have an objection?

MS. JEFFERSON: Yes, I do.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Why do you object to it, Ms. Jefferson?

MS. JEFFERSON: He can't read that sign. I can't read that.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Well, what's the purpose of this exhibit, Mr. Bianco?

MR. BIANCO: It shows the rear parking lot that is the subject of many of the complaints in this case. It shows that there is in fact a sign there.

But his testimony is what establishes the text on the sign. That's not what the exhibit is for. The exhibit has simply established that there is a sign there.

And Ms. Jefferson is free to put on evidence to impeach the testimony like someone who will say that the sign says something else. But that doesn't go to admissibility.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Yes, I'll overrule the objection. I mean, it's, I don't know what the sign says.

But I don't think, it's not my understanding that this is exhibit is moved into evidence to prove that there was a sign there that says no loitering.

MS. JEFFERSON: Well, he asked him.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Well, he can ask him. But that's not the purpose. From what I'm told this is just, this is the rear of the building.

So, I'm going to overrule the objection and I'm going to allow Exhibit 7.
(Whereupon, the document previously marked as Applicant Exhibit 7 for identification was received into evidence.)

MR. BIANCO: Kibreck, since May of 2019, have you done anything differently in the way you run your day to day operations?

MR. EMBAY: Yes.
MR. BIANCO: What have you done differently?

MR. EMBAY: First of all, 1 changed the schedule to have the DJ in the basement just
one day a week. And in the upper level we changed the restaurant completely and the kitchen.

MR. BIANCO: Okay. Well, 1 want to drill down on that a little bit. When you said changed to make it a restaurant completely what do you mean? What specifically did you do?

MR. EMBAY: The upper level of our establishment used to look like, more like a club. So, we changed the seats and it looks like a, more like a restaurant.

And we also changed the old kitchen. We spent about $\$ 8,000$ for this because our intention is to make a legal restaurant.

MR. BIANCO: And what specifically, $\$ 8,000$ that you spent upgrading the kitchen, what did you do?

MR. EMBAY: For the $\$ 3,000$ we purchased six tables for the restaurant. And for the rest we got sink and refrigerator.

MR. BIANCO: And when your customers enter the establishment are they seated or do they just find a seat wherever?

MR. EMBAY: We seat them. There is a person who will seat them.

MR. BIANCO: And who is that person?
MR. EMBAY: If I'm around it would be me or else it would be the manager or the servers.

MR. BIANCO: And when you seat guests, do you give them menus?

MR. EMBAY: Yes.
MR. BIANCO: There was some testimony earlier in the day about the use of security cameras. Do you have security cameras?

MR. EMBAY: Yes.
MR. BIANCO: And how many security cameras do you have?

MR. EMBAY: Sixteen.
MR. BIANCO: Did you install those security cameras or were they there when you took over the restaurant?

MR. EMBAY: There were old ones and after we purchased it we installed new ones.

MR. BIANCO: When was that, that you installed new cameras?

MR. EMBAY: In 2018 when we purchased it.

MR. BIANCO: Okay. And are the cameras located both inside and outside of the
establishment or only inside?
MR. EMBAY: Four are outside and 12 are inside.

MR. BIANCO: Okay. Are you aware of the complaints about Betty's Gojo from the neighbors?

MR. EMBAY: I didn't know this until I made application to renew the license. But after I made the renewal request I became aware of it and I'm trying to correct things.

MR. BIANCO: And did you attend any meetings of the Shepherd Park Citizens Association?

MR. EMBAY: I attended twice after I filed for renewal.

MR. BIANCO: Okay. And what happened in those meetings?

MR. EMBAY: There was a complaint about our establishment.

MR. BIANCO: And what did you say in response?

MR. EMBAY: On the first one I arrived there late so I only managed to speak to Stacy of ANC. And on the second one I went with you, with my lawyer that is.

MR. BIANCO: Okay. And did anyone from the Shepherd Park Citizens Association contact you after that meeting to discuss Betty's Gojo?

MS. JEFFERSON: Objection. He's not giving a time frame.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: I mean you can't object to an answer. You have to object to a question. So, I'm going to overrule your objection.

You have to object to a question, not an answer.

MS. JEFFERSON: I was objecting to his question, I'm sorry. He didn't give a time frame. He left it very open ended.

MR. BIANCO: From the time of your renewal application until today, has anybody from Shepherd Park Citizens Association contacted you to discuss Betty's Gojo?

I'm sorry, strike that. From the time you attended Shepherd Park Citizens Association meeting until today has anybody from Shepherd Park Citizens Association contacted you?

MR. EMBAY: Mr. Stacy.
MR. BIANCO: I'm sorry, who is Mr.

Stacy?
MR. EMBAY: From the ANC.
MR. BIANCO: Stacy Lincoln from the ANC?

MR. EMBAY: Yes.
MR. BIANCO: How about from Shepherd Park Citizens?

MR. EMBAY: Nobody called me.
MR. BIANCO: And there was some testimony today from the investigator about an incident that took place. And I'm just checking the date.

I believe it was November 23, 2019, with a food truck parked outside. Do you remember that?

MR. EMBAY: I remember just hearing that from now.

MR. BIANCO: Were you there on November 23rd?

MR. EMBAY: Yes.
MR. BIANCO: Did you hire the food truck to come there that day?

MR. EMBAY: No.
MR. BIANCO: What, if anything, does your establishment have to do with the
proprietors?
MR. EMBAY: I don't have any association with it. And it was not parked in front of my establishment. It was a little bit behind between my establishment and Champion.

MR. BIANCO: Okay. Did you ask them to leave?

MR. EMBAY: I was downstairs in the basement so I was not aware of it. But when ABRA came, when the police came that's when I became aware of it.

MR. BIANCO: Thank you. I don't have any further questions.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Your questions. CROSS EXAMINATION

MS. JEFFERSON: So, what efforts have you made to work with the community about their concerns?

MR. EMBAY: First of all, I believe the main concern of the community was coming from the people who were hanging out at the back side.

MS. JEFFERSON: That wasn't my question.

MR. EMBAY: And secondly, I completely took care of the cleanliness and those issues.

MS. JEFFERSON: Sometimes businesses hire consultants to help them work with the community and deal with issues. Have you all hired one?

MR. EMBAY: I have an accountant that I hire to do those kind of things.

MS. JEFFERSON: Okay. My direct question was to work with the community not accountant. Your accountant has nothing to do with our community. So, I'm going to repeat my question.

MR. BIANCO: I'm going to object. Her question was whether or not he hired a consultant to work with the community which he answered as he hired an accountant.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: The question was has he hired any consultants to work with the community. He said that $I$ hired an accountant.

One could say he answered the question but that's not the question that she was asking. So, why don't, if you want to answer the question, ask him has he hired any other consultants outside of the accountant to work with the company. Ask him that question.

MS. JEFFERSON: Have you hired any
other consultants outside of the accountant that you just mentioned to work specifically with the community on the issues that the community has raised?

MR. EMBAY: I did not. I hired a lawyer and since I know the complaint I try to take care of it and try to work with you. But I do not get any good reception.

MS. JEFFERSON: You mentioned that you called the police. Did you ever receive an incident report?

MR. EMBAY: I don't have it with me. If you saw one I can try to get it. But I would say that $I$ call about once in two days and the 30 or 50 calls that was being said was usually from me, from Betty Gojo related to those who hang out at the back which is not in the establishment that I work at.

MS. JEFFERSON: So, you hired a security company just for events, that was his testimony.

MR. BIANCO: Object to the characterization.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Rephrase that question. Ask him why --

MS. JEFFERSON: You hired security. If you were having problems in the back did you include that in part of your contract?

MR. EMBAY: To begin with the problem at the back is not our problem. The problem is, was ours and yours. But it has only been me who has been calling the police.

MS. JEFFERSON: Okay. You, did you sign the renewal application?

MR. EMBAY: Which application?
MS. JEFFERSON: The renewal
application for this license.
MR. EMBAY: Yes, I did.
MS. JEFFERSON: Did you see the exhibits that the inspector presented, his report?

MR. EMBAY: Yes, I did.
MS. JEFFERSON: Okay. His Exhibit 1 was your renewal application. Do you have a summer garden?

MR. EMBAY: What do you mean by summer garden?

MS. JEFFERSON: You filled out the application and I'm asking you. It has hours and then it says summer garden. Do you have one now?

You do have a summer garden. And where is that summer garden?

MR. EMBAY: At work.
MS. JEFFERSON: Where physically on the property is the summer garden?

MR. EMBAY: There is one at the front door and there is one inside.

MS. JEFFERSON: So, there's a summer garden inside and a summer garden in front.

MR. EMBAY: Yes.
MS. JEFFERSON: So, Mr. Bianco showed you, I'm trying to think what exhibit that was, that Exhibit 7. Do you still have it, your Exhibit 7?

MR. EMBAY: Yes.
MS. JEFFERSON: Is there a summer garden behind Betty's Gojo?

MR. EMBAY: No, in front and inside with the license.

MS. JEFFERSON: Okay. And are you aware that your current license does not have a summer garden?

MR. EMBAY: I don't know.
MS. JEFFERSON: Have you ever seen your license?

MR. EMBAY: Yes.
MS. JEFFERSON: Who did you purchase the business from?

MR. EMBAY: From Betty Etana.
MS. JEFFERSON: Was she the only owner?

MR. EMBAY: There were also two others with her.

MS. JEFFERSON: Do you know their names?

MR. EMBAY: Yes.
MS. JEFFERSON: Can you share them for the record, please?

MR. EMBAY: Messai and Farah (phonetic).

MS. JEFFERSON: Okay. Your business has hookah, correct?

MR. EMBAY: Yes.
MS. JEFFERSON: Do the smoke alarms ever go off?

MR. EMBAY: No.
MS. JEFFERSON: Do you have carbon monoxide detectors?

MR. EMBAY: I do.
MS. JEFFERSON: And do they ever go
off?
MR. EMBAY: No. There is, $I$ have installed equipment to get the smoke out of the building.

MS. JEFFERSON: You've installed equipment to get the smoke out of the building.

MR. EMBAY: Yes.
MS. JEFFERSON: Do you have a license, a smoking exemption from the Department of Health for that hookah?

MR. EMBAY: Was, no license is given for hookah throughout the city.

MS. JEFFERSON: And that's your understanding?

MR. EMBAY: That's what $I$ know and that's what it is.

MS. JEFFERSON: Okay. Have you seen the settlement agreement?

MR. EMBAY: For who?
MS. JEFFERSON: The settlement agreement that is attached to your license.

MR. EMBAY: I saw it after the complaint.

MS. JEFFERSON: Okay. Did you read it?

MR. EMBAY: To begin with our contract is, we passed but with the previous owner. And after the complaint I saw it and I read it.

MS. JEFFERSON: Are you aware that the license and the settlement agreement are together? So, when the license goes to a new owner so does the settlement agreement.

MR. BIANCO: I'm going to object. That calls for a legal conclusion. She's giving argument as opposed to asking questions of facts. CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: I'm not going to, I'm going to overrule that objection. I would hope that we all know that if there's a settlement agreement it goes with the license and that she's just trying to find out whether or not the owner of the establishment is aware that his settlement agreement, that's not illegal.

That's just elementary. So, you need to answer the question. So, I'm overruling the objection. So, answer the question, sir.

MR. EMBAY: I now know after the complaint.

MS. JEFFERSON: Okay. If you'll give me one second. Are you aware of the offer and compromise that the ABC Board before you gave you
after the closure?
MR. EMBAY: Yes.
MS. JEFFERSON: Did you read it?
MR. EMBAY: Yes.
MS. JEFFERSON: The security company that you hired, did you check to see if they were licensed, that they were?

MR. EMBAY: Yes.
MS. JEFFERSON: And how did you check that?

MR. EMBAY: When we entered into the contractual agreement he showed me his license and I showed him my license.

MS. JEFFERSON: Are you referring to driver's license?

MR. EMBAY: No. I'm referring to the business license.

MS. JEFFERSON: Okay. Were you aware under that OIC what the security requirements were?

MR. EMBAY: Yes.
MS. JEFFERSON: In your prior testimony you mentioned you have what $I$ think was referred to as the ground level and the basement. Is that correct?

MR. EMBAY: Yes.
MS. JEFFERSON: How many seats do you have on the ground level? How many people can actually sit down?

MR. EMBAY: Maybe 25 or so.
MS. JEFFERSON: And what about in the basement?

MR. EMBAY: About 24, 23, 24.
MS. JEFFERSON: Twenty-three, 24, okay. So, that's minimum 47, okay. Do you have a written security plan?

MR. EMBAY: Yes.
MS. JEFFERSON: Okay. And did you submit it to ABRA and the Office of the OIG back in May?

MR. EMBAY: Yes.
MS. JEFFERSON: And it's part of the record?

MR. EMBAY: Yes.
MS. JEFFERSON: Okay.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Now, let me ask you, you said that you purchased this restaurant in 2016, is that correct, 2018, I'm sorry?

MR. EMBAY: Yes.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: And in
purchasing this restaurant you had no previous experience in running a restaurant. Is that correct?

MR. EMBAY: I didn't have any.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Did you wife have any experience in running a restaurant?

MR. EMBAY: No. We were only running a store.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: What do you call a store?

MR. EMBAY: Convenience store.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: So, what did you sell in the convenience store?

MR. EMBAY: Grocery.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: So, did you hire someone who had experience in running a restaurant when you bought this restaurant in 2018?

MR. EMBAY: Usually the previous owner would be working there for about six months. But she did not stay for that long. She bought another restaurant and she left. And that's the reason why she want to sell it.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: So, you were operating a restaurant and you had no experience
in operating a restaurant. Is that correct?
MR. EMBAY: I haven't run an
establishment like that one. But I believed I had a general knowledge of how to run a business and I didn't think it was going to be that hard for me.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: And the reason I'm asking you that, sir, is because I'm looking at the investigative history of your establishment. And there's a lot of violations.

Some already have been prosecuted and some have not been. And so, that's why I'm asking you what type of experience did you have in running a restaurant and running this type of business.

MR. EMBAY: You are right.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Now, if you want to run a restaurant why does your restaurant have to operate until 2 or 3 o'clock in the morning if you're running a restaurant?

MR. EMBAY: Our customers for our culture is usually up until 2:30 on Fridays and Saturdays. And when our customers go we don't really need anyone to tell them to go out.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: So, what time
do you usually close your kitchen?
MR. EMBAY: 2:30.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: So, your kitchen is operating until 2:30?

MR. EMBAY: Yes.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Now, why do you believe that the protestants are complaining about all this violence that has occurred close to your restaurant, if it's the actual restaurant or that block off where your restaurant is established, why is it that they are saying that all of this violence is occurring at your restaurant?

MR. EMBAY: This is a good question. First of all, those who are involved in violence are not associated with us or Champion. They are always there, 24 hours.

Because in front of us the people who are out there are not residents of that area. I believe the main problem is the people who hang out at the back, I believe, I work with the community I can make a fence so that those people don't come there.

And from now on we can work hand in hand with the community.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: I just, I want just a clarification. Mr. Puente when he testified earlier about the food truck, Mr. Puente stated that you told him that the food truck was supposed to leave at 2:30.

But you just testified that you knew nothing about this food truck. So, can you explain to me about this food truck?

MR. EMBAY: So, I did not say that to him because I was inside so I came out from inside. And secondly, the food truck is not associated with us and it was not in our premises.

It was on a private area. It was on the street. And the customers were coming from all around. In fact, we did not have promotion. We had a very slow business at that time.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: What kind of food truck was this? What kind of food were they selling?

MR. EMBAY: I think Jamaican food.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: So, you never had a conversation with Mr. Puente regarding the food truck?

MR. EMBAY: What $I$ remember telling
him is that I don't know about it because when I stepped out of my establishment I saw many people around the food truck.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: But you said you were a restaurant, right? And you said that your kitchen closes at 2:30. Why would a food truck come in your block to sell food if you are a restaurant and you're closed at, and your kitchen has been operating?

I mean, you tell me why would and I'm not saying that it was in the area. But why would a food truck show up to park to compete with a restaurant at 2:30 in the morning?

MR. EMBAY: Okay. That is also surprising for me. But $I$ do know that those kinds of food trucks they go around in D.C. and Silver Spring area where there are crowds of people and they set up.

That was the first time I saw the food truck in our area.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: And were, so when you went outside and saw the food truck, so was it the, some of your customers who were at the food truck buying food? Do you know?

MR. EMBAY: I don't recall any of
them.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Now, regarding your history with ABRA, have you ever thought about changing the type of license that you have?

MR. EMBAY: To what can $I$ change it?
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: I'm asking you.
I mean, it's a matter of public record that you're not filing your quarterly, you've had several infractions from ABRA for not filing the quarterly statements on time. Is that correct?

MR. EMBAY: That is true. But the problem is not from me but from the accountant. I'm giving him all the details but he's not filing it on time. That's why I'm being asked to pay the fee.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: So, are you paying your accountant to do this work?

MR. EMBAY: Yes.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: So, if you are paying someone to do the work and they're not doing the work why is he still employed by you?

MR. EMBAY: For the 2019 quarterly reports they have been done, they have been filed on time. They are not late because I have been following them up.

But hearing the complaints from the community I have been hurrying fast to do all those things.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: I wonder if there are anybody on the Board? Go ahead, Mr. Short.

MEMBER SHORT: Good afternoon. You were here and heard Lieutenant Jenkins with the Fourth District Metropolitan Police Department who are first responders to your business describe your establishment as trouble.

Why would he make that public statement under oath today?

MR. BIANCO: Objection, calls for speculation. He has no idea why somebody testified the way that they did.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Rephrase the question, Mr. Short. Ask a different way.

MEMBER SHORT: Okay. Looking at your ABRA investigative history, you have 24 times that you've been cited by ABRA to come before this Board. What's causing that?

MR. EMBAY: Which citation?
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: The question is not, it wasn't specific. He said that you have
been called 24 times to come before the Board. He's just asking you, why?

He's not asking specifically what citation. Why is it that you were called 24 times to come to the Board?

MR. EMBAY: It's because of the complaint by the community.

MEMBER SHORT: Okay. You owned Betty's, how many years have you and your wife owned this business?

MR. EMBAY: About a year and nine months.

MEMBER SHORT: So, what month in 2017 did you buy this business, '18?

MR. EMBAY: April.
MEMBER SHORT: Excuse me.
MR. EMBAY: April.
MEMBER SHORT: April. Does that mean the license we put in your wife's name for ABRA in 2018?

MR. EMBAY: Yes.
MEMBER SHORT: Okay. Well, looking at your investigative history on May 1, 2018, did you own the business at that time?

MR. EMBAY: Yes.

MEMBER SHORT: Okay. According to your investigative history the first time you were cited by ABRA was May 1, 2018, when you failed to file your quarterly statement.

The next time would have been May 6th. The next time you were cited would have been August 1, 2018, failed to file quarterly statement.

The next time you were investigated was September 24, 2018, for assault with a deadly weapon. The next time you were cited would have been 11, November 11, 2018, failed to file quarterly statement.

The next incident would have been January 9, 2019, operated outside of approved Board hours. The next time you were cited would have been February 2019, failed to file quarterly statement.

The next incident would have been April 27, 2019, simple assault. The next incident would have been May 13, 2019, assault with a deadly weapon.

The next incident was investigated by ABRA and the police department would have been July of 2019 where you were charged with
operating outside of approved hours. You just testified a minute ago that the community is causing these incidents.

How are the neighbors in your community around you been causing these particular incidents I just read from your investigative history?

MR. BIANCO: Mr. Chair, I would like to make a limited objection. Many of the 12 violations that Mr. Short read off many have either not been adjudicated or the Board took no further action on.

I would ask that the inquiry be limited to only those issues that the Board took action on.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right. MEMBER SHORT: I'll agree with that. Of the 12 at least four or five of them were you failed. I'll strike that question.

What I would really like to ask is have you ever hired the Metropolitan Police for an RDO program which is the Reimbursement Police Detail which city businesses and establishments in the District of Columbia use to help them run a safer business. Have you ever used RDO?

MR. EMBAY: I did not hire because I have two security and there is also a police between my establishment and between Champion. And I thought it was not important. But from now on I can hire one.

MEMBER SHORT: Do you think with the accusations of loitering around your property and the testimony that a food truck was in front of your establishment at 2:30 in the morning, do you think an RDO would help you with that situation, help alleviate that situation?

MR. EMBAY: Very much so.
MEMBER SHORT: Again, can you repeat that answer?

MR. EMBAY: Very much so.
MEMBER SHORT: Thank you very much. That's all I have, Mr. Chair.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Any more questions by the Board Members? All right. Ms. Jefferson, any final questions as a witness based on the questions that were asked by the Board?

MS. JEFFERSON: No, thank you.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Mr. Bianco, any clarification that you would require from your client?

REDIRECT
MR. BIANCO: Yes. Kibreck, Ms. Jefferson asked you about a summer garden. Do you even know what that is?

MR. EMBAY: She showed me this one and I said, yes.

MR. BIANCO: Okay. Have you ever sold or served alcoholic beverages on the sidewalk in front of your establishment?

MR. EMBAY: No.
MR. BIANCO: Have you ever sold or served alcoholic beverages in the parking lot behind your establishment?

MR. EMBAY: It wouldn't be allowed for, to leave the premises.

MR. BIANCO: Have you ever served food anywhere outside of your establishment?

MR. EMBAY: No, it's not allowed.
MR. BIANCO: Have you ever set up tables and chairs anywhere outside your establishment?

MR. EMBAY: No.
MR. BIANCO: Okay, thank you.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Thank you, sir, for your testimony. You can step down. Do you
have any other witness, or do you rest?
MR. BIANCO: We rest.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right.
It's 2:30. You have 45 minutes. Do you want to take a lunch break? No, I'm just saying do you want to take a lunch break?

By the way, do you need a break? right, we'll take a break for half an hour.

MS. JEFFERSON: Our witness has to be somewhere in an hour.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: What witness?
MS. JEFFERSON: Our first witness that we were about to bring.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: How much time, no, how much time do you require? We'll take a ten minute, we'll take a 15 minute. He needs a break. Okay, so we'll take 15 minutes.
(Whereupon, the above-entitled matter went off the record at 2:34 p.m. and resumed at 2:48 p.m.)

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right. We're on back on the record. Does the Protestant have another witness?

MS. JEFFERSON: Yes. I'd like to call Ken Giles.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Mr. Giles, raise your right hand please? Do you swear or affirm to tell the truth and nothing but the truth?

MR. GILES: I do.
WHEREUPON,
KEN GILES
was called as a witness by Counsel for the Protestant and, having been first duly sworn, assumed the witness stand, was examined and testified as follows:

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right. Have a seat, sir.

MR. GILES: Thank you.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Your witness. DIRECT EXAMINATION

BY MS. JEFFERSON:
Q Mr. Giles, thank you for coming.
A You're welcome.
Q Can you tell us where you live with respect to Betty's Gojo?

A I live in the front apartment right above the establishment. I live in the same building.

Q Okay. And have you filed complaints?

A I have. Each complaint's at the ABRA website.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Pardon me, let Mr. Giles state and spell his name for the record please.

MS. JEFFERSON: I'm sorry?
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Have him just state his name for the record.

MS. JEFFERSON: Okay.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: And get him to spell it.

MR. GILES: Okay. My name is Ken Giles spelled G-I-L-E-S.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Okay. Go ahead.

MS. JEFFERSON: Sure.
BY MS. JEFFERSON:
Q My question was have you filed complaints, and I think you just responded.

A I have, yes.
Q Do you know how many?
A By my count, 71 --
Q Seventy-one.
A -- over a three-year period.
Q And when was the most recent
complaint?
A The day before yesterday.
Q And what was the nature of your complaint.

A Loud music that causes the floor to shake.

Q Okay. And when you have filed complaints over that three-year period, has an ABRA investigator ever come to your unit to speak with you?

A Twice. Mr. Florentine came twice, and Mr. Santos came once with Mr. Florentine.

Q Okay. And what was the nature of your compliant each time?

A Loud music and shaking the floor, and both Mr. Florentine and Mr. Santos substantiated that.

Q And do you know what year that was?
A It was about a month ago.
Q A month ago, for both complaints?
A The first one with Mr. Florentine was about two or three months ago.

Q So --
A So there were two separate incidents. One where Mr. Florentine came by himself, and
another time where he came with Mr. Santos.
Q And where do you park your vehicle?
A In the parking lot behind the building.

Q And have you ever had damage to your property?

A Three times. Three times my vehicle's been hit. The most serious damage to the right front passenger door. I did ask for video information from Betty's Gojo and I was never given any video.

Q Okay. Did they offer to pay for the damage?

A No.
Q Okay. Do you know who damaged the car?

A Not specifically. That's why I asked for video information.

Q Okay. Are you aware of the School Academia de la Recta Porta?

A Yes, it's the store front school that's right next door.

Q Okay. And have they had any property damage?

A Yes. There was a window broken during
a fight. In fact, $I$ filed a report that night. I heard the window being broken.

Q Okay. And who was having the fight?
A People who had emerged from the front door of Betty's Gojo. I can see -- if I just look out the windows of my apartment, I can see the door as it opens. I can see the front door of the establishment as it opens, and I can see people coming out on to the sidewalk along Georgia Avenue.

Q Okay. And were the police called?
A Yes.
Q And was there any damage to property?
A The window was broken in the school right next door.

Q Okay. They talked about hookah. Have you smelled any kind of --

A Yes.
Q -- smoke or anything?
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Mr. Giles?
MR. GILES: Yes, sir.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: You have to let her finish asking a question before you answer, sir.

MR. GILES: Okay, I'm sorry. I was
just trying to move us along. Sorry. CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: No, sir. You have to wait until she asks a question before you answer.

BY MS. JEFFERSON:
Q And have you heard any fire alarms go off?

A Yes. There is a smoke alarm and a CO alarm right outside the apartment doors at the top of the abutting stairway, and both the smoke alarm and the $C O$ alarm have gone off repeatedly.

Q In the hallway?
A In the hallway right outside our doors, yes.

Q Okay. You mentioned that you could hear music from Betty's Gojo.

A Yes.
Q So have you ever heard the smoke alarm go off inside of Betty's Gojo?

A No, I haven't.
Q Okay. But it has gone off in the hallway?

A Right. The hallway that is intended for the people who live upstairs, yes.

Q Okay. And has the fire department
ever been called?
A No, because we knew that it's coming from the smoke that wafts out of Betty's Gojo. Because the wall is abutting, there is a vent down at the street level between the wall, a heat vent, and that's where the smoke comes. And the smoke just rises up to the stairway and sets off the alarms.

Q Okay. So if you can smell smoke, can you smell food being cooked?

A No, I've never smelled food being cooked.

Q Have you ever been inside Betty's Gojo?

A A couple of times I've asked if they had received a package either a UPS package or a FedEx for me.

Q And did you see people eating?
A No, I've never seen that.
Q Okay. Have you seen people congregating in the parking lot behind?

A My windows don't open on the parking lot. They open on Georgia Avenue.

Q Okay. Can you hear people back there?
A Yes. Sometimes when I try to park my
car back there, $I$ do see people in the parking lot, yes.

Q Okay. And what are they doing?
A Smoking and standing around, and sometimes $I$ can't park my car there because there are no spaces left.

Q Okay. And are you allocated a space because you're a resident?

A Yes. I should have a space. It's not numbered. It's just somewhere in that vicinity $I$ should have a space.

Q Have you ever observed people who may have been parking in the parking lot kind of walking around the building going into Betty's?

A Yes. And I myself have done that. The family that lives across the sidewalk between Betty's and the next building locks their gates. They lock the gate of the sidewalk. They lock the front and the back because they were trying to stop the shouting that was happening as people walked on that sidewalk. So they've locked that. So the only way you can get from the parking lot to Betty's is to walk around the other side and come around the front side.

Q This past Tuesday evening around 9:30,

10 o'clock, did you observe a crowd in front of Betty's Gojo?

A The report that I filed I think was more at one or two in the morning.

Q Okay.
A Wednesday morning. Tuesday night to Wednesday morning.

Q Okay.
A I did file a report about loud noise and shouting.

Q Okay. And is that a frequent occurrence?

A Yes, I can frequently hear shouting and fighting out on the sidewalk right along Georgia Avenue.

Q And prior to Betty's opening, how often did you hear fighting, shouting, yelling and screaming on Georgia Avenue?

A Never.
Q And how long have you lived there?
A I've lived there almost ten years.
Q Ten years, okay.
MR. BIANCO: This is his?
MS. JEFFERSON: Oh.
MR. BIANCO: Excuse me. I don't have
any objection to his complaints.
MS. JEFFERSON: You don't?
MR. BIANCO: If you want to put them in, put them in.

MS. JEFFERSON: Okay.
MR. BIANCO: That's fine. I just want to get those.

MS. JEFFERSON: I'm just trying to think which -- it was your exhibit?

MS. BLACK: It was his, but he his has been disqualified so I hadn't referenced it.

MS. JEFFERSON: Okay. So --
FEMALE PARTICIPANT: He has no objection?

MALE PARTICIPANT: No, That's fine.
BY MS. JEFFERSON:
Q So the ANC submitted exhibits which included your e-complaints. I'm going to hand this to you. I don't know how to reference -what number is it for you?

A Well, I have numbered it Exhibit 47.
Q Okay. And this is with the ANC's submission?

A So I recognized this.
Q And did you write this?

A I did.
Q And can you just quickly?
A Yes. This basically says that the carbon monoxide alarm was activated because of lots of smoke coming from Betty's Gojo. This was on Saturday, August 31st. And it said once the CO alarm got started, it didn't stop because there's no place for the smoke to go when it rises to the stop of the stairway. It just sits there and it keeps activating the alarm, and the alarm went on for hours, and it's pretty loud.

Q Okay. So are you fearful for your health?

A You know, I don't think there's enough CO that it's going to cause damage to me, but it's just a terrible, noisy nuisance, and it happens a lot.

Q Okay.
MS. JEFFERSON: Oh, I'd like to move this into evidence.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Which one is this? What's the document? MS. JEFFERSON: It's Exhibit 47. CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: It's part of the ANC complaint.

MS. JEFFERSON: Yes, it is.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Do you have any objection, Mister --

MR. BIANCO: No objection.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: So moved.
MS. JEFFERSON: Your witness, Mr.
Bianco.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: You're done with him?

MR. BIANCO: I have no questions.
MS. JEFFERSON: You have to wait.
MR. GILES: Okay.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Go ahead, Mr. Short.

MEMBER SHORT: Good afternoon, Mr. Giles.

MR. GILES: Good afternoon, Mr. Short.
MEMBER SHORT: We had a lot of testimony today, especially from a Lieutenant Jenkins with the 4th District.

MR. GILES: Okay.
MEMBER SHORT: And he described this establishment as a troubled business. I was saying to you, and I say this to you because I was a fireman in the city for 33 years, when that
detector goes off, don't take it for granted. But if $I$ were you --

MR. GILES: Yes?
MEMBER SHORT: -- I would call Engine 22 right there on the street. And when smoke is making the alarm go off, we do have devices in the fire department that can read how dangerous it is because you go to sleep and you have carbon monoxide, you're not going to wake up. It's odorless, colorless, and it just make you drowsy, and you just drop and that's it.

MR. GILES: Okay, thank you.
MEMBER SHORT: I would call emergency services, just have them call the police department. Don't put your health at risk.

MR. GILES: All right. Thank you.
MEMBER SHORT: Okay? And the more documentation you have about your -- something that's happened, you might have grounds for taking further action. But at any rate, if you're going to document it appropriately, and if your smoke detector and CO are going off --

MR. GILES: Both are.
MEMBER SHORT: -- something's wrong.
MR. GILES: A lot of smoke coming from

-     - 

MEMBER SHORT: If there's smoke in the building, something's got to give. How old is that building? Do you know?

MR. GILES: 1940s I think.
MEMBER SHORT: Yes. It doesn't have any of the modern stuff. And now just let me say this to you, the Fire Department's going to make some -- probably make some recommendations. But I wouldn't put myself at risk.

MR. GILES: All right. Thank you, sir.

MEMBER SHORT: Thank you. That's all I have, Mr. Chair.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right. Thank you for your testimony, Mr. Giles. You can step down.

MR. GILES: You're welcome.
MS. JEFFERSON: I'd like to call the next witness, ANC 4a Chair Gale Black.

MALE PARTICIPANT: You can't take a look at it.
(Off mic comments.)
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Okay. Raise your right hand, please, Ms. Black. Do you swear
or affirm to tell the truth and nothing but the truth?

MS. BLACK: Yes.
WHEREUPON,
GALE BLACK
was called as a witness by Counsel for the Protestant and, having been first duly sworn, assumed the witness stand, was examined and testifies as follows:

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right.
Thank you. Have a --
DIRECT EXAMINATION
BY MS. JEFFERSON:
Q All right. Can you give me your name for the record please?

A My name is Gale Black, B-L-A-C-K.
Q And share about how long have you been an ANC 4A commissioner?

A Probably about 12 years.
Q Okay. You are representing ANC 4A and you've submitted appealed exhibit list, correct?

A Correct.
Q Okay. I'm going to present a few exhibits, and I am going to ask you to identify the exhibits. Here's the first one listed as ANC

4A Exhibit 1.
A Yes.
MR. BIANCO: Mr. Chair, can I have a brief indulgence, $I$ have everything electronically --

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Yes.
MR. BIANCO: -- while $I$ bring up the ANC's exhibits. Thank you.

BY MS. JEFFERSON:
Q Oh, I'm sorry, pages --
A Exhibit 1 is the May 17th, 2019 letter that was sent to ABRA regarding the application of Betty Gojos. It's identified as ANC 4A Exhibit 1. It attaches also the investigative history that we have as of the date that we submitted the letter.

Q Okay. And then that was your letter for protesting, correct?

A Yes.
Q Okay.
A The Protestant.
Q And I'd like to also present Exhibit 2 to you, if you could tell me what that is?

A Exhibit 2 is the agenda for May 7th, 2019, and it shows that this matter was listed on
the agenda for consideration.
Q And when you say this matter, what are you referring to?

A The ABRA license request from Betty Gojos.

MS. JEFFERSON: Okay. I would like to -- you want me to wait till the end to move --

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Yeah, why don't you do that?

MS. JEFFERSON: Okay.
BY MS. JEFFERSON:
Q Exhibit 3, if you could --
A Yes. Exhibit 3, ANC 4A Exhibit 3 is the notice that we received telling us that there had been a request to renew the license, and that notice to us was dated April 29th from ABRA.

Q Okay.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: I'm sorry.
A Oh, I'm sorry, wait a minute. It's a -- yes, it's from the ANC to Betty Gojos saying that we've been informed of your request to renew your license.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right.
Q Exhibit 4 please.
A Exhibit 4 are the ANC's minutes of the
meeting from May 7th. Exhibit 4 just details the actions that were taken, and that we moved to submit a letter in opposition to the renewal of the ABRA license for Betty Gojos. And that was passed.

Q The next one is Exhibit 5.
A Exhibit 5 was the minutes from our October 2, 2018 regular public meeting, and it contains within it the objections that ANC 4A passed regarding problems. And was a resolution and complaints regarding Betty Gojos. And it's a detailed listing that goes through a number of concerns that had been raised with the ANC. And I particularly note that there are many that started March 2 of 2018 and onward. And this resolution was passed by the ANC 4A. I believe that the same document might appear in the SPCA's listing.

Q Okay. And in that document is one of the complaints that there is -- that the Shepherd Park Citizens Association is alleging that they're not in compliance with the settlement agreement?

A Yes.
Q Okay.

A I'm trying to find that exact paragraph. I don't have my glasses on so it's -so, yes. All right.

Q Okay. I think we've already touched upon the offer in compromise, but I'll present it anyway. I think the Board already has this. But this is Exhibit 6.

A ANC 4A offers as Exhibit 6 the order approving the OIC that I received electronically when this matter was issued. ANCs often get information electronically, and this one told us that there had been this document entered with the Office of the Attorney General for D.C. and ABRA regarding Betty Gojos.

Q Okay. And do you know what the incident was about?

A All I know is that this offer of compromise detailed what was necessary to reopen the business and specified certain items be done. And the charge was summary suspension proceeding. Not sure if that's what you're asking.

Q And when were you elected chair?
A I was elected chair for 2019. So January 2nd, 2019.

Q Okay. And over the course of the last
three years, at the ANC meetings that you've attended have you personally heard members of the community express complaints about Betty's Gojo?

A Yes.
Q Okay. During the ANC meetings, does MPD do updates to the ANC?

A The police give regular updates --
Q Okay.
A -- as part of our meeting, yes.
Q And at any point in time did they make any reference to any type of noise, fighting, assault, or anything of any nature?

A Are you talking about specific to Betty Gojo?

Q Yes, specific to Betty's Gojo.
A I am not recalling -- well, at the last meeting there was something regarding the same block, but I don't think that Betty Gojos was specifically mentioned.

Q Okay.
A Yes.
Q And then the last exhibit is Exhibit 7.

A Okay. Exhibit 7 for ANC 4A were the responses that $I$ submitted to the investigator.

He had posed three questions to me, and so I provided this written response and offered it verbatim into the record.

Q Okay.
A And I can verify the authenticity, that these are documents that $I$ have personal knowledge of and maintained as part of the ANC business.

MS. JEFFERSON: So I'd like to move all seven of those documents into evidence.

MS. BLACK: There was one -- and I've heard there was no objection.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Ma'am, you're a witness, okay, so you can only speak when you're asked questions. And the motion that's on the table is that we're asked to move seven documents into evidence. That's the only pending question that's there. Now let's go back to ask Mr. Bianco if he had an objection?

MR. BIANCO: Perhaps surprisingly, I don't.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right.
MR. BIANCO: And all seven can be admitted and we can move forward.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Without
objection, all seven documents are a part moved into evidence. Do you have any other questions?

MS. JEFFERSON: I'm trying to find -there is an Exhibit 8 reference that I'm just -I'm sorry, I'm trying to find where it is because --

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Well, I don't have it in front of me, so $I$ have seven exhibits.

MS. JEFFERSON: It's not in here.
I'm not sure because I don't see the numbers.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Well, let's move on.

MS. JEFFERSON: Okay. So I'll just -this is Exhibit 8 I believe. MALE PARTICIPANT: Mr. Bianco? MS. JEFFERSON: Could you please confirm whether that's Exhibit -MR. BIANCO: Hang on, I don't have an Exhibit 8.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: I don't have an Exhibit 8.

MS. JEFFERSON: Okay.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All of us haven't had documents, but I've have had -- I have all seven.

MS. JEFFERSON: Okay.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: I just don't have an eight.

MS. JEFFERSON: Okay.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: And Mr. Bianco stated that he doesn't have an eight, so therefore there's no eight.

MS. BLACK: The --
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Ma'am? Mr. Bianco stated he doesn't eight. So did you receive eight exhibits in your PIF Mr. Bianco?

MR. BIANCO: I received seven. I'm looking at their submission of an exhibit list and there are seven documents identified. There are numbers eight, nine and ten on the sheet but they are not -- there's nothing identified for eight, nine and ten.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: So nothing identified eight, nine and ten. I don't have it in front of me. It's not in the record. So let's move on. And if you want to ask her about -- I mean the documents are not in the record because they haven't been disclosed, but if these are personal documents that she -- I mean if these are personal documents that she compiled,
you can ask her general questions. She can't look at the documents because they're not in the record, but you can ask her questions from the documents if you have it, but you can't show them to her.

MS. JEFFERSON: So the documents that are Exhibit 8 were actually the documents that were submitted by Mr. Giles, but he was dismissed.

MR. BIANCO: Aren't they in already? That was exhibit 47.

MS. JEFFERSON: I don't know.
MR. BIANCO: Correct?
MS. JEFFERSON: That was one page.
That wasn't all of his submission.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right. Are these documents in the record?

MS. JEFFERSON: Yes, they were submitted.

MR. BIANCO: Well, there is 47 of them, but --

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right. So what is this document, and why is this document important? Why can't --

MS. JEFFERSON: It has the list of all
the complaints that were made and what the nature of the complaint was.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Oh, but he testified. So I mean he testified he made all the complaints to ABRA. It's on the record and based on his direct testimony, I don't believe that we need any documents for that.

MS. JEFFERSON: Okay. I believe there's just a discrepancy in the number of ecomplaints versus what the investigator had.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Like how many?
MS. JEFFERSON: Well, I think his number was 50 complaints, and I think the ecomplaints were 22.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: But he testified, we don't need the documents.

MS. JEFFERSON: Okay.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: He testified. That's better. He testified on what -- he was a witness and testified so it's not necessary. Let's move on.

MS. JEFFERSON: That's --
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: That's it, Mr. Bianco.

MR. BIANCO: I do.

CROSS EXAMINATION
BY MR. BIANCO:
Q I want to inquire briefly on the issue of the establishment's efforts to mitigate the concerns of the ANC. You and I had some discussions on that subject, correct?

A Yes.
Q And were you aware of the discussions that Kibreck and myself had with Commissioner Lincoln on that subject?

A No.
Q Okay. Specifically directing your attention to the discussions that you and I had on that subject, there are some mitigating measures that the ANC was willing to put in place to alleviate concerns as to the ongoing operations of this establishment.

A Are you asking me a question?
Q I am. I'm asking you if there are mitigating concerns -- I'm sorry, mitigating measures that the establishment can put in place that would alleviate the ANC's concerns on this specific issue?

A I recall we had a discussion, and I recall your response was there was nothing that
could be put in place that would guarantee that this would not happen again. And as you know, that's where the ANC is on this that we can appreciate the situation, but not hearing a willingness to put in place those requirements.

Q What are the requirements?
A Something that would guarantee that this would not happen again. And that there wouldn't simply be a payment of fines and ignoring all of the rules and problems that were delineated especially after the OIC was entered and we have no proof that any of those things happened.

Q And --
A So our conversation was such that I shared with you we would love to try to reach some agreement, but you could not tell me and assure me that this would not happen again.

Q Well, when you say this will not happen again, this, what do you mean by this? What will not happen again?

A I can direct your attention again to the list of 22 , or I think it was 20 items that we attached to the ANC 4A letter. Subsequent to that there have been all the alleged violations
that have occurred after that time. So those including the noise, including the acknowledged loitering that's going on, whoever is responsible, it's acknowledged that it's happening. That long laundry list that calls for the police to be called more than any establishment that has ever come before 4A. So --

Q So by this, this will never happen again, you mean any violations?

A Yes. I'm looking for full compliance with all the laws of D.C., yes.

Q Okay.
A Yes.
Q And when you say written guarantee, what do you mean by guarantee? How would one guarantee that there would be no violations again ever?

A That's up to you all to figure out. I mean as a business here in D.C., like I said, other businesses seem to find a way to comply. Not only with the reporting requirements, but the requirements for peace and quiet. And when you have it in writing what the police had suggested in terms of a security plan and having security
officers there, there's been an acknowledgment right now that there's a hookah bar operating downstairs and the testimony today that ten businesses have indeed got hookah licenses. Maybe they instead of saying they're a restaurant need to be changing their format and complying with the laws that apply to whatever that format is. We really shouldn't have to go through all of this to get peace and quiet for our neighborhood. We really shouldn't. So I'll stop there.

Q Of the issues that you have cited, how many violations have you personally witnessed?

A I have not personally witnessed any, but $I$ have heard and seen enough and gone past it to observe the outside of the building to realize that what has been stated, $I$ think that who do live right above it, they're all valid. I also have faith in the Office of the Attorney General in what they spelled out as problems. And the people who came to the 4A's meeting on May 7th, they were personally observing and providing us as the ANC with their perceptions, I have no reason to doubt the truth of all of that.

Q Right. And by those people who
attended your meeting, how many people spoke at that meeting?

A Now I'm going use from memory.
Q Please.
A But I would say probably about eight.
Q Eight.
A Now realizing that our ANC meetings cover many different topics. So we allot a certain amount of time to the topics, and others may want to talk but that's it. We also provided an opportunity to the owners to speak.

Q And do you know who these people were?
A I am not sure I recognized all, but I could probably look at our list of attendees.

Q Are they --
A And they are more than the people who are with the SPCA.

Q Okay. And is it people who are with the SPCA or Protestants in this case?

A There were more people.
Q Okay. Of them, how many were outside of this class of Protestants that are here?

A Well, ANC covers 16,000.
Q Well, but eight people spoke, so many of the eight were not part of the group?

A That I mean I don't know how many people were not part of the groups. They didn't do that kind of a summary. I'm getting the feeling that you are pretty dismissive of the concerns of the community and of ANC 4A.

Q Well, ma'am, there's no question pending. Okay, so I'm going to --

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Well --
A Well, there should be. I mean if you're asking me about --

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Hold on, hold on, ma'am. Hold on, ma'am. Well, there was some type of question. I mean --

MR. BIANCO: Right. But was it --
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: You answered the question.

MR. BIANCO: Five steps down the road here.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Well, he asked the question, Mr. Bianco and she's answering the question. All right. Let's move on. Ma'am, wait till the question has been -- it's answered. It's been asked, you answer it, and okay. Let's move on, it's a long day. It's been a long 24 hours for the Board. Okay? So please be mindful
of the Board. Go ahead, please.
MR. BIANCO: I'm just looking at the exhibit list to see if I had anything else. No, I don't have anything further. Thank you.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right.
You're protesting on the behalf of the ANC.
MS. BLACK: Yes.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: What is it that your constituents want?

MS. BLACK: We want ABRA to deny the license renewal for the reasons that we listed in that May 17th letter. And we do it reluctantly, but it's the only one that I'm aware of in the many years that I've been -- where we've gotten to this point where we're just saying please do not renew this license.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Any questions by any of the Board members? Go ahead, Mr. Short?

MEMBER SHORT: Good afternoon again, Ms. Black.

> MS. BLACK: Good afternoon.
> MEMBER SHORT: Commissioner Black.
> MS. BLACK: Yes.
> MEMBER SHORT: Thank you for your
service, and how many years have you been the ANC commissioner?

MS. BLACK: I think about 12.
MEMBER SHORT: How many years have you resided in this community, or the community of your ANC?

MS. BLACK: Since '92. So whatever that is.

MEMBER SHORT: Pretty good time.
MS. BLACK: Yes.
MEMBER SHORT: When you moved in to your community, you mind saying what street or what area your --

MS. BLACK: Yes, my senior member district is 4A08 which is actually Crestwood. It's in the southern part of 4A.

MEMBER SHORT: I'm familiar with Crestwood, yes. In fact, it goes over to 16th Street.

MS. BLACK: Correct.
MEMBER SHORT: Yes. So can you describe what that neighborhood was like when you moved in in 1992?

MS. BLACK: My neighborhood of Crestwood is similar to Shepherd Park. It's
residential and quiet. It has a lot of homeowners. Pretty decent amount of owners. And I think that it's primarily single family homes in that area.

MEMBER SHORT: So you're just south of Walter Reed and the golf course on 16th Street, Rock Creek Park.

MS. BLACK: Yes.
MEMBER SHORT: All right.
MS. BLACK: Yes, surrounded by Rock Creek Park. Much of 4A is surrounded by Rock Creek Park.

MEMBER SHORT: Okay. So how have things changed since 1992 until 2019 in your opinion? Yes, just --

MS. BLACK: For ANC 4A there has been now the development at Walter Reed that's going on. The community is still very family oriented but we have more people moving in. I think that 4A itself is pretty stable, but along Georgia Avenue, there are some issues with closures and -- yes, it's changing in a way that is not I think beneficial to those who reside.

MEMBER SHORT: Very strong rumors that you're going to be getting a very nice grocery
store there. Can you elaborate on that a little bit?

MS. BLACK: No, I can't.
MEMBER SHORT: Okay. Well, I'll just say this, and it's on the record, I served with the D.C. Fire Department for 33 years, and I was first assigned Engine 14 on North Capitol Street with second duty --

Black: Oh, yes.
MEMBER SHORT: -- in that area. So I got to know that area quite, quite, quite well. And I always dreamed one day I'd have a house - I guess that's the amen. I don't know. I still have a lot of friends and a lot of well-meaning citizens in that area. And $I$ don't like this kind of situation, but I mean clearly something has to be done. And the applicant -- I don't know. I just would like to see us come to some kind of decision where it's good for everybody, but $I$ don't know if that's going to work. I guess my last question would be, again, you went on the record and said again -- I guess I heard you but I'd just love to hear it again, what is it that 4A wants to do with -- 4A or 8 want to do with this?

MS. BLACK: Well, 4A because I'm speaking on behalf of the ANC as a whole.

MEMBER SHORT: Great. Thank you.
MS. BLACK: And 4A would like to have ABRA not grant this license. We think that there has always been a requirement to have a detail working -- police officers on detail patrolling. It hasn't happened. We have no reason to believe that if another opportunity was given, that anything would be any different. They just seem to pay the fines and not seem to be aware that there is an issue. And perhaps it's because these were new owners of a restaurant operating supposedly as a restaurant but who had no clue as to what is required in order to be compatible with the neighborhood that it's in. So I just think that you should not give them another opportunity to operate a business that they clearly are unqualified to handle.

MEMBER SHORT: Your testimony, and I guess all the testimony we've heard today has been quiet compelling. And thank you again, for your service to the city and to your community. Thank you. That's all I have, Mr. Chair.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Any questions,

Mr. Bianco?
MR. BIANCO: No more questions, no.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Ms. Jefferson, any questions based on the questions that were asked by the Board?

MS. JEFFERSON: No thank you.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: No?
MS. JEFFERSON: I'm sorry.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Ms. Black,
thank you very much for your testimony.
MS. BLACK: Thank you.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: You can step down.

MS. JEFFERSON: Chair Anderson, I'd like to check the time?

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: How many more witnesses do you have, ma'am?

MS. JEFFERSON: Just one. I'd like to call Doctor --

MR. MUSGROVE: G. Derek Musgrove.
MS. JEFFERSON: -- G. Derek Musgrove
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: This is your
last witness, right?
MS. JEFFERSON: Yes. If you got somewhere you need to go, I want to make you
happy today.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Normally people say to me. Raise your hand, sir. Do you swear or affirm to tell the truth and nothing but the truth?

MR. MUSGROVE: Yes.
Whereupon,
GEORGE DEREK MUSGROVE
was called as a witness by Counsel for the Protestant and, having been first duly sworn, assumed the witness stand, was examined and testified as follows:

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All Right.
Have a seat. Your witness.
MR. MUSGROVE: Okay.
DIRECT EXAMINATION
BY MS. JEFFERSON:
Q Could you please state your name for the record?

A Yes. My name is George Derek Musgrove.

Q And where do you live?
A I live at 7601 12th Street, Northwest.
Q And where is that in relationship to Betty's Gojo?

A So the rear of my home is adjacent to Betty's Gojo in that we share the alley. I recall the name -- but the same alley.

Q Okay. And have you ever called MPD for noise or disturbance?

A Yes. So I have been calling either ABRA or MPD since 2016. I initially tried to submit my complaints via ABRA primarily for noise but also for fighting. Sometimes for speeding cars. And the interface was just too difficult, my apologies, and so I started calling MPD because an ABRA representative who attended an ANC meeting told me that that was the easiest way to do it. It's also the easiest thing to do at 2:30 a.m. when you're not really that lucid.

Q Okay. And have you witnessed any of these disturbances?

A Yes.
Q So my second floor bedroom window looks out over the alley, and there are some trees in the way, but I can see the parking lot behind Betty's Gojo, particularly in the winter when the foliage is not full. And $I$ have seen from 2016 until the summer of 2019 and then sporadically since large groups of people playing
music, dancing outside their cars, drinking liquor, in certain cases fighting. There was one instance where a woman was yelling so much that I actually went and grabbed the bat that we put by our front door, ran out there because I thought she was being assaulted. Turns out she was just fighting with another woman. And I have tried to call MPD on every occasion so that I could keep a record.

Q When you take out your trash, do you put in front or in back?

A I put in the rear.
Q In the rear?
A Yes.
Q In the alley?
A Yes.
Q And do you happen to see across the alley and see what the back of Betty's looks like?

A Yes. So there are two things that I typically see when I take out my trash, and I do a lot of work on my house, and so I'm out there not just taking out the trash but on a pretty regular basis. And so you see two things. The first is that the alley can be a little trashy.

Now part of that can be blamed on the person who is directly across from Betty's Gojo, and they sometimes not secure their trash cans.

But you see a lot of trash in the parking lot behind Betty's itself, which people would just drop out of their car while they were hanging out back there. But what you'd also see is the people themselves. Young men sitting in their cars smoking marijuana, hanging out, listening to music. Back in 2016 people -- there was one point where folks actually had a full on soccer game in the alley at 1 a.m. behind my house. But it's not as bad as that now. Typically, you'll just see smaller groups of people. Every once in a while there will be a big fight. But it's not as bad as it was two years ago, it's still very bad.

Q And is your trash picked up on the weekdays or weekends?

A It is picked up on Monday mornings.
Q Okay. So on Saturday morning, have you ever gone out back -- have you seen litter and trash skewed around in the back of Betty's?

A I have, but on many of those occasions I cannot directly connect it to Betty's Gojo. My
complaints primarily deal with the noise and the loitering.

Q How long have you lived there?
A I've lived in my building since 2007. Not my building, my house since 2007. I started hearing the disturbances in 2016. Those continued very consistently through the summer of 2019. And in my complaint with my PIF, I had listed all of the major disturbances since the summer of 2019, I counted three in the PIF, and that does not include the major disturbance that occurred on the 23rd right before Thanksgiving of this month. So that would be four in all since the summer.

Q So you're a designated representative for the group of 15 ?

A I am.
Q And what is your understanding of the other 14 people's -- the nature of their complaints?

MR. BIANCO: I'm going to object.
Calls for hearsay. The other 14 folks are available to testify as witnesses.

MS. JEFFERSON: We don't have all day.
MR. BIANCO: They haven't been called.

And I can't cross examine Mr. Musgrove on the basis of the other people's knowledge, what they observed, when they observed it. It's not appropriate to have Mr. Musgrove relay their words to the Board when I can't cross-examine on what the basis is for their understanding?

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Well, I'm going -- and the only reason I'm going to overrule the objection, Mr. Bianco, is because he is the designated representative for -- he's the spokesperson for the group. So I don't understand how you're objecting to the spokesperson for the group who is recognized as the spokesperson who they have designated, was given standing to represent the group. So I mean I don't understand how --

MR. BIANCO: I have standing to represent my client but I can't testify. I certainly couldn't put hearsay on the record. So --

## CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Well --

MR. BIANCO: So I don't understand how -- what I don't understand is how it's appropriate to avoid cross-examination by having one person in a group say what somebody else
said.
MS. JEFFERSON: I'll withdraw the question and reframe it.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right.
MS. JEFFERSON: Just for --
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Okay, fine.
MS. JEFFERSON: -- time's sake.
BY MS. JEFFERSON:
Q How did the group of 15 come together?
A So when the noise and the disturbances, I mean when you get awakened at 2:30 a.m. every Tuesday and Thursday for a couple of weeks and you start to lose it. And so when that occurred back in I think it was 2018 or so, I started walking the neighborhood and I went to all of the houses that abutted the alley that's connected to Betty's Gojo on 12th Street and on Alaska Avenue. And so that's 12th Street between Shepherd and Alaska, Alaska between 12th and Georgia.

I secured signatures from a majority of the people that lived in those properties, all of whom are homeowners, attesting to all of what was in our complaint which was issued to ABRA. All of them attested to, and it's written into
the complaint, loud parties, fights, people speeding. I did not personally experience property damage, but others did, primarily to their garages. And so that's how the group came together.

Q And when you say complaint, are you referring to your protest letter that was submitted to ABRA?

A Yes, the PIF.
Q Okay. The PIF or the protest letter?
A I'm sorry, the protest letter, and then I took the same information from the protest letter and put it in the PIF. Thank you.

MS. JEFFERSON: Okay. I'd like to move that letter -- I'm trying to think of what it is I --

MR. BIANCO: The letter's already in. It's attached to the --

MR. MUSGROVE: Yes.
MR. BIANCO: -- investigator's report.
MS. JEFFERSON: Okay.
BY MS. JEFFERSON:
Q Before 2016, how would you describe your nights? What was life like?

A It was quiet. It was just very quiet.

The type of noise that we experienced after Betty's Gojo opened was not existent at the time.

Q What's the impact had on your family?
A Just sleeplessness, honestly. You know, I think when I get awakened at 2:30 a.m., I just can't go back to sleep, and the same is the case for my wife. I'm fortunate that my youngest son sleeps on the front of the house, and so he does not hear the noise. My eldest son had complained about being awakened. And thankfully, he's nine so he's able to go back to sleep pretty quickly.

I on the other hand am not primarily because I actually get up, look out the window, see what is happening and then call the police. And that process takes a little while and so it's hard for me to go back to sleep.

Q Have you ever seen Mister -- I'm going to butcher?

MR. EMBAY: Embay
MS. JEFFERSON: Thank you. I always want to do the syllables a little different.

Q Have you seen Mr. Embay ever in the alley or behind Betty's Gojo?

A I have seen Mr. Embay in the alley
once I believe, but that was in the last couple of months. It might have been a month ago. And I believe I just drove past you, if I'm allowed to address you. But that was the only time.

Q Before this hearing, did you meet with the neighbors about Betty's Gojo?

A Yes. On several accessions in several different forms. And so I initially tried to gather up my neighbors, and that group eventually became the group of 15 . I took our concerns to the SPCA and to the ANC. And so I and my neighbors, four or whom -- I'm sorry, five of whom were here earlier, one who has remained, we all went to those meetings and put our concerns before those two bodies in the hope that those two representative bodies of which all of us are a part could bring our concerns to the proper authorities.

Q Do you recall whether any of your neighbors shared with you whether Mr. Embay has reached out to them?

A The only person, and I can't speak to the content of their conversations, but the only person who I know has called Betty's Gojo and I don't know who she spoke to there was Joan Hoyt.

Her property is roughly directly behind Betty's Gojo, perhaps a little bit to its north. And she would call directly to the business. I was a little less -- I called the police.

MS. JEFFERSON: Mr. Bianco?
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Your witness,
Mr. Bianco.
CROSS-EXAMINATION
BY MR. BIANCO:
Q Mr. Musgrove, so you testified about the large groups of people congregating in the rear of the establishment, correct?

A Yes.
Q How do you know those individuals are customers of Betty's Gojo?

A Only because they parked on the property of Betty's Gojo and congregated on the property of Betty's Gojo.

Q So they could be customers of Champion's Kitchen for all you know?

A I suppose that's possible.
Q You testified that you made calls to the police when there's people congregated behind Betty's Gojo disturbing you, correct?

A Correct.

Q And have you witnessed what MPD has done when responding to those calls?

A Yes. On several occasions they have dispatched squad cars. Those squad cars have come out and asked people to leave. And people by and large have left. On other occasions folks have scattered on their own before the police got there.

So for instance, there was an incident on September, I believe it was 23rd. It's in my actual PIF where there was a very long and loud fight. It took about 20 minutes to unfold, and it was occurring directly behind Betty's Gojo. And then shots rang out probably about a half a block away. All of those people then fled. And then MPD showed up. And so, yes, I have called them. Yes, they have come out in many occasions, but not all.

Q You said that since the protests have been filed there's been marked improvement in the issues behind Betty's Gojo. Is that the case?

A There has been a change, yes. And it has been -- there had been fewer disturbances but there still have been disturbances.

Q Marked improvement is what -- marked
improvement is what you said in your PIF though, correct?

A Yes. And that's embedded within a sentence that gives it a bit more context.

Q That's all I have. Thank you very much, Mr. Musgrove.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Any questions by any Board members? Mr. Musgrove, you're one of the Protestant, you're the designated representative, so what is it that you're asking that the Board to do as far as your group is concerned?

MR. MUSGROVE: I and my neighbors are asking pretty much unequivocally that the license be revoked, or not be renewed.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right. Any questions, Mr. Bianco?

MR. BIANCO: No more questions.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Ms. Jefferson?
Just based on the questions that $I$ had asked.
MS. JEFFERSON: Yes, I'm sorry. I was trying to listen.

REDIRECT EXAMINATION
BY MS. JEFFERSON:
Q Your earlier testimony was that you
can see the lot from the window of your house.
A Yes.
Q Have you seen anyone from Betty's attempt to disburse the people congregating back there?

A On one occasion, yes. And I'm going to approximate the time because $I$ simply cannot say, and quite frankly, everything that happens to me in 2:30 in the evening is a bit off. But this was somewhere in the area of six months to a year ago, and there was a very large fight, and I do recall a person who appeared to be security, I could not tell in the darkness, shoeing people away and asking them to leave the parking lot. Those people after some protest did, in fact, leave. That was the one time that $I$ saw a person of that description acting behind Betty's Gojo in the alley.

MS. JEFFERSON: No more questions.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Mr. Musgrove, thank you very much for your testimony, sir. MR. MUSGROVE: Thank you.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: You may step down. Does the Protestant rest? All right. No more witnesses. And the parties rest. Have both
sides moved into the evidence all the documents that you wish to move into evidence?

MR. BIANCO: Yes, sir.
MS. JEFFERSON: I'm sorry, I thought I already did that so $I$ need to do it again?

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: You did what?
MS. JEFFERSON: Moved them into evidence? I need to do it again?

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: I said has all the parties moved into evidence all the documents?

MS. JEFFERSON: I'm sorry, there's a lot -- I just --

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: The question I had asked did the parties move all the documents into evidence that they wished to move into evidence? That's the question that $I$ asked. Yes?

MS. JEFFERSON: Yes.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right.
MS. JEFFERSON: I hope you heard that over drilling.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Yes, I heard that. All right.

MR. BIANCO: And for the record,

Betty's Gojo --
(LAUGHTER)
MS. JEFFERSON: That's good, but nobody testified about drilling.

MR. BIANCO: Attempted a joke.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right. So are the parties ready for closing? Arguments to close?

MR. BIANCO: I would ask to submit proposed findings of fact and conclusions of law in lieu of closing.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Okay. I know that -- so, all right, so both parties are going to

MS. JEFFERSON: I'm sorry, the drilling is still continuing. So it's --

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: No, I'm not -I'm waiting for the drill to stop before 1 --

MS. JEFFERSON: Okay.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: I would say that -- so both parties have elected not to do closing, and what --

FEMALE PARTICIPANT: Well, I don't --
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right, let me -- the Applicant has elected not to do closing
because the Applicant is going to do proposed findings of facts and conclusion of law. And I know that you're aware of what that is, Ms. Jefferson. You have done that before.

MS. JEFFERSON: He said he is not, or he --

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: He said he is going to do that.

MS. JEFFERSON: Oh, okay.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Right. And do you want to do a closing?

MALE PARTICIPANT: Is she?
MS. BLACK: Yes.
MS. JEFFERSON: She's doing closing?
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: But --
MS. JEFFERSON: Yes.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Do you want to do a closing?

MS. BLACK: Yes, I think I would because in order to have it done.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Okay, fine.
MR. TEKLE: Excuse me, Mr. Chair?
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Yes.
MR. TEKLE: The interpreter should like to get something to eat.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: I'm sorry?
MR. TEKLE: The interpreters would like some time to get something to eat.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: The hearing is over. So I'm sorry, but I thought we took a 15 minute break so people could run across the street. I got some popcorn and some water. So that's what $I$ did in the 15 minutes. And so the hearing will be over in five minutes, so I believe the interpreter can wait another five minutes --

MR. TEKLE: Yes, yes.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: -- to get some food.

MR. TEKLE: Yes, Mr. Chair.
MS. BLACK: So we'll do a response of findings of fact when we get petitioner's statements?

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: all right.
This is how the process works. At this juncture we will do closing. The applicant has elected not to do closing. You can still do closing.

MS. BLACK: Okay.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: And you got five minutes to do that. Once you have done
closing, then the other question I asked you is do you want to -- do you wish to do proposed findings and fact and conclusion of law meaning that you will wait for the transcript, meaning that within about three weeks after today, the transcript will be available. You will read the transcript and then you'll do proposed findings and fact to say that this is what -- this is what the facts -- these are the facts that came out of the hearing and based on the law this is the decision that the Board should make. Now you're not bringing in new evidence. You are just wrapping up this hearing once you listen to the transcript, and oh, my God, listen to what I have to say here. Good luck to you both.

But it's not you waiting for them. It's due 30 days after you received the transcript. So therefore, he'll provide his, you'll provide that. But we'll send you the transcript and we'll tell you the date to say 30 days after, that's when it's due after you receive the transcript.

And then the Board will issues a decision I think 60 days or 90 days after that basically. So today is December 5th, you'll
probably get the transcript in about two to three weeks before the end of the year. So your proposed findings of fact and conclusion of law will probably be issued -- will be due back some time in the latter part of January and 60 to 90 days, January, February, March, April we'll issue a decision. But you can still do your closing. And I think Ms. Jefferson has done that before, the proposed findings of fact, conclusion of law.

MS. JEFFERSON: I hoped it is my last time.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: I'm sorry?
MS. JEFFERSON: I hoped it was my last time. Nothing personal.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Well, you see what it is to be a lawyer. But as I said, so you can still do a closing if you want to do that.

MS. BLACK: Yes, I would.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right. So go ahead.

MS. BLACK: ANC 4A opposes Betty's Gojo's request for renewal due to the numerous citations by ABRA and the number of police calls to the establishment. We believe Betty Gojo has had a negative effect on the peace, order and
quiet of the community, and we reference noise and litter.

In addition, our opposition takes into consideration the numerous complaints by residents and the adverse effect that we believe the establishment, at least operated by these owners, has had on the community. It impacts our quality of life and we believe public safety.

In terms of peace and order the record today documents that the Applicant's request should be denied. There should not be another renewal because the applicants did not come in with the knowledge and the wherewithal to operate a restaurant in conformity with the rules of D.C.

It's been documented by many that there have been repeated violations. It's just part of the history that's listed. It's been documented that the business is operating basically a hookah bar without a license. And the city has licensed at least then other hookah bars, but this is not one of them.

It has not followed requests, hasn't met those kind of requirements. And the ones that were filed demonstrate that they do not comply with the requirements that are in place to
operate a restaurant.
In terms of disturbing the peace again, we've made more than 22 calls, but those 22 calls for noise, for example, were just for the period August 2018 to November of 2019 disturbing the quality of life that includes sleep deprived in many of the folks here, and I think you probably share some idea of what sleep deprivation will do.

There have been vibrations of the building itself, litter violations, violence in terms of assaults with deadly weapons. Inadequate parking in the back. We've heard about the number of parking spaces. That the business has six employees on its own. There are only six place. Two of them are for residents. And the other four are pretty much for the owners of the business and then two would be available for the customers assuming that those parking spaces were just dedicated solely to Betty Gojo's which is not the case. You've heard testimony of that today.

You heard from Lieutenant Jenkins who -- 17 years of service he identified the business as troubled. He spoke of 36 calls that the
police have had just on this one particular business.

ANC 4A operates as an Advisory Neighborhood Commission. We meet, we've considered the information they came in at a public meeting duly noted. And we've offered our recommendation to you. And we urged at that time and still do that this license not be renewed. We think that the business has enough opportunities to comply and has not shown its ability to do that.

If there had been compliance, none of us would be here right now. But this is for all of those previous agreements including agreements with ABRA and the ANC. So we reluctantly concede that it is not in the public interest to let them in granting this request. We ask that you do not grant a license renewal. Thank you.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: You know, I believe that's coming from the garage, and we're on the fourth floor. All right. So as was previously stated, the parties have elected to do proposed findings of fact and conclusion of law. And you will be provided a copy of the transcript within the next two to three weeks. And once the
transcript has been provided to you, you will be given the date, the deadline when the proposed findings of fact and conclusion of law will be due, and that will be due 30 days after you receive that transcript.

All right. So as chairperson of the Alcohol and Beverage Control Board for the District of Columbia in accordance with D.C. Official Code Section 2574(b) of the Open Meetings Act, I move that ABC Board hold a closed meeting for the purpose of seeking legal advice from our counsel on Case number 19-PRO-00050, Betty's Gojo pursuant to D.C. Official Code Section 2574(b)4 of the Open Meetings Act and deliberate upon 19-PRO-00050, Betty's Gojo for the reasons cited in D.C. Official Code Section 2574(b)13 of the Open Meetings Act. Is there a second?

MEMBER SHORT: Second.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Mr. Short has seconded the motion. I will now take a roll call vote before us on the motion now that it has been seconded. Mr. Short?

MEMBER SHORT: I agree.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Mr. Cato?

MEMBER CATO: I agree.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Mr. Anderson?
I agree. As it appears that the motion has passed, $I$ hereby give notice that the ABC Board will recess its proceeding to hold a closed meeting in the ABC Board conference room pursuant to section $2574(b)$ of the Open Meetings Act.

I want to thank both parties for their presentation today. And it shows that you are concerned about your neighbors and the neighborhood, and the business. The Board, as I stated, will take this matter under advisement and will issue a decision. Thank you very much and have a good day.

MR. BIANCO: Thank you, Mr. Anderson and members. Appreciate you pushing through today.

MS. JEFFERSON: Thank you, Mr.
Anderson. Thanks for your time.
