4	next case on our calendar is Case No. 18-PRO-
5	00048, Big Ben Liquors, License No. 60652.
6	Will the parties, please, approach and
7	identify themselves, please?
8	MR. THOMAS: Good morning, Mr.
9	Chairman. Bradley Thomas, ANC-5E.
10	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Mr. Thomas.
11	MR. BRADDELL: Good morning, Mr.
12	Chairman. Leon Braddell, Vice President of
13	Hanover Civic area Hanover Area Civic
14	Association.
15	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Mr., your last
16	name again?
17	MR. BRADDELL: Braddell, B-R-A-D-D-E-
18	L-L.
19	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Good morning,
20	Mr. Braddell.
21	MR. SINGH: Good morning, Mr.
22	Chairman. My name is Harjinder Singh, owner of

1	TM Liquors, Inc. t/a Big Ben Liquors.
2	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Good morning,
3	Mr. Singh.
4	Mr. Braddell, did you provide notice,
5	seven days notice to the owner that you were
6	protesting
7	MR. BRADDELL: Yes.
8	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: the so
9	you did provide them the notice. Did you
10	receive?
11	MR. SINGH: I didn't get notice.
12	MR. BRADDELL: Well
13	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: How did you
14	provide notice to them? How?
15	MR. BRADDELL: Well, I followed the
16	rules of
17	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: What is
18	MR. BRADDELL: Well
19	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right.
20	They are saying they never received it, so
21	MR. BRADDELL: Okay.
22	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: I'm just

1	asking you how did you
2	MR. BRADDELL: Well, then outside
3	since I didn't know, Mr. Singh's email or
4	anything like that, I didn't Hanover Area
5	Civic Association did not provide notice to Big
6	Ben Liquors. We just notified the ABRA Liquor
7	Board.
8	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Well, Chapter
9	25-601(b)
10	MR. BRADDELL: Um-hum.
11	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: states that
12	if you are going to protest the license, you have
13	to give them seven days notice.
14	MR. BRADDELL: Well, yes, that's true,
15	but also I contacted ABRA stating that I couldn't
16	even find the placard for the record notice. If
17	I don't know if they provided any notice, but
18	I spoke with your Community Relations liaison and
19	emailed them several times that I can't even find
20	the placard about the liquor license protest
21	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Let me
22	MP RPADDELL about the liquor

license validation.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: What do you mean you couldn't find the placard?

MR. BRADDELL: So if I can't even see that, how can I provide? I can't even really provide a notice to the owner. And your -- ABRA wrote back to say that they were going to investigate that, so I just went on not seeing that and ABRA not writing me back, I just followed the procedures of the -- the known procedures of filing with ABRA.

what I'm saying is if you said you followed the procedures of filing with ABRA, but weren't you aware that the procedures also stated that you also needed to -- when you have your meeting to invite the owner at your meeting for him to come and to also inform him that one of the issues that my civic association is going to do, we are going to protest your liquor license.

How is he supposed to know that you are protesting his liquor license?

Well, I mean we can 1 MR. BRADDELL: 2 look at that several ways, sir. If I can't see the placard, I can't even figure out what the 3 4 date and times are for the protest, if it's not 5 posted. Two, your -- these Protest Hearings 6 7 happen in the summer time when we don't even have 8 meetings. So it's kind of hard to get him to a 9 meeting when (A) the placard isn't up there and 10 (B) our meetings aren't even being held. 11 But again, I still followed the 12 procedures, the part of the procedures of liquor 13 license protest that ABRA publishes. 14 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: I hear what you are saying, sir, but this is the problem I'm 15 16 having. Okay. You are going to sue me and you 17 don't give me notice that you are going to sue me 18 and so -- and although -- no, I can't use that

Let me give you -- I'm going to give you -- I'm going to go back --

analogy. The -- let me not use that analogy.

15	MEMBER ALBERTI: So you did have a
16	meeting?
17	MR. BRADDELL: Yes, well, we had a
18	meeting at the end of our end of year, end of
19	June meeting, but
20	MEMBER ALBERTI: Okay. Well, I was
21	just confused because you said you don't meet in
22	the summer time.

1	MR. BRADDELL: Well, yes
2	MEMBER ALBERTI: But you did meet?
3	MR. BRADDELL: in the months of
4	MEMBER ALBERTI: Okay. So that
5	MR. BRADDELL: after May, June.
6	MEMBER ALBERTI: doesn't matter.
7	You did meet to vote on this protest. Is that
8	correct?
9	MR. BRADDELL: Yes.
10	MEMBER ALBERTI: All right. Did you
11	attempt to deliver notice at the store?
12	MR. BRADDELL: No, because I didn't
13	even see the placard.
14	MEMBER ALBERTI: No, but you knew
15	about the protest. How did you know about the
16	protest?
17	MR. BRADDELL: Bradley Thomas let me
18	know about the protest.
19	MEMBER ALBERTI: Okay. And did he
20	give you the details?
21	MR. BRADDELL: He give me part of the
22	details as far as when the protest was

that you were going to you might protest and you then and then you knew that you had this meeting coming up, right? MR. BRADDELL: Um-hum. 14	MR. BRADDELL: Wait a minute.
15	MEMBER ALBERTI: I understand that.
16	MR. BRADDELL: I request that you give
17	me a chance to answer. I still went to the ABRA
18	Community Liaison to say hey, look, I can't
19	really see this information. Where is it at?
20	So, yes
21	MEMBER ALBERTI: Did they send you
22	notice?

1	MR. BRADDELL: I can understand why
2	the Board has
3	MEMBER ALBERTI: Did ABRA send
4	MR. BRADDELL: I can understand
5	MEMBER ALBERTI: you notice then?
6	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Hold on, Mr.
7	Alberti. The man needs to answer the question.
8	Go ahead, Mr. Braddell. Go ahead, sir.
9	MR. BRADDELL: I can understand as far
10	as saying well, you didn't contact Mr. Singh.
11	But I was trying to get information about the
12	start of the process. So the basic is, we didn't
13	contact Mr. Singh in seven days, but I was trying
14	to find information about the protest, because
15	the placard wasn't where it was and I did not
16	MEMBER ALBERTI: No, I understand the
17	placard wasn't there. I got that.
18	MR. BRADDELL: Let me answer your
19	question.
20	MEMBER ALBERTI: No, because when did
21	you contact ABRA to get the information?
22	MR. BRADDELL: Excuse me, sir, I just

1	said
2	MEMBER ALBERTI: When? When?
3	MR. BRADDELL: Well, I would have to
4	look through my emails.
5	MEMBER ALBERTI: Well, please, let me
6	know.
7	MR. BRADDELL: But I did
8	MEMBER ALBERTI: Let me know when it
9	was. Was it before your meeting?
10	MR. BRADDELL: Huh?
11	MEMBER ALBERTI: Was it before your
12	meeting?
13	MR. BRADDELL: It was before the date
14	of the protest.
15	MEMBER ALBERTI: Okay. So it was
16	before your meeting?
17	MR. BRADDELL: Right. But
18	MEMBER ALBERTI: Okay. So
19	MR. BRADDELL: remember on that
20	MEMBER ALBERTI: no, no, wait,
21	wait.
22	MR. BRADDELL: Okay.

1	MEMBER ALBERTI: Did you ask them to
2	send you the information? Because
3	MR. BRADDELL: Yes.
4	MEMBER ALBERTI: And did they?
5	MR. BRADDELL: No.
6	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right.
7	Hold on, Mr. Alberti. There is
8	MEMBER ALBERTI: Then you should take
9	that up with the Director, Mr. Moosally.
10	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right.
11	Hold on.
12	MR. BRADDELL: My name is Mr.
13	Braddell, but thank you.
14	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: No, all right.
15	All right.
16	MR. BRADDELL: Oh, okay. Oh, Mr.
17	Moosally, oh, okay.
18	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: I think that
19	there has been some confusion, because I know you
20	were not at I know, Mr. Braddell, you were not
21	at the Roll Call. I know you were. Okay. And
22	so, therefore, you weren't granted standing.

The issue that I have today, this
Board was going to provide you standing because
you did protest timely the renewal. However, the
regulation says, 25-601.3, it states that "A
citizens association incorporated under the laws
of the District of Columbia located within the
affected area provided that the following
conditions are met."

And this is a condition that I'm
having right now that you have not overcome is
that "A resolution concerning the license
application has been duly noted in accordance
with the association's Articles of Incorporation
or bylaws at a duly called meeting with the
notice of the meeting given to the voting body
and the applicant at least seven days before the
date of the meeting."

And so the regulation clearly states that in order for me to grant you notice, you had to have invited him to your meeting at least seven days before the meeting and let him know that one of the discussions that we are going to

have today is that we are going to protest your liquor license in order for me to grant you standing.

Now, if the Board decided not to grant you standing, you can still work with the ANC.

You could sign-off on a -- if the ANC allows you to, you could sign-off on a settlement agreement with the ANC, if the ANC wants you to be a party.

The only problem that this -- that we have here today, I'm not sure if I can grant the citizens association standing by itself, because you have not complied with that, one of the provisions. And so that's one of the -- that's the exercise that we are having today.

So if you can categorically provide us information to say seven days before you -- if -- because you could say to me although you did not -- I didn't send it to him, but I went to the store and I dropped off a letter to someone in the store to say we are having this meeting and we are going to discuss protesting your liquor license and no one showed up and if you can say--

and because you said well, I did not know his 1 2 email address, I couldn't email it, but someone from our -- from the civic association went to 3 4 the liquor store, dropped the notice off and gave 5 it to one of the employees. But what you are saying is that you 6 7 didn't tell him and so that's the problem that we 8 are having here today. 9 So can you respond to -- and so are you then stating that you did not provide him 10 11 seven days notice prior --12 MR. BRADDELL: I am stating that I did 13 not provide him seven days notice. 14 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right. And so because you have not provided him seven days 15 16 notice, I cannot grant standing to the civic 17 association. 18 Okay? And so therefore, I make a -and so that's -- it's automatic because you have 19 20 not complied with the provision. 21 So what this says, so the ANC is here,

you can still work with the ANC. And if they

1	allow, if the ANC decides to come to a Protest
2	Hearing, then they can call you as a witness and
3	you can do whatever you need to do, but you would
4	have to be a part of their case. Okay?
5	So therefore, I make a I then make
6	a motion that standing is not that the civic
7	association is not given standing in this matter,
8	because they have not complied with 25-601.3. Is
9	there a second?
10	MEMBER SHORT: Second.
11	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Mr. Short has
12	seconded the motion.
13	All those in favor say aye.
14	ALL: Aye.
15	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Those opposed?
16	The matter passes 6-0-0.
17	MR. BRADDELL: Well, excuse me, sir?
18	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Yes?
19	MR. BRADDELL: Can I say one more
20	thing?
21	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Yes, sir.
22	MR. BRADDELL: And I would state for

the record that ABRA didn't do its job. 1 2 ABRA failed in its responsibility. CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Well, I don't--3 MR. BRADDELL: No, wait, excuse me. 4 5 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Hold on, sir. I'm not --6 7 MR. BRADDELL: No, excuse me, sir. CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Hold on. 8 Hold 9 Hold on, sir, hold on. Hold on, sir, hold on. 10 on. 11 What I have stated to you, sir, 12 before, I stated to you that there were some 13 administrative foul-up. And part of the 14 administrative foul-up, as I stated before, you were not at the Roll Call and normally, if you 15 16 don't show up at the Roll Call, then you don't 17 have standing. And so, therefore, I am admitting 18 that there was some foul-up. Okay? 19 But the bottom line is that, sir, you 20 knew that there was -- you knew that they were 21 asking for a liquor license, they want to renew

their liquor license. You also stated that you

knew ABRA's protocol. This is what you said.

You said I know ABRA's protocol, so therefore, I came to protest the liquor license.

All I'm saying to you, sir, is that at some point if you are going to protest a liquor license, you need to tell them.

So you are having a meeting, you need to tell the applicant that. And so if you had said to me today that you talked to our Community Liaison and so even if after the fact you spoke to them, if you had said to me once I spoke to ABRA, got some information, I went over there and spoke to them about what we were doing, then maybe I would have stated -- I could use the argument to say that there was some additional administrative foul-up and because of the Agency's administrative foul-up, you were prevented.

But at some point you had to tell him.

Mr. Singh said to me today, so irrespective of

who is at fault, I did not know. I didn't get

any notice. I did not know they were protesting

my liquor license. Okay? That's all I'm saying.

So if Mr. Singh -- so everything you have said, I could listen to it and I could ask the Agency let's listen to it and because of the Agency's foul-up, because this is what you have done, but you have told me that you have never contacted him to tell him that you wanted to protest his liquor license.

And what I have stated, sir, is that you can work with the ANC if you want to work with the ANC and do whatever you want to do. The only difference in this particular case is that you do not have -- you cannot -- say for example I can't force you -- I can't force -- if there is a settlement agreement, I cannot force the ANC to make you a part of the settlement agreement.

But if you and the ANC are on the same page, they can bring you in as a party to a settlement agreement and you can talk to the ANC and you can have -- if a settlement agreement is reached and if the ANC agrees with -- you agree with them and they want to bring you in as a

party, they can do that.

and so everything that you need, you can still have it. So I hear you and I hear your frustration. All I have said to you is that if you had told me at some point that you had contacted him and told him that you wanted to protest his liquor license, then I could take -- because as I said before, I have taken administrative notice that there was some Agency foul-up.

So that's -- so you were not -because I could have -- if -- but not for the
foul-up, because you were not at the Roll Call, I
could have said you did not show up at the Roll
Call, so, therefore, we are not even going to
entertain you today. But you were not at the
Roll Call and it was not your fault why you were
not at the Roll Call.

So I have taken all that into consideration. The only part that I am making a decision on is because you did not tell Mr. Singh that you were protesting his liquor license.

1	Okay, sir?
2	MR. BRADDELL: Okay. Thank you.
3	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right.
4	That's all. All right. I don't I want this
5	to be consumer-friendly. I don't want folks to
6	believe that I come here and the Board is not
7	listening to me and the Board is making
8	decisions. No, you care about your community and
9	you took the time to show up here today.
LO	All I'm saying to you is that you have
L1	to give him notice that this is the decision that
L2	we are making. Okay, sir?
L3	MR. BRADDELL: All right. Thank you.
L 4	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right.
L5	Yes, Mr. Silverstein?
L6	MEMBER SILVERSTEIN: Thank you. Thank
L7	you, Mr. Braddell. I can sense your frustration
L8	and I understand it and sympathize with it. And
L9	I would think that all of us understand when
20	there is a bureaucratic issue, that it can be
21	extremely frustrating.
ı	

I do think that you need to be -- you

need to understand this is not our rule. This was part of an omnibus bill that City Council passed three or four years ago that changed the status of community organizations. And originally the bill was going to allow them to be completely subsumed if an ANC signed a settlement agreement and these are the rules that they put in to allow citizen associations to remain in the bill. And we have to abide by the City Council rule.

You can work hand-in-hand with your ANC and partner in this, it's just you don't have the status, because we can't legally grant it to you.

And I'm sorry with the frustration you went through and the difficulty and I thank you for your work on behalf of your community, but we all have to go by the rules and we have to stay in our lanes and that's what we are doing.

MR. BRADDELL: Okay.

MEMBER SILVERSTEIN: Thank you all.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right. Are

there any preliminary matters? Yes, Mr. Singh? 1 2 MR. SINGH: Same question. The ANC also they did the same thing, they never informed 3 4 us of a meeting or anything. 5 For that, I can --MR. THOMAS: CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Well, let's --6 I'm reading the -- one of the things that I do, 7 8 see this book in front of me, this is the law 9 that we operate by. Um-hum. 10 MR. SINGH: 11 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: And so when 12 people ask questions, I take the time to read the 13 law, to read the rules before I respond. And so 14 I know what you are saying and, sir, as far as the ANC is concerned, that's not up -- the law 15 16 does not require --17 MR. SINGH: Okay. 18 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: -- that -- it doesn't require. Yes, it would be nice if they 19 20 do that, but the law does not require for them to 21 do that. So that's not required.

MR. SINGH: Yet that is you have my

1	side, if somebody is complaining about me, I
2	answered the questions at meetings when I saw
3	them.
4	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: I'm sorry, sir,
5	I didn't hear what you said.
6	MR. SINGH: It been happening,
7	something about me and my
8	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Speak a little
9	bit slower. I'm trying to make sure that I hear
10	everything that is being said.
11	MR. SINGH: Sometimes people are
12	talking about me.
13	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Um-hum.
14	MR. SINGH: Sometimes present over
15	there, that talk about me.
16	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Right.
17	MR. SINGH: So I could defend myself
18	and tell about the truth.
19	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: I hear you, but
20	in this particular case, the regulation does
21	not
22	MR. SINGH: That's fine.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: -- require for 1 2 them to give you notice for you to show up at a That's not in these regulations. 3 meeting. 4 MR. SINGH: Okay. That is fine. 5 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Mr. Thomas, can 6 you respond to --7 MR. THOMAS: Yes. 8 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Yes, sir. 9 MR. THOMAS: For the record, notice was given. We post well in advance of the 10 meeting, a minimum of seven days in advance. 11 12 MEMBER SILVERSTEIN: I'm sorry, sir, 13 I can't hear you. 14 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Move your --A minimum of 15 MR. THOMAS: Sorry. 16 seven days in advance of every public meeting, we 17 post the notice of the meeting with the agenda, 18 including this matter, on our website, on all of 19 the local listservs and in three or four 20 conspicuous places within the Single Member 21 District, within the ANC. But it -- in each 22 Single Member District, there are several places

1 where it is posted, in addition to the website, 2 in addition to all the listservs. So the notice is posted and it 3 4 contains everything that is going to be discussed 5 at that meeting. So Mr. Singh has no -- if he chooses not to avail himself of looking to see 6 7 what is on the --8 I never --MR. SINGH: 9 MR. THOMAS: -- schedule, to look at 10 the agenda, that's on him. But we are not 11 required --12 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Hold on, Mr. 13 Singh. Only one person can speak. 14 We are not required by MR. THOMAS: our rules to go to every single individual, 15 because all these matters affect all of us and we 16 17 are not required to give a specific hand-held 18 notice to every individual who lives in our 19 Single Member District or in our ANC. 20 We are required to post the notice in 21 the manners in which I just described and we have 22 done that and we do that for every single

1	meeting.
2	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right. No,
3	I'm I sir, I do hear your pain, but
4	MR. SINGH: That's fine.
5	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: I heard your
6	pain.
7	MR. SINGH: That's fine. Still
8	working on that, that's fine.
9	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Yeah, but as I
LO	said, there is nothing the only specific
L1	regulation that is listed here talks about the
L 2	civic associations.
L3	MR. SINGH: Well, I was assuming,
L 4	because last time they send me letter before last
L5	proceeding, I got a letter at my business that
L6	this is agenda.
L 7	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Right.
L8	MR. SINGH: My name was there also.
L9	I was assuming this time also I got some
20	information on my store. I don't have website.
21	I have it end up being a lot of problem in
22	life also. So maybe he like to go to the

website, but I don't have website.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Well, what I'll say to you, Mr. Singh, is that you are the one who is asking to -- is this a renewal?

MR. SINGH: Renewal.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: And so one of the things I'll ask you in the future to do that when your liquor license is up for renewal, just as an FYI, you contact your ANC commissioner to say my liquor is up for renewal, is there anything I can do to make sure that my license doesn't get -- I'm not saying you need to do that.

But just to be proactive -MR. SINGH: That's fine.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: -- to be in touch with the ANC, so I'm not saying you have not done that, but just to protect yourself, so therefore, you are not necessarily faced with coming to a hearing and you are saying that I thought everything was okay. I don't know why these ANC people are protesting my -- the renewal

1	of my liquor license, because, you know, I'm an
2	upstanding citizen. I have done everything I'm
3	supposed to do.
4	So I'm just saying just to protect
5	yourself.
6	MR. SINGH: Okay.
7	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: But
8	unfortunately or if or another thing that
9	you can do is maybe have someone, if you know
10	when the ANC meetings are, you kind of just
11	browse the Internet to go check to look at the
12	agenda to see if people are talking about you.
13	MR. SINGH: Okay.
14	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Okay.
15	MR. SINGH: That's fine.
16	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Just to protect
17	yourself, okay?
18	MR. SINGH: Yes.
19	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: I'm not all
20	right. Yes, Mr. Short?
21	MEMBER SHORT: Yeah, I would like to
22	say to Mr. Braddell and also Mr. Thomas and to

the owner, as the Chairman stated, our ABRA Rules and Regulations are available on the Internet, but you can -- before you leave here today, and I would advise anybody who is running a civic association, especially in your area, to get a copy of the rules and regulations of ABRA, that way you protect yourself and when you come here, you will be properly prepared.

Thank you, Mr. Chair.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right.

MR. THOMAS: May I?

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Yes, Mr.

Thomas.

MR. THOMAS: Just one other thing for the record. The reason that Mr. Singh received a specific notice three years ago was that, I think, because his store was one of the locations where we did the public posting. Those locations change from time-to-time.

But that particular time, his store was one of the places that we would post the public notice. This time it was not one of the

places where we posted the public notice. 1 2 However, the public notice was posted in a conspicuous place. 3 4 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Well, as I 5 said, that is not an issue as far as the ANC is 6 That's not required. concerned. But I appreciate the explanation to Mr. Singh. 7 So we 8 want this to be a playing level field for 9 everyone, so I don't want folks to come here and say I did not know and I did not know. 10 11 Okay. Are there any other preliminary 12 matters that need to be discussed? 13 MR. THOMAS: Yes. The Protest Hearing 14 date was set as September 19th. Yes, September 15 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: 16 19th at 4:30. 17 MR. THOMAS: But I requested via email 18 to counsel for the Board that we move that date 19 to late October. The reason being, the ANC, as 20 Mr. Braddell has indicated that just like the 21 civic association, doesn't meet in the summer. The next meeting of our ANC is September 18. 22

we don't have time to respond or to negotiate or to prepare a settlement agreement.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Well, you can negotiate, you can do that, but this -- you can negotiate. You can continue to negotiate. You could ask -- for example, because you can say that we have reached a settlement agreement, but in order for -- but we need to meet for the ANC to vote on it.

And so just let me ask, Mr. Singh, would you agree to postpone the date?

MR. SINGH: Yeah, yeah, that's fine.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right.

MR. SINGH: That's fine.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: So the Agency-since we have an agreement from both sides to postpone the date, the Agency will come up with another date. And because it's a renewal, it's not an issue in the sense of pushing the date up. So the Agency will come up with another date to have this meeting.

But what I'll ask that the parties to

do is to meet, see if you can come up with some 1 2 type of agreement. And if you can't come up with an agreement, then we will have, hold on, sir, a 3 4 date. 5 Give me your name again, Mr. Braddell? Braddell. 6 MR. BRADDELL: CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Mr. Braddell. 7 Yes, Mr. Braddell. 8 9 MR. BRADDELL: Well, sir, I mean, I'm sure you guys here have a lot of cases in front 10 11 of you. And I mean, we have, as an association 12 and as an ANC, you know, protested the liquor license before. 13 14 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Yes, sir. 15 MR. BRADDELL: And you are right, the 16 more preferred method is to negotiate with them 17 over there --18 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Yes, sir. 19 MR. BRADDELL: -- as far as the 20 And I mean, I think Bradley would say protest. 21 and we were -- we are definitely more on that path, instead of having the Protest Hearing. 22

1	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Right.
2	MR. BRADDELL: Now, just as you know
3	that, you know, I as a HACA representative and
4	Bradley have to get our communities
5	MEMBER SHORT: Speak up, Mr. Braddell,
6	speak up.
7	MR. BRADDELL: involved on oh.
8	Myself and Mr. Thomas have to get our communities
9	vote for approval.
10	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Right, right.
11	MR. BRADDELL: Just as you asked
12	before, did we have a vote on this?
13	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Right.
14	MR. BRADDELL: So I have to have a
15	vote later on also.
16	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Right.
17	MR. BRADDELL: And my next meeting is
18	our his next meeting is September and my
19	next meeting is in September.
20	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Okay.
21	MR. BRADDELL: But if the Board grants
22	a little extension, I'm sure we probably, as we

did in our last liquor protest, would come up with an agreement and write the Board that hey, we have come up with an agreement. We don't really need the Protest Hearing.

MR. THOMAS: Right.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: No, I mean, we are going to grant the extension, because we are going to -- because both sides have agreed. So we are going to grant the extension.

I can't give you a date. Would

October 31st at 1:30, would that work for both

sides? October 31st at 1:30. So the Protest

Hearing is scheduled for October 31st, that's the

new date. October 31st at 1:30. So I want every

-- I want to make sure that everyone writes this

date down, October 31st at 1:30.

MR. THOMAS: Okay.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: That's when we are going to have the Protest Hearing. And what this means is that seven days -- if there is no agreement, seven days prior to October 31st you need to exchange your documents and witnesses to

1	the Agency.
2	And if there are any if you don't
3	understand this process, if you need some
4	assistance in figuring out how this process
5	works, please, contact Assistant General Counsel,
6	Ms. April Randall. And her phone number is (202)
7	442-4353.
8	She is here. Whatever problems you
9	have, if you don't understand the process, she
LO	will explain to you what is it that you need to
L1	do. Again, her number her name is April
L2	Randall and her number is (202) 442-4353.
L3	Okay. All right. Do we have any
L 4	other questions by anyone else?
L5	MR. BRADDELL: I believe that is it
L6	for us.
L7	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Mr. Singh? Mr.
L8	Thomas? I don't know why I should remember Mr.
L9	Braddell.
20	MR. BRADDELL: Yes, sir.
21	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right.
22	Thank you for being here today, sir, and I see

1 your pain and I understand your frustration. Ι 2 don't want you to leave here to say these folks, the Board doesn't understand and the Board is 3 4 being unfair. That's one of the reasons why I 5 take the time to explain to you why the Board ruled the way it does. 6 7 And to also explain to you that you 8 are not shut out from the process. All this is 9 is that you now have to work through the ANC to 10 get what is it that you need. 11 MR. BRADDELL: Okay. 12 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Okay. All 13 right. 14 MR. SINGH: Yes, Mr. Chairman, I 15 wanted to --16 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Yes, Mr. Singh? 17 MR. SINGH: No matter protestant done, 18 have done, still I work with the community. I'11 19 work with Mr. Bradley. What I will say I'll work 20 with him, yes. 21 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: 22 MR. SINGH: I wonder why the community

1	said we have some problems in the neighborhood
2	here.
3	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Right.
4	MR. SINGH: Which is all our problem.
5	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Right.
6	MR. SINGH: Nobody here protested
7	Mark, I still work with him, yeah, both of them.
8	We will see if we can come together and work out
9	everything.
10	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: What I was
11	about to say is that I don't really want to see
12	you on October 31st.
13	MR. SINGH: I got that.
14	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Okay. That's
15	what I was about to say.
16	MR. SINGH: Yes, I'm trying my best
17	not to see.
18	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right. I
19	don't want to see you on October 31st, because if
20	I see you on October 31st, it's telling me that
21	the community cannot agree. And one thing I
22	prefer for the community to agree and to have

settlement agreements, because this is your community. You know what works and what does not work in your community.

So I'm hoping that you can solve it, because it's much easier for you to solve it than for you to come here and for the seven of us, who none of us -- well, maybe except for this Ward, that's what Ward 2?

MR. THOMAS: No, it's Ward 5.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Ward 5. Well,
Mr. Cato is the only one who actually lives in
Ward 5. The rest of us live in others. So we
would be making decisions about your neighborhood
and we don't live there.

So I prefer when folks negotiate, have an agreement, come to us to say this is what we are happy with, because at least if you have a settlement agreement, both sides are happy.

When the Board makes a decision, everyone is going to be upset, because you have seven folks making decisions about your neighborhood. Okay.

1 So I prefer that, I tell folks that I 2 prefer, you do settlement agreements. So if you don't come back on October 31st, I'm not going to 3 4 take it personally. Okay. It just tells me that 5 the process works. Mr. Silverstein wants to say 6 7 something. 8 MEMBER SILVERSTEIN: Yes. 9 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Go ahead, Mr. Silverstein. 10 11 MEMBER SILVERSTEIN: I agree, of 12 course, with everything that our Chair said. And 13 since we are talking about the importance of 14 communicating with one another, we should also tell you that if you are going to come to an 15 16 agreement, if you can, the sooner the better. 17 If you wait until the 31st, our 18 Investigators will put together a protest report 19 for us that is in a big loose leaf binder. Ιt 20 may have 40 or 50 pages. It can take many hours 21 for them to do.

And if you come to an agreement say

22

1	two weeks in advance, they are not going to have
2	to finish that and they would be able to do other
3	work. It is a great help to us if you if it
4	appears that you are going to come to an
5	agreement and you think you can, that you do it a
6	little earlier, so that our staff can go about
7	doing the work to the other work that they
8	have to do.
9	Thank you very much for being here.
.0	MR. BRADDELL: Thank you, sir.
.1	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Thank you.
