The Alcoholic Beverage Control Board met in the Alcoholic Beverage Control Hearing Room, Reeves Building, 2000 14th Street, N.W., Suite 400S, Washington, D.C. 20009, Chairperson Donovan W. Anderson, presiding.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: We now move to our Show Cause Hearing Status Calendar and the first case on our Show Cause Hearing (Status) Calendar is Case No. 18-CC-00113, Dean \& Deluca, License No. 18083.

Would the parties, please, approach and identify themselves for the record, please?

MS. SCHMIDT: Good morning. Amy Schmidt, Assistant Attorney General, on behalf of the District of Columbia.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Good morning, Ms. Schmidt.

MR. SARGEANT: Steven Sargeant, General Manager for Dean \& Deluca.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Good morning, Mr. Sargeant. Do you have a letter of -- have you been here before? And if you have not, do you have a Letter of Authorization?

MR. SARGEANT: I have been here before, but $I$ don't have a Letter of

Authorization with me.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: But have you provided the Agency with a Letter of Authorization to say that you are authorized to represent this establishment here? Do we have that in our record?

MR. SARGEANT: I might have years ago.
I have been with Dean \& Deluca five years. I have been here a couple of times to represent them.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Ms. --
MR. SARGEANT: I can't remember if a letter was --

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: -- Schmidt, is there something here that says that this -- I'm sorry, your last name again, sir?

MR. SARGEANT: Sargeant.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: That Mr.
Sargeant is authorized to represent this establishment?

MS. SCHMIDT: The attorney who was assigned to this case just left me a note saying
that the manager will accept the OIC, that's all I -- that's the only note $I$ have about this case.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right. Are you able to provide us with a letter authorizing you to enter into any type of -- to represent this establishment here today?

MR. SARGEANT: I could call the lawyer and have him send one in, forwarded to me, and I can get it through my phone and show it to you.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: No, I'm just saying when can you? Can you provide us by close of business today?

MR. SARGEANT: Oh, yes.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Provide the Agency?

MR. SARGEANT: Definitely, definitely, yes.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right. Are there any preliminary matters in this case?

MS. SCHMIDT: Yes. In this case there is -- the fine is a $\$ 30,000$ fine to be paid within 120 days and a 30 -day suspension with all

30 days to be served. And the respondent shall serve five days triggered from Case No. 17-CC00082.

And since the licensee has the license with him today and has represented that all the alcohol is off the shelves, they are asking to start the suspension immediately.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: And so what are the suspension days?

MS. SCHMIDT: It will be today, starting today, April 3rd until -- I did not do the math. I did not do the math.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: I need to know what the days are. So it's going to be --

MS. SCHMIDT: Yes.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: -- so it's a $30--$

MS. SCHMIDT: 35 days.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: I'm sorry.
There is a 35-day suspension starting today. So what are the days?

MS. SCHMIDT: April 3rd until, if I may
provide them at the -- well, it will be 35 days from today. If I may count at the end of this? CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: I want to make sure that -- all right. We are going to issue a Board Order, but I need to make sure that everyone knows that the Board will -- I mean, I'm inclined to accept starting today, but what's -so the OIC then is that it's a fine of $\$ 30,000$ payable within 120 days.

That there is a 30-day suspension. MS. SCHMIDT: 35 days.

MEMBER SHORT: 35 days.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: No. Can -MS. SCHMIDT: I'm sorry.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Can I finish this, please? The OIC from what I'm told is a fine of $\$ 30,000$ payable within 120 days. For this case, Case No. 18-CC-00113, there is a 30day suspension. And as a result of Case No. 18-CC-00113, there is a 5 -day suspension that will be served, so that was because of Case No. 17-CC00082. So a 5-day suspension was triggered from
that case.
And so therefore, they have a total then of a 35-day suspension which will start today, April 3, 2019. We will --

MS. SCHMIDT: And end on May 7th. The last day will be May 7th.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: And end on or about May 7th, but we are going to issue a Board Order, but we will -- in the Board Order it will calculate that May 7 th will be the day. And it's my understanding that the license has been turned in today to the Agency.

All right. So, Mr. Sargeant, right?
MR. SARGEANT: yes.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: What I'm going to ask is that, I guess you have turned the license in, so it will appear that you have the authority to do this, because you actually have a copy of the license with you. No, no, I'm sorry, you have the original license that you are turning in to the Agency today.

So because you have that, then I'm
taking it that you have authority to enter into this agreement. All right. All right.

So let me state then what the OIC is. It's a 30-day suspension. I'm sorry. A \$30,000 fine payable in 120 days. If the fine is not payable in 120 days, the license will be suspended until the fine has been paid. That's for the 120 days.

As a result of this particular case,
Case No. 18-CC-00013, there is a 30-day suspension. Because of this infraction, there is an additional 5-day suspension that is triggered by Case No. 17-CC-00082 and so there is a total of 35 days. The suspension will start today. The establishment is providing the Agency with its license today.

So is this your understanding, sir, of the Offer in Compromise?

MR. SARGEANT: Yes.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Are you aware that by accepting an Offer in Compromise, that you are giving up your right to a hearing?

MR. SARGEANT: Yes.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Are you also aware that by accepting an Offer in Compromise, that you are giving up your right to appeal this matter?

MR. SARGEANT: Yes.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right.
With that said, are there any questions by any Board Members?

With that said, I then make a motion that the Offer in Compromise of a fine of $\$ 30,000$ payable within 120 days be accepted. That along with the $\$ 30,000$ fine that there is a 30-day suspension for this particular case and there is an additional 5-day suspension that is triggered by Case No. 17-CC-00082 for a total of a 35-day suspension that will run starting today and that the licensee is handing over its license to the Agency today.

Is there a second?<br>MEMBER SHORT: Second.<br>CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Mr. Short has

seconded the motion.
All those in favor say aye.
ALL: Aye.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Those opposed? The matter passes 6-0-0.

The Board will issue a Board Order in this matter that will specifically list that suspension. Although you haven't received -well, you are giving us the license today, so it doesn't really matter.

So but we will let you -- in the Board Order, we will give you the date when the license will be returned to you. Thank you.

The only thing I can say, sir, now that this case is over, one more strike, the next strike, you are going to lose your -- you might lose your -- probably lose your ability to serve license -- to serve alcohol.

MR. SARGEANT: Okay.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: It's sale to minor, the foolproof way to do this is that no matter how -- what the person looks like, no
matter how old they are, they have to provide a license.

MR. SARGEANT: Yes.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: I was -- you have to provide proof. And I say this to everyone, you go to Costco, I'm not saying that they are the best, they are perfect, but everyone who goes to Costco to buy alcohol has to produce a license, proof how old they are. It doesn't matter whether or not they are 21, 31, 101, if you are buying alcohol, you have to prove that you are old enough. And if you -- so if you guys want to continue serving alcohol, then if you don't comply with the law, then you are going to lose your ability.

MR. SARGEANT: All right. Just to let you know, we do have strict policies in place now for carding. So we have taken care of that 100 percent. I mean, nobody is perfect, but we have made dramatic changes in the way we operate to make sure that this does not happen again.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: And you know
that -- well, all right. All right. Have a good day.

Well, what's the process? Where does he turn in -- who does he give the license to? Mr. Gordy, at the back of the room, you can hand him the license, sir.

MR. SARGEANT: Yes, do you still need the Authorization Letter, even though I'm turning in the license?

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: I think for the record you can provide -- also provide the Agency with just an Authorization Letter.

MR. SARGEANT: Okay.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: So by -- do that by close of business today, sir.

MR. SARGEANT: Who can I email that to?

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: You can talk to Mr. Gordy around back. Yeah, talk to Mr. Gordy.

All right. Ms. Randall will give you her card and so you can email that to her.

And I'll just say in the future
whenever you are in the Board, make sure that the Agency has a letter authorizing you to represent them.

MR. SARGEANT: Okay.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right.
Thank you.
MR. SARGEANT: Thank you.
