3 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Our next case
4 and our last case for the year unless there is an
5 emergency hearing, is Case Number 18-251-00197,
6 District Anchor, License Number 10517. Would the
7 parties please approach and identify -- all
8 parties please approach and identify them for the
9 record, please. Go ahead, Mr. Puente.

10 MR. PUENTE: Kevin Puente, ABRA
11 investigator.

12 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Good afternoon.

13 MR. FARMER: John Farmer, on behalf of
14 District Anchor.

15 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Good afternoon,
16 Mr. Farmer.

17 MR. KOLOKOUSIS: Paul Kolokousis.

18 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: What's your
19 last name, sir?

20 MR. KOLOKOUSIS: K-O-L-O-K-O-U-S-I-S.

21 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: How do you
22 pronounce that?

1 MR. KOLOKOUSIS: Kolokousis.

2 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Kolokousis?

3 And who are you, sir?

4 MR. KOLOKOUSIS: I was the manager on
5 duty that night.

6 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right.

7 Well, this Mr. Farmer is an attorney, so I -- all
8 right. Normally, if Mr. -- if you were not -- if
9 you weren't represented by an attorney, I would
10 ask that you have a letter from the establishment
11 stating that you are authorized to represent the
12 licensee today. But since Mr. Farmer is an
13 attorney --

14 MR. KOLOKOUSIS: Oh, I'm also the
15 general manager. I'm sorry.

16 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: That still
17 doesn't mean anything, sir. Are you on the
18 li- -- if you aren't on the licensing, you are an
19 employee of the establishment.

20 MR. KOLOKOUSIS: Okay.

21 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: And so, that's
22 why I'm saying, if Mr. Farmer, as an attorney,

1 and my assumption, he -- the licensee authorized
2 him and -- I'm sorry, he's representing the
3 licensee and the licensee has identified you as a
4 person to come here, I was just stating that.

5 So, not every time that there is an
6 attorney, I'm saying -- if in the future you
7 are -- if there's an incident and you show up,
8 and if you not -- if there is no attorney with
9 you, then you would have to bring something from
10 the licensee saying that you are authorized to
11 represent them in front of the Agency.

12 MR. KOLOKOUSIS: Okay.

13 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: That's all that
14 was about. All right, this case involves an
15 incident that occurred at -- on Saturday,
16 October 28th at DC Anchor. And I'll state on the
17 record, District -- I'm sorry, District Anchor.

18 And I -- some information that the
19 Chief of Police had requested in this particular
20 case, that we have a fact-finding here in this
21 case and I see that -- what's in front of me,
22 that there is an article that I think was on

1 Channel 5 that this matter was televised.

2 And I think I might have seen it on
3 the TV. So, I'll say that I think I might have
4 seen this incident on television when it was.
5 But it didn't ring a bell at the moment until now
6 I'm sitting here.

7 So, I just put it out there to say
8 that I thought I'd heard about it before. But
9 that doesn't mean that I've made any decisions
10 regarding whether or not this establishment was
11 liable for whatever occurred.

12 But we're having a hearing because of
13 an incident occurring, and also because the
14 police chief had requested that we have a fact-
15 finding hearing.

16 And so, the way this process will
17 occur, I'll ask Mr. Puente to tell us the
18 incident, at least from -- as a result of the
19 report that was written. And then, your attorney
20 can respond whichever way to the incident.

21 And at the conclusion of the hearing,
22 based on what's told, I will make a motion about

1 what further action, if any, the Board will take
2 as a result of this incident. Okay, sir? All
3 right. Go ahead, Mr. Puente.

4 MR. PUENTE: Yeah, so on Saturday,
5 October 27, 2018 at approximately 8:45 p.m., ABRA
6 received a hotline telephone call from MPD
7 regarding a ADW that occurred at District Anchor.

8 Myself and Investigator Vanessa
9 Pleitez arrived at the establishment at about
10 9 p.m. We were met by Lieutenant Patrick Loftus,
11 Captain Edward Bernhardt, Sergeant Adam Gray and
12 Officer Nathan Maring.

13 Officer Maring advised that at
14 approximately 7:15 p.m. he received a radio run
15 from DC Fire Department advising that they had
16 two patrons in ambulances that were assaulted
17 inside District Anchor.

18 Also, Maring stated that he arrived at
19 the scene met by the first victim, who claimed
20 that she was shoved down twice by an unknown male
21 and her friend tried to intervene. And at that
22 time, her friend was assaulted by the unknown

1 male patron.

2 He took a beer bottle right to her
3 face and she received significant lacerations to
4 her head. Also, Maring stated that he went
5 inside District Anchor to attempt to locate the
6 crime scene.

7 He was met by ABC manager,
8 Mr. Kolokousis, and advised him that he's going
9 to look through the crime scene and he will need
10 the music and lights turned off -- the lights
11 turned down and music turned off.

12 Also, Maring stated that he found a
13 crime scene with broken glass and blood on the
14 floor and -- near the dance floor. Him and
15 several of the officers had to kind of clear the
16 people out of the establishment to maintain the
17 crime scene.

18 Officer Maring asked to see video
19 surveillance from the incident. He was advised
20 by Mr. Kolokousis that the surveillance video
21 equipment was not operating -- it had stopped
22 working several days prior. So, that's why

1 there's no video surveillance available.

2 Myself and Investigator Pleitez
3 arrived, we were told the same thing by
4 Mr. Kolokousis, that the surveillance video was
5 not working due to the system frying. So, they
6 had to get a new system, or have a tech come look
7 at it.

8 A few minutes later, the owner --
9 Mr. Morrogh -- arrived. We advised him the same
10 thing. During the conversation with
11 Mr. Kolokousis, Mr. Morrogh and the MPD Command
12 Staff, Mr. Kolokousis made a statement that he
13 said it was a moot point because there was no
14 video surveillance in that area where it
15 happened.

16 I advised him it's not a moot point,
17 it's your job to help out and protect the patrons
18 of the establishment, and advised him that he's a
19 nightclub. For regulations for nightclub, there
20 has to be operating video surveillance.

21 I came back to the office, I pulled
22 the file, I determined that the establishment did

1 not have a security plan. They submitted one
2 back in January of this year. They were advised
3 by our ABRA staff that it did not meet the
4 requirements, and was rejected.

5 To date, we have not received anything
6 updated. No response up until after this
7 incident. I called the victim, Ms. Madison
8 Alford, who advised me that while inside the
9 establishment, her friend was pushed.

10 She tried to intervene. The suspect
11 struck her in the head with a beer bottle. She
12 received significant damage to her face. She had
13 to be on short-term disability from work due to
14 her injuries.

15 She advised that she went to the
16 bartender, told the bartender, the bartender kind
17 of laughed at her, told her that they didn't
18 think she was serious.

19 I spoke with the bartender. He
20 advised me that he did call 911 right away once
21 and he made notification to Mr. Kolokousis and
22 his staff.

1 MPD advised me that the establishment
2 was very cooperative and they assisted with their
3 investigation. The only issue was that there was
4 no video surveillance, and per the regs you're
5 supposed to have it.

6 I spoke with Mr. Morrogh and
7 Mr. Kolokousis in the following days. They
8 advised me that they had ordered a new system and
9 it should be arriving by November 20th, and they
10 would be installing it.

11 I advised Mr. Morrogh that he needed
12 to contact ABRA immediately about updating --
13 getting a security plan on file right away, due
14 to them being a Class C and it was required.

15 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: So, Mr. Farmer,
16 where is the security plan?

17 MR. FARMER: We had actually twice
18 filed the security plans, once in May and then
19 again in June.

20 MEMBER ALBERTI: Please speak a little
21 louder.

22 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Mr. -- oh, I'm

1 sorry, I couldn't hear you.

2 MR. FARMER: We filed a security plan
3 initially, I believe, in end of April, early May.
4 We spoke with Mr. Berman. He sent an email. We
5 amended a security plan, and then on June 16th we
6 resubmitted the security plan.

7 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: So, you're
8 saying it was submitted June 16th and you have
9 not re- -- you haven't heard whether or not it's
10 legally sufficient as of June 16th.

11 MR. FARMER: That's correct. Yes.

12 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: So, you're
13 saying you don't know whether or not you received
14 a response?

15 MR. FARMER: I can state I have not
16 received a response. I thought that it was the
17 end of the matter.

18 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: So, who
19 submitted it? You submitted it, Mr. Farmer?

20 MR. FARMER: Yes. I had an individual
21 submit that plan.

22 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Oh, so you

1 submitted it. All right. I will -- we'll find
2 out whether or not -- so, as far as the security
3 tenet's concerned -- well, is your client aware
4 that there is a statute that specifically states
5 that you are supposed to have operative -- your
6 camera is supposed to operate, and if it doesn't
7 operate you are supposed to let ABRA know that
8 your cameras is not operating?

9 MR. FARMER: He is aware of that now.
10 He was aware then but he did not know from the
11 time what -- the camera ceased to operate shortly
12 before the incident and he had to order new
13 parts.

14 As Inspector Puente correctly said,
15 the camera was fried or something to that effect.
16 I can't give you a full technical explanation
17 base. It was inoperable, he was aware that it
18 was inoperable, he ordered parts.

19 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: The thing that
20 troubles me -- and it's not just this
21 establishment, Mr. Farmer -- is that it always --
22 when an incident occur, the camera's not working.

1 It always happens. An incident occur
2 and the camera's not working. And it's not just
3 District Anchor.

4 It's too many of these establishments
5 that something happens -- either the video
6 doesn't work, it livestream, it, I don't know how
7 to operate it, it broke down yesterday.

8 I mean, having cameras is for your own
9 protection. And I don't understand -- I mean, I
10 don't understand what systems are in place to
11 ensure that you have cameras, and that the
12 cameras are operating.

13 And if you find out that they're not
14 operating, that in due course -- I'm not sure --
15 I know that the establishment went out and
16 ordered and purchased. I missed the point here.
17 How long after your conversation with them did
18 they purchase a new camera system?

19 MR. PUENTE: I received confirmation
20 from Mr. Kolokousis -- that's one of my
21 exhibits -- I called him around November 14th.
22 Then, I got a confirmation later that day that

1 they had purchased one, it was going to be
2 received earlier than November 20th.

3 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: And when did
4 this incident occur?

5 MR. PUENTE: October 27th.

6 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: But it took
7 them about three weeks?

8 MR. PUENTE: Yes, sir.

9 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: So, therefore,
10 they were --

11 MR. PUENTE: So - the night of the
12 incident. I failed to mention it. There was pub
13 crawl. Ms. Alford was participating in the pub
14 crawl that night. So, that -- the crowd -- there
15 was a larger crowd there that night.

16 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Now, I don't
17 know if I can say you can't participate in
18 another pub crawl. I don't know if I have the
19 power to recommend that to the Board. I don't
20 know.

21 MEMBER SILVERSTEIN: You do.

22 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: So --

1 MEMBER ALBERTI: You do.

2 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: -- well, I
3 was -- so that's something --

4 MEMBER ALBERTI: Well, actually, I'm
5 not sure. They're eligible because they have a
6 violation.

7 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right. So,
8 maybe with another --

9 MR. PUENTE: He also made statements
10 to us that night that he didn't like pub crawls.
11 I advised him, if you don't like it, then why are
12 you participating in these.

13 MEMBER SILVERSTEIN: Would you say
14 that again?

15 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: He did not like
16 pub crawls.

17 MR. PUENTE: Mr. Patrick Morrogh
18 stated that he did not like the pub crawls, in
19 front of me and the Lieutenant Captain. I
20 advised him, if you don't like pub crawls, then
21 why are you allowing your staff to participate in
22 the pub crawls, then.

1 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right.
2 Well, pub crawls are voluntary. You have to sign
3 up to do it. And if you don't want to
4 participate in a pub crawl, then you don't have
5 to.

6 I don't think anybody's going to --
7 and I would guess -- I'm just making a general
8 statement. So, pub crawls are voluntary, that
9 someone convinced -- a pub crawl operator will
10 come and convince a licensee that how you -- that
11 they want you to participate in the pub crawl,
12 and then you have to get a copy of the license to
13 post to say you're participating. So --

14 MEMBER ALBERTI: They're ineligible
15 anyway.

16 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Well -- so,
17 well, it doesn't really matter. It doesn't
18 really matter -- it's my case, it doesn't really
19 matter. But I'm just saying, they're voluntary
20 participation.

21 MEMBER ALBERTI: Can I make a comment
22 for the record?

1 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Yes, yes,
2 Mr. Alberti.

3 MEMBER ALBERTI: I just want to point
4 out some talk about security plan.

5 MR. FARMER: Mm-hmm.

6 MEMBER ALBERTI: I went back and
7 looked at your record.

8 MR. FARMER: All right. I'm sorry?

9 MEMBER ALBERTI: I went back and
10 looked at the record --

11 MR. FARMER: Yes.

12 MEMBER ALBERTI: Back in January there
13 was an incident and an order was issued in June.
14 The incident included -- and the charges in that
15 incident were not a failure to file a security
16 plan.

17 MR. FARMER: Correct.

18 MEMBER ALBERTI: And that case was
19 resolved last June. All right?

20 MR. FARMER: Right.

21 MEMBER ALBERTI: It was in May -- I
22 think that probably because of that case you

1 filed a security plan. Right?

2 MR. FARMER: That's correct.

3 MEMBER ALBERTI: And you still don't
4 have one.

5 MR. FARMER: No, we do. I just --

6 MEMBER ALBERTI: No, you don't. You
7 don't have one that meets with the Board's
8 requirements -- the law's requirements.

9 MR. FARMER: Again, if I can --
10 Mr. Alberti, we -- after speaking with Mr. Berman
11 and having received Mr. Berman's email, we
12 submitted an amended plan.

13 MEMBER ALBERTI: Right. And I --
14 we'll -- I'm going to guess we'll check, but as
15 the information I was hearing earlier -- and
16 maybe I'm mistaken -- is that Mr. Berman respond
17 to you -- responded to you in June, or
18 thereabouts?

19 MR. FARMER: The email from Mr. Berman
20 I believe was in May. And after -- it was in
21 late-May. I believe we responded in early June.

22 MEMBER ALBERTI: And you have -- your

1 contention is that you have --

2 MR. FARMER: Yes.

3 MEMBER ALBERTI: -- you haven't heard
4 back from Mr. Berman?

5 MR. FARMER: Yes. I didn't think
6 anything of that. It was just --

7 MEMBER ALBERTI: We'll check that,
8 because this is serious. This is quite serious.

9 MR. FARMER: I understand.

10 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Anyway,
11 moving -- the representation by counsel is that
12 counsel provided the security plan to the Agency,
13 and counsel is waiting for the Agency -- if the
14 security plan is not legally sufficient, then
15 counsel is waiting for instructions from the
16 Agency to inform him.

17 And so, I will take counsel at his
18 word that this is what was done, and that counsel
19 is waiting from the Agency.

20 If the Agency has not responded to
21 counsel, or if the Agency responded to counsel,
22 then I will once again remind the Agency to, if

1 they had responded to counsel, to say that -- to
2 say whether or not the security plan was legally
3 sufficient, or if it's not sufficient, I will
4 instruct the Agency to once again follow up with
5 the licensee regarding the security plan.

6 And I will -- since this is going back
7 as far as May, I'm going to order that -- before
8 even making a final decision -- that within two
9 weeks that a legally sufficient security plan be
10 provided to the Agency.

11 If it has been, it's not an issue. If
12 it has not, then within two weeks that security
13 plan -- and this is -- although this is a fact-
14 finding hearing, but based on the class of
15 license that you have, it is mandatory that you
16 have a security plan.

17 So, therefore, all we're doing is
18 making sure that you comply with the law. And
19 there's an outstanding order going back almost
20 six months regarding the security plan.

21 So, since counsel is -- the
22 representation by counsel is that he believes

1 that he has provided legally sufficient security
2 plan to the Agency, the Agency might be saying
3 they're not sure.

4 So, whether -- I will -- so therefore,
5 I will order the Agency to provide counsel with
6 notification, and I'll say within the next 48
7 hours that the Agency will provide counsel -- 48
8 business hours -- that Agency will provide
9 counsel with either a follow-up email that was
10 sent before, or a new email, to say the status of
11 the security plan.

12 And then, counsel will have two weeks
13 to provide us with a legally sufficient security
14 plan if that was not done.

15 All right, that's that -- a security
16 plan, because it is mandatory that this class of
17 license has a security plan.

18 Now, within the security plan maybe
19 you can tell us how is it that -- there is an
20 allegation that -- by the victim -- that the
21 licensee did not call the police.

22 And there's an allegation stating that

1 the licensee believed that -- it's their position
2 that even if the camera was operational, it would
3 not have covered -- it was irrelevant. It would
4 not have covered the area.

5 I said an allegation. I didn't say it
6 was factual. Do you know Mr. Farmer, an
7 attorney? So, I said there was an allegation.
8 So, I want to make sure -- how does the licensee
9 respond to these allegations, and what are their
10 views regarding these issues?

11 MR. FARMER: In reverse order,
12 Mr. Kolokousis used the word moot. His meaning
13 was not that it was not an issue. What he meant
14 by moot, the way the camera was positioned,
15 apparently did not -- this happened in an alcove.
16 The camera would not have covered that particular
17 space.

18 And since that time he's repositioned
19 the cameras with the operating system. But
20 again, it was not his -- it was not his -- he
21 wasn't being facetious or making light of the
22 point.

1 His point was that the camera would
2 not have seen that. That hadn't been pointed out
3 by the inspector. That particular issue has been
4 corrected.

5 In terms of the allegations of the
6 bartender's behavior at that particular point,
7 you know, the establishment's position on that is
8 it's just not true. I have personally spoken
9 with the bartender.

10 The bartender was the one that
11 actually called the ambulance. He provided the
12 first-aid kit and medical assistance to the best
13 of his ability. And the ambulance was there
14 within four or three minutes.

15 But he did actually call. There's no
16 indication from any members of the staff that it
17 was anything -- any light they made of the
18 incident itself.

19 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Any other
20 representation you wish to make?

21 MR. FARMER: I'm sorry?

22 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Any other

1 representation you wish to make on - regarding
2 -

3 MR. FARMER: Yeah. In terms of -- I
4 mean, I think it's already been noted that it was
5 a crowded situation.

6 The incident was not observed by any
7 members of the bar staff, or even of the security
8 staff.

9 And we, frankly, are in the dark and
10 not quite sure what happened. Again, the young
11 lady appears to have come to the bar, asked for
12 assistance, got immediate assistance.

13 But further than that, and other than
14 assisting the investigatory agencies with this
15 particular incident, there's really not knowledge
16 of this particular incident.

17 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Mr. Puente, as
18 a result of these incidents, did you -- were you
19 able to find any other violations? I know that
20 you mentioned the failure to have a security
21 plan.

22 MR. PUENTE: Just the security plan

1 was the biggest issue. No other issues.

2 MEMBER ALBERTI: Can I ask a question?

3 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Go ahead, man.

4 MEMBER ALBERTI: Okay.

5 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Go ahead,

6 Mr. Alberti.

7 MEMBER ALBERTI: Are the cameras not
8 working an issue?

9 MR. PUENTE: Oh yeah, the cameras not
10 working is part --

11 MEMBER ALBERTI: Because we have --
12 there were beliefs that there is a compliant
13 security plan in June and this happened in
14 October, so the camera should have been working.

15 MR. PUENTE: Yeah, the camera -- MPD
16 and us agreed that if we had cameras, they could
17 have identified the suspect.

18 MEMBER ALBERTI: And they -- but they
19 weren't working.

20 MR. PUENTE: They weren't working that
21 night. No.

22 MEMBER ALBERTI: Okay. Okay.

1 MEMBER SILVERSTEIN: Mr. Chairman, may
2 I --

3 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Yes,
4 Mr. Silverstein. I'm sorry.

5 MEMBER SILVERSTEIN: Several things
6 here that are of particular concern, the first of
7 which, the 27th of October was a multiple pub
8 crawl, Halloween.

9 Two years earlier we had the perfect
10 storm on Halloween, a pub crawl there that was
11 probably the worst we've ever had. The fact that
12 this happened then is a matter of concern, and
13 I'm sure our investigator knows exactly - been
14 through this.

15 The lack of cameras, among other
16 things, it's not just that the event itself could
17 not be captured, but you could not capture the
18 individual -- the suspect entering or leaving.
19 So, the individuals who were the victims in this
20 case were deprived of the opportunity of
21 identifying the person who assaulted them.

22 And just -- I would ask the

1 investigator where the licensee fell short. You
2 could just simply list their failures.

3 MR. PUENTE: By not having cameras
4 operational, and -- but he made it clear if they
5 had a door camera, they could identify the
6 suspect. But observations were made that the
7 suspect ran out, and they could have easily
8 figured out who ran out right after the incident.

9 MEMBER SILVERSTEIN: Do they have a
10 door camera now?

11 MR. PUENTE: They've always had a door
12 camera. I've seen the camera system.

13 MEMBER SILVERSTEIN: Okay. Drawn.
14 Move on.

15 MR. PUENTE: I mean, his biggest thing
16 was, like you mentioned, without the cameras
17 those victims don't have an opportunity to point
18 out the suspect, and the suspect is still out
19 there.

20 MEMBER SILVERSTEIN: It also denies us
21 the proof that your people did offer aid and did
22 respond properly. We simply have to take your

1 word, whereas if there were a camera, we would
2 know that that occurred, or that it did not.
3 Anything else, investigator?

4 MR. PUENTE: Not that I can think of.

5 MEMBER SILVERSTEIN: Thank you.

6 Nothing further.

7 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Let me ask you,
8 Mr. Farmer.

9 MR. FARMER: Yes.

10 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Do you
11 recall -- was this May or -- when was the last
12 communication that you had with the Agency, if
13 you remember correctly?

14 MR. FARMER: I believe it was in June.

15 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: So, do
16 you -- you haven't -- I think you have it in
17 front of you a communication on May 24th. Do you
18 recall whether or not you had -- well, you
19 prob- -- well, all right.

20 It appears that there are -- when was
21 this new camera system installed in November?
22 So, this new camera system -- the cameras -- this

1 is in November. Is that correct?

2 MR. FARMER: Which - ?

3 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: The cameras
4 that -- you bought new cameras. Is that correct?

5 MR. FARMER: That's -- yeah, I think
6 new cameras were bought -- Mr. Kolokousis said
7 yeah, I think new cameras were bought twice,
8 or --

9 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: When was the
10 last time were --

11 MR. KOLOKOUSIS: Purchased?

12 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: -- purchased
13 for this establishment?

14 MR. KOLOKOUSIS: October 30th they
15 were purchased. I think they were delivered
16 November 21st.

17 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: And so, they're
18 operational now?

19 MR. KOLOKOUSIS: Yeah. Well, they're
20 wired and hooked up now. Yes.

21 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: So, they're
22 wired and they're in operation?

1 MR. KOLOKOUSIS: Correct.

2 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Are you able to
3 provide this Agency with an updated security plan
4 that indicates the security cameras --

5 MR. KOLOKOUSIS: Yes.

6 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: -- their number
7 and their location? Are you able to provide this
8 information to the Agency?

9 MR. KOLOKOUSIS: Yes. We're going to
10 put more cameras in to try to get every dead
11 spot. And additionally, sir, we try --

12 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Identify
13 yourself.

14 MR. KOLOKOUSIS: Yes.

15 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Who's speaking?
16 Just for the record, sir, identify yourself.

17 MR. KOLOKOUSIS: Oh, Paul Kolokousis.
18 And additionally, we do take safety very
19 seriously, and stayed out voluntarily from the
20 last bar crawl, which was just this past
21 Saturday.

22 They had said we were approved for it.

1 We voluntarily said we're not part of the -- we
2 put signs up on the doors and the windows telling
3 people we're not part of the bar crawl. We do
4 take it very seriously.

5 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Well,
6 Mr. Farmer, I -- where I am still is that within
7 two weeks from today the licensee needs to
8 provide a security plan to the Agency that
9 indicates that there are security cameras, the
10 numbers of cameras and the location.

11 Because what I have -- this
12 information was asked on May 24th. I don't know
13 what happened after May 24th, but since I've been
14 told that cameras were purchased in October, I
15 believe that we can -- and it appears that
16 whatever dead spot that was not covered before,
17 that that should not be that difficult
18 that -- for that information to be provided to
19 this Agency within two weeks from today.

20 All right, and I -- just as an FYI, I
21 think that there's been -- based on the
22 investigative history, I do not believe that you

1 can legally participate in a bar crawl, whether
2 or not you want to or not, I believe that you
3 cannot based on, I get there's some violations.

4 So, I believe that you cannot legally
5 participate in a bar crawl.

6 MR. KOLOKOUSIS: Okay, we don't want
7 to. That's what I'm saying. Voluntarily, we
8 stayed out of it.

9 MR. FARMER: If I can just raise a
10 point. You're saying based on the investigative
11 history?

12 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Yes, my
13 understanding.

14 MR. FARMER: As District Anchor? Or
15 from the previous establishment?

16 MEMBER ALBERTI: Well, you've been --
17 how long have you been this establishment?

18 MR. FARMER: - sixteen.

19 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: I'm sorry, who?

20 MR. KOLOKOUSIS: March 15 of 2016.

21 MEMBER ALBERTI: Right. Your last
22 violation was resolved this past June. I'm

1 looking at the order.

2 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: June 25th.

3 MEMBER ALBERTI: As District Anchor,
4 you have a violation that was resolved in June.

5 MR. FARMER: My question -- my query
6 was as to -- my understanding, there's only one
7 previous incident.

8 MEMBER ALBERTI: Yeah, and I don't
9 know -- I'm looking what the law requires.

10 MR. FARMER: Oh, I understand. That
11 was, again, a curious question.

12 MEMBER ALBERTI: All right. Okay.
13 Okay.

14 MR. FARMER: But --

15 MEMBER ALBERTI: I understand. We're
16 looking into that.

17 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right,
18 that's irrelevant. I mean, whether or not you --
19 bar crawls are voluntary. So, if you decide that
20 you're not going to participate in a bar crawl,
21 that's -- whether or not you can or cannot,
22 that's not within the purview of the Agency.

1 The law says that if you have certain
2 violations, that you can't participate. Even if
3 you don't have the violations and you decide that
4 you don't want to provide -- you do not want to
5 participate in bar crawls, then that's your
6 call.

7 We're out of it, whether or not -- if
8 there's no legal impetus why you can't
9 participate in a bar crawl, that's your call.
10 That's not the Board's. The Board is not
11 involved with what establishments participate in
12 bar crawls if they can. All right? Any other
13 comments by the Board? Any final comments,
14 Mr. Puente.

15 MR. PUENTE: No, sir.

16 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Mr. Farmer, any
17 final comments by your clan -- the BFA clan?

18 MR. FARMER: On behalf of my clan, I
19 could say that they strive mightily to comply
20 with the law and regulations. And as
21 Mr. Kolokousis said, safety is of the utmost
22 importance, as well.

1 I personally interviewed the bartender
2 who's in question, Mr. Kolokousis and members of
3 the security staff, and can assure you that they
4 did everything they could in relation to this
5 particular incident, based on what they saw,
6 observed, and were told.

7 So, I can't really -- other than the
8 security plan issues, I don't think that there's
9 any indication here that this is an intentionally
10 non-compliant establishment.

11 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right. So,
12 what I want to leave here today, which is clear,
13 is that within two weeks that District Anchor
14 will provide to the Agency a legally sufficient
15 security plan that specifically identifies that
16 their cameras -- the number of cameras and the
17 location of cameras.

18 And that is queued to this Board two
19 weeks from today. With that said, I then make a
20 motion that no further action be taken regarding
21 this matter. Is there a second?

22 MEMBER CATO: Second.

1 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Mr. Cato has
2 seconded the motion.

3 (Off-mic comments.)

4 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: I'll withdraw
5 my motion and the Board will take this matter
6 under advisement. Okay? I will withdraw my
7 motion and we will take this matter under
8 advisement.

9 But as I stated before, you know what
10 is it that you need to do as far as the security
11 plan. Okay? All right. With that said, we are
12 in recess. Thank you.

13 (Whereupon the above-entitled matter
14 went off the record at 3:22 p.m., and
15 resumed at 3:40 p.m.)

16 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: We do have a
17 licensing agenda for today and the only
18 establishment on our licensing agenda is to
19 review request to change hours for Hill County,
20 license number 083696. I make a motion that we
21 approve this request. Is there a second?

22 MEMBER SILVERSTEIN: Second.

1 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Mr. Silverstein
2 has seconded the motion. All those in favor say
3 aye.

4 (Chorus of aye.)

5 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Those opposed?
6 The matter passes.

7 PARTICIPANT: 4-0-0.

8 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: 4-0-0. Thank
9 you very much and we are formally adjourned.

10 (Whereupon the above-entitled matter
11 went off the record at 3:41 p.m.)
