The Alcoholic Beverage Control Board met in the Alcoholic Beverage Control Hearing Room, Reeves Building, 2000 14th Street, N.W., Suite 400S, Washington, D.C. 20009, Chairperson Donovan W. Anderson, presiding.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right. Good morning, everyone. I would like to welcome you to the regular scheduled meeting of the District of Columbia Alcoholic Beverage Control Board.

Today is October 23, 2019.

I would like to introduce the members of the Board with us today. To my far right is Ms. Rafi Crockett. To my immediate right is Mr. Bobby Cato. To my far left is Ms. Rema
Wahabzadah. And to my immediate left is Mr.
James Short.

My name is Donovan Anderson. I'm

Chairman of the Board. We have five members in

attendance today so therefore we do have a quorum

to conduct business.

I would like to mention three things before we get started. First of all, if you have any electronic devices, pagers, cell phones or such, please make certain that they're turned off to avoid any interruptions of the proceeding.

Secondly, there is a piece of paper on each table. When you come forward as your case is called, please take a seat at the table and

please sign it. This is to ensure the correct spelling of your name for the record.

And lastly please note that today's hearing of the Alcoholic Beverage Control Board is governed by the Open Meetings Act. Please address any questions or concerns to the Office of Open Government at opengovoffice@dc.gov.

I would note that the approximate time is 9:43 a.m. I'm sorry. It's 9:43 a.m. And our first order of business today, it's a show cause hearing status, Case Number 19-CC-00068. Do we have the government? Do we have -- our first order in this case number was 16-CC-00068, Farmers and Distillers, License Number 100647. It's my understanding that the licensee is running late this morning. So I will recall this case once the licensee shows up. So I will recall that case.

(Whereupon, the above-entitled order to show cause hearing went off the record at 9:42 a.m. and resumed at 9:55 a.m.)

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right. I am going to -- let's recall our show cause hearing status, Case Number 19-CC-00068, Farmers & Distillers License Number 100647. Would the

And 10 their right -- with that said, I then make a 11 motion that the offer in compromise of a fine --12 I'm sorry -- an offer in compromise -- I'm sorry. I make a motion that the offer in compromise of a 13 14 written warning be accepted if there is there is 15 a second. 16 MEMBER SHORT: Second. 17 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Mr. Short 18 accepted the motion. Is there a second -- I'm 19 sorry. All those in favor say aye. 20 (Chorus of ayes.) 21 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Those opposed. 22 (No audible response.) 23 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: It passes 5-0-24 Now that this case is over, Mr. O'Brien, I am 25 disappointed that the owner of this establishment

is not here.

As you are aware, for a first infraction that if an applicant or licensee does a sale to a minor, it is a staff settlement where it is an automatic warning. However, in this case, the Board considered it egregious. That's one of the reasons why the Board sent this matter over to the Office of Corporation Counsel for it to be prosecuted.

And in this particular case on April 26, 2019, the ABRA investigators, we were conducting compliance checks with the assistance of a 15-year-old minor.

A 15-year-old minor went to this establishment. The bartender asked her for her license, for her identification. She showed this individual her identification that stated that she was 15-years-old, and your client sold her alcohol. And this is egregious.

I believe that if a 15-year-old -- we do sale to minor always. And if you tell me that a person is 20-years-old, 19, 18, 17, you know, people look. But if it's a 15-year-old who shows -- you ask you for an identification and she shows you an identification saying that she was

born in 2004, how can your client -- how can this 1 2 occur, sir? 3 And that's not a reason -- I think I 4 was told that we were going to pass this on for 5 another week because the owner could not be here today. But it's something that as Chair I take 6 7 this very serious. And I believe that if we send 8 a 15-year-old to an establishment that's a 9 freebie. 10 That's like someone looking to say, 11 you know, she's so young. It's like thank you 12 for sending someone so young so we know that we 13 pass this test. But it's just something that I 14 take this very seriously. And it's just, at 15 least for me, it's egregious. And that's all I 16 can say. 17 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Yes, Mr. Short. 18 MEMBER SHORT: Mr. O'Brien. 19 MR. O'BRIEN: Good morning, sir. 20 MEMBER SHORT: You're highly respected 21 amongst a lot of people in this city and 22 especially by this Board member.

this establishment, 15-year-old, I have 1 2 grandchildren that age. It's not acceptable at 3 all. That's all I have to share. CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Thank you, Mr. 4 5 Short. Yes, Mr. O'Brien. MR. O'BRIEN: May I speak? 6 7 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Yes, sir. MR. O'BRIEN: As far as what the Chair 8 9 as the service of a 15-year-old, I've got nothing 10 to say other than I agree with you 100 percent. 11 But I do want to explain the absence --12 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: I'm aware why 13 -- I'm aware why he's absent. So you don't have I was told that -- from what I was told from 14 15 a procedural matter, he would not have been here. 16 They were going to postpone it for another week 17 for him to be here. At least that's what I was 18 told, so I'm not -- but if you have a --19 MR. O'BRIEN: Let me set the record. 20 I knew nothing about -- I represent this 21 establishment and its sister establishments in 22 the city --23 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Okay. 24 MR. O'BRIEN: -- on ABC measures. Ι 25 knew nothing about this until I would guess

around 6 o'clock last night, maybe a little bit earlier when the Board's general counsel, as a courtesy telephoned me because she recognized my name being associated with this licensee.

I immediately got ahold of the owner, who knew nothing about it. He knew that there had been an incident back in April but knew nothing about a hearing.

And what I understand may have
happened late yesterday was that someone from the
Attorney General's office made a call and spoke
to a bookkeeper there. And the bookkeeper
apparently spoke to someone in the Attorney
General's office and maybe someone in ABRA -- I
don't know -- saying we didn't know about this.

Now I'm not arguing whether the Notice to Show Cause was served properly or not. That's not what I'm saying. I'm simply saying that the owner did not have personal knowledge of it.

And in order that the Board not be stood up, it was agreed that I would come this morning. But this should not be interpreted at all as indifference on the part of the ownership. And you may rest assured, Mr. Chair, and if I can ask Board staff to send me a copy of the

investigative report, you may be assured that I
will counsel the owner --

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Fine.

MR. O'BRIEN: -- about this and express the Board's concerns, which I will pile on with.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Fine. Well, thank you, again, Mr. O'Brien for your representation, but to the owner's defense at least, I was not informed that he was indifferent and that is why he is not here. So, right, I was informed that he was not indifferent.

But as I stated that I prefer when we have these matters for at least this 15-year-old that the owner is here for the owner to know how seriously the Board considers this matter for someone who is 15 and who looks 15. Because when the Agency does the sale to a minor, reasonable people will look at these young people and agree that they do look their stated age.

Because, as we know, there's some folks today who you look at them, you would on first blush you would not state that they're the stated age. But the young people we use, reasonable people will agree that they do look

their age. And I'm not sure if it's even better that they didn't check the ID. But I cannot believe that someone could check an ID and it says that the person was born in 2004 and that doesn't compute that that's not 21. But all But thank you for your representation. MR. O'BRIEN: Thank you, sir. (Whereupon, the above-entitled matter went off the record at 10:03 a.m.)
