The Alcoholic Beverage Control Board met in the Alcoholic Beverage Control Hearing Room, Reeves Building, 2000 14th Street, N.W., Suite 400S, Washington, D.C. 20009, Chairperson Donovan W. Anderson, presiding.

# 1 P-R-O-C-E-E-D-I-N-G-S 2 (10:30 a.m.) 3 MEMBER ANDERSON: Actually, let's go 4 back to our regular schedule. Now we have a fact 5 finding hearing, Mr. Allen S. Tubis. It's the 6 Giant Barbeque Battle. Would all parties for 7 that matter please appear? Would all parties introduce -- we'll go with the investigators. 8 9 Introduce yourself for the record. 10 MR. PUENTE: Kevin Puente, 11 investigator. 12 MEMBER ANDERSON: Good morning, Mr. 13 Puente. Yes, sir. 14 MR. TUBIS: Yes, I'm Allen Tubis. I'm 15 the event organizer of the Barbeque Battle event. 16 With me here I have Julie Hanson, who is in 17 charge of permits and compliance this year for the event and also Joan Davis, who is our 18 19 volunteer coordinator for the event. 20 Captain Jackson, who handles the 21 special police detail, should be arriving 22 shortly. 23 MEMBER ANDERSON: You want us to wait? 24 MR. TUBIS: No. We can begin.

don't want to hold you up.

MEMBER ANDERSON: Our morning is free, sir, so we can. If you have another witness and you believe that you want to be here, we can wait. But anyway. All right. I know this is a tortuous matter in a sense that the event occurred in June of 2019.

MR. TUBIS: Yes, sir.

MEMBER ANDERSON: And as all events we have, we sent investigators to go and monitor the event.

MR. TUBIS: Yes, sir.

MEMBER ANDERSON: It's my
understanding the investigator -- we'll have the
investigator give his report. But it's my
understanding that in both days that we monitored
the event, there were some serious infractions
that our investigator saw.

MR. TUBIS: Yes, sir.

MEMBER ANDERSON: And that the investigator brought it to your attention the first day, and these infractions continued the second day. And so, and they were not addressed.

The ABC Board determined that because of the serious nature of the violation that we

were going to have a fact finding hearing. 1 2 for whatever reason when we initially had a fact finding hearing, you did not appear. 3 So the ABC Board went forward with its 4 5 And the Board, based on the serious hearing. nature just was very concerned whether or not we 6 7 should issue any further license for this event. 8 So you are here. So what I'm going to 9 have occur again is I'm going to have the 10 investigator tell -- report what happened for 11 the event, and then you can respond. So you can 12 respond -- yes, sir. 13 MR. TUBIS: May I address the Board? 14 MEMBER ANDERSON: Well, we're going to 15 have the investigator. You're going to have an 16 opportunity. 17 MR. TUBIS: No, no. It's not to 18 respond to that. 19 MEMBER ANDERSON: It's what, sir? 20 MR. TUBIS: It's to respond to the 21 Board directly. 22 MEMBER ANDERSON: No, but I'm saying 23 you are going to have an opportunity to. 24 MR. TUBIS: Yes, sir. 25 MEMBER ANDERSON: So what I'm going to say to you is that I'll have the investigator state what happened. You can provide us -- once the investigator's done, you can respond. You can also respond why is it that when we had our first hearing why you weren't here.

MR. TUBIS: Yes, sir.

MEMBER ANDERSON: So at that time, you can provide us a response. And the Board will move from there. So go ahead, Mr. Puente. Maybe you can just let us know what happened with this event.

MR. PUENTE: Yes. So Saturday, June 22nd, and Sunday, June 23rd, myself and a team of our investigators were assigned to the Giant Barbeque Battle.

On the first day, Saturday, June 22nd, myself and Investigator Pleitez, Vanessa Pleitez, were walking around. We were near Beer Garden

Number 1. We observed a female who was checking

IDs, but at the same time she wasn't checking

IDs.

When Ms. Pleitez approached her, the female had kind of an attitude with her, told her the guy looked like he was 21, so she's not going to ask for ID. Ms. Pleitez identified herself

and advised her per the policy of the event you're to check all IDs.

I went and notified Mr. Tubis right away about that who came over. We observed patrons with hand stamps and we observed patrons without hand stamps getting alcohol.

I think the biggest issue with the event was the patrons were getting multiple drinks at one time. Some were carrying three to four drinks. None of the drinks were being opened.

A lot of the drinks were being served in closed containers. There was mini bottles of wine being served. And I was following some people and observed people giving it to other people.

And that was the biggest issue there. When we brought it up to Mr. Tubis, we had him come over to Beer Garden Number 2. We observed himself and Ms. Pleitez went over to the young female.

And let me backtrack, asked why they weren't opening the alcohol. The response we got was their hands were getting cold because the alcohol was cold. They didn't want to break

their fingernails.

I advised you should probably buy some bottle openers, can openers to help that process. When they went to speak to the young female, the young female threw their hands up in the air and said you can have this and walked off her job because she was frustrated.

And I found out that each of the Beer Gardens were being run by organizations, so I think that's one of the issues here. These people who are coming from the organizations, there's no blowback on them essentially.

So they don't really have a dog in the fight, so they're going to do what they wanted to do. And most of the time, it's hot. It's hot in June, so it was very hot that day.

And some of these volunteers are hot, and they're going to start just giving multiple drinks out. Then on the second day, we advised Mr. Tubis of the violations.

On the second day, it's Sunday, and myself and the team were out there working. We observed the same issues. What was most concerning was from Beer Garden Number 1.

I observed a volunteer walk from

behind the Beer Garden with a 30-pack of Bud 1 2 Light and just went out. And him and his friends were just drinking it and walking off. And they 3 walked off to the -- I believe was a Go-Go band 4 5 performing and watched the Go-Go band perform. MEMBER ANDERSON: Now did you bring 6 7 this to the attention of Mr. Tubis? I did not. 8 MR. PUENTE: It was hard. 9 I was trying to track him down, but I couldn't 10 get to him. It was just towards the end of the 11 event, a lot of people. Usually this event draws 12 almost 20,000 people a day. And I believe that 13 day was the headline concert, so he was just hard to find. 14 15 MEMBER ANDERSON: Have you -- is this 16 the first time you have monitored this event? 17 No, sir. I worked this MR. PUENTE: 18 event the last four years. 19 MEMBER ANDERSON: And how was that, 20 just if you can recall? 21 Usually, they're pretty MR. PUENTE: 22 I think who they had performing this year 23 brought more of a crowd, more people. I think 24 another big issue is Mr. Tubis is running around.

I see him running around these events

1 all day, and he has a lot going on. I think there has to be someone assigned to the Beer 2 3 Gardens making sure the staff is following. 4 It may need to be an manager that he 5 trusts or he has someone at each Beer Garden assuring that they're complying with the 6 7 policies. 8 MEMBER ANDERSON: Thank you. Anything 9 else you want to add at this juncture? We'll 10 probably have more questions. 11 MR. PUENTE: Okay. 12 MEMBER ANDERSON: All right. 13 Tubis, you have the floor. 14 MR. TUBIS: Yes, sir. First of all, 15 I would like to apologize to the Board. I have tremendous respect for the Board. 16 I've been 17 working with District agencies for almost 30 18 years. 19 I've been producing this event for 28 We've been in full compliance for 20 vears. 21 decades. We've raised literally millions of 22 dollars for nonprofit groups. 23 I did include some information on the 24 We work with our partner, Giant, most of it USO.

in-store, but also from the event over \$2 million

has been raised in the past three years just for the USO.

Over the years we've also benefits through the Police Boys and Girls Clubs, which is now the Boys and Girls Clubs and now the Food Bank, which was part of our situation this past year in transition.

I do not dispute anything. I was not aware of the case of beer because that's theft.

I did not know it was volunteers. I thought it was carried in through the gate in a duffle bag or something.

I would have contacted the police, and they would have intervened because that was theft in that cause if a volunteer stole that. Again, I don't dispute anything.

I am responsible. My name is on the permit. I take that very seriously. I do not want to serve underage people. I do not want to over serve. I do not want to not comply and have a situation like this because for many years I would abide and tried to abide this year.

I do agree that I've spread myself too thin. I am responsible for all the permits. I'm constantly being called over. If there's a

restaurant where there's a problem or there's a fire hydrant blocked or whatever the case is.

This year, we brought in a new nonprofit group. We wanted to. We've been working with a food bank donating food. We wanted to generate money.

We made a \$20,000 donation aside from the other beneficiaries for them to help with some volunteers. The problem was they had a new volunteer coordinator, the problem as I see it.

We did train volunteers or give them training information. We had some of our own people in the booths, but the volunteers, some of the volunteers that were even trained ended up not coming.

at the last minute. They also added more shifts, so we constantly -- we would run around. I would. I was constantly, as soon as I would hear there was a problem, that they were serving more than one or not checking an ID, I would run over the address that, work with their volunteer coordinator and physically myself go to all the booths.

I even put up the instructions and

taped them to every booth to make sure. The problem was the shift would change. Other people would come, and some of the volunteers, as I said, would tell me they're breaking their fingernails or they don't want to touch the beer.

That's not the Barbeque Battle.

That's not the system we've had for decades.

What I've done in the hopes that we can correct it and get back to where we have always been,

I've brought in Julie Hanson of Hanson

Productions and also Joan Davis.

Joan Davis is a volunteer coordinator.

Julie Hanson and Joan both do major events,

including Cherry Blossom and other very

successful events.

Julie is going to handle all of our permitting. She's going to be the person onsite. And she can -- and they could both speak to this, who would actually interact with the other parts of the District government, the D.C. Fire Department, the Health Department to make sure everything else is running smoothly throughout the weekend.

She also has a team that, and she could explain the spotters. We're going to bring

in our own spotters. Commander Jackson is, I guess he's running late.

We bring in Capital City Protective Service aside from MPD. Capital City are special police. They have arrest power. We're adding shifts. We're enclosing our beverage areas, and there's a lot of additional training that would be going on.

If you want to go through the packet,
I'm happy to go through the packet. But
essentially, we are going back to wristbands,
which we always did.

We tried last year for the first time the hand stamps, which the wristbands are much more effective for visibility. We're going back to that. We're also going to cordon off our beverage stations.

Even though the whole event site is fenced, so anyone going into a beverage area, before they can get to a server or volunteer, they have to confirm that they have been ID'd and they have a wristband on.

So basically, we're taking the responsibility away from the volunteer to ID check. Anyone in that area will be 21. We're

1	putting the responsibility on the special police
2	to do that. So would you like me to go through
3	the layout, or would you like to
4	MEMBER ANDERSON: You requested it,
5	sir.
6	MR. TUBIS: Yes.
7	MEMBER ANDERSON: We had our hearing.
8	MR. TUBIS: Yes.
9	MEMBER ANDERSON: We made our
10	decision. You didn't show up.
11	MR. TUBIS: If I could just
12	MEMBER ANDERSON: So you can
13	MR. TUBIS: Okay.
14	MEMBER ANDERSON: So the floor is
15	yours to tell us why is it that what is that
16	
17	MR. TUBIS: Sure.
18	MEMBER ANDERSON: Why should the Board
19	reconsider its position?
20	MR. TUBIS: If I could speak to first
21	of all why I didn't show up. The notices were
22	being sent to an old email address that I have
23	not used in years and put on any paperwork in
24	years.
25	I did have my correct email address

here. So I did not get the notices. I did get a call telling me that there was a hearing scheduled coming up.

I was 11 flight hours away from here at the time. It was a few days later because I would have flown here. I said can it be rescheduled and very graciously, you did reschedule.

At that time, I was told there was a 1:00 slot available. I was planning on being here at 1:00 with my business partner. I had it in my calendar. I had all my information.

The hearing, from what I understand, I received a call at about 10:00, or I think it was 10:00 saying the hearing's going on. Where are you? I said, I have 1:00. And it was like no, it's 10:00.

And I said I can come right now.

It'll take me 40 minutes to get there. I was told just wait. We'll call you back. Don't come. I received a call back, and I was told the hearing went on without me. I would absolutely never not show up for a hearing. So I'm just saying --

MEMBER ANDERSON: Do you recall who is

it that you were communicating with? Who gave 1 you all of this information? 2 3 MR. TUBIS: I believe Dee Dee was 4 sending out all of the information. The first 5 email that I looked back on AOL, the email said There was a letter attached to be here at 2:00. 6 7 that said 11:00, so that was inconsistent. The second time, I just went on the 8 9 time that I was told, which was 1:00. I don't know what to tell you other than I would have 10 11 been here earlier. I was planning on being here 12 at noon, but it was already -- the hearing was 13 going on beforehand. I've never been late to a 14 hearing in 27 years. 15 MEMBER ANDERSON: I see that you have 16 A new person joined the table. 17 that person --18 MR. TUBIS: Yes. 19 MEMBER ANDERSON: -- introduce 20 himself, please. 21 MR. TUBIS: Yes, sir. 22 MR. JACKSON: Commander Jackson, 23 Capital City Protective Services. 24 MEMBER ANDERSON: Good morning, sir. 25 There's a sign-in sheet. Please sign in.

Anything else you want to say, sir? The floor is 1 2 yours. 3 MR. TUBIS: Yes, sir. If I could have 4 5 MS. HANSON: Good morning. As Allen mentioned, I am going to be in charge of 6 7 permitting and compliance onsite. We have also 8 added compliance monitors to each beverage 9 station, who will be there from start to finish. 10 And they will be monitoring the 11 volunteers to ensure that the regulations are 12 upheld during the process, including that --13 MEMBER ANDERSON: Excuse me. Your 14 name again? 15 MS. HANSON: Julie Hanson. So that 16 only one beverage is given out at a time, that 17 they are wearing their wristband and anything 18 else that is required of that beverage station. 19 So that is new for this year. And I 20 think it would really benefit the issues that we 21 had last year. We will also have additional 22 shift monitors come in to spell (phonetic) the 23 people so they don't get too tired and et cetera, 24 so that everybody's alert and doing their job. 25 And then we also have brought on Joan

Davis who will be overseeing the volunteers and giving briefings and such. And I'll let you speak to that as well.

MS. DAVIS: I'm Joan Davis, and I work with Hanson Productions. I will be working with the volunteer coordinators securing the actual individuals and assigning shifts.

We'll be doing preliminary training so that the individuals who will be volunteering are aware of what their responsibilities are and are comfortable with them before they actually show onsite so there are no issues actual day of.

Day of we'll be doing group briefings before everyone is sent out to the individual beverage stations. And then as Allen mentioned, we'll have monitors in each tent to ensure that the volunteers are actually complying with the instructions that they've been given.

I think having the special police monitoring access into the area before the guests are in there will ensure that they are 21 and over. And we will definitely be having gloves and can openers, bottle openers so that we don't have the broken fingernail and cold hands issues moving forward.

And then the transitions from one 1 2 shift to the next, again we'll be meeting with 3 the groups before they're sent out to relieve the 4 existing volunteers and then we'll again monitor 5 that transition time to ensure that there's full compliance. 6 7 MEMBER ANDERSON: So who's in -- ah, 8 who provides the volunteers? 9 MR. TUBIS: The Capital Area Food Bank 10 would like to be beneficiary. I explained the 11 They said they do need situation to them. 12 assistance. Their volunteer coordinator is now 13 going into her second year. 14 That was her first year, but we have 15 our own volunteer coordinator who will work with 16 them training the volunteers, picking out the 17 volunteers. And there are a number of events 18 that you've both worked on. 19 MEMBER ANDERSON: The reason I'm 20 asking is because --21 MR. TUBIS: Sure. 22 MEMBER ANDERSON: All right. Prior to 23 last year, who were the volunteers? 24 MR. TUBIS: The volunteers came from the Boys and Girls Club, and they had done it for

15 years. Then we switched to the USO. The USO has a very good volunteer training program.

The Boys and Girls Club, they'd just been doing it for year. We tried to bring in the food bank to raise more money for the food bank because we shifted around some other opportunities for the USO.

And in this case, they were not prepared to conduct the training. I did not physically go to all of their training. I went to their basic managers hoping the information will then get communicated to volunteers. It didn't.

And some volunteers came in at the last minute. So we're working now to ensure that everyone, if they're to be in a booth, that they get through training.

And that's where I'm turning to Hanson Productions so I don't have to rely on the nonprofit group. We have a history of bringing in nonprofit groups who have been successful.

Your inspectors do a great job of making sure that everyone is safe and everything is served properly. And I really appreciate they allow me to be proactive to handle situations

before they develop into something, like get extra signage or you need more ID checkers.

We've been very successful in the past. This year, it did fall apart this past year. I'm doing everything I can, and I recognize that your organizations have to come into it.

And that's why we're going to heavy up on our special police at the event, and we're also brining in professionals who've done a lot of other events very successfully in the hopes of continued working with nonprofit groups and not be sitting here again in front of you having to deal with situations like this.

MEMBER ANDERSON: Now will -- all right, so you're saying that the -- so how many areas will there be, will alcohol be served?

MR. TUBIS: We've consolidated. We had four last year. We're now going to have three areas. Two are beer and wine. One is beer and wine, but it is also some wine and microbrew samplings. It has the vendors there talking about the product.

But they're all enclosed in barrier rack with special police at the entrance and the

exit. So people will come in with a wristband, be properly ID'd or they will not be let in.

Once they're in, our volunteer coordinator, Joan, and Hanson Productions will make sure that our staff, not just the volunteers but our staff are there in the booth on the ground.

so if there's any problem, we can relieve it right away. What we should have done is, I should have closed some of the beverage booths. And I should have sent some of the volunteers home or told the volunteer coordinator we've got to sift through the volunteers because some volunteers, to me, not only nonresponsive but absolutely like I don't need this.

It was out of control last year. I apologize to the Board and to the inspectors that had to run around trying to help us deal with the situation. We will not have that again. At least that is what we're trying to do to make sure that we're covering every base.

MEMBER ANDERSON: So how many of your -- let me -- I'm going for a better choice of words. How many of your employees will you have who will be in each tent monitoring the

4	How many of your and that's why I said
5	employees. How many?
6	MR. TUBIS: I'm going with the
7	recommendation beyond what I think is appropriate

10	20-by-20?
11	MR. TUBIS: Yes, around 20-by-20.
12	MS. HANSON: So there's a tent that's
13	20-by-20 that will have
14	MR. TUBIS: And the outside area will
15	be cordoned.
16	MS. HANSON: Right. And then the
17	stations for each of the volunteers, which is
18	three to four stations that volunteers can hand
19	out alcohol. So we will have one compliance
20	person monitoring those volunteers
21	MR. TUBIS: At each station.
22	MS. HANSON: at each beverage
23	station. And then we also have an additional
24	four compliance people that are roaming to make
25	sure that things are compliant and then taking

shifts with the compliance people that are within 1 2 the 20-by-20 area distributing the beverages. MR. TUBIS: And we're doubling the 3 4 special police. Instead of one per booth, it's 5 going to be two per booth making sure that we seal off the entrance and exit and everyone is 6 7 properly ID'd. So will folks be 8 MEMBER ANDERSON: 9 able to leave the area with alcohol? The event is fenced 10 MR. TUBIS: Yes. 11 in. 12 MEMBER ANDERSON: No, I'm talking 13 about will they -- no, will they be able to leave 14 the fenced in area? 15 MR. TUBIS: Yes. The fenced in area -- the overall event is fenced in. People go to 16 17 the music stage. They want to have the barbecue 18 and their beer, sit at a dining table. 19 Each person that comes in will be able 20 to get one drink. They will be 21 years or 21 They are responsible for the drink, and 22 they will have a wristband on and will understand they have to retain the wristband. 23 24 But yes, once they purchase a drink, 25 they can go sit and eat their barbecue and have

their beer. That's the -- we don't sell a lot of alcohol at our event.

But we feel we have to have it because some people won't come to the event unless they know they can get their barbecue ribs and a beer or a glass of wine.

So anyone that has a beer in their hand, any adult, will be able to move around, but we're going to make sure that they are 21 or over. They recognize, you know, they only have one drink. They don't have two drinks in their hands or three drinks.

MS. HANSON: But they can't leave the site.

MR. TUBIS: They cannot leave the event site. The event site is completely fenced in. We have police at every single point on the event site.

We're going to have between 14 and 20 Metropolitan Police Officers coming throughout the event site also. And they're also available to the inspectors. If there's a problem, they can have the police there.

MEMBER ANDERSON: The part that I'm -- what's the role? Because she said that we're

going to have -- I'm sorry. 1 Your name, sir? 2 MR. JACKSON: Commander Jackson. 3 MEMBER ANDERSON: Commander Jackson and his staff are going to be at the tent. 4 So what is it that -- what's their role there? 5 MR. TUBIS: Their role is in the past, 6 7 this past year, if you -- you could come to the 8 You can get ID'd right at the tent. tent. 9 can purchase a beer, and you can walk off. 10 In order to even get to the tent, you 11 have to be ID'd first, have a wristband. 12 you have to enter a cordoned off area. 13 Like if you're servers at the tent, in 14 order to get there, I would have to go through a 15 fenced area, past a special -- one or two special 16 police officers that will verify that I've been 17 ID'd properly in order even to get over to order 18 a beer. 19 You cannot even go there unless you 20 pass the special police officer who will approve 21 you to then move forward. So what I've done is 22 the volunteers are going to be instructed.

And you can serve them 1 That's it, one drink. 2 one drink. 3 In the past, they would -- again, 4 people could just walk right up to the booth. 5 They can't do that anymore because we're going with barrier rack and fencing. We're going to 6 7 close off the area. 8 Once you have a drink, once someone 9 has a drink, they've shown with an ID they're 21 10 years old or older. They're an adult. They only 11 have one drink per person. We're trusting that 12 adult to finish their drink and be responsible on 13 the site. 14 MEMBER ANDERSON: But they can leave 15 the fenced in beer area and go out in the larger 16 area with their drink? 17 MR. TUBIS: And the larger area is 18 sealed. 19 MEMBER ANDERSON: Yeah, I know, right. 20 MR. TUBIS: Yes. 21 MEMBER ANDERSON: But they can leave 22 that inner fenced in bar area to go outside, 23 still --24 MR. TUBIS: The inner fenced in area 25 is not large enough --

MEMBER ANDERSON: Right.

MR. TUBIS: -- for a whole beer garden because of the way the event site and we have to maintain fire lanes. So yes, that individual with a wristband on can then leave.

And that's another thing also. When they walk out with a beer or a wine, they will also verify, make sure that they check them on the way out. So we'll check them on the way in to make sure they have a wristband to get in and on the way out, we'll tell them to keep their wristband on.

So this is something that we had done years ago. We have changed the way the layout is, and apparently our safety -- we had a number of different safety measures.

Apparently, with the way things went last year didn't work. So we are going back. We are redoing everything and then adding to it.

That has remained -- kept us remaining in full compliance for 20-something years.

MEMBER ANDERSON: I'm sorry. Go ahead.

MR. TUBIS: I'm a TIPS trainer to make sure that I can train volunteers. I've been I

1 think 14 years now. It was actually the recommendation of a Board member that I should 2 3 look into the TIPS program, the Training for 4 Intervention Procedures. 5 So we're going to utilize that also to make sure that all of our spotters are trained, 6 7 all of our managers. And we also have trained 8 Capital City Protective Service officers. 9 they'll also be trained in the TIPS program. 10 MEMBER ANDERSON: Go ahead, Ms. 11 Hansen. 12 MEMBER HANSEN: The training process. 13 MR. TUBIS: Sure. 14 MEMBER HANSEN: Do you have written 15 I plan a lot of events. policies? 16 MR. TUBIS: Yes. 17 MEMBER HANSEN: So I mean I also 18 consider my volunteers. I do have some paid 19 staff and then volunteers, so I know the 20 importance. But I do hold the volunteers as 21 liable. 22 MR. TUBIS: Yes. 23 MEMBER HANSEN: Otherwise I'm liable. 24 Yes, and they are liable. MR. TUBIS: 25 MEMBER HANSEN: Do you have written

procedures? What is the training process, and 1 2 how many hours? What does it entail in person? 3 I mean because posting things doesn't work. MR. TUBIS: That actually moves to 4 5 Joan Davis. **MEMBER HANSEN:** 6 Okay. 7 MR. TUBIS: She would be the one 8 training and --9 MS. DAVIS: So we have not written 10 them yet since my involvement. My plan is to 11 review the procedures that have been written in 12 the past and them amp them up. 13 And we will have, as I said, a 14 training session prior to the actual event date 15 to make sure that everyone is familiar. We'll distribute them via email so that everyone has 16 17 them to review in advance. 18 We will ask them to sign that they've 19 read everything so that there's an element of 20 responsibility and that they are aware that this 21 is serious. And then we will do a training that 22 morning before every shift before we distribute 23 people out into their individual assigned areas. 24 MEMBER HANSEN: My recommendation

would be, whatever your training policies are

that they have -- it's a form where they're initialing, and it needs to be in person where they're initialing on every line item that they understand, not just at the bottom of the page.

MS. DAVIS: Okay.

MEMBER HANSEN: Because I think that holds them responsible for reading, you know, everything that's important and that it is done in person. And if you have last minute changes that those people are held to the same standards.

MR. TUBIS: Yeah, they will be aware they're dispensing a controlled substance like a pharmacist. When I do my TIPS training, I try to make them aware of that. It is a controlled substance.

It is a legal substance used, you know, to relax or something like that, but it could also be abused. And so we will -- I will turn over all the information.

But again, I'm very open to expanding what we've done in the past to make sure that this, having to appear before you like this does not happen again.

MEMBER ANDERSON: Any other questions by any of the other Board members? Yes, Mr.

1 Short. 2 MEMBER SHORT: Mr. Tubis, why did you 3 stop wristbanding? Why did you stop using 4 wristbands last year? 5 Well, I actually stopped MR. TUBIS: using wristbands because another event that has 6 7 been approved started doing hand stamps. I asked 8 around, and some of the feedback I got was well, 9 you know, a hand stamp you can't take off. But wristbands -- a hand stamp is also 10 11 hard to spot. You can't spot it. People wash 12 their hands. I tried it because I thought bars 13 do wristbands and other events have been approved 14 for wristbands -- I mean I'm sorry, hand stamps. 15 We never had a problem. 16 MEMBER SHORT: I don't mean to cut you 17 off, sir. 18 MR. TUBIS: Yes, sir. With 19 wristbands. MEMBER SHORT: Your situation is not 20 21 We're talking about -like a bar. Okay. 22 MR. TUBIS: I realize that now, sir. 23 MEMBER SHORT: -- 20,000 people. You 24 probably realized it years and years ago. 25 many years you been doing it?

1	MR. TUBIS: 28 years now, sir.
2	MEMBER SHORT: 28 years.
3	MR. TUBIS: Yes, sir.
4	MEMBER SHORT: Ms. Hanson, you do the
5	Cherry Blossoms for the city. Correct?
6	MS. HANSON: Not specifically the
7	Cherry Blossoms, but other large events.
8	MEMBER SHORT: Special events?
9	MR. TUBIS: Didn't you work with
10	Cherry Blossom?
11	MEMBER SHORT: Can we have her
12	testify? Excuse me, Mr. Tubis. That's kind of
13	disrespectful. Don't you think?
14	MR. TUBIS: I'm sorry, sir.
15	MEMBER SHORT: Thank you. Just Ms.
16	Tumis, have ever been before the Mayor's
17	Committee on Special Events?
18	MR. TUBIS: Several years, sir.
19	MEMBER SHORT: Not you. I'm asking
20	Miss please, sir, please. Calm down.
21	MS. HANSON: Many times, sir.
22	MEMBER SHORT: Okay. Have you ever
23	applied for a special permit for events like
24	this?
25	MS. HANSON: Events like a Barbeque

1 Battle --2 MEMBER SHORT: Yeah. 3 MS. HANSON: -- or large scale? 4 MEMBER SHORT: Large scale. 5 MS. HANSON: Yes. MEMBER SHORT: So if Giant were to say 6 7 to you this year, we'd rather have you get the permit from this ABC Board rather than the 8 9 persons who have been doing it before with the 10 problems, would you consider that? 11 I personally can't do it MS. HANSON: 12 because as I understand it, it has to be from the organization itself, Barbeque Battle, Inc. 13 14 wouldn't be able to do it, I don't think. 15 MEMBER SHORT: Okay. Well, I'll just 16 simply say you heard the testimony today, and you 17 heard what the investigator said. People were 18 walking away with six-packs. People were just having backup drinks, 19 20 wine and just walking. That's very unacceptable, 21 and I was very, very displeased and hurt that the 22 sponsor of the event couldn't come to a hearing. 23 He's been before this Board many, many 24 He knows how important this is to this times.

And when we get reports that this

particular event, which is a great event for the 1 2 city and raises a lot of money for a lot of 3 different organizations, which is greatly needed. And we don't want to ever see this 4 5 event stopped. The city looks forward to this 6 battle of the barbecue every year, but just 7 because one person has their name on the permit 8 doesn't mean that the event can't go on. Is that 9 true or not? 10 MS. HANSON: That is true, sir. 11 MEMBER SHORT: Okay. Well, again, I 12 thank you very much. And it sounds like the 13 training is going to be taken care of by Ms. --14 MS. DAVIS: Davis. 15 MEMBER SHORT: -- Davis. How many 16 people, like they say, have you been involved in, 17 Ms. Davis? 18 MS. DAVIS: Over the course of 32 19 years, hundreds. 20 MEMBER SHORT: Have you ever been 21 involved with this event before? 22 MS. DAVIS: I have not. MEMBER SHORT: Okay. So you heard the 23 24 testimony from the investigator. Has anything 25 like that ever happened with any event you've

1	been involved with?
2	(No audible response.)
3	MEMBER SHORT: This is for the
4	commander. How long have you worked in the
5	District, sir, as a special police officer?
6	MR. JACKSON: Going on six years.
7	MEMBER SHORT: Six years. Have you
8	ever been involved with an event like this before
9	or any major events?
10	MR. JACKSON: Yes, sir.
11	MEMBER SHORT: Which? Can you name
12	some of them?
13	MR. JACKSON: I've done the Japanese
14	Festival. I think it was Caribbean Fest over at
15	RFK Stadium.
16	MEMBER SHORT: Oh.
17	MR. JACKSON: And
18	MEMBER SHORT: How did that go?
19	MR. JACKSON: You know, fairly a
20	little rough because, you know, the nature of the
21	event and, you know, things didn't
22	MEMBER SHORT: So lessons learned, you
23	would be a little better if you had to do it
24	again?
25	MR. JACKSON: Yes, sir.

1 MEMBER SHORT: Especially on 2 Pennsylvania Avenue. 3 MR. JACKSON: Correct. 4 MEMBER SHORT: In light of -- we know 5 that you had incidents all around the world and 6 in this country where people take advantage, 7 especially people who don't mean any good to this 8 country. 9 But a situation where people are walking around with six beers in their hand and 10 11 nobody checking and nobody seeming like they 12 care. So that wouldn't happen with you being 13 there. Correct? 14 MR. JACKSON: No, sir. 15 MEMBER SHORT: All right. Well, I'll 16 just simply say this. This hearing is for Mr. 17 Mr. Tubis, again, I'm very disappointed, 18 very disappointed with you, not the event. 19 MR. TUBIS: I understand, sir. 20 MEMBER SHORT: Very disappointed. And 21 even more hurt that you did not come when we 22 subpoenaed you to talk about this. So that's all I have for right now, Mr. Chair. And thank you 23 24 for a great report, Mr. Investigator. 25 MR. TUBIS: Mr. Short, if I could just

morning waiting around for the afternoon, I would have. I did not know to be here at that time.

MEMBER SHORT: Thank you for those words, sir.

MR. TUBIS: That's all I can say, sir.

I did not mean disrespect to anyone, and I

understand what you do. And it's extremely

important. It literally can affect saving a

life. I understand that. I do understand that.

MEMBER SHORT: Well, the reason why I have this passion is because I was once a public safety person for the city, and I know what can happen. And I do know what happens when we have people who run great events like this who don't do their due diligence.

It could cause this city a very big embarrassment. It could cause a lot of hurt, harm and danger to our hospitality community and events like this. Pennsylvania Avenue is a sacred place.

MR. TUBIS: Yes, sir.

1	MEMBER SHORT: But you didn't act like		
2	that on that last year. Correct?		
3	MR. TUBIS: No, sir.		
4	MEMBER SHORT: Okay. Thank you.		
5	That's all I had, Mr. Chair.		
6	MEMBER SHORT: Any other questions by		
7	any other Board members? Mr. Puente, any other,		
8	any questions that you need, you want to ask?		
9	MR. PUENTE: No. I'll just add		
10	Supervisor Jason Peru sits in on the Mayor's		
11	Event Task Force.		
12	On last weekend, he met with Ms.		
13	Hanson, talked about issues and concerns. And we		
14	gave her a recommendation, so we're pleased that		
15	she took that and offered it.		
16	MEMBER SHORT: We are very happy to		
17	see her today. She's got a great, stellar		
18	reputation in this city. Thank you very much for		
19	that.		
20	MEMBER ANDERSON: Any final comments		
21	you want to make, sir?		
22	MR. TUBIS: Sir, you		
23	MEMBER ANDERSON: There's somebody at		
24	the back of the room. I guess maybe they want to		
25	talk to you.		

MR. TUBIS: Oh, yes. Oh, this is my wife, Suzanne Tubis, who is also my partner in putting together the Barbeque Battle. Suzanne said she's willing to put her name on the permit and be responsible if that's an issue.

I trust that you know what's best for the city and for safety. I do ask for another chance. I don't know if I deserve another chance, but it's entirely up to you, whatever you think is right.

I will, in any capacity, make sure that we are in full compliance and that everyone is safe at the event and everything works well at the event. Again, from a historical standpoint, I have done everything that I could in the past.

I did not -- I was not effective this past year. I just hope that if you choose and you trust that I can be responsible this year, I would like to be responsible. But it's entirely up to you, whatever course you see fit.

MEMBER ANDERSON: All right. Anything else? No other questions? That's it. Thank you for being here this morning, sir.

MR. TUBIS: Thank you again for seeing me. I really appreciate it.

1	MEMBER ANDERSON: We'll take this
2	under advisement. Thank you. Have a good day.
3	The Board is in recess until our 1:30 hearing.
