The Alcoholic Beverage Control Board met in the Alcoholic Beverage Control Board Hearing Room, Reeves Building, 2000 14th Street, N.W., Suite 400S, Washington, D.C. 20009, Chairperson Donovan W. Anderson, presiding.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Good morning, everyone. Welcome you to a special meeting of the Alcoholic Beverage Control Board. Today is November 8th, 2018.

Joining us today for this hearing is Mr. Mike Silverstein to my immediate left. To my immediate right is Mr. James Short. And My name is Donovan Anderson, and I'm chairman of the board.

The Board, we do have three members here today, so we have a quorum to have a hearing. The first case on our --

MEMBER SHORT: Correct yourself.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Oh, I'm sorry.
To my left, to my right is Mr. Bobby Cato. We have four members here in attendance today, so we can conduct business.

The first matter on our schedule today, it's a fact-finding hearing regarding a manager's application for Mr. Derrick Hampton.

Mr. Hampton, could you please identify yourself for the record?

MR. HAMPTON: Derrick Hampton.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Good morning, sir.

MR. HAMPTON: Good morning.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right, you did apply for a manager's license. And one of the reasons why we brought you in today is the, let me see, where is the rest of them, do you have the rest of the, or was it handed over to us?

You applied for a manager's license, and as part of the application for a manager's license, you have to do criminal background check.

And so I don't have an issue as I said before, so one doesn't, $I$ need to, yes, $I$ know, but $I$ don't have the, $I$ don't have the rest of it.

Oh, okay, so I'm now here. Okay. All right, $I$ think one of the things and maybe $I$ was
incorrect. And I guess, yes, when someone applies for an application, and it's more so we know that things happen and everyone should have a second chance.

But when it comes to a file we always look at the application to see what is it that someone write, when it says, like number A, "Have you been convicted of a misdemeanor within the past five years?"

And I think, or at least I thought when I first saw the application the application said, no. And when the application says, no, and then when the person's criminal background check comes in, then there's an issue.

And then the bottom line is that, why can't you be honest on the application? I'm not concerned about the incident itself, what I am more, or what the Board is more concerned about is whether or not you made a mistake and you own up to it.

Especially if you have to provide an agency with a background check, and that
information is going to come out anyway.
So maybe you can just tell us who you are, sir. Where is it that you're currently working and why is it that you require a background check?

I'm sorry, why is it you require a manager's license and maybe you can just give us some context about what's on your record.

MR. HAMPTON: Yes, I'm Derrick Hampton, of course. And I was applying for a manager's license for work at Orchid bar on 8th Street.

I checked, no, because I probably had my dates off. I thought it was longer than the five years. So my dates were clearly off in terms of what $I$ was asked on the application.

Since then, yes, I had some mishaps and mistakes that has been rectified. I've been to several, actually two alcohol intervention classes through a church.

And went through an online class that was required. So since then, you know, it was a
time I was going through some family issues and had gotten a DUI, two DUIs.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Because the one you have 2015 and -- are they, so there was an event on 11/6/15, 11/23/15. Is that the same event or is that two different events?

MR. HAMPTON: Two different events.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Oh, I'm sorry, it's 11, okay, it's '15 and '16. So was 4/29/15, so that's a different event. We have 4/29/15 and 11/6/15. They're the same event?

MR. HAMPTON: That had to be the same event. It's two different events, so that's probably the same event.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Now one was 4/29/15 attend operation after a vacation, and then 11/16/15 driving under the influence. And those are different events?

MR. HAMPTON: That's a different event, correct.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Then '15 was a bad year for you.

MR. HAMPTON: It wasn't a good year.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Like I said before, my goal, I mean, especially your request for a manager's license. I mean, you are in a position to make a determination to sell or serve alcohol to someone who might be tipsy.

So what assurances can you give the Board that you will prevent someone from doing what you did? Since you as a manager, you're in this power of authority as far as selling or serving alcohol to folks who come into this establishment.

MR. HAMPTON: Well, I had a situation, I want to say two weeks ago where the patron that was very assertive about having another drink.

It was clear that she was intoxicated, so one of the other bartenders that was there said, "I don't know how to handle this situation she's really, really adamant about getting another drink."

So I said to her, I said, "I'll be down there, and I'll handle the situation." So
basically I said, "Ma'am, you know, right at this time, $I$ just don't think that it's a good idea for you to have another drink but you're more than welcome to have some water."

So I gave her a glass of water, she drank it, and then she ended up leaving. So it was a situation where she was able to get home safely. She got into a cab; I made sure that happened, and then that was it.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right, any other board members have any questions they want to ask?

MEMBER SHORT: Yes, I'm going to make this short, I guess. Mr. Hampton.

MR. HAMPTON: Yes.
MEMBER SHORT: And I see you live on
Flagler Place Northwest?
MR. HAMPTON: Yes.
MEMBER SHORT: Right there off of North Capitol Street?

MR. HAMPTON: Mm-hmm.
MEMBER SHORT: That's a very, very --
that street has a lot of, how old are you if you don't mind me asking?

MR. HAMPTON: 39.
MEMBER SHORT: 39 , so you wouldn't know the history of Flagler Place. And African Americans, you would probably have a clue, but I just have something to say to you.

But a lot of African Americans who became very influential during the Civil Rights period and during a period of time when Washington D.C. wasn't so welcoming to people that looked like you and myself, African Americans.

So when you checked the wrong box on the application, and why did that happen again? MR. HAMPTON: I clearly had my dates off, so in terms of that was just an erroneous mistake.

MEMBER SHORT: I don't think anybody on this panel wants to see you not have your manager's license. But the reason why you were called in is because when you have responsibility
of being the ABC manager of an alcohol establishment.

Then you have some choices to make as you said with the young lady you put in the cab. And it could be a terrible choice if you make the wrong decision or you make an indecision that isn't in the best interest of your business, the client, or yourself.

So when we look at these applications, and you get your dates, as your testimony's been, incorrect, then we want to bring you in, and we want talk to you.

We want to see if you truly are a person who should have an ABC manager's license. So explain to the Board what this license would mean to you, and how you would benefit the alcohol industry here in Washington D.C. by you having a manager's license.

Please explain that to us.
MR. HAMPTON: By me having my manager's license, it would afford me the opportunity, of course, to continue working at
the establishment that I am at now.
MEMBER SHORT: Which establishment is that again?

MR. HAMPTON: Orchid, Orchid on 8th Street.

MEMBER SHORT: What is the address?
MR. HAMPTON: 520, 520 8th Street North, Southeast. So it's a whole restaurant group, so it's Orchid. I work at Finn McCool's and Lola's, so I'm between the three operations there. So that will afford me, of course, to keep my job there.

MEMBER SHORT: Well, everybody wants you to keep your job, but we want to make sure whenever you deal alcohol from now on, any time or way that you put truthfully on applications who you are, what you stand for.

And how again, the question I asked you was not about you. How would a manager's license for you benefit Washington D.C. and the tourist industry and ABC establishments of Washington D.C. business?

MR. HAMPTON: I would assure that the patrons that I serve are safe. I would make sure that you know, going forward that I will adhere to the laws and make sure that everything would happen in the orderly, according to the regulations of the alcohol board.

MEMBER SHORT: Mr. Hampton, I'd like for you to know that I'm a person who's had second chances in my life and I have something to say this to you. I believe in second chances, but I really want people to understand that you can't go through life checking the wrong boxes on applications.

You can't go through life having an ABC license and then not fulfilling what the license stands for and what your job is. So I believe your testimony today is believable.

And we're hoping the very best for you, and we're hoping we don't see you here again.

MR. HAMPTON: Thank you.
MEMBER SHORT: Because most ABC
licenses, ABC manager's licensees, we don't see them unless they have a problem where they have gone asunder of the law. You're not going to be one of those kinds of persons?

MR. HAMPTON: No, sir.
MEMBER SHORT: All right, thank you.
That's all I have Mr. Chair. Thank you.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Any other questions from any other board members? As I said, I'm sorry, Mr. Hampton. I didn't call you in because of what's on your record. That's not the purpose why we called you in.

Because as Mr. Short says, everyone is deserving of a second chance but one of the things that we look when recommendations when it comes in.

It's what is it that the person says on their application? And if we cannot believe that you will be truthful and owning up to what errors that you have made, we give you this license; you're in a position to make decisions on other folks.

How do we know that you will do the right thing? Okay. So that's one of the reasons why you're brought in here today. Is there anything else you want to say?

MR. HAMPTON: That's basically it. CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right. With that said, I make a motion that we grant this application. Is there a second?

MEMBER SHORT: Second.
MEMBER SILVERSTEIN: Second.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Both Mr. Short and Mr. Silverstein have seconded the motion.

All those, all those, all those in favor say aye. (Chorus of ayes.)

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Those opposed? The matter passes four, zero, zero. So, sir, I'm going to sign this off, and you can get, this is the 8th. Right? Today is July?

MR. HAMPTON: Yes, the 8th. CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: July 8th. I'm sorry, November the 8th. I don't know where I am. November the 8th, 2018. And the members
will sign off on this, sir, and you can go to the front desk and go pick up your application.

And I do hope that while I'm on the Board, we don't see you in front of us for, are you bartender?

MR. HAMPTON: Bartender at will, but also work in the building on Wednesdays, so you will see me but not here.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Well, when I said see, I mean see you sitting at this table. And when I said that one of the things that we do, one of the things that we do when we do sale to minor, it's not just on the establishment. It's also on your license.

So, therefore, if there's a sale to minor in the establishment you work at, it will be on your license. So I do hope that we don't see you in front, at least we'll see you but not sitting at a table and asking you questions about why you did what you did. Okay? Good luck, sir.

MR. HAMPTON: Thank you.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: You're welcome.

Okay, okay, so we'll wait for 11:00 to show up.
(Whereupon, the above-entitled matter went off the record at 10:59 a.m.)
