4	on our calendar, a Fact-Finding Hearing, Case No.
5	18-251-00091, Howard Theatre, License No. 88646.
6	Would the parties, please, approach
7	and identify themselves for the record, please?
8	Anyone who is here for this hearing for Howard
9	Theatre, can you, please, move step up,
10	please?
11	INVESTIGATOR PUENTE: Kevin Puente,
12	Investigator.
13	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Good morning,
14	Mr. Puente. Introduce yourself for the record.
15	LIEUTENANT HREBENAK: So Lieutenant
16	Paul Hrebenak with the 3rd District.
17	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Good morning,
18	Lieutenant.
19	LIEUTENANT HREBENAK: Good morning.
20	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Could you also
21	just sign-in on the sign-in sheet?
22	I see that Howard the Howard

there is no one here for the Howard Theatre. We did have two Show Cause Hearings (Status) this morning at 9:30 and the Howard Theatre did not show up for those Show Cause Hearings.

And so we have a Fact-Finding Hearing today and the Howard Theatre is not here. I will have Mr. Puente -- you can move forward and let us know what is it that you know about this establishment and what is going on. So since -- I'm moving forward with this hearing, because the Lieutenant is here, so we can -- the Board can put certain things on record and then we will decide what is it that our next step will be.

INVESTIGATOR PUENTE: Okay. So on March 11th, I was contacted by MPD Detective Eric Johnson about a sexual assault that had occurred at Howard Theatre that night. And he advised me that he was in contact with the ABC Manager, Shani Pace, about retaining surveillance video and she wasn't able to get it that weekend, but call her and she will get it to him as soon as possible.

He reached out to her several times via voice, calling her, he left a voicemail, emailed her several times, no response and finally asked ABRA for assistance.

I contacted Ms. Pace and immediately got a response and told me to come out that Friday to get the video. I went out there Friday and picked up the video. There was an altercation that was inside.

What I was told, there was a couple and another male or female and there was, I guess, a mistress involved and a fight ensued. Then during the altercation, the female was groped inappropriately by someone. The altercation poured outside onto T Street.

MPD responded. The responding officer arrived. He walked with one of the suspects down T Street who was eventually assaulted by the suspect. I'll let the lieutenant get more into that.

I reviewed surveillance video. The only two available cameras that were inside at

1	the time were the lobby entrance and going
2	towards the lobby that showed altercations. I
3	was advised that they had 38 operational cameras.
4	I got video of the incident, if you would like to
5	see it?
6	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Go ahead,
7	please.
8	INVESTIGATOR PUENTE: I've got video
9	if you guys would like to see that?
LO	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right.
L1	Hold on a minute. I believe that we have Howard
L2	here. So what I'll do is I'll have you start at
L3	the beginning.
L 4	Good morning, ma'am, can you introduce
L 5	yourself? Have a seat and can you introduce
L6	yourself for the record, please?
L 7	MS. PACE: Yes, Shani Pace.
L8	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: And who are
L9	you, ma'am?
20	MS. PACE: The general manager for the
21	Howard Theatre.
22	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Do you have any

authorization stating that you can be here today 1 2 to represent the theatre? MS. PACE: Not with me, but I have 3 4 been here before representing the Howard Theatre. CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right. 5 Well, you can have a seat, but what I would ask 6 is, I'm not sure if it's in the record, just to 7 8 make sure that in the future that you provide the 9 Agency with something on letterhead saying that 10 you are authorized to represent --11 MS. PACE: Absolutely. 12 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: -- the Howard 13 in these proceedings. And we had two hearings 14 this morning, Show Cause Hearings and there was-no one was here for those two hearings at 9:30. 15 16 MS. PACE: I apologize. This is the only one I knew about. I received the paperwork 17 18 for the 10:00 a.m. 19 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right. So 20 but I'm just saying, but it's -- so I don't know 21 what happened, where the communication -- and I 22 believe that there was representation made by the

1	Government that they had spoken to Howard and
2	they had assured them that they would have been
3	here this morning for the hearing. So I just
4	wanted to let you know that.
5	But anyway, there is a sign-in sheet,
6	please, sign-in. Can you, please, sign your name
7	in on the sign-in sheet and I'm not sure if you
8	know what so let's start over again.
9	And can Mr. Puente, can you
10	introduce yourself again for the record, please?
11	INVESTIGATOR PUENTE: Kevin Puente,
12	Investigator.
13	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Good morning,
14	Mr. Puente.
15	LIEUTENANT HREBENAK: Lieutenant Paul
16	Hrebenak with the 3rd District.
17	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: I didn't hear
18	your last name, Lieutenant.
19	LIEUTENANT HREBENAK: Hrebenak.
20	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Hrebenak?
21	LIEUTENANT HREBENAK: Yes.
22	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Good morning

again, Lieutenant.

And you can also introduce yourself again, ma'am.

MS. PACE: Shani Pace for the Howard Theatre.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right.

This is -- we are having a Fact-Finding Hearing because there has been some concerns regarding the operation of this establishment. And I think there has been an issue with whether or not the Howard Theatre has been cooperating in providing video.

Basically, it's the operation and so we are having this hearing to get to the bottom of exactly what is going on and how is it that we can ensure that the -- this business operates the way we want it to operate. And so therefore, do you have a copy of this -- does she have a copy of the report? Can someone give her a copy of the report that Mr. -- does she have a copy of the report, Mr. Puente?

INVESTIGATOR PUENTE: Yes.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Yes, all right.

So can you just start over at the beginning and

tell us about this report and what -- where we

are, please?

INVESTIGATOR PUENTE: Okay. So on March 11th, ABRA was contacted by MPD Detective Eric Johnson from the Sexual Assault Unit about a sexual assault incident that had occurred inside Howard Theatre and asked about ABRA assisting in getting video, because he was unable to get in touch with Ms. Pace. And they were playing phone tag. He emailed Ms. Pace a couple of times and he asked if we could get involved.

I was able to contact Ms. Pace right away. I was able to get a response. I went out there that Friday and picked up the video for Detective Johnson.

In reviewing the video, there was some kind of altercation that occurred inside near the lobby. It went outside. And sometime during the altercation, there was a couple and another female, someone allegedly groped the female

against her will.

And then another altercation ensued.

911 was called. And MPD officer did arrive onscene. And just as he arrived on-scene, several
of the suspects began to walk away down T Street.

While walking away on T Street, the officer tried
to stop one of the individuals and he turned and
assaulted the officer. I'll let the lieutenant
get into that.

He walked with one of the suspects down T Street who was eventually assaulted by the suspect. I'll let the lieutenant get more into that.

On the night of the incident, there was security staff working on the night. Howard does have a security plan. In the security plan it says there will be 45 operational cameras. In reviewing the camera layout from this past weekend when we were at the establishment, I determined that we could only see that there was 28 operational cameras that were working.

And most of those cameras were torn --

or turned towards the cash registers, back of the 1 2 house and the bar areas, nothing really covering the floor or the stage or anything that shows the 3 4 incident. CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Lieutenant? 5 Lieutenant, go ahead. 6 7 LIEUTENANT HREBENAK: Yes. So we --8 actually, the officer was -- received a call for 9 disorderly and was already there on the scene when he was watching people as they exited the 10 11 club. There was a large number of people exiting 12 the club spilling onto T Street as the 13 Investigator said. 14 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Can you, please, pull the microphone closer to you. 15 16 LIEUTENANT HREBENAK: 17 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Please. 18 LIEUTENANT HREBENAK: The officer had 19 already received a call for disorderly and was 20 there in the block when he saw a large crowd 21 spilling out of the Howard Theatre. He was

flagged down by an individual saying that she had

been assaulted and that the person that assaulted her was walking away.

They had all come out of the Howard

Theatre together. The officer attempted to stop

the individuals that had assaulted her. He gave

several loud commands and then the person refused

to stop and then swung a punch at the officer.

At that point, he called for additional assistance. We had officers respond to both help with the disorderly crowd that was forming around the officer, as he was trying to make the arrest, and for the people that were continuing to come out of the club -- I'm sorry, the theatre.

At that point, we had about 20, 25 officers respond. Units from all the way up in Adams Morgan respond, U Street respond, and I believe it was a Sunday night if I'm not mistaken and that about 20, 25 officers is about, I would say, 75 to 80 percent of my deployment for that night.

So that means people are coming down

from Columbia Heights, Adams Morgan, all the way down to -- from the Convention Center. I had seven sergeants on the scene to help control with the crowd control. Myself and another lieutenant had to respond then. So pretty much the entire District had to show up. People, you know, other than people on assignments or at the station.

We had to do crowd control to get things under control. People had formed a circle around the officer, who was trying to make the arrest. We had to actually move the arrestee off onto 7th Street, 7th and T Street, so that we could gain control of the situation.

We had to block off the entire street from 7th Street to Florida Avenue, because there was just so many people spilling out at that point and things were getting out of control.

I would say it took the better part of an hour to get control of the situation. We had to have the ambulance back out of T Street onto 7th Street, because it couldn't go through in front of the Howard Theatre, that was for the

victim of the assault.

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And then we later learned that there was a sexual assault involved. This is after we got everything calmed down and finally were able to interview the witnesses and the complainants and after we got the combative subject arrested and transported.

This is the second time this has This happened again last weekend on happened. May 13th when 800 people spilled out onto T Street after a Howard graduation party. similar thing, I had to bring -- it was a Saturday night this time. I normally have 60 to 70 officers in the 3rd District working. I had about 30 or 40 officers had to respond to T Street. It's about half of my deployment, that leaves most of Adams Morgan, U Street and Columbia Heights with no officers in them, because now there was such a large number of people on T Street, I had to get them to close off T Street.

No vehicular traffic, no pedestrian

traffic, other than the people coming out of Howard Theatre. And I believe this was at 3:42 in the morning. And then there was a simple -- this is when an employee actually got assaulted inside the club and then they were kicking people out at 3:42. This is when the 800 people, roughly, exited the theatre and were on the street.

Again, it was most of my deployment for the night. I had to respond. I had to leave a sergeant on-scene to manage it, to manage crowd control. And coincidentally, on May 7th, I had met with Ms. Pace at the Howard Theatre to offer her reimbursable detail overtime officers. I'm the administrator of the program at 3rd District.

And I'm paraphrasing what she said, we are able to handle our events. We don't need help. We handle our events very well. I said well, we have had some complaints from the neighborhood and I have witnessed, you know, issues as I have described on March 11th and she again said no.

I sent her a follow-up email and 1 2 Brenda Smith, who is a civilian coordinator, also contacted her and said if you need any more 3 information about the Reimbursable Detail 4 5 Overtime Program, please, contact me. told her that between the hours of 8:00 p.m. and 6 7 4:00 a.m., it's even -- ABRA actually helps with 8 the cost of that. Again, we got no response. 9 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: So, Lieutenant, 10 what is it you are asking the Agency to -- you know, this is a Fact-Finding Hearing, so we can't 11 order -- I mean, I know that they had an event. 12 13 There were 800 people. So okay, so what, they 14 had 800 people. So what is it that -- I'm being facetious when I said so what. 15 16 LIEUTENANT HREBENAK: So yeah, I 17 understand what you're saying. 18 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Right. 19 LIEUTENANT HREBENAK: From a 20 management -- from a police public safety 21 management perspective, (A) there was no

advisement to myself or any other members of the

3rd District who have contacted her.

Lieutenant Smith who works evenings also contacted her. Went to -- met her in-person at the Howard Theatre and even said, you know, if you are having large events, give us a heads up. She said when I met with her that night, it's all on the website. We have a calendar.

The other thing is --

MEMBER SILVERSTEIN: Wait, wait. What are you saying, they did not advise you of the event or --

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: They said it's on the calendar. So they are saying that they advised them because it's on their calendar.

MEMBER SILVERSTEIN: All right.

LIEUTENANT HREBENAK: So she said she gets plans last minute or something -- she says that the time blocks that she has for events at the theatre may or may not be filled. As they are filled, she puts them on the website and that was in effect would be my notification if events were going on.

So there was -- there is no liaison with us. If we are going to have 800 people exiting a location at 3:00 in the morning on a Saturday when I have U Street to contend with and Adams Morgan, a little heads up would be nice.

Second, the request I would make is obviously security was not sufficient to control the crowd getting out there. While, yes, they had security on-site, if you have 500 to 800 people exiting a club, the surrounding neighborhood is (A) going to be affected, (B) traffic is going to be affected, (C) pedestrian traffic is going to be affected and there was no control. It was just mass exodus of people, especially after this event happened inside, they decided to kick it -- I don't know if they decided to kick everybody out at that moment, but it was just hundreds of people exiting the theatre with no control.

And then third, I would say if we had an establishment like Kiss across the street happened to have RDOs working, reimbursable

detail officers who actually went over to Howard

Theatre to help with the incident.

So another establishment, in this case Kiss, was at the time acting -- in this instance, was acting responsible by having the reimbursable detail.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: I think the owner would feel a great deal if he would have heard that. So I appreciate that.

yes. They were acting responsible. They had two officers working and those officers had to stop what they were doing, because as our general order -- even though our general orders say, those officers are responsible for that block when they are working detail.

So they had to stop what they were doing, monitoring traffic in and out of Kiss and in front of that establishment and go over to the Howard Theatre, in effect robbing an establishment of what they are paying for, what they are doing, so that they could go and handle

Howard's problem, which I was told they handle very well. And I would not agree with that, at this point.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: So if you had to make recommendations, what recommendations would you ask that Howard -- what is it that you want Howard to do when they have these type of events?

going to have an event that is going to have hundreds of people consuming alcohol (A) I would ask that they send some sort of notification to the 3rd District, especially if it's going to be on a bust Saturday night and say 3rd District Commander Emerman, whoever they want to liaise with, me, whoever they would like to talk to, we are having a large event. Please, be advised it's going to go from 11:00 p.m. to 3:00 a.m., whatever their license allows just to let us know.

Unfortunately, I don't have enough time to consistently check the Howard Theatre

website. I have hundreds of establishments that I'm responsible for on U Street and when Town Nightclub on 9th Street has a large event, guess what? They contact us and let us know. When Cobalt has events, they let us know. So I don't think it is too much to ask for you to come to us and say hey, we are having a large event, such as a Howard graduation event that happens annually, we might want to know.

And secondly, I don't think it's too much to ask if other establishments, much smaller establishments can have RDOs present, I don't understand the reason why Howard Theatre can not have RDOs as well.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: So how many

RDOs would it -- would you ask that, I mean, they
have? I mean, I'm asking you. This is -- you
have an opportunity to -- for the perfect world.

LIEUTENANT HREBENAK: Right.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: So of course we can't, but you are telling the Board and so maybe we could have conversations with Howard to see

what they can do. So what is it that you would recommend that they do regarding RDO?

LIEUTENANT HREBENAK: I think it would need to be proportional to the event and it would have to -- you would have to take into context what the event was. So I believe the week before that, they had a bar mitzvah. There is a lot of people at the bar mitzvah and that's when I actually talked to Ms. Pace. It was after the bar mitzvah.

We didn't have any issues with the bar mitzvah. It was a younger crowd. I don't think there was a lot of alcohol consumption, you know, because there was a lot of probably underage kids there. So that maybe is an event where they don't need RDOs.

But if you are going to have a large event with hundreds of people, I would say you need to put -- the RDOs need to be proportional to the amount of people that are going to be there. So if you are going to have 800 people there, I mean, I don't know the magic number of

RDOs per person, but it needs to be proportional to the amount of people definitely.

I mean, for example, Kiss Nightclub
has -- I don't know exactly how many, but they
can not fit more than a couple -- maybe a hundred
people inside that club and they have two
officers. This is 800 people with zero officers.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Okay. Thank
you. I'm going to have the Board ask questions,
but I'll give you an opportunity, Ms. Pace, to
respond to -- about this incident and what is
going on. And one of the things I'll say to you,
I have now been on the Board since -- this is my
third year on the Board when I first joined the
Board. I think they were -- Howard was here a
lot prior to my assuming the position on the
Board.

And I haven't heard of Howard over the last couple of years, in the past two years.

This morning we had two Show Cause (Status)

Hearings. Now, we have a Fact-Finding Hearing.

What's going on? Why is it that now Howard is

now back on the radar? In a sense, negatively. 1 2 When I said negatively, in the sense that ABRA needs to be involved. What's going on? 3 MS. PACE: So I don't know which event 4 you would like me to comment on first. 5 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: 6 Comment on --7 I think one of the reasons why you are here is 8 because, I think, this last event, in the sense 9 you didn't have enough -- I think this report was about the sexual event and I think there is some 10 11 issue with turning cameras over to MPD. 12 don't you let us know about that factor and maybe 13 you can arrest -- you can address the other 14 incidents as addressed by the --MEMBER SHORT: Ms. Pace, pull the mike 15 16 a little closer to you. 17 MS. PACE: Sure. 18 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: -- as the 19 Lieutenant mentioned. 20 MS. PACE: Okay. Well, the first 21 incident, which I guess is being considered 22 sexual assault, was a Friday night promoter

I read through the paperwork and the 1 2 report and it sounds mildly inaccurate to what actually happened. 3 4 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Then you need 5 to correct the record what is it --6

MS. PACE: Okay.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: -- from your perspective what happened.

MS. PACE: All right. So this sounds very random and that might just be how I'm reading the sub-text, but from my understanding of the situation, this was a couple or rather a guy with his not girlfriend that attended the event.

The girlfriend continuously kept calling the guy's phone, which is what caused the couple to get into a verbal argument. I quess it was mildly loud and one of the servers observed this, so she immediately grabbed security, our in-house security.

Our in-house security tried to diffuse the situation and escort both people out as per

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the ABRA request for a security plan. I guess as they were exiting the establishment, the guy trying to reach over to his not girlfriend, grazed her breast. That is what was construed as sexual assault. That absolutely happened. You can see that on the footage, which I was happy to turn over.

Then from my understanding following that, once the couple made it outside, the girlfriend was actually there. That escalated into something very different as now the girlfriend was involved in the situation. The not girlfriend ended up getting injured.

I'm not entirely clear by whether it was the guy or his girlfriend. What I do know is that one of my security officers who placed the 911 call, they assisted in trying to diffuse the situation even when it was outside. And I know that the guy was fleeing from the arresting officer and my security team still continued to try to assist with that as well.

Since -- from what my security team

1	explained to me, the guy took off running
2	towards, I guess that would be, 7th Street. And
3	they attempted to help with that situation as
4	well.
5	We were staffed according to what our
6	security plan requires.
7	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: What's tell
8	me how many people were there and what was the
9	staffing level, please?
LO	MS. PACE: So we do one security for
L1	every 50. I don't recall the specific click, but
L 2	it was probably, I would say, 900 most likely.
L3	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: So about how
L 4	many security that you had in that I don't
L5	want you to say that we do one for every 50.
L6	MS. PACE: Oh.
L 7	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: I'm trying to
L8	find specifically.
L9	MS. PACE: I had 20 that night.
20	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: They had 20
21	security that night?
22	MS. PACE: Yes. And I turned over the

log-in sheet, so security documents every single person that works, so we have a sign-in sheet for security. I turned that over as well along with our in-house incident reports. So I provide one for the company and then security provides one as well. I turned both of those over in addition to a copy of the sign-in sheet.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: So there is an allegation that either yourself or someone from the establishment was not cooperating with Inspector Johnson regarding, I think, the incident. What can you state about whether or not the -- your company was providing information as requested by MPD?

MS. PACE: So that would have been me.

That wasn't anybody else and I guess we played

phone tag or email tag for a while and I

apologize if it came across as my being evasive,

that was not at all the case, because the moment

I received the email from ABRA, I think, I

responded within less than an hour.

So it might have just been bad

circumstance and I again apologize if it came across as my trying to avoid anything, because that's, obviously, not the case. But I on most shows run as a solo manager, so there is a lot of emails and phone calls and turmoil that I deal with outside of the shows, so it's again, not intentional.

I returned the phone call as soon as

I received the voicemail. I didn't get a reply

and then I guess when I was contacted back, I

didn't answer the phone immediately. Again, I

apologize if that came across as my trying to be

evasive, but that was not at all the case.

I'm happy to cooperate, just like I am happy to provide a list of the shows. My statement that night when I was asked absolutely correct was yes, we always put everything we have up on the website. We occasionally do get last minute bookings, just because we may have thought something else would get contracted and it ended up not getting and so we settled on a secondary show or a different event, but the moment that

things get finalized, they do automatically get uploaded to the website.

That was my statement. Again, I apologize if that came off the wrong way, but when I first started at the Howard, we did actually have a liaison within MPD who I provided monthly. And then as things got added last minute, I updated according to that. I am happy to do that again. We are not trying to hide anything. I want to be cooperative. So if that makes everyone's life easier, again, I'm very happy to do that.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: So Lieutenant,
Ms. Pace has stated that there at one point was a
liaison that she contacted, so how can we get
this system back in place, since, at least what
I'm hearing is that, we don't have a problem
doing -- providing you the information. So who
is this? How can we establish the chain that
they will have a liaison to make sure that your
office will know what is going on at the
facility?

1	LIEUTENANT HREBENAK: Yes, sir. I
2	mean, I would venture to say I already offered
3	myself up as a liaison. I have already emailed
4	Ms. Pace about the RDO program, so if she
5	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Well, not
6	necessarily as an RDO. I think we are we
7	haven't got to the RDO yet. We are just talking
8	about the liaison in the sense that I think
9	one of the things that you stated was that you
10	as other establishments when they have large
11	events, they have informed you that they are
12	having a large event. And so you, therefore,
13	want them to do the same.
14	LIEUTENANT HREBENAK: Yes.
15	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: So I'm
16	LIEUTENANT HREBENAK: That would be me
17	as well.
18	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right. So
19	at this stage
20	LIEUTENANT HREBENAK: Independently.

20	through real quickly. Which one do we want to go
21	through? You tell me which one is first and
22	which one is second. A and B.

12	Puente, you heard all of that.

8	about the camera position as well, if you wanted
9	him to
10	MEMBER ALBERTI: Okay. So
11	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Investigator
12	Brashears, can you come forward, please, and
13	identify yourself for the record? All right.
14	INVESTIGATOR BRASHEARS: Investigator
15	Mark Brashears from ABRA.
16	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Can you tell us
17	about what it is that you know about the camera
18	system at Howard, the Howard Theatre, please?
19	Since we are talking about the camera, then maybe
20	you can help Mr. Alberti can ask some further
21	questions.
22	INVESTIGATOR BRASHEARS: Yes, sir. I

was tasked with conducting investigations at Howard Theatre. Numerous times in the past, approximately 12 investigations, during that time frame, there were 38 operational cameras with recording capacity of 30 days. Due to an issue with a female falling over the balcony, a subsequent issue with someone being injured in the vestibule and a sex abuse case that happened in the stairwell, at the request of the Board, I did a camera review at the establishment and, basically, those areas didn't have any camera coverage.

So the original 38 covered a very good chunk of the establishment, with the exception of those three areas I mentioned. Seven cameras were added to cover the stairwells, the balcony and the vestibule area, in essence, giving all the public access areas and the perimeter, the outside of the building, camera coverage.

MEMBER ALBERTI: So can I ask a question?

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Yes, go ahead.

MEMBER ALBERTI: 1 So thank you, 2 Investigator Brashears. When was this, approximately? 3 4 INVESTIGATOR BRASHEARS: I want to say 5 2015. MEMBER ALBERTI: 6 Okay. Did you 7 follow-up to make sure that most, if not all, of the publicly accessible areas were covered by the 8 9 cameras? 10 INVESTIGATOR BRASHEARS: Yes, sir. After -- basically the establishment submitted 11 12 the security plan with the addition of the 13 cameras, I went out and viewed them and, 14 basically, I saw that we were looking to make 15 sure there were no camera blindspots in any of 16 the pubic areas where they would have access. 17 And during the inspection, I want to say it was 18 the fall of 2015, all the areas were covered. 19 MEMBER ALBERTI: So I'm going to ask 20 you something that's obvious to me, but I'll ask 21 You have seen these pictures and you have you.

heard the description of the cameras coverage,

19	MS. PACE: Yes.
20	MEMBER ALBERTI: Okay. You could find
21	it right away. You know exactly where it is?

MEMBER ALBERTI: Great. Our records show that in the security plan it says that the security plan has a blueprint of where the cameras, the angles, the coverage of the cameras. It's a diagram showing what is covered by the cameras.

MS. PACE: Okay.

MEMBER ALBERTI: Okay? We don't have that. For some reason, I don't know whether we didn't get it or that we lost it, we don't have it. Can you provide that blueprint by COD today?

MS. PACE: I don't know that I have ever seen a blueprint. I know that I have seen a detailed written description of the locations.

MEMBER ALBERTI: So you don't have -so you are telling us that even though the
security plan tells us that there is a diagram,
you have never seen it?

MS. PACE: Personally. That doesn't mean it doesn't exist. It could be sitting at the corporate office. I am happy to look for it though. I personally have not seen one. No,

3	concern to us. Absolutely great concern. And it

12	And also you mentioned something about promoter
13	events. So when you have promoter events, do
14	they provide their own security or Howard
15	provides it?
16	MS. PACE: Howard.
17	MEMBER SHORT: So how do you control
18	how many tickets a promoter sells?
19	MS. PACE: Well, that's generally
20	contracted in advance by the Booking Department.
21	MEMBER ALBERTI: Actually, I have
22	further questions.

1 MS. PACE: And we get updates 2 accordingly. I normally tend to staff on the safer end of things, so would rather end up with 3 4 not to say too much security, but more than what 5 is needed versus less than what is needed. So okay. 6 MEMBER SHORT: I quess the point I'm trying to find out is the night of the 7 8 incident where the Lieutenant testified there 9 were 800 to 900 people on the street, how many people were in the club that -- meaning the 10 11 theatre that night? 12 MS. PACE: If I remember correctly, the click was 842. 13 14 MEMBER SHORT: 842. And how many personnel, I mean, how many security did you have 15 16 working that night? 17 MS. PACE: 25. 18 MEMBER SHORT: 25. So how are they 19 stationed, the security persons? When you have 20 800 people in the theatre and -- because I'm just 21 trying to think in my mind the testimony we heard

before. And we mentioned to the last person who

were there with Howard that security on the front 1 2 should be really revved up, because that's the main way in and the main way out, correct? 3 4 MS. PACE: Yes. 5 MEMBER SHORT: And so we were promised that there would be extra security in the lobby 6 So do you have that now? 7 8 So we have had -- we had MS. PACE: 9 six outside monitoring the lines. We had two, I believe, in the lobby on both ends leading into 10 11 the main theatre. There were two upstairs in the 12 balcony. There was one back stage. There was two on either side of the main bar. 13 I know there 14 was one downstairs in the basement lobby. And then there were two on opposite ends of the pit, 15 16 so either side of the theatre. 17 MEMBER SHORT: Okay. So it sounds 18 like you pretty much know where the -- or the 19 manager should know where the security is. 20

MS. PACE: So we generally try to keep the same points to make sure that everything is covered as humanly possible.

21

Now, I'm going to have 1 MEMBER SHORT: 2 to explain myself a little bit, before I ask this next question, so that I don't go around the 3 Board and what our authority is. 4 5 The RDO questions that were asked earlier, they have been asked before. 6 Why does 7 not Howard have an RDO? 8 MS. PACE: I don't have an answer. 9 MEMBER SHORT: Well, I guess the 10 question I want to ask then, do you think you may need an RDO? 11 12 MS. PACE: I mean, I can understand 13 the concern and the benefit of having one, 14 absolutely. So you knowing the 15 MEMBER SHORT: 16 concerns and the benefits, we can't require you 17 to do anything here today at this hearing, but we 18 can only just ask questions that might lead to a 19 better understanding or a better management of 20 the properties. What would be the drawback of Howard 21 22 not having an RDO? From a manager's point,

10	about it, then why haven't or why has not Howard
11	gotten RDO?
12	MS. PACE: I can't speak to the past.
13	I recently returned to Howard. And Mr. Ellis and
14	I actually spoke about that yesterday about the
15	MEMBER SHORT: We have heard from Mr.
16	Ellis. We have had him here several times.
17	MS. PACE: Yes.
18	MEMBER SHORT: I'm surprised he is not
19	here today.
20	MS. PACE: He had something with his
21	son he had to do.
22	MEMBER SHORT: Oh, okay.

MS. PACE: His son -- so I told him I would come in his place. But we actually did have that conversation yesterday and so looking to the possibility to adding. And again, like the Lieutenant said, it's -- I don't deem it necessary to every single event that we have. We have a lot of private events like the bat mitzvah that we had last weekend. A lot of it is very family-friendly.

However, for the later crowds, for the later nights, for the promoter-type events, I can absolutely see the benefit.

MEMBER SHORT: And most promoters, what is the number, the occupancy of the -- a normal promoter who would rent Howard?

MS. PACE: So it's a standing room only event, so the occupancy or their ability of capacity would be 1,200. That is not to say they always hit that number, but that would be their capacity on those.

MEMBER SHORT: Which leads me now to ask if you know you are going to have a promoter

1 and you know they are going to come pretty close 2 to capacity, then promoted events should have an I mean, I'm asking you would that seem 3 RDO. reasonable for the management --4 5 MS. PACE: Yes. MEMBER SHORT: -- to consider that? 6 7 MS. PACE: Yes. 8 MEMBER SHORT: So are you going to have a talk with Mr. Ellis about that? 9 10 MS. PACE: Yes. 11 And do your liaison MEMBER SHORT: 12 with the Lieutenant, then maybe that can come up 13 again and --14 Absolutely. MS. PACE: 15 MEMBER SHORT: -- because basically 16 what happens is Howard University or Howard 17 Theatre means a lot to Washington, D.C. and to 18 LeDroit Park and to that whole area and we can't 19 have these kind of incidents continue, especially 20 with a liquor license there because we are 21 talking about 1,200 people, 800, 900 people

drinking alcohol and not properly supervised,

1 then we can look forward to more incidents like 2 this, which gives me nightmares. MS. PACE: 3 Yes. MEMBER SHORT: And I would imagine as 4 5 management, would do the same to you. 6 MS. PACE: Yes. 7 MEMBER SHORT: So can I ask you, can 8 you give me a suggestion or can you tell me what 9 it looks like with RDO and Howard now? I mean, we can't require you to do anything, so what do 10 11 you think is the best way to -- I, as a Board 12 Member, am quite concerned about it. I can only 13 speak about my concern. I don't know about the 14 rest of the Board Members. 15 MEMBER ALBERTI: 16 MEMBER SHORT: But I have heard the 17 testimony and you come off as a very legitimate 18 So what are we going to do with -- as 19 far as the RDO goes? 20 MS. PACE: I need to --21 MEMBER SHORT: What can we do? 22 -- well, to be completely MS. PACE:

fair, I am not the say-all, unfortunately, to all decisions. And I hate to say this, but I feel like if I were the say-all to all decisions, we would have had RDO a long time ago. But I am working on making that happen.

MEMBER SHORT: Okay. Now, also I have got to get this question in. You have heard the testimony from the Lieutenant. This melee or fight that occurred, sexual assault allegedly, all of the police officers in this District were in front of your establishment, which meant the rest of the citizens in that area had no protection.

And you have a liquor license, which is very valuable and a part of your business model. We can't continue to have that. And listen, what really happens is your history gets piled up, sooner or later it's going to come to a head and this Board is going to have to make a decision whether or not Howard is going to continue to have a liquor license if these kind of incidents keep occurring.

MS. PACE: Understood.

MEMBER SHORT: So what guarantee can you give the Board that you are going to do more to make sure these things don't continue? What can you say to us, as a Board, today or any commitment you can make that when you have motives and you have 1,200 people and you are going to liaison with the Lieutenant, all these things sound good here today, but apparently we have heard them before.

MS. PACE: I understand.

MEMBER SHORT: And here we are again in the same place we started. I'm quite, quite concerned. And I want to -- I just want to hear what your concern is and what you are going to commit -- I know you are not the say-all, as you said, but what can you say to us to make at least me feel better today before we leave here?

MS. PACE: My concerns are completely shared with you 100 percent. And I wish I had the ability to do things completely my way, unfortunately, that's not the case. I don't

believe in making promises I can't keep. 1 2 What I can promise you is that I am happy to liaison. I am happy to share any 3 4 information that is required by MPD by all means as often as they would like it from me. 5 6 absolutely give you my word that I am going to fight to the best of my ability to get RDOs 7 8 placed on these promoter late night events. 9 MEMBER SHORT: Okay. And I would also like to say to you I'm only one vote for licenses 10 11 that come before us that have problems. 12 wouldn't like to think to say to anyone what I would or would not do without hearing all of the 13 14 circumstances, but this can't continue. 15 I understand. MS. PACE: 16 MEMBER SHORT: That's all I have, Mr. 17 Chair. Thank you. 18 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Any other --19 Mr. Silverstein? 20 MEMBER SILVERSTEIN: Yeah, I would 21 like to go over what I have heard from all of you 22 here and share some thoughts with you.

Ms. Pace, you were told that 75 to 80 percent of the total deployment available in the 3rd District had to be sent to outside of your establishment to quell a melee and to maintain peace and order.

MS. PACE: Um-hum.

MEMBER SILVERSTEIN: That meant that only 20 to 25 percent of the total deployment of the entire 3rd District was available to protect over 70,000 people. That, to me, to this Board Member, constitutes an imminent danger to public safety. And that is a very serious legal threshold. I'm speaking as one Board Member. It is that much concern to me.

You have stated that you are willing to have the Lieutenant as the liaison and to work with him. You have stated and I agree that, as one Board Member, an RDO may not be necessary for every single event. That if there is a small event, if there is a family event, things of those sort, that it may not be absolutely necessary at that point to have an RDO.

And I can understand that, but if there is a large event, if there are things you are not sure, I would say that you should consult with the police. First of all, inform them, so that they are not blindsided. And second of all, if they believe and you believe that maybe you should have an RDO, you should.

We are not at the point right now where we can order it. But if things occur that are really bad, then we can and you will not have the option that you have now of saying well, maybe we shouldn't have one here and maybe this does not rise to that occasion. We can impose things in those types of situations that will not give you the flexibility.

MS. PACE: Yes, sir.

MEMBER SILVERSTEIN: Please take that back to your management and, please, do not put us in the situation where things go south and we are all forced to do things that are much more difficult for all of us.

Do you have any response?

1	MS. PACE: I wholeheartedly agree.
2	Absolutely.
3	MEMBER SILVERSTEIN: Thank you.
4	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Any other
5	questions by any of the Board Members then?
6	MEMBER ALBERTI: Yes.
7	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Go ahead, Mr.
8	Alberti.
9	MEMBER ALBERTI: So, Ms. Pace, I would
10	like to return to the cameras.
11	MS. PACE: Okay.
12	MEMBER ALBERTI: Because now that I
13	think back about where we ended this, I think
14	there is more of a discussion that we could have.
15	Whose you are general manager,
16	right?
17	MS. PACE: Yes, sir.
18	MEMBER ALBERTI: So you have purview
19	over the day-to-day operations of the club,
20	right?
21	MS. PACE: (No audible answer.)
22	MEMBER ALBERTI: So does the coverage

1	of these cameras, the camera angles, how they are
2	placed in the club and how they are aimed in the
3	club, does that come under your purview?
4	MS. PACE: No, not necessarily.
5	MEMBER ALBERTI: Whose purview is it?
6	MS. PACE: The owners.
7	MEMBER ALBERTI: So only the owners
8	can tell you where the cameras should be
9	covering, should have coverage?
10	MS. PACE: Well, the final decision is
11	theirs, yes.
12	MEMBER ALBERTI: And the owner is not
13	here today.
14	MS. PACE: No, sir.
15	MEMBER ALBERTI: So I can't really ask
16	you to if you would be willing to work with
17	our Investigators to make sure that all public
18	areas were covered, right? I can't ask you to do
19	that, because you would have to go back to the
20	owner, right?
21	MS. PACE: Right.
21 22	MS. PACE: Right. MEMBER ALBERTI: It's unfortunate. I

mean, do you understand? Do you see my 1 2 frustration here? 3 MS. PACE: Yes. 4 MEMBER ALBERTI: It's because you tell 5 us that you are in charge, but you are not really 6 And so we have all these problems in charge. 7 with this establishment and nothing can happen. 8 Enough of that, I'm not going to lecture Okay. 9 you any more on that. But I do want to go back to the event 10 on March 11th, all right? Detective Johnson said 11 12 he sent you two emails, one on the 14th and one probably around March -- on March 14th and 13 14 probably one somewhere around March 19th. It's 15 not clear exactly the date, but he sent you two 16 emails. 17 Did you get those emails? 18 MS. PACE: Yes, sir. MEMBER ALBERTI: Did you respond with 19 20 I have the video, you can come pick it up? 21 MS. PACE: I believe one of them was trying to coordinate a right time, yes, sir. 22

1	MEMBER ALBERTI: A right time for
2	what?
3	MS. PACE: That was convenient.
4	MEMBER ALBERTI: For what?
5	MS. PACE: Lieutenant to come view or
6	pickup, because I didn't know which angles he
7	would wanted either, because this was all
8	prior to my conversation with ABRA regarding the
9	video, so I didn't know which angle was required.
LO	MEMBER ALBERTI: All right. Did you
L1	ask? I mean, did you suggest times that he could
L2	come in?
L3	MS. PACE: I said let me know your
L 4	availability and I'm happy to accommodate
L5	accordingly.
L6	MEMBER ALBERTI: And did he?
L7	MS. PACE: I think short after that
L8	was when I was contacted by ABRA and I met with
L9	him within the next day or so I believe. He came
20	and viewed the cameras. I provided everything
21	that was needed.
22	MEMBER ALBERTI: So he says that he

1	wanted video from 2:45 a.m. to 4:00 a.m.,
2	correct?
3	MS. PACE: (No audible answer.)
4	MEMBER ALBERTI: Would it have been
5	possible for you to give him every camera angle
6	in that time period?
7	MS. PACE: I suppose so.
8	MEMBER ALBERTI: And did you offer?
9	MS. PACE: No.
10	MEMBER ALBERTI: No. I have no
11	further questions. Thank you.
12	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Investigator
13	Puente, you said you have some video that you
14	wanted to share with the Board?
15	INVESTIGATOR PUENTE: Yes.
16	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: So can you
17	what's this video you are going to share with the
18	Board, please?
19	INVESTIGATOR PUENTE: So the first one
20	is from the March 11 incident.
21	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right.
22	There is a monitor over there. Mr. Puente. You

1	can
2	MEMBER ALBERTI: Can we take this
3	under advisement? I have come comments on it.
4	(May 11 - Video 1 Played)
5	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: So what are we
6	looking at?
7	INVESTIGATOR PUENTE: The security is
8	escorting some people off the camera site over
9	here. There is something going on over here, but
10	it's not caught on the cameras. And those two
11	enter the camera frame here in a second or two.
12	MEMBER ALBERTI: Okay. So we are
13	looking at what? From inside?
14	INVESTIGATOR PUENTE: Yes, this is
15	inside right when you come off the lobby area
16	entering the stage hall, the D Area.
17	MEMBER ALBERTI: Okay. So these
18	people are coming?
19	INVESTIGATOR PUENTE: Yes, right here
20	an altercation takes place.
21	MEMBER ALBERTI: All right.
22	INVESTIGATOR PUENTE: Security is

1	trying to escort them out.
2	MEMBER ALBERTI: Well, I see security
3	with his name on his back. Who where else is
4	security in there?
5	INVESTIGATOR PUENTE: He's the only
6	one I see so far, because they have they are
7	clearly identified with safety enforcement on the
8	back of their shirts.
9	MEMBER ALBERTI: So I only see one
10	security. Is that correct?
11	INVESTIGATOR PUENTE: Yes, that I can
12	tell unless these other guys have security shirts
13	covered.
14	MS. PACE: Yes, they have arm bands
15	though identifying
16	MEMBER ALBERTI: Themselves as
17	security?
18	MS. PACE: Yes.
19	MEMBER ALBERTI: Okay. Geez.
20	INVESTIGATOR PUENTE: They now enter
21	the lobby area near the front doors.
22	MEMBER ALBERTI: Okay.

1	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: What is this?
2	What are we looking at now?
3	INVESTIGATOR PUENTE: This is someone
4	being escorted out by security.
5	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Okay.
6	MS. PACE: Whew.
7	MEMBER SHORT: And, Mr. Puente, real
8	quick, so right outside of those doors that is T
9	Street?
10	INVESTIGATOR PUENTE: Yes, sir.
11	MEMBER SHORT: And that's where the
12	RDO would be if they had one?
13	INVESTIGATOR PUENTE: Yes.
14	MEMBER SHORT: All right. Thank you.
15	I just wanted that for the record.
16	MEMBER SILVERSTEIN: Thank you.
17	INVESTIGATOR PUENTE: And here comes
18	the rest of security with other patrons being
19	escorted out. And it appears that there is some
20	kind of shoving going on out here with between
21	the patrons. Then a crowd starts forming out
22	here.

1	And momentarily, you will see at the
2	top of the screen an MPD officer walking up.
3	Right there is the MPD officer that arrived on
4	the scene. Then it cuts off.
5	(May 11 - Video 1 Stopped)
6	INVESTIGATOR PUENTE: Then this next
7	video is from Sunday, May 13th.
8	MEMBER ALBERTI: Should we be seeing
9	that now? I mean, that's part of another case.
10	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Investigator,
11	I mean
12	MEMBER ALBERTI: I don't know.
13	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: The Lieutenant
14	spoke about it, so
15	MEMBER ALBERTI: All right.
16	MEMBER SHORT: It's on the record.
17	MS. PACE: Well
18	MEMBER ALBERTI: This is a different
19	incident.
20	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Well, the
21	Lieutenant spoke about it.
22	MEMBER ALBERTI: I'm just trying to be

1 safe.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Well, the Lieutenant spoke about it, so since we have a video on the event and it's part of the record, so you can go ahead.

(May 13 - Video 2 Played)

INVESTIGATOR PUENTE: So someone is already escorted outside over here where the two security guards are. And that male, the security guard is bringing back in and the rest of the patrons. So these two security guards are still dealing with a patron over here outside the door. The rest of the security starts escorting people out.

So at what point do you feel as things are transpiring that you guys need to call MPD instead of letting security handle it themselves?

(May 13 - Video 2 Paused)

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: What am I

hearing?

MS. PACE: Well, normally --

INVESTIGATOR PUENTE: I was talking to

1	Ms. Pace there.
2	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Oh, okay. All
3	right. Okay.
4	(May 13 - Video 2 Played)
5	INVESTIGATOR PUENTE: So security
6	escorts patrons out and there is some kind of
7	another altercation right outside the door. All
8	the folks are being escorted out. Clearly, there
9	is, you know, a problem with patrons.
10	MEMBER ALBERTI: So you don't have any
11	video of inside the club, right?
12	LIEUTENANT HREBENAK: No, that's why
13	we asked to see the club video.
14	INVESTIGATOR PUENTE: This guy right
15	there with his shirt off, so that's this is
16	all transpiring now.
17	LIEUTENANT HREBENAK: The camera is
18	not in range. I haven't arrived just yet.
19	INVESTIGATOR PUENTE: They are right
20	at the door.
21	LIEUTENANT HREBENAK: MPD and I saw
22	all this unfold in front of me.

(May 13 - Video 2 Stopped)

INVESTIGATOR PUENTE: At this point, someone should be calling MPD. And the disconcerting thing for me on this is with the past issues. We had worked very closely with the management, at the time, and security personnel that when something happened, we had enough coverage that you could literally see it transpire and watch everything all the way out.

And my concern is (A) why we have dropped so many cameras and (B) some of the angles I'm looking at the quality is much poorer than what was originally there. That would be a question I would have.

MEMBER ALBERTI: Can I ask how -- do you have an approximate number of people that got escorted out?

INVESTIGATOR PUENTE: It looked like probably 5 to 10 patrons.

MEMBER ALBERTI: 5 to 10 patrons got escorted out. Did they call MPD at that point?

INVESTIGATOR PUENTE: No, there was --

Kiss had the RDO and the two officers at Kiss saw 1 2 this unfold and they split the --MEMBER ALBERTI: But the club made no 3 4 attempt to call? 5 INVESTIGATOR PUENTE: No, because we asked did anyone from the club call and we were 6 told no. 7 8 MEMBER ALBERTI: Okay. So let me get 9 it straight. They escorted 10 people, maybe more, out of the establishment and no one thought 10 to call MPD. Am I correct? 11 12 INVESTIGATOR PUENTE: That's what we--13 Investigator Peru asked that question several 14 times that night. Lieutenant, do you 15 MEMBER ALBERTI: 16 want to respond? Make any comment on that? LIEUTENANT HREBENAK: All I can say is 17 18 we did -- the only thing receive was a priority 19 call from the overtime officers, which happened 20 to be a sergeant and an officer. Never once did 21 I receive any sort of --22 Would it be your MEMBER ALBERTI:

1	advice that, I mean, if you escort that many
2	people out that you call MPD?
3	LIEUTENANT HREBENAK: I think there is
4	a high propensity for an assault to occur outside
5	the club if they are fighting inside the club. I
6	mean, so
7	MEMBER ALBERTI: And
8	LIEUTENANT HREBENAK: if they were
9	fighting outside the club
LO	MEMBER ALBERTI: Yes. I'm going to
L1	LIEUTENANT HREBENAK: From inside the
L 2	club to outside the club.
L3	MEMBER ALBERTI: Okay. So and I'm
L 4	focusing on the number of people. I mean, if
L5	it's two people, I understand, but with 10
L6	people, it doesn't I would say the odds go up,
L7	am I correct, that you are going to have problems
L8	outside?
L9	LIEUTENANT HREBENAK: Absolutely.
20	MEMBER ALBERTI: Okay. Thank you.
21	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Ms. Pace, let
22	me ask you a question. What is the policy and

procedure that the theatre utilizes when there is an incident? What is it that security does? I mean, do we just take the individuals and just escort them out the front door and just leave them there or tell me what it is that -- what is it that the theatre does?

MS. PACE: It all depends on the circumstance. In this particular one, which is what I said that night, is we would have called. It was 5 people that got escorted out. And we would have called, but the moment the second person got escorted out, the officer that was sitting in front of Kiss was already there. There was no need for us to place a call, because he already got involved.

And to my understanding, he already got on the radio and called it in.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: No, I guess that's not necessarily what I'm trying to find out. What I'm trying to find out is that just generally, what do you do? There is an incident, you just escort the person out and put them out

1	and then the security goes back in and/or
2	MS. PACE: No.
3	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: that's what
4	I'm just trying to find out.
5	MS. PACE: So I mean, truthfully, it
6	depends on the situation, but when it is an
7	altercation, we call. We place the call to MPD.
8	Just like we did on the night with this
9	paperwork, with the so-called sexual assault. We
10	placed that call. We placed that call before
11	everyone was escorted or the two individuals
12	involved were escorted out.
13	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Okay. All
14	right. Any other is this the extent of the
15	video?
16	INVESTIGATOR PUENTE: Yes. And these
17	are just some photographs I took of outside what
18	MPD was dealing with.
19	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Okay.
20	INVESTIGATOR PUENTE: The large crowd.
21	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right.
22	INVESTIGATOR PUENTE: And just to note

that the two sergeants on-scene advised me that
they asked Ms. Pace to shut the event down early
at 2:00, because -- due to their concerns of what
was happening in the mini scrimmages that were
unfolding at the time. So MPD asked her to close
the event early that night.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: And what

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: And what happened?

INVESTIGATOR PUENTE: She complied and patrons started coming out.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: So the establishment did comply and closed the establishment?

INVESTIGATOR PUENTE: Yes. I know the promoter was not happy, but the sergeant, based on what was unfolding, he asked the establishment to close down for the night early.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Okay. Well, I appreciate that, Ms. Pace. That I want to just-that I appreciate that the Investigator put that in on the record that you were asked to close, to shut the event down and you did comply, because

part of this is that you didn't comply with -MS. PACE: No.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: -- the allegation is that you did not comply with certain things with the -- with MPD, so I'm hearing that you did, so I want to comment to you, the Board is not here to always beat up on you if you do something well, then I will commend you on doing that. Okay?

MS. PACE: So if I may, he only asked us once and I told him I am happy to shut down.

The only concern we expressed to the officers who made that request was about us opening the door and letting such a tremendous amount of people out all at once.

I will not argue with MPD. They asked me, I said absolutely. And we followed their orders. However, this was my big concern, because I knew that the crowd would be unhappy about us shutting down early to begin with and this escalated out of control very, very quickly.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Yes,

Lieutenant?

LIEUTENANT HREBENAK: If I may, while she is correct, yes, she did comply and it was an additional amount of crowding, people that came out. However, there was already a large crowd forming outside Howard Theatre prior to us asking her to shut it down.

So, yes, it was compounded by the fact that he asked her to close the club early, the theatre early and people -- more people ended up coming out, but it wasn't like there were five -- only those five people out on the street at the time, because that would not -- obviously, this is two sergeants, I'm told, I think 20 to 30 officers, if there was only five people out there being disorderly.

I mean, my officers handle that on a nightly basis on U Street, so there is already an unruly crowd to begin with prior to her shutting down the event.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: And this is just as an aside. It does -- and I'm not in that

area, but it is say Howard's Homecoming, Howard's graduation or whenever Howard itself have large activities, it appears that there are going to be crowds of people in that vicinity. So I think that's something that moving forward that whether or not the theatre, whether or not they have RDO or whether or not they are called, but I think it's a factor that if it's Howard's Homecoming, if it's Howard's graduation, there is going -and especially if it's nice weather, there is going to be a tremendous amount of people in that area and we have to all figure out how to, both the establishments in the area and MPD has to, figure out how can we plan for these type of events?

Because we know that historically there is going to be a tremendous amount of people in the area. Not necessarily because this establishment might have 800 people, but folks just want to be in that area because.

LIEUTENANT HREBENAK: Yes, in the area, general area.

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CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Yes.

LIEUTENANT HREBENAK: But I would also say that area, T Street, there is not a lot of other establishments. 9th and U Street, I would absolutely agree with you.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Okay.

LIEUTENANT HREBENAK: There is -- 14th and U Street is another example. I can't attribute a crowd to any one specific establishment. But at T Street, the only other establishment is Kiss and the Kiss crowd was much smaller. So once you get past Howard Theatre, it's mainly residential.

You have Shaw's Tavern which, I
believe, closed -- is well beyond closed at that
point. So yes, people -- it's going to be a
Saturday night, it's going to be busy,
absolutely. I manage U Street every weekend, but
I would also say there was an abnormally large
amount of people in the crowd that attributed to
the Howard Theatre specifically that night.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Okay. Thank

1	you. Yes, Mr. Short?
2	MEMBER SHORT: Ms. Pace, occupancy
3	again. How many seats are in Howard Theatre?
4	MS. PACE: 130 built-in roughly, but
5	that is without any additional tables or chairs.
6	That is
7	MEMBER SHORT: So fixed seating, how
8	many fixed seats are in the Howard Theatre?
9	MS. PACE: Roughly 130.
10	MEMBER SHORT: 130 seats. So you have
11	130 seats for the theatre and then you have 900
12	people standing? Is that what the occupancy is?
13	MS. PACE: Yes. So
14	MEMBER SHORT: And I mean, that's what
15	you said the DCRA and the city and the Fire
16	Marshal approved?
17	MS. PACE: (No audible answer.)
18	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: You have to
19	answer, ma'am.
20	MS. PACE: Yes. I'm sorry, yes. We
21	have built-in seats into the theatre, booths and
22	stadium seats and then anything in addition

1	MEMBER SHORT: So 130 seating and 900
2	standing?
3	MS. PACE: Roughly, yes, sir.
4	MEMBER SHORT: Or 1,100 standing. You
5	had I guess then I'm going to ask the
6	Investigators, have you seen any posted occupancy
7	in the theatre?
8	INVESTIGATOR PUENTE: Other than just
9	the Certificate of Occupancy.
10	MEMBER SHORT: But I mean, is it
11	posted?
12	INVESTIGATOR PUENTE: No.
13	MEMBER SHORT: The placard stating how
14	many seating, how many standing?
15	INVESTIGATOR PUENTE: No.
16	MEMBER SHORT: Is that normal for a
17	theatre?
18	INVESTIGATOR PUENTE: Yes.
19	MEMBER SHORT: So it not in that
20	theatre, but it's normal for and legal. So will
21	you check and make sure that they get the
22	placards up?

INVESTIGATOR PUENTE: 1 Yes. 2 MEMBER SHORT: And for our record, too, will you send something to the Board, so we 3 4 can see that placard? The one stamped and approved by the city? 5 INVESTIGATOR PUENTE: 6 Yes. 7 MEMBER SHORT: All right. Thank you 8 very much. Thank you, Ms. Pace. 9 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right. Any 10 other questions by any of the Board Members? someone turn the lights back on, please? 11 12 final comments from both Investigators? 13 INVESTIGATOR PUENTE: Well, just the 14 event from Sunday night, that's done twice a year at Howard Theatre on homecoming and graduation, 15 16 so it's an annual event every year, twice a year 17 all total. 18 MEMBER ALBERTI: Fine. Thank you. 19 LIEUTENANT HREBENAK: And something 20 else that the manager didn't clarify, my 21 understanding is in addition to the fixed

seating, you guys have the capability to put in

1	tables and chairs and things.
2	MS. PACE: Yes.
3	LIEUTENANT HREBENAK: Per the event.
4	MS. PACE: Yes.
5	LIEUTENANT HREBENAK: So the actual
6	fixed seating is 130, but it can go up or down
7	based on them setting up tables and chairs and
8	things of that nature.
