CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Okay, we're back on the record, and our next case is case number 19-PRO-00084, Lucky Buns. License number 107929. Will the parties please approach to identify themselves for the record, please?

MR. MCCOY: Yes, sir.
MS. WILSON: Do you need an
introduction?
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: No. No, I mean normally you're sitting out in the audience. So when I said approach, I said move forward. So, yes.

MR. MCCOY: My name's Alex McCoy, I'm the owner of Lucky Buns.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Your last name?
MR. MCCOY: McCoy, M-C-C-O-Y.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Mr. McCoy.
Okay.
MS. WILSON: I am Ashley Wilson. I'm a resident on Vernon Street, and I am also representing the group of nine protestants.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Hi. I'm Dennis James, president of the Kalorama Citizens

Association.
MR. IRANI: Hello. Amir Irani representing ANC 1C.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: How do you spell your last name, sir?

MR. IRANI: I-R-A-N-I.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right. ANC
1C. Now there are three protestors? Do you have a designated -- do you have one designated representative who's going to represent all three?

MR. JAMES: We don't, but through discussion with Board's general counsel, we understand one person will ask questions of just one witness, and then in other cases -- for instance, both of these worthy folks are going to become witnesses at some point.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Sir, hold on. Hold on one minute. Where's my rule book?

MR. JAMES: But we understand the desire for efficiency, and we will respect that to the greatest extent possible.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Yes.
Basically, I was going to give you the provision. Basically we're going to have -- there's going to
be one designee who will make the opening, closing and cross-examine witnesses. So we can't have three people -- so if you want to split it up to say, okay, fine, this person will make the opening, this person will make the closing, but it should be one consistent person who's going to cross-examine any witnesses and stuff.

MS. WILSON: Can I ask a clarifying question?

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Yes.
MS. WILSON: So I will make the opening and closing.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Right.
MS. WILSON: Do I need to also be the one that asks the witnesses questions?

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Not necessarily.
MS. WILSON: Okay. So that can be among the three of us.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: But it's not going to be all three of you asking --

MS. WILSON: Yes, understood.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: -- the witness.
MS. WILSON: Yes.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: So it has to be one person --

MS. WILSON: Per witness.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: -- asking the witness per witness.

MS. WILSON: Yes.
MR. JAMES: Yes, that's the way we designed it, and it was based on the conversation that I had with Ms. Jenkins.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Okay. All right.

MR. JAMES: Yes
MS. WILSON: Yes.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right. Now have you done a protest hearing before?

MR. MCCOY: No.
MS. WILSON: I have not.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right. So this process is -- the way the process is going to operate is that the Board will have its witness testify which is the investigator who should have spoken to all the parties, written a report. And so the investigator will testify, the Board will question the investigator about the report.

Once the Board questions the investigator, then the applicant will have an
opportunity to question the investigator about his report, and then the protestant will have an opportunity to question the investigator about his report. After the Board has presented its case, then the applicant will present its case by calling its witnesses.

Once a protestant has -- I'm sorry, the applicant has put his case on, then the protestant will put his case one. I'll give you five minutes for opening, five minutes for closing. And each side has an hour and a half to present its case. And I want to let you know that you should not spend most of your time cross-examining witnesses because that's off part of the time, too. So I think your time is better spent if it's spent on direct examination rather than cross-examine because you don't want to cross examine a witness for 30, 40 minutes and then you haven't presented your case and we're telling you that you only have 30 minutes left in your case. So be mindful of that. All right.

MR. JAMES: And the board is keeping track of the time?

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Yes.
MR. JAMES: Very good.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Ms. Crockett over there. I don't have a book.

MS. WILSON: Will you give us regular updates?

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Well, I think Ms. Crockett will let you know if -- she'll keep a track -- I'll have them get one. So Ms. Crockett will look at it and let you know, keep you abreast of -- all right.

MEMBER SHORT: That's why ask them, you could just to do it to me now.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right. All
right. Okay. So are there any preliminary issues that needs to be addressed before we start the protest hearing?

MR. MCCOY: No. I would like to say something though.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: What?
MR. MCCOY: As we will discuss this throughout the hearing here, every single issue that is being protested is actually the jurisdiction of the Department of Transportation. This is a protest against a DDOT-approved trash area that exists on a DDOT-approved sidewalk café. It's approved by the city.

It falls under the jurisdiction of the Department of Transportation and they have approved all of this. They've approved the trash area. They have approved the side walk café. And as well as the movement of the walk-in cooler which will be discussed, has been done with the approval and with the guarantee of the Department of Transportation who have given us their blessing to do these things with the timeline that we have done.

And we have accomplished all these goals. We dug out the basement. The new walkin is being delivered. And once that's being delivered we're building a new fence. And those are all the things that I promised. And so we already have a signed settlement agreement.

And we have zero ABRA violations. We have zero ABRA violations as they pertain to trash. And Inspector Ruiz's report clearly states that we are not violating our settlement agreement, and we are not violating any ABRA laws whatsoever.

And so I would like to say that in the beginning. We have a long day of talking about this stuff, and I think it's important to
understand that, you know, we can talk about this for an hour and a half each, but the decision about the existence of this trash area is actually DDOT's responsibility. So I just wanted to mention that on the onset.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right. The protest issue is its adverse impact on peace, order and quiet. Now I don't know what the issues are, and that's all this -- basically this is an application to renew your license.

MR. MCCOY: Correct.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: And it's being protested by three sides. So we'll start off by -- so we'll basically start off by having an opening statement by the applicant and then the protestant, and then we'll call our witnesses. And what I'm going to say, I don't know -- how many witnesses do you have?

MR. MCCOY: I have no witnesses. I just have my facts and the approval of the city.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: And so you're basically -- you're going to testify?

MR. MCCOY: Correct. Yes, I'll cross examine the witnesses, but I'm not --

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: But you're
going to -- in presenting your case you're going to testify?

MR. MCCOY: Correct.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right.
MR. MCCOY: Correct.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: So, all right.
MR. MCCOY: Yes, yes.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: How many witnesses do we have? How many witnesses does the protestant have?

MS. WILSON: We have one, two, three, four, five.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Five witnesses.
MS. WILSON: Six actually.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Six.
MS. WILSON: Sorry, six witnesses.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Six witnesses.
And - -
MR. JAMES: Some of them are going to be very brief.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right, that's even better. The only thing I'll just say I'm not going to have redundant testimony, so if folks are -- I don't need ten people to testify on the same issue. So if it's not the same
issues, the same fact, then it's like heard it, I don't need to hear ten times.

MS. WILSON: Sure.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Use your time presenting testimony on something that's new.

MS. WILSON: Yes.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: That will make an impression on the Board. Okay? All right. So does the applicant wish to make an opening statement?

MR. MCCOY: Absolutely.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: You have five minutes.

MR. MCCOY: Yes, yes. So I want to start off with --

MR. IRANI: Sir, we have a preliminary matter.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: I'm sorry, what's that?

MR. IRANI: Yes. Under 23 DCMR 23313.8, protestants request the exclusion of applicant's exhibits and protest information form as they were not filed timely. These documents were required by 11:59 p.m. November 27th, 2019. The PIF and some photo exhibits were sent by the
applicant by e-mail at 10:09 p.m. last night, December 3rd. I haven't even seen them.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right. So
I know at the protest hearing status I informed parties that the PIF is due seven days before. So they're saying they did not receive your PIF. So what --

MR. MCCOY: So, no, they actually -well, so I sent over an e-mail to -- let me get this, and I'll pull up the timestamp because that's actually not correct. I sent over an email to $I$ believe it was -- is it April? And because the PIF form that was sent to me was a little confusing because it's formatted as if it's a protestor, you know, basically saying this is what we're protesting, et cetera, I sent the question and said do $I$ have to fill this form out or is this form directly for the protestors, and do I have a separate form? Before 11:59, I sent all of my photos, everything to ABRA Legal before the 11:59. I actually have a timestamp right here.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: But was it sent to the other side?

MR. MCCOY: What's that?

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Was it sent to the other side?

MR. MCCOY: It was the night before Thanksgiving and I didn't have any questions answered. On --

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: No, I'm saying did you send it?

MR. MCCOY: I did not because I wasn't sure of the process. When I was --

MR. IRANI: We all sent e-mails and he could have just hit reply all.

MR. MCCOY: When I was --
MR. IRANI: Everybody hit reply.
MR. MCCOY: -- responded by ABRA Legal, and she said, okay, this is fine, but just make sure you send it over. So I sent it over when she told me to send it over.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: But --
MR. MCCOY: I was just confused by the process because, you know, they --

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: But when I was here at a protest hearing status, I told each side that you were supposed to disclose the documents seven days previously, prior to. So you never disclosed the documents.

MR. MCCOY: I sent it to ABRA Legal, and because $I$ had a lot of questions about how to send that.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: But why did you wait till -- why did you wait to the day it was due to --

MR. MCCOY: I was traveling for Thanksgiving and all of that. It's kind of unfortunate, this landed like day before, you know, through the Thanksgiving weekend with a lot of people out of town. The form that was sent to me that week --

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: But I'm not talking about -- but I'm not talking about -- I'm not trying to be harsh, but that's just sounding like an excuse. We had the protest hearing status -- we had the protest hearing status September 18th, and on September 18th I told both parties when the documents were due.

So I mean, yes, you chose to send it on the seventh day. You had a problem on the seventh day. You got an e-mail from them. You got their documents, so why didn't you just send -- even if you didn't know what you were doing since you got -- and did you receive the
documents from them?
MR. MCCOY: They sent their just shortly before 11:59.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: And when did you send yours? So why didn't you respond at the same time as --

MR. MCCOY: I sent mine -- because I didn't see all the documents. I didn't see any of the photos and I didn't see any of the videos.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: So when did you send them documents?

MR. MCCOY: So I sent over after $I$ had been -- after my e-mail was responded to.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: When was that, sir?

MR. MCCOY: That was yesterday. That was yesterday. So $I$ sent over a couple of them, and then after $I$ got the response from April --

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: But this is not April -- but I told you what I need -- -- you were here at the show-cause hearing status.

MR. MCCOY: Yes.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: And I specifically told you what you needed to do. Is that correct?

MR. MCCOY: Yes. I mean I have no defense for that. I'm just saying that that was based off the information $I$ got from April.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: But it's --
MR. MCCOY: And I apologize.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: But they send you documents. Why would you not send documents back to them?

MR. MCCOY: No. It didn't seem like it was the full set of documents.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: But it doesn't matter. They send you documents. They sent you documents.

MR. IRANI: Chair Anderson, also I'd like to call --

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Hold on, hold on, sir. Hold on, hold on, sir.

MR. MCCOY: Well, I --
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: They sent you documents, why didn't you just -- why didn't you not respond back?

MR. MCCOY: I wasn't sure about the process and I apologize. And it wasn't meant to be deliberate. It was just with the Thanksgiving weekend and I asked questions, I didn't receive a
response till the beginning of the week. And once I received the response and I had a few questions back and forth with April and a phone call with --

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Well, that's not --

MR. MCCOY: -- ABRA Legal.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: I mean I'm not going to allow you to -- you can testify because you are the applicant, and this will be for both sides. But I don't know what the documents are, but because you did not provide the documents to the protestants seven days in advance, and I mean I don't think it's reasonable.

The reason that you're giving us why you did not provide the documents in my view, it's not reasonable. So I'm not going to allow you to -- I'm not going to allow to introduce the documents in record. But you can testify -- you will be able to testify, you'll be able to crossexamine, and we'll make a decision based on the testimony that you make.

MR. MCCOY: That's fine.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right. All
right. So what's the -- yes, based on your
presentation, $I$ don't believe that you're going to be harmed much by the documents not being on the record --

MR. MCCOY: Okay.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: -- because
based on the representation that you're making so far. So what is your opening -- what is your opening statement?

MR. MCCOY: So I want to start off with an e-mail from George Bowman who's a neighbor.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: I'm sorry. Hold on. I'm sorry. I'm sorry, did you have something you wanted to say, sir?

MR. IRANI: I did. But would you like me to send this preliminary request to you guys by e-mail?

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: What preliminary -- I don't have any access. What preliminary request was that?

MR. IRANI: It's just exactly what I just said, the preliminary matter of --

MR. JAMES: There's a little bit more detail about when the different --

MR. IRANI: Because --

MR. JAMES: Send.
MR. IRANI: So --
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: It's irrelevant at this juncture. I already ruled that I'm not going to allow because the documents were not timely and the documents were not submitted timely. And I don't have reasonable -- I don't have just cause why the documents were not. I mean it was perfectly -- it was clear. We had a prehearing conference. We had the protest hearing status on September 18th. I gave specific instructions to both sides to say what needed to be done and when it needed to be done. And I'm told that it was not done at that date. And if you had said to me that you had submitted, although you didn't know. When you got their documents, you said you immediately send them document at $12: 01$, okay, fine. But you're telling me that you didn't even provide the documents until yesterday.

MR. MCCOY: Well, I apologize. It was based off of my communication with ABRA Legal, and it's my fault not --

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: And I'm not going to allow you, sir, to say based on your
communication with ABRA Legal because what I said before -- one thing that I've always said to parties, if you do not understand this process please contact assistant general counsel.

MR. MCCOY: Absolutely. I apologize.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: April Randall, she'll provide you, she'll walk you through the process. So, therefore, $I$ don't expect -- it's the Thanksgiving holiday, I don't expect you to contact her -- and then District government was closed Thanksgiving Day and the day after Thanksgiving so I don't know when she responded. Yes, she probably did not respond back to you until Monday because the government was closed on Thursday and Friday.

And so that's not ABRA Legal not responding back to you timely. It's the government was closed. And if you did not understand the process, you have known since September 18th that you didn't understand the process, and so as of September 18th, you should have contacted Legal for them to provide you instructions on how to do it. And as I stated before, if you had informed me that you had submitted the documents the next day, although
you still didn't understand, once you received their documents -- because my problems with this is that, yes, you received their documents, and even if you did not know what to do, they did something so that should be some indication to you that whatever they did, I need to do the same thing, too.

And so if you told me I didn't understand the process, $I$ had some issues but I sent you -- they sent theirs at 11:59. I sent it to them 12:15 or 1:15 because I didn't understand but I sent it anyway, of course I'm going to -- I would have allowed them in. But not yesterday. MR. MCCOY: Well, I apologize and I'll do my best to articulate my position regardless. CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right. So --

MR. MCCOY: Thank you. CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: You can do your opening.

MR. MCCOY: So I want to start off just thank you for giving me the opportunity to talk, and I'd like to start off with an e-mail from George Bowman who's a neighbor who lives on the street and has lived on the street for 30
years. And he says I think a protest is premature. This is the first a lot of people have heard about this including the owners of the buildings, and I don't think it's right to blame one restaurant for the neighborhood's problems.

In fact, when I heard about the protest, $I$ thought it was just to get the city's attention to deal with the rat problem in our neighborhood which certainly isn't limited to the area just around the restaurants. I also see a lot more rats this year on Florida Avenue. I have lived on this corner for almost 30 years and the rats come in waves after milder winters. So all this has happened before, and a coordinated approach with the city is the only way the problem will go away.

The owners of both the Duplex and the Lucky Buns buildings have handled this many times in the past, so I believe they know how to work with the city to solve the problem, let them do it again.

MR. JAMES: Mr. Chair, I'd like to understand a little bit better about how this is going to work because he's -- actually that's a document and it's probably not allowed. We've
never seen it.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: I don't know what the documents are. He's giving his opening statement. I'm not going to allow him --

MR. JAMES: It looked like he was reading from a letter.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Well, he can do whatever he wants to do, but there's a difference with -- he can read whatever document he wants to read from. He can have all the documents that was supposed to be disclosed, he can have them in front of him. He can do whatever he wants to do with them. I'm just not going to move them into evidence.

MR. JAMES: Thank you.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: So --
MR. JAMES: I won't keep on
interrupting.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Right. So -MR. JAMES: But--

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: But, yes, he can have all the documents in front of him. He can do whatever he wants to do in front of the documents. But I'm just not going to allow them -- I'm not going to allow him to physically move
the documents into evidence because they were not disclosed seven days previously.

But $I$ can't tell him how to -- if he was a witness sitting over there, and if he was reading from a document, then you could object and $I$ could tell him that he can't read on the -he can't have a document to read from because it's not in the record.

However, because he's the attorney I can't tell the attorney what he can or can't have in front of him in presenting his case. The same way I cannot tell you -- you guys, are going to have a whole bunch of documents in front of you and your PIF will not move into evidence until you make a motion to move it into evidence.

So you can rely -- you can ask your witnesses of all the documents you have in front of you, but I'm not going to move it into evidence until you make a motion to say I want to move this into evidence. I will ask him if he object. He'll tell me yes or no. And I'll decide to whether or not we're going to move the documents into evidence. As he can later on, he can try to move his documents into evidence. I already said that $I$ 'm not going to move them into
evidence, but he can try.
MR. JAMES: Okay.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: And you're going to object anyway. So --

MR. JAMES: So--
MR. MCCOY: So --
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: But, yes, so -and when we do -- any other time you can interrupt. But when we do opening and closing no matter what a person says, those are the times we do not object. Any time when someone is spouting off you can object, but we don't object during the opening and the closing because it's their opportunity to say whatever they want to say because it's not necessarily supported by anything that's in evidence. It's just a statement, okay? Yes, sir.

MR. JAMES: Thank you.
MR. MCCOY: You know, the reality is is that there is a rat problem at Adams Morgan. There's always been a rat problem at Adams Morgan. And that's existed for a very, very, very long time. And that's not limited to Vernon Street and Florida Avenue.

I've lived in D.C. my entire life and

I remember going down to Adams Morgan when I was a kid and there was a rat problem then, and there's a rat problem now. And the reason for that is that homes and licensed establishments up and down the street have a very difficult task and that is curbing rats. And unless they work together it's very difficult to remove rats. And you're probably never going to be able to remove rats from the neighborhood.

The reality is is that this protest is not about rats. This protest is about the existence of a DDOT-approved trash area that exists next to the protestants building which they obviously don't like. That is approved by DDOT. We've gone to DDOT and met with DDOT and talked to them about it. It exists on our certificate of use. It's been there for 25 years.

DDOT alone has the jurisdiction over this trash area and they have given us full use of this trash area as well as worked out a road map to try to work out some of the problems with the trash.

I've mentioned this to protestants and because their goal is to remove the trash area,
they are literally trying anything they can to try to leverage us into making a deal including protesting our liquor license. We have a flawless ABRA record. We have zero violations. We have zero ABRA trash violations. We have a flawless health inspection record. We have no liquor-related violations whatsoever.

We're a very quiet, small, little restaurant. We don't cause a problem. We don't make noise. You know, all we're asking is, you know, to allow the Board to recognize the jurisdiction of DDOT to deal with this issue, and also, you know, recognize that we are doing the best we can to help curb this rat problem. But if the neighbors don't also help other than try to just protest our license and call the city, then the rat issue on the street is not going to be abated.

And I have multiple photos and I have a ton of testimony here, which even though you won't accept it, $I$ want to show it to you guys, which proved that the rat problem is not limited to just the corner in our street. It is all the way up and down the street. The rats live in the neighbors' yards. They eat in the backyards.

And until the neighbors also have put up together a concerted effort to help abate these rats, well, they're never going to end. And trying to come at us and say that we're the sole reason why there's rats in Adams Morgan $I$ think is very unfair and it just is not truthful. And so that's where I'm going to leave it.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right. Who's doing the opening? Yes, ma'am.

MS. WILSON: Hi, good evening. ANC 1C, KCA, and the group of nine neighbors are requesting that ABRA suspend the liquor license of the applicant Lucky Buns until the applicant eliminates their outdoor refrigerator, their trash, recycling and grease which is next to their sidewalk café. We are requesting this based on the fact that the applicant has disturbed the peace, order and quiet of our neighborhood, including litter provisions set forth in ABRA regulations.

The applicant does not maintain his trash area in a clean manner even though it is located right next to a sidewalk café and residents. The trash cans and refrigerator are a food source attracting rats and other vermin, and
it has caused financial and personal burden for the residents of the neighborhood. During this hearing we will demonstrate that the applicant is in direct violation of ABRA code, his current settlement agreement, and how he has harmed the neighborhood.

We know that there are issues with rats in D.C., that is obvious. The residents and the applicants agree on this. However, businesses in the area must do everything possible to control the rats just as we, as residents, are doing. Our residents have had exterminators come out multiple times. We have set traps. We have conducted rat abatement. And we have actually changed front yard landscaping to prevent the burrowing of rats.

We would love to have a burger joint in our neighborhood, but Lucky Buns has not worked with us on finding ways to reduce and solve the actual problem. Lucky Buns is obligated to follow ABRA and other district agency regulations. As indicated by the trash, the litter, and the rat infestation on Vernon Street, Lucky Buns has clearly not been in compliance with District regulations. Therefore,
we believe their liquor license should be suspended until the trash area and the refrigerator are removed. Thank you.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right. All right, thank you. The Board will call its first witness, Mr. Ruiz. Can you raise your right hand please, Mr. Ruiz? Do you swear or affirm to tell the truth and nothing but the truth?

MR. RUIZ: I do.

## WHEREUPON,

## MARK RUIZ

was called as a witness by the Board and, having been first duly sworn, assumed the witness stand, was examined and testified as follows:

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right.
Thank you. Have a seat, sir. And pull the microphone close to you.

DIRECT EXAMINATION BY CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON:

Q Can you state your name for the record?

A Mark Ruiz.
Q And where are you currently employed?
A Alcoholic Beverage Regulation Administration.

Q And how long have you been employed with the Agency?

A Approximately 10 months.
Q And have you ever testified at a protest hearing before?

A No.
Q And are you familiar with this protest hearing?

A Yes.
Q And how are you familiar with this protest hearing?

A I was assigned to investigate the protest issues.

Q Did they come a time when you wrote a report?

A Yes.
Q Can you share with us what were you able to find regarding the protest, who you spoke to and why you spoke to --

A Yes.
Q Why or why not you spoke to certain individuals?

A Yes. I was assigned to conduct a protest investigation of Upshur Burger Concepts, LLC, with a trade name as Lucky Buns which is
located at 2000 18th Street Northwest. The establishment at 2000 18th Street Northwest is located at the corner of 18th Street and Vernon Street Northwest. The renewal application for 2000 18th Street Northwest was protested by three entities, the Advisory Neighborhood Commission for 1C, and a group of nine led by Ashley Wilson and Mimi Papas, and the Kalorama Citizens Association.

The protest issues for all protestants involved are the following: Adverse impact on the peace, order and quiet, including noise and litter provisions. Rat infestation with the trash enclosure being built on the sidewalk café with a walk-in refrigerator.

On October 2nd, 2019 I requested interviews with the protestants via e-mail in relation to the protested issues. Mr. Irani with ANC 1C responded back via telephone and stated that the parties would most likely enter into settlement agreement with the establishment, and that Mr. Irani further stated that he would send a detailed e-mail containing all of the protest issue details. No further e-mail communication occurred with Mr. Irani as of the publishing of
the report. And no other protestants responded to my e-mail inquiry to provide further details regarding the issues.

On Sunday, October 6th, 2019 I had the ability to meet with Mr. Alex McCoy, owner of Lucky Buns. Mr. McCoy stated that he understands the main issue of the community for protesting his establishment was due to a rat infestation. I completed a walkthrough of the property with Mr. McCoy who showed myself the trash area, which at the time was clean and tidy at the time of my visit. Mr. McCoy also showed myself a basement area of the establishment where he stores additional trash during overflow periods. Mr. McCoy also stated that he had invested over \$20,000 working with the community on the issues at hand, and that the trash area was also shared with his neighbor business 18th and U Duplex Dinner.

Mr. McCoy stated that he would be removing the walk-in refrigerator and building a new fence within the trash area, pushing back the trash area closer to the building, and has provided and showed invoices that he is having that work completed. Excuse me.

There are 31 ABC establishments that are within 1200 feet of 2000 18th Northwest. The establishment at 2000 18th Street Northwest was monitored by myself a total of seven times from October 6th, 2019 to November 22nd, 2019 where I found no ABRA violations. The occasions I monitored 2000 18th Street Northwest I did not observe issues with peace, order and quiet, and as well appeared to be minimal pedestrian traffic in the area. There were no noise complaints reported to ABRA that was associated with 2000 18th Street Northwest between September of 2018 and September of 2019.

As of the publishing of this report, I was unable to receive the calls for service for the address requested on October 2nd, 2019 in regards to any calls related to the property. That's all.

Q That's it?
A Yes.
Q Are there any exhibits attached to your report?

A Yes.
Q What are the exhibits?
A Exhibit 1 is the protestant's letter
to ABRA from the Advisory Neighborhood Commission, ANC 1C. Exhibit 2 is protestant's letter to ABRA from the Kalorama Citizens Association. Exhibit 3 is the protestant's letter to ABRA from the group of nine. Exhibit 4 is the ABRA GIS System map of ABC licensees located within 1200 feet of Lucky Buns.

Exhibit 5 is the ABRA GIS system map of schools, recreation centers or libraries located with 400 feet of Lucky Buns. Exhibit 6 is the photograph of 18th and U Duplex Dinner located next door to Lucky Buns. Exhibit 7 is the photograph of a Blaguard located across the street from Lucky Buns. Exhibit 8 is a photograph of the Imperial also located across the street from Lucky Buns. Exhibit 9 is a photo of Lucky Buns exterior of establishment.

Exhibit 10 is the photo of Lucky Buns exterior of establishment. Exhibit 11 is a photo of Lucky Buns' trash area exterior. Exhibit 12 is a photo Lucky Buns' trash area exterior. Exhibit 13 is a photo of the interior of Lucky Buns. Exhibit 14 is another photo of the interior of Lucky Buns. Exhibit 15 is another photo of the interior of Lucky Buns. Exhibit 16
is a photo of Lucky Buns' bathroom area as well as Exhibit 17, 18 and 19.

Q I want to ask you, you mentioned in your report that you said that you tried to reach out to protestants on October 2nd, and Mr. Irani responded back via telephone and told you about a settlement agreement, and that he would send a detailed e-mail, and that you have not received any communication from the protestants. Can you explain what -- can you explain that?

A So based off the roll call form that was provided that had the contact information, it was the e-mail addresses to all the parties, and I believe Mr. Irani also had a phone number. I went ahead and drafted an e-mail to all the parties at once that $I$ was conducting the investigation. If they have any further detail regarding the issues further from what is in the letter, pretty much I would like to interview each of them.

Mr. Irani I believe had actually contacted me a couple hours later that day if I'm not mistaken, $I$ don't recall exactly, but it was a relatively short amount of time. And we spoke briefly over the phone. And then after that
there was no other communication from any protestants during the investigation up until my deadline and had to submit a report.

Q So did you reach back out to any of them?

A I did not. No.
Q So it was just that initial contact?
A Yes.
Q Was there any reason why you didn't reach back out to them because you hadn't heard back from them?

A No. I probably just -- activities, I didn't get a chance to reach back out, follow up. Other investigations, I just --

Q Did you --
A It was a couple weeks. Yes.
Q Did you receive the detailed e-mail from Mr. Irani as that was --

A I did not.
Q You did not? All right. How many times did ABRA monitor this establishment?

A So I was able to -- there were a total of seven.

Q Seven? And many times?
A Seven visits to the premise which were
all conducted by myself.
Q Oh, so you did all seven?
A Yes.
Q So from what mister -- actually Mr. McCoy told you that -- at least from his perspective that the protestants were protesting him because of trash or the rats? Is that what your understanding based on --

A Yes.
Q -- your conversation with him? So can you describe to us -- tell us about his trash disposal system. What is it that you -- in at least the time that you went to investigate, what --

A So --
Q -- did you see as far as that was concerned?

A I believe one of -- so I believe on the exhibits is a photo of the trash area?

Q Which one is that?
A So Exhibit 12 showed a photograph of the interior from the gate with three trash cans, a recycle -- well, four trash cans and a recycle bin that's visible. So from that point, from that visit on and throughout each visit, $I$
checked the trash area as well as observed the exterior of it for any kind of rodent movement, and during those times $I$ did not see a rat in the trash area. The trash area was kept tidy. Trash contained to the trash cans. I did not find any exterior trash bags outside of the cans.

The area throughout my visits was pretty much kept pretty much to this picture minus maybe the ladder and the mop bucket. But trashcans were never overflowing. Yes, so the condition pretty much remained the same throughout my checks.

Q Through the seven times you visited?
A Yes.
Q So where is the trash area located?
A So the trash area is located on the side of Lucky Buns on Vernon Street side to the rear, the sidewalk café facing up Vernon Street would be on your right hand side surrounded by a black fence.

Q What's the closest ABC establishment to this establishment?

A The closest would be their neighbor 18th and $U$ Dinner.

Q And so that's right next to them?

A Yes, and they are the ones that share that trash area as well because there is no alley behind their building, establishments.

Q So do they share the same trash or the same trash cans, or do they have -- do you know if they have separate trash areas, separate trash cans?

A They utilize the same cans.
Q Okay. So you don't know what trash -you're unable to determine --

A I'm unable to determine whose trash --
Q What trash, but in your visit each time the area has been -- you did not see any ABRA violation as far as trash is concerned, correct?

A Yes, correct.
Q Now do you believe if you had received more cooperation from the protestant, do you think that would have made your report more complete or more -- a better understanding? Or what's your opinion on that?

A Depending upon what the details and specific issues are pertaining to, and I may have been able to include more, but $I$ mean as far as the letter from -- I believe the most specific
letter was from the Kalorama Association that actually included the rat infestation issue within its issues, yes, I guess, depending on what they would have provided. I don't know -I'm not really sure what it would have been.

Q Okay. All right. All right. Any other questions by any board members to Mr. Ruiz? All right, hearing none, Mr. McCoy.

MR. MCCOY: Yes.
CROSS-EXAMINATION
BY MR. MCCOY:
Q I just have one question. When we first met, Mr. Ruiz, did I show you some of the rat holes up and down the street on the neighbors' property?

A Yes.
Q Okay. Did I also show you pictures showing holes in cans in the neighbor's properties and numerous rat holes as well as dead rats on the neighbors' properties?

A Yes.
Q Okay.
MR. MCCOY: That's all I have.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right, Mr. Irani, you're the one asking the questions.

Okay. Go ahead.
MR. IRANI: Yes.
CROSS EXAMINATION
BY MR. IRANI:
Q Investigator, thank you. Do you consider holes in the side or lids of trash cans as signs of vermin?

A Yes.
Q Are you aware that DPW wrote a violation on 10/17 four days after you inspected on 10/13 for --

MEMBER SHORT: Can you move the microphone a little closer to -- the microphone is behind --

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Oh, it's not a microphone. He just needs to speak up.

Q Are you aware that DPW wrote a violation on 10/17 four days after your noted inspection on 10/13 for holes in their trash cans which indicate signs of vermin?

A I understood there was a DPW inspection, but $I$ did not take note of the date of it.

Q I'd also like to -- you had mentioned the location of the restaurant and its neighbor.

A Yes.
Q The neighbor being on 18th Street. Where is the location of the trash area?

A On the Vernon Street side, it's on the corner.

Q Are there any other ABRA establishments on Vernon Street?

A No.
Q And the sidewalk café, is that on Vernon Street?

A Yes.
Q Okay. Also one other thing, the residential trash cans, are those located in the front on Vernon Street or in the rear?

A I didn't notice any on the front. I supposed they're in the rear alley.

Q Yes. That is all. Thank you.
A You're welcome.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: I'm confused. The question asked about are there any other ABC establishments on Vernon Street, or are we just talking about trash? Which one was it?

MR. IRANI: There were two different questions. One was are there ABC establishments on Vernon Street, are there other ones. And then
are there trash areas from the residents that are in the front on Vernon Street?

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: But where is -Mr. Ruiz, is there an ABC -- any other ABC establishment that is close to this other Lucky Buns?

MR. RUIZ: Its neighbors and across the street, which is 18th and Florida.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right. No, but is there -- would you consider is there another ABC establishment that abuts Lucky Buns?

MR. RUIZ: Yes, 18th and U Dinner.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: 18th and U Dinner. So that's right next to --

MR. RUIZ: It's facing 18th Street.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: And that's right next to Lucky Buns?

MR. RUIZ: Yes.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: And you're also saying that the trash area is on a different street?

MR. RUIZ: Yes. So the Lucky Buns sits on the corner --

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Yes.
MR. RUIZ: -- of 18th and U.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Yes.
MR. RUIZ: 18th and U Dinner, if you're facing the establishments are to your right. And the trash is around the corner on the side of Lucky Buns on Vernon Street in the rear.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: And so the trash area is shared by both 18th and U Dinner and Lucky Buns, is that correct?

MR. RUIZ: Yes.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: So they utilize the same trash area?

MR. RUIZ: Yes.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right. And you also stated that they utilize the same trash cans?

MR. RUIZ: Yes.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right.
MEMBER SHORT: Say more on trash.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Huh?
MEMBER SHORT: Say more on trash?
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Go ahead, Mr.
Short.
MEMBER SHORT: Good afternoon or good evening --

MR. RUIZ: Good afternoon, good
evening.
MEMBER SHORT: -- investigator. Did you ever question or did you ever find out how often the trash is picked up from Lucky Buns?

MR. RUIZ: Yes. Their service by
Tenleytown is seven days a week.
MEMBER SHORT: They come every day?
MR. RUIZ: Yes.
MEMBER SHORT: What time?
MR. RUIZ: I did not ascertain that.
MEMBER SHORT: Good point.
MR. RUIZ: Yes.
MEMBER SHORT: Thank you. That's all
I had Mr. Chair.
MR. RUIZ: Thank you.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right. All
right, Mr. Ruiz, thank you for your testimony. You can step down.

MR. JAMES: We have another -- we might.

MR. IRANI: We got one more question.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Well -- all
right.
MR. IRANI: How close --
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Hold on, sir.

These are my witness. The Board has the last word because this is our witness. And so if you're going to ask him questions, then he has to ask questions again. So therefore, he's our witness, we have the last work so, therefore, you have had your opportunity to ask questions. So there are no more questions to be asked of the witness. You have to find some other way to bring the testimony in.

MR. IRANI: Thank you.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Thank you, sir, for your testimony.

MR. RUIZ: Thank you.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: You can step
down. All right Mr. McCoy, can you raise your right hand please?

MR. MCCOY: Yes.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Do you swear or affirm to tell the truth and nothing but the truth?

MR. MCCOY: I do. WHEREUPON,

ALEX MCCOY
was called as a witness for the applicant and, having first been duly sworn, assumed the
witness stand, was examined and testified as follows:

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Present your case, sir.

MR. MCCOY: Okay. So we took over 2000 18th Street in November of 2017. Part of taking over that space, it included an existing trash area. That area has been used for 20 plus years as a dual-use trash area between the neighbors, Duplex Dinner, 18th and U Dinner and us. So they have used that trash area without a problem for 20 plus years.

I have included in my -- and again, you don't have to add this in, but $I$ have the site plan from DDOT and I also have our certificate of use that is -- that would be JJ and II in our examples. This is an approved use area, so the site plan itself shows that this is a DDOT-approved site plan. Existing fenced in trash area shared by L'Enfant Café and Duplex Dinner, L'Enfant being the previous restaurant that was there.

The settlement agreement and the licenses transferred over. So we did a license transfer. It wasn't a new establishment. We
bought the business and transferred the licenses over including the settlement agreement with the ANC.

This site plan, even though this will be disputed by the ANC, was actually approved by the ANC Board. In a meeting with the Blaguard, with our neighbors and with L'Enfant Café. When we took over the space, you know, we were well aware of the rat problems at Adams Morgan. Like I said before, I grew up here. I know that Adams Morgan has a massive rat problem. I'm very familiar with the rat problem on the street as well, and to illustrate that, $I$ have an e-mail which I will read which is DD in the examples, which said from 27 Leah Carter who is a neighbor, it said, "Hi, I'm a long term neighbor at 1812 just across from Lucky Buns. Well, we at 1812 have noticed an uptick in the rats and over the years there have been surges on occasions for different reasons, $I$ am not in favor of filing a protest at this time."

As mentioned din the first e-mail, you know, rats and rodents their population increases for various reasons. You know, we knew this and we wanted to really take charge and prevent the
rats from being an issue. When we moved in, we noticed there was rats all up in the neighbors' yards and they were in the flower boxes that were adjacent and across from the protestants' building.

Very early on we had a lot of conversations about what we were going to do about these rats because the last thing we wanted were rats that were living in the neighbors' yards and then coming down and making it seem like, as unfortunately it has seemed, the rats are on our property. I have listed in our exhibits partner e-mails $K$ through 0 , and --

MR. JAMES: Objection.
MR. MCCOY: I'm going to read them.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: So --
MR. JAMES: I just wanted to ask a question, and possibly object to --

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: What's the objection? Yes.

MR. JAMES: You know, you said I can't object during the opening statement, but to object when he's presenting documents which --

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: You cannot -he's not moving them -- he's not moving them into
evidence so what are you objecting to?
MR. JAMES: Very good. I understand you better now.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Okay.
MR. JAMES: Thank you very much for that.

MR. MCCOY: So my first e-mail, and I'm going to read this out because I have -- and I'm not going to really stretch this out, but is an e-mail from my business partner. And where he says, "Just at FYI guys, I did some more work on some holes and had some more stuff to apply. Also reinforced the ice bin behind the bar. I called Pests Now to have them come out tomorrow and give us a good spray so I can show the guy what we expect every time. Finally, I crushed a bunch of glass and buried in the holes in our planter box next to the trash and will continue to do so.

Just sharing so we can all keep our eyes open for these things, but we know the biggest thing is cleaning. Power washing will come weekly, and I will need to find a solution for the kitchen matts cleaning and storage at night." There's actually a picture they have
included of the kitchen mats that we put outside and we wash and clean if that adds a little bit of clarity to that.

In addition, my response was agree that clean schedule need to be enforced and most importantly, the work checked and down properly. These are e-mails that I'm having with my partners. Furthermore, Hunter responds with that he spoke with a neighbor who lives at the top of Vernon Street. Long story short, "There's a rat issue in the neighborhood and our street and neighbors believe the main cause is the planter tree box on the sidewalk right close to our trash area in front of the neighbor's building.

They have called the city. The city said they won't plug holes or anything, and that it's the responsibility of the property owner. That said, we should do our part to be a good neighbor and we don't need a hotbed of rats outside our door either." So he said he researched, you should have broken glass put down and bury it and collect as many bottles as we can to do that in.

Here's another e-mail. From Hunter, "Just reminding, HVAC cleaning in the kitchen,
power washing the back area, trash area, stairs." Talking about the cleaning that we do. Okay? And then finally -- and, oh, I actually have a copy of our trash cleaning schedule. We deep clean our trash area twice a week with power washers. We pull out the trash cans. We deep clean. We power wash twice a week. That includes cans, inside cans and the actual cement.

I have a picture of that and I will show you here. And I apologize because I can't include this into -- so $I$ got so many pictures of all the holes in the neighbor's yard it's really difficult for me to find this picture. In any case, I'll find the picture. So I mean basically -- I'll find that picture.

So basically, you know, we went through just doing the best we could to keep the area clean non-stop. You know, there was always issues with the rats up and down the street. Really what this boils down to is that, you know, as I said before, the neighbors, they have called the city, but other than that they haven't done anything.

You know, I doubt that many of the neighbors have actually hired -- I know that some
of the apartment buildings have. I doubt that many of the neighbors actually hired rat abatement, hired companies to come out and regularly bait those traps. It actually got to the point where we are at our expense treating the tree boxes up and down the street because the neighbors weren't doing this.

And it really boils down to money. It's like they don't want to pay to have their rat holes abated. They'd rather just call the city and say fix it, or what's the next best thing? Let's just protest the trash area that's right down the street because that's got to be the reason why the rats are here. Those rats existed long before we there, and it was a problem long before we were there.

We continued basically doing this whole thing for months and months and months and months and months. Not a single neighbor had come up to us at any point and said, hey, listen, besides the ones that we had reached out to and talked to and said there's a real problem here. There's a problem with our trash area. We don't like your trash area. And it wasn't until May of this past year that randomly in the mail we get a
letter from Dennis saying that they are going to protest our license.

Before that point, we had received no communication from the KCA, no communication from ABRA -- or from the ANC. No communication from the neighbors where they said, listen, we got to solve this problem as a group. The first communication we had with the neighbors was this is your fault, this is your problem, now we're going to protest your license.

I immediately scheduled a meeting with Dennis and with Amir. It was made very, very clear that the goal was simply to remove the trash area. There really was no talking about this, about what can we do together, how can we fix this problem as a community. It was just you need to remove your trash area. Your trash area's illegal. We don't believe you should have it, and that's it.

I immediately sought to try to work out alternative plans to make the neighborhood happy. There was -- and actually one of the false comments made about a grease trap. There is no grease trap on our patio, and the reason for that is the day after we had this meeting I
moved the grease trap across the street because I wanted the neighbors to know that we wanted to work on fixing that, and that was something that they had an issue with, and so I immediately fixed it.

The trash area on the other hand is very difficult. We have reliable access to trash as any business should have reliable access to trash. This has been approved by DDOT. Our neighbors need reliable access to trash. We don't have a back patio.

The protestants' idea was just take your trash and put it on someone else's property. That's not an adequate result. There's no way -there's too many questions. That's not enforceable. So we're going to move our trash a mile away and just cart it out there? That's just not an acceptable answer.

Once I made it very clear that I was not going to relinquish use of the trash area, but was very happy to talk about beatification of the trash area, covering of the trash area, any number of things to make the neighbors happy, no

MR. JAMES: Objection.

MR. MCCOY: -- no communication from Dennis.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: You can't --
MR. JAMES: We can because this is discussion of settlement.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Well, I don't
-- well, $I$ don't take it as that, but you'll have an opportunity to cross-examine him. So everything that he said you can take notes and you can cross-examine him because he's put himself on the record. So you can cross-examine him for everything that he just said.

MR. JAMES: Well, we understand that you're not supposed to discuss settlement in front of the Board.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Well, I wasn't aware. If that's settlement, then that's true. I don't - -

MR. JAMES: The meetings that he's discussing took place.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Well, I mean I guess the only settlement -- well, I mean if -like mediation.

MR. MCCOY: I'm not talking about mediation. I'm talking the meetings that we had
as a group between the three of us.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Right. So you can talk about that. But if you're talking about mediation --

MR. MCCOY: Yes.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: That when you went to mediation what was discussed there, then that's not brought up here. But if he said that he has met with you before --

MR. JAMES: The purpose of the meetings -- I'm not going to belabor, but the purpose of the meetings was to try to achieve a new settlement agreement, different terms were discussed like you say, but $I$ believe it goes to settlement.

MR. MCCOY: I'd like to add that Dennis also was very glad to try to include limitations on our entertainment license as well while also submitting changes, trying to submit changes to our settlement agreement for the trash. I just think that's an important little note as well.

Once we had discussed with -- once we had discussed with the ANC the fact that we weren't going to relinquish use of our approved
trash area, I actually had a walk-through with the department of health of the neighbors' homes, and I took a number of photos. And just to kind of illustrate that, you know, they are protesting our trash area claiming that our trash area is just completely out of control. And I'm going to show you this and I have a set of -- put all these up.

These are trash cans in the back of the trash area of the neighbors. This is food on the ground as well as trash that's just strewn out. Here is more food on the ground, trash strewn about. Here are rat traps that are just open because no one has actually been keeping these up because they are not utilizing pest control.

And then you have the holes. So here's a hole in a neighbor's yard. Here's a hole in a neighbor's yard. Here is a hole in the neighbor's yard. Here is a bunch of construction going on up the street which was running off down to my building which they were then accusing me of creating run off, okay? And here's some of the run off from that, okay?

This is what the neighbors done have
to fill the rat holes. They've just gone to Home Depot and bought spray, you know, the filler and just sprayed it in the holes. They haven't done anything to fill it up. Here is more rat holes. Here is dead rats in front of the neighbor's yards. More rat holes. Here is a dead rat behind the neighbor's property. Rat holes behind the neighbor's property. Holes in trash cans. Holes in trash cans with trash cans with no top on them. Holes in trash cans again. Holes in trash cans again.

I think it's important to note that if the ANC was really serious about rats -- I sent these pictures to Amir. He has not contacted the neighbors at all, and nothing. The only thing that he's done is they passed a resolution to try to get DPW to conduct night time inspections of businesses. He has not put any pressure on the neighbors to abate their rat problem at all and has gone strictly for us, and I think that is highly inappropriate.

After meeting with them and as they were debating the legality of the trash area, I had a number of meetings with the Department of Transportation. And they're going to talk about
the walk-in cooler.
When we first opened, there was some I guess bad information about whether or not that fenced-in trash area was private or public. We were under the impression that it was private so we built a walk-in cooler in there. When we were made aware that it was public space and that cooler wasn't supposed to be there, we immediately scheduled a meeting with the Public Space Committee, and we had a conversation with them about how we were going to move this trash area, or move the walk-in cooler. And this was a conversation that we had had a number of times. When the legality of the trash area came into question, I went back and talked with the head inspector, also talked with Mr. Garrett who's the head of permitting and Mr. Marcu where I laid out exactly what we were going to do about digging out the basement, getting the permit for, buying and installing a new walk-in cooler in the basement which cost me $\$ 25,000$ which I was happy to do.

Upon movement of the walk-in cooler we were going to build a new fence because that was one of the issues that the neighbors were
concerned about. And I am happy to do anything to make that area nice and clean for the neighbors. I'm just not going to remove that trash area because I need to have reliable access to trash.

Over the summer and in the winter, we finished our build out. We got all of the permits. It was inspected and approved. I have a picture of the area. This is what it looks like right now. This is the hole. The walk-in cooler which we have purchased, and here is the invoice for the walk-in cooler that has been purchased is being delivered on the 17th of December. I have an e-mail I'm more than happy to send to everybody. Here is an invoice for the build-out which cost me \$10,000.

Furthermore, talking about the fence, here is an e-mail with Elliot Garrett because one of the arguments they're going to make is that the fence is not the right height. Well, I asked that question. I said should I replace the fence to the current height or the height that DDOT prefers for their fences? And Mr. Garrett's response was, "I would suggest that it be replaced to its current height. Please
application for repair and replace fence permit in tops. It will be great if we can move the fence a few feet back towards the build, but I understand that would make the sidewalk café a projection on the sidewalk."

This has also passed approval of that being an approved trash area. They are well aware of the trash area. They are well aware of what we're doing moving the walk-in cooler, and we are in full compliance with DDOT.

Furthermore, I know that they're going to bring up a couple things because one of the issues that they're going to try to promote is that we're just this disgusting restaurant. Terrible, disgusting, you know, we don't keep -you know, our health inspection's horrible. It's garbage. That's actually not true.

So we have zero Department of Health violations pertains to rats, rodents, vermin, you name it. Okay? We actually have in the past three, and they sent over some information about our health inspection. Our past three health inspections I had zero violations, three, and then five.

Department of Health conducts health inspections knows that most restaurants do not get zero violations. Most restaurants gets between three and 10 violations. Some of them are minimal, some of them can be door is open or a bracelet on a prep chef's hand. Okay?

I actually made a list of all the establishments in that area and all the violations they have from the last two. Like I said before, our last health inspection, which I have the actual reports right here, we have zero violations. Before that we had three violations, and I'd like to read off the violations because we take health very seriously, we take cleanliness very seriously. We were hit because there wasn't thermometer in a reach-in cooler. We were hit because there was food being transported that wasn't covered. There was just not a cover on it, one person. And that wiping clothes were not stored in sanitizer buckets. That is all that we've got hit on. And like $I$ said, the one after that had zero violations.

You know, we have -- I have a very close relationship with the Department of Health.

Six of my employees are DOH certified food handlers including myself. And I'm also training another six to go through to that food handlers. All of my kitchen staff will have DOH food handlers' licenses. Okay?

Another thing that the protestors will submit to you are two Yelp reviews. One Yelp review that shows someone heard a rat on our trash area, and another Yelp review that showed the picture of a roach that they saw.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Of a what?
MR. MCCOY: Of a roach that they saw.
Currently, we are the number one Cheap Eats restaurant in Washington, D.C. by Washingtonian. We were voted one of the best top 50 burgers in America. Top 100 restaurants. We take what we do very seriously.

I have over 1, 200 reviews between Yelp and Google and all of these other different formats. Only two reviews of 1,200 have mentioned anything. One mentions that they heard a rat in the trash area, another one mentions that they saw a roach.

Now the reality is is that in all
restaurants roaches tend to pop up here and
there. That doesn't mean there's a roach problem. It happens in people's homes. Like I said, I have a very aggressive pest control plan. I have Pests Now which is our pest company comes out twice a month and does a very deep serious sprays. I can't stand pests. I hate them. Okay?

We work really, really hard to maintain our caliber of restaurant and maintain the health of, you know, the health and sanitation of the restaurant and make sure that we're creating good food. And the reason why we have so many great reviews, and our reviews average between 4.5 and 4, all of them were like 4.5 is a testament to that.

Furthermore, you're going to see a lot of pictures - oh, and this is the picture of us cleaning the trash area by the way. Furthermore, you're going to see a lot of pictures from the protestants and they show our trash area just out of control, out of control.

And, you know, I'm not saying that every day we've been absolutely perfect. I think I would be a liar if I said that. There have been days where there have been -- you know, the
trash company didn't come pick up, or there was problem with something. I get it. That happens at every establishment. Those situations I take full accountability for what's wrong. But our trash area is not this wild out of control, disgusting, you know, cesspool.

You'll notice in a lot of pictures that they have submitted you'll actually see all the trashcans closed. But what you'll see is a lot of boxes. You'll see either the recycling bin open, you'll see a bunch of boxes sitting on top of the trash cans. And the reason for that is the neighbors love coming by when I get my orders and I'm taking all the boxes out to crush them and taking pictures and making it seem like things are just out of control.

We get our order in on Monday and Friday, massive order. We take all the boxes outside and then we break them down. But they're going to show you pictures that show these massive piles of boxes and make it seem like that's how we keep our trash area constantly. That's not the case. That just my guys either cleaning the patio, pulling trash cans out and putting them on the area while
they're cleaning and power, you know, power cleaning the area. Or we're just waiting to break down all those boxes and put them in the recycling bin.

There is pictures of what looks to be runoff coming off of our patio. It's water. That's water. It's water from us watering our plants and cleaning our trash area. This isn't grease that's just coming out of my restaurant. There's not grease bin out there. Okay? There's pictures of our mats outside which we put outside to clean, to make sure that these mats are clean.

These pictures are so situational and they do not show exactly what's going on. Inspector Ruiz shows that we keep that area clean and organized. It's easy to come by when we're breaking down boxes and snap a couple pictures and make it seem like things are out of control, but that's just not the way it is. What else was there? I had -- oh, yeah, the other thing was, and this is what bothered me the most. When it was made very clear that DDOT was going to side with us, uphold the use of the trash area, Commissioner Ronnie really did some I think borderline, just really
not appropriate behavior when talking about our business to the public.

He is an elected official. His job is to be fair and impartial. I am one of his constituents. He also should be fighting for us and for fairness to us as well. Not just the neighbors. Mr. Ronnie posted a tweet -- I apologize. I apologize here. If I can find it. Oh, here we go. Oh, here we go.

Here is a tweet that Mr. Ronnie posted saying that the grease that streams from Lucky Buns stains our streets and attracts rats, please be a good neighbor. This is public. And you'll notice that the angle of the photo makes it seem like there is just a bunch of grease coming off of our, you know, patio.

The reality is that this is the real photo. You can see that the grease clearly starts in the middle of the street from a truck that's passed by, from someone dumping some coffee in the street. It's not from our patio. It's clear. It's a picture. It's right here.

This was not limited to just tweets. This was what $I$ noticed right after the protest was submitted. Someone had come to our back
fence and ripped off one of the panels from the back of the fence in the corner, and this is nearest to the neighbors. You can very clearly see that it was pulled from the outside. You see that?

I would find regularly, I would walk outside and the trash can that is closest to this, the top would be flipped up because someone has stuck their hand under there and flipped it up undoubtedly for the hopes that an inspector would come by and try to cite us for having an open can. And I think that -- unfortunately, I have no way to prove that this was a neighbor, but it just seems quite interesting that this would happen right after this protest would be filed.

Furthermore, we were having complaints, the neighbors were calling in complaints to the DOH and DPW constantly to the point where the health inspectors were like, "Yeah, we're back again." They knew we were doing nothing wrong. DPW came multiple times. And we've actually been cited, and I'll say this because they'll talk about this. We've been cited four times by DPW. Twice in one day. And
three of those are not our fault.
First was a grease spill from a trash company, a grease company that came to pick up the grease from our container. They spilled it early in the morning and when we got in, we cleaned it immediately. DPW was there before and they took pictures. It is what it is. We got rid of that grease removal company and we moved the grease across the street.

After we removed the grease across the street, we have to fill up buckets of grease and with a wheelbarrow take them across the street. We got cited because one of those buckets was just cracked a little bit because the grease was a little hot and we didn't want to spill hot grease in the street. That was what we were cited for. It's like a $\$ 100$ fine.

The last two DPW fines were a recycling fine, and they're going to show you a picture of that recycling bin because they're actually showing a bunch of pictures of our trash cans open. Those were opened by DPW. That was not our trash. We don't carry Bud Light. We don't carry that wine, we don't carry plastic straws. That was the neighbor's trash. I had a
very serious meeting with the neighbor and threatened to remove him from the trash area if they do not recycle and follow DPW and DDOT regulations when it comes to trash.

Now there was one thing that I will take credit -- well, not take credit for, but I will take on my shoulders. I requested to have new cans. We've had new cans put out there four or five times. We've had new cans brought out. They have taken old cans. I submitted with our trash guy to bring out new cans because we noticed that there was some holes in the cans. Every time there have been holes in the cans we have called our company to bring out new cans.

The reason why Inspector Ruiz didn't see any holes in the cans is because, and you'll see in the picture, there's a hole in the back of the can. When they brought those new cans, we did not see that hole because it was in the back of the can. Subsequently, we canceled our trash contract with that company and we started a contract with Tenleytown. All brand new cans. And they're out there. I don't have a picture of them unfortunately, but brand new cans, brand new company.

I do not tolerate dirt and disgusting mess in that trash area, and I have shown that I'm willing to spend the money, that I'm willing to make the moves. I'm not complacent on this, and neither are my business partners.

And as I said before, we have a flawless Department of Health record, we have zero ABRA violations, and we only have four DPW violations in a period of two years, two of which happened on one day. And those are easily explainable. This does not show a track record of just a disgusting mess that is contributing to the rat problem.

Now I would urge the Board to take that into account, and also take into account that this is, like I said before, this is DDOT's jurisdiction. If we don't keep this trash area clean, that's on us. And the reality is is that this problem has already been solved, but the protestors refuse to concede.

Once this walk-in cooler is removed and put downstairs, there is a huge trash area which we can put more trash cans, we can put dumpsters. There is more than enough space to fill that entire place cleanly, keep it
organized. And you know what? If my team does not keep it organized, well, we can be fined by DPW. We can fined by ABRA. We leave ourselves open to that, but we are moving -- we are making the moves and doing the things that we need to do in order to make this right. We've shown that we were going to do that.

I showed that to Inspector Ruiz. I've shown you invoices here that $I$ have to show that we've done that. We spent a lot of money. We spent $\$ 25,000$ to make the neighbors happy. We've worked with the Department of Transportation. We've worked with the Department of Health to make sure this is done properly. We are not a bunch of complacent owners that are sitting back and just putting our hands up and saying this isn't a problem.

But I would ask that the ANC and the neighbors don't just say you're the problem because this rodent problem is not going to go away unless the neighbors, the city, ANC, and us, and the businesses in the neighborhood all work together to solve this problem. And removing one trash area and just moving trash to another location is not going to solve any problem that
doesn't solve any rat problem whatsoever. But what it does is it strips my business of reliable access to trash and it strips my neighbor's business of reliable access to trash.

And like I said before, I don't think that we've been 100 percent perfect. Nobody has. But we have done a lot of to try to make this better as best as we can do. And that's all I have to say.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Thank you. Who is going to do the cross-examination?

MR. IRANI: I'd like to.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Yeah. Go ahead.

CROSS-EXAMINATION
BY MR. IRANI:
Q So I just have a few things. I'll just try to keep it brief since we're on the clock. You mentioned a flawless DOH record --

A Yep, I do.
Q -- including zero health violations pertaining to rats, animals.

A Mm-hmm.
Q I have submitted to you a week ago a document where there are 32 DOH violations in the
last year, including violations pertaining to insects, rodents and animals.

A I would love to respond to that.
Q And actually, can you read it?
A Yep.
Q Can you read the actual line item?
A
MR. JAMES: He can't just --
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right.
He's asking you a question.
THE WITNESS: I apologize.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: And you respond to the question to the best of your ability.

THE WITNESS: Yes. I apologize.
BY MR. IRANI:
Q Did you not receive any of these violations from the Department of Health, any of these 32 violations, including the ones pertaining to insects, rodents and animals? Because right now, in front of the Board and the rest of us, you're claiming you have zero violations.

A In the last health inspection, which I have right here, we had zero violations.

Q In the last year, there had been
multiple health inspections, 32 violations. CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Hold on. All right.

THE WITNESS: Actually, I can answer that if you don't mind.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: You can what?
THE WITNESS: I can answer it. The line item that you're referring to as it pertains to rats and rodents, if you actually read the line item, it says insects, rodents and vermin are not present.

Read it. If you read it, that's what it says. And the reason for that is because anybody who understands how a Department of Health inspection is performed is there's about 50 line items. Those line items can be tripped by a number of different things.

Now on the actual health report, which you don't have access to because you've downloaded all of your information off of HDScores.com, which is a subsidiary of Yelp, which only shows the actual line items. It doesn't show what triggered them.

MR. IRANI: It shows the violation.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Hold on.

You've asked him a question. You've answered your question. And all right. I'm not going to have --

MR. IRANI: I'm satisfied with his answer.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right. Give him another question.

THE WITNESS: I would love to finish what $I$ was saying because --

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: There's no pending question, sir. Let's -- we're moving on to another -- is there another question?

THE WITNESS: I think what $I$ was going to say --

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Sir --
THE WITNESS: I apologize.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: There's no pending question. Is there another question?

THE WITNESS: I'm sorry. I'm a little fired up right now.

MEMBER SHORT: We respect you. I think you should respect this Board.

THE WITNESS: You're absolutely -- and I apologize.

MEMBER SHORT: And I think you've been
very disrespectful to our chairman and us.
THE WITNESS: I'm very sorry, and I don't mean --

MEMBER SHORT: Think about it. Take a deep breath.

THE WITNESS: I don't mean to be disrespectful.

MEMBER SHORT: Take a deep breath. BY MR. IRANI:

Q Thank you. So you had also mentioned that you take full accountability when presented with an issue, and you talked about a tweet a resident made that I replied to with pictures.

I've sent you emails with pictures of broken cans, open cans of grease, grease spillage on Lucky Buns' property and around it, pictures of your trash pickups with trash spillage happening. Why haven't you maintained that full accountability with the neighbors and with the ANC?

A Well, I have, and as I mentioned before, I've changed trash companies. We have instituted biweekly cleanings. We have seven-day pickups. We replace trash cans.

We've moved the walk-in cooler down
into the basement. I've spent over \$25 in improvements, including building new fences that will be done as soon as the walk-in cooler is removed. I made these changes.

They don't always happen as quickly as some people would live, but I've made these changes and I've spent the money, and I've done the things that $I$ need to do to work with the neighborhood properly.

Q Okay. You also had stated, and I want to keep this brief, so this will be my last question, that you doubt neighbors paid for rat abatement.

I just, you know, there's so many things that you say that $I$ have emailed you about, sent you evidence of, including last week with all the exhibits, showing $\$ 3,500$ paid by one resident for rat abatement, letters from pest control companies for a single resident talking about how they have seen a significant uptick during the recent six months and captured two to five rats.

But, so this is all proof of the neighbors all paying thousands and thousands of dollars for rat abatement, so why do you
constantly come back and say that?
A Because you've shown evidence with that of what two residents that are paying for rat abatement? How many properties are up and down Vernon Street? Do you know off the top of your head?

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Well, you answer --

THE WITNESS: I can't ask questions. Sorry.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: You answer questions. You don't ask the questions.

THE WITNESS: I don't know the number off the top of my head, but --

MR. IRANI: I'm satisfied with the answer. I'd just like to move on to our own witnesses.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Do you have no further questions?

MR. IRANI: No further questions.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Mr. McCoy, I'm confused about this trash area. So who shares this trash area?

THE WITNESS: So basically, we are located at the corner of Vernon Street and 18th,
and it's a corner building. So it's like a strip of buildings, a strip of small shops and then kind of ours is on the end on the corner.

The shops kind of toward the end have a really tiny little back area that they keep their trash. And that area is filled with their trash. The Duplex Diner and ourselves, we don't have a back alleyway.

That alleyway stops like three back, like three buildings back. So historically, that trash area was located on the side of the building and shared by Duplex Diner and by the businesses that were there before us because it was the only place to put trash for the businesses, so they had reliable access to trash.

It's not that it was chosen just for the, you know, for the heck of it. We don't have a back patio area. So it's just -- it's right, and basically, there's some big walls that go up kind of in the corner and then about 6-foot walls, a fence around it.

And I would say it's about a 10' $x$ 10', maybe a little bit more square that the trash is. And it's been there for 20-something years.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: So the trash area is utilized by you said two --

THE WITNESS: Correct. Yeah.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right.
THE WITNESS: By two businesses.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Now, how often is your trash removed?

THE WITNESS: Seven days a week.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: What time? I mean like --

THE WITNESS: It comes between 12:00 and 2:00 generally, but they do come earlier. Kind of the accepted time is between 12:00 and 2:00, but they do come as early as 6:00 a.m. They come as early as 5:00 a.m. It really just depends on the day and the route. But it's always up by at least 2:00, before we're open.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Any other questions by any of the other Board members? Go ahead, Mr. Short.

MEMBER SHORT: Have you ever heard of a Business Improvement District?

THE WITNESS: I have not.
MEMBER SHORT: Well, it's when several businesses who have the same problem you have in
the same neighborhood band together and when you have a bid or you take to your neighbor's business, do a bid, you find yourself a lot better off. They solve a lot of problems. Have you ever heard of a trash compacter?

THE WITNESS: Yes, I have.
MEMBER SHORT: Have you ever tried to get one for your business?

THE WITNESS: Yes, actually. And that's a very good question. So when we had started discussing some ideas because, as I mentioned before, that I was more than happy to discuss some ideas that would help abate rats in the neighborhood and --

MEMBER SHORT: What did you do about getting about a trash compacter?

THE WITNESS: I called a bunch of companies about putting a trash compactor in the trash area to prevent, you know, one that doesn't leak.

MEMBER SHORT: It's a big tax write off in the District government for doing that. You know that?

THE WITNESS: It is. So the reason why they wouldn't -- AMG Hauling, we talked to.

We talked to Tinley Town about doing that. The reason why they can't install a trash compactor on that trash area is that there's no road access.

So the trucks can't come up, pick up the trash compactor and dump it, because basically, you have the sidewalk. You have cars parked. So in order for them to access that, there would have to be no cars there. The other idea that we came up with is a --

MEMBER SHORT: Let me get this straight, so maybe you'll know that $I$ know the neighborhood. Is this the same Vernon Street that goes up the hill that runs to the back of the Hilton?

THE WITNESS: Correct.
MEMBER SHORT: Oh, it's been like that for many, many years. Hasn't it?

THE WITNESS: Yeah. That trash has been there.

MEMBER SHORT: But there haven't been that many restaurants there before. Correct?

THE WITNESS: There was a restaurant there before.

MEMBER SHORT: No, no, as many as they
are now.
THE WITNESS: I would argue they've been close to about the same.

MEMBER SHORT: No, sir. If you don't know, just say you don't know, but you don't know. All right. Now, I also want to ask you will you please still try to look into a trash compactor?

THE WITNESS: I --
MEMBER SHORT: There's different kinds that they could work it out. The District government will really help you with that if you would ask them to.

THE WITNESS: I would 100 percent put a trash compactor on our trash area.

MEMBER SHORT: Okay. Ever heard of the cardboard box regulations, DCRA?

THE WITNESS: Yes.
MEMBER SHORT: So tell me exactly how you understand the cardboard box because I've seen some pictures that show boxes in your --

THE WITNESS: Absolutely.
MEMBER SHORT: -- trash area that you can't close the bins unless you press them down over. Tell me what the regulation does.

THE WITNESS: So you're supposed to break down all your boxes, and they need to be separate.

MEMBER SHORT: Break them down inside or outside?

THE WITNESS: Well, you need to break them down inside and then take them outside.

MEMBER SHORT: Because if you take them outside, you'll sit them down, you'll come back and crush them later.

THE WITNESS: Correct.
MEMBER SHORT: And that causes big problems. Doesn't it?

THE WITNESS: Correct. And we've solved that problem because I no longer have them -- because of the pictures, $I$ no longer have them breakdown boxes outside. They break them down in the basement. They keep them in the basement, and then they bring them up.

MEMBER SHORT: Well, let me ask you this. You're part of this community. You say you live in the District.

THE WITNESS: Yes, sir.
MEMBER SHORT: Do you live in this neighborhood?

THE WITNESS: I don't. I used to live nearby, but I live in Petworth.

MEMBER SHORT: Where?
THE WITNESS: Petworth?
MEMBER SHORT: Petworth. Okay, not far away.

THE WITNESS: Yeah.
MEMBER SHORT: There's a lot of restaurants there, too, right?

THE WITNESS: Well, there's a lot more than there used to be.

MEMBER SHORT: Oh, that's what I'm saying about your area. Okay. So I really know the city a long time, too, like you. All right. Now also, you mentioned that you haven't had any citations from which agencies? Have you had any citations from DCRA?

THE WITNESS: No citations from DCRA. MEMBER SHORT: DPW?

THE WITNESS: We've had four citations from DPW.

MEMBER SHORT: Four, that's all?
THE WITNESS: That's it.
MEMBER SHORT: In how many years have you been there?

THE WITNESS: Two years.
MEMBER SHORT: Okay. How about Department of Health?

THE WITNESS: Zero.
MEMBER SHORT: No.
THE WITNESS: Well, as it pertains to

MEMBER SHORT: In the two years you've been there, have you ever had any -- just yes or no. Have you ever had any violations?

THE WITNESS: No for the trash area, but yes --

MEMBER SHORT: Please listen at the question. You can't over talk me.

THE WITNESS: Sorry.
MEMBER SHORT: Thank you. Yes or no, have you ever got citations from the Department of Health?

THE WITNESS: Yes, for routine health inspections.

MEMBER SHORT: When?
THE WITNESS: I mean every health inspection has had a few citations, which is --

MEMBER SHORT: So you're saying every time the Department of Health comes they find
violations?
THE WITNESS: Yeah, but that could be someone wearing a bracelet or a door open. That's what $I$ was going to respond to about the insect and rodent line item on the health report because --

MEMBER SHORT: I've been on this Board going on seven years, and you're the first business owner who said to me he gets a violation every time the Department of Health comes out, and that's regular.

THE WITNESS: Well, like a minimal violation.

MEMBER SHORT: Well, violations period.

THE WITNESS: Well, they're small violations, and as I said before, I have a list of all the businesses in the neighborhood. And every single one of them has --

MEMBER SHORT: My last question to you is - -

THE WITNESS: -- between three and five violations.

MEMBER SHORT: My last question to you is, you were here the last time and this Chairman
read to you and read to the -- your neighbors what was required by this Board, when it's required and how to get it to us. You sat here and heard that. Correct?

THE WITNESS: I did.
MEMBER SHORT: But then you said you didn't get it in on time. So if every business that we deal with has ABC license, comes in and says -- we might as well throw that regulation out of the window.

THE WITNESS: That wasn't my intention.

MEMBER SHORT: I know it wasn't your intention, but the law is the law. So I really wish that you would just tone it down a little bit and listen a little more than you.

THE WITNESS: No, I understand.
MEMBER SHORT: Because we're here to help you not hurt you.

THE WITNESS: No, I know. I'm just very frustrated.

MEMBER SHORT: Well, I understand. We get frustrated when people come in with all kinds of complaints because we don't see a lot of restaurants. It's many of them, but some people
we see two and three times a year, sometimes more than that. And guess what happens to them after a while? They get enough violations from us they lose their license.

THE WITNESS: Yeah, I understand.
MEMBER SHORT: That's all I have, Mr. Chair.

THE WITNESS: And I don't want to be that person.

MEMBER SHORT: Thank you. That's all I have.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Any other questions by any Board members? Any questions based on the questions that were asked by myself and Mr. Short?

MS. WILSON: No.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right. And so you rest, sir?

THE WITNESS: I rest, yes.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right. The Board is going to take a 10-minute break, and then you can present your case. We're in recess.
(Whereupon, the above-entitled matter went off the record at 9:07 p.m. and resumed at 9:25 p.m.)

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right. We're back on the record. So the Protestant is going to present its case. So who is the attorney, and who is the first witness.

MR. JAMES: It's going to rotate a bit.

MS. WILSON: I'm Ashley Wilson. I will be the attorney for the first witness. I'd like to first call to the stand Marcus Mirra.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Marcus Mirra.
MS. WILSON: M-I-R-R-A.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Mr. Mirra, can you raise your right hand, please? Do you swear or affirm to tell the truth and nothing but the truth?

MR. MIRRA: I do.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Have a seat, sir, and please pull the microphone and speak into the microphone please.

MR. MIRRA: Good evening Board members and Chair. WHEREUPON, MARCUS MIRRA
was called as a witness by Counsel for the Complainant and, having been first duly sworn,
assumed the witness stand, was examined and testified as follows: DIRECT EXAMINATION

BY MS. WILSON:
Q Can you please introduce yourself?
A Yes. I'm Marcus Mirra. I live in the building that's abutting to the restaurant, Lucky Buns.

MEMBER SHORT: Mirra, can you spell it, please?

THE WITNESS: Yes, M-I-R-R-A.
MEMBER SHORT: Thank you.
THE WITNESS: Yes, I live right next door to the restaurant, Lucky Buns, and my units is one of the garden units that --

MEMBER SHORT: So you're on Vernon or you're on --

THE WITNESS: On Vernon Street, yes. That's a residential street, not the main commercial street, which is 18th, yes.

MS. WILSON: And I would like to introduce a motion for evidence. I believe you guys have a binder in front of you.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Okay.
MS. WILSON: I would like to introduce
all of the photos.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Now you have to

MS. WILSON: I'm sorry. There's a white binder, and I would like to introduce --

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right. This is how you need to do that. If you have them, tell me what you're trying to do.

MS. WILSON: So as he's speaking, right, the photos and a video that we will show as well as a map that $I$ think we want to help clarify the location of the establishments, I want to figure out the best way to introduce all of that.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: If you're going to -- are you going to ask him about the photo? MS. WILSON: Yes.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: So why don't you ask him about the photo and after you're done asking about all the photos, then you can ask to move them into evidence.

MS. WILSON: Okay.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: So show him the photo and ask him to identify it.

MS. WILSON: Okay.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Does he have a binder?

MS. WILSON: Yes.
THE WITNESS: But I do recognize it, if that's enough.

MS. WILSON: Yes. So Marcus, to ensure the clarity, and I'm on the last tab of the page, there is a map of Vernon Street. Can you best describe the location of Lucky Buns?

MEMBER CROCKETT: I'm sorry.
MS. WILSON: Yes.
MEMBER CROCKETT: What tab are you on?
MS. WILSON: I'm sorry. I'm on the photos tab.

MEMBER CROCKETT: Okay, photos tab. Thank you.

MS. WILSON: Photos tab, and it's the last page of the photos tab.

MEMBER CROCKETT: Got you. Thank you.
MS. WILSON: And it should look like
a picture of Vernon Street.
MR. JAMES: Sir?
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Yes, sir.
MR. JAMES: I just want to be sure we're doing this procedurally correct. We do
have an evidence book to share with the other side, which I understand is the proper thing to do.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: So did you disclose that?

MR. IRANI: We disclosed everything in the book to him.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: But you didn't have it in the booklet form.

MR. McCOY: I can pull up the photos on my --

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: As long as it was disclosed to him seven days, then that's fine.

MR. JAMES: Yes, it was.
BY MS. WILSON:
Q Okay. Marcus, can you please best describe the location of Lucky Buns, the location of the Duplex Diner establishment as well as where the residents are located relative to Lucky Buns, please?

A Okay. So what we're looking at is we see 18th Street north and south and then Vernon Street east and west. And Lucky Buns is on the very corner. It's got that enlarged sidewalk in
a V shape.
And then just next to it northward is the Duplex Diner. We are along Vernon Street just abutting. It's the abutting building next to Lucky Buns. And so, our patio is -- it's abutting to their sidewalk café, which includes their garbage area.

So because Vernon Street is on a slope, our garden patios are above their garbage space. So where we have some chairs, it looks over to their garbage space, and yeah basically, that's enough.

Q No problem. So Marcus, if you turn to image -- so I would like to introduce that picture into evidence.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right. Do you have any objection, sir?

MR. McCOY: No objection.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: So moved.
(Whereupon, the above-referred to document was marked as Complainant Exhibit 1 for identification and received into evidence.)

BY MS. WILSON:
Q So Marcus, if you turn to Image 34, can you show, to the point that you were making
earlier about the location of your building with the Lucky Buns' trash area? It's Image 34.

A 34, okay. So we see the crosswalk, and then moving up the sidewalk we see where their seating area is where they have tables. We see their side door, and then immediately continuing up the sidewalk is where they have the fence.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Hold on. I think I'm looking at the same one. So I see some umbrellas. So why don't you identify using the umbrellas.

THE WITNESS: Okay. So the umbrellas, we've got one yellow one and three blue umbrellas going inward through the street.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right.
THE WITNESS: Image number 34,
correct?
MS. WILSON: Yes.
THE WITNESS: Image number 34.
MR. McCOY: May I --
THE WITNESS: So as you walk up the sidewalk --

## CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Hold on one

 minute. Yes, sir.MR. McCOY: Because the pictures aren't numbered --

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: The pictures are numbered. Are -- they're not --

MEMBER SHORT: 34.
MS. WILSON: Page 34.
MR. McCOY: Which one is 34?
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: They're not numbered on the -- give me a book.

MR. McCOY: That would be great.
Thank you so much.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right. Go ahead.

MR. McCOY: I appreciate that.
THE WITNESS: Okay. So this is basically the crosswalk at the corner of Vernon and then 18th. So as we walk up the sidewalk along those umbrellas, you'll find Lucky Buns' side door to their kitchen or that kitchen area.

And then the fence that you see is where they have their garbage bins, and only since they've had possession of the property do they have that gigantic fridge out there.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Can I -- and I just -- so you're saying you have a fence. Is
the fridge -- what is the fridge because I can't --

THE WITNESS: It's that silver metal square that you see, that we have more photos that are up close.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Okay. All right.

THE WITNESS: But yeah, just since they've had the ownership has there been that huge walk-in cooler. Before, there just used to be garbage bins within that square area of the fence.

The fence is there supposedly to conceal and keep in their garbage area. The fence area protrudes out into the sidewalk about I don't know, maybe a foot and a half. I'm not sure of the measurement.

But that is what abuts to our building. It's against our patio, and it's against the wall of our residential building. And that's the only restaurant on our street. The rest of the street is all residential. BY MS. WILSON:

Q And Marcus, to the point of the patio that you made, if you can all turn to Image 14, I
think that depicts a great picture. And can you just describe that exterior patio and how that -where that fence leads to.

A Okay. So this is the one patio right in front of the doorstep of the Unit 101, and this is the entrance to -- one of the entrances. We have a double staircase like it comes up to our main entrance.

So that patio is right in front of someone's front door. It's the front door of a unit that has that patio. And so, we have the steel fence there and the wooden fence there to try to make some type of barrier between the garbage that these two restaurants pile up and our living area.

MR. McCOY: May I make an objection to that?

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: What's the objection?

MR. McCOY: I just want to make a note that --

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: No, it's not make a note. What are you objecting to?

MR. McCOY: Oh, just the placement of the cans. That's not how it's actually placed.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Well, you can -- you're going to have an opportunity to crossexamine.

MR. McCOY: Okay. Absolutely. Okay.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: You can crossexamine him, so you can cross-examine him about that, sir.

MR. McCOY: Okay. Absolutely.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Go ahead.
MS. WILSON: Thank you, Marcus, for describing. I'd like to introduce those pictures that $I$ just showed you into evidence as a motion.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Do you have any objection to the introduction of --

MR. McCOY: No, that's fine.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: So moved.
(Whereupon, the above-referred to document was marked as Complainant Exhibit 2 for identification and received into evidence.)

BY MS. WILSON:
Q Okay. Marcus, can you confirm where the residents of 1811, the building you live in, plus the residents on the street, where do they keep their trash cans?

A All of the residents, all of the homes
and the residential properties keep their garbage in the alleyway. It's behind the entire block. It's on the other side of our buildings, so none of the houses have their trash pick-up or storage of their garbage along this sidewalk. The only garbage that is seen on this sidewalk belongs to the restaurant.

Q Thank you. As mentioned, Mr. McCoy in his opening statement I believe or his testimony, he mentioned there was a previous establishment prior to Lucky Buns, right, which we also acknowledge? Can you describe the difference between those two establishments?

A Yes, there's a huge difference. The only reason we have a protest is because there's a huge difference between the years that we had a previous restaurant there and the reality that we live with now.

We never had these scenes of garbage cans lined up along our property for cleaning. As the Defendant pointed out, they do cleaning, but they do cleaning like this.

There's garbage lined up along our front wall, and there's piles of garbage. Those cans are not lifted up open just because
someone's leaving them open. It's because they're overflowing.

And being a resident, $I$ don't just have visits every now then. I'm there every day, and I walk by this every day. It's either like this, or those cans are inside the enclosure. But there are many times they're open because they're overflowing.

And it's unkept. The maintenance has changed very much since the last ownership to now. There's much more garbage. The production of food is much greater than it used to be with the previous restaurant.

The previous restaurant was more like a café and a place where people would drink. This new restaurant is wonderfully successful, and we'd love it to be like that because we enjoy places like that in our neighborhood.

But it accumulates so much more garbage than the previous establishment did, so there's a huge difference.

Q So when you -- can you -- I know you spoke about the difference, right? And I'd like to introduce the video that we have on the screen, and I'm going to play the video. And
then I'm going to ask -- actually, can you please describe --

A What we'll see?
Q Yep, what we'll see.
A All right. So on many afternoons, evenings and well into the night, $I$ come in and out and I see lots of rat traffic. It's not just the rats that I'm here to talk about though.

It's the cleanliness of the area and garbage that spills out, bottles or plastic around the garden area that's in front of their area. But this is a source. It's a food source for rats.

And because of the amount of food, food that spills over, the food that is inside these bins that have had holes in them, it attracts lots of rats.

And if you see how our property is raised from the sidewalk. My front door gives me perfect -- I have a glass door, and it gives me perfect view of how many rats move in and out straight through the whole street to this specific area.

It's like a rat highway going there and coming back. And many times, I've filmed
them. I've taken pictures. And this is one of our -- one of the videos that I've taken.

Q So if you look right here, you'll see two rats, one running. This is one right here that just ran. You'll see one coming out of that bin.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right. Why don't you ask him to tell us? You're asking questions.

MS. WILSON: Oh, I'm sorry.
THE WITNESS: Oh, I see. What I saw. So I'm standing on my property. Okay. This is part of our building. I'm standing right over their garbage bins, and this is what I see on a regular basis.

These are rats running out of their garbage bins through the holes or because they're open, and they go up the street and down the street. They come to eat at this site. They nourish themselves, and then they go reproduce wherever they make their burrows.

So opposite of how he was trying to paint the picture, the rats don't just live at our place. The rats multiply because they find their food source nearby, and then they reproduce
wherever they can make their home
It's the opposite. They're
reproducing because they have such a plentiful food source, and that wasn't the case before Lucky Buns. This is not the way it was before in the previous establishment.

BY MS. WILSON:
Q So Marcus, I know you shared a description of the video at night. Can you describe activity even during the day?

A Yeah. I mean it increases in the evening, but it's been similar during the day as well just like we see here. And mind you, this is my front doorstep. So the rats walk across my front area, and they aim right for that --

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Is that a rat? I'm sorry. That looks like a cat. I apologize.

MS. WILSON: That's how big they are.
MEMBER SHORT: They've got some big ones out there.

THE WITNESS: Well, they're getting plenty of food, you guys. That's exactly what I wanted to point out, and they're going right to that refrigerator, right to the property, right to the trash.

This is a very dirty area. This is our property, and the restaurant has also taken the liberty of placing their property on it, ladders, brooms, furniture.

It's been really a huge disrespect to the neighbors. We're in this area, and they find it just acceptable for them to put whatever they want on our property and leaning up against our fence.

It's just on many levels, it's been disrespectful, and it shouldn't even happen. Why do I need to point things out like them putting their own property, wedging it against -- so this is on a daily occurrence.

It's not just when maybe an inspector goes and doesn't see these things. I live here along with my neighbors, and I deal with this on a daily basis. The number -- the amount of feces now as opposed to any other time has increased to where we have flies and where you have an odor.

So my garden that $I$ used to dig in and plant flowers and use my hands, I cannot bear to get near it anymore. I've totally neglected it, and I've come across -- I've looked into other solutions, to put cement over it.

And I've had that garden for years. I moved into that place because it was a onebedroom that had a garden. And I thought I was very lucky to find that in Washington.

I can't look at my garden anymore because it's become a rat-infested -- it's a litter box. It has all the droppings of the rats. It has the flies in the door, and it's right in front of my doorstep.

It wasn't like this before Lucky Buns is being so successful with their great numbers and wonderful food production. It wasn't like this before.

Q Thank you. So one of the testimonies of Mr. McCoy is that he does take his trash bins out of the area and cleans them. So I'd like to refer to Image 15. Can you describe what you've observed? What is his process that they clean these bins?

A Okay. So just like in this photo, we see the bins outside of their little fenced area.

MR. McCOY: May I make an objection?
THE WITNESS: -- and I walk --
MS. WILSON: Thank you.
(Whereupon, the above-entitled matter
went off the record at 9:43 p.m. and resumed at 9:45 p.m.)

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: We're back on the record. Go ahead.

MS. WILSON: Thank you.
MR. McCOY: Can I just -- my objection?

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: What's your objection?

MR. McCOY: So Mr. Mirra is making a statement of fact about how we clean when he doesn't really know how we clean.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Sir, remember. He's testifying, okay. You're going to have an opportunity --

MR. McCOY: Okay. I wasn't sure if I could object to that.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: You're going to have an -- I don't know. She's asked him a question.

MR. McCOY: Okay.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: He's stating how from his perspective you can. When he's done testifying, then you can ask him questions about his testimony.

MR. McCOY: All right.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: You can clarify the record if you can do so through crossexamination.

MR. McCOY: Okay.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: That's the beauty of cross-examination. Someone paints a picture, and depending on how successful you are, then you'll either wipe the slate clean, or you'll make it worse. I'm just saying, but that's what we say in cross-examination.

MR. McCOY: All right. Thank you.
BY MS. WILSON:
Q So I'm going to only ask you one more question about the pictures because $I$ don't want to belabor this point. I think you guys get it. Marcus, I'm on Image 24, which is also displayed on the screen. Can you describe what we are looking at?

A Okay. So this is now looking into the walk-in cooler, the refrigerator up over the garbage bins. So this is all within their -this is all on the sidewalk patio that we've established.

This is within their fenced area, and
so they walk in and out of this cooler, taking in and out food. I've witnessed uncovered food. I've witnessed them just like in the picture prior to that, 23.

I've witnessed them placing food containers on top of the trash bins in order to free their hands to open the refrigerator. There's just a lot of poor judgment.

There's poor judgment on keeping the area clean, on respecting the area, the neighborhood and the fact that you can see through the fence, the dilapidated fence. And that has not been fixed and right into their fridge. There's just a lot of poor judgment that's been made here.

Q And you mentioned they put food on top of the trash can. Can you describe is that what's happening in Image 23 ?

A Image 23, that's exactly what I saw. I saw this individual placing that container of meat on top of the trash bin in order to free his hands to open the door to the cooler. Yeah, there's --

Q Thank you.
MS. WILSON: So I would like to
introduce all of these images and motion to introduce all of these images. I don't want to go through all of them, but it reiterates the continued testimony of Marcus plus the other witnesses you will hear. So I would like to formally introduce them as a motion of evidence.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Just, all you need to say I would like to move these images into evidence.

MS. WILSON: I'd like to move the images into evidence.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: And any objection, sir?

MR. McCOY: No. No objection.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: So moved.
(Whereupon, the above-referred to document was marked as Complainant Exhibit 3 for identification and received into evidence.)

MS. WILSON: Thank you.
BY MS. WILSON:
Q So Marcus, I'm just going to ask you a few other questions. What have you done as a resident for rat abatement or rat treatment?

A Okay. So we have exterminators all up and down the street. Several residents pay for
the extermination on their property. We use bait stations and we use the poison, the powder poison that the exterminators use.

We try to -- we keep our property clean and, you know, all our garbage is on the back side of the street, so they don't have anywhere to stop and feed on any of our properties on that block.

They go right past my doorstep running to those bins that are chewed through. You'll notice on the photos there are lots of chewed holes for them to get into. And then they go back.

So I get the traffic. I get all the traffic, and up until recently $I$ didn't have the problem of the burrows in my immediate garden. And just about maybe within the year, that's when they targeted my garden, too. So yes, there are burrows up and down the block, but that's because they're getting their food from there, from that source.

Q Thank you. Prior to joining this protest, did you ever meet with Mr. McCoy about these issues?

A Yeah. Before the protest, I met with him when they -- well, I'm not sure if it was
you. It was a blonde guy when you first acquired the place, and I introduced myself, wanted to see and discussed a few of these issues that $I$ was worried about because there was that visibility of the garbage and it looked unkempt.

So and then later in May and then in September, I specifically remember talking to you in person in front of the garbage area, so yes. I brought up these issues, and I voiced my concern.

And each time, I was reassured that things were going to change, that he was doing everything in his power. I mean $I$ could listen to him and be enchanted by what he described was right in front of me.

And I would shake my head. I'm looking at an entirely different situation. You're describing a paradise of cleanliness, and I'm standing on top of a lot of filth. It was not addressed. We're months later, and these things have not been addressed.

Q So to confirm, even after you met with him, which sounded like -- can you confirm three times? Was that three times?

A Yes. Well, two times with him
specifically, one time with another owner.
Q Okay. So after three meetings, did you see any improvement?

A I haven't seen any improvements. And of course the rat situation is only worse because of time and with reproduction. It's worse now than it was before. It's worse than it was last year, and it's worse at this point than it was months ago.

Q It's also my understanding, and Mr. McCoy brought this up in his testimony about a fence and that he said he's been willing to repair the fence. Have you seen any marginal, even marginal repairs to the fence?

A No. The fact that he points it out that someone must've torn parts of it from there. I just don't understand a successful business would not remedy these situations.

You have a dilapidated fence next to your tables where you have people eating, and it looks disgusting. I don't go to that restaurant because of that. I used to before when it was the previous establishment, and I would have had I not seen all of this stuff firsthand on a regular basis. I can't move myself to eat there.

Q Apart from Mr. McCoy, have you met with any other D.C. agencies regarding the issues that you've seen?

A Yes. I did meet with Mr. Garrett, who you mentioned, at the DOT. And he realized that there was an inconsistency between the written permit that you have for the patio and the map that was drawn up.

And so he assured us that we could go further with some type of negotiation of some sorts and target that because he could not understand who would have approved the map containing a garbage next to tables on a café, on a sidewalk café.

In the written permit, it says there's no -- they are not allowed to have that garbage are adjacent to the café. Yet, in the map that was drawn up and also approved, there's an area dedicated for that.

So there's an inconsistency right there that Mr. Garrett identified any, and he was at a loss to know how to approach that. But he assured us that he would work with us.

And we're here today because we haven't gotten anywhere with any of this, and we
don't know how else to deal with this problem because clearly, years ago, someone put a stamp and signature on a garbage area next to tables where people eat and next to a residence that our patio looks right over and next to a written permit that prohibits that very thing.

Q Do you think Mr. McCoy, his other partners or the establishment are acting in best faith for the neighborhood?

A No. It's very different from the previous establishment that did work with us. We didn't get to this point with any of the previous establishments because they did work with us as neighbors.

They even paid for mosquito spraying of the block just to ensure that there weren't so many mosquitos on their patio. None of this happens anymore. When I raise these issues with the current ownership, we haven't gotten anywhere.

He's pushed it all the way to this point. There's been no repairs to the fence. It's in worse deterioration now. He's blaming us for harboring rats when that can't be blamed on us.

The tree boxes in front of his place and ours, he's not keeping up with them like they used to in the previous establishment. There's a lot of -- there's loitering now from his employees.

There's tons of cigarette butts because of the cigarette breaks that his employees take, and there's just no supervision like there used to be in the previous establishment.

We have photos that are part of the evidence that are just tons of cigarette butts along our sidewalk, and it's because of the cigarette breaks that his employees take and well, I smelled marijuana and I smelled cigarette smoke coming into my windows because my windows are right in front. And I see this going on on a regular basis.

Q Thank you. I have one final brief question. You had mentioned a lot of things that you have done. Are you changing anything structurally to the front of your garden?

A Yes. Like I mentioned, I got estimates to cover my garden with cement so that we don't have this going on anymore. I don't
want rats making their homes in front of my doorstep.

So yeah, $I$ got estimates that will also furnish evidence that this is costly to us. It didn't used to be like this, and now we have to resort to costly solutions in order not to have the droppings, the rat droppings and the flies in front of my doorstep. Yeah.

MS. WILSON: And I'd like to make a motion to introduce the quote that he is talking about for the garden replacement of cement. It is in the tab labeled Professional Letters and Bills and is the last page on that tab. And it's a quote for $\$ 10,000$. And with that, $I$ have no further questions. Thank you.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Who's Carol

## Vaughn?

THE WITNESS: She's our treasurer at the building of the condo association.

MEMBER SHORT: Is that your address?
THE WITNESS: It's my address, 1811 Vernon Street.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: I mean, $I$ don't know what this is for. Okay. It says -- I mean I don't know what this is.

MS. WILSON: This is to demonstrate a financial burden on the neighbors because of the situation of increased --

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right. This is an estimate to remove and take away dirt, build new wall next to building on the left using concrete blocks, paint new block walls, put concrete where dirt was removed, remove actual fence, build a new wall right next to you.

I mean, it's an estimate. I don't know what the estimate is for. I mean it's not --

THE WITNESS: Okay. If it's not very clear, the garden in front of my doorstep has a wall that's about this tall. And so this is to continue that way and to cover the dirt in that garden with cement.

And then because of doing that then to follow District laws of keeping in the floor area of that, the newly placed floor, you have to put on a metal fence. So all of these things have to be created in order to remove that garden from there because otherwise I now have a nesting area for rats right at my doorstep.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: And so you just
-- you want to put this in evidence and say this is some cost that you --

MS. WILSON: It's a -- we want to enter it into evidence because the neighbors are at a point where they don't even want to have a garden.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Sorry. You can't do that.

MS. WILSON: Oh, I'm sorry.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Not you, ma'am. The witness is on the stand. Please do not have any conversation with the witness while the witness is on the stand. Okay? Go ahead, ma'am.

MS. WILSON: So as I was saying, this is an estimate because the neighbors are at a point where they don't want to have gardens where you can even have an option to have a rat burrow because the treatment, the abatement, the poison, it's not working.

So they are deciding to potentially rip up the garden, fill it with cement. And now that it's a walkway and enclosure you have to put a fence around it. And I don't believe it's been decided on. I believe they're taking it to the Board.

MS. WILSON: Yeah, we have to decide on that, but what this points out is that we are proactive in trying to do our part to eliminate where rats can live. It's a burden on us. It's a new burden. This was not the case before Lucky Buns was next door to us.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right. So do you have any objection, sir?

MR. McCOY: No, I'd just like to ask questions.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Okay. All right, fine. I'll move it to evidence.
(Whereupon, the above-referred to document was marked as Complainant Exhibit 4 for identification and received into evidence.)

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Yes, Mr. James.
MR. JAMES: Can we just have a check on the amount of time that the Protestants have used so far? Is that possible?

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right. She's not taking time, but I would say that we don't want to be here all night. So be mindful of your time. You can -- it's your opportunity, sir, to cross-examine.

MR. McCOY: Yes. Absolutely.

CROSS -EXAMINATION
BY MR. McCOY:
Q All right, Mr. Mirra. Do you remember when you and I met for the first time?

A I believe it's May. It was May.
Q It was not May.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right. He said -- hold on. You asked him a question. He said that he believed it was May. You can't say to him it's not May. You ask him. He tells you.

Then you either ask another question to clarify. Ask him if he's sure it's May. Could it have been some other time? But don't say it's not May. Okay?

MR. MIRRA: Okay.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: You are crossexamining him. And you don't watch TV? You don't see how they do it on TV?

MR. McCOY: That's why I own a restaurant because I'm not a lawyer. CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: No, but you don't have to be a lawyer. Everybody watches TV. There's so many lawyer shows on TV. You see all these lawyers on TV. They do a wonderful job in cross-examining witnesses. You don't watch TV?

MR. McCOY: Good thing I didn't go to law school. I'll tell you that much.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: You don't have to go to law school. None of them on TV went to law school. Okay. Go ahead, sir.

BY MR. McCOY:
Q Could -- do you remember it being possibly being towards the end of the summer, like more like I would say like July, August-ish? A No.

Q Okay. Well, do you remember what we talked about when I talked to you?

A Yes. You assured me that you were going to do many things you have not.

Q Did I offer you my phone number directly and say please call me if you notice anything that's, you know, not right? You can get to me directly, and that $I$ really do want to solve this problem for the neighbors.

A The issues that I pointed out to you in person at the meeting. Did you want me to -okay. No, I remember you giving me your phone number and asking me to contact you if you notice -- if I notice more irregularities. I didn't see that there were more. It was just a continuation
of the same.
Q Have you contacted me at all since then to let me know about any of this?

A Yes.
Q When did you contact me?
A September 4th. I have it written down, but it was immediately following one of the photos and videos that I took.

Q And what was my response?
A Your response was that you were having -- you were -- you had the permit to lower the cooler, and that was going to remedy many situations that we were experiencing. But that has not happened yet.

Q Do you acknowledge that I have paid for the cooler, that I have done work in the basement to move the walk-in cooler to the basement?

A Do I acknowledge that you've done that? I don't have any proof of that. The cooler is still there. I don't have proof of what you've spent or what you've done to remedy an illegal situation that you have a cooler outside on your patio. It shouldn't have been there, and I'm not the one to need to look into
that. It should have been you as the owner.
Q Do you remember me telling you that I would hold off on doing any work in your garden because once we move the walk-in cooler into the basement, then we were going to build a new fence? And once that fence is done, then the trash area will have plenty of space for trash.

A You know what? It's December now, and I've been living there and going through that every day.

Q Do you acknowledge that was the conversation?

A I acknowledge that. We're still dealing with things that you told me that would be taken care of by now.

Q Do you -- you mentioned that you were good friends with the prior business owners. Are you aware that those business owners are our landlords now?

A I didn't say I was their friends. They were more cooperative with us and they were much more proactive, and they solved situations with us.

Q Are you aware that they are my landlords?

A Yes.
Q Okay. Are you aware that they are in full support of us and feel that we have done what we can and paid the money to move all this in compliance with what the neighborhood needs. And do you know that they are fully supportive of what we're doing because they feel that we've been doing the right thing?

A Whether they're supportive or not, I am aware of what's in front of me. They're not here. The owner lives in New Jersey. He does not see what I see. So I'm not aware that they're in full support of what you're doing because I think that you're not doing much. And that would be a shame if they're in full support of that.

Q Are you aware that walk-in coolers exist in proximity to trash areas in hundreds of restaurants around the city?

A I am not aware of that, and I don't think you have the permit for that.

Q I'm just asking if you're aware or not.

A I am not aware of that, and you don't have the permit for that.

Q I'm just asking if you're aware of that.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Let's moved on. You have asked the question, sir. He has answered the question. Let's move on.

BY MR. McCOY:
Q Are you aware that the Department of Health has actually inspected the trash area with the walk-in cooler on it and has found no violations pertaining to the trash area or the walk-in cooler on the trash area?

A I am not aware of that.
Q Okay. Are you aware that, as I mentioned before, it is actually not against Department of Health code to have commercial walk-in coolers in proximity to trash in the District of Columbia?

A I am not aware of that.
Q Are you aware that when we clean our patio that the spray that we use does contain a biodegradable cleaning agent, and this is approved to clean patios and also get up grime and dirt and things like that?

A I'm aware of the result that is not clean. Whatever is used, I am aware of the
result that's left afterward that $I$ walk over every day, and it's not clean.

Q Are you aware that we clean twice a week aggressively? We pull everything out and clean that.

A No, I'm not aware of that, but I am aware of what it looks like on a daily basis.

Q Are you aware that our trash cans contain rat proof lids that latch down and lock in place?

A I would say no, not that I'm only not aware of it but that it's not the case. I have evidence that shows rat holes bitten through and them coming in and out of like we just showed you in the video.

Q Are you aware that looking at the picture, and especially Picture 15, you can actually see the rat proofing locks on top of the lids?

A For some reason, they might not respect those locks. I don't know.

Q But I'm just saying. Are you aware that we have changed our trash company, and there are new cans out there from a new provider?

A I've seen new cans that look like the
old cans that are made of plastic that are getting chewed through anyways, yes.

Q Are you aware that the cans have no holes of them?

A I am not aware of that. No.
Q Are you aware that these cans are approved cans for use around the city for commercial and residential use?

A No, I'm not aware of that.
Q Are you aware that rats -- that there are more food sources on this street other than just our patio?

A No. I would say no.
Q So are you saying that none of the other homes have trash areas? I don't --

A They have them in the back in the alley. That has nothing to do with the trash traffic that I see the rats going into your garbage and back.

Q Do you feel that it's not unreasonable to say that the rats can easily go back and eat and breed because of the trash in the backyard, which does have holes in it as well through the pictures that I showed, do you think it's unreasonable to think they're also feeding behind
your buildings as well as in my trash area?
A The difference is that --
Q That was my question.
A The difference is --
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Answer the question, sir.

THE WITNESS: The difference is that those garbage containers are in the back in an alleyway that's completely --

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Let him answer the question, sir. He's not done. Let him answer the question.

THE WITNESS: That alleyway is much like all of the city in which they have their garbage in an alleyway that's completely cemented over. It has nothing to do with people's front doors and where we open to our living rooms.

And I don't see the avenue of rat traffic going in front, where I step, where I sit going to your containers and back, going back and forth. No, it's not the same situation.

BY MR. McCOY:
Q Are you aware that Adams Morgan has had a rat problem for as long as you've lived there?

A Yes, absolutely, but it's not like this. It's changed since you've been there.

Q Okay. So are you saying that my trash area has made Adams Morgan rat infested now when it wasn't rat infested?

A It has complete -- I do because it's completely changed the reality in which I live. There are many more rats and burrows that we never had before, and I watch them.

I watch them and I film them going straight to your garbage area and coming back, running across my property, going up the street and back down going to your food source.

Q Do you as a neighbor when you were living next to the previous business, did you have this problem with rats as you do now?

A No.
Q Would you say then that by moving the walk-in cooler to the basement and increasing more trash cans in that trash area that that would solve the problem?

A I would say it would probably worsen it.

Q So you're saying that the problem that didn't exist before, by reverting it back to the
original plan would be worse of a problem?
A The reason being is that you produce so much more food and you share that trash area with another restaurant, which creates an enormous amount of food garbage, which was not the situation before.

And the cooperation with the establishment was very different from what you had given to the neighborhood. There are there two realities, one that was manageable before and the new one with your restaurant that is not admissible anymore.

Q So --
A It is very disturbing to live there. You don't live there, and I do. I see this on a daily basis.

Q So what you're saying is that the two businesses that share this trash area right now, that the inspector in his report noticed that there was no problems with the trash area, no rodents at all, by tripling the volume of trash cans and as it is manageable or what you would argue is barely manageable, you're saying that by tripling the volume to put trash in, that's going to make the problem worse?

A I'm not saying that. I'm saying that with the level of garbage that you produce, this has gotten worse. I can only attest to what I've seen by living there before Lucky Buns and during Lucky Buns.

And there's been a huge change in the cleanliness of our sidewalk, in the looks and maintenance of that entire area, in the care and consideration that you have put forth, which has not been any and the resistance to us and that accusations to us.

This was not the relationship we had with them before. And it is worse. Our reality of the rat problem and of the cleanliness on our sidewalk is entirely different.

Q Do you want the walk-in cooler removed?

A Yes.
Q Do you want the fence repaired?
A Yes.
Q Do you want the trash area reverted back to the way it was before?

A I don't know what the solution is going to be about that trash, but what I will tell you is that I wasn't aware prior to this and
in looking into the permits, we weren't aware that there was an inconsistency between what was written in the permit and what was mapped out giving you this authority to have garbage next to our doorstep.

It was something that we just dealt with before and we tackled on with the previous ownership, but then we discovered that there was the inconsistency by looking into these things. And we've furnished those in our evidence, so this is a different situation now.

Q I just have one last question. Is that area currently DDOT approved or not?

A I have no idea.
Q I mean I do, but that's --
A The thing is, $I$ know for a fact that there's a license that says not to have the garbage there, and there's a map that shows an area for garbage.

So you know what? There's also an ABRA, what is it, the AS, the agreement settlement that we have with you that insists that you keep the area clean and orderly.

And you don't do that, so when you said earlier that you have no infringements and
no -- nothing against your ABRA permit, that's wrong. I see it all the time. You do not keep that area clean and orderly. It's not. The photos show it. You can walk through there, and you see it. It's not.

Q Are you aware -- I understand your opinion of things, but are you aware that we have no ABRA violations pertaining to the trash?

A There was an inspector that failed to see the holes in the garbage cans and no signs of vermin, and I've shown you that there are regular signs of vermin. So I can't attest to that.

Q I'm just asking if you're aware or no that there are no violations.

A I'm aware that there are violations.
Q But they're not. Okay. That was my last question.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right.
Thank you. Let me ask a question. Is either in your PIP or in the Protestant's PIP, is there a copy of the DDOT permit?

MR. McCOY: Yes, I have it.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Where is that? Where's the DDOT permit? Who has it?

MR. McCOY: I have it right here. If
you like, I can --
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: I'm saying is
it disclosed in the Protestant? Is it in the Protestant's PIP? Yeah, the DDOT permit we're talking about. Is that in your PIP?

MS. WILSON: I don't think we submitted the permit.

MR. IRANI: It's on the PIP, but we have it here.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: I'm sorry. It's what?

MR. IRANI: It's not -- I don't believe it's --

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Do you have that? Did you disclose that in your PIP, sir?

MR. McCOY: Yes, I did.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right.
MS. WILSON: The whole permit, not the drawing.

MR. McCOY: Yes. The data, permit and certificate of use.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right.
MS. WILSON: There's a difference. I just want to clarify.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right.

What I'm going to do is that I'm going to accept -- it's probably -- that document probably is in our records, however, but $I$ don't have it in front of me, but yes, ma'am.

MS. WILSON: I just want to clarify. I want to ensure that if you're going to accept his permit, it's my understanding that he is just going to submit the drawing.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: I did not ask for the drawing. This is the question I asked for. The question $I$ asked for, in the PIP that was not timely disclosed, is the DDOT permit a part of that disclosure, because in order for him to have a -- because I'm trying to figure it.

In order for him to have a sidewalk -the sidewalk café is on -- does this DDOT permit, does it also cover the sidewalk café?

MR. McCOY: Correct.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right.
MS. WILSON: That's what the permit's for.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right. So we should have that in our records, but there's really not one here for me to look at. So if that document is part of the disclosure, then $I$
will allow that in evidence, the DDOT permit.
MR. IRANI: The permit here, should I email it?

MR. McCOY: I have the permit right here in paper.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right. Can you show him the permit? Is this the same document? Show him the permit. It was not disclosed by -- that's what I'm trying to find out if he disclosed. That's what I was trying to figure out.

MEMBER SHORT: Did he submit it?
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Yes, he did. It was late, Mr. Short. I'm just trying to see if it's there. I'm sorry. Is that the same document? That's the permit? Okay.

I know that in order to use a sidewalk café, it's in our records, but I'm going to allow him to -- although it was not timely, I'm going to allow him to submit that. So I want to see that document. What exhibit is that?

MR. McCOY: That is under mine at -let me pull this up. It is the II and JJ on ours.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Have you
located that?
MR. McCOY: Let me get the actual. I have the drawing the COU. I don't have the other --

MS. WILSON: He doesn't have -- right.
MR. IRANI: He doesn't have the permit.

MS. WILSON: So he has the drawing as I mentioned, but he doesn't actually have the --

MEMBER SHORT: Does that have a city seal on it, that map?

MR. IRANI: I have the actual permit, the drawing, everything.

MEMBER SHORT: Until I see one with a raised seal on it, approved and stamped by the Agency.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Well, hold on a minute. Just hold up, Mr. Short. That's all I wanted. Okay. What is it that you're saying that you have, sir?

MR. IRANI: I just have -- Alex has said that he has the certificate of use and the site plan but not the actual permit. We're saying that $I$ have the documents he's holding plus the actual permit in a PDF, and I'd be happy
to email it to you.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right.
MR. McCOY: So can I clarify?
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: We're off the record.
(Whereupon, the above-entitled matter went off the record at 10:19 p.m. and resumed at 10:26 p.m.)

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Okay, Mr.
Mirra?
THE WITNESS: Yes.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: How long have you been living in this --

THE WITNESS: For six years.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: For six years?
THE WITNESS: Yes.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: And how long ago did this restaurant open up?

THE WITNESS: Two years ago.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Two years ago. So where did -- what restaurant was in the -- was at the location prior to this restaurant?

THE WITNESS: It was called Café L'Enfant.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: And where did
they store their trash?
THE WITNESS: In that enclosed area, that same enclosed area, but there was no outdoor fridge there. There were fewer bins, and there was less trash. They were a café.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right. So, but the same space was used for trash. However, there was less trash. Is that what you're saying?

THE WITNESS: Correct. Yes.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: And so this is actually a more successful restaurant in the sense that they have more business?

THE WITNESS: Yes. It has much more traffic. The capacity has changed. I believe they did work inside to change the format of their kitchen or whatnot or they pulled out the fridge in order to have more capacity.

So yes, they produce much more food, and they expanded the outside café. It's my understanding that they've enlarged the seating area and placed planters actually beyond what was permitted.

When I spoke to Mr. Garrett at DOT, he noticed that the area of the seating, the patio
area with the planters was protruding beyond what was -- what had been approved. So yes, there have been changes made in order to increase the capacity way beyond what there used to be.

MR. McCOY: I object to that. That is not true.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Sir?
MR. McCOY: Sorry. I just --
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Sir, I'm asking questions.

MR. McCOY: I'm sorry. It's just --
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: You've had your opportunity. Sir, this is --

MR. McCOY: I'm sorry. I apologize. I just --

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: We're the ones that should be upset --

MR. McCOY: I know.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: -- because we've been here since 9 o'clock this morning.

MR. McCOY: I know.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: You guys just got here at 6:30 this afternoon, okay. And we are calm, cool and collected, and we have been working here since 9 o'clock this afternoon.

MR. McCOY: I know. I understand. I'm sorry.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: So if we can sit up here and we are giving you the patience to listen to what you have to say, you can do the same --

MR. McCOY: Okay. I'm sorry. I apologize.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: -- because as I said before, we've been here since 9 o'clock this morning, and we are all here with a smile on our face and we all are paying attention to what's going on.

MR. McCOY: You're absolutely right.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: So I expect that from you, sir. All right. Now the pictures that we just saw, when were these pictures taken?

THE WITNESS: Starting late last year into May maybe, yeah, starting -- over several months.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Starting when?
THE WITNESS: Yeah, about May.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: May of 2018 or
'19?
this year, yeah.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: The problem I'm having, were you here when our investigator testified?

THE WITNESS: Yes, I saw him.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: You saw the pictures the investigator showed?

THE WITNESS: Yes.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: How is it that our investigator went to the establishment, and I'm looking at the report from the investigator. Where is that? Okay. I'm looking at Exhibit 11, 12 from our investigator. Our investigator also testified that he observed the property. He went to property on several occasions.

THE WITNESS: I have the photos with dates on them in my phone.

MEMBER SHORT: Ma'am, you can't do that.

THE WITNESS: But I'm just showing him

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: No.
MEMBER SHORT: But you can't do that. You can't approach him while you're --

THE WITNESS: Can $I$ give it to them to
show him?
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Here. Give it to him, but you can't walk up to the witness. THE WITNESS: I'm sorry. I apologize. CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: I know this process is --

THE WITNESS: It's new to all of us. CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: But it's not that informal, okay. All right.

THE WITNESS: If we need --
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Hold on. All right. Our investigator went October 6th, Sunday, October 10th, Thursday, October 13th, October 19th, October 15th, October 16th, October 22nd.

And the first time he went was 11:50 p.m. to 12:30, 3:15 p.m. to 3:30, 1:00 a.m. to 1:30, 10:30 to 11:30 p.m., 11:30 p.m. to 12:00 a.m., 1:45 to 3:00 a.m., 4:45 to 5:10. So he has gone there different times over different days. And this was as of October. So how is it that you're showing these pictures. He went there, and he saw something differently in the sense that he stated that the trash area was clean with cans shut and no visible signs of
vermin.
So he went there in October, and this is what he saw. So why is that this is what was presented to the Board from our investigator in October, which is completely different from what you're providing?

THE WITNESS: Yes. I believe it's different, but it has a totally different degree of detail. And he doesn't spend hours there like I do. My photos are over that time period, before and after and between those visits.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: But I hear you, but I guess what I'm saying, and I'm not saying I disbelieve you. If our investigator went there for a week, different times and he's not seeing anything that you saw, so is it that you took those photos, it was in that way last year in May, but there were changes made as of October? This doesn't exist anymore? That's what I'm asking because that $I$ don't know.

THE WITNESS: Sure. And my answer is that the garbage is still there, and the rats are still there and the uncleanliness is still on the sidewalk and odors and flies and rat droppings are still there.

So whether he noticed the rat holes in the garbage cans or not, he didn't write that he saw any signs of vermin. But during his visits, I have photos with time stamps on them from when they were taken during that same week with rat holes bitten through the plastic containers. And with that level of traffic of rats comes all of the other things that I've described.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Where are these? Are they in the record? Were they disclosed? Which ones are these?

MS. WILSON: So they're all the same pictures. We --

MR. IRANI: If I may, I can point out some of the images and give you dates. So October 17th, Images 17 through 21 in the binder of the tabbed photos.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: I'm sorry. Which ones were -- that was under the photos?

MR. IRANI: Under photos.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: So you're saying image what?

MR. IRANI: Images 17 through 21 was taken on October 17th. On October 16th, I mean there's --

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: This is October 17th.

MR. IRANI: Yes.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Do you have any pictures that were taken October 6th, October 10th, 13th, 19th, 15th, 16th or 22nd?

MR. IRANI: I have the 16th. Of those dates, $I$ have the 16th.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Which one is the 16th, image what?

MR. IRANI: 26. And that would coincide with the yellow bucket that's in one of the inspector's photos as well.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: And what time was this taken?

MR. IRANI: I'd have to look that up. Let me see, Image 26. It's this one, right?

THE WITNESS: Yeah.
MR. IRANI: So if go here, 1:26 a.m.
MR. McCOY: May I make a comment?
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: No, sir. I'm just asking a question.

MR. McCOY: Sorry.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: I'm just
comparing our -- the information from our
investigator and then the investigation of the picture.

MR. McCOY: It just pertains to that. There's no trash there. It's actually --

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: I'm asking different questions. The question I asked -- I'm not saying if there was trash there or not.

MR. McCOY: Because there's a trash bag, so it makes it looks like it's trash.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: I don't know, sir. The only question that I asked --

MR. IRANI: It looks very messy. You're right.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Hold on, please. Hold on, sir. Hold on. The only question $I$ asked is there an image that was taken the same day as the investigator went. That is the only thing.

I am not making any type of conclusion what is or isn't there. All I'm trying to do is try to compare because what's been -- our investigator went on several occasions.

And our investigator said that, and these are all different times. And our investigator said from his perspective,
everything was okay. All right?
And I'm hearing a witness who lives there is painting a different picture. And so one of the questions I asked, when were these pictures taken. If these pictures were taken, maybe this is what the place looked like a year ago.

But maybe as of October when our investigator went there, it changed. So now I'm being shown a picture that was taken on October 16 at -- October 16th. And you're saying that picture was taken at?

MR. IRANI: It says date stamp 1:26 a.m.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: And our investigator was there October 16th at 1:45.

MEMBER SHORT: A.m. or p.m.?
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: A.m., which is 20 minutes after you took your picture.

MR. IRANI: It's October 16.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Oh, I'm sorry. It says November. Okay. No, so there's no -I'm sorry. We don't have any -- I apologize. So this is November. So there's no dates. You don't have any pictures from any dates that the
investigator went there?
MR. IRANI: No, but I picked out some pictures that are within a couple days before and after.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: But it's not the same day, so I'm just curious why is it that what our investigator -- so one of the pictures that we have that's taken -- from the pictures that were shown, what pictures do we have that -do we have any pictures outside of this one that was taken in October of this year, October 2019? Do we have pictures that were taken from October 19th forward?

MR. IRANI: 19th?
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Yes, from -because our investigator went there in October. So do you have any pictures that were disclosed of the condition of the property as of October 2019?

MR. IRANI: Oh, yeah. Yes. So if you go to -- well, I'm going to point out --

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: I don't need you to point out.

MR. IRANI: Okay.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All I need you
to do, answer the question.
MR. IRANI: Then I'll just tell you.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: No. The question I asked you, if you have a picture, show me a picture. If you have a picture that was taken --

MR. IRANI: In October 2019?
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: From October 2016 subsequent to now because the question is that maybe we had all these issues, and maybe he could have rectified him. But the picture that you're showing me -- all right.

Mr. Mirra, how often is the trash -in your estimation, how often is the trash removed?

THE WITNESS: I'm not there all the time to see it removed. I hear that it's daily.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: He says that trash is removed daily.

THE WITNESS: So I would trust that it is, but what $I$ see until it's removed is that very often it stockpiles and that it overflows from their bins.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: But the trash is removed daily?

THE WITNESS: I don't know. I can't attest to that, but 1 believe --

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Sir, I mean come on. You live there. This is a place that always has trash spewing. You should be able to tell me whether or not the truth is removed daily because you live there.

You're complaining about all the other issues. He says he removes the trash daily, and so maybe if it's not being -- I don't know what the Board is going to do. But the Board can say because of the volume of trash, maybe he needs to have twice a day pickup.

I don't know. So because you live there and you're asking -- and I don't know what the solution is. I don't know what it is because the difference I'm hearing is that the restaurant that was there before utilized the same space.

It appears this is a much more successful restaurant, so yes, they have more trash. So if they have more trash, how is it that if -- and I know that ABRA can't suspend a license.

THE WITNESS: Sure.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Okay. So it's
either we're going to renew the license, or we're going to revoke his license. And you're asking for suspension, so we can't suspend it. Okay.

So what we can -- we can order to say this is what you have to do, or we can say that we're not going to renew your license and revoke it. Those are our options.

THE WITNESS: Yes.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Or we can renew it with conditions. So he's saying that his trash has been picked up every day and I'm asking you because if you live there, sir, you should notice that okay, there's sometimes I come home and there's no trash or there's -- or you can say the trash is there 24/7.

THE WITNESS: No. There are times when the trash is not there, yes, and there are times when it's overflowing. So I believe him when he says that it's removed every day. I just don't have it in my head when it happens, and it might happen at different times of the day. I'm not sure.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right. So because you live there, how it is that you believe, in your view, how can this problem be
solved? And since I've now established that the previous restaurant, they had their trash there, too, but because it's a more successful restaurant, there's a lot more trash.

So how is it that you believe that -how do you believe that this can be remedied?

THE WITNESS: Personally, knowing that there's going to be more trash generated and that their plan is to have more bins there, I can only imagine to have the trash picked up more often.

So if that means twice a day, I would say okay. Let's start by that. When we came across the inconsistency in the licenses, we realized that there was a part that said it wasn't allowed to have -- they weren't allowed to have garbage there.

And so if, there was no presence of garbage there, then that would eliminate the food source for the rats and the uncleanliness of having trash there and having trash picked up there at this level because at this level of trash production, the times that the trash pickup removes and takes the garbage out is what's dirtying the sidewalk.

And they're not managing that. So two
separate things. There's the rats, but there's also the trash management.

So if they're not keeping the sidewalk clean, even if they're having twice a day pickup, if they're not cleaning and they're not being conscientious about being a neighbor on a residential street, $I$ don't know what else to ask them but to follow those rules that are in their agreement, their settlement agreement that they're supposed to be respecting now which is keeping that whole area clean.

The fence is in total disarray. It's broken in areas, and they haven't bothered to fix it. So I don't know what else to suggest. I wish that trash area wasn't next to our doorstep.

And then I found a permit saying that they can have their patio but no trash there, so of course $I$ looked at that and said wait a minute. There's an inconsistency here, so I would love that trash not to be there at all.

It's next to our doorstep, but if they're going to have to keep that trash there, then it has to be kept clean, which they haven't done. And it has to be picked up more often and totally different than what they're doing
currently.
MEMBER SHORT: Mr. Chair, can I please ask that he put that back one screen? I think that would clear up everything because apparently there's some disinformation that we've been accepting.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Well --
MEMBER SHORT: This deed says 2011 to 2012, renewed annually, and he's submitting that to us for 2019?

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: No, Mr. Short.
MEMBER SHORT: Okay. I understand.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Mr. Short, he's not the one who gave this to us.

MEMBER SHORT: I understand.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: I got that from a Protestant. Okay. I do not know --

MEMBER SHORT: The one you had on the screen, it becomes a lot clearer and I really think it would clear up a lot of things.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Now Mr. Short, this is a permit.

MEMBER SHORT: That's for 2011.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Mr. Short, this is a permit that's on the screen.

MEMBER SHORT: So we accept a permit that's supposed to be done annually for 2011? CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: I don't know. MEMBER SHORT: Where's 2019?

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Hold on, Mr. Short. I don't know where that is, okay. The question that we're here, and I mean we just have the question where people are talking about permits.

And I said well, the permit in the record. The only permit that we're discussing that's on the screen that's here is a permit that's dated 3/21/2012. It says this permit expires in 2012.

I'm not familiar with -- I have a permit that sidewalk café that expired in 2013. I'm not going to say I'm familiar with the DDOT permitting system.

MEMBER SHORT: Can I say that I am?
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Mr. Short?
MEMBER SHORT: I worked for the government for 33 years.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Mr. Short, please sir.

MEMBER SHORT: I know. I understand.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Please, let me finish.

MEMBER SHORT: Yes, sir.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All I'm saying
-- I'm saying I am not stating that I'm familiar with the DDOT permitting system. I will find out when the Board issues whatever decision the Board will issue, $I$ do not know off the top of my head how often, whether or not -- when in order to operate a sidewalk café if we need to have a currently permit. I don't know that off the top of my head.

THE WITNESS: Sure.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: But by the time we -- when the decision is written, that will be there, okay.

THE WITNESS: Okay.
MEMBER SHORT: Can I please ask? It's one thing.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Yes, Mr. Short. MEMBER SHORT: Can I see that, please? Thank you.

THE WITNESS: The presence of the garbage is what causes --

MEMBER SHORT: Please, sir.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: What's the question you want to ask, Mr. Short?

MEMBER SHORT: It's not a question. If you look at --

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: It has to be a question because he's under cross-examination. So that's why.

MEMBER SHORT: Okay. Then I'll ask him, if he were permitted a copy of this, I want him to read the third from the bottom star.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Who are you asking?

MEMBER SHORT: I'm asking him to read the question. That's my question to him. The question is no trash may be stored on or adjacent to the sidewalk café. No trash enclosure may be adjacent to the sidewalk café.

So what are we talking about? Look at third from the bottom. I read it when it was on the screen very briefly. And then on here, again it says --

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right.
Okay.
MEMBER SHORT: Either it is or isn't.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right.

MR. McCOY: I don't want to interrupt, but I have an email from Ellie Garrett talking about repairing the trash area.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: That's not relevant for the moment. That's not where we are, okay. Irrespective of whether or not -this is -- let me clarify for the record and state.

Irrespective of what the permit says, the sidewalk is stated, it appears that this restaurant and the restaurant prior to this have always stored their garbage at the same place.

So whether or not this establishment is compliant with the law, the other establishment was not compliant with the law because the trash was in the same place.

The only difference that we have now is that it's a volume of trash because this restaurant is producing more trash. That's the only difference. That's my reason I had asked Mr. Mirra where was the other restaurant storing their trash. And the trash was being stored in the same place. It's just there's a different volume.

THE WITNESS: Volume and then their
cleanliness with the sidewalk and their care for the area.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right.
Okay. So we're going to move on from the sidewalk café, and what we'll -- we're going to move on from this issue. And as I stated before, whenever the Board issued -- whatever the decision the Board issues, then we'll address this in an issue.

If there's a sidewalk café, then it needs to be -- it's going to -- I'm going to make sure that whatever decision it is, it will be addressed. Okay. All right.

I don't have any other questions for you. Does anyone else have a question for the witness? All right. So all right, Mr. Mirra. Thank you very much for your testimony. You can step down.

THE WITNESS: Thank you, Board.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right. Do you have another witness?

MS. WILSON: We do, sir. We would like to call Lorrie Clark to the stand, and I promise we will do our best to keep this brief.

MR. IRANI: Image 16 is the most
recent image we have, and that's November 11th, taken at 9:30 in the morning.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right. Ms.
Clark, I see you just went up there with a big stack of documents.

MS. CLARK: This is, I'm not--
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: You have to take that big stack of documents right back there, ma'am. And you can't have any documents with you. So raise your right hand, please.

Do you swear or affirm to tell the truth and nothing but the truth? All right. Thanks. Have a seat. Pull the microphone next to you. Your witness, please.

THE WITNESS: First of all, would anybody like some chocolate?

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: No, thank you, but all right.

THE WITNESS: Okay. We have a bag there, and I'm happy to share. CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Okay. Go ahead. WHEREUPON, LORRIE CLARK was called as a witness by Counsel for the

Complainant and, having been first duly sworn, assumed the witness stand, was examined and testified as follows:

DIRECT EXAMINATION
BY MS. WILSON:
Q Lorrie, can you please introduce yourself and where you live?

A Sure. I'm Lorrie Clark. I live at 1813 Vernon Street NW, which is on the same side of the street as Lucky Buns. There's Lucky Buns. There's the Vernon House condo 1811, where Marcus lives, and I'm immediately adjacent to that.

I've lived in that house for 20 years, and I'm basically here today because of the dramatic increase in rat activity I've seen, and I am going to talk about it from a different problems and issues than what Marcus talked about.

Q Right. So we won't go through pictures. We know that there's kind of rat burrows in 1811. Can you describe what practices you yourself have done to address the rat issues that you're experiencing?

A Is it possible to put the picture of the house because I think it helps clarify?

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Ma'am, you're the witness. Questions are being asked of you. You answer the question if you're able to answer the question. If not --

BY MS. WILSON:
Q So I will clarify. Can you quickly just describe your house and the landscape and the front yard?

A My house is 16 feet, 1 inch across. On the front of my house, $I$ have five rat stations, and these are the super duper rat stations. They have snap traps in them as well as poison.

I have two exterminator services. One comes every other week and starting in the spring when the activity in the café, the sidewalk café increased dramatically. There's more people out there.

There's more food out there, major increase in rat activity. We catch on average two to five. Now remember, $I$ have five stations. So in that case, every one is full.

They are actually caught in the snap trap. That's not counting rats that catch the poison in there. I also have another
exterminator service. And I have spent in 2019 a little over $\$ 3,500$ on exterminators.

Q Lorrie, can you clarify what your discussions have been with your exterminator about the problem that they are seeing and the frequency of what they're catching?

A Yes. The exterminator that comes every other week has basically said this is the first time we've had significant burrows in my front yard and that he puts tracking powder down the burrows.

We cover it, and the burrows reappear and I get new burrows. He said the problem will not go away or be significantly reduced as long as there's the immediate food source. And the only immediate food source is Lucky Buns' trash, which is two houses away. And you see the rats run across my front yard, Marcus' front yard to the trash and then come back. And now they're digging in my whole. And there's a safety issue in that. I have to walk up a set of stairs to get into my house, and almost every night a rat runs in front of me, terrifies me. I scream.

I'm afraid of getting bit, and I and
various other people have almost fallen off the steps because a rat runs right in front of you, runs up your handrail where you have your hand, runs across your foot. I scream. I'm almost falling backwards. That is a safety issue.

MS. WILSON: At this point, I'd like a motion to introduce the evidence on the Professional Letters and Bills tab.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: What professional, what's that?

MS. WILSON: I'm sorry. So in the binder, there's a tab indicating professional letters and bills. And I would like to -- a motion to introduce a letter from Lorrie's exterminator.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Well, why don't you? All right.

MS. WILSON: I just want to --
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Ask her what it is.

MS. WILSON: Okay. I'm sorry. Can you discuss what your exterminator said?

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: No. Show her this letter and ask her to identify it.

MS. WILSON: Oh, I'm sorry.

BY MS. WILSON:
Q Do you recognize this notice?
A Yes, I do.
Q Can you explain what it is, please?
A It's a letter from my best company that comes twice a month acknowledging that when they come, they've seen a dramatic increase in the rat activity, that they on average catch two to four rats, again, in a maximum of five traps every two weeks and that in their professional opinion that the situation doesn't call for more traps or more bait in my yard. As long as there's a food source, I'm going to have this rat problem.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: So you want to move this into evidence. Do you have any objection, sir?

MR. McCOY: Mm-mmm.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: So moved?
(Whereupon, the above-referred to document was marked as Complainant Exhibit 5 for identification and received into evidence.)

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: What's the other one?

MS. WILSON: Okay. And then the other
one I would like to just pull out what looks like an Excel spreadsheet. Can you clarify what this is?

THE WITNESS: Yes.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Where is that document?

MS. WILSON: It's in the same tab. It is two back, the second to the last page, and it has dates, costs.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Ask her to identify it.

MS. WILSON: Can you identify that, please?

THE WITNESS: Sure. It's an Excel spreadsheet I made based on the other documents that are attached, that are screen shots from my checking account showing payments to my two exterminator services.

And what I did was put in every payment I've made for rat-related treatment from January 1, 2019 through my payment on December 6th, which it's coming out of my checking account. And it totaled $\$ 3,500$ and something. MS. WILSON: Thank you.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Do you have an
objection, sir?
MR. McCOY: Nope.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: So moved. All right.
(Whereupon, the above-referred to document was marked as Complainant Exhibit 6 for identification and received into evidence.)

BY MS. WILSON:
Q Okay. Lorrie, I mean you have a beautiful garden. We've seen your landscape. Do you have anybody who works in your garden? Do you maintain that yourself?

A No. I have a professional gardener who has repeatedly told that there's problems in there. The rats are chewing through the roots of my plants, including a tree that's been there almost as long as I've been, 20 years.

And the tree is at first, that the smell of rat urine is so bad that it's a health hazard to her and to anybody else walking in the house. Also, she takes care of the burrows.

She covers them over. She fills in any holes in the wall or cracks that we have that rats can hide in. And her position is that she is considering not working on my garden anymore
because of the threat to her health from doing this.

She has also chopped all my plants a foot and a half off the ground a foot and a half down, a foot and a half off the ground so that we can see when the rats are running through and keep track of them, a foot and a half down, again sight lines so we can see things because I have kind of a tiered garden and that my plants are likely to die because of this aggressive chopping.

But again, $I$ had it professionally put in and maintained for 18 or so years.

Q I'd like to draw your attention to the second document in that same time, right after the pest letter. Lorrie, can you identify this for us, please?

A Yes. It's an email that my professional gardener sent to me basically saying that she's considering not continuing to work on the garden because of the rat problem and that she's seen them in the daytime because she's only there during the day time.

MS. WILSON: Thank you. I would like to make a motion to introduce this as evidence
please.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Any objection, sir?

MR. McCOY: Nope.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: So moved.
(Whereupon, the above-referred to document was marked as Complainant Exhibit 7 for identification and received into evidence.)

BY MS. WILSON:
Q Okay. Lorrie, do you have any house sitters? Do you have anybody else who lives in your residence besides yourself?

A I have a basement apartment, which is currently vacant. The reason I was not a protester here is that I was out of the country for three months during a big part of this period.

And my friend, who is sitting in the audience, Jason Campbell, housesat for me. And he got the unpleasant task two consecutive days in a row of disposing of dead rat bodies that were on my sidewalk, which is not a typical occurrence.

These are small rats that had been poisoned presumably from my bait stations, and it
was in between the twice a month service. Mr. Campbell, my friend who's my house sitter also the night before I left the three months, we had an experience that still gives me nightmares.

I've never seen anything like this. We had literally dozens of rats swarming around my sidewalk, on my personal sidewalk, excuse me. And they were fighting.

They were screaming, and it just went on for an extended period of time. He was about to leave my house. He couldn't leave because we were afraid they were either going to trip him because the activity was so great, or he was going to get bitten.

We went to the second floor of my house, looked down, saw it again, walked down to the first floor. And he went out the back alley of my house, which we've all acknowledged that's where the trash from most of the street is stored.

It's rat problems there because it was safer for him to go out the back than the front of the house.

MS. WILSON: I have no further questions.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Any questions, sir?

MR. McCOY: Yes.
CROSS -EXAMINATION
BY MR. McCOY:
Q How you doing?
A Hi, Mr. McCoy.
Q Thank you so much for the chocolate by the way.

A That's my role in life.
Q There you go. Have you and I ever had a conversation before?

A I don't believe so.
Q Have you ever come over to the restaurant or contacted me with any issues to try to explain what's going on with the hopes that we could help you work through this problem?

A No, but I am part of the neighborhood association, and $I$ know that $I$ was in touch. I was not out of touch while $I$ was out of the country for three months.

I was getting the emails, and to be fully honest about this, $I$ was the person who in beginning of May said this is unbelievable the problems I have. I'm sending out an email to
everybody I have email addresses for on Vernon Street saying am I the only one.

Am I seeing this? So I started the most recent action to take care of this problem in May of this year.

Q Did -- oh, I'm sorry. Go ahead.
A And I've done this in the past.
Q Did you include Lucky Buns or any of the owners or any landlords in any of the conversations?

A No, but I didn't exclude them. I just didn't have your email address, and so we met out in front of your restaurant. We walked around the front of the houses. We walked in the back alley, and we identified burrows and problems.

And we said, you know, we'd contact me. And again, division of labor. You know, there's other people on the street that I'm working with and contacting the city, which Ashley on our behalf did on this.

Q Did you have any issue with the trash area prior to us moving in?

A No. As my neighbor, immediate neighbor Marcus explained, it was a very different situation. There wasn't overflowing
trash. You know, occasionally, and I mean very occasionally you'd see a rat go in there.

We'd call the owners of the previous restaurant, and they'd say okay, we're going to do this and this. And I'd say we're going to do this and this. And we'd send out an email, and we addressed it. This time we can't address it. We can't get on top of the problem.

Q So you said yourself that if there's a problem you usually just contact the previous owners, have a conversation with them and it would usually get fixed. Correct?

A I knew them.
Q Okay.
A Because as you may be aware, they had an annual event.

Q They had a big party, yeah.
A They had Bastille Day, and they put the stage right in front of my front walk, so I couldn't get out the house. And they were good neighbors so, you know, they were a good neighbor.

I'm a good neighbor. We let it happen. They put all kinds of trash. I mean all kinds of trash came on my front yard when it
happened. They moved it. The next morning my yard looked pristine.

They fixed a fence that somebody trampled on, so yeah, I knew them. I saw them in the street. I waved. I knew them. I'm sorry, you know, I haven't met you before. And again, when the most action was happening, that's why you haven't seen me at the hearings before. I was out of the country.

Q Understandable. When -- as I was discussing with the protesters the steps we were taking to move the walk-in to the basement, replacing the fence, the timeline, was any of the information ever passed on to you in terms of what we were actually getting done or planning to do so you would be updated on exactly what was going on with that trash area?

A My neighbors did a good job of keeping me updated. I was on my email. They forwarded any of the email chains. It may have taken an extra day for me because of the time difference, again being in Eastern Europe.

But I looked at them. I sent them emails. I asked questions. So I was in the loop. I just wasn't physically present.

Q So are you aware --
A And also, my house sitter, Jason, you know, when he shoveled the rats off my front step, he sent me nice, charming pictures one day and then the next day.

Q So are you aware that we have already finished digging out the basement? Are you aware that we have already paid for the new walk-in cooler, and are you aware that once that cooler is installed on the 17th, which I have a confirmation of, that we are going to build a new fence around the trash area?

A What I'm aware of is this issue was brought up. And I know you were aware of it at least at the beginning of June because $I$ have the emails from you on this.

So that's six months ago, and the refrigerator is still there. I don't know your plans. I don't know whether they're going to happen. You know, best intentions often fall through.

Q Yeah. Are you aware that in order to do these in the city, in the District of Columbia, it's not like you can just call someone and then it gets done?

Are you aware that you have to go to DCRA? You have to get permitting. The plans need to be approved, and then that work needs to be approved as well. And every step of the way, the city needs to approve individual steps.

And those things take time, especially when you're dealing with custom units, when you're dealing with digging out a basement. Are you aware that those things do take time, and they're not immediate?

A I, for 30 years, have been a regulatory lawyer working with a federal agency. We've made -- I know timeframes. And I know that things can take longer, but $I$ also know that there's often a chance to expedite it. And this, to me, seems to be taking longer than it should.

Q Fair enough. It seems like it's taking longer than it should. If I were to show you documents which show that we've actually done everything exactly the way it should be done and we followed the timeline that we're basically being held to, would you change your opinion of that?

A If you tell me that you're putting in the -- moving the refrigerator into the basement

-     - 

Q If I show you the invoices, all that.
A -- and your license and I don't understand all the details because I am not an ABRA attorney, it's conditioned on your accomplishing that, then I'm --

Q If I were to show you --
A -- comfortable with if you satisfy the condition, that issue is off the table.

Q If I were to show you the prepaid invoices that show that we've paid for all of this, all these units, the emails that show that when they're going to be delivered as well as you can come down to the basement and see the dig out. If you've seen --

A Will I see a rat?
Q What's that?
A Will I see a rat when I go down there?
Q You'll never see a rat because we've never been cited for a rat on our property.

A No, but you've had a Yelp review from six days ago.

Q You mean the neighbor?
A The person described themselves as no longer living in D.C.

Q No, it was a neighbor. They --
A They were describing actually seeing rats.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Hold on. BY MR. McCOY:

Q I'll get to that actually in my closing statement. I'm glad you brought that up, the neighbor that wrote a Yelp review.

A And you responded to acknowledging that there was --

Q I acknowledged that they were a neighbor and they were part of the protest.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right. You're asking questions, sir.

MR. McCOY: But that's just a very --
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: You ask her questions.

MR. McCOY: Yes.

## CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: You're just

 asking the question. You're not giving an answer.MR. McCOY: If we were to -- would it be unrealistic to say that as the current trash, the volume, right, so I disagree with your assessment, the assessment of the trash area from
the summer. And granted, there have been some days where things haven't been great.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right. Is there a question, sir?

MR. McCOY: Yes. Absolutely.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right. I'm going to allow you to do this entire time.

MR. McCOY: I have one question and that's it.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: You can ask whatever question you need to ask, but I don't need you to front load it by testifying. MR. McCOY: Okay. CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: If you ask her a question, ask her a question. BY MR. McCOY:

Q Do you feel that with the change in having new trash cans brought in, by removing the walk-in, which will then triple the amount of space that we can keep trash, would that make you feel better about the use of the trash area, if we hold onto a two times per week cleaning schedule, working with the ANC?

A You described your trash cans --
Q Yes.

A -- as residential or commercial use. And whatever they are, and you've talked about the trash cans in the alley and that you saw holes in them. I'm a resident. I put my trash out.

Many nights, I get a new hole. A rat chews through. I think in the last year I've ordered three new sets of trash cans in there.

I am not confident new trash cans, more trash cans is going to solve the problem as long as there's a food source because unless those trash cans are truly metal and the rats can't get into them and the lids are closed and all that, they have a food source. And that's the problem.

Q Are you aware that those trash cans are DOH approved? They're DDOT approved.

A My trash cans are DOH approved, too.
Q Are you aware that these trash cans are the same trash cans that are used by every single restaurant in the entire city?

A But does every single restaurant have their trash cans in the front while the residents' trash can is in the back, which creates a rat run when they go to the food
source?
Q I'm just asking if you're familiar that those trash cans are the same cans in every restaurant in the city?

A I'm not familiar with the commercial trash cans.

Q Are you familiar with the fact that with our trash company that any time there's a hole, you know, unlike residential where you have to go and buy, are you familiar that they just bring out new trash cans every time we request them?

A I'm familiar with the fact that I've seen the pictures that Marcus has taken over a five-month stretch, and there are rat holes in the trash cans repeatedly.

Q Are you --
A Whether they're new trash cans, and they've been replaced, there are constantly rat holes in them.

Q Are those trash cans that you've seen, the green trash cans, are they the current trash cans that are out on the patio at this point?

A I don't believe that's the case, but if you put the new trash cans out in a short
period of time, they just may have not had a chance to get holes with.

Q I'm just asking are you aware that those trash cans are different?

A I believe so from my visual observation.

Q Okay. So do you believe that based on the fact that we've spent over $\$ 25,000$ in improvements, which don't include the cost of putting in a new fence and concerning the fact that we've already replaced trash cans, we've done biweekly cleanings and we've set that schedule, are you aware that we are making steps to try to make this trash area more, I think better for the neighborhood.

A I take you at your face value that you're doing that.

Q And I appreciate that answer, but --
A I'm not seeing the results yet.
Q Okay. And as I said before, if you saw the documentation which shows the timeline, would that change your opinion of it?

A I'm from Missouri. The documentation, until it happens -- it needs to happen for me to believe that.

Q Fair enough. The documentation, I'll just leave it at that. I'll leave it at that. Thank you very much, and thank you for that.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: The Board was laughing because we've heard that. We have had two protestants here today, and we have heard that statement today, that I am from Missouri. And that's --

THE WITNESS: So I get the cliche crown for the evening?

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: So I've heard that today. The only difference was that the first person said I'm from the Show Me State, and you just said I'm from Missouri. So that's why you heard the response. Two protest hearings today --

THE WITNESS: I'm used to people laughing when I talk.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: -- and it's the same comment. It is $11: 15$, and so the Board has to have some levity. Okay. All right. Any questions of this witness by the Board? Yes, Mr. Short.

MEMBER SHORT: The document that's on the screen right now, can you see it? Do you
need to stand up?
THE WITNESS: Can I stand up and go around? Thank you.

MEMBER SHORT: Just make sure that microphone is pretty close to you.

THE WITNESS: Okay. I'll hold the microphone because my eyesight isn't what it used to be or my voice.

MEMBER SHORT: Will you read the last three dots that are on that permit that was submitted today by this --

THE WITNESS: You want me to begin sidewalk café or trash?

MEMBER SHORT: Start with that first one, sidewalk café shall not.

THE WITNESS: Okay.
MEMBER SHORT: And then read all the way down.

THE WITNESS: Okay. Sidewalk café shall not exceed the dimensions listed on this permit and shall DOT approve sidewalk café plans. The extent of the café is the outside edge of any fixture or feature used to delineate the boundaries of the café.

No trash may be stored or adjacent to
the sidewalk café. No trash enclosure may be adjacent to the sidewalk café. No change in size, layout, design or materials in the existing feature is allowed.

Permit holder is responsible for all damage to public space as a result of work done under this permit.

MEMBER SHORT: Okay. Now read all the way to the bottom. Permit holder --

THE WITNESS: I'm sorry. Permit holder is responsible for all damages.

MEMBER SHORT: No, no, under that.
THE WITNESS: Oh, I'm sorry. Permit effective August 30, 2011.

MEMBER SHORT: Expired what date?
THE WITNESS: June 25, 2012.
MEMBER SHORT: And for the record, all these permits have to be renewed annually, and for the record, this document was submitted today in evidence that this person or this business is in compliance with the law.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Hold on. Sir, please be quiet. I'll let the record reflect this is not a permit that was submitted by the Applicant. This permit was not put in the record
by the Applicant.
MEMBER SHORT: Okay. Well --
MR. IRANI: This was the permit that was provided to me by the Applicant, as I'm saying.

MR. McCOY: As an example.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right. But as I'm saying, this is not a -- this permit -- I want the record to reflect, this permit, it is and, you know, this permit is not in evidence.

It's not in evidence. It's not in the record because it was not submitted. I thought -- when I asked the question, I thought the Applicant, in his PIP that was not, which was not allowed in the evidence because it was not provided within the seven days, because we had a significant amount of conversation regarding the permit, I asked the question is the permit -- was that disclosed.

But this permit has not been disclosed, so I just want the record -- this is a permit, but it was not put into evidence by the Applicant as his current permit.

MEMBER SHORT: I stand corrected. Can I ask another question?

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Yes, Mr. Short. MEMBER SHORT: Now --

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Excuse me.
MEMBER SHORT: -- Ms. Clark, Lorrie Clark, are you part of the Protestants?

THE WITNESS: I am not an official Protestant because I was out of the country when they filed the protest. And my understanding at the time was you couldn't accept electronic signatures, and I had no other way to do it.

But I have been in communication with them the entire time. As I mentioned, I started this kind of movement, and I'm here.

MEMBER SHORT: Okay. Can I ask you to do us a favor?

THE WITNESS: Of course.
MEMBER SHORT: As a person that's one of the neighbors, can you ask him to ask the business owner if he would show you a current document like this, up to date, that was issued to him.

MR. McCOY: Yes. If you want to ask that, absolutely.

THE WITNESS: I will certainly ask you the question.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Well, our -MEMBER SHORT: I'm asking questions. It's still my question time, isn't it?

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: But Mr. Short, you can't ask the witness to ask the Applicant -MEMBER SHORT: I didn't ask. No, I asked her could she ask to get a copy to submit to the person when you do that.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: But she can't ask him.

MEMBER SHORT: I didn't ask the person to --

THE WITNESS: I think I understand your question. You're just asking if I could, and my answer is I can.

MEMBER SHORT: Well, I'll withdraw the question, Mr. Chair. I'll withdraw the question. CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Because he feels that he needed to respond to the question that was --

MEMBER SHORT: Another thing he said, but I'll wait my turn. Mr. Chair, that's it. That's the end of my questions. Thank you very much.

MR. McCOY: Can I just give some --

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: No, sir.
MR. McCOY: Okay, because I can answer that question.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: No. Any other questions from any other Board members? Say your name again, ma'am. I'm sorry.

MEMBER SHORT: Lorrie.
THE WITNESS: Lorrie Clark.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Ms. Clark.
THE WITNESS: Call me Lorrie.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Ms. Clark, thank you very much for your testimony. You can step down.

THE WITNESS: Thank you.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Do you have another witness?

MR. JAMES: Yes. The Protestants called Amir Irani, Commissioner Irani, to the stand.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Is this the last witness, or is it another one?

MR. JAMES: No, there will be one more.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: One more.
MR. JAMES: It'll be short.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right. Mr. Irani, can you raise your right hand, please? Do you swear or affirm to tell the truth and nothing but the truth?

MR. IRANI: Yes.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Yes, what?
MR. IRANI: Yes, I affirm to the tell the truth and nothing but the truth.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Thank you. Your witness. Go ahead.

MR. JAMES: Thank you. WHEREUPON,

AMIR IRANI
was called as a witness by Counsel for the Complainant and, having been first duly sworn, assumed the witness stand, was examined and testified as follows:

DIRECT EXAMINATION
BY MR. JAMES:
Q Mr. Irani, could you describe the various actions you took in connecting with D.C. government agencies to try to help resolve this situation?

A Yes. I started with our council member's office, Ward 1 council member and worked
with our council member's office to connect to DPW, DOH, DDOT, the Mayor's office of Clean City and we had in person meetings as well as site visits, the new Office of Nightlife as well. I might be missing somebody in there, but we brought in a lot of agencies. And some things led to citations. And the only change in behavior I've seen is recently the trash pickup company has changed since the DPW violation.

Q Is it your understanding that Wednesday, May 29, 2019, a stop work order was issued by DDOT to the establishment and a number of concerns were raised that were non-permitted items, including refrigerator, six large garbage cans, two ladders, three unpermitted umbrellas, which were stored on the sidewalk café patio? Are you familiar with that?

A Yeah, I'm familiar with that. I had exchanged some emails. I'm not familiar with the citation or the stop work order specifically because $I$ never saw a copy of it, but $I$ did exchange some emails with DDOT in an attempt to get a copy of it and to understand what the resolution was.

Q So --

A That's when they notified me of the stop work order and the citation.

Q For the Board's interest, it's in tab number 3, these various emails. It's rather dense, so I'm trying to -- okay, District Government Emails, Tab 3.

So in relation to the stop work order, is it accurate that a DDOT official, Brant Miller, emailed you to inform you that the Certificate of Use is issued through DCRA and that Lucky Buns was not needed to have a new one issued?

A It's correct that he informed me that the Certificate of Use was issued through DCRA and was expired and needed a new one issued.

Q Okay. Thank you for that. Going to another particular encounter, you had contacted -- did you contact the Office of Clean City, a Ms. Julie Lawson there?

A Yes, I did. I contacted Julie because I happened to see a tweet from her indicating that Clean City was figuring out solutions for businesses and trash areas.

Q Okay. Do you recall on August 2, 2019 Julie Lawson sent you an email?

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Are these documents in our --

MR. JAMES: Yes, could I? I'd like to introduce them as evidence.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Okay.
MR. JAMES: Do I move the --
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: No.
MR. JAMES: No?
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Ask him to
identify the document and ask him what does the document state. So the first document, show it to him. How is this document identified by? MR. JAMES: Okay. So I'm going to take them out of the book.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Take it out of the book. Ask him to identify the document, and once you ask him to identify the document, ask him what does the document state.

MR. JAMES: So the first topic that I mentioned bridged two pages.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Ask him to identify the document.

BY MR. JAMES:
Q Please identify the documents that $I$ just handed you.

A This is an email between DDOT, Council and myself.

Q And when you say Council, you mean Council member Nadoe's office?

A Yes. The email indicates citations, a stop work order and an expired certificate of use for Lucky Buns.

Q All right.
MR. JAMES: Mr. Chair, do I need to enter them as evidence one at a time?

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: After he's done testifying, you can move to enter all of them into evidence.

MR. JAMES: I'm really trying to focus on the ones that appear most glaring.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: They're not going to be in evidence unless they're identified and moved into evidence.

MR. JAMES: I'd like to hand another email to -- page with an email from Julie -well, to Commissioner Irani here, and could you please identify this email and what it contains.

THE WITNESS: This is an email between Julie Lawson and myself. Julie is with the Mayor's Office of Clean City, and the email cites
open buckets of grease, grease spillage and a large fridge near the trash cans that are an issue.

MR. JAMES: Okay. Thank you. So I think I'd like to introduce these two as evidence on behalf of the Protestants.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: The first one? Did they already have a number on them?

THE WITNESS: I believe that they're the second and the third email.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: No, but do they have a number on the document?

MS. WILSON: No, there's no number on the document.

THE WITNESS: It says it at the bottom.

MS. WILSON: Yeah.
THE WITNESS: It says one through four, one out of four and then one out of seven in the bottom right.

MS. WILSON: So if you're in the District Emails tab, it would be the first one, one out of seven in the bottom corner, which I believe is the fourth page, one out of seven in the bottom right corner.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right. So you're trying to move into evidence the email from -- the email dated May 17, 2019. Is that one?

MS. WILSON: No. It's the email from Miller Brant -- Brant Miller, I'm sorry.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: So you want to move into evidence the email from Fuller to Miller, Brant dated June 7, 2019? What's the other one?

MS. WILSON: That is correct.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: How many pages is that document?

MR. JAMES: Two pages.
MS. WILSON: It's two pages.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right. What's the other document?

MS. WILSON: It's that one page and the one right behind it. That's two of seven, which is just a continued email communication.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right. Do you have any objection, sir?

MR. McCOY: No, no objection.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: So moved.
(Whereupon, the above-referred to
document was marked as Complainant Exhibit 8 for identification and received into evidence.)

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: What's the other document? So that's the email from Miller, Brant dated June 7, 2019. It's admitted without objection. What other document?

MR. JAMES: So this is -- I should be reading this to you, but $I$ gave him my copy so I'm having to read. And thank you Ashley here for helping. So this is an email from August 13th. It's titled as follow up on Clean City Rat Initiative.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: What number is that? That's dated what? What's the page number on it at the bottom?

MR. JAMES: It's one of four.
MS. WILSON: It's one of four, and it's following a picture of trash cans.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: So the email from Amir Irani from Julie Lawson dated August 13, 2019. All right.

MR. JAMES: So that's actually him thanking her for responding on August 2nd.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right. But how many pages is this email, does this email
testify to?
MS. WILSON: Three pages.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Any objection, sir?

MR. McCOY: No, no objection.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: So moved.
(Whereupon, the above-referred to document was marked as Complainant Exhibit 9 for identification and received into evidence.)

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right.
Let's move on. Where are we now?
BY MR. JAMES:
Q Mr. Irani, do you recall any other incidents where either there was a direct observance by a city official of violation associated with Lucky Buns or another email, you know, which contains information leading to a violation or about a violation and how it had to be cured by the Applicant?

A Yes. There's an email also early on between Council. Council and I walked Vernon Street and walked in front of Lucky Buns, and we took pictures.

And we witnessed grease stains and a trail of grease coming from the Lucky Buns' trash
area down the sidewalk. And we took pictures of it. And then Council sent an email to DOH and attached those pictures.

The email that I'm mentioning is the first email in the tab under District Government emails. In addition to that, there was emails to -- I was an eyewitness to DPW writing tickets to Lucky Buns for broken trash containers and comingling of recycled and trash goods, which is a violation of their settlement agreement and which I had emailed the Applicant about days before, which he tersely replied to me saying that he doesn't have any broken lids. Yeah, so.

MR. JAMES: Okay. So we'd like to enter that email into evidence.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: What email was that?

MR. JAMES: It's on the very first page of tab 3.

## CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: There's an

 email from Fuller dated -- to Duffy that is an email dated May 17, 2019?MR. JAMES: Correct. I believe Celeste Duffy is at DPW.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Is that a one-
page document?
THE WITNESS: May I point it out?
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: I'll talk to you after the move. So this is the document you just testified to you're trying to move into evidence?

MR. JAMES: I didn't hand him this before we started this discussion. So this was the email of which I was just speaking.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: So this is the email from?

THE WITNESS: This is from Fuller to Ronnie Taylor, Taylor Ronnie at DOH. And that's 5/17. It's different than the email to Celeste Duffy at DPW.

MS. WILSON: It has three pictures. It should be your second page in your tab.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Okay.
MS. WILSON: There's pictures.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: So you want to move this document into evidence?

MR. JAMES: Yes, please.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Any objection, sir?

MR. McCOY: No, no objection.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: So moved. That's an email from Fuller dated May 17, 2019 at 12:01 p.m.
(Whereupon, the above-referred to document was marked as Complainant Exhibit 10 for identification and received into evidence.)

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Any other documents?

MR. JAMES: Yes, just one more in this tab, and it begins I believe --

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Show her the document -- I'm sorry. Show him the document and have him identify the document.

MR. JAMES: So this is a --
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Show him the document.

MR. JAMES: Yes, sir.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: And have him identify the document.

MR. JAMES: Mr. Irani, could you please identify this document and what it contains?

THE WITNESS: This is an email exchange I had with the Mayor's Office of Community Relations in an attempt to get a few
agencies to come along for a walk all at once instead of trying to tackle this, you know, one agency at a time over many months.

I also want to point out that this walk took place on October 17th, after months of emails..

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: So what email is this? I --

MS. WILSON: If you're in the -- it's the last four.

MEMBER SHORT: Can you hold it up?
MR. JAMES: It has the logo there.
MS. WILSON: It's the last four pages of your tab.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: I've got it. All right. So this is an email from foreman to foreman dated -- I guess it's an email from September.

MS. WILSON: Actually, I think --
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Yeah.
MS. WILSON: -- one more page, 9/27.
I'm sorry. It was the last five pages dating -MR. JAMES: For the --

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: These emails, they have a page number at the bottom.

THE WITNESS: Exactly, at the bottom right.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: What's the page number?

MS. WILSON: It says one of eight.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: But what page are we dealing with?

MS. WILSON: We'd like to submit one, two, three, the five pages because that's the full email exchange?

MEMBER SHORT: What's the last page number on the bottom?

MS. WILSON: The last page on the bottom is five of eight.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Any objection, sir?

MR. McCOY: No.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: So moved.
(Whereupon, the above-referred to document was marked as Complainant Exhibit 11 for identification and received into evidence.)

BY MR. JAMES:
Q Mr. Irani, how long did it take to set up that meeting with the Mokers, as they're commonly known, and the team that they assembled?

A Maybe about two or three months.
Q Thank you. And was there a result from the actual visit to the site?

A There was -- the biggest gain I think we had there is that it resulted in -- at least I hope that there will be a gain here. It resulted in the establishment changing their trash company because DPW wrote them a ticket for their broken cans. And I think, I mean I'm just speculating that Alex saw that and acted to do something.

Q Alex, you mean Mr. McCoy?
A Mr. McCoy, the Applicant.
Q So while you were present, a representative of DPW actually a wrote a ticket for the trash cans and their condition?

A That's correct. Yeah. He --
Q That's good.
A Okay.
Q So changing subjects, this is a slightly different discussion, but it's something we think is important. I'm sorry. On the subject of trash compactors, are you aware of any other trash compactors located in Adams Morgan?

A Yes, I am.
Q Can you please describe what you know
of it and where it's located?
A There's a trash compactor that serves -- it's a relatively small size, and it serves Federalist Pig, Potter's House, a small medical office and a small apartment building, one compactor.

Q Right, and of those locations that you named, is Federalist Pig an ABC establishment?

A It is.
Q That's the only one?
A That is an ABC establishment.
Q Okay. And are you familiar enough with the site there to describe how pickup would work? What is the physical layout of where that trash compactor was located? Was there a driveway right near there? How did they get it to offload into a truck?

A I believe they just wheel it out and the truck picks it up.

Q Wheel it out to?
A Wheel it out to the alley, I mean away from -- there's no driveway.

Q Okay. All right. So in your opinion, is there a way that a compactor could be brought to use in this situation for Lucky Buns? I mean

I want to ask that in conjunction with the knowledge that's been admitted that Lucky Buns currently takes it grease across the street, as has been mentioned. What is meant by across the street. Could you describe that?

A So Lucky Buns currently takes its grease to the area behind El Tamarindo, which is another ABC establishment.

And $I$, at some point, thought that -and it's also indicated in my email to Clean City dated August 13th that $I$ thought we were getting someplace. And we might get a settlement agreement because they were considering a compactor.

Q I'd like to keep going. So in this space, are you aware of who owns the property there?

A In my understanding, it's El Tamarindo.

Q Thank you. And have you seen any document that shows that is the case?

A No.
Q In that space, could you describe it a little more fully? Have you ever walked back into that area?

A Yeah. It's on an alley. There are no apartment buildings nearby. It is serving a handful of establishments, including the newly opened Imperial, Jack Rose, Blaggard, all ABC establishments and --

Q Is it also serving a small carry out called Meat in the Box?

A Meat in the Box, that's the one, yeah.
Q So there's Jack Rose, Meat in the Box - -

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Where are we going with this because -- I hope you're not asking the Board to tell them that they need to take their grease and store it over at El Tamarindo.

MR. JAMES: The question, $I$ believe, just to -- I believe Mr. Irani has already stated that that is his understanding as to where the grease is already being taken.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: But -- and so you're telling us that for what? To say that we should direct them to take their grease over there?

MR. JAMES: Well, are you asking me to testify?

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: No. Where are you going with that?

MR. JAMES: You know, it's getting late and Commissioner Irani knows about as much of this as I do, but he would be giving you hearsay.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Yeah, but I guess the question I'm asking, where are we going with this testimony. It's like okay, it's good for you that he's disposing of his grease somewhere else. But are you saying that's a violation? That's wrong?

MR. JAMES: No, I'm not at all.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Are you telling us that --

MR. JAMES: We're trying to get to the point of suggesting that there is a good alternate location for all of the trash, recycling and --

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Well, that's something that you guys could have discussed in a settlement. The ABC Board is not going to order him to take his trash and dump it over at El --

MR. JAMES: Well, it would be through an agreement with the owner of the property.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: The ABC Board cannot order him to sign an agreement with another owner. That's something you guys can do in a settlement agreement. I'm not even sure if we could -- if that's something -- if that's enforceable, but we don't need to go there because that's not relevant to this hearing. MR. JAMES: Well, we thought -CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Not in the sense of us ordering him to sign an agreement with some other ABC establishment to dispose of his grease.

I think your time is better if you're telling us to order him to do -- to dispose of his grease on his property in some other way but not to go across the alley to dispose of his grease in some other ABC establishment. That's not helpful. Let's move on.

MR. JAMES: I don't think $I$ have any further questions?

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Do you have any questions, sir?

MR. McCOY: Yes, please, and I'll make it quick.

CROSS - EXAMINATION

BY MR. McCOY:
Q Okay. Mr. Irani, when we met in May and you voiced to me your issue with the trash and the grease, are you aware that we immediately then moved that grease can off of the trash area?

A No.
Q Are you aware that that grease can does not exist on the trash area anymore and has not for months and months and months?

A Can you say that one more time?
Q Do you agree that that grease can does not exist in our trash area currently?

A No, because I have pictures and have submitted. I have seen it and taken pictures of buckets of grease stored on your patio.

Q You just said that we take our grease across the street because we don't have a grease can on our trash area, so explain to me how we can have a grease pan on the patio and then have a grease can across the street if --

A Sure. I'd be happy to explain it. You store buckets of grease, and then I think sometime in the morning because I've seen buckets of grease stored there at 1:00 a.m., sometime in the morning you go and drag them across the
street where you probably dispose of them though I've never seen it.

Q Did we move the grease to across the street at the request of the neighborhood?

A I don't know.
Q Okay. Are you aware that we were issued a stop work order for having an expired certificate of use?

A Yes.
Q Are you aware that we received a new certificate of use the next day?

A I don't know when you received it.
Q But you're aware that we have a new certificate of use?

A Yeah.
Q Okay. Are you aware that you can't get a current certificate of use without a current public space permit?

A No.
Q Are you aware that we have a current public space permit?

A No.
Q Okay. All right. Are you aware that after we received a stop work order that I immediately met with Matthew Marcou, Elliott

Garrett and Stacey Collins, and they immediately issued a stay on the stop work order because I explained to them that we were moving the walk-in cooler and created a whole framework?

A Your question is am I aware of a meeting. I'm not aware of a meeting. I am aware that a stay, a grace period was granted as indicated in the email that has been submitted.

Q Are you aware that that stay was issued because DDOT and my business are working to get that trash area in compliance and that DDOT is aware of the trash area?

A What was the question? Am I aware that the stay was issued?

Q Are you aware the stay was issued?
A Yes.
Q Okay. Per our conversations, because we've had a number about this, are you aware that that stay was issued in order for me to create a plan to move the walk-in cooler to the basement, that DDOT was very happy to acquiesce?

A No, I'm not aware of all of those.
Q Okay. But you're aware that we are currently in compliance with DDOT right now as we're able to operate our patio and have a

## current stay?

A I'm not aware that you're in compliance with DDOT.

Q Okay. Are you aware that Reuben, let's see, Reuben who -- Reuben from -- that's the liaison from the Mayor's office had an all hands walk up and down Vernon Street?

A When did that walk occur?
Q You mentioned yourself. You said in October.

A Oh, October 17th. Yeah, I was there.
Q Were you --
A I was there.
Q Okay. So are you aware that the DOH, DDOT, DPW didn't find any violations on our property but actually did find violations on neighbors' property?

A No, that's not my understanding of this walk at all.

Q Are you aware that $I$ have had conversations with Reuben in which he actually mentioned to me there was no violations found on our property, but there were violations found on other properties?

A I was eyewitness to violations found
on your property and a ticket being written by District government officials on a District iPad.

Q Are you aware that those -- we're talking about two completely different days? I'm talking about are you aware that --

A You said October 17th.
Q -- the walk with -- what is it -- the all hands walk with Reuben from the city -- let me see. You actually had mentioned that. It was the all hands walk that was different from the day that the citations were issued.

The neighborhood was walked by DOH , DDOT, the Office of the Mayor, going up and down, looking at all the neighbors, looking at our trash area.

A You're referring to October 17th, and I'm telling you that were issued violations on October 17th.

Q That was not the day I'm talking about. But are you aware those are two different things, in any case.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Why don't you ask a clear question, sir?

MR. McCOY: What's that?
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Ask a clear
question because you two are talking across each other.

MR. McCOY: I'm going to pass on that because I've got to find the actual -- I have the information. It's a conversation $I$ had with Reuben, but $I$ can't give it to you guys unfortunately.

BY MR. McCOY:
Q Are you aware that we changed all of our trash cans to new trash cans?

A That's my understanding.
Q Are you aware that we're moving the walk-in cooler to the basement?

A That's been my understanding for the last seven months.

Q Are you aware that we're building a new fence once the walk-in cooler is completed?

A No, I'm not aware.
Q Okay. Are you aware that the walk-in cooler is being delivered on the 17 th of December?

A No.
Q Okay. Are you aware that we had a conversation about trash compactors on the patio of our establishment?

A Yes.
Q Okay. Are you aware that I called the trash companies looking for information on trash compactors?

A No.
Q Are you aware that the trash company, per a conversation I had with you, said that they couldn't install a trash compactor on our patio because there's no -- for two reasons.

MEMBER CROCKETT: Sir, would you ask him questions about things that he's knowledgeable of? How would he be knowledgeable of a conversation you had with a trash compactor company?

MR. McCOY: Because I actually had conversations with him about it.

MEMBER CROCKETT: So you're testifying then, not him.

MR. McCOY: Well, no. I just want to make it clear that him and $I$ conversations about this where I told him this information, and he --

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: So why don't you ask him did -- why don't you -- rather than asking if he's aware, just ask him the nature of the conversations that you have had with him
directly.
BY MR. McCOY:
Q Are you aware that I attempted to look at information about a trash compactor and that couldn't work because there's no street access to the trash area?

A I'm aware that you told me that you had a conversation with another company and they said that you can't have a compactor there.

Q Okay. Are you aware that I also looked into a rolling compactor, and they said they couldn't do it because it's a huge risk? Rolling down the street, it could get loose and hit a car.

A That's what you told me.
Q So you're aware that I've tried to look into other options for the trash area to try and please the neighborhood?

A I know that you've -- well, I know what you've told me that you've talked to a trash company.

Q Fair. And then my final question is in the photos you took of the grease that's coming off of our patio, $I$ don't actually see a picture of grease coming off our patio. I see
grease that's on the side --
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Would you ask him the question, sir? You're testifying.

MR. McCOY: Yeah, I'm just asking where's the picture of the grease coming off of my patio. All I just see is runoff on --

MEMBER CROCKETT: Which picture are you referring to?

MR. McCOY: I'm sorry, this picture right here where he --

MEMBER CROCKETT: What exhibit number?
MR. McCOY: Unfortunately, I don't --
MEMBER SHORT: The number at the bottom of the page. There's a number at the bottom of the page.

MEMBER CROCKETT: What tab is it in, the Photos tab?

MR. McCOY: I apologize.
MEMBER SHORT: Tab 3.
MR. McCOY: Tab 3, page 2.
MS. WILSON: You're in District Government Emails tab.

MR. McCOY: I'm sorry. I apologize.
MS. WILSON: And I believe we've already given you guys this document. It's the
one with three pictures.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right. So what's the question about the document?

MR. McCOY: So where's the picture of the grease actually coming off my property? I just see grease.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Sir, it's not what you see. Ask a question.

BY MR. McCOY:
Q Where's a picture of the grease actually physically coming off my property?

A I was an eyewitness there. I could see a trail of grease coming from your property and per your settlement agreement and ABRA regulations, you are responsible for the front of your property, which there are clearly pictures of.

You are responsible to 18 inches from the curb, which there are clearly pictures of, and pictures of grease.

Q So you saw with your eyes the grease coming off my property, but you didn't take a picture of it? You only took a picture of what we don't even actually really know is grease. It looks like runoff just coming down from up the
street.
A These were a few pictures shared to DOH showing grease in front of Lucky Buns.

Q I'm asking --
A There are other pictures in our photos that show grease on Lucky Buns, a trail coming from the trash barn that you have.

Q I just want to know where the pictures of it coming off of our property are. That's all

A Okay. They're in the 8th tab. I could probably give you a number if I could go through it.

Q Well, that's all of my -- oh, are you aware that you wrote a five-star review of Lucky Buns earlier this year?

A No, I'm not.
Q All right. I just wanted --
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Any questions by the Board members? Hearing none, thank you, Mr. Irini for your testimony. You may step down. Who is the final witness?

MS. WILSON: We actually have no more witnesses.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: I'm sorry. Say what?

MS. WILSON: We do not have any more witnesses.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: I thought you told me you had another one.

MS. WILSON: I'm sorry. We're trying to help, so we eliminated a witness.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right.
MEMBER SHORT: It's a developer.
MS. WILSON: As best as we could.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: What?
MEMBER SHORT: It's a developer.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right. So do you rest?

MS. WILSON: We rest.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Are you ready for closing, sir?

MR. McCOY: Yes.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Okay. Five minutes.

MR. McCOY: Okay. So I think there's a couple issues here, and I want to just state for everybody, I want to have a good relationship with the neighbors. I really do. And you know, there's obviously been bad blood between all of us, but $I$ want to make that better.

And I hope that I've proven through invoices and through showing that we are moving the walk-in cooler downstairs, that we're building new fences, that we're trying to do things in order to make that trash area much more hospitable and able to take more trash so that we don't run into these issues because I don't want to have bad blood with the neighbors.

And I have documentation of that. We worked really hard to try to get to this point. We've got a couple days left. The walk-in cooler is going to be delivered on the 17th. Once that's delivered and installed, that walk-in cooler on the outside is gone.

A new fence is up, and we have more trash cans back there to handle the volume of trash so that we don't have to run into these problems. We can start mending our relationship with the neighbors.

I do ask the Board, you know, do pay attention to the fact that this is the jurisdiction of DDOT. DDOT has the jurisdiction over this trash area. We have worked with DDOT to have these things approved and worked with them over the past year to make sure that they
were okay with it.
They have issued us stays on stop work orders. Mrs. Collins and Mr. Garrett, Mr. Marcou, Mr. Marushian are all very familiar with what's going on right now, and they're all very happy that we're moving the walk-in to the basement. And we're trying to get that place up and running properly.

I do want to note that the permit that we have, the drawing that we have doesn't show planters. And we just replaced everything that was already there. So there were planters existing. We have planters out.

The same amount of seats, we actually have less seats out there now than we were on the initial plan. So there's less people sitting on the patio than was approved for and approved on the plan.

We have a current certificate of use. We have a current permit to use the patio by DDOT, you know, and these issues, and I understand that there is an issue with the drawing.

And I understand that there's an issue with the permit. This needs to be dealt with in
public space. This needs to be dealt with, with the Department of Transportation because this is where a lot of our issues are coming in because we've been granted use of that space.

It's been used for 20 years.
Obviously, they have issue with that, but that needs to be dealt with in public space. The reality is we have zero ABRA violations. We have zero ABRA trash violations. The report by Inspector Luiz clearly shows that we've been keeping that place clean and organized. And honestly, I think that based on some of the other information about, you know, what we've been doing to keep that place clean, it shows that we have a real commitment to getting this done and finished. And I know the neighbors are frustrated, and I know this timeline is a lot longer than they expected. And I understand that. And I understand the frustration. But I am committing myself to everybody here that this is going to get done because I want to have a good relationship with everybody. I want to have a good relationship with ABRA and DDOT and DOH.

And I will do whatever it takes to get to that point. And I've shown invoices to prove that fact. You know, I'm happy with our settlement agreement, and I intend on working really hard to like maintain that trash area and make sure that trash area is organized.

You know, that's really all I have to say. We want to work hard for the neighborhood. We want to work hard to create an establishment that we can be proud of and that the neighbors can be proud of.

And I want the neighbors to feel like they have a place on the street that they can come to. And I do hope that once the walk-in is removed and we have the trash cans out there that this will start to calm down.

And neighbors will see that there are less rats in the neighborhood, that things are getting better. And at that point, hopefully, we can start mending our relationship.

That is our hope. And you know, I don't know what to say. I've provided proof of all the stuff we're doing. You know, I don't know what else $I$ can give you guys other than my guarantee and these invoices and pictures that
show that we've been doing this work.
And we've been getting these approvals from the city. And we've been working with DCRA, and we've been working with DDOT. And we're in full compliance right now, and I want to keep it that way. And I want to make sure that, you know, we keep moving forward. That's really the best I can say, so.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right. I'm ready for you.

MS. WILSON: Oh, I'm sorry. Okay. We, as residents, did not want to take this protest as far as this hearing has come. However, after numerous attempts over the past six months to work with the Applicant to rectify issues plaguing our neighborhood, with little to no action from Lucky Buns, we had no other choice but to take the action which has led us here tonight.

Lucky Buns is obligated to follow ABRA and other District agency regulations, which state that they shall ensure that all solid waste inside the property and in the outdoor spaces immediately surrounding the property are stored and containerized for collection in a manner that
will not provide food, harborage or breeding places for insects or rodents or other animals or to create a nuisance of a fire hazard.

The Applicant is also in violation of the trash recycling grease and fatty oils outside an area, an outside area maintenance provisions of its enforced current settlement agreement.

As indicated by the witness testimonies, violations and citations from the District agencies and countless documentation of trash, litter and rat infestation on Vernon Street, it is evident that Lucky Buns is not in compliance.

It is also evident that they have a permit which states that no trash may be stored on or adjacent to the sidewalk café and that no trash enclosure may be adjacent to the sidewalk café.

We have no documentation that the Applicant has filed annually for his permit renewal and that the only permit we have been provided by the Applicant is the one we have shared with you tonight, which expires on 6/25/2012.

We believe the issues with the permit
should be discussed and further investigated between ABRA and DDOT. We requested the Board also take administrative notice of DCMR Chapter 3, Sections 310, 314 and 315, which indicates that trash and refuse storage shall not be located in the vicinity of a sidewalk café.

It can also -- there cannot be a structure or enclosure to accommodate the storage of garbage shall not be erected, maintained or placed adjacent to a sidewalk café. We have no evidence that Lucky Buns has requested an exception to this regulation.

As mentioned by some of the Board members themselves, you have probably never seen a protest to this degree with a hearing of a restaurant.

We appreciate your time and attention this evening, and we hope you will agree that the elimination or the not approving the renewal of their liquor license is necessary until the Applicant can move their trash and their refrigerator.

We are hopeful that this will ensure that Lucky Buns will work to immediately rectify the neighborhood issues we have shared with you
here tonight. Thank you.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Thank you. Do the parties wish to file post-findings of fact and conclusions of law or waive their right to do that, meaning that do you want us to make the decision on the evidence and testimony that was made tonight, or do you want to wait until the transcript is issued, read the transcript and for you to write what was presented here today?

MR. JAMES: We -- for the Kalorama, we waive it. We trust that the Board heard us and will make a good decision.

MR. McCOY: I waive it.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right.
Thank you.
MS. WILSON: Oh, I'm sorry. The Group of 9 will waive as well.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right. As Chairperson of the Alcohol Beverage Control Board for the District of Columbia and in accordance with the D.C. Official Code Section 2574b of the Open Meetings Act, I move that ABC Board hold a closed meeting for the purpose of seeking legal advice from our counsel on Case Number 19-CMP-000 -- no, I'm sorry, 19-PRO-00084,

Lucky Buns pursuant to D.C. Official Code Section 2574b for -- of the Open Meetings Act and deliberate upon Case Number 19-PRO-00084, Luck Buns for the reasons cited in D.C. Official Code Section 2574b13 of the Open Meetings Act.

Is there a second?
MEMBER SHORT: Second.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Mr. Short has seconded the motion. I will now take a roll call vote on the motion, of course, now that it's been seconded. Mr. Short?

MEMBER SHORT: I agree.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Mr. Cato?
MEMBER CATO: I agree.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Ms. Crockett?
MEMBER CATO: I agree.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Mr. Anderson, I agree. As it appears that the motion has passed, $I$ hereby give notice that ABC Board will recess these proceedings to hold a closed meeting in an ABC Board Conference Room pursuant to Section 2574 of the Open Meetings Act.

I want to thank the parties for their presentation today.

MR. McCOY: Thank you.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: The Board will -- we have to close this case first. I would want to thank the parties for their presentation today, and the Board will issue a decision I think within the next 90 days. I believe we'll issue a decision where we are.

One of the things I've always stated is that $I$ prefer settlement agreements because at the end of the day, this is your neighborhood and you have to live together.

You have to live -- none of us live in that neighborhood, but now we will make a decision, and I'm not sure. One side might be happy. The other side might be sad, but we'll try to make a decision that we believe, by listening to the testimony and making a decision that we believe is in the best interest of the residents of the District of Columbia. All right.

MR. McCOY: Thank you very much.
CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Well, thank you for your presentation today.
