The Alcoholic Beverage Control Board met in Alcoholic Beverage Control Hearing Room, Reeves Building, 2000 14th Street N.W., Washington, D.C., Ms. LaVerne Fletcher, Agent, presiding.

AGENT FLETCHER: Would the parties in the matter of Lucky Buns, please, come forward? This is Case No. 19-PRO-00084, Upshur Burger Concepts, LLC, 2000 18th Street, N.W., License No. ABRA-107929. This is a Retailer Class CR License renewal.

The protest issues are adverse impact on peace, order and quiet.

My name is LaVerne Fletcher conducting the Roll Call Hearing as the Board's Agent.

Introduction beginning with the applicant, please. If you could just state your name and spell it for the record?

MR. CAMPBELL: Yes, ma'am. My name is Hunter Campbell. That's H-U-N-T-E-R C-A-M-P-B-E-L-L.

AGENT FLETCHER: Thank you, Mr. Campbell. And is anyone present from Kalorama Citizens Association?

MS. MEIER: Oh, actually, I mean, I'm
part of Kalorama. Yeah, I'm part of the citizens association.

AGENT FLETCHER: So are you representing the Kalorama Citizens Association?

MS. MEIER: No, I'm as an individual.
AGENT FLETCHER: Okay. So the --
MS. MEIER: But we have different individuals. Okay, go ahead.

AGENT FLETCHER: Okay. Let me check something.

MS. MEIER: Okay, sure.
AGENT FLETCHER: Thank you. Would you want to represent the Kalorama Citizens Association today?

MS. MEIER: Were they the designee on the --

AGENT FLETCHER: So I'll tell you why I'm asking, because we have situations like this every now and then where --

MS. MEIER: Okay.
AGENT FLETCHER: -- for example this protest was filed by the president of the KCA,

Denis James.
MS. MEIER: Yep.
AGENT FLETCHER: He is --

MS. MEIER: Okay.
AGENT FLETCHER: He is not present today.

MS. MEIER: Then I can, yeah.
AGENT FLETCHER: So that's -- I just wanted to --

MS. MEIER: Sure.
AGENT FLETCHER: -- check to see if that is --

MS. MEIER: Okay.
AGENT FLETCHER: -- something you --
MS. MEIER: Um-hum.
AGENT FLETCHER: -- would be --
MS. MEIER: Yes, ma'am.
AGENT FLETCHER: -- willing to do for today.

MS. MEIER: Yes.
AGENT FLETCHER: And it's up to you.
MS. MEIER: Um-hum.

AGENT FLETCHER: So this is what I'm going to do. I know you are going to be a part of the group. We are going to talk about in a minute.

MS. MEIER: Um-hum.
AGENT FLETCHER: But right this
moment, $I$ 'm going to make a note that you, at least for today, are here on behalf of the KCA. And so do you have your contact information on that sheet already? Because what is going to happen, the initial notice that we send out, you are going to get a Hearing Notice with dates on it. It is going to come to you. We will copy Denis James, too, but we are going to copy you, too, since you were here today.

MS. MEIER: Okay.
AGENT FLETCHER: Then you can just pass it off to Mr. James.

You can tell me your name, too, so I can -- for the record.

MS. MEIER: My name?
AGENT FLETCHER: Yes.

MS. MEIER: Felicia, F-E-L-I-C-I-A, Meier, M-E-I-E-R.

AGENT FLETCHER: M-E-I?

MS. MEIER: E-R.
AGENT FLETCHER: E-R.
MS. MEIER: Two Es and one I.
AGENT FLETCHER: Did you say T-I-E-R?
MS. MEIER: M-E-I-E-R.
AGENT FLETCHER: That's what I have.
MS. MEIER: Okay.
AGENT FLETCHER: Is anyone present on behalf of ANC-1C? Is ANC-1C present today?

MS. MEIER: Not -- well, we are all ANC, yeah.

AGENT FLETCHER: So let me state something for the record. So the ANC filed a protest, but there is no one here from the ANC.

MS. MEIER: Oh, okay.
AGENT FLETCHER: It's the same situation. So here is the thing. The protest was filed by Ted Guthrie. The ANC did not -- so I'm assuming that with the KCA, you are a member
of the board?
MS. MEIER: No, I'm not.
AGENT FLETCHER: Are you a member of the board with KCA?

MS. MEIER: No.
AGENT FLETCHER: So what's your connection to the KCA?

MS. MEIER: I'm a member of it.
AGENT FLETCHER: You are a member of the KCA.

MS. MEIER: A dues-paying member. AGENT FLETCHER: Okay. You are a resident?

MS. MEIER: Correct, yes.
AGENT FLETCHER: Well, let me continue with the ANC.

MS. MEIER: Okay.
AGENT FLETCHER: So ANC-1C filed a protest. Ted Guthrie filed the protest on behalf of ANC-1C. Ted Guthrie is not present and he did not designate anyone to appear on behalf of ANC1C.

MS. MEIER: Okay.
AGENT FLETCHER: So are you on the board of ANC-1C?

MS. MEIER: Huh-uh.
AGENT FLETCHER: You are a member of the community?

MS. MEIER: Um-hum.
AGENT FLETCHER: You are in that ANC?
MS. MEIER: Yes.
AGENT FLETCHER: So I'm not going to-I'm just -- I'm not -- going to dismiss ANC-1C. I am dismissing ANC-1C because they filed a protest, but they are not present.

MS. MEIER: Okay.
AGENT FLETCHER: So they are going to get a Board Order dismissing their protest. And Mr. Campbell?

MR. CAMPBELL: Yes, ma'am?
AGENT FLETCHER: You will receive a copy of that Board Order dismissing their protest.

Once that order is issued, they will
have 10 days to ask the Board to reinstate the protest. And if they have a good reason for not coming today, have you been in communication with ANC-1C?

MR. CAMPBELL: Yes. My partner, Alex, has. I have actually been away, but just got back.

AGENT FLETCHER: Uh-huh.
MR. CAMPBELL: So I know there has been communication, but we haven't finished. AGENT FLETCHER: Okay. So to your knowledge, there is not a settlement agreement at this stage?

MR. CAMPBELL: No, no.
AGENT FLETCHER: There is
communication.
MR. CAMPBELL: Yes, ma'am.
AGENT FLETCHER: One second. Ms.
Meier?

MS. MEIER: Yes?
AGENT FLETCHER: Okay. One second.
Because you are not actually a member of the
board of the KCA --
MS. MEIER: Yes.
AGENT FLETCHER: -- I'm going to dismiss the KCA.

MS. MEIER: Okay.
AGENT FLETCHER: If you were a member of the board of the KCA --

MS. MEIER: Right.
AGENT FLETCHER: -- then I would accept that as you --

MS. MEIER: Okay.
AGENT FLETCHER: -- representing the
KCA. But I should have clarified that when I said --

MS. MEIER: Okay. That's fine.
AGENT FLETCHER: Yes. So the same thing will happen with the KCA.

MS. MEIER: Um-hum, okay.
AGENT FLETCHER: They are going to get
an order dismissing them for not coming today and they can explain why they weren't here. If the Board accepts that, they will grant them
reinstatement.
MS. MEIER: Okay.
AGENT FLETCHER: But everybody will be kept informed about that.

MS. MEIER: Great.
AGENT FLETCHER: So now, we are going to move on to the group of individuals. And so, Ms. Meier, I know that you are a member of that group of individuals --

MS. MEIER: Correct, yes.
AGENT FLETCHER: -- that filed a protest.

MS. MEIER: Yeah.
AGENT FLETCHER: And you signed that protest letter? Can I get your name?

MS. WILSON: My name is Ashley Wilson, A-S-H-L-E-Y W-I-L-S-O-N.

AGENT FLETCHER: Okay. And you are members of the same group, right? So you can -if you can just state your name into the microphone and spell it for the record, please?

MS. THOMAS: Yes, my name is Selma

Thomas, S-E-L-M-A T-H-O-M-A-S.
AGENT FLETCHER: Thank you, Ms.
Thomas.
MR. COMP: And my name is T. Allan
Comp, just $T$, the letter $T$, is my first name Allan, A-L-L-A-N last name Comp, C-O-M-P, like comp in competition.

AGENT FLETCHER: Okay. Thank you. And you all signed the Protest Letter?

MS. WILSON: Yes.
MR. COMP: Yes, ma'am.
AGENT FLETCHER: Thank you. I need to clarify a couple of things. So your Protest Letter says a couple of things. It says that you are residents of Vernon Street, N.W. Some live-some signatories reside beside the restaurant. Is that some residents claiming to be abutting property owners or -- because see, so here is what happens.

You can file a protest as a group of five or more, which that's fine. You all already would be considered a group of five or more
because you signed the Protest Letter. So your group is going to be granted conditional standing as a group of five or more, because the Board needs to see five people.

And what that means is that at the upcoming Status Hearing, one more person that is not here today would just come for that hearing. So your group would be granted conditional standing today as a group of five residents, because four of you were here today. So that's established.

I'm just moving now to if there is anybody here also claiming to be an abutting property owner, because that's a different classification.

MS. WILSON: Can you define abutting?
AGENT FLETCHER: Yes. For us,
abutting means that you live in a-- that the unit that you live in actually touches a wall of the establishment.

So if your ceiling, if your floor touches their ceiling --

MS. WILSON: I believe --
AGENT FLETCHER: -- or you have --
MS. WILSON: -- yes. So I'm part of the building.

AGENT FLETCHER: Okay.
MS. WILSON: I'm an owner in the building.

AGENT FLETCHER: Uh-huh.
MS. WILSON: And I believe we do share part of a wall that is touching the restaurant.

AGENT FLETCHER: And so which address is yours?

MS. WILSON: We are 1811 Vernon Street.

AGENT FLETCHER: Okay.
MS. WILSON: And our board is
collectively the Vernon Condo Association and there are a few residents that do have units.

AGENT FLETCHER: That touch the wall of - -

MS. WILSON: Correct. Particularly, Carol Vaughn is one of those --

AGENT FLETCHER: And so which walls touch for Carol Vaughn? Do you know?

MS. WILSON: I --
AGENT FLETCHER: Is it wall-to-wall or ceiling-to-floor?

MS. WILSON: It's a wall-to-wall.
AGENT FLETCHER: Mr. Campbell, are you familiar with any of this at all? In terms of -MR. CAMPBELL: Yes, ma'am. AGENT FLETCHER: Are you familiar? MR. CAMPBELL: The wall? I mean, I would have to look at it, but we are right next to them, so it's probably.

AGENT FLETCHER: For us it make a difference, you know, that you are actually touching, because that's our definition of abutting.

MR. CAMPBELL: Ah, okay.
AGENT FLETCHER: That the walls touch.
MR. CAMPBELL: I am not positive. I do not know for a fact.

AGENT FLETCHER: But you believe that
they do?
MS. WILSON: I believe they do touch.
AGENT FLETCHER: Okay. Can you give me the -- this is 1811, right?

MS. WILSON: Yes.
AGENT FLETCHER: Can you give me the-is there a unit number? Are these units in a condo building or units in an apartment building?

MS. WILSON: They are units in a condo building.

AGENT FLETCHER: Do you know the -- so there are -- at 1811 there is Ashley Wilson.

MS. WILSON: That's myself.
AGENT FLETCHER: That's you. So you believe you wall touches one of the walls of the establishment?

MS. WILSON: Yes. Not my particular unit.

AGENT FLETCHER: It has to be yours. I'm just talking about yours.

MS. WILSON: No, not my unit --
AGENT FLETCHER: Okay.

MS. WILSON: -- in particular.
AGENT FLETCHER: So what that means is that you are not abutting. But I'm just establishing this for the record. You are not abutting them, but you are a part of the group of five. So in order for you to be abutting, one of your walls would have to touch the wall of the establishment.

MS. WILSON: So just to clarify it -AGENT FLETCHER: Yes.

MS. WILSON: -- I am also part of the Vernon Condo Association. I am acting on behalf of them and some of the members on the Vernon Condo Association do have abutting walls.

My particular unit 202 is not an abutting wall.

AGENT FLETCHER: Um-hum.

MS. WILSON: But there is another resident, $I$ think, two or three maybe, that have abutting walls.

## AGENT FLETCHER: The condominium

 associations don't have standing as protestants.MS. WILSON: Okay.
AGENT FLETCHER: They had filed a protest. They would need to file a protest. I saw where you -- someone whose name I can't really -- it's not really legible --

MS. WILSON: Is it Mimi or Marcus?
AGENT FLETCHER: Lauren?
MS. MEIER: Lori Clark?
AGENT FLETCHER: I don't know what this says. I's illegible for us.

MS. WILSON: Okay.
AGENT FLETCHER: But the last name looks like it's spelled P-E-D-I-T. The first name looks like Lauren.

MS. WILSON: Okay.
AGENT FLETCHER: And whoever she is said that she was filing individually and for the Vernon House Condo Association.

MS. WILSON: Oh, Lanora Pettit.
AGENT FLETCHER: Okay.
MS. WILSON: She is our president of our board.

AGENT FLETCHER: Okay. So she signed the protest --

MS. WILSON: Yes. And then I --
AGENT FLETCHER: -- as an individual.
MS. WILSON: Um-hum.
AGENT FLETCHER: She lives as an individual, which is fine, but if she were here, I would tell her that condominium associations don't have standing as protestants.

So because it was her intention to file on behalf of the condominium association, the condominium association is actually dismissed as a protestant, because condominium associations cannot file a protest. You have to be a community association, elected officials open to the community. Condo associations don't have standing as protestants.

But the residents in your condo building do.

MS. WILSON: Okay.
AGENT FLETCHER: The condo association represents the condo unit owners.

MS. WILSON: Correct.
AGENT FLETCHER: Right. And so it's not the same as an Advisory Neighborhood Commission that represents the entire community. MS. WILSON: Okay.

AGENT FLETCHER: Or the Kalorama Citizens Association represents the entire community. A condo association represents the owners of the units. And so for us, it's not the same thing.

MS. WILSON: Okay.
AGENT FLETCHER: So I'm going to
dismiss the condominium association. We don't have an address for the condominium association, but can you pronounce that person's name again? At least we will know her name.

MS. WILSON: Lanora.
AGENT FLETCHER: Lanora.
MS. WILSON: And let me -- I'll -- I want to make sure I'm pronouncing her last name. It should be Pettit.

AGENT FLETCHER: P-E?

MS. WILSON: Hold on one second, sorry.

AGENT FLETCHER: P-E? Yeah, we can't read her writing, so we have her listed as -MS. WILSON: Yes, Lanora, L-A-N-O-R-A. AGENT FLETCHER: Oh, L-A-N?

MS. WILSON: L-A-N.
AGENT FLETCHER: Uh-huh.
MS. WILSON: 0-R-A.
AGENT FLETCHER: Uh-huh.
MS. WILSON: Last name Pettit, P, as in papa, E-T-T-I-T.

AGENT FLETCHER: And we have her email address and now that $I$ know her name, it's lcpett@gmail.com. Do you have that over there, too?

MS. WILSON: Yes, lcpett@gmail.com, correct.

AGENT FLETCHER: L-C, like cookie?
MS. WILSON: Yes.
AGENT FLETCHER: P?
MS. WILSON: $P$ as in papa.

AGENT FLETCHER: E?
MS. WILSON: Yep.
AGENT FLETCHER: And two Ts?
MS. WILSON: Yes, ma'am.
AGENT FLETCHER: At gmail.com?
MS. WILSON: Correct.
AGENT FLETCHER: Okay. So we do have her email address?

MS. WILSON: Yes.
AGENT FLETCHER: So do you remember--
MR. IRANI: Ms. Fletcher?
AGENT FLETCHER: Oh, good morning.
MR. IRANI: Good morning. How are you?

AGENT FLETCHER: Okay. ANC representation is present?

MR. IRANI: That's right, yeah.
AGENT FLETCHER: Okay. Could you, please, state your name and spell it for the record?

MR. IRANI: Sure. Amir Irani, A-M-I-R I-R-A-N-I, on behalf of ANC-1C.

AGENT FLETCHER: Okay. Thank you. And so ANC-1C is now present. Just before you got here, ANC-1C was dismissed because you weren't here. I saw you come in and so ANC-1C is granted standing as a protestant. Thank you for coming. Okay.

MR. IRANI: And Mr. James is on his way from KCA.

AGENT FLETCHER: Okay. And when he shows up, we will -- I'll retract his dismissal as well. We are still going through some things.

MR. IRANI: Thank you, Ms. Fletcher.
AGENT FLETCHER: Maybe he will get here in time.

MR. IRANI: All right.
AGENT FLETCHER: Thank you. So, Ms. Meier, the -- so the condominium association is dismissed as a protestant and Ms. Pettit is going to get an order from us dismissing the protest and she will have 10 days to ask the Board to reinstate the protest.

Even though condominium associations
don't have standing, she can ask anyway if she wants to and the Board will say yes or no, but that's her right.

And so, Mr. Campbell, you will get a copy of that order as well. If the association seeks reinstatement, you will be informed and you will have an opportunity to be opposed to it or be in agreement with it.

Ms. Meier, you mentioned that you are in Unit 202 and although you --

MS. WILSON: Excuse me, I'm Ms. Wilson.

MS. MEIER: She is Ms. Wilson.
AGENT FLETCHER: Ms. Wilson, I'm sorry.

MS. WILSON: It's okay.
AGENT FLETCHER: I'm saying -- I'm looking at you.

MS. WILSON: Okay. No problem.
AGENT FLETCHER: Ms. Wilson, you mentioned that your unit is 202 and so your unit, you are not saying that your unit abuts, but you
were thinking that some of the other members of the condo association had units that abut?

MS. WILSON: Correct.
AGENT FLETCHER: Do you know if those individuals signed the Protest Letter?

MS. WILSON: I do know that at least one of them did, Carol Vaughn.

AGENT FLETCHER: Okay.
MS. WILSON: V-A-U-G-H-N.
AGENT FLETCHER: I see that she lives at 1811 Vernon Street, N.W.

MS. WILSON: Yes.
AGENT FLETCHER: And why do you think her unit abuts? I mean, does she have a common wall as far as you know?

MS. WILSON: Yes, yes. So when you are standing on the street --

AGENT FLETCHER: Um-hum.
MS. WILSON: -- you can see that both of the buildings are touching.

AGENT FLETCHER: And what about the walls of her unit?

MS. WILSON: Yes, it is. I believe it is her living room wall.

AGENT FLETCHER: Do you know her unit number?

MS. WILSON: I was just looking at that. I believe she is 101.

AGENT FLETCHER: 101. And so, Ms. Wilson, you believe she abuts or you know she abuts?

MS. WILSON: I am 99 percent confident that she abuts.

AGENT FLETCHER: Thank you. What about Mimi Papas?

MS. WILSON: Mimi, I believe does not abut, but she is also an owner in the building.

AGENT FLETCHER: Okay. So she is a part of the group of residents anyway. I'm just trying to --

MS. WILSON: Yes.
AGENT FLETCHER: -- separate out in the abutting, because if there are any abutting property owners, then they have standing as a
part of your group and standing as abutting property owners.

MS. WILSON: Okay. Got it. Okay.
AGENT FLETCHER: Which means that if your group for some reason was dismissed, she could carry on as an abutting property owner.

MS. WILSON: Okay.
AGENT FLETCHER: So that's why I'm trying to determine who may be abutting.

So right now what I have, according to you, Ms. Wilson, is that Carol Vaughn is abutting. She is not here to say whether or not she abuts, but based on your observation, she is abutting.

MS. WILSON: That's correct.
AGENT FLETCHER: Okay. And, Mr.
Campbell, you are not aware of whether or not Carol Vaughn is on the other side of one of your walls or not?

MR. CAMPBELL: I am not.
AGENT FLETCHER: Okay. Thank you. Do you know if Marcus Mirra is in 1811?

MS. WILSON: He is also part of that building.

AGENT FLETCHER: He is part of that building. Do you know whether or not his unit abuts?

MS. WILSON: It does not abut.
AGENT FLETCHER: Okay.
MS. WILSON: It is on the other side of Carol.

AGENT FLETCHER: Thank you.
MS. WILSON: But they have been the most impacted because their residential -- their doors are outward facing.

AGENT FLETCHER: Right.
MS. WILSON: Versus the rest of ours where you walk into a door and then there is a lobby area and all our units are inside. They have outward facing doors.

AGENT FLETCHER: Okay. Thank you. So I'm just going to go through each address. I just have a few more because of the way the letter was written, I just want to make sure I
cover every address, because one of the sentences says "The grounds of our protest are the effect of the establishment on peace, order and quiet, including noise and litter provisions, as well as the effect on the abutting residences."

And so I'm not sure who those are. So the other address that we have is for Felicia Meier, 1841 Vernon. I know that doesn't abut already, because --

MS. MEIER: Correct.
AGENT FLETCHER: -- I check the addresses before $I$ come in.

MS. MEIER: Um-hum.
AGENT FLETCHER: So I know the
building of 1811 abuts, but I didn't know where the units were located. And so 1841 doesn't abut, but Ms. Meier, you are still a group of five.

Jeff Merrill?
MS. MEIER: Merrill.
AGENT FLETCHER: Jeff Merrill, his
unit does -- his address doesn't abut, but he is
still part of the group of five.
Selma Thomas, you are here.
MS. THOMAS: Yes.
AGENT FLETCHER: So your building doesn't abut, but you are still a part of the group of five.

And Mr. Comp, you are at 1847 also.
MR. COMP: Correct.
AGENT FLETCHER: And so you are part of the group of five without an abutting unit.

MR. COMP: Correct.
AGENT FLETCHER: So what we have is a group of five or more. There are four of you present from the group, which means the group is granted conditional standing and one more person that is not present today needs to come to the Status Hearing and I'll give you that date in a minute.

So conditional standing is granted to the group of five or more. Is there a designated representative for this group? Who is going to be the designated representative for the group of
five or more?
MS. MEIER: I think we had it on the letter, right?

AGENT FLETCHER: Is that in your letter?

MS. WILSON: Yeah, I believe it was myself and Mimi Papas.

AGENT FLETCHER: Oh, let me see here.
MS. WILSON: Mimi was unable to get here with the weather.

AGENT FLETCHER: Okay. Well, maybe it just didn't come through on this. Oh, here it is, here it is. You represent -- you authorize Mimi Papas and Ashley Wilson. Okay.

Let's see, Ms. Wilson, your contact information is on that sheet?

MS. WILSON: Yes, ma'am.
AGENT FLETCHER: So we are going to contact you, because you know you have an alternate, but we just use one designated representative, but we know that Mimi Papas can represent the group also.

MS. WILSON: Great.
AGENT FLETCHER: So I'm going to tell you the number of protestants I count in your group. I'm calling to a group of five or more, but I'm going to tell you what $I$ count.

I see one, two, three, four, five, six, seven, eight, nine. I see nine individuals. Is that about right? Those are the number of signatures that I count?

MS. WILSON: Yes.
AGENT FLETCHER: So this is a group of nine that has been granted conditional standing. So a group of nine was granted conditional standing. I'm going to grant conditional standing to Carol Vaughn as an abutting property owner, because you believe that her property abuts.

When she appears for the Status Hearing or some person on her behalf, she will have to speak for herself in terms of whether or not her property abuts. As an abutting property owner, she actually in-person would need to
appear at the Status Hearing, because if she is granted standing, she is granted standing solo, separate from you. So she would have to appear in-person.

MS. WILSON: Okay.
AGENT FLETCHER: If Caroline Vaughn does not appear in person, she still remains a group -- part of your group, but she would lose her standing as an abutting property owner, but she is still a part of your group.

So I'll grant conditional standing to her. She can appear at the Status Hearing and speak on her own behalf and tell the Board why she believes she is abutting. And at that time, Mr. Campbell or whoever appears on behalf of the applicant will have an opportunity to say she doesn't abut.

But for the purposes of the Roll Call Hearing, she is granted conditional standing. Does all of that make sense?

MS. WILSON: Yes.
AGENT FLETCHER: Okay. ANC-1C has
standing. The group of nine conditional standing. The abutting property owner may be conditional standing.

So we have the Kalorama Citizens Association, I'm going to keep moving, hopefully they will walk in any minute.

MR. COMP: Yes.
AGENT FLETCHER: So the next step is to schedule some dates. $I$ have to schedule a date for --

MR. IRANI: Ms. Fletcher, for the group of nine, do they have conditional standing or is it that three residents within a Moratorium Zone, which we have?

AGENT FLETCHER: Oh, is it a
Moratorium Zone?
MR. IRANI: It is in a Moratorium Zone.

AGENT FLETCHER: Well, that changes everything.

MR. IRANI: Yes.
AGENT FLETCHER: So okay. If you are
in a Moratorium Zone, only three of you need to be present today, that means that you are granted standing --

MS. WILSON: Okay.
AGENT FLETCHER: -- today.
MS. WILSON: Okay.
AGENT FLETCHER: So no -- there is no fifth person that needs to appear. Three of you are present, this group is granted standing.

In a Moratorium Zone, only three people need to be present in a Moratorium Zone.

MR. IRANI: Thank you.
AGENT FLETCHER: Thank you very much.
MS. MEIER: So what about Caroline
Vaughn? Is she the same or --
AGENT FLETCHER: She is still
separate.
MS. MEIER: Okay.
AGENT FLETCHER: Because you believe, Ms. Wilson, that she is abutting, you are pretty sure she is abutting?

MS. WILSON: Yes.

AGENT FLETCHER: So she will still be a part of the group, but as an abutting person, she would have to come and speak on her own behalf, so she remains a part of your group of nine, no matter what.

So the group of nine is granted standing, which means that at the upcoming Status Hearing, only the designated representative for the group needs to appear in-person, except for Ms. Vaughn, who needs to come in-person if she wants to be considered an abutting property owner.

If she doesn't want to be considered an abutting property owner and she doesn't come, she just won't be granted standing as an abutting property owner.

MS. WILSON: Okay.
AGENT FLETCHER: She just continues to be a part of the group. It's up to her. It may not matter to her if she is abutting or not, as long as she is being represented.

So I'm going to give you some dates.

We have to set a date for a Status Hearing, a Protest Hearing and a mediation. I'm going to give you the date for the Status Hearing and Protest Hearing first.

The day of the Status Hearing is September 18th, September 18 at 9:30 a.m. That's September 18 at 9:30.

The Protest Hearing is set for October 30, October 30 at 4:30 p.m. That's October 30 at 4:30 p.m.

MR. IRANI: October 3rd or 30?
AGENT FLETCHER: Oh, 30, 3-0.
MR. IRANI: 30.
AGENT FLETCHER: Uh-huh. We need to set a date for mediation. I will give you the next available day. The next available day for mediation is Thursday, August 8 at 9:00, 10:00, $10: 30,11: 00,11: 30,1: 00$ or $2: 00$ in the afternoon, any time basically.

MR. CAMPBELL: That date doesn't work for the applicant.

AGENT FLETCHER: Okay.

MR. CAMPBELL: Sorry, I have a -AGENT FLETCHER: We will just keep moving.

MR. CAMPBELL: -- baby coming that day. Seriously.

MS. WILSON: No problem.
AGENT FLETCHER: I will keep moving through the calendar. The next available day is Tuesday, August 20, same -- any time of day, 9:00, 10:00, 11:00, 11:30, 1:00, 2:00, any time of day pretty much.

MR. CAMPBELL: You said the 20th?
AGENT FLETCHER: The 20th, uh-huh, Tuesday, August 20.

MR. CAMPBELL: I can do at 4:00 on that day.

AGENT FLETCHER: What time?
MR. CAMPBELL: 4:00 p.m.
AGENT FLETCHER: 4:00 p.m.? We can make that be enough time. The office closes -- I mean, I'll stay until -- if everybody else can come at 4:00, I'll stay, but if -- I'll leave it
up to everybody else.
MS. MEIER: I can do it at 4:00.
MR. IRANI: Okay.
MS. WILSON: Okay.
MR. CAMPBELL: Thank you.
AGENT FLETCHER: Mr. Campbell, if you
can do it at 4:00, $I$ can do it at 4:00.
MR. CAMPBELL: Yes, ma'am, 4:00 p.m.
AGENT FLETCHER: 4:00 it is.
MR. CAMPBELL: On?
AGENT FLETCHER: Tuesday, August 20.
MR. CAMPBELL: Tuesday, August 20.
AGENT FLETCHER: Uh-huh. Excuse me
one second. I was just checking to see what time our doors close out front and I'm never sure if it's 4:00 or 4:30, but it doesn't matter, I'll come and get you.

MR. CAMPBELL: Okay.
(Laughter)

## AGENT FLETCHER:

MR. IRANI: And Mr. James just
notified me and said that he is outside, but he
can't make it in. He is experiencing a lot of back pain and can't walk right now.

AGENT FLETCHER: Oh, no. Okay.
MR. IRANI: Yeah.
AGENT FLETCHER: This is what I will do. I will -- Mr. James, what is his status again?

MR. IRANI: KCA.
AGENT FLETCHER: Uh-huh.
MR. IRANI: Kalorama Citizens
Association.
AGENT FLETCHER: And you said he is outside?

MR. IRANI: He is outside parked, but because of back pain --

AGENT FLETCHER: Yes.
MR. IRANI: -- he can't get out of his car.

AGENT FLETCHER: Okay. Okay. So what I'm going to do, in light of that, I'm going to grant the KCA conditional standing instead of dismissing the KCA, which I had done already.

I'm going to grant conditional standing to the KCA.

And Mr. James can explain to the ABC Board at the Status Hearing what you just said and the Board can decide to grant standing or not.

MR. IRANI: Okay.
AGENT FLETCHER: So I'm granting conditional standing to the KCA because Mr. James is experiencing back pain. He is present and outside, but he can't get out of his car. And he texted that to ANC-1C.

MR. IRANI: Thank you, Ms. Fletcher.
AGENT FLETCHER: You're very welcome.
Sorry to hear that.
So conditional standing granted to the KCA. I think that covers everything.

Any questions from anybody? Okay. So then I'll see you at 4:00 on, what is it, August 20.

MR. CAMPBELL: 4:00?
AGENT FLETCHER: Yes. Thank you for
coming. If you have any questions, give me a call.

MS. WILSON: Thank you.
MR. IRANI: Thank you.
MS. MEIER: Thank you.
MS. THOMAS: Thank you.
MR. COMP: Thank you.
AGENT FLETCHER: Thank you. Thank you very much.
(Whereupon, the Roll Call Hearing was concluded at 10:58 a.m.)
