4	the record. Our next case we have a fact finding
5	hearing, Case No. 19-251-0070, Madam's Organ,
6	License No. 25273. Would all persons having an
7	interest n Madam's Organ please appear. We'll
8	start with the investigator.
9	MS. DANTZLER: Good morning. My name
10	is Felicia Dantzler, ABRA investigator.
11	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Good morning,
12	Ms. Dantzler.
13	SERGEANT TOBE: Sergeant Tobe,
14	Metropolitan Police Department, 3rd District.
15	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Good morning,

11	Okay. I'm going to refer to you so I need to
12	figure it out. I apologize. Thiagarajah. Good
13	morning, sir.

Mr. Duggan.

All right. This matter is a fact finding hearing based on an incident that occurred at Madam's Organ. It appears that there was some altercation inside of the establishment. When our investigator went to investigate the incident, the cameras were not working.

Based on the nature of the incident -I'm trying to see if this is a case that the
police chief had also asked us to -- I think the
police chief had asked us to have a fact finding
hearing. That's where we are today.

The police chief had also asked us to have a -- Chief Peter Newsham on March 24th had asked the ABC Board to have a fact finding hearing because they thought that it was serious enough for us to have the hearing this morning.

What I'll do is I'll start with the investigator to basically let us know from their investigation what was found. We'll also have some comments from Sergeant Tobe and then, sir, you can respond based on what was stated.

Go ahead, Ms. Dantzler.

MS. DANTZLER: On March 24th of 2019
this matter was brought to ABRA's attention by
the Metropolitan Police Department, CCN 19049356.
At Madam's Organ located at 2461 18th Street
Northwest MPD reported that two patrons were
assaulted inside of Madam's Organ.

I was assigned this case by supervisory investigator Mark Brashears. At approximately 2:22 a.m. on the date stated George Garcia, Mark Ruiz, who are also ABRA investigators, accompanied me to Madam's Organ.

Once there on the scene we made our identification known to Ronald Perry Dyson who identified himself as the ABC manager. Mr. Dyson stated that he was working on the night of the incident. However, he did not witness the incident.

Mr. Dyson instructed me to speak with Mike Wolf, one of the security guards. On that very same night I spoke with Mr. Wolf who stated that he was on the second floor of the

establishment overlooking the floor below when he observed a drink hit the wall.

Mr. Wolf stated that he responded to the area and saw Larry Taylor, another employee, separate two patrons. Mr. Wolf stated that he instructed one of the males to go towards the back of the establishment and the other male to go towards the front of the establishment at which time both patrons complied.

Mr. Dyson stated approximately five minutes later as he was making rounds on the third floor stairwell he encountered the patron who he directed to go up towards the front of the floor dazed and bleeding. Mr. Wolf stated that he handed over the male patron to Darren Gray, the security person working at the front door.

Also on that night I spoke with Mr.

Gray stated that he confirmed that Mr. Wolf

brought to his attention a patron who was

injured. Mr. Gray said to the extent of his

involvement, he took the injured patron to one of

the police officers who was standing at a nearby

corner.

Also on that night I spoke with Mr.

Taylor, Larry Taylor, who stated that he saw a

female patron pushing a male patron. Mr. Taylor

stated that he instructed the female patron to go

to the back of the room, or the back of the area

of the establishment. Mr. Taylor stated that his

second sighting of that very same female was when

he saw the female walking out of the

establishment with the injured male.

On Sunday, March 24th, Chief of Police Mr. Newsham contacted ABRA stating that he would like to have a fact finding hearing base off the fact that there have been six incidents that have occurred, six incidents involving MPD that have occurred since January 1, 2019. That concludes my statement.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Did you conclude were there any ABRA violations?

MS. DANTZLER: I did check the records and saw that the establishment does have a security plan and I'm looking at the security

1	plan. There were no violations as it relates to
2	the security plan. The establishment does have
3	cameras. I believe it was six cameras. However,
4	the area where the camera was located was not
5	operable.
6	MEMBER SHORT: The area or the camera?
7	MS. DANTZLER: The camera was not
8	operable where the incident occurred.
9	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: So what does
10	their security plan state about their cameras and
11	its operation?
12	MS. DANTZLER: It just states that not
13	all of their cameras will be working. That's the
14	extent of the language for the cameras.
15	MEMBER SHORT: Not all the cameras
16	will be working?
17	MS. DANTZLER: Yes.
18	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: So why have
19	cameras if your security plan said not all of the
20	cameras will be working?
21	Sergeant Tobe, do you have anything
22	you can add, sir?

SERGEANT TOBE: Just the fact that this situation was brought to our attention by the security of Madam's Organ who alerted us to the individual that was injured. Also they told us who to stop so they identified the suspects, helped us in identifying the suspects.

Immediately we got the suspects stopped. Then subsequently did an investigation that resulted in two arrests for the assault that occurred inside. They were very cooperative and helpful to us on the scene.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right.

Thank you for that representation.

All right. Yes, Mr. Silverstein.

MEMBER SILVERSTEIN: I would ask both
Inspector Dantzler -- Investigator Dantzler and
Sergeant Tobe, beyond any ABRA violations was
there anything that they did that fell short of
the standard that we should set regarding
response to an incident like this? Is there
anything they did wrong? Anything they could
have done better?

tell. Like I said, they immediately -- we had officers standing pretty much essentially in front of their establishment. They alerted us to the injured person and told us who to stop in reference to it. I mean, I think they went above and beyond as far as what they were required to do.

MS. DANTZLER: I believe as it relates to the incident where there was some sort of a struggle with the two patrons, I believe that just with my experience dealing with these types of situations generally one set, or one person or group, is ejected from the establishment.

The fact that a glass was thrown is not something that's in the ordinary customer service type of approach. I found that problematic that it reached to that level. Once the staff intervened both parties were allowed to stay inside.

Investigator Garcia and I, while we were there, we went to the area where the

incident occurred. You can see like droplets of blood in the area. There is a camera that was at the bottom of the stairway. I want to say also at the top of the stairway where the incident occurred.

That's where the victim was
encountered by one of the staff. That area where
the cameras were were not operable. It would
have been helpful had the cameras been operable
to aid MPD as far as helping with their
investigation as well as our help to see how the
establishment reacted at that point.

I do believe had the establishment perhaps ejected one of the parties, perhaps this incident may not have gotten to the level that it did.

My investigation revealed through MPD that the female who was accosted by one of the men in that group, who was either touched inappropriately or spoken to in an inappropriate manner, and that was the birth of the --

MEMBER SILVERSTEIN: That was the

	genesis of it.
2	MS. DANTZLER: Yes. Of how this came
3	about. It seems like an opportune time but that
4	situation was not explored by the establishment.
5	Perhaps if they would have addressed that and
6	maybe ejected the folks at that time, that would
7	have probably helped in the matter of the
8	gentleman being struck with the glass.
9	MEMBER SILVERSTEIN: Thank you,
10	Investigator.
11	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Mr.
12	Thiagarajah, how does your does the client
13	have any response to the report?
14	MR. THIAGARAJAH: Yes. I'll clarify
15	that the six security that were on duty that
16	night at Madam's Organ two of them worked quickly
17	to diffuse the situation when there was the
18	altercation.
19	MEMBER SILVERSTEIN: Can you move the
20	microphone closer to you?
21	MR. THIAGARAJAH: Sorry.
22	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: It just

amplifies your voice. That's all it does. It does amplifies.

MR. THIAGARAJAH: So, as I was saying, of the six there were two who worked quickly to diffuse the initial altercation. By the evidence that they had there was -- they didn't think there would be an escalation.

The couple said they were fine and the other three said they didn't want any trouble.

They separated them. It was closing time.

Everyone would be ushered out as the rest of the patrons would also be ushered out. The unfortunate event that occurred after, which happened very quickly, was dealt with immediately.

The two assailants were escorted out right to the police. By all indications there was reasonable judgment exercised. They had the six security in place. There were 16 cameras and six security officers and an appropriate security plan that worked.

Now, the camera -- I'll let Mr. Duggan

explain it, but there was just a malfunction. 1 2 There was a one-off malfunction. Just to reiterate what we heard previously, there were no 3 4 indications of any violations in the reports. 5 The prior incidents I don't believe is really relevant. 6 7 I mean, no violations were found in 8 any of those. Those don't really relate to the 9 situation here and it's hard to see the relevance of bringing those in at this hearing on the 10 11 incident that took place on March 24th. 12 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: You trailed off 13 at the end. 14 MR. THIAGARAJAH: I was staying I 15 don't see the relevance of the incidents, the 16 prior incidents that were cited, because they 17 don't have overlapping facts or overlapping 18 individuals. There were no violations found out 19 of those as it is. 20 I'll let Mr. Duggan give more of a

there that night. I was not on the second floor.

I was right at the front door. I do think

there's a misunderstanding of what happened

because the individual, Mike Wolf, was on the

third floor, not the second floor. He was called

down.

The incident with the glass that was the same incident. The glass was the incident that we're responding to. That's when the fellow got hurt. Again, I'm only going from what I got. They brought them down the stairs and literally, you know, I told the chief that we didn't call 911 because literally there were two officers there and these guys literally ran.

I mean, we could tell they were trying to get away from something because they were in a hurry coming down the stairs. My security guy was behind them. We call him Big Larry. He was right behind them bringing them down and they literally ran into the arms of MPD. We held them until we could find out what had happened.

Again, originally what we thought we

didn't hear about the glass incident until the security guy came down. He identified them right away. We dealt with the police right there. We got the other fellow down right behind them.

The fellow was bleeding from the head and we got him attention right away. We already had somebody there with first aid stuff. It looked ugly. It was a gash on his head from the glass and it was bleeding a lot. Luckily it looked a lot worse than it was.

In speaking to them, again, my understanding of the incident is relatively different because my understanding from my security people there that night, and even from MPD when we were speaking with them, was that the female was actually the instigator, not from somebody touching but one of the people apparently stepped on her foot as they were moving through the room and she got up in their face.

That's the incident where they separated them. She was yelling and the guys.

My people thought they had it under control. We were coming up on closing. I don't think it's a surprise to anyone that there are arguments in a bar or restaurant at any given point. I think we've even had a few arguments in this room but nobody has carried me out yet.

You know, we deal with things and we're usually in the business of diffusing situations. I think had they at closing started trying to take three individuals out or whatever, I think it could have caused more of a scene right then. Unfortunately, this happened afterwards.

I don't think it was anything that any of us foresaw, or could have foreseen happening.

I have it all the time where we see people and can we separate here and is everybody okay.

Sometimes they say yes, and sometimes it's an apology. Sometimes it's someone glaring at the other one. We have very little trouble.

In fact, these other incidents that the chief noticed there, I happened to have been

there for both the sexual assault thing.

Unfortunately, Adams Morgan is extremely
ethnically diverse and I think it was a cultural
thing.

We had an individual, an older African gentleman, who grabbed a woman's butt. She complained and we brought him out. We had the police talk to him and they arrested him and she said she wanted to file charges for sexual assault. That's the sexual assault there.

The other one, the trespass, again was an individual that we asked to leave. Again, it was an older man and he just wouldn't leave. We didn't call 911 because we had the officers right there. They came over. In fact, I left because I thought it was all under control.

I was at happy hour eating with some friends across the street. Apparently the guy wouldn't leave and they arrested him for trespassing. It wasn't a major incident.

I believe it happened about 7:30, 8:00 at night. I think in all these years of

operating, I think we run a pretty clean shop and I'm very proud of my security people that, again, they are able to diffuse most incidents.

I think we have a better than normal relationship with the officers that are out there because their parking space is literally right across the street from Madam's Organ. That's the designated parking for their group. There is no way we took away, as the chief said, from 3D.

We have a designated group of -- the sergeant can answer that better but I think 13 officers literally right across the street on any given Wednesday through Saturday. They are there for the Adams Morgan club strip. They are not deployed throughout 3D unless there's a bigger problem in 3D.

We have, in fact, the individual

Darren Gray, who was the doorman who they quoted,

was given the civilian commendation last year for

helping to save those two officers' lives that

were run over in the street by the truck two

years ago. We have a very good relationship, I

hope, with them and with the ABC investigators.
We are extremely accommodating with any of them.

The thing with the security plan, we have 16 cameras and I usually call Night Owl Security for those. Unfortunately, with 16 cameras at any given point one or two could be down. I mean, I've had the same security system at my beach house.

I spent an hour-and-a-half on the phone with Night Owl yesterday just to get them back up and running. Anytime you're dealing with software that's running through the internet, things can happen. I have no idea why that particular one but 15 or 16 cameras were operational and we handed over that DVD to the police.

In fact, we got it to them before they asked for it because within a day we got a subpoena from a defense attorney asking for that.

We burned two and got it to the detective immediately as well. We wanted him to see whatever was there before the other counsel got

it.

Overall, I think, again the sergeant can attest to it, I think we have a great relationship, a working relationship, with the police on that beat. As I said, it's an unfortunate incident but I don't think anybody acted out of line whatsoever.

As I said, I think there was a misunderstanding when they interviewed Mr. Wolf because there was not a physical altercation prior to that first one. If somebody had thrown a glass in my bar, believe me nobody is going to be standing inside our bar to throw another one.

They will escort them out. That part

I believe was just a miscommunication as to

exactly what happened. Mr. Wolf came down when

he was called by the other fellow. They all have

radios and he was called down to assist them when

that incident happened.

Mr. Wolf attended to the injured individual and the other security guy, Larry, brought the other three down to us and that's the

way the incident ended that night.

I'm relatively surprised because in the larger scheme of things it's unfortunate and a bad incident but it certainly was not an overthe-top incident that the chief of police would write a letter to the ABC Board within -- they finished their investigation 4:15, I think. The chief of police was writing a letter within relatively a few hours, the same morning.

I think he also had a misunderstanding of what the deployment is of his own officers because we definitely are not pulling officers off of their beats in 3D. They are there for that. We use them and we communicate with them literally all night long on any given night.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Mr. Duggan, as you stated, the chief of police wrote us a letter. He believed his officers. I assume it was someone within 3D informed him and he informed us that we need to -- that he thought that the incident was serious enough, and based on the prior incident at the establishment, that

we should do an investigation. But that's neither here nor there.

One thing I was concerned about is the operation of the cameras. It's unfortunate that we have an incident that occurred and it so happened that the camera that would catch the incident is not working. It's unfortunate because you have 16 cameras and 15 was working that night but the one camera that would protect you for any other event, that one was not working.

MR. DUGGAN: I feel the same way. As I said 15 to 16, and that one was repaired within a day. I will add that there's no way we can alter that. Any footage that we have is fixed in those cameras and it's in the DVR. What we turned over there's no way for us to alter it, no way for us to delete one camera or anything of that short.

There's nothing sinister going on.

Again, in a four-floor establishment 16 cameras.

I'm sorry but at any given point that's why we

put that in there, that we can't guarantee 1 2 everything is working. Honestly, we're not required to have 3 cameras. We put the 16 cameras in there with the 4 5 DVR recording it so that we can be responsible. That's not a requirement by ABC or by any agency 6 7 of the government. 8 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: I'm aware of 9 that, sir. I'm aware of that. That's one reason 10 I'm going to bring -- I know you are a CT establishment so, therefore, you're not required 11 12 to have a security plan. However, you do have a 13 security plan that was done in 2009. That's a 14 very old security plan. Actually, we have a new 15 MR. DUGGAN: 16 one. There is a newer one. 17 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Hold on. 18 MR. DUGGAN: We changed it on March 19 20th of this year. 20 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Well, the ABC 21 Board does not have your security plan. We sent

you a letter in February on February 19th, and

1 also one was sent to your previous counsel just 2 to let you know that the security plan that you had was not covered. Since you have a security 3 4 plan, would you agree within the next 30 days to 5 provide ABRA with a legally sufficient security plan? 6 7 MR. DUGGAN: Absolutely. She said it 8 was submitted to ABRA. We have the receipt from March 20th it was submitted to ABRA. 9 submit it again. No problem. 10 11 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: So I would ask 12 that you submit it again and that we will review it to see if it's legally compliant. 13 I was told 14 as of this morning that we didn't have the -that the security plan that we have was from 15 16 2009. 17 MR. DUGGAN: Ms. Boyez is my general 18 She submitted it then but we'll submit manager. 19 another one today. 20 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right. 21 Thank you. 22 Ms. Dantzler, do you have anything you want to --

MS. DANTZLER: Mr. Anderson, my investigation showed that it wasn't a question of whether or not what the establishment did once they came across the injured patron. They did what they did immediately and brought it to the attention of MPD. But there's definitely a difference in material facts of actually what happened.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Okay.

MS. DANTZLER: This female reported to MPD that she was struck in the face. The incident that happened on the floor was, as I understand it through MPD's report, is that the throwing of the glass was in conjunction with all of that.

I understand Mr. Duggan's position as he stated that, you know, if someone throws a glass, they will react immediately. Mr. Wolf was very clear in his recollection of what happened on that night.

From just separating the members and

to rely on the fact that the establishment is closing and that's the reason why no one was ejected, I think that falls short of really protecting the patrons who are there. Someone should have been ejected. Police should have been notified to help aid in this.

I don't think it was a coincidence that five minutes later Mr. Wolf is doing rounds and comes across this injured person who he separated earlier, five minutes earlier. I think there definitely needs to be a clear way of protecting the patrons when the establishment is encountering that type of behavior.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Well, I'm
hoping that with the security -- with this
updated security plan, that will be provided to
the agency, I'm hoping that will have some clear
guidelines what the proper procedures are once an
incidence occurs within the establishment.

Mr. Thiagarajah. See, I wrote it down. That's why I'm looking whenever you see me think about calling the names. You don't have

1 I thought you had something you wanted to 2 say. 3 MR. THIAGARAJAH: No. As I said, 4 obviously in the future we'll continue to do 5 everything we can. We'll get you that updated security plan today. Should we mail it? 6 7 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Ms. Randall, 8 our assistant general counsel, will provide you 9 her card and you can provide the security plan to 10 the agency through her. 11 Mr. Dantzler, do you have any final 12 comments you would like to make? 13 MS. DANTZLER: No, sir. 14 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Sergeant Tobe? 15 SERGEANT TOBE: No, sir. 16 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Thank you. 17 Yes, Mr. Silverstein. 18 MEMBER SILVERSTEIN: First, before we do anything, I want to thank Investigator 19 20 Dantzler for the thoroughness and for the work 21 that she's done on this case. It's important. Ι 22 would address Mr. Duggan and remind him of

basically what we're doing here, what are charge is.

We're overseeing the second biggest industry in the city and the second biggest employer after government. Our job more than anything is a preventive job to make sure that if something bad happens, or is going to, that we are all prepared, that people understand what we have to do to protect ourselves and to protect one another.

We need to be certain that everyone is prepared, that cameras are on, that there are security plans where they are needed, that people understand what is to be done.

The issue here was one of preparation and one of proper response. We are a target to all kinds of things. We saw that this past Saturday in Dupont Circle. We never know what's going to happen.

The most important work that we can do here, and we've done it many times on things that people know nothing about, is to make sure that

those things that are falling short are -- first, that we oversee.

Oversight is the most important thing we do to make sure that you are doing what you need to do in advance, that you are prepared, that we are all prepared because we don't know what's going to happen.

That's why the chief with six violent incidents, or six calls rather -- excuse me, six calls in a number of months said to take a look and be sure that everything is okay. This is not to pick on you or anyone in particular.

It's just when you see a flag like that, oversight is important. I thank you for your cooperation. I thank you for making sure that the cameras are in working order and understanding that we are all in this together and that we never know what's going to happen tomorrow so we have to be prepared today.

MR. DUGGAN: I agree 100 percent. Thank you.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Thank you, Mr.

1	Silverstein.
2	Sergeant Tobe, any final comments you
3	want to make?
4	SERGEANT TOBE: No, thank you.
5	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Thank you.
6	Mr. Thiagarajah, you have the final
7	word if you need to say anything else.
8	MR. THIAGARAJAH: I have nothing else.
9	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right.
10	We're joined by Mr. Short.
11	Good morning, Mr. Short.
12	The agreement that we have today is
13	that, Mr. Duggan, you have agreed to provide the
14	agency with an updated security plan within the
15	next 30 days and that's the agreement that we
16	have today. Thank you.
17	I make a motion that we take no
18	further action on this matter. Is there a
19	second?
20	MEMBER CATO: Second.
21	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Mr. Cato
22	seconded the motion. All those in favor say aye.

1	(Chorus of ayes.)
2	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Those opposed?
3	The matter passes 5-0-0. Thank you for being
4	here today. I thank all the parties for being
5	here today and have a great day.
6	(Whereupon, the above-entitled matter went
7	off the record at 10:44 a.m.)
