3	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right. So
4	our next case is a fact-finding case hearing.
5	Case Number 1925100052. DC Shenanigans, License
6	Number 88119.
7	Will the parties please approach and
8	identify themselves for the record, please?
9	MR. O'BRIEN: Stephen O'Brien for the
10	licensee.
11	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Mr. O'Brien.
12	MR. O'BRIEN: Accompanied by Thomas
13	Hall to my immediate left, and Thomas King to my
14	far left.
15	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Thomas Hall and
16	Thomas
17	MR. O'BRIEN: King and Hall.
18	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: King and Hall.
19	Okay.
20	MR. O'BRIEN: Who are the principals
21	of the licensee.
22	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right.

1	Thank you.
2	INVESTIGATOR PROUT: I'm Investigator
3	Prout with ABRA.
4	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Good afternoon
5	Investigator Prout.
6	SERGEANT TOBE: And I'm Sergeant Tobe
7	with the Metropolitan Police Department.
8	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Good afternoon
9	Sergeant Tobe. Now, this is a fact finding
10	hearing that was requested by the Chief of
11	Police.
12	And it stems from a March 2, 2019
13	enforcement investigation that was regarding
14	an altercation that occurred between three male
15	patrons.
16	Now, my only concern was that the
17	Board has that it doesn't appear that the cameras
18	recorded. And it doesn't appear that there was
19	any working.
20	And I guess this is a CT. So, do you
21	guys have do they have a security plan?
22	MR. O'BRIEN: Yes, sir.

1 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: And is your 2 client aware that as part of our regulations that if your camera is not working, -- the camera was 3 4 not working, or was it just not -- was it not 5 recording? MR. O'BRIEN: Well, the security plan 6 based at 2014. And it -- the security plan does 7 8 not require cameras. 9 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All Okay. 10 right. All right. Okay. 11 MR. O'BRIEN: But then I -- but to 12 finish I think where you're going --CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: No. 13 I was 14 to say that if your -- to see if your about 15 security plan is a -- security plan requires 16 cameras that our regulation states that if your cameras are not working, that the licensee is 17 18 supposed to advise the Board. 19 To take proactive steps to advise the 20 Board that your camera is not working. So it 21 shouldn't be that we go to an establishment and

the camera is not working.

That you are supposed to know that 1 2 it's not working. And you need to advise the Board that a camera is not working. 3 4 I was just --5 MR. O'BRIEN: No. I understand. But 6 it's -- as the Chair has recognized, if a security plan doesn't require cameras in the 7 8 first place. 9 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Right. 10 MR. O'BRIEN: Okay. I'm told that 11 this business was established in 2011. Am I 12 correct? 13 The cameras that the investigator 14 observed were there when they took over from the 15 predecessor operator. And in all the time 16 they've been there, have never worked and never 17 been utilized. 18 They're dead -- they were dead cameras 19 that were sitting there. 20 MR. KING: Actually, you can view. 21 They don't record. 22 MR. O'BRIEN: Oh. All right.

1	you always view?
2	MR. HALL: Certain cameras at certain
3	parts.
4	MR. O'BRIEN: Even up too currently?
5	MR. HALL: Yes. You could.
6	MR. O'BRIEN: Okay.
7	MR. KING: The it goes with the
8	we saw the Chief's request, the camera system now

10	MR. O'BRIEN: All right.
11	MR. KING: And I have the receipt to
12	show it.
13	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right. So
14	what I'll do then is I'll start with the
15	investigator. And then I'll have him,
16	Investigator Prout, Prout will tell us a little
17	about the report.
18	And then you can respond. And so,
19	Investigator Prout, can you introduce yourself
20	for the record, please?
21	INVESTIGATOR PROUT: Yes, sir. My
22	name is Investigator Tavril Prout.

1	MEMBER SILVERSTEIN: Could you please
2	speak up, sir?
3	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: And speak
4	you can pull the microphone closer. And I am
5	aware that you're no, not that one.
6	The other one. That, yeah that's it.
7	That's the recorder for the transcriber. That's
8	the report.
9	And I know this is your first, at
10	least this is the first time you are appearing in
11	front of me to testify. So, don't be nervous. I
12	won't bite you.
13	And just so you tell us your name
14	for the record. And how are you familiar with
15	this establishment?
16	INVESTIGATOR PROUT: Yes. So, my name
17	is Tavril Prout. And I am an investigator for
18	ABRA. On Saturday, March 2, I responded to a
19	call to the ABRA line from the Metropolitan
20	Police Department.
21	It was stated an aggravated assault
22	had just taken place inside of DC Shenanigans

located at 2450 18th Street, NW. Involving one 1 2 male patron, who was struck in the face multiple times with a closed fist by two unknown male 3 4 patrons. 5 Upon arrival on Saturday, March 2, 2019, I interviewed the responding MPD Officer, 6 Benitez Garcia, on an aggravated assault that 7 8 occurred resulting in one male patron being 9 treated at George Washington University Hospital for a fractured skull, nose, and internal 10 11 bleeding. 12 With one suspect arrested, treated for 13 abrasions on the right hand at George Washington 14 University Hospital. And then transported to PD's Third District for processing. 15 16 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: This is what I 17 want you to do. You don't have to read your 18 report word for word. Just summarize what 19 happened. 20 INVESTIGATOR PROUT: Okay.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: And what --

21

investigation.

INVESTIGATOR PROUT: So, on March 2 I arrived to DC Shenanigans. We received a call for an aggravated assault that occurred.

A male patron was struck in the face by two male patrons. One male patron was holding the victim up against the bar.

And the alleged brother struck him in the face. The victim lost consciousness. And he was transported to George Washington University Hospital.

From the last conversation I had with MPD, he was in an induced coma. He is from Australia.

The cameras were not working in the establishment. An incident report was taken.

And medical attention was provided by the ABC

Manager, Sean Griffith, who was on duty on that evening.

After the assault transpired, the licensee did take reasonable steps in contacting MPD in a timely manner.

1	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: So, did you
2	see, as a result of your investigation, did you
3	see any violation that occurred at at the
4	establishment?
5	INVESTIGATOR PROUT: No.
6	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: And did the
7	licensee cooperate with you in you conducting
8	your investigation?
9	INVESTIGATOR PROUT: Yes, sir. I did
10	take the opportunity to review their security
11	plan. And they did have four security staff on
12	duty. Which is in correspondence with what the
13	security plan states.
14	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Okay. Do you
15	have anything else you want to add?
16	INVESTIGATOR PROUT: The only concern
17	that I do have, was already brought up by the
18	Board, is that the cameras are not able to
19	record.
20	MEMBER SILVERSTEIN: Will you say
21	again?
22	INVESTIGATOR PROUT: The so my only

1	concern that I have at this current time is that
2	the cameras inside the establishment are unable
3	to record.
4	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Now, I heard
5	there was a statement by the licensee that that
6	has been corrected. Was that information
7	provided to you prior to this hearing?
8	INVESTIGATOR PROUT: No.
9	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: So you weren't
10	aware that they had taken any steps to correct
11	that?
12	INVESTIGATOR PROUT: No, sir.
13	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right. All
14	right. Sergeant? Sergeant Tobe?
15	SERGEANT TOBE: Yes?
16	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: This is one of
17	the reasons why we had the spec line in here.
18	And it's because the Chief of Police had
19	requested that we have that.
20	And so, what what if anything, can
21	you add to this hearing?
22	SERGEANT TOBE: One thing I'd like to

add, as far as the on-scene investigation went, their security did an excellent job in helping us. Not only alert us to the situation, but also to close the case.

They flagged us down immediately. And a couple of the staff members actually were able to act as witnesses. And we were able to get the case closed immediately when they -- when they were able to point out to us.

They gave us a good description to go on as to who was the suspect in this case. We were able to make a stop right outside of the bar by the bus stop, on the individual that had actually committed the crime.

And they assisted us when we did the show up. And actually were crucial in helping us close this case.

So, we were impressed with what they did on scene. So, it's very much complimentary of how they helped us that night, so.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Mr. O'Brien, the Sergeant, right?

1	SERGEANT TOBE: Yes, Sergeant.
2	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: The Sergeant
3	made made your job that much easier.
4	MR. O'BRIEN: (Laughing)
5	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: But what is
6	that you can add? Sir, if your lawyer said that
7	you can speak, then you can speak.
8	So so, Mr. O'Brien, what can you
9	now, you're based on the investigation and
10	information by the Sergeant, how does the
11	licensee respond?
12	MR. O'BRIEN: Well, Mr. Chair, one of
12 13	MR. O'BRIEN: Well, Mr. Chair, one of the thing a lawyer learns only through experience

1	security plan. But I thought it was an awful
2	good idea, and I thought they would look a lot
3	better today in front of the Board, to say that
4	they have installed working cameras.
5	Now working and recording cameras.
6	And I am told, and given some documentation here
7	that they have.
8	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right.
9	MR. O'BRIEN: That there are no
10	cameras,
11	MR. KING: Yes, sir.
12	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: How many
13	cameras?
14	MR. O'BRIEN: Recording for up to 30
15	days.
16	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: How many
17	cameras do you have? And how long can do they
18	record for?
19	MR. KING: Eight days, I mean, or
20	excuse me, eight cameras. And they record up for
21	a month.
22	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: For 30 days.

1 Would you, Mr. O'Brien again, this is a fact-2 finding hearing. And would your client be averse to an 3 4 Investigator go to the establishment to look at 5 the cameras to make sure that they're -- to assist to see if there are any blind spots? 6 7 MR. O'BRIEN: Not adverse, rather 8 welcomed. 9 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: So, I would --10 I am requesting that the Agency work with the 11 licensee to go to the establishment to check on 12 the location of the cameras to see if there are 13 any obvious blind spots. 14 MEMBER SHORT: Do they have a security 15 plan? CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: They do have a 16 17 security plan. And I guess, it's a CT? 18 MR. O'BRIEN: It is. 19 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: So, I'm not 20 going to -- they have a secure all voids that are 21 -- I guess Mr. O'Brien, I know you had stated 22 that they're updated there.

1	Do you know whether or not the
2	security plan that they have is a has it been
3	updated? Is it current?
4	Is it current with our current rules
5	and regulations? And if it's not, would you be
6	averse to providing the Agency with an updated?
7	And this is, it's an updated security
8	plan that's
9	MEMBER SHORT: Sufficient, yeah.
10	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: That's legally
11	sufficient?
12	MR. O'BRIEN: Well, I believe the
13	present plan to be legally sufficient.
14	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: I don't know.
15	MR. O'BRIEN: It's been reviewed and
16	approved by the Board's legal staff.
17	MR. KING: We actually added another
18	security person to the plan.
19	MR. O'BRIEN: Yeah.
20	MR. KING: To roam around. We added
21	a person to roam. We have a person at the front
22	door, second floor, first floor.

And we have a fourth person that, you 1 2 know, goes -- roams around. Put an extra set of eyes on where it's busiest on the night. 3 4 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Let me -- now, 5 I see why the -- tell me about the security procedures. I see one of the things that came up 6 7 in the report was that when the clientele goes in 8 there, they're not wand. 9 I mean, what's that about? 10 MR. HALL: Go ahead, sir? 11 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: They're not 12 wanded. 13 MR. HALL: They're not wanded? 14 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Yes. 15 MR. HALL: We just don't have a --16 this is a pub. This is a pub that plays Irish music and throwback music. 17 18 We only even have the upstairs open 19 out of the 88 hours a week we're open, the 20 upstairs is open a grand total of nine. So we're 21 barely even open upstairs. 22 We've never had a weapon used ever.

1 Just a, you know, we only know of a couple of 2 incidents period in the eight years where there's an altercation inside the place. 3 So, we -- and we don't like using, it, 4 5 because we have a very high contingent of females There's a lot of females come in. 6 in our place. 7 And they tend not to like. They tend 8 to shun upon being wanded. They think it's a 9 dangerous place. And we think that would hurt our 10 11 reputation. That's why we never did it. 12 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: I'm not -- I 13 cannot tell you what to do or -- what to do or 14 what not to do. But now you are aware of certain 15 16 dangers that are out there. So, as long as you 17 take appropriate measures that you think works 18 with the operation of your business. 19 And you have to keep that in consideration. 20 21 MR. O'BRIEN: Mr. Chair, may I emphasize that the instant matter, the March 2 22

1	matter did not involve a weapon.
2	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right.
3	MR. O'BRIEN: So, wanding would not
4	have made any difference.
5	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Right.
6	MR. O'BRIEN: And there's no history
7	of weapon problems.
8	MR. HALL: There's never been weapons.
9	MR. O'BRIEN: This is not a nightclub
10	is what he's saying.
11	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: I know. I'm
12	given certain notes. And that was one of the key
13	points I was told to touch.
14	So, that's the reason why I had asked.
15	MR. O'BRIEN: Yes, sir.
16	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Anything else
17	you want to add?
18	MR. O'BRIEN: No. Well, the licensee
19	regrets anything like this happening. It
20	happened.
21	The licensee dealt with it quickly.
22	I know the Board does not want to prolong this

1	hearing.
2	We do have the bartender present if
3	the Board needed to talk to him. Who, as soon as
4	this that it was not it's not like this was
5	a build up to a problem.
6	Or that you could sense that things
7	were going bad. It was very sudden. The
8	bartender immediately went over the bar to assist
9	the victim.
10	And as as Sergeant as the
11	Sergeant has said, assisted in all different
12	ways.
13	So, we did what we could once this
14	unexpected event transpired.
15	(Off mic comments)
16	MR. KING: One of our security is a
17	trained EMT.
18	MR. HALL: We have a security guy
19	that's a trained EMT.
20	MR. KING: So he treated him when they
21	were called.
22	MR. O'BRIEN: Okay. One of the

1	security personnel on duty that night is an
2	Emergency Medical Technician.
3	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Okay.
4	MR. O'BRIEN: And is present. And
5	that individual treated the victim that night on
6	the spot.
7	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Okay.
8	MR. O'BRIEN: And called for for
9	emergency assistance. The purpose of bringing
10	him and the bartender today was to show that we
11	did everything we could once this transpired.
12	If the Board wants to hear from either
13	either of them, they're certainly available.
14	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: If you want
15	that it's your call Mr. O'Brien, if you want
16	the person to testify since there here.
17	If they want to add anything, I'm fine
18	with it.
19	MR. O'BRIEN: No. I think I'll leave
20	it as it is here.
21	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Okay. All
22	right.

1	MEMBER SHORT: I'd like to make a
2	comment.
3	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Yes. Go ahead
4	Mr. Short.
5	MEMBER SHORT: Well, I'd like to think
6	that it sounds like a lot of cooperation went on
7	between the ABRA person, Investigator, and MPD.
8	And thank you Sergeant for your service.
9	And it sounds like you have an EMT
10	there that worked on it right away. And that's
11	music to my ears for certain reasons.
12	But anyway, you're doing a lot of the
13	right things. And I see where you've got the
14	cameras functioning.
15	And you're going to have an
16	investigator to come by. But, I have to make
17	this observation.
18	You know, in this day and time, and
19	they say in this city, not if, when something
20	could occur. And I would I understand that
21	you have a nice crowd.
22	A pub, and your business is great.

But, you might want to think about what's going on currently in this country and around the world.

You can't have too much security now a days. Because when they know people don't wand or don't do any detecting, those are soft spots or soft targets as they would call them.

So you might want to think about doing something. I don't know if you -- we suggested in the hearing that we can't describe anything for you.

But, just consider what's going on as far as public safety is concerned in places of public assembly. And there are just a lot of angry people.

And like they're coming out of the woodwork. So, Washington, D.C. is a prime target for something to happen.

So, just be cautious. And if you can, do a little something better with security. With all this coming and going.

You probably know most of your

1	regulars. Is that correct?
2	MR. HALL: Yes, sir.
3	MEMBER SHORT: So, when somebody comes
4	in who's not a regular, would that person get
5	wanded?
6	MR. HALL: Currently we don't have
7	we do no wanding at all. But I take under I
8	understand what you're saying.
9	MEMBER SHORT: Okay. Good. That's all
10	I want to hear.
11	MR. HALL: So if you want us to look
12	at ways to enhance anything we can do, because we
13	want to do everything we can. We don't want any
14	problems.
15	That's the last thing we want.
16	MEMBER SHORT: Thank you. That's
17	that's very encouraging coming from you. And
18	again, thank everybody for coming today.
19	And we've heard some things. And I'm
20	glad to hear that you've got the cameras
21	functioning. And that this agency is coming
22	over.

1	Thank you Mr. Chair. That's all I
2	have.
3	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Thank you. Any
4	other questions by other Board Members?
5	(No response)
6	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Mr. O'Brien, I
7	was while Mr. Short was asking, I was
8	reviewing this security your security plan.
9	I see that your firm had provided the
10	security plan to the Agency on March 18, 2014.
11	And the suggestion that I would ask is that is
12	to ask that you amend the security plan to add
13	the cameras since you do have the cameras.
14	I don't know how many cameras. But
15	whatever amount of cameras that you have, to
16	for you to amend the security plan to add
17	cameras, so that it becomes an official portion
18	of your security plan.
19	Would you be amenable to doing that?
20	MR. O'BRIEN: Yes.
21	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: So I would ask
22	that you provide that within the next could

1	that be provided to the Agency within the next 30
2	days?
3	MR. O'BRIEN: Yes.
4	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: That you would
5	amend your security plan to add the cameras. How
6	many cameras that you currently have?
7	MR. KING: Eight.
8	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Eight cameras.
9	And that add the cameras in. And since we're
10	going to add the cameras that it will record for
11	the 30 days.
12	MR. O'BRIEN: Very well.
13	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Any other
14	questions? Thank you Sergeant for being here.
15	Investigator Prout, thank you for being here.
16	It's your first hearing. So, I guess
17	it I guess it you're still alive, so I
18	guess it still went to it well.
19	And Mr. O'Brien and your client, thank
20	you for being here. I'll make a I'll make a
21	motion that we take no further action.

1	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: So, all those
2	in favor, say aye.
3	(Chorus of ayes)
4	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All opposed?
5	(No response)
6	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: So the Board
7	has voted four to zero to NFA this. And thank
8	you for your presence today. Have a good day.
