The Alcoholic Beverage Control Board met in the Alcoholic Beverage Control Hearing Room, Reeves Building, 2000 14th Street, N.W., Suite 400S, Washington, D.C. 20009, Chairperson Donovan W. Anderson, presiding.

3	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right, our
4	next case is a fact finding hearing on Red River
5	Grill, Union Pub, a one-day substantial change
6	application. Will the parties please approach
7	and identify themselves for the record, please?
8	MR. WEISS: Matthew Weiss, owner of
9	the Union Pub.
10	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Good afternoon,
11	Mr. Weiss.
12	MS. FINLAY: Anna Finlay, committee
13	member of Credit Union Cherry Blossom Ten Mile
14	Run.
15	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: I'm sorry; what
16	organization do you belong to, ma'am?
17	MS. FINLAY: I'm sorry?
18	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: What
19	organization do you belong to?
20	MS. FINLAY: There we go. I am a
21	committee member of the Credit Union Cherry
22	Blossom Ten Mile Run.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Mr. Weiss, right?

MR. WEISS: Yes.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: You requested a one-day substantial change. Can you explain to me what it is that you're -- what is it you're seeking?

MR. WEISS: Sure. This is a charitable organization that puts on a ten-mile cherry blossom run on Sunday, April 7th, on the Mall. For the last five years, we have been hired by them, also donating our time, to provide beer and a mocktail, non-alcoholic mocktail, to the race participants as part of the event to pick up their race stuff.

In other words, at the Building

Museum, from 3:00 p.m. to 8:00 p.m., participants

that have registered come and pick up their

registration materials. Then in the great hall,

they will have a number of vendors and sponsors,

including sneaker company, power bars, granola

bars, and then we're one part of it, where we'll

be serving beer and a non-alcoholic beverage from 5:00 to 8:00 p.m.

When the race participants gather their materials, they will be given a drink ticket. They will come to our portion, which will be in part of the great hall, where we will have our staff serving. They will ID each participant. If they are of age, with valid ID, and they want a beer, they will be given one 6-ounce pour of beer of their choice, or if they'd prefer or they're under age, they can have the non-alcoholic mocktail.

It's really only one drink per person, only six ounces. The main course of this event is not even a food and beverage festival or anything in that way. It's really just an opportunity for the race participants to get their stuff early, so they don't have to register everybody that morning, and then get off at 7:12 in the morning, and for the sponsors to have a little tent and promotions.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: You say you

1	have been doing this, so you have applied for
2	this type of license before from us?
3	MR. WEISS: Yes.
4	MEMBER ALBERTI: Real quick, was it
5	always at the Building Museum?
6	MS. FINLAY: The race expo has always
7	been (Simultaneous Speaking).
8	MEMBER ALBERTI: Okay.
9	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Do you have any
10	questions, Mr. Puente?
11	MR. PUENTE: Just a few.
12	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Go ahead,
13	please.
14	MR. PUENTE: Kevin Puente,
15	investigator. Will the national hall is that
16	what it's called?
17	PARTICIPANT: National Building
18	Museum.
19	MR. PUENTE: Will they have security
20	inside the building?
21	MR. WEISS: Yes.
22	MR. PUENTE: Will you guys be giving

1	out wristbands to anyone that's over 21?
2	MR. WEISS: No.
3	MR. PUENTE: Will your area be it
4	won't be fenced in or anything, just open, people
5	come up to the table?
6	MR. WEISS: Yes.
7	MR. PUENTE: Okay, that's all I have.
8	MEMBER SHORT: I have one question.
9	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Yes, Mr. Short.
10	MEMBER SHORT: How would your event
11	first of all, good afternoon.
12	MR. WEISS: Good afternoon.
13	MEMBER SHORT: How would your event
14	handle, unfortunately, if someone what are the
15	ages of the people that you're reaching out to
16	for this event? What are the ages?
17	MR. WEISS: What's the age range of
18	the participants?
19	MS. FINLAY: There are no age ranges
20	to participate in the race, so we do have all age
21	ranges, but we will be ID'ing them for the beer.
22	MEMBER SHORT: How will you

differentiate a teenager or someone under the legal drinking age from getting a drink when -- what safeguards are you going to have in place to take care of that?

MR. WEISS: My staff will ID every single person, regardless of how old they look, when they come to redeem their drink ticket. If they don't have valid ID, or they're not of age, they will not be served.

MEMBER SHORT: I'm very familiar with the building. You're going to be using the great hall. Once people come in to get checked at the door, then they'll mingle.

MR. WEISS: Right.

MEMBER SHORT: If I'm somebody who thinks my 18-year-old friend needs a drink and I hand him a cup, what's going to stop that from happening? What do you have in place?

MR. WEISS: We discussed that. Again, the nature of the event, I think, A, that doesn't really -- it's not a concern as much. I'm not saying it's not a concern, but not as much as in,

1 maybe, perhaps, other applications. We have 2 coordinated with them. They're going to have 10 to 20 3 volunteers that will be walking around. 4 5 staff will also rotate walking around. If we see 6 anybody that doesn't -- we don't recall serving a drink to or looks under age, we will certainly 7 8 stop them. 9 MEMBER SHORT: How many people are 10 going to be in that great hall? MR. WEISS: It's about 1,000 people, 11 but coming and going. I don't know how many will 12 be there at one time. 13 14 MEMBER SHORT: Can I make a suggestion 15 to you? 16 MR. WEISS: Sure. 17 MEMBER SHORT: Probably to alleviate 18 some of the problems. Someone asked about 19 wristbands. Will you be serving only alcohol, 20 serving sodas, water? 21 MR. WEISS: Yes, there will be a 22 non-alcoholic option.

MEMBER SHORT: If soda's in a red cup and water's in a red cup, what a lot of events do is they put water in a clear cup, making them different colors. What we normally do with groups that large, wristbands.

It helps if our investigator happens to come, just to pop in to see if you're doing things legally, and he sees three or four people drinking, and he checks on one and they happen to be under age, and you say well, we have 1,000 people, we checked as much as we could, we try to alleviate that. We try to nip it in the bud before it happens, so you won't have a problem, the City won't have -- and you can have a very wonderful event. Will you have a problem with wristbands and working with the investigators to -- they can tell you how to do that because they do this all the time.

MR. WEISS: Yes, I'm familiar. Do you guys mind if we have the wristbands?

MS. FINLAY: No, anything that we can do to make sure that --

1 MEMBER ALBERTI: I'm going to 2 interject here and just sort of -- I hate to contradict you like this, but I'm sort of 3 4 familiar with these types of events. personally, don't see the need for wristbands. 5 Your suggestion of having different-colored cups 6 7 8 Absolutely. MR. WEISS: 9 MEMBER ALBERTI: -- if you have even 10 labeled cups with whatever brand of beer you're selling, or a brand of beer, and only serve 11 alcohol in those, that's a great recommendation. 12 I think it's a little overkill because it's only 13 14 -- you only get one drink, only if you have a 15 number. You're going to have to present to them, 16 probably, your registration materials, right? 17 MR. WEISS: Right --18 MEMBER ALBERTI: You get a ticket. 19 MR. WEISS: -- one ticket, and then 20 that's it. 21 MEMBER SHORT: Mr. Alberti, thank you 22 very much (Simultaneous Speaking). I understand.

MEMBER ALBERTI: I don't want to burden them with something that's --

MEMBER SHORT: I understand. I don't want to burden many groups that come in here, but I don't cherry pick, either. To address you appropriately, I hope, as I possibly can, and respectfully.

We can't say because I do something with this group -- because there's some groups that come here that I do things with, but I still would like to see us to have a standard, where everybody's on the same playing field, so if anything does come up, we've taken every necessary step.

I understand, Mr. Alberti, that you know this, and you know them well. They didn't seem to have a problem thinking that wristbands were -- or do you have a problem with that?

MR. WEISS: Honestly, we would prefer not to. I think it's an extra layer. If it was something where we were providing a bar that was open, where people could come for multiple

drinks, absolutely, without -- we would have
totally --

MEMBER SHORT: I'm open for new things, but again, normally, when people come in with 1,000 or some people and there's drinking going on -- we have cases here -- we had cases here today -- most people would say that would never happen in my business, but there's always a slip-up or some people who want to out-slick other people. I know because Mr. Alberti goes to very outstanding events, he wouldn't vouch for you if you weren't good. He wouldn't.

But the bottom line is, again, if we, as a Board and a City, say the rule applies to everyone, then someone can't come in and say they had an event down at the National Museum and they didn't have to have wristbands, and they didn't have to have different color cups. What's the difference between that group and -- oh, Mr. Alberti spoke up for this group. To save Mr. Alberti in this -- I would just suggest that you talk with Kevin Puente. He can tell you how to

do this, probably, inexpensively and do it in a way that you will make him comfortable, and investigators who come -- because there will be investigators that will come into your -- it won't be Mr. Alberti, I think.

What I'm asking you is -- I'm not trying to put any burden on you that we don't put on any other group that's 1,000 people or more.

The City has a lot of things going on. We read the paper every day about things happening in different places.

The police work a little better when we know who's doing what and who's where. Things with the wristbands and things, it would help law enforcement; it would help public safety; it would help a lot of things.

MR. WEISS: Sure, I appreciate -
MEMBER SHORT: I say that because I
have a little background in that.

MR. WEISS: Certainly. I've also had a liquor license here for 25 years, so I understand. I want to make it clear; I'm not

saying that we won't do it. I want to put on a good charitable event. I'm only answering your question to say that I would prefer not to have to do the extra level for this type of event, but absolutely, if it's the recommendation of the Board, we will absolutely do it, no problem.

MEMBER SHORT: I'm just one Board member. Mr. Alberti's another. At any rate, I think if you talk with -- in fact, let me ask the investigator. I'm not trying to -- what is your opinion, Mr. Puente, investigator?

MR. PUENTE: With this event, I've been to events like this similar in the past.

Will there be a lot of underage drinking? From my experience, no, but just to safeguard, I would recommend either a wristband or maybe put an X on patrons who are over 21.

At least that way, the volunteers and security know if they see someone with a cup in their hand without an X or something, they know they're possibly under age and drinking.

MEMBER SHORT: Thank you very much for

1	your opinion. That's all I have.
2	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Thank you, Mr.
3	Short. Any other questions by any other Board
4	members?
5	MEMBER WAHABZADAH: Are there any
6	other vendors, besides Union Pub, that will be
7	serving alcohol at this event?
8	MR. WEISS: No.
9	MEMBER WAHABZADAH: About how many
10	other vendors are there, in general,
11	non-alcoholic establishments?
12	MS. FINLAY: We have, I'm going to
13	estimate, about 25 other vendors around the
14	National Building Museum, like what Matt said
15	earlier. They're power bar vendors, clothing
16	vendors, things like that for the race
17	participants.
18	MEMBER WAHABZADAH: Thank you.
19	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: For the record,
20	that was Ms. Wahabzadah. Any other final
21	comments you want to make, sir?
22	MR. WEISS: No. I would only say, for

the wristbands, that I don't -- I think we should, as Union Pub -- because we're going to be the ones responsible for ID'ing, so when they check in, instead of having the burden be on the race coordinators of confirming who's 21 or not, that when they come to our station, they will be ID'd, and then either an X or the wristband will have to be given by our staff. I think that is the best course of action for us to be responsible for what we know how to do, as opposed to the race coordinators.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: If there's a violation, you're the one we're coming after, so, therefore --

(Simultaneous Speaking.)

MR. WEISS: I don't want to do this anymore. I'm getting scared.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: If you think that's the best way to do it, then -- I was just saying if there's a violation, we're not going to go after the young lady beside you. We're going after you. So whichever way you believe that you

1	can more appropriately protect your
2	establishment, then that's fine with the Board.
3	MR. WEISS: Very good.
4	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: With that said,
5	I make a motion that we approve the one-day
6	substantial change. Is there a second?
7	MEMBER SHORT: Second.
8	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Mr. Short has
9	seconded the motion. All those in favor, say
10	aye.
11	(Chorus of ayes.)
12	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All those
13	opposed.
14	(No audible response.)
15	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: The matter
16	passed 6-0-0. The office is closed, but you can
17	pick up your license tomorrow.
18	MR. WEISS: Okay.
19	(Simultaneous Speaking).
20	MR. WEISS: Oh, yes, I know. I've
21	seen you many times here.
22	(Simultaneous Speaking.)

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right,
thank you. As chairperson of the Alcoholic
Beverage Control Board for the District of
Columbia, and in accordance with D.C. Official
Code Section 2.574(b) of the Open Meetings Act -
hold on, before I say that, let me make sure

10	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Mr. Anderson,
11	I agree. As it appears that the motion has
12	passed, I hereby give notice that ABC Board will
13	hold the closed meeting, pursuant to the Open
14	Meetings Act.

16	Board Hearing Room bulletin board, placed on
17	electronic calendar and ABRA's website, and
