3	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right.
4	We're back on the record and our next case we
5	have a, I'm sorry, this is a Fact Finding Hearing
6	regarding a Manager's Application Manager's
7	License for Mr. Davin M. Vice.
8	Can you state your name for the record
9	sir, please?
10	MR. VICE: Yes, sir. My name is Davin
11	Vice.
12	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Okay. Mr.
13	Vice, you have requested, you applied for
14	manager's license and as part of the manager's
15	license that there are, you have to provide a
16	background check.
17	MR. VICE: Yes, sir.
18	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: And you
19	provided, we got a criminal background check from
20	you and there are some concerns that the Agency
21	has. And so it says that if you've committed a

felony and which is less than ten years, that you

can't get a license, I think a misdemeanor for five years, then that's, we can consider it.

There are a lot of issues on this application and so we've decided to bring you in for you to explain to us. So you can start off first by, I see that you, as part of the record that you have put in a request to have your record expunged?

MR. VICE: Yes.

CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: So can you please explain to us what does that mean and where is our process?

MR. VICE: Okay. So the charge basically, I haven't been really found guilty for the charge because they haven't bring in any hard evidence on me.

What they did was put me on probation before a justice and gave me a period of probation to finish. And once I did that, then I was eligible to get my charge wiped clean from my record altogether. And I'm at the process of doing it now.

1	Actually yesterday I was at court in
2	Baltimore with that process and she said she
3	would do it, I just need a letter stating that
4	it's affecting my jobs or my hiring.
5	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: I guess, so you
6	said you were given probation and that so what
7	was that period and have you complete, what was
8	that period that you were given
9	MR. VICE: I was given a two-year
10	probation term that I completed. So two-year
11	probation started
12	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: So when did it
13	start, I'm sorry, when did this start and when
14	did it end?
15	MR. VICE: This started in 2015 and it
16	ended in 2017.
17	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: But when in
18	2017?
19	MR. ALBERTI: Just FYI, it says here
20	September of 2015, is that correct?
21	MR. VICE: Yes, sir.
22	MR. ALBERTI: Yes, September 23rd the

1	records say.
2	MR. VICE: 23rd, yes, sir.
3	MR. ALBERTI: 2015 is when it started?
4	MR. VICE: Yes, sir.
5	MR. ALBERTI: Okay. I just want to
6	put that out there.
7	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right.
8	(Simultaneous speaking.)
9	MR. VICE: I'm sorry. September 23rd,
10	2015 to September 23rd, 2017 is when it stopped,
11	when it was over. Then from that point on I was
12	eligible for expunging which is cleaning my
13	background of the case altogether.
14	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Where is, let
15	me ask you a question also.
16	MR. VICE: Yes, sir?
17	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: On the front
18	page, well, when did you fill in this
19	application?
20	MR. VICE: It was a couple
21	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Approximately,
22	when did you apply?

1	MR. VICE: Maybe last month sometime,
2	I believe.
3	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: In September?
4	MR. ALBERTI: January. The date it
5	was accepted was January
6	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: No, it's
7	MR. VICE: January 9th.
8	PARTICIPANT: Right here.
9	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Oh, 9th day of,
10	I was looking right here. It was written, I
11	guess the notary had the day before.
12	But so the problem that let me ask
13	you a question. On Page, on Number 8 of your
14	application, one of the questions was that 8-C
15	says have you been convicted of a misdemeanor
16	during the past five years or a felon during the
17	past ten years, if yes, attach a copy of the
18	court disposition.
19	And you said no. So why did you check
20	no on that box if?
21	MR. VICE: I must have misread the
22	question, sir. I'm sorry. I did give you a copy

1	of my background with the fingerprinting. I
2	completed the TIP classes. I must have misread
3	the question. I'm sorry.
4	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Because I'm
5	also concerned when someone gives
6	MR. VICE: It wasn't being dishonest.
7	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right.
8	(Off the record comment.)
9	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Well, but it's
10	not, there are
11	(Off the record comment.)
12	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Oh, and it's
13	convicted.
14	PARTICIPANT: If he's good for two
15	years then the charges are dropped.
16	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: I know, but I'm
17	saying but that's not, there are a lot of other.
18	Well, let me ask this question.
19	PARTICIPANT: I don't see why he would
20	answer that.
21	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right. Let
22	me ask the question.

1	Based on this, you know, you were in
2	my shoes and I saw your background that you
3	provided me with and what, do you have a job
4	currently?
5	MR. VICE: Yes. I'm not in the
6	position I want to be in but I have a job.
7	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: No, but I'm
8	saying why are you applying for a
9	MR. VICE: Manager's license?
10	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Yes.
11	MR. VICE: So I can get a higher wage.
12	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Oh, so you
13	don't have a job that requires you to have a
14	manager's license? That's what I'm trying to
15	find out?
16	MR. VICE: Right now?
17	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Yes.
18	MR. VICE: No, I don't but it's, I'm
19	at the level where it's though I can't
20	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: No, I'm fine
21	with that. No, I thought, so you're applying for
22	a manager's

1	MR. VICE: So I can move up.
2	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: So you can move
3	up?
4	MR. VICE: Yes, sir.
5	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: So it's not
6	like, okay, you have the job and you need this,
7	okay, which I'm fine with.
8	MR. VICE: No, I mean, I do need it to
9	keep the job, if that's what you're asking.
10	MR. ALBERTI: Can I just ask, where
11	are you working now?
12	MR. VICE: I'm located on 1818 Benning
13	Road, Sylvia's Liquor Store.
14	MR. ALBERTI: Sylvia's?
15	MR. VICE: Sylvia's Liquor Store.
16	MR. ALBERTI: And you want the
17	manager's license to be a manager at that store?
18	MR. VICE: Yes, sir.
19	MR. ALBERTI: Okay. So this would be
20	a promotion if you had a manager's license?
21	MR. VICE: It would be like keeping my
22	job founded, grounded, like, I could be replaced

1	right now. You understand what I'm saying?
2	MR. ALBERTI: So it gives you more job
3	experience?
4	MR. VICE: And he just hired me
5	because I'm a prime candidate for a manager's
6	license or that's what he thinks.
7	MR. ALBERTI: Okay. That's what we're
8	talking about. Okay.
9	MR. VICE: If I'm not able to grasp a
LO	manager's license, I'm sure that he'll find
L1	somebody that can and get rid of me.
L2	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right. So
L3	you was in my position
L 4	MR. VICE: Yes, sir.
L5	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: and you
L6	provided me, and yes, you told me that your
L7	license is, you're going through the process of
L8	getting your record expunged. Why should we give
L9	you this license?
20	MR. VICE: I think you should give me
21	a chance because I'm trying my best to pass this.
22	Like I said, I proved that it's not that I've

1 been convicted because otherwise I would have 2 still been locked up. I would have still been arrested. 3 4 They couldn't prove me guilty for it, 5 so they just put me on probation to watch to see 6 if I would have been messed up or something and I 7 didn't mess up. I completed that. I'm working. 8 Like the job really affects my life, sir. If you 9 can just give me a chance, I can prove to you that I'm reliable for this but I won't do 10 11 anything to make you regret it. 12 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right. Any 13 other questions by any of the Board members? 14 Go ahead, Mr. Alberti. 15 So Mr. Vice --MR. ALBERTI: 16 MR. VICE: Yes, sir? 17 MR. ALBERTI: Mr. Vice --18 MR. VICE: Yes, sir? 19 MR. ALBERTI: I'm going to ask you 20 maybe a couple tough questions here, all right? 21 MR. VICE: Okay. That's fine. 22 MR. ALBERTI: It says it's, just the

1 underlying charge, the one that we have to deal 2 with and you were given probation upon judgement, I get it. So really, after probation they're 3 4 essentially dropping the charge? 5 MR. VICE: Yes. But you were charged for 6 MR. ALBERTI: 7 this enough and there was probably, there seemed 8 to be enough evidence that the judge would give 9 you probation. And this is assault in the first-10 degree. 11 MR. VICE: Yes, sir. 12 MR. ALBERTI: Can you tell me what 13 events led up to that charge being brought 14 forward? They basically, I was 15 MR. VICE: 16 suspect because I was there. 17 MR. ALBERTI: Where? Where are you, 18 where were you? 19 MR. VICE: It was a party. 20 MR. ALBERTI: You were at a party? 21 MR. VICE: Yes, sir. 22 MR. ALBERTI: And what happened at the

1	party?
2	MR. VICE: The party got a little
3	wild. Alcohol was involved, I guess. I don't
4	know. But the police wound up coming because
5	somebody had been in a fight and I was arrested.
6	MR. ALBERTI: So tell me a little bit
7	about the fight?
8	MR. VICE: I don't really know much
9	about the fight, sir. I was just at the wrong
LO	place at the wrong time and
L1	MR. ALBERTI: Well, you were at the
L 2	party?
L3	MR. VICE: Yes.
L 4	MR. ALBERTI: Listen, I'm not trying
L5	to look to find fault. I just want to know, I
L6	just want some assurance that, about your
L7	judgement and, you know, because you're going to
L8	be judging, I mean, you're going to be in a
L9	position of responsibility.
20	MR. VICE: Yes, sir.
21	MR. ALBERTI: And so, I mean, I just
22	need to know, it seems like you're hiding

1	something from me. Because you're at the party,
2	oh, and the police came in and I was just at the
3	wrong place at the wrong time. And that's all
4	the information, and there happened to be a fight
5	at the party but I don't know anything about it.
6	That's all the information you're giving to me.
7	I can't believe that's all
8	MR. VICE: Want me to go into detail
9	of the party?
10	MR. ALBERTI: No, I can't believe
11	that's all you know about the incident.
12	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: I think we're
13	
14	MR. ALBERTI: Did they arrest, let me
15	say, did they arrest everybody at the party?
16	MR. VICE: They arrested me and a
17	couple of other guys.
18	MR. ALBERTI: Well, then why did they
19	single you and a couple of other guys out?
20	MR. VICE: Why did they single me and
21	a couple, because we were hanging together and we
22	came to the party together.

1 That's not a reason to MR. ALBERTI: 2 single you out. They didn't know you came to the 3 party together. 4 MR. VICE: That's what they told me. 5 The guys that I was with were in a fight with the 6 guy and he was in the hospital and he said my 7 name. That's why I was singled out basically for 8 the assault. 9 MR. ALBERTI: So the victim, the 10 person who ended up in the hospital because of 11 the fight --12 MR. VICE: Yes, sir. 13 MR. ALBERTI: -- mentioned your name? 14 Yes, sir. MR. VICE: 15 MR. ALBERTI: Okay. How badly was he 16 hurt? 17 MR. VICE: He was, I guess he was 18 pretty mangled but he didn't, no life 19 threatening. Like the state always tack on extra 20 charges so one of the state, I already know their 21 tactic but it's like, he wasn't, I don't know. He was pretty bad, I don't know. 22

Like I said, I didn't put hands on the 1 2 guy or anything. I don't understand why I was even wrote up. I just, I knew that I was with 3 4 the company so guilty by association. 5 MR. ALBERTI: Okay. I'm going to be 6 quite honest with you. What gives me pause is that this is not the first time you ended up 7 8 being arrested, not charged, not prosecuted, but 9 arrested for an assault. It seems like you're in 10 the wrong place at the wrong time more than once. 11 MR. VICE: No, that was not the case, 12 sir. 13 MR. ALBERTI: Can you help me out 14 here? MR. VICE: Prior charges, you're not 15 16 talking about this one? 17 MR. ALBERTI: Well, you know, it was 18 a while back. I get it, it was a while back. Ι 19 got one in 2004. 20 MR. VICE: A lot of racist people in 21 the world. Like I had to fight a lot going through school. I don't know how else to explain 22

1	it.
2	MR. ALBERTI: You were 21 years old in
3	2004.
4	MR. VICE: Yes.
5	MR. ALBERTI: Which school would it
6	have been?
7	MR. VICE: No, I was just probably
8	just being an average teen or just being bad, I
9	don't know.
10	MR. ALBERTI: You were 21 years old.
11	MR. VICE: Yes, sir. I understand.
12	MR. ALBERTI: Not an average teen.
13	MR. VICE: I don't know what you want
14	me to say, sir.
15	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Let me finish.
16	Go ahead.
17	MR. SHORT: Are you done?
18	MR. ALBERTI: Yes, I'm done.
19	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Go ahead, Mr.
20	Short.
21	MR. SHORT: Good afternoon, sir.
22	MR. VICE: Good afternoon.

1	MR. SHORT: I just have to bring this
2	up. To read in the paper in the last few years
3	but especially these last couple of months.
4	Baltimore has had some rough, rough times.
5	MR. VICE: Yes, sir. Yes, sir.
6	MR. SHORT: Seven police officers
7	arrested for setting people up, sending people to
8	jail, robbing people. Did you know any of these
9	police officers that arrested you or were you
10	familiar with them in your neighborhood?
11	MR. VICE: I don't want to say that I
12	know them but
13	MR. SHORT: Are you familiar with
14	them?
15	MR. VICE: I've seen them around but
16	I don't know them personally.
17	MR. SHORT: So the night that they
18	came in the party and arrested you and how many
19	other people?
20	MR. VICE: It was two other people.
21	MR. SHORT: And all of you from the
22	same neighborhood?

MR. VICE: No, we were not. We knew each other from my old job in in Baltimore City. Used to work together.

MR. SHORT: Yes, well. I'll just say this and I hate that it's on record but I must be truthful. I wouldn't want to live in Baltimore for all the tea in China after what I've read.

This is --

MR. VICE: Yes, it's pretty rough, sir.

MR. SHORT: What they did to Gray and some other things. So I just have to, anybody who would come before this Board and say to me, you know, the police department just caught me up for this reason or that reason, it seems like a lot of that was going on in Baltimore.

And it just seems to me that if they really had a case on you, that they, second-degree murder or first-degree murder, two years and then that's just enough to get a person's nose or get the job prospects, get their lives all messed up. And in two years the case is gone

1	but it's still on your record.
2	MR. VICE: Yes, sir.
3	MR. SHORT: So now you're trying to
4	get it expunged. And you're working at Sylvia's
5	at 18th and Benning Road?
6	MR. VICE: Yes, sir.
7	MR. SHORT: Right across the street
8	from Langston Grill?
9	MR. VICE: From Wings and More Wings.
LO	MR. SHORT: Wings and More Wings on
L1	the corner but Langston Grill's a couple doors
L2	down.
L3	MR. VICE: I'm not familiar. I'm new.
L 4	MR. SHORT: I know the neighborhood
L5	well. I was born at 719 Langston Terrace right
L6	around the corner from there so I know the
L7	neighborhood quite well. I just have to say this
L8	to you. Welcome to Washington D.C. Are you
L9	living in Washington now?
20	MR. VICE: No, I can't afford it here.
21	I can't.
22	MR. SHORT: I guess you can't.

1	MR. VICE: It's too expensive here.
2	Compared to Baltimore City it's like moving to
3	New York, man. It's too expensive.
4	MR. SHORT: Yes, well, I tell you
5	what, I would find some extra money. I'd get out
6	of Baltimore if I were you. I'd get the heck out
7	of there.
8	MR. VICE: I'm trying. I really am
9	trying.
10	MR. SHORT: That's no place for
11	anybody who wants a future.
12	MR. VICE: I'm really trying, sir, but
13	I need certain eligibilities to be promoted and
14	move on. Like I don't have a whole lot of trade
15	skills.
16	MR. SHORT: So when's the last time
17	you had trouble with the police?
18	MR. VICE: 2015, sir.
10	m. viel. 2013, bil.
19	MR. SHORT: And then how long you been
19	MR. SHORT: And then how long you been

1	from Baltimore from Washington every day?
2	MR. VICE: Yes, sir. Via train or via
3	Greyhound. I did have a rental car for a while
4	but it was too expensive also. They were
5	charging me over \$300 a week.
6	MR. SHORT: Mr. Vice, if this Board
7	were to give you a manager's license here in the
8	District of Columbia and it's going to help your
9	life, I hope you really aren't pulling our leg
10	and that you are really someone who wants to get
11	his life straightened out.
12	MR. VICE: Yes, sir, I do.
13	MR. SHORT: Okay.
14	MR. VICE: Right.
15	MR. SHORT: We wish you the very best.
16	As a Board Member, I wish you the very best.
17	That's all I have, Mr. Chair.
18	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Any other
19	questions by any other Board members?
20	Anything that you want to say?
21	MR. VICE: Yes, sir.
22	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: What's that?

1	MR. VICE: I do want to say something.
2	Like I said, I have completed my TIP training. I
3	have had experience in liquor stores for over the
4	past 12 years, in Baltimore City and in D.C.
5	I am going up for the expungement I am
6	eligible for. I have the court letters from
7	Baltimore here.
8	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: What's that?
9	MR. VICE: That's my expungement and
10	my date where I'll get it expunged.
11	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Let me, why
12	didn't you, why did you have, why didn't you
13	bring it up earlier?
14	MR. VICE: I told you.
15	(Simultaneous speaking.)
16	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: We've been
17	trying to get you to do that. That's what we
18	wanted you to do.
19	What was the first question I asked
20	you? I said to you, where do we stand?
21	MR. ALBERTI: It's okay. It's all
22	right.

1	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Sorry. You
2	have to stay out, please. We'll call you.
3	Remember the first question I asked
4	you? I said to you, where are you with the
5	expungement? You said you went to court
6	yesterday but you didn't tell me that, okay, you
7	said you told the lady's trying to
8	MR. ALBERTI: He's trying to help you,
9	Mr. Vice.
10	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: So all you need
11	to say, I went to court yesterday, this is what
12	receive and I have oh, let me see what it
13	says, okay.
14	So you had an expungement hearing
15	yesterday?
16	MR. VICE: Yes, sir.
17	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: And so tell us
18	again for the record what happened yesterday at
19	the expungement hearing that you had.
20	MR. VICE: So yesterday I had an
21	expungement hearing in Baltimore City. The
22	outcome of that was, the judge asked me, she

1 said, is this hindering your life and how so if 2 it is? And I told her that it's holding me 3 4 back from getting certain positions in jobs. And 5 she said, well, if you can provide a letter 6 stating that, then I'll happily remove the 7 charges from your background. 8 And then so I said, okay, I will 9 provide the letter, how much time do I have? said how about two weeks and then I'll set you a 10 11 court date for February 20th, 2018. 12 that's fine. So I'll go back down there and provide 13 14 the letter and she will keep up her word and 15 expunge my record. 16 MR. ALBERTI: I would assume getting 17 a manager's license would also help you today? 18 MR. VICE: Yes, sir. It would. Maybe 19 if you can write --MR. ALBERTI: Well, you'll have, if 20 21 you were granted the license, you'd have it to show. 22

1	MR. VICE: Okay.
2	MR. SHORT: Good luck to you. Get out
3	of Baltimore as soon as you can. Get out of
4	there.
5	MR. VICE: I know. I have 34 years
6	there, man.
7	MR. ALBERTI: What hours do you work?
8	MR. VICE: Right now it's shaky
9	because I work around the owner and the manager
10	that he's assisting with.
11	MR. ALBERTI: Yes.
12	MR. VICE: So my hours fluctuate.
13	Sometimes I do it 2:00 to close, sometimes I do
14	it 12:00 to close.
15	MR. ALBERTI: Sylvia's is a liquor
16	store?
17	MR. VICE: Liquor store, yes, sir.
18	MR. ALBERTI: Okay.
19	MR. VICE: So my hours fluctuate.
20	MR. ALBERTI: Yes.
21	MR. VICE: My hours would be more
22	steady if I have a manager's license. That way,

1 you know --2 MR. ALBERTI: The owner wouldn't have to be there while you were in charge. 3 4 MR. VICE: Right. Exactly. 5 MR. ALBERTI: I get it. CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: At least we 6 7 know they're trying to do the right thing. I'11 8 just put that in the record. 9 MR. ALBERTI: Yes. No, the owner's 10 trying to, I understand that. The owner's trying 11 to do the right --12 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: I'll put in the 13 record that based on the representation that 14 they're trying to do the right thing, that they 15 know you don't have a manager's license. have to make sure there is either an owner or an 16 17 ABC manager on duty at all times. So I --18 PARTICIPANT: I'll sign it. 19 CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right. Any final words before we vote? 20 21 MR. VICE: Okay. Thank you for your 22 time.

1	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: For the record,
2	please. Sir, can you stay outside, please, sir?
3	PARTICIPANT: I mean, if he has the
4	money he can get it today.
5	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All right. Any
6	other question by any other, any other question
7	by any Board members?
8	All right. All right, sir. I'm going
9	to make a motion that we're going to give you a
10	chance and I hope that I never have the pleasure
11	of seeing you again.
12	And when I say that to people because
13	normally when you come here it's never for a good
14	reason. Okay. So I make a motion that we grant
15	a manager's license. Hear a second?
16	MR. SHORT: Second.
17	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Mr. Short has
18	seconded the motion. All in favor say aye?
19	(Chorus of ayes.)
20	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: All opposed?
21	Okay. The matter passed 6 to nothing. I'll sign
22	off on it and if you have the money, you can go

1	out the front desk and get your license, sir.
2	MR. VICE: Thank you, sir. Thank you
3	all.
4	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: And I do hope
5	that we get to
6	MR. VICE: I need the
7	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Oh, you're
8	going to get it back. We're making a copy but
9	we're giving you this you can take to the front
10	desk and if you have the money
11	MR. ALBERTI: Just wait a second.
12	We're going to give you this.
13	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Didn't I just
14	say we're going to give you a paper?
15	MR. ALBERTI: Boy, you're being tough
16	today.
17	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: We're going to
18	give this to you.
19	MR. VICE: Yes, sir.
20	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: When she comes
21	up with your receipt, you take it to the front
22	desk and if you haven't, if you've paid the fee,

1	if you have paid the fee for the license you can
2	walk out with your license.
3	MR. VICE: Okay.
4	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Okay. So
5	MR. ALBERTI: Yes, she'll be right
6	with you.
7	CHAIRPERSON ANDERSON: Good luck.
8	MR. VICE: Thanks again.
9	MR. SHORT: Get out of Baltimore as
